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# From St. Jude To Judy

Judy Bennett was the first person I interviewed who discussed deep questions on faith. What do you believe? Why does faith matter? Who do you pray to? And what saints do you connect with? These are all important questions to reflect on as Easter nears. Judy is a devout Catholic who has had her share of trials and tribulations. In most cases, they are likely worse than our own. This includes her survival of an attempted murder, and arguably witnessing another. This introductory piece examines the saints she admired. She did, however, want to make it very clear to readers that she herself should not be portrayed as a saint.

The first time I went to Judy Bennett's house, she greeted me with a "Come in!" as if you were foolish for waiting outside. She took my jacket, explained her affinity for daytime Jeopardy, and then yelled at me to NOT take my shoes off. Then the tough question: "Are you a beer drinker? I'm having Jim Beam and 7-up." It sounded delicious; she got the drink and found a writing utensil for she had "pens up the gazoo."


She was worried about me understanding her. I perched on a mini couch near lighting; she sat on the other side with an Amish rocker. There was no confusion hearing her dedication to Roman Catholic saints and her reflection on faith. The following part covers her heroes of devotion from the initial interview, as well as comments from follow up conversations.

## St. Jude Thaddeus

Who is her favorite saint? "Well St. Jude, case of the impossible, my mother named me after him." She continues her story with an "Oh my God." That's how Judy starts many of her stories. Not in the context of using the name in vain, but rather attributing her faith, God and divine providence into her life stories.

"My mother was dating a fellow, and they broke up, but apparently during the dating — she always talked about St. Jude." Judy's mother was in nursing training at Holy Family in Manitowoc, and she got a call that her mother was dying at age 42. "She had a blood clot, and my mother said to her father, 'Pray to St. Jude, I just want to see mom alive.'"

When mom got to the homestead in North Fond du



## Padre Pio Book

Judy Bennett holds up a picture from a booklet on one of her favorite saints, Padre Pio (1887-1968). A mystical priest who lived in Italy, he was believed to have experienced the stigmata (wounds of Christ at the crucifixion). This image from one of Judy's devotional books shows Padre Pio's open sores on his right hand. Padre Pio had many followers come to Italy to see him say mass. He was canonized by Pope John Paul II. Sincerity is an important aspect of this saint. Judy said he listened to confessions all day long, "When someone made an insincere confession, he would call 'em on it, and not give them absolution. Can you imagine?" Padre Pio and followers have indicated he could read souls. He also claimed the power of bilocation, in which he could be in two places at once. He claimed he would even do more in the afterlife: "After my death, I will do more. My real mission will begin after my death." Such spiritual powers appeal to the faithful like Judy Bennett.



## Pio Blanket

Judy Bennett shows her blanket honoring Padre Pio, a mystical Catholic priest who over the course of his lifetime brought thousands in pilgrimage to San Giovanni Rotondo in Foggia, Italy. He died in 1968, and was canonized a saint in 2002.



## Father Damien Postcard

This early 1900s postcard of Father Damien shows the effects of leprosy on the priest who dedicated his life to helping the lepers on the island of Molokai in Hawaii. It was taken shortly before his death at age 49 in 1889.



## St. Maria Goretti Postcard

This postcard shows the display for most of the remains of Saint Maria Goretti. Although some mistakenly think that Saint Maria's body did not decompose, what is known as "incorrupt," her body did in fact go through the natural decay after her murder. Today, most of her remains are sealed in this wax statue within a glass casket in Nettuno, south of Rome. According to mariagoretti.com, her mother allowed her right arm to be donated to the church in her birth town of Corinaldo. This is the arm that rejected the man who tried to rape her.

Judy saw this postcard's image in real life when she visited Italy in the 1960s, and could remember the book that her mother read to Judy and her sisters. She was impressed on how the childhood story book images of Maria matched what she saw with the wax statue.

Lac, "My grandfather, her father, met her at the door and said, 'Margaret — come in here.' And she died shortly thereafter, but St. Jude answered her prayer to keep her alive. Whether her mother was conscious and knew she was there, I don't know." Judy added, "She died about 15 minutes after my mother saw her. And my mother always vowed that she would name her first child after St. Jude."

After Judy's mom and dad were married, they were back in Manitowoc and they met up with the man her mom used to date. "He walked up to my mother and dad, and he said, 'Oh, I hear you have got a baby girl.' How is Judy doing?"

The meeting was mere happenstance. "It was a tavern... maybe it was a nightclub." It was not awkward with mom's former boyfriend, Judy said, for the memory validates mom was serious about naming her first child for St. Jude.

"He knew that she, my mother, would name me after St. Jude. Case of the impossible. Impossible cases." This is how Judy talks, and often in phrases that uniquely piece important parts of her story. The fragments are not always in order, but they are said with sharp tone that makes you desire more. Her memory goes back to her mother. "She had a holy card of St. Jude; she died at 67. Forever. Next to her bed."

## Father Damien


Judy left North Fond du Lac High School after her freshman year to spend three years at Manitowoc where she was on the "aspirant" path to become a nun at Holy Family Convent. Mom trained earlier at the hospital, so these Holy Family institutions were at different locations in the Manitowoc area.

Judy said those three years aligned more with being a convent than a high school. The schooling promoted a serious curriculum on Catholicism, including Latin. The culture was strict too. "We didn't have habits, but my mother had to make three black dresses with white collars." She described the trajectory on the pace to become a nun, from aspirants, then she would have gone to postulancy, then a novitiate. However, in those high school days, "aspirants is what they called us." She affirmed it was like a convent prep school. "In those days, they wouldn't have referred to it as that, but today definitely."

It was there that she learned the story of Father Damien on the island of Molokai in Hawaii. She can't say for sure what made her gravitate to the Fr. Damien story, but the devotion is there. "Every book that Holy Family Convent had on Damien, I read." It was an amazing story of dedication to those who are sick.

Hawaii, or The Sandwich Islands, was 'discovered' by the British in the late 1700s. The impact of outsiders on Hawaii brought in leprosy by the 1800s, and Hawaii converted a portion of the island of Molokai, where there were sheer cliffs, into a leper colony secluded from the rest of Hawaii. By the 1870s, Fr. Damien, a Roman Catholic priest, dedicated his life to serving those debilitated by what was also known as Hanson's Disease. In his effort to live among equals with the lepers, he acquired the disease and died from it in 1889.

Judy's mind goes back to her early years of high school, and as she was considering being a nun. "My beloved Father Damien. Oh my God! Those books I read." Then she recalls the head mistress in charge of



## Nazareth Heights Postcard

It takes a kind and compassionate person to work at a nursing home, and Judy Bennett was one of them. What is clear about her working at Nazareth Heights was also the stories she picked up while caring for the retired Sisters of St. Agnes. The building faded from use by the late 1990s, but not before Judy's work of almost twenty years. In that time, she met many sisters, including those who had interacted with the blessed Fr. Solanus Casey. This included sisters who were interviewed by officials from Rome during the investigation on whether he should be canonized as a saint.

her aspirant group at Holy Family. "I'm sure it bugged her that I was reading Damien."

Judy later added that she wasn't a strong student, and one gets the sense her passion for saint stories did not appease the head nun's expectations of a prospective student for the convent. This element of the story is important because the superiors at Holy Family expected more academically from Judy, who herself admitted she could not deliver. She was the only sophomore in a freshman class, and because she was the only one at Holy Family who was from the Milwaukee Diocese, the prayers were said differently, so in some cases "it was a little rough."

Is it accurate to describe herself an aspiring nun who lacked the academic part? She gave a thumbs up. But this is an important message on why people study saints: all people can understand the story. You don't have to be an expert in Latin. "I never took typing, and I always blame that on the three years I had on Latin at Holy Family."

In her mind, it wasn't the Latin that strengthened her faith — it was the stories of the saints. Did she retain the Latin? Her eyes told a "no" with an extra adjective in front of it. They "asked me to leave," and Judy isn't sure if it was because of her hard-of-hearing, or less than adequate grades. Anyways, they were "looking at me," and she notes with resignation: "they knew I did not have a vocation." Judy isn't bitter as she reflected on the head nun's comments. "This was at night right before strict silence. And I must have said to her, 'I've



read my third or fourth book on father Damien.' I think she would have preferred that I was studying some other subject."

For Judy, saints like Damien humanize faith. They are not just human interest stories, but parables and narratives that anybody can understand. Wisdom is useless if it can't be transferred to other people who could relate to it. When one listens to Judy, it is clear her faith is best told in stories like Saint Damien. Judy longed to go to Hawaii where Father Damien did his good works; but she accomplished that pilgrimage with another saint in a different country.

**St. Maria Goretti**

St. Maria Goretti was a great example of how a story of one little Italian girl could ring so loud to Catholic school children all around the world. Judy will attest it is Maria Goretti who had the biggest influence on her childhood, when Maria Goretti and St. Jude were the only two saints she knew. Even prior to her days at the Holy Family in Manitowoc, she was praying to Maria. "My mother read it to us when I was eight or nine years old to the three of us [sisters]."

Saint Maria is one of the youngest saints in the Catholic Church. She died tragically in 1902 just shy of age 12 and was beatified in 1947 and canonized a saint by Pope Pius XII in 1950. The message of the story was purity and forgiveness. A man tried to rape Maria, Judy recalled, "but the whole time she said, 'It's a sin, Stop!' 'It's a sin! Stop.'"

The man continued his sexual advancements, and upon Maria's refusal he stabbed her. "But she died forgiving him." He was arrested and convicted. After Maria died, she appeared to her perpetrator in jail, and sent down lilies in an apparition. He repented, was released from prison, and became a lay brother. The forgiven perpetrator died peacefully in a monastery in 1970. He even was present for Maria's canonization in 1950.

Judy's memory of her childhood merges with her visit to Italy in her early 20s: "And all the pictures in the St. Maria's little paperback that my mother read, we saw pictures of it, and she is in this beautiful, white, first communion dress." She explains her "magnificent trip" when she finally got to Italy.

There were only two things she had to do in that country which boots out into the Mediterranean. First, she went to the Vatican. Seeing Maria Goretti was the second on her to-do list. "I went to whatever town it was that she made her first communion, and she was in the church in a glass casket, looking just the way she did in the picture in the book."

**Padre Pio**

Father Pio is best described as an Italian friar, priest, and mystic. Judy goes back to her time in Rome, "And I remember seeing Pietrelcina where he's from. I remember in the railroad station... 'Should I get a train?' And he was still alive. And of course, I didn't."

Pio was fascinating, because he had the stigmata for over 40 years. He then became famous for his services, as he was still saying mass in the Province of Foggia in the 1960s. Judy left the conversation: "just a minute." She came back from a room to show me a blanket: "The Padre Pio organization sent me this." It has his quote: "Pray, hope, and don't worry."


Judy was fascinated by the stigmata, perhaps Pio's biggest claim to fame. When someone undergoes the stigmata, the person is suffering the wounds of Christ. Stigmatic wounds can occur on the feet, hands or side where Christians believe Jesus was wounded during the crucifixion. There are some cases where the Crown of Thorns is part of the stigmatic's wounds too. Padre Pio was particularly known for the wounds on his hands.

In the case of Padre Pio, many of the wounds didn't really heal the last 50 years of his life. "It always oozes. I read his life. It always oozes, as well as the side piercing," Judy says. Believers point to the wrapped hands Padre Pio always had. Also, if Pio was a "braggart," as some in his lifetime accused him of, he would not have been made a saint by Pope John Paul II in 1999. Noteworthy too was that some sources indicate his wounds smelled like perfume.

Judy's attitude is that all is possible with God. Pio is interesting because not all people within the Church believed in Pio, and many tried to undermine his credibility. This may partially be to blame because he was such a spiritualist, and believed in the power of the dead intervening.

Padre Pio had very strong beliefs on the power of prayer, but also in the power of the soul. Judy likes to define Padre Pio as a mystic, which she defined as "someone that can be in two places at one time... That's how I always looked at it." She warned that it may be a simple explanation. But she's right.

When researching Padre Pio, one finds out that he was an advocate of bilocation. Supporters of his sainthood note he could be in two places at once. There are

qualities about this man which suggest a type of "sixth sense." One must understand some within the Catholic church questions this medium work that often was associated with the "occult." Padre Pio thought it was very important for souls to recognize their power.

The stories of Padre Pio ask followers to reflect to push the limits of what is the spiritual realm and what is the physical realm. Padre Pio opens up the possibilities. Judy never went to Pietrelcina, but she wished she did. She also never saw him preach at San Giovanni Rotondo in the province of Foggia, Italy.

"My greatest regret, I was at the train station in Rome looking at whatever/whatever, and chose — HE WAS STILL ALIVE AT THAT TIME! I choose to see St. Maria Goretti's body in the church where she received Holy Communion. I did not go to Pietrelcina." (She did not go to the province of Foggia where he was preaching either.)

The prior quote has a myriad of emotions and detail. Did Judy only have one choice: to see Maria Goretti or Pio? "Noooo. Noo...", she says with guilt, noting she was in Italy a few months. So she could have gotten back to Padre Pio? "Yeesssss." Her answer was said with disappointment and mild shame. "It is my greatest regret today."

This is not a figure of speech. "Yea. One of my greatest... why didn't I do it?" At this point, I was laughing at Judy, because there is a saying "When in Rome [do as the Romans do]." Ironically, Judy was in Rome. And she should have seen Padre Pio, like most in Rome do, by getting on the train. When Padre Pio was canonized as a saint, 300,000 came to Rome for the celebration.

**Fr. Solanus Casey**

Perhaps the biggest spirit that intervened for Judy is Father Solanus. Now, yes, Father Solanus Casey is not a saint yet — but Judy says it's coming someday. He was born in Wisconsin, but spent nearly 20 years in New York, another 20 in Detroit, and the last decade in poor health in Indiana. It was in Detroit that he created a soup kitchen and became renowned while at St. Bonaventure Monastery.

Judy's story goes back to the 1980s. Judy was always praying to Father Solanus. This was helped by her patients at Nazareth Heights who had given Judy a badge of Father Solanus to pass on to her son, and routinely discussed the importance of praying to Father Solanus.

Judy says what occurred was a miracle. One night during his senior football season, her son Bob was told he couldn't play football because of a very bad ankle. This was a huge deal, as he had a rough junior year at Goodrich, before returning to St. Mary Springs. In addition, Bob just loved football, and anyone who has a child that is a dedicated athlete can understand the agony of missing games as a senior.

So while Bob was soaking his ankle in cold water to reduce the swelling, he put some holy water with it and by evening he was able to walk on it. Of course, Judy added, he played football the next day. Judy attributes the healing to the holy water and Fr. Solanus. She recalls being told about the healed ankle by her son when she came home from work at Nazareth Heights.

Judy's service to the Sisters of the St. Agnes is a very important aspect of this story, she worked at Nazareth Heights for two decades.

The facility was built in the 1960s. Judy began working there in the early 1980s, and worked there until it closed in the late 1990s. "I went down then to St. Francis home, but I stayed with the nuns." It was these Sisters of Saint Agnes who interacted with Judy, and taught her many lessons and stories of the saints. Many of those Sisters made badges of Father Solanus. "Several of them worked and knew him in New York and Detroit."

There was Sr. Agrapeena, who Judy thinks made the badge. Judy also said that she could not guess how Agrapeena was spelled, so it is so phonetically here, as it sounded like "Agra" in agra-science, and "peena" like pea-nah. "I took care of her." Judy's son Bob was also



**Solanus Casey Badge**

The following prayer badge honors Father Solanus Casey, whose roots were in Wisconsin, New York and Michigan. He is not yet a saint, but his beatification at Ford's Field in Detroit brought 60,000 of the faithful in 2017. This badge was made by the Sister Agrapeena at Nazareth Heights, which was a retirement home for the Sisters of St. Agnes near St. Mary's Springs. Judy's son Bob played with this badge in his football helmet at St. Mary's Springs; this, holy water, and mom's prayers to Fr. Solanus are attributed to the healing of his bad ankle his senior year.



**Father Damien Postcard of Grave**

This postcard is stamped July 19, 1909 at Honolulu, Hawaii. It is mailed to Concord, New Hampshire with a simple message: "This priest lived with the lepers on the island of Molokai." The card was sent roughly two decades after Father Damien died from the leprosy he acquired by serving the leper colony. The top of the card notes of the Martyr Priest: "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

This grave has a unique history, in that Father Damien's body was returned to his native Belgium in the 1930s at the request of King Leopold III. Despite being reinterred in Leuven, Belgium, after his beatification in 1995, Father Damien's right hand was returned to his original grave at Molokai. Damien was made a saint in 2009.

playing football with her Fr. Solanus badge in his football helmet at the time of his healing.

There was also Sr. Mary Beatrice, "My very friend — but who was [also] a patient, said her father went and picked him up one time when he flew into New York." Sister Mary Beatrice was only a child at the time, but it was a pleasant memory of being at the airport and sitting in the back seat in the presence of Father Solanus. Judy said she took the time at Nazareth Heights to really question Sr. Mary Beatrice about Solanus, because Judy was so interested in the Capuchin priest, other potential saints and saints in general. This story of the car ride matches up, because Father Solanus Casey was in New York until 1924, and this child riding along would mathematically be a retired sister at Nazareth Heights by the 1980s. It is possible this was a trip in which Fr. Solanus was returning to his prior placements, as airports became common in the New York City area by 1930.

# Heroes Of The Holyland — Dennis Buechel

My path to the military was paved all the way back to the American Revolution. My 5X Great Grandfathers, Asa Hatch and Flemwell Higbie, both served in the Revolutionary Army. Tradition has it that my GG Grandfather Johan Buechel served in the Prussian Army before emigrating to America. In the last 60 years, my father Herman, six uncles, two brothers and a sister have also served in our military in various branches.

I was the oldest of six children of Herman and Janet (Lefebvre) Buechel growing up in the "Holyland" in St. Joe. We belonged to St. Joseph Parish, went to school in New Holstein and participated in various community activities in both St. Joe and St. Cloud. I went to Moraine Park Technical Institute in Fond du Lac for restaurant and hotel cookery and then to UW-Stout for hotel restaurant management.

While going to school, I worked at the Cabaret and Schreiner's Restaurant. After graduation, I worked for a year as an

assistant manager at Taco Bell in Appleton. I enlisted in the U.S. Navy in January 1990.

After completing boot camp, Mess Management "A" School, and Submarine School, I spent 12 of my 20 years in the Navy cooking aboard three nuclear powered submarines; the USS MG Vallejo SSBN 658, USS Dallas SSN-700, and USS Pittsburgh SSN-720. Depending on type of submarine, they are 360 feet to 560 feet long. Only the USS Vallejo had sixteen ballistic missiles, but all three submarines were armed with torpedoes and tomahawk cruise missiles. With a nuclear reactor for electrical power and propulsion, a nuclear submarine can stay submerged for an unlimited amount of time. The only limitation for a submarine's underwater capabilities is the amount of food it can carry.

While cooking on a submarine it was challenging to feed 140-160 hungry sailors every six hours in a galley, (kitchen), about the size of many home kitchens. Submarine life is like being on a plane for up to six months with no connection to the outside world and with the same passengers for the duration of the voyage.

There are no windows on a submarine. Fortunately, I am not claustrophobic, just a little crazy going on such a vessel. My duties as the Chief Petty Officer of the Culinary Specialist (CS) Division of a typical submarine included leading six other CS's in meal preparation, inventory control, upholding sanitation standards and being the liaison, along with the supply officer, to the ship's commanding officer.

Some of my more interesting travels on a boat were seeing much of the

Mediterranean in the summer of 2000 including pulling into Haifa, Israel, and visiting Jerusalem and Bethlehem. I also made a port call to Halifax, Nova Scotia in 1993. Some of the more interesting passengers we were able to serve were Terry Bradshaw and his father who sailed with us on the USS Pittsburgh in 2003. Tom Clancy toured the USS Dallas in 2000, which was the very boat penned in his novel "The Hunt for Red October."

Since retiring from the Navy, I have been teaching culinary arts to inmates at Oshkosh Correctional Institution. Service to my country and community continue with membership in the American Legion Abler-Engel Post #454 in Mt. Calvary as their membership chairperson. I am also a member of the Great Lakes Base of Submarine Veteran's in Caledonia. I belong to the Knights of Columbus Council #664 and the 4th Degree Assembly #1211 in Fond du Lac and serve as their newsletter editor. I currently live in Fond du Lac with my wife Tracy, son Jakob and daughter Anika.

Thank you to all who have served before me and are currently serving. These men and women established what it means to serve our country and our current warriors continue the same. I just did my small part to provide freedoms for my nation, community, and my children with zero regret that I did.

Mike says that the secret to hunting bears is having access to hunting land.

"I have lived in Forest County over 30 years, and I get permission from a lot of the neighbors and private property owners here. That helps us a lot," Mike said.

Mike said that he does not get scared when he is bear hunting.

"I do not get scared chasing a bear. I've never been afraid of a bear. I respect the bear. I am more afraid of wolves than I am of bears," Mike said.

Now ages 63 and 59, Mike and Randy started hunting when they were growing up in Kewaskum.

"We used to rabbit hunt when I lived in Kewaskum for many years, and bear hunting is far more exciting," Mike said.

Mike and Randy have passed their love of bear hunting down to their children. They are hoping the tradition will continue for even more generations to come.

"My stepson named Brian has shot three bears with us. And now he has a 6-year-old daughter, Willa, and a 3-year-old son, Waylon, who also come bear hunting," Mike said.

Each year, the Board of Directors of the WBHA gives the special recognition to senior bear hunters. This year, there were a total of three honorees, with Jamie Thomack also being recognized as an Iron Clad Bear Hunter on March 27.

This year marked the first time that two brothers were elected to receive Iron Clad Bear Hunter awards.

"That's what was extra special about the award. The day we received it would have been our dad's birthday. He's been passed away for over 30 years. He would have been 93 on that day, so that kind of got me choked up," Randy said.

Any senior bear hunting member of WBHA is eligible for the Iron Clad Bear Hunter award and may be nominated by any WBHA member.

When it comes to making a saint, there is a process of canonization that requires years of investigations. This includes miracles being verified. "So Rome came and interviewed these gals [at Nazareth Heights]. To see if they could get more information." In addition, "Then when I found out about this, I wrote a long explanation of Bob's high school career and how I felt his life at that time... was so awful, and I prayed to Father Solanus beyond anything."

She did not save a copy of her letter sent to Rome, but one gets the feeling that it doesn't matter. Judy would conclude it was a miracle. And the power of Father Solanus, holy water, the faith of the Sisters at Nazareth Heights worked its powers. She is very proud of how her son turned out, and attributes it to prayer.

### Stories Shape Faith

The life experiences of Judy Bennett intertwine with the saints, all of which have something to teach us. St. Jude teaches us all things are possible: even at the moment of death, divine intervention is possible. 
### Maria Goretti Prayer Card

This is a prayer card for Saint Maria Goretti (1890-1902) of Italy. Maria denied a man who threatened to rape her, then was stabbed to death. However, Maria forgave her perpetrator before she died. She is a symbol not only for purity, but forgiveness. Judy Bennett of Fond du Lac recalls being taught about Saint Maria during her childhood. "Her mother was the only mother to ever see her child canonized." Judy's mind goes to what it must have been like in Rome when Maria was made a saint in 1950. "When they held up that magnificent banner, when she was canonized, her mother was there. In Rome. In the Vatican." Her feast day is July 6, the day she died on. "Yea," Judy said, "I know Maria Goretti."

us of the power of forgiveness, and Padre Pio is an example of how there are no limits to faith, spirituality, and power of prayer.

Judy's story of Solanus Casey illustrates that we are never too removed from the holy, whether that's the fact that he came from Wisconsin, or that the people who saw his great works ended up being served by Judy at Nazareth Heights. And yes, Fr. Solanus Casey should be a saint in Judy's mind.

Our own lives are shaped by the faith of others. Sometimes we can understand others beliefs best by who they admire. If Jesus taught in parables, so too did the saints in their actions. As Easter approaches, reflect on someone close to you, often elderly and perhaps departed, who was defined by strong faith. It is those memories and stories that embody the spirit of spring and Easter's optimism. Seems Padre Pio and Judy's blanket is right. "Pray, hope and don't worry."

**5 Years Ago  
April 7, 2016**

Over the years, Aaron Laatsch of the Kewaskum Historical Society has collected old picture frames. About six months ago, he began transforming those picture frames into shadow boxes. These memories now adorn the walls of the Coffee Corner and will do so until the beginning of July. A social will be held on May 4 with a short presentation on the history of the featured businesses beginning at 7 p.m.

Memories in the Making is an art program sponsored through the Alzheimer's Association. The program helps people to express their feelings and memories through art, even after they have lost the ability to use words. Kettle Moraine Gardens will hold a Garden Memories Art Show on April 4.

Area voting locations saw a steady stream of voters on April 5. The only contested race was for two seats on the Kewaskum School District school board. Unofficially, of the four candidates, Timothy Ramthun and Mary B. Miller won seats; Bradley A. Petersen and Craig Staffin had also been on the ballot.

Thomas Gill, a member of the Kewaskum High School Band, is the first KHS student to have ever been selected to participate in the Wisconsin School Music Association High School all-state honors band. Thomas is one of approximately 15 percussionists selected from the entire state through a highly competitive audition process. This is one of the highest honors available to a high school musician. 





**Notice of Spring Election and Sample Ballots**  
**April 6, 2021**

**OFFICE OF THE WASHINGTON COUNTY CLERK  
 TO THE VOTERS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:**

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Washington County on April 6, 2021, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

**INFORMATION TO VOTERS**

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

**Where Optical Scan Voting is Used**

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone in a manner that would reveal how the ballot is marked.

**Spoiled Ballots**

If the voter spoils an **optical scan ballot**, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

**After Voting the Ballot**

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

**Information to Voters**

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. **If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.** If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

**Where Optical Scan Voting is Used**

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

**Spoiled Ballot**

If the voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

**After Voting the Ballot**

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, the voter shall leave the booth and insert the ballot in the voting device.

**The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.**

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

**Wisconsin Individual Income Tax Return And Payment Deadline Extended To May 17**

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) issued news release yesterday indicating that the federal income tax filing and payment due date for individuals for the 2020 tax year will be automatically extended from April 15, 2021, to May 17, 2021. The IRS will provide formal guidance in the coming days.

As a result, the Wisconsin individual income tax return filing and payment due dates are extended to May 17, 2021. Wisconsin law provides for an extension of time and waiver of interest and penalties when the IRS extends filing deadlines during a presidentially-declared disaster.

"This has been a hard year for everyone. People are still trying to catch up financially and emotionally. Extending the tax deadline to May 17 should help make things a bit easier for those who need the extra time," said Department of Revenue Secretary Peter Barca.

- Individuals do not have to file any extension forms to be eligible for this new due date.

- No interest or penalties will accrue during the period of April 15, 2021 to May 17, 2021. Interest and late filing fees will apply beginning May 18, 2021.

- No underpayment interest will apply for failure to make quarterly estimated individual income tax payments for the 2020 tax year.

- This relief is solely for 2020 individual income tax returns and payments that are normally due on due April 15, 2021.

- This relief does not apply to:
  - \*2021 estimated tax payments for individuals, the first payment of which is due April 15, 2021, or
  - \*to any other returns or tax payments due to the Department of Revenue.

"Roughly, half of all taxpayers in Wisconsin have already filed their tax returns, and most have received refunds, on average over \$800," noted Department of Revenue Secretary Peter Barca. "We are still processing returns and issuing refunds and other credits that Wisconsinites rely on such as the Homestead Credit and Earned Income Tax Credit."
