No Building Planned For Kewaskum Municipal Parking Lot

The Kewaskum Shared Facilities Committee is going back to the drawing board to come up with a plan for improved building facilities for the village administration, police department and library.

At the Shared Facilities Committee meeting on Tuesday, April 13, committee members voted to abandon the idea of building a new municipal building and library on the existing municipal parking lot on Main Street in Kewaskum.

The committee is now looking to rebuild the municipal building at its current location on First Street in Kewaskum, with an addition on the east side of the building. It is exploring different ways the current footprint could be expanded further, either by purchasing properties to the north of the building or by extending the building west, across Railroad Street.

Both ideas are in the early stages. To determine if either extension is feasible, the committee plans to have a traffic study done, as well as a cost and legal analysis.

If the village extends the municipal building across Railroad Street, traffic will need to be rerouted because it would no longer be able to flow between First and Second streets on Railroad Street. However, the village would not have to purchase any property.

"My thoughts were to potentially build in phases so no one is out of operation at any time," said Village Trustee Jim Wright, who serves on the committee.

This would save money if village employees were not needed to be relocated during construction. In addition, the committee is considering having a single-story building in order to save the cost of adding an elevator.

The idea of razing the village annex building and constructing a new 21,590-square-foot building on the municipal lot had been presented at a meeting on Wednesday, March 10. That proposal was met with strong opposition from about 35 people from the business community who attended the meeting.

Business owners voiced concerns about losing parking spaces from the current municipal parking lot. The general consensus was that downtown businesses would be adversely affected if any parking spaces were removed from the municipal parking lot, even if an additional parking lot was created where the existing mu-

Kewaskum School Board To Hold Special Meeting On Declining Enrollment

To discuss the district's declining enrollment and options for the future, the Kewaskum School Board is holding a special meeting on Thursday, April 29, at 6 p.m. in the Kewaskum High School Theater. The public is invited to attend.

"We are going to have a presentation on enrollment and staffing, and then open the floor up to public comments. It will be an open forum where you can go back and forth to answer questions," Board President Jim Leister said.

This fall, the district is projected to have 155 fewer students than it had in the 2019-20 school year, according to numbers that were presented at the April school

board meeting. The total number of elementary school students is expected to fall to 746 students.

The district has three elementary schools. According to numbers presented by school administration at the April board meeting, Kewaskum Elementary School has a capacity of 875 students, Farmington Elementary has a capacity of 460 students and i4Learning Community School has a capacity of 175 students.

With declining numbers, parents fear that the school board is considering closing an elementary school. But some do not feel that now is the time to make a change.

"What is the need for right now? Why would you make such a big call like this the year following a

Police Chief Talks To Board About Road Construction

During the Monday, April 12, Campbellsport Village Board meeting, Police Chief Tom Dornbrook gave the board a report on the Highway 67 construction project going on in the village this summer.

Dornbrook explained that they are giving mostly warnings to those driving through the active construction area. The department is focusing on the area that is actively under construction, since the project is being done in phases.

"Since March 15th, we've written 13 tickets," Dornbrook said. "They are getting tickets if they are

driving through what I consider an active construction zone. Not one citizen from Campbellsport received a ticket. We were giving out written warnings but that was taking too much time so now it is a verbal warning."

The chief explained that they are trying to work with people but want to make sure everyone stays safe. While the crews are working on the roadway, it is not a safe area to be driving through. It could also cause damage to your car.

"It's not safe and this is for the safety of the people," Dornbrook said. "Some people have already com-

Drexel Building Supply, Inc. Expands Operations In New Berlin

Drexel Building Supply Inc., a leading provider of building materials and services to contractors and homeowners, is expanding its facility in New Berlin — an \$11 million project expected to create 50 jobs over the next three years.

“In addition to the jobs created by this project, this expansion will allow Drexel Building Supply Inc. to take advantage of a growing market and increased demand for its services,” said Missy Hughes, secretary and CEO of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC). “This project marks the latest example of a Wisconsin business that has chosen to grow in our state because of our strong business climate and dedicated workforce.”

WEDC is supporting the project by authorizing up to \$250,000 in state income tax credits over the next three years. The actual amount of tax credits Drexel Building Supply will receive is contingent upon the number of jobs created during that period.

Drexel Building Supply is planning to develop a large showroom and distribution center in New Berlin to keep up with increased demand for construction and home improvement materials.

The new seven-building, 128,000-square-foot complex will include a showroom, warehouse, shop/siding shed, treated shed, truss shed, header shed, and a plywood and laminated veneer lumber shed. The complex will be located on a vacant 92-acre parcel in the New Berlin Industrial Park.

The first phase of the project includes construction of two buildings that will serve as operations for cabinetry and flooring. This phase will transfer the cabinetry and flooring operations and 75 employees from the Brookfield facility, which the company has outgrown.

The second phase includes the completion of five

lumberyard buildings. These developments will allow Drexel to add new employees and expand its product categories. With the new location, the company plans to deliver to a 60-mile-plus radius daily.

WEDC’s assistance is also helping facilitate the company’s statewide growth. Drexel expects to create 100 full-time jobs across the company’s nine locations in Wisconsin. Of the 100, 50 will be created at the New Berlin facility, with the remaining 50 created at other locations. All the current Brookfield employees will be offered their same positions at the expanded New Berlin location.

“Congratulations to Drexel and all its employees. This significant expansion will be a boon for the company and its employees and a big benefit to New Berlin,” said state Sen. Dale Kooyenga. “Drexel’s success is a great example of how a strong and resilient economy has positive benefits for the wider community, region and state.”

In addition to the 50 jobs expected to be created by Drexel Building Supply, an economic modeling study estimates the project could indirectly generate 56 additional jobs in the region. Those 106 total new jobs are expected to generate \$213,356 in state income tax revenue annually.

Drexel Building Supply Inc. is a leading provider of building materials and services to professional contractors and homeowners throughout Wisconsin. Founded by Albert and Joan Fleischman in 1985, the company is based in Campbellsport, where it was formerly known as Campbellsport Building Supply. Drexel offers lumber, roofing/siding, trusses, millwork, doors, windows, pole building, decking, cabinetry, flooring and window treatments.

Rehabilitation Work To Resume Along I-41 In Washington County

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) has resumed rehabilitations along I-41, from the I-41/US 45 split to WIS 60 in Washington County.

Work completed in 2020 included roadway resurfacing along I-41, between the I-41/US 45 split to the Dodge County Line, guardrail and cable barrier installation, and bridge replacement. Work scheduled for 2021 consists of completing the cable barrier system that was started in 2020 from the I-41/US 45 split to WIS 60.

During construction, I-41 will remain open to traffic with daytime, off-peak lane closures.

The contractor, Payne and Dolan, Inc., plans to complete the project in early summer, 2021. The schedule is dependent on favorable weather conditions and construction progress.

Village Of Kewaskum Gets New Trustee

Nathan Wendelborn has been appointed as a trustee for the Village of Kewaskum.

Wendelborn replaces Sarah Severance, who resigned from the position on April 5 because she moved out of the village limits. Severance was in her second two-year term on the board; she was re-elected to the position in April 2020.

Wendelborn will serve the remainder of the term, which ends in April 2022. Wendelborn has served on the village’s plan commission since October 2019. He has been the director of public works and sanitary for the Village of Newburg for almost two years. He previously worked in the Department of Public Works for the City of West Bend for three years.

Wendelborn grew up in the outskirts of Kewaskum and went to Kewaskum High School.

He attended Concordia University and is currently working on his bachelor’s degree in project management. He and his wife have owned a home near Village Hall for six years and welcomed a son in October. Wendelborn has served as head boys soccer coach for Kewaskum High School as well as a referee and volunteer for the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization.

“I am interested in serving the community on the Board of Trustees to see the village move forward with growth and responsible spending. I plan on raising my son and future children in the village and would like to see the community thrive and improve for years to come. I believe that my experience with municipal process, budgeting and ordinances will lead me to make informed and reasonable decisions. I also believe that I can bring a different perspective to discussions given my background,”

Wendelborn wrote in his letter of interest to the board.

Wendelborn was one of four people who applied for the position. The other applicants included Jim Geiger, Bret Klapper and Harry Roecker. All applicants wrote a letter of interest.

Three of the applicants attended the village board meeting on Monday, April 19; Harry Roecker was absent.

Village trustees interviewed Wendelborn, Geiger and Klapper during open session at Monday night’s meeting.

The candidates answered questions before the trustees unanimously voted to appoint Wendelborn to the position.

“I would like to thank all the candidates,” Village Trustee Richard Knoebel said, noting that he felt Wendelborn was the best fit because of his schedule and ability to attend special meetings during daytime hours on short notice.

Because there already is one trustee serving on the village’s plan commission, Wendelborn will need to relinquish his seat on the commission. The village is now looking for two plan commission members and one board of appeals member.

“I will be talking to Jim and Bret to see if one of those positions would be something they would like to serve in. I do have a couple other candidates who may also be interested, but I definitely would like to talk with the well qualified candidates that were willing to put

themselves out here tonight,” President Kevin Scheunemann said at Monday’s meeting.

During the meeting, Scheunemann issued a proclamation of commendation to Severance for serving on the Kewaskum Village Board. Severance also was recognized for serving on the village’s Protection and Public Safety Committee as well as the village’s Park and Recreation Committee.

Village Matters

In other action at the April 19 meeting, the Kewaskum Village Board:

- Approved a partner-

ship with the Riveredge Nature Center’s Community Rivers Program for the center’s 2021-22 fiscal year.

- Approved \$3,800 for exterior cleaning of the water tower located adjacent to the public works shop.
- Approved the School Resource Officer Agreement with the Kewaskum School District. Under the agreement, the school district will reimburse the village \$46,000 for the 2021-22 school years and \$47,000 for the 2022-23 school year.

global pandemic?" asked Rachel Maas, who school choices her children into the Kewaskum School District.

When it plans the budget each year, the Kewaskum School Board has to decide whether it is cost effective to keep three elementary schools open. It is the same story every year, according to District Administrator James Smasal.

"It is a simple story. But it is one of the most difficult stories because there is so much emotion attached to this story," Smasal said. "It started 20 years ago when Kewaskum Elementary School opened. They had the foresight to make it as large as they did. The day they opened that school, is the day you really didn't need three elementary schools in the Kewaskum School district anymore. So, for 20 years, we have done everything in our power to keep three elementary schools open."

In an effort to attract more students to the district, Wayne Elementary became a charter school in 2015 and was renamed i4Learning Community School. The charter school contract ended last year, and parents are now worried about the school's future as the school board discusses falling enrollment numbers.

Since 2019, the largest drop has been in the number of students in 4K and 5K. There were 102 4K students in 2019; that number fell to 73 in 2020 and is expected to fall to 71 in 2021. The district had 113 5K students in 2019; that fell to 108 5K students in 2020 and is expected to fall to 80 in 2021.

This drop in numbers could be due at least in part to the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, this year all 4K classes were held at Kewaskum Elementary School, and some parents did not want their children bused to KES rather than attending Farmington Elementary or i4Learning Community School, where their older siblings attended school.

"I think the district is seeing a drop in enrollment at the 4K level this year due to the extreme circumstances of the pandemic causing some parents to exercise caution and not enroll their kids in an optional program. Another major factor is the consolidation of the 4K offering to KES. This creates a major logistics issue for some families," said David Schulenberg, a parent in the district. "I know of four families off-hand that have chosen to put their kids in an alternative 4K program because they can't manage pickup and drop-off at KES and another school at the same time."

"Navigating through the past year with a pandemic could be a reason why the district has seen a drop in the enrollment at the 4k level as well as the shift of 4k to KES. It was not an easy decision for my family to enroll my child at KES for 4k. Some of our major concerns include a 40-minute bus ride to school as well as the inconvenience and logistics of dropping my children off at two different schools that start at the same time," parent Rachel Homulos explained.

It is unclear how many parents decided to keep their children home this year because of the COVID-19 pandemic. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's Household Pulse Survey, there was a significant increase in homeschool rates across the nation in fall 2020. That survey showed that Wisconsin had a 3.5 percent homeschooling rate the week of April 23-May 5, 2020. During the week of September 30 to October 12, 2020, the homeschooling rate went up to 8.1 percent, a 4.7 percent increase.

Some parents chose to send their children to another school because of the pandemic. For example, Nate Weseman chose to send two of his children to the Wisconsin Virtual Learning School in

the Ozaukee School District because of the mask mandate.

Despite the decrease in enrollment numbers, there has been new home construction in the area. According to census.gov, in Washington County, the number of new building permits rose over the past decade. In 2011, there were new building permits for 122 buildings, compared to 329 in 2019. There were new building permits for 182 units in 2011, compared to new building permits for 460 units in 2019.

In the Village of Kewaskum, 37 single family homes were constructed in the Nature Haven subdivision over the past three years, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser. There currently are building permits taken out for two new single-family homes and nine side-by-side homes in the Village of Kewaskum, according to Heiser. There are approximately 41 single family lots open in the village.

In addition, the Village of Kewaskum has been working to attract new businesses to the area, which could bring more families with students. An agreement is currently being developed that will bring McMahan and Company, a millwork company that employs about 50 people, to Kewaskum.

If the Kewaskum School Board would choose to close i4Learning Community School, all of the elementary students would be spread across the same number of classrooms at the remaining two schools. It would not increase the class size, according to Smasal.

"Class size is based on the number of students in a certain grade level, not a school," Smasal said.

According to Smasal, it is unusual for a district this size to have three elementary schools.

"I would argue we are one of two school districts with three elementary schools with our number of students because it is not cost effective; it is a perk," Smasal said.

Karen Strobel, whose children attend i4Learning Community School, wonders how much the district would save by closing a school. She said that she has asked for operating costs of all three elementary schools but has not yet received those numbers.

Currently some of the classrooms at KES are used for special education. If i4L were to close, those classrooms would be converted to regular classrooms.

"At KES, in each pod, there is one classroom being utilized for special education/special needs. By filtering in 120 kids into KES, we're going to be taking away from them. You're gaining something, but you are losing something else," Strobel said.

"Plus, there is a pandemic going on still. In the fall, we are still going to have to have mitigation; it is best to keep everyone spread out with fewer children in classrooms," Weseman added.

Abby Watzlawick, a parent in the district, worries about the families whose children were sent to i4L this year after attending KES or Farmington last year in an effort to create equal class sizes across the school district.

"There are many children who have just switched schools and who will be asked to switch again," she said.

Parents are looking forward to sharing their concerns with school board members at the April 29 meeting.

"We want the school board to listen to what we need and keep the best interest of our children in mind," said Katie Markeland.

In addition to discussing student enrollment, the Kewaskum School Board is expected to reorganize at the April 29 meeting, with board members electing board officers, as well as board members being assigned to various committees.

Campbellsport School Board Approves Additions For Next Year

Members of the Campbellsport Board of Education, during their Monday, April 19, meeting, approved some new additions to start in the next school year.

The first addition will be a second ag teacher for the middle and high schools. Years ago, the district had two agriculture teachers but decided to scale back.

"We are on the cusp of needing a second ag teacher," said Paul Amundson, district administrator. "There is an interest there. We would like to get your approval on adding that and open it up to hire."

At the Monday, April 5, this idea was brought up by board members Danielle Neitzel and Mike Weiss. They had both heard that the district was considering the idea and wanted to endorse the idea.

"I definitely want to see that on the forefront in the future," Neitzel said.

All Day 4K Program

A second addition for the 2021-2022 school year will be a pilot program for all-day four-year-old kindergarten. This will be a voluntary program for those parents who feel their child would benefit from an all-day program instead of a half-day program.

This concept was presented to the board at the April 5th meeting by the early childhood teachers. It was then approved this week by the school board.

"Right now, our current 4K program is very successful," said Alyssa Krautkramer, 4K teacher. "We have a lot of really great things going for us. This isn't to fix a broken problem, it is just to take it to the next level."

The teachers explained that the opportunity to have the students for a full day would provide more opportunities for learning and growth. They would be able to spend time on social skills as well as educational goals.

"Many kids lack the social and emotional skills that they once had," Krautkramer said. "This is a huge area that I think would really benefit us. I have really good ideas to take our kids out into our community, but in a two-hour time frame, we are just not able to do that. There are a lot of places in our community that we could have partnerships with and get our kids out in the community. It (full day) would give us more time for these types of opportunities."

The program will be voluntary. For those parents wanting to keep their child in a half-day four-year-old kindergarten program, they would be able to do that.

"We know there are kids in our district that could handle a full-day program who need that challenge and need those types of opportunities," Krautkramer said. "But then we also know that there are those who can't handle that. They can't handle a full-day program. They need that half day program. It is just opening up opportunities to the families in our district. We've done a lot of research on this. It is really a setting that is rich with developmental opportunities."

Board members asked if there would be additional costs to this program. The teachers stated that they felt the current staff could handle the program. There are currently two four-year-old kindergarten teachers in the district. One would teach the all-day program and the other would teach the half-day students.

"We know this is a pilot and we have never done this before so there are going to be things that work and there are going to be things we try that just don't," Krautkramer said.

With it being a pilot program, they would open it up to parents but limit the number if needed. After the April 5th meeting, a survey went out to parents who had already enrolled their student in the 4K program to see if anyone was interested a full day. Of those, 20 families expressed interest in it.

Board members approved the option of a full day four-year-old kindergarten program.

High School Math Curriculum

In other business, the board also approved a new

math curriculum at the high school. The math teachers have been researching a new program for the high school. This too was originally presented at the April 5th meeting and approved at the April 19th meeting.

"We've been looking at a math curriculum for the past number of years," Amundson said. "The recommendation that went to the curriculum committee was to go with the CPM. It is a different program that is widely used and well recommended by those who will be using it. Many districts are going to it. We see no reason not to. We have teachers excited about it. It (recommendation) comes not from the district administrator or the principals, but your experts in math and education here."

It was explained to the board that this program will teach students to think through math rather than just find the answers. They will be solving problems in small groups and will need to really think through the problem.

"It's a lot of interacting with peers," said Mike Wettstein, math teacher. "It's a lot of social and life skills with math. It is going to give our students an opportunity to think, which has been lacking. That's probably Mr. Baughman's biggest point that he has talked about. He has said, he really wants to get them thinking. It's about building a bunch of mathematical thinkers."

Amundson added, "You are still going to need the base facts. But this is about getting into the deeper levels of thinking and being able to discuss it in groups of three or four or five. They have to discuss how they get to an answer and how they got to that answer."

It was mentioned that the high school math teachers have been including some of this kind of teaching already this year in their classes. They want to give the students a taste of the new teaching style.

"We're noticing that the kids we wouldn't expect to chime in normally are now chiming in," Wettstein said. "It's turning out that those kids who weren't really strong before, are really good thinkers. So we are kind of taking a veil away from those kids and letting them shine a little bit. It's been very surprising for us as we are starting to gear up for it and get ready. We're getting a lot more feedback from kids and a lot more interest that we maybe wouldn't have before and it's pretty awesome."

Board member Sharon Gazzola told board members this will be a good program for the students and the district.

"Having teachers passionate about it and wanting to use it is different than pushing them to use it," Gazzola said. "The misconception is that you are just throwing it at the students. You are indeed still teaching the concepts."

Before approving the new math curriculum, Gazzola also asked the board members to support the teachers on this new program. She explained that it may take the students a little time to warm up to the program because it will be very different from what they are used to but the benefits will be worth it.

"It will be a culture change," Gazzola said. "Students at first don't like it because they like the answer. They don't like having to find the answer. I'm not saying it's perfect, but we do have to be on board with it. Try to be supportive of our staff. Give it a chance otherwise it won't be good."

Summer School

Board members also approved the summer school schedule. It will be very similar to previous years with some fun and interesting class offerings for the elementary students.

Summer school will start on Thursday, June 3, and run through Thursday, July 1. Information about summer school will be going out to families this week, now that the board has approved the schedule.

"I think it looks like you have been able to put together a wide variety of classes," said Deb Senn.

Highway 23 Construction Continues

Now that construction season is getting underway again, the Highway 23 project is continuing. It is being changed into a four-lane highway between Plymouth and Fond du Lac.

Construction began in 2019 on the Sheboygan County portion. It moved into Fond du Lac County last year and is expected to be fully completed in 2022.

"This is our last major part of the project," said Rob Wagner, WisDOT Project Supervisor. "We've been working on this project for many, many years."

The project will continue to affect traffic at the County G near St. Cloud. This intersection has been closed since early 2020 for construction of an overpass and on and off ramps. It is scheduled to be reopened in October.

Some roads in the area between St. Cloud and Mt. Calvary have had roads closed during the construction. Some of these will be permanent closures with the roads no longer having access to Highway 23. These will include the north leg of Hickory Road, south leg of Division Road, south leg of Log Tavern Road and Banner Road.

Throughout the summer months, roads will be closed and reopened as needed. For example, the south leg of Seven Hills Road was closed on Wednesday, April 21, and will remain closed through Thursday, April 28.

"There will be some side roads that we will need to close during this project," said Jack Laning, project engineer, KL Engineering. "These residents should get seven day notice for when we are working there on this project."

Highway 23 will be open throughout the entire project. Everyone is cautioned to be careful while traveling this roadway during construction.

"Safety of the workers and the traveling public is top on this project," Laning said. "When we are out there working, please stay away at a safe distance. Just be safe out there."

Part of this year's project also includes construction into Fond du Lac. This includes the hill and intersection by St. Mary's Springs Academy. For those area families who have students who attend this school, they may need to find a different way to get to the school during construction.

The Highway K intersection will become a jug handle interchange, which is a little different than the normal diamond interchange. Highway K will run under Highway 23 and then the access to the state highway will be a little to the west of where Highway K crosses.

In addition to the new Highway K access, the hill in that area will not look the same when the project is done. They are planning to cut that hill down a little bit.

"It will not be as steep but it will still be a pretty big hill," Wagner said.

As the project continues, the trail along the highway is also being constructed. This trail will run the entire length of the highway and will connect with the trail along Highway 151.

Though the highway will be open throughout this project, the Department of Transportation asks people to find an alternate route or just be cautious when driving through the construction zone. This is a huge project that benefit all roadway users when it is completed.

"I ask for patience over the next two years," Wagner said. "It is going to be a beautiful road at the end."

Firefighters Train For Farm Emergencies

Golden E Dairy Farm in Farmington became a training site for firefighters from across the region on Saturday, April 17.

Approximately 80 firefighters from 25 fire departments attended the daylong training to better prepare them to respond to farm emergencies. Some came from as far away as Plover, Nichols, Iron Ridge and Sheboygan.

“The goal is to educate our responders, the EMTs and firefighters, about what today’s farmsteads look like, because they have changed. They are not milking 20 cows at a time anymore. They are milking 2,450 head three times a day,” said Ron Naab, secretary of the Badger Firefighters Association, which is hosted the training program.

There were six training stations set up at the farm on Saturday. Firefighters trained at each station for 65 minutes to learn how to respond to different emergencies.

At one station, the emergency personnel learned how to respond to a tractor rollover. They practiced stabilizing a tractor in order to lift it and remove someone who was trapped underneath the vehicle. At another station, firefighters learned how to free a person trapped in a skid steer.

Firefighters learned how to cut a cab and how to remove a patient from a sprayer unit. At one station, they even practiced freeing a patient who was sucked into a grain bin.

The training also included an orientation on how the different farm equipment works. Emergency personnel became aware of things like commodities and chemical storage.

Last weekend’s program marked the first time in about five years that firefighter training had been held at a farm in Washington County, according to Naab, who was the lead instructor on Saturday.

Naab, who is a driver/operator and former assistant chief for the Allenton Fire Department, has been involved in farm rescue training for 42 years.

“We have fewer firefighters working on farms than we used to, so the training is important,” Naab said.

The Fillmore Fire Department helped plan Saturday’s training.

Kewaskum School District Continues Mask Mandate

At the regular Kewaskum School Board meeting on April 8, the board once again voted to require face masks in school buildings until the end of the school year.

Board Member Tim Ramthun made a motion that wearing face masks should be optional in school buildings, effective immediately.

Approximately 30 parents in the audience applauded the motion.

However, Ramthun was the only board member to vote in favor of the motion. Board member Sue Miller was absent from the meeting.

Other board members said that the policy of requiring face masks had helped the district to offer in-person classes throughout the year, and they would like to stay the course for the remainder of the school year. In addition, there was some concern that students could be bullied if they chose to wear or not wear a mask.

"I believe in the science, but I also believe we have a choice, and we should

be able to be given a choice," Ramthun said.

In other action at the April 8 meeting, the Kewaskum School Board:

- Approved March payroll of \$1,304,077.16.
- Approved March accounts payable of \$448,304.79
- Scheduled a special board meeting on July 8 and the change of regular July board meeting date to July 15.
- Approved \$40,000 for academic career planning contracted services for the 2021-22 school year.
- Approved a three-year contract with Johnson School Bus Company
- Approved a five-year advertising contract with Drexel in the Kewaskum High School cafeteria expansion. Drexel will be selling beams at cost for the construction project in return for the advertising, according to Board President Jim Leister.
- Approved a two-year school resource officer contract
- Approved a two-year crossing guard contract.

Stay Vigilant; Avoid Burning


The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced fire danger is very high and high across the state.

Be aware of rapidly changing fire conditions.

Areas with very high danger in the past week include Adams, Ashland, Barron, Bayfield, Brown, Buffalo, Burnett, Calumet, Chippewa, Clark, Door, Douglas, Dunn, Eau Claire, Florence, Fond du Lac, Forest, Green Lake, Iron, Jackson, Juneau, Kewaunee, La Crosse, Langlade, Lincoln, Manitowoc, Marathon, Marinette, Marquette, Menominee, Monroe, Oconto, Oneida, Outagamie, Pepin, Pierce, Polk, Portage, Price, Rusk, Sawyer, Shawano, Sheboygan, St. Croix, Taylor, Trempealeau, Washburn, Waupaca, Waushara, Winnebago and Wood counties.

Areas with high fire danger in the past week include Columbia, Crawford, Dane, Dodge, Grant, Green, Iowa, Jefferson, Kenosha, Lafayette, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Richland, Rock, Sauk, Vernon, Vilas, Walworth, Washington and Waukesha counties.

It's been a busy wildfire season in Wisconsin so far. During the first week of April alone, 161 wildfires burned more than 1,000 acres; 19 buildings were destroyed and another 179 were threatened by the flames but saved with



fire suppression efforts.

The main fire causes have been debris burning and equipment, accounting for more than half of the fires. However, the two largest fires so far this spring in Juneau and Waukesha counties ignited along railroads.

Recent rain had given the state a bit of a reprieve, but the dead grass, leaves and pine needles have dried out and are ready to ignite once again.

April is the busiest month for wildfires in our state. Stay vigilant with any outdoor flames, smoke, campfires, ash disposal or equipment use. Put off burning your debris pile until the vegetation "greens up," or becomes less dry after spring rains.

Paying It Forward

Some years ago when I was helping with a lower elementary class there was a lull I needed to fill. So I asked the students whether they knew the Golden Rule. Not a hand was raised and I was not particularly astonished, as I seldom heard that scripture ever taught in the church as it once was while I was growing up.

Jesus taught this to His disciples: "Therefore, whatever you want men to do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets" (Matthew 7:12 NKJV). A more modern version of this is, "Treat others as you want them to treat you. This is what the Law and the Prophets are all about." (Contemporary English Version) This is the essence of paying it forward.

The norm these days seems to be to treat everyone the same way they've been treating you. If they are bullies, you become a bully. If they are rude, you become rude. If family ignores you or abuses you, you become the same. That is one way generational curses are formed — doing the same stuff your parents and family have done and never ending the oppression in the line of generations.

The end of that verse speaks about abiding by what the Law and the Prophets taught. The foundation of the Law is the Ten Commandments, which can be found in Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5 in the Old Testament. The Law is also the regulations and prescriptions that flowed out of figuring out how the Law applied to everyday life; what God requires His people to do. On the other hand, the Prophets looked forward, telling people the good news from God about what was to come in the future. [Remember, prophets told the people what God had to say; priests told God what the people were saying.]

How do we do the Golden Rule? Jesus gave us the standard when He taught us to love our neighbor as ourselves as the second greatest commandment after the greatest commandment, which is "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind." (Matthew 22:37 NKJV) Both of these instructions are other fo-

cused, not self prioritized.

Notice what verse 40 says in commenting: "The rest of the law, and all the teachings of the prophets, are but variations on these themes." (The Voice Translation) Everything God taught is other focused! We are to put others before ourselves. That is how parents have traditionally raised their children; the children's welfare coming before their own. Parents sacrificed to give their children what was necessary to develop well-rounded lives; they gave up expensive frills to provide the necessities for their children. Then, when the children were grown, parents could enjoy some of the things that had been put on hold.

Back to Jesus via Ben Franklin; Ben Franklin once loaned a man a sum of money with the understanding that when the man was able to repay the loan he should, rather than repay, pay it forward by lending it to someone else to help them. How did Jesus live paying it forward? He taught the principles of the Law and the Prophets, but He also taught the Good News that He was the Savior they were all looking for. He fed people, healed the sick and infirm, delivered people out of their sin, revealed how to finance God's kingdom on earth, trained people up to be solid citizens and modeled a godly life.

Most importantly, God demonstrated by example how Jesus paid it forward by giving up His life for those who were yet sinners: "... He presented himself for this sacrificial death when we were far too weak and rebellious to do anything to get ourselves ready. ... We can understand someone dying for a person worth dying for, and we can understand how someone good and noble could inspire us to selfless sacrifice. But God put his love on the line for us by offering his Son in sacrificial death while we were of no use whatever to him." (Romans 5:6-8 Message)

This is the ultimate testimony of paying it forward, giving up your life for someone who doesn't even know you or care. On the other hand, Jesus knew one day you would know Him and care that He willingly gave up His life for you. Now it's time for you to pay it forward!

WisDOT: Drive Safely For Adopt-a-Highway Crews

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) asks motorists to stay alert for Adopt-a-Highway volunteers, who are busy collecting a winter's worth of trash and recyclables along state highways.

New to the program this year, the department keeps an interactive map (wisconsin.gov/Pages/doing-bus/real-estate/roadsides/adopt-hwy/default.aspx) showing areas maintained by the Wisconsin's 2,769 Adopt-a-Highway groups as well as what routes are still available for additional volunteers.

"It's a sure sign of spring to see people so generously taking the time to remove trash and debris from our roadsides," said WisDOT secretary-designee Craig Thompson. "Every driver makes a difference for their safety as well — buckle up, phone down and mind your speed."

Last year, Wisconsin Adopt-a-Highway groups collected more than 81 tons of trash and recyclables. County highway crews gather the bagged materials for

proper disposal.

This season, the crews will continue to operate with extra health and safety precautions, including recommendations for masks and social distancing. Additionally, WisDOT furnishes safety vests, highway worker signs, a safety training video, trash bags, and two permanent signs identifying the group. Each group must provide one adult supervisor for every five or six volunteers. Groups do not work in dangerous areas like medians, bridges or steep slopes.

Adopt-a-Highway workers are asked to clean-up their assigned two-mile state highway segment at least three times per year. Of the 11,800 miles of state highway in Wisconsin, about 4,200 miles (about one-third of the system) are still available for adoption, meaning there's plenty of room for interested volunteers. 

"These improvements to the COVID-19 hospital data page put important metrics into focus and add context to how trends in hospital capabilities have changed over the course of the pandemic. The Piitt Stop

Thanks, Barry

News broke recently that the athletic director at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Barry Alvarez, was going to be announcing his retirement. Well, that news was true and the UW Athletic program is searching for its first new AD since he replaced Pat Richter in 2004.

I have followed Barry Alvarez for many years. He was part of Hayden Fry's first coaching staff at the University of Iowa in 1979. Coach Alvarez was a big hire for Fry, as he came from Mason City (Iowa) High School and was able to help recruit top in-state talent.

I remember when Coach Alvarez came to Wisconsin and he made a comment about fans needing to buy season tickets because they would be selling out before too long. How fortuitous he was! He was not unlike Coach Fry, in being a little brash with his confidence.

I remember going to an Iowa-Wisconsin game in Madison in one of Alvarez's first years. My friends and I all commented to the Badger fans around us that he was going to get that program turned around. Sure enough, he did, and the rest is history.

More than talking brashly, Coach Alvarez instilled confidence in his charges. He changed the culture of the program, in the way they did many, many things — down to what may have seemed small details. It

was all part of his plan.

The "Motion W" that we have grown accustomed to on UW uniforms, helmets, facilities, and such, was brought in by Alvarez to signal a new era in Badgers football. This is a move not unlike Hayden Fry with the creation of the "Tiger Hawk" logo.

The comparisons go further. Fry modeled Iowa's uniforms after the Pittsburgh Steelers — a dominant force in the 1970s. Alvarez had played college football at Nebraska, under the legendary Bob Devaney. It is no accident that the Badgers uniforms have a strong resemblance to the classic look the Cornhuskers have worn for decades. He borrowed concepts from three of the top coaches in college football history, in my opinion — in Devaney, Fry, and Lou Holtz — whom he worked for at Notre Dame before coming to Wisconsin. Since Barry's arrival in Madison, you can see many successful things in the athletic program that he had his hand in.

The word is that the school is going to go through a full search for his replacement, though Chris McIntosh would seem to be a logical choice. Whomever fills those shoes will have a big job to do to maintain and build on the culture and success that Coach Alvarez has helped foster at the UW.

Hunt Safely This Spring Turkey Season

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds hunters to practice safe hunting as they prepare for the upcoming spring turkey season.

While turkey hunters are skilled in the art of concealment, wearing the wrong color could put hunters more at risk this upcoming turkey season. It's especially important to avoid wearing red, white or blue. If a fellow hunter sees a flash of those colors through brush, you could be mistaken for a turkey.

Think safety first when out hunting. Last spring, the DNR received two reports of hunting incidents, including one person who was imitating a turkey and was accidentally shot by another hunter from a different group.

In addition to watching your wardrobe, hunters are reminded to practice the four rules of Firearm Safety (TAB-K) while afield:

T - Treat every firearm as if it is loaded

- A - Always point the muzzle in a safe direction
- B - Be certain of your target and what's beyond it
- K - Keep your finger outside the trigger guard until ready to shoot

"The most common rule that we find to be broken is people not being certain of their target and what's before and beyond it," said Ashley Van Egtern, DNR hunter education and R3 program specialist. "When people are afield, they need to make sure they are taking the time to properly identify their target. They should also know what is before their target and what is beyond it, as the trajectory of any projectile isn't guaranteed to stop with the target."

Wisconsin State Park System Spring Operations Update

Spring has sprung. And with 49 state parks, more than 500 boat launches, 15 state forests, 44 state trails, over 5,000 campsites, and much more — your adventure awaits.

As we usher in a new season, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced several State Park System operations updates outlined below.

Starting April 30, the following changes will be implemented:

- Observation towers and playgrounds will be open
- Volunteer group sizes will be increased to 50 people
- Capacity for open-air shelters, amphitheaters and outdoor group campgrounds will be increased to 100 people
- Non-department led special event capacity will increase from 50 to 100. Special event permit applicants may work with property staff to phase larger events with capacities over 100.
- Stand-alone concession facilities will open to the public at 50 percent capacity including staff
- In addition to the operations updates, the following amenities continue to be available to state park

visitors:

- Family camping (100 percent reservable with auto check-in)
- Outdoor group camping, maximum capacity of 100 people (100 percent reservable with auto check-in)
- Bathroom and dump station facilities
- Accessible cabins
- Drive-up window service
- Concessions, including firewood sales

Spring Reminders

Rain coupled with an increase in use can sometimes be damaging to public spaces and natural resources. While DNR staff try to provide signage and condition updates whenever possible, please be sure to stay on trails and seek dry trail alternatives if you find muddy conditions.

Visitors are encouraged to practice social distancing and to wear a face covering when a distance of six feet or greater cannot be achieved.

State park visitors can purchase annual admission passes online, over the phone by calling local properties directly or in-person at self-registration stations at individual properties.

plained about damage to their cars."

On safety, Dornbrook pointed to a neighboring community who had a resident injured while going through a construction zone and not paying attention.

"This is going to be a tough summer for Campbellsport," Dornbrook said. "It bothers me that right now the police department is taking the brunt (of the complaints) and we are not writing very many tickets. I bet you 95 percent of our contacts are not tickets."

The chief asked residents to find ways to drive around the construction and not through it. It will be a lot of construction around the Village of Campbellsport this summer and will be tough to navigate, but it for your safety to drive around the construction.

"Stay out of the way and let these guys do their job," said Dave Krebs, village president. "It will help make it quicker."

In other business, the reorganizational meeting was held before the start of the board meeting. The board named Janet Hafemann the vice president of the board. This is a new title the board has added to determine who would run a meeting if the president is not available. Hafemann was chosen because she has the most seniority on the board.

At a special board meeting on Monday, March 8, the board approved suspending the impact fees on new construction in the village through the end of the year. Developers assured the board during the meeting that this decision would bring some new construction to the village.

"We have had two building permits taken out since we lifted the impact fees," said Charlie Kudy, village administrator. "We have at least three more in the pipeline. Those conversations continue to happen and so the village is doing what we can to get those going."



participation of hospitals across the state in providing this data on a regular basis, so we have an up-to-date picture of hospital capacity as the pandemic continues.”

The COVID-19 hospital capacity dashboard now shows COVID-19 patients who are hospitalized or in the intensive care unit (ICU) in a longer trendline to show how the numbers have changed. The dashboard also displays bed use the same way, and includes a current trajectory of hospital and ICU bed use. New metrics include the percentage of immediately available hospital beds in the state and those reporting peak capacity. A second dashboard was added to the hospital data page that includes metrics on COVID-19 cases among health care workers by healthcare emergency readiness coalition (HERC) region.

DHS continues to improve the way COVID-19 data is presented on our website. We strive to provide transparent, valuable information to Wisconsinites as part of our continued effort to monitor the pandemic and recommend strategies to help stop the spread of COVID-19.

municipal building is located.

To get input as it develops future plans, the Shared Facilities Committee now would like the village board to appoint a representative from the business community to serve on the committee.

The Shared Facilities Committee was created in January 2019 in order to develop a plan for improved municipal facilities. Zimmerman Architectural Studios was selected in July 2019 for the project.

Architects originally developed two conceptual plans for the new facilities. The first plan included potential upgrades to the existing 9,315-square-foot building, along with a proposed 11,250-square-foot addition for an expanded library. The other plan included razing the current municipal building and rebuilding at the current site, with the library encompassing about 12,000 square feet, the police station utilizing about 6,680 square feet and village offices covering about 1,800 square feet.

Those plans were presented to the Shared Facilities Committee on December 19, 2019. During that meet-

ing, the committee members saw there would be no room for further expansion at that site if the need arose in the future. The group did some brainstorming at that meeting and came up with the idea of building on the municipal lot.

Now that the village will not be building on the municipal parking lot site, the Municipal Annex Building will remain, providing approximately 2,200 square feet of community room space that would have been lost with that plan.

Costs that were proposed in December 2019 ranged from \$4,771,116 for renovating and adding on to the existing building to \$6,579,100 for a complete rebuild at the current site. Construction costs have increased since that time.

The lot to the east of the municipal building was purchased by the Kewaskum Library Foundation and donated to the village to be used as a library expansion.

All Shared Facilities Committee meetings are open to the public. The committee has not set a date for its next meeting.
