Volunteers could be seen walking along the riverbank in Kewaskum as they participated in the 26th annual Milwaukee Riverkeeper Spring Cleanup on Saturday, April 24.

They found a variety of garbage. There were papers, boxes, plastic bottles and old beer cans. There were old food wrappers and cigarette butts. There was barbed wire. There was even an old cast iron kitchen sink.

In total, the 48 volunteers filled 35 large garbage bags with the rubbish.

"I am so grateful to get all of that out of the river," said Peggy Kober, leader of Kewaskum's Mighty River Project.

Not everything that was found was garbage, though. Members of a local Girl Scout troop collected 180 golf balls that they found in the river below the dam. The girls, who may soon decide

PUBLISHER'S LETTER

Fighting for what is right

Dear Reader,

There are times when one must take a stand. This is one of them.

Multi Media Channels, the company that owns the newspaper you are reading, together with newspaper publishers in 11 other states, filed a federal lawsuit against Google and Facebook on Monday alleging their business practices violate federal antitrust laws governing competition, and that they unjustly benefited from the use of our original content.

This is a very important lawsuit not just for our company, but for the newspaper industry as a whole. As alleged in our complaint, Google and Facebook have unlawfully monopolized the digital advertising market which has had a profound effect upon our country's free and diverse press, particularly the newspaper industry. Local news and journalism is vital to our democracy and we are committed to fighting for what we believe is right, as our company has always done.

We believe in the importance of local news and journalism. Our newspapers are locally owned, operated, and written and for well over 50 years have told the stories of people, places, challenges, and victories in our communities. Our newspapers, like so many others across the country, often serve as the primary, if not sole, source of local news – the town square, where one can get information about the school board, the city and county government, what happened at Friday night's game, who got married, or who passed away. Google and Facebook's unfortunate practices are threatening the existence of community newspapers across the country.

There is a long history of legal action to address competitive imbalances. The breakups of Standard Oil over a century ago and the AT&T telephone monopoly in the 1980s provide examples of these principles in action. There is a similarly long history of requiring those who benefit from a creator's efforts to pay licensing fees to the creator. The royalties that musicians receive anytime their music is played in a public venue are an example of fair compensation for creative effort.

Our intent is to win this suit so that newspapers, such as ours, can compete on a level playing field. Stay tuned.

Every Driver Can Make Construction Zones Safer

Gov. Tony Evers proclaimed April 26-30 as Work Zone Safety Awareness Week, and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) will be taking part in a nationwide campaign to spread awareness about safe driving as construction and maintenance activity increases for the spring and summer months.

"One thing that unites us all as highway workers and motorists is that we all want to make it home to our families," said WisDOT secretary-designee Craig Thompson. "Even the smallest distraction can lead to a tragedy on the highway, so we ask everyone to stay focused — buckle up, phone down."

Last year, despite traffic reductions related to the pandemic, there was still a work zone crash every 3.5 hours in Wisconsin. Over the past five years, Wisconsin work zones have seen more than 13,000 crashes causing 59 deaths and more than 5,000 injuries. The vast majority of crash victims are drivers and passengers with speed, tailgating and distracted driving all common factors.

"Every moment matters behind the wheel," said Tony Burrell, superintendent of the Wisconsin State Patrol. "We ask all drivers to stay focused, plan ahead and always expect the unexpected."

Even at a reduced speed of 55 mph, a vehicle

covers 80 feet per second, or the length of a football field in under four seconds.

In Wisconsin, work zones include major highway construction and rolling maintenance operations as well as emergency response, municipal projects and utility work along local roads. Wisconsin's efforts are in coordination with National Work Zone Awareness Week.

How can people help?

- Drive safely, avoid distractions and obey posted speed limits. Be courteous and patient. Set a good example for others on the road.

- Leave the phone alone. Texting and driving is illegal statewide and talking on a hand-held mobile device is illegal in work zones.

- Slow down when you see workers and, if it's possible, provide additional space by moving over. Wisconsin's Move Over Law applies to maintenance operations as well as emergency response units.

- Show support for work zone safety with the social media hashtags #DriveLikeYouWorkHere, #NWZAW, #WorkZoneSafety, or #OrangeForSafety (but please never text or tweet and drive).

Heroes Of The Holyland — Paul A. Birschbach

Paul Anthony Birschbach was born on May 21, 1947, to Walter and Antonia (Lauby) Birschbach. He is the youngest of nine children, five brothers and three sisters.

Paul attended Holy Cross Grade School, Mt. Calvary, and graduated in 1965 from St. Mary Springs High School, Fond du Lac. In his youth, he belonged to the Hillviewers 4-H club for nine years and won county awards in woodworking and gardening. He also attended the State Club Congress in Madison where he won the County Citizen Award and was a co-op winner in State for woodworking. Paul led woodworking in the club for four years.

He was also very active in his Catholic Church. He was a Mass server for 12 years, an officer in the Parish Young Men's Society for three years where he served as president for one year. He also was hands-on and planted the trees around the parish church after it was built and donated many hours for the church and parish school for building and repairs.

At home, Paul worked on the family's 364-acre dairy herd farm until being drafted into the U.S. Army at the age of 20. Four of his older brothers, Ralph, Roger Henry and Wayne were also drafted into the US Army. Paul was the only one that was in combat. Paul's sisters Betty and Rose are active with the American Legion Auxiliary Unit #454 of Mt. Calvary and his deceased sister Delores was active with the Stockbridge #128 unit. All three sisters were unit president and held other titles within their units.

Paul entered service on July 13, 1967. He received basic training at Ft. Campbell, KY, and advanced training at Ft. Knox, KY. Following a Christmas furlough at his home, he began his tour of duty in Vietnam on January 4, 1968. Spec. Birschbach served with Company C 2nd Battalion 22nd Division of the 25th Infantry.

On January 1, 1968, his unit was a part of the start of the Tet Offensive. When Paul was trucked to his unit in Dau Tieng on January 5th, he realized the Army sent him to the center of the Michelin Rubber Plantation. Why are we here? January 6th marked his first encounter with combat. Paul spent one month as a ground infantryman and then became a 50 caliber machine gunner on an Armor Personal Carrier (A.P.C.) for four months. Paul was seriously injured by hostile forces' fire on May 6, 1968, near the village of Cu Chi, Republic of Vietnam.

Paul received multiple shell frag-

ment and AK-47 bullet wounds. His injuries included a gunshot to the neck which lacerated his common carotid artery, resulting in severe paralysis of the right upper and lower extremities and a partial facial paralysis. Paul also received a left hand wound in the same attack which required amputation of his left ring and little finger tips.

Paul was lucky that he was close to the medical unit. Paul's initial surgeries were performed at the 106th General Hospital and 12th Evacuation Hospital in Vietnam. He spent two weeks at the 25th medical unit in Cu Chi. His nurse happened to be his distant cousin, Ann Petrie, from St. Peter.

Paul spent one week in a Japanese Air-Force hospital. He was later transferred to Brooke General Hospital, Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, for five months of extensive treatment and physical therapy to regain strength in his right upper and lower extremities, and also to regain his memory.

A V.A. doctor looking over Paul's one-inch thick file stated, "You know Mr. Birschbach, you should be dead or a vegetable." Paul's answer was, "Just a stubborn German." Paul was retired from the service April 1, 1972.

The military Medals and Awards Paul received included: the Purple Heart, Vietnam Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Marksman (M-14) Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Combat Infantryman Badge, Republic of Vietnam Civil Gallantry Cross with Palm Unit Citation Badge, Republic of Vietnam Civil Actions Honor Medal, First Class Unit Citation Badge, Sharpshooter with Machine Gun Bar, Vietnam Service Medal with three Bronze Service Stars.

After 30 years, Paul was reunited with three members of his 1-1 squad: the medic, Connie Stovall, New Mexico who saved his life, his A.P.C. driver, Charles R Otty, Ohio and Marion Carter, Pennsylvania who was wounded on May 5th, the day before Paul was wounded. Paul has attended many of the 2-22nd infantry reunions and was eventually reunited with his Captain William Allison, Alabama, and Lieutenant Gilbert Lilly, South Carolina.

Following his honorable discharge, Paul spent time recuperating from his wounds by helping on his father's farm. He attended Fond du Lac Tech School and received a one-year degree in mechanical drafting. He also worked for his uncle for

a year as a carpenter's helper. Paul attended further education at North Central Technical Institute, Wausau, and received an associate's degree in architectural-residential design.

On June 17, 1972, Paul married Nancy Lee E. Merten. They built the family's house in 1976 in the village of Mt. Calvary. Paul has six grown and working children: Amy Schmitz, mortgage closing coordinator; Sara Rhode, clinical therapist; Ted Birschbach, general contractor; Neal Birschbach, sales representative; Larry Birschbach, eight years in the Army and now a private contractor at Ft. Bragg and Penny Arentsen, administrative assistant and utility drafter.

All of Paul's children are married, with five living in Wisconsin and one living in North Carolina. His three sons are members of the Sons of American Legion, and Larry is also a member of the Mt. Calvary Legion Post. His three daughters are life members of DAV Auxiliary #11 and MOPHA #162.

Paul has 14 grandchildren, three step-grandchildren and one deceased grandchild. His six granddaughters are junior members of Mt. Calvary Unit #454. His wife, Nancy Lee is active in all of Paul's Veterans groups.

Paul worked with his oldest brother, Ralph as a carpenter for 25 years and went on to be a self-employed carpenter doing custom carpentry and remodeling. Paul was on the committee in 2000, which started the tradition of having the American Flags displayed on the streets of Mt. Calvary. Each year, he and the committee put the flags up in the village before Memorial Day and down after Labor Day. Paul also served for the Mt. Calvary Athletic Club as treasurer for three years and is now on the building and grounds committee.

Paul has many hobbies in retirement. He enjoys watching his grandkids in various sports activities and school programs they are involved in. He coordinates an annual Brewer game trip with his entire family and holds Milwaukee season tickets for the Green Bay Packers.

Paul and Nancy Lee traveled to different states by car while checking out antique stores. They also toured Italy and traveled twice to Germany. Once in Germany, he visited his foreign exchange student, Hanna Becker.

Paul is still involved in his church and sings in St. Isidore's Choir.

Paul is a life member of the 25th Infantry Division Association and a life member of American Legion

through this manual," he said. "This manual is meant to help the singer or director of choirs. So many church choirs strive to provide good music to glorify their church service. Sometimes ideas or suggestions may be just the thing to help."

His main focus when writing this book was to help church choirs, but it is really for anybody who wants help singing but can't get the training. He already has a few churches who have bought multiple copies of his book for their choir members.

The method he lays out in the book is something that has taken many years for him to form. As he taught high school choir, he continued to educate himself and push himself.


"I always tried to improve myself," Dahlke said. "I went to summer school every year that I taught."

Over the years, he found what seemed to work for his students and what didn't work. He then used these techniques with his students and he is now sharing them in his book.

"It's a lifetime of ideas and secrets and hints," Dahlke said. "It's just so simple to use some of these tips to get just a little bit better. It's just a few things that if they tried, they would be so much better."

The process to put this book together was a little harder than Dahlke thought it would be. He had to get all this information written down in a way that was easily understandable to his readers.

Dahlke worked with iUniverse to publish his book. He also enlisted the help of a pretty tough editor.

"This library is so exceptional," Dahlke said. "These girls have been so helpful."

Dahlke and his wife lived in Beloit most of their lives. After retirement, they moved to Northern Wisconsin. But, they were too far from their children and grandchildren so they decided to move closer. This brought the two of them to the Kettle Moraine area.

"We moved down here to be near my daughters," he said. "We found this beautiful house that my wife just loves."

While in this area, Dahlke has stayed active in teaching too.

"I did a long-term sub in Lomira," he said. "I have also substituted in Eden and Campbellsport."

He has been working with all age groups in his substitute teaching. His love though is working with high school students.

"I just love high school kids," he said. "They're still young enough to have that nice, young, full voice. I had at least half the kids in school singing (while teaching in Beloit)."

He now hopes to help a larger audience with this book.

"I would hope it gets out there to people," Dahlke said. "These methods and ideas may be new and strange to some. Please be open and give them a try. I am confident they will be a blessing to your singing and singers. Use what you wish, the contents are proper and proven."

Swim Pond To Open At Kiwanis Park

The swim pond at Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum will be open this summer.

The Kewaskum Village Board voted on Monday, April 26, to hire Breanna Rice as the pool supervisor. Emily Gonnering was appointed to work if needed as the backup supervisor. Lifeguards still need to be hired.

Village officials hope the swim pond will open on June 15.

Last year, only 150 people were permitted at the swim pond at a time in order to allow for social distancing. No capacity guidelines have been set

yet for this summer.

The village board also has not yet been determined whether there will be swim lessons or inflatable amenities at the swim pond this summer. Last year, the swim pond was open, but there were no swim lessons or inflatable amenities there due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The village added inflatable amenities in 2017. Inflatable items include a 10-foot water slide in the deep end of the pool, an obstacle course in the pond's medium depth area and a floating raft and splash area for children in the pond's shallow end. Life jackets are available for swimmers and are required while using the inflatable amenities.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is releasing the following information pursuant to Wisconsin Statute 301.46(2m), which authorizes law enforcement agencies to inform the public of a sex offender's release when, in the discretion of the agency, the release of information will enhance public safety, awareness and protection. The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of a sex offense. Further, his criminal history places him in a classification level which reflects a low potential to re-offend.



Timothy Cynor was released from prison on April 27. After his release he will reside at 1725 County Trunk Highway NN in the Township of Jackson. In 2012, Cynor was convicted of First-Degree Sexual Assault of a Child. Cynor will be on probation until May 3, 2040, and will be monitored closely by WI-DOC Division of Community. Cynor will have numerous rules and restrictions.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by law enforcement at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Spring Snowstorm Causes Multi-Vehicle Crashes

A spring snowstorm on Wednesday, April 21, brought freezing temperatures and heavy snow with whiteout conditions, which led to 20 crash scenes on Interstate 41 between County Trunk Highway D and State Highway 60, including a 48-vehicle pileup. One of the crashes resulted in the death of a 37-year-old woman from Trenton, Tenn.

According to a Washington County Sheriff's Office press release, at 11:13 that morning, the Washington County Sheriff's Office Communications Center began taking a series of 911 calls from motorists on Interstate 41 near County Trunk Highway D in the Town of Wayne for a multi-vehicle crash involving both passenger vehicles and commercial motor vehicles. Kohlsville Fire Department was the lead fire department in this incident, and no major injuries were reported. Substantial traffic delays ensued as several commercial motor vehicles needed to be removed from the traffic lanes, and I41 southbound was closed at State Highway 28.

Within the following 15 minutes, the emergency communications center began taking more 911 calls of additional multi-vehicle crashes along

I41 from Arthur Road to Cedar Creek Road in the Town of Polk.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office handled the largest scene on I41 northbound, just south of Cedar Creek Road. At that scene, there was a total of 48 vehicles involved; 38 were damaged. There was a total of six patients that were transported to local medical facilities with various degrees of injuries. Another 26 were evaluated and treated at the scene. Rite Way Bus Service Inc. assisted with the mass transit of about 50 stranded motorists to Pioneer Travel Plaza, which acted as a reunification and investigative point for the incident. I41 northbound was closed at State Highway 60 due to this scene.

Slinger Fire Department was lead fire department in that multi-vehicle incident, as well as in another multi-vehicle chain reaction crash on I41 north of State Highway 144. Numerous other fire departments and rescue squads assisted from both within and outside of Washington County.

The 20 different accident scenes on I41 are under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office, the Wisconsin State Patrol and the Slinger Police Department. Near white-out snow conditions will likely be a contributing factor in the investigations, according to the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Beware Of Scams

Area residents have been recent targets in a number of telephone and email scams.

Over the past month, caring Washington County grandparents have been swindled out of tens of thousands of dollars, according to Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis. On April 22 alone, the Washington County Sheriff's Office investigated two cases that may result in the loss of nearly \$40,000.

"The sheriff's office would like to warn citizens that numerous Washington County residents have been recently targeted in 'grandparent' type phone or email schemes," Schulteis said.

There are many twists on the scam. Sometimes the caller says that the grandson is in the hospital because he is sick or was in an accident and needs money. Sometimes the caller says the grandson is in some type of legal trouble and needs bond money. Sometimes the caller identifies themselves as the grandson or granddaughter, while other times the caller says they are an attorney or someone calling on behalf of the grandson or granddaughter. In all cases, the callers create a sense of urgency and pull on the heartstrings of the grandparent to send money quickly.

"These predators will impersonate your loved ones convincingly. With all of the social media and networking sites, it is surprisingly easy for these criminals to obtain family information to create a story. They will ask for money to be wired, or even have a reputable courier company pick up the money. It is imperative that you do not send a check, cash or money order by overnight delivery or courier. These criminals are counting on you sending the funds before you realize it is a scam. They may even ask for gift cards as a payment," Schulteis said.

Anyone who receives a call asking for money or gift cards should resist the urge to act immediately. Instead, verify the person's identity by asking

questions that only that individual would know. Check the story out with another trusted member of your family, even if you were instructed to keep it confidential.

"The sheriff's office will dedicate every investigative resource necessary to make our victims whole, but there are oftentimes investigative challenges when we are not notified immediately," Schulteis said.

People should speak with other family members, especially those who are more vulnerable, about the scams to make sure they do not fall victim to these criminals, Schulteis advised.

"We all need to watch out for each other," Schulteis said.

Other Scams

In addition to scams like those described above, the Kewaskum Police Department has been seeing a lot of the following scams targeting residents recently.

- **Amazon Scam:** A caller identifies themselves as an "Amazon associate" and states that a purchase was made on your account that you did not make. The "associate" will manipulate a way to access your computer and request that you access your bank account. At that time, they will have access to all of your personal banking information.

- **IRS Scam:** A caller states they are from the IRS and may threaten that you will be arrested if you don't cooperate. They will request personal information, such as a social security number and date of birth.

- **Free COVID Grant Money:** This scam generally originates on Facebook. The victim will get a message from someone on their "friend list," stating they received a large sum of money and advising how you can as well. They will provide a link to follow and will request personal information. Victims assume the message is from a trusted friend and will follow the link. The actual message is from a scammer spoofing another Facebook account.

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

**5 Years Ago
May 5, 2016**

When he was a kid 55 years ago, Mike Rechlicz went to a dime store on the south side of Milwaukee to buy plastic model kits for a quarter or 50 cents whenever he could. Although he always purchases kits while they are on sale these days, he spends a couple hundred dollars on each by the time he buys the extra add-ons for a kit. Rechlicz has built model boats, cars, figures, tanks, airplanes, dioramas and science-fiction contraptions. His favorites are the stock cars from the 1960s and early 1970s. The 65-year-old Kewaskum resident said building a plastic model directly from the box is fairly easy, but with the after-market parts or additions, it can get quite difficult. It takes him about six months to build a model, but it is not solid work.

Brent Schultz was an officer for the Kewaskum High School FFA who wanted the high school to have a greenhouse. Schutz and Travis Trapp lost their lives in a car crash on June 18, 2014. Both were 16. The Brent Schultz Memorial event scheduled for May 7 will raise funds for a future greenhouse at Kewaskum High School. The total goal is \$125,000, and about \$85,000 has been raised so far.

Everyone living in the Kewaskum School District should be getting a survey in the mail next week. 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

“I always knew this is something I wanted to do,” Kieler said. “I started baking with my mom and loved it. There is a lot of creativity and art in it. I am completely self taught.”

This new career is a definite departure from where Kieler was more than a decade ago. She wasn't baking very much and was focused on her career.

According to her website, “I served in the US Army reserves for 14 years where I started my career in healthcare as a respiratory therapist and continued on to complete my BA in healthcare management and MS in management.”

She and her husband, Clint, have three young boys. As their family grew, Kieler knew she needed a more flexible schedule for their family.

“Once I had kids, I went back to baking (at home for the family),” she said.

Her journey in baking professionally started with a new job. She started working at Blue Door Coffee Co. in Campbellsport.

“I worked there as a barista,” Kieler said. “They needed someone to bake, so I stepped in. That led to them saying ‘did you ever think of owning your own business?’”

With that, 3 Sweets Bakery began and Kieler became an independent contractor working out of Blue Door. She started the company in October 2019.

“I leased at Blue Door,” she said. “I did all my baking there.”

As the popularity of 3 Sweets treats grew, Kieler knew she wanted to expand. It was always in the back of her mind.

“I’ve always thought that I wanted to have my own business and a bakery,” she said. “I always knew.”

She also knew starting a bakery would be a tough thing to do. According to Kieler, there is a very small profit margin in bakeries.

“It’s one thing to have a dream, but another to support it,” she said.

So in order to be able to make this dream come true, she had to expand her vision. This included breakfast,

lunch and all things coffee.

“I found my love for coffee,” Kieler said.

With that, the idea for 3 Sweets Bakery and Cafe began. They found the perfect spot in Dundee, along Highway 67. The building once housed a general store and has had other random businesses in it over the years. It had been empty for some time though.

“I had my eye on this building for a while,” Kieler said. “We had to redo everything. We tore it down to the studs. It was a lot of work. We used all local contractors.”

They had purchased the building at N3040 Highway 67, which is located between Camp Dundee and the entrance to the Dundee Sportsmen’s Club, in December 2019. It took them about 11 months to do all the remodeling and repairs.

Once it was ready to go, Kieler decided to quietly open the business on January 2nd of this year. She wanted to slowly get the business started at its new location. It didn’t take long for people to hear about the place and start patronizing the business.

“It took off and I’ve been very supported,” Kieler said. “The support from the community and the other businesses has been great. I love this town. I am amazed at the compliments we’ve been getting. It’s been really well received!”

Kieler also credits her staff for their success. “We have a really great team,” she said. “Our entire team here, we have fun. We have a really good blend. We put people into their specialty. I strive to hire

people who are an extension of who I am.”

On a regular day, Kieler has half her hours in by the time most of us are getting up and heading out the door. She arrives at the bakery around 3 a.m. everyday to start baking.

“I have one baking partner — Karen,” Kieler said. “She and I determine what we’re going to do each day. Everything is made from scratch, in-house. We do a really good variety.”

In addition to the cafe, she also bakes for other businesses. Kieler still provides the bakery items for Blue Door. She also works with Stone Oak Coffee Haus and Solid Grounds Coffee Shoppe (inside ReachOut Books), both in Fond du Lac, and the Wallace Lake Supper Club near West Bend. Kieler is talking to other businesses who are wanting to partner with 3 Sweets Bakery too.

As proof of her success, Kieler and 3 Sweets Bakery was given the 2020 Envision Greater Fond du Lac Entrepreneur of the Year award. This award was announced just after she opened her new location. She was a co-winner with another local business — Ledgerrock Distillery near Eden.

The business has really taken off and looks to get even bigger in the future. 3 Sweets has definitely “arrived” in Dundee.

“I’ve never worked so hard in my life, but I love it,” Kieler said. “It’s awesome to have that feeling. I’m excited to see what’s to come!”

Kewaskum School Board To Hold Special Meeting On Declining Enrollment

To discuss the district's declining enrollment and options for the future, the Kewaskum School Board is holding a special meeting on Thursday, April 29, at 6 p.m. in the Kewaskum High School Theater. The public is invited to attend.

This fall, the district is projected to have 155 fewer students than it had in the 2019-20 school year, according to numbers that were presented at the April school board meeting. The total number of elementary school students is expected to fall to 746 students.

School administration will give a presentation on enrollment and staffing, and then open the floor up to public comments. There will be an open forum format in which attendees and school board members will be able to go back and forth to answer questions.

In addition to discussing student enrollment, the Kewaskum School Board is expected to reorganize at the April 29 meeting, with board members electing board officers, as well as board members being assigned to various committees.



Jerry Gosa, who passed away on March 5, served as president of the organization since January 1986. With Gosa's passing, the organization's board has reorganized.



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
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

#4 — Bruce Springsteen & the E Street Band: Live 1975-1985. A marvelous collection of live shows from the Boss. Great crowd interaction in every song.

#3 — Lynyrd Skynyrd: One More for the Road. It was a double live album and one that got plenty of playing time on my record player in the late 1970s. "What song is it you wanna hear?" Did I hear someone say FREE BIRD?



#2 — Eagles Live. This is a two-LP set released in November of 1980 that features clips from the Hotel California tour and a bunch of their greatest hits sprinkled in.





More Fishing Tournaments Using Immediate Release Method

It's the start of fishing tournament season, and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds tournament organizers that an immediate release method can be used for competitive fishing events.


Immediate release, more commonly known as catch-photo-release tournaments, consist of participants measuring and weighing their catch on their boats using bump boards and weigh scales, uploading a photo to a mobile app and immediately releasing the fish back into the water.

This method differs from the more traditional catch-hold-release

tournament formats, where fish are transported in the angler's possession to an onshore weigh-in location, and eventually released back into the water, but often not in the area where they were caught. This can cause problems for nest-guarding fish such as smallmouth bass, as predators can destroy unguarded nests.

Using immediate release during fishing tournaments has become an increasingly popular practice in both local and national tournaments. In Wisconsin, the number of bass and

walleye tournaments using the immediate release format has increased from an average of six per year between 2010-2015, to more than 30 per year from 2015 to 2020.

This format can help to reduce controversies surrounding catch-hold-release methods and alleviate concerns about crowds gathering for these events during the COVID-19 pandemic. Immediate release tournaments can also benefit local fish populations by:

- Minimizing the stress on fish, especially during spawning, nesting and warm water periods

- Keeping fish in their own "backyards"

- Minimizing disease transmission

Both tournament organizers and participants support this type of tournament format. This year, one local tournament, the Sturgeon Bay Bass Tournament, is set to become one of the largest Wisconsin fishing tournaments to use the immediate release format.

"There was a lot of support from the community to use this format and we felt it was the right thing to do," said Gary Nault, Sturgeon Bay Bass Tournament organizer. "It also saves a lot of work for tournament staff and money, which can be put back into the tournament to increase the prize money for anglers."

"Not only are these tournament types better for the resource, but it also allows for greater competition among tournament participants because they aren't limited by size or bag limits. Whether it be a one-pound fish or a 10-pound fish, every fish can be counted in an angler's total weight," said Joe Bevington, DNR statewide tournament coordinator.

Most fishing tournaments are required to hold a tournament permit. For help implementing the immediate release method into your permitted tournament, please contact your county's DNR fisheries biologist.

and to move education-based athletics forward," Hauser said. "Our member schools are facing challenging times, and I look forward to supporting and involving them in the process as we embrace this new chapter together."

boat before and after launching, draining all water from compartments, and never move live fish away from any waterbody.

Over the past year, DNR staff have worked hard to manage Wisconsin's amazing fishery resources responsibly. The DNR's efforts include maintaining and enhancing critical fish habitat, conducting fish population surveys, adding over 120 miles of classified trout waters and stocking out over 5.5 million fish into inland lakes and streams and both Great Lakes.

Based on early harvest reports, the DNR predicts anglers across the state will have a successful opening weekend.

Northern Pike And Walleye Forecast

Recent creel reports show anglers have successfully fished inshore for species such as northern pike and walleye.

In the central, western and northern parts of the state, walleye will be done spawning and have moved into shallower bays to feed. Anglers should expect to find them in slow currents or drop-offs and should fish for them using a jig and a minnow.

On the Winnebago System, walleye and northern pike will be in their pre-summer patterns in a little deeper water and prominent lake locations, but not as much as during the heat of summer.

Anglers should expect walleye to be next to shore structures in the vicinity of the major rivers. Inland waters on the eastern side of the state will be a little cooler, and the walleye and northern pike will likely be hanging around the shoreline-oriented habitat.

In southern Wisconsin, walleye and pike are finished spawning, but the southern lakes haven't warmed up much past 55 degrees.

Cool water temperatures in Lake Superior have prolonged walleye spawning. The temperature should provide excellent walleye fishing along the Ashland County side of Chequamegon Bay, off the coal dock in Washburn County and in the St. Louis River. If you are fishing the southern portion of Lake Michigan, try fishing tributary rivers.

Bass Forecast

Bass anglers have reported modest catches during the new catch and release season, and both largemouth and smallmouth bass will be in their pre-spawning modes for the opener. Anglers will find largemouth bass in the same shallow bays as walleye, while smallmouths will be on rocky drop-offs adjacent to spawning sites.

If temperatures warm before the opener, this will be some of the best smallmouth action of the year.

Panfish Forecast

Panfish anglers will find hungry bluegills and crappies in warm shallow water around trees and stumps preparing to spawn, though fishing may be slow with the cooler weather. Worms, waxies or small plastics fished under a bobber will work well for bluegills. Try using minnows under a bobber to catch crappies.

Trout And Salmon Forecast

Good catches and a high abundance of trout have been reported during the early catch and release season despite clear waters. Trout streams are low, but trout fishing in the Driftless Area should be phenomenal.

Trout streams across the eastern part of the state look suitable for opening weekend as well, though they are lower than in years past. Expect clear waters unless it rains. Anglers should take a stealthy approach and expect trout to spook easily. Reports indicate trout anglers have had luck while trolling stick baits and spoons.

Anglers trolling in Door County and northern Lake Michigan can expect to catch brown trout, and perhaps rainbow trout, as they are just finishing their spawning runs. Many of these trout have begun returning to the lake.

Additionally, coho salmon are starting to make their annual northward migration along the Lake Michigan lakeshore. Shore anglers have reported catching coho by casting spoons off the piers, while boat anglers have caught them trolling with flies on dipsy divers.

This time of year, anglers fishing Lake Superior have the most success trolling stick baits high in

the water column in shallow water. Coho salmon, brown trout, splake and lake trout can all be caught.

The DNR has stocked out spring catchable trout and those DNR locations will be a hit opening weekend.

"No matter where you live or recreate in Wisconsin, there is a good fishing spot close by," Hasz said. "Take some time, get outdoors and find your adventure fishing Wisconsin waters."

Contact your local fisheries biologist for more information or to find a launch or fishing location near you.

All Wisconsin residents and non-residents over the age of 16 are required to purchase a fishing license. Licenses can be purchased through the GoWild System or from a licensed vendor.

The DNR invites anglers buying their annual fishing license through GoWild to add a donation to the Cherish Wisconsin Outdoors Fund before completing their purchase.

Proceeds from the endowment fund established by the Wisconsin Legislature go toward protecting, restoring and improving habitat for plants and animals on the state's 1.5 million acres of public lands, including fisheries areas like the Lawrence Creek Fish and Wildlife Area.

The fund is held and managed by the Natural Resources Foundation of Wisconsin, a public, nonprofit 501c3 organization. Donations can also be made on CherishWisconsin.org.

Thirty Five Percent Increase In New Home Construction

The latest single-housing permit numbers show that new home construction is up 35 percent in the first quarter of 2021 compared to the first quarter of 2020. Compiled by the Department of Safety and Professional Services (DSPS), the data is required to be submitted to DSPS by all municipalities in the state.

Between January 1, 2021 and March 31, 2021, 2,626 new home permits were pulled in Wisconsin compared to 1,941 permits during the same time period in 2020, an increase of 35 percent. This news comes after a 10 percent increase in new home construction in all of 2020 compared to 2019.

“While we have heard from our members that business has been strong, these numbers are greater than even we anticipated given the rising cost of building materials and quarter one occurring during winter months,” said Wisconsin Builders Association (WBA) executive director Brad Boycks.

Other encouraging data has been released by the Department of Administration. In the first quarter of 2021, 67 plats and 1,404 lots were approved. These numbers are on track to surpass last year’s, as there were 201 plats and 5,340 lots approved in all of 2020.

“Historically low interest rates and a low inventory of existing homes have been huge factors in the number of new home building and remodeling projects,” said WBA

President Abe Degnan. “While we need to see the cost of building materials come down as they are not sustainable for the industry, we are pleased they haven’t hindered the volume of overall homebuilding thus far.”

The Wisconsin Builders Association is a professional trade association comprised of 21 local associations dedicated to helping members build communities around the state. We advocate the interests of 4,000 home building industry members to keep housing affordable and accessible for Wisconsin families, Protecting the American Dream for over 70 years.

In this area, Washington County saw a large increase in permits, but Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties both saw a decrease from last year.

Washington County is up 178.6 percent, with 42 permits taken out in 2020 and 117 this year. Fond du Lac County is down 50 percent, with 54 permits taken out last year and only 27 this year. Sheboygan County was only down 4.4 percent with 45 pulled last year and 43 this year.

DHS Transitions To VaccineFinder

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) will begin using VaccineFinder to help people more easily locate available vaccine providers who are open to the public. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) launched the VaccineFinder tool in March to help people find COVID-19 vaccine in their area. Next month, the tool will replace the DHS map of COVID-19 vaccine providers that launched in February.

“DHS is constantly evaluating different tools to make it easier to find

available vaccine,” said DHS secretary-designee Karen Timberlake. “It is critical that we streamline this process so anyone wanting a vaccination can quickly locate available vaccine in their community and get vaccinated.”

VaccineFinder gives users a more customizable experience when searching for vaccine. In addition to standard information, such as days and hours of clinics, users will be able to filter their search by vaccine type, adjust the search radius, and

Wisconsin DMV: Renewal Extension For Drivers Age 60 And Over Ends May 21

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) announced that the extension for drivers over age 60 — whose regular driver license expired after March 12, 2020 — expires May 21, 2021.

The DMV extended the renewal period to help keep these higher-risk customers safe during the health emergency.

“With more and more Wisconsin residents getting vaccinated, we believe we can provide a safe environment for these customers to visit a service center and complete this important activity,” Kristina Boardman, Wisconsin DMV administrator said. “Drivers over age 64 will need to visit a DMV to renew their license or it will expire. Social distancing protocols and limited transaction types remain in effect for the time being.”

Most drivers age 60 to 64 are eligible to renew their license online at wisconsin.dmv.gov/renew. This leaves approximately 27,000 drivers age 65 and older needing to plan for an in-person visit at

a Wisconsin DMV Customer Service Center prior to May 21, 2021.

Customers can reduce their time in the DMV service center by beginning the process online:

- Use the Driver License Guide to fill in the form and submit it electronically
- Make an appointment through the Driver License Guide

Drivers who no longer want to use their driving privilege but want identification can easily exchange their license for an ID online. A new ID card will be mailed to them. Details and other resources for aging drivers are available at wisconsin.dmv.gov/olderdrivers.

Most people do not need to visit a DMV. All vehicle-related services are online (e.g. renew registration, get title and plates). DMV’s online services at wisconsin.dmv.gov have been greatly expanded to support Wisconsin residents during the health emergency.

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Governor Evers, DHS Announce More Than \$175 Million To Support COVID-19 Testing In Schools

Governor Tony Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) announced the state has received more than \$175 million in federal funding to develop a program to support school-based COVID-19 testing for teachers, staff, and students. The program will be part of a comprehensive COVID-19 mitigation approach to assist schools in operating safely.

“We know this pandemic has been tough on students, educators, and staff and administration alike,” said Governor Evers. “Expanding access to testing is one tool we can use to help decrease disruption in classrooms across the state.”

In March, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced it would be investing \$10 billion to increase screening testing to help schools reopen, and an additional \$2.25 billion to ramp up testing in underserved populations.

DHS will be working closely with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) to develop a testing program that optimizes the state’s existing COVID-19 testing infrastructure and designing the program

in light of recommendations from the CDC. A survey went out to school districts and private schools last week to gather input on what kind of testing programs would best suit their needs. Testing would be offered on a voluntary basis and would not be mandated.

“Testing has been, and will continue to be, a critical part of Wisconsin’s COVID-19 response,” said DHS secretary-designee Karen Timberlake. “This funding will allow us to implement a COVID-19 testing program for schools that supports the safety and wellbeing of teachers, staff members, and students throughout the state.”

Schools will be able to choose from different testing options for the spring and summer and further options will be available in the fall for the 2021-2022 school year. More information will be available as plans for those options take shape.

UW Health Offers Lawn Mower Safety Reminders

As the weather warms up, the familiar sound of lawn mowers can be heard in neighborhoods across Wisconsin. While this can be a welcome sign of spring and summer, UW Health experts want to remind the community this can bring the risk of serious lawn mower accidents, especially for children.

According to the Child Injury Prevention Alliance, thousands of children in the United States are treated for lawn mower-related injuries every year including injuries to fingertips, hands, arms, legs and feet.

“Every year we see several very serious injuries at American Family Children’s Hospital related to lawn mowers, and these usually happen when the person mowing is distracted for a split second,” said Jessica Draper, nurse practitioner at American

Family Children’s Hospital’s level one pediatric trauma center. “The good news is most of these accidents can be prevented by using a few simple guidelines.”

- Don’t start mowing until you know where all kids are, and they should be inside if possible.
- If they are outside, tell them to stay out of the yard while you are mowing and/or find a supervisor who is not mowing to watch them.
- Never allow a child to ride as a passenger on a riding lawn mower.
- Teach children that lawn mowers are not toys and can be dangerous.
- A child should be at least 12 years old before using a push mower.
- A child should be at least 16 before using a riding lawn mower.

Does COVID-19 Vaccination Impact Blood Donation Eligibility?

This spring as COVID-19 vaccines become more available and people resume some of their favorite activities, the American Red Cross is reminding the public that the need for blood remains.

Healthy individuals are encouraged to make a blood donation appointment now. But what about those who’ve received a COVID-19 vaccine — can they donate?

As long as donors are symptom-free, feeling well and can provide the vaccine manufacturer’s name, there’s no waiting period required after receiving a COVID-19 vaccine currently authorized in the U.S. Additional blood donation eligibility information is available at [RedCrossBlood.org/Eligibility](https://www.redcrossblood.org/Eligibility).

Three reasons not to wait to donate:

Health Insights For Donors

The Red Cross is testing blood, platelet and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies. The test may indicate if the donor’s immune system has produced antibodies to this coronavirus, regardless of whether they developed symptoms. Testing may also identify the presence of antibodies developed after receiving a COVID-19 vaccine.

Plasma from routine blood and platelet donations that test positive for high levels of antibodies may be used as convalescent plasma to meet potential future needs of COVID-19 patients. Convalescent plasma is a type of blood product collected from COVID-19 survivors who have antibodies that may help patients who are actively fighting the virus.

The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test. To protect the health and safety of Red Cross staff and donors, it is important that individuals who do not feel well or believe they may be ill with COVID-19 postpone donation.

At a time when health information has never been more important, the Red Cross is also screening all blood, platelet and plasma donations from self-identified African American donors for the sickle cell trait. This additional screening will provide Black donors with an additional health insight and help the Red Cross identify compatible blood types more quickly to help patients with sickle cell dis-

ease. Blood transfusion is an essential treatment for those with sickle cell disease, and blood donations from individuals of the same race, ethnicity and blood type have a unique ability to help patients fighting sickle cell disease.

Donors can expect to receive antibody test and sickle cell trait screening results, if applicable, within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App and the online donor portal at [RedCrossBlood.org](https://www.RedCrossBlood.org).

Blood Drive Safety

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions — including temperature checks, social distancing and face masks for donors and staff — have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face mask while at the drive, in alignment with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public guidance.

About Blood Donation

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit [RedCrossBlood.org](https://www.RedCrossBlood.org), call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients.

A blood donor card or driver’s license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. National Volunteer Week: BBB Tips For Choosing The Right Charity

It has been estimated by the Corporation for National and Community Service that 77.4 million people in the U.S. volunteered 6.9 billion hours of their time in 2019 which has been valued at \$187.7 billion dollars. The estimates for 2020 will soon be available and it will be interesting to see what impact COVID-19 had on the volume of volunteer hours provided.

There is something in the fabric of American society that has fueled the spirit of volunteerism throughout its history. Whether it was assisting neighbors through barn-raising or the volunteers who helped armed service personnel in World War I and World War II, volunteers have played a vital role in strengthening community spirit and helping those in need. Charities today have inherited this rich legacy of people seeking to assist others.

While many are motivated to volunteer, we sometimes hit roadblocks or challenges to achieve this objective. Chiefly among them is finding the "extra" time to donate. Well, that problem is certainly understandable but it can be overcome by considering the following tips when making a volunteer choice.

Pick Your Passion

If you volunteer for an organization that is addressing a cause that you really care about, that can add incentive to help. Kelley Bevis, who serves as general counsel, BBB Wise Giving Alliance, notes in a Heart of Giving Podcast, that "You have to follow your bliss, whatever you're passionate about you'll make time for."

Start Small

You might begin by devoting just a couple of hours per month or an hour a week. Something that you can manage without disrupting your other chores and/or work time. Volunteering does not have to involve the effort of a part-time

job. Think of it as testing the waters a bit before you decide to take a swim.

Special Skills Are Especially Valued

If your profession and/or work experience provides special skills, consider offering them in a volunteer capacity. An accountant might help a small charity with its books, a plumber might be needed to construct homes for the poor, or a health care worker could lend a hand in a charity clinic. The possibilities are varied. Don't assume it's all about ladling soup at the homeless shelter.

Use Your Time Wisely

Sometimes people have the right motivation to volunteer but choose the wrong way to use it. For example, after a natural disaster strikes, some may feel like loading up a pickup truck with water and supplies and head out to help.

If you are not doing this in collaboration with an experienced disaster relief charity, you might actually result in getting in the

way of planned efforts that already have systems in place to coordinate emergency assistance. Many disaster relief charities welcome and rely on volunteers during such times of need, reach out and let them know you want to assist them.

Look Before You Leap

As always, we urge volunteers, just as we do with donors that contribute funds, to check out charities before you offer your assistance. Visit Give.org to verify if they meet the 20 BBB Standards for Charity Accountability.

You may also want to see if the charity is registered with the appropriate state government agency in your state (usually a division of the Attorney General's office or the Secretary of State). About 40 of the 50 states have such a requirement. You also can verify an organization's charitable tax-exempt status at the following IRS link, <https://www.irs.gov/charities-non-profits/tax-exempt-organization-search>.

see at a glance which vaccine providers have vaccine in stock. DHS will continue to work with vaccine providers to ensure the data populating VaccineFinder is current.

People can also call the toll-free vaccine hotline at 844-684-1064 with questions or for help finding or registering for a vaccination appointment. The hotline is available in English, Hindi, Hmong, Somali, and Spanish. In addition, certain vaccine providers are also using the COVID-19 Vaccine Registry. Anyone can register for an appointment using the vaccine registry. Other providers may use their own scheduling system.

While more Wisconsinites become fully vaccinated, COVID-19 disease rates remain high and, therefore, it is critical for everyone to continue good public health practices. Masking up, staying physically distant, washing hands, and getting tested continue to be crucial tools for protecting ourselves and our communities against COVID-19. People who are fully vaccinated can review CDC post-vaccination guidance.
