## Kewaskum Honors The Fallen

Monday was a Memorial Day, a day in which people across the nation honored the men and women who have died while serving in the U.S. military.

In Kewaskum, people lined the streets, dressed in red, white and blue, waving American flags as a Memorial Day parade made its way through the village on Monday, May 31.

Last year, the American Legion Post 384 did not hold the annual parade because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This year, the parade was held, followed by the post's annual Memorial Day program.

James D. Reigle, who is a World War II veteran, was the parade marshal. Children greeted him along the parade route, holding up signs that said, "Thank you, Mr. Reigle," in appreciation for his family's donation of land for Reigle Family Park, a new village park in Kewaskum.

The parade route ended at the American Legion Hall on Fond du Lac Avenue, where people gathered for the Memorial Day ceremony.



Wayne Rimmel, who is a member of American Legion Post 384 in Kewaskum, served as the master of ceremonies for the program. Wisconsin State Rep. Timothy Ramthun gave the main address during the program, as the crowd reflected on the meaning of Memorial Day.

"These men and women gave up so much more than just their lives. They sacrificed future careers and accomplishments. They sacrificed future joy and happiness. They sacrificed future time with loved ones and friends. They truly

gave all," Ramthun said during his address.

During the ceremony, the names of those from the Kewaskum area who died during a war were read. They had lost their lives during the Civil War, World War I, World War II, Korean War or Vietnam War.

"For many of us, these men and women didn't know us, nor did we know them. But each one of them decided that our freedoms, that we so often take for granted, were worth fighting and dying for. The safety and security of our nation were

**Book Of Columns**


Dear Reader,

# Heroes Of The Holyland — Victor Pagel

## Growing Up And Family

Victor was born in Plymouth on December 21, 1918, the oldest child of William and Ida Pagel.

While he was growing up during the great depression, his family made numerous moves based on where work could be found. They resided in Marytown, Jericho, Plymouth and St. Anna no name a only a few.

Victor had two brothers, Robert and Roger, and one sister June. Victor entered school at the age of four and graduated from New Holstein High School at age 16. He rode a horse back and forth to grade school.

At age 15, Victor left home to live with the Langenfeld family in New Holstein where he worked at Silver Moon Fur Farm which was owned by the Langenfeld family. This is when he honed his craft of being a mink rancher, which would be his life-long occupation. Victor would send money home to help his family during those very difficult times. He had learned responsibility at a younger age than most children, but he accepted the challenge and went with it.

## Victor's Time In Service

Victor entered the Army after passing his second physical. His first physical detected a heart murmur, but the second physical proved to be the charm. He attended basic training in Mineral Wells, Texas, commonly referred to as "Venereal Wells" because of the prostitution near the camp.

Victor particularly remembered the intense heat of long marches in full gear and assumed he was probably being trained for the Pacific theater. He recalled being shipped out to Maryland where the temperature was 104 degrees and he stated it felt cool. At basic training camp in Texas no thermometers were allowed to be seen.


As could have well been anticipated, he was shipped out to the European theater at the end of October. It was cold and icy. Victor was a combat medic and was known as "Doc" by his platoon. His first experience in battle was to crawl across an open area on his belly amongst barbed wire with machine gun fire above him.

Arriving at the fallen soldier, Victor found a man who was mortally wounded. The top of his scalp had been lifted off by the machine gun, which had found its mark. He wrapped the man's head in gauze and proceeded to warm his almost frozen hands on the still warm body — welcome to war and combat.

Victor also spent time in France and Italy. When asked where he stayed and slept he said there were

vacant homes usually with wine and canned food in the cellar. This was in both Italy and France. He encountered people who could speak English in both countries. But having grown up in a German family, he had learned to speak German fluently, which turned out to be a much more common bond in the language barrier.

It should also be told that the red and white cross on the medic helmet was not used by him. He wore a small arm band to indicate that he was a medic as the bright red and white symbol on the medic helmet was an excellent target for the enemy.

Victor was close to death many times. He recalled one time while marching when the soldier directly in front of him was shot in the center of his helmet and killed instantly. If not for his position, the outcome would have been deadly for him.

In another episode, while sleeping in a fox hole during a nighttime battle he awakened to find a large rock in the foxhole and some of his teeth were laying on the ground. He had no recollection of anything happening. The other two soldiers in the same foxhole were not as lucky. They were both dead.

Victor was then shipped to Germany and spent the remainder of the war in that country. When asked about reality and fiction, Victor stated there was much idle time, and that battles generally lasted in 10-15 minute spurts.

In the last battle Victor was involved in, he was left taking care of the wounded. As his platoon moved back, a whole German platoon came over the hill and he was captured. He had started to flee but gunfire came over his head. He raised his hands and surrendered.

Being able to understand German, he overheard the conversations of his captors. One said, "Let's shoot him." The other responded, "No, let's take him and let him sleep with the

rest of the pigs." This was Victor's start as a POW.

He was marched to an enclosed cattle rail car. It was very crowded with no light. Not knowing the final destination, he arrived at the stalag, was debriefed and deloused and began serving six months as a POW.

Many of the German soldiers upon speaking with Victor stated they did not want to be there anymore than he did. The German Draft Board was extremely harsh. You were made to serve or you were shot.

When asked about the TV show Hogan's Heroes, he said it was not that far fetched. There were such special units in the stalags and the German Guard "Schultz" on that TV show was not unlike the actual German guard named Little Willy at Victor's stalag who was full of threats but never carried them out. During one particular march, Little Willy told Victor to "go faster" or he would shoot him. Victor had terribly worn shoes and retorted this was as fast as he could go, so he would have to shoot him in a few moments. Little Willy then said, "Go as fast as you can."

The POW's were asked to cut wood for special privileges such as more food, etc. But that never came to be. They were usually dead and buried within one to three weeks. The starvation was unimaginable.

At one point, knowing that Victor knew how to butcher animals, his fellow POW's wanted him to butcher a sick cat that was around the barracks. He refused saying it would be the quickest way to death by eating a sick animal.

Food consisted of one small loaf of bread containing sawdust as a one-week ration and a large cauldron with a horse head in it with large overgrown dirty carrots.

Victor's weight had gone from over 200 pounds to 145 pounds when he was released. He suffered from malnutrition and also had a seri-

ous case of hepatitis. At war's end, he was transported to convalesce in a French hospital for over a month. The doctors told him that one more week in the prison camp would probably have meant his death.

The day Victor was released, he remembers the sky was black with allied airplanes making a monstrous, thunderous sound. Victor told his captors, "Just look." Hitler had issued orders that all POWs were to be shot. These orders were never carried out.

Victor said that every German he saw was surrendering to him. This was his exit from the prison camp. The malnutrition had caused the loss of his teeth at an early age and the hepatitis prevented him from ever donating blood again. Eventually Victor left the Army after a stint in the USA at Fort Lewis near Seattle, Washington.

## After The War

After returning home, Victor went to New Hampshire to build and operate a mink ranch for a rich family. Mink ranching was his love and the occupation he desired. While there, he took trips to nearby Boston and saw many Broadway plays before the shows moved onto New York.

He returned to Wisconsin after two years and looked up his old friend, Norbert Abhold, who operated a dairy farm and mink ranch. Victor ran the mink ranch for Norbert while Norbert tended to the farm and cattle.

Victor had his own mink, he lived with the Abhold family for seven years before building his own mink ranch across the road. He had purchased the land from his future father-in-law, Frank Blackmore.

Victor met his future wife, Elaine, in 1953. They dated for two years and were married on April 23, 1955, at Our Lady of Angels Catholic Church in Armstrong. Victor and Elaine

In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by her husband, John.



had four children — John, Lynn, Maureen and Joseph.

Everyone grew up and worked on the mink ranch. It was a family effort. Victor was an excellent rancher and raised champion mink. He was a board member of the Kettle Moraine Mink Breeders Association for over 40 year. He was past president, vice president, and chairman of annual mink shows in Fond du Lac.

Victor was a member of the American Legion Post in St. Cloud and received a citation for being a 50-year member. His two brothers both served in WWII. Robert enlisted in the Navy and Roger in the Army. His family had three sons serving at one time in the World War.



Victor's son, John, took over the mink ranch with success and the sign for the ranch proudly displays the fact that it was founded in 1955 by Victor and Elaine Pagel.

Victor lost the love of his life, Elaine, on July 31, 2000, when she died from complications of diabetes at the age of 69. Victor was never the same after that loss, he lost his battle with cancer on December 5, 2005.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORTS

### Injury Crash

On Sunday, May 30, at 3:43 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a motorcycle crash in the curves on Pleasant Hill Road just east of Slinger Road in the Village of Richfield. The caller was an area resident who heard the crash from her home. The caller responded to the scene and observed a motorcycle crashed in the south ditch of Pleasant Hill Road and the lone male operator lying approximately 15 feet south of the motorcycle in the tall grass. The caller advised that the operator was unconscious and bleeding from the head; the operator was not wearing a helmet.

Washington County sheriff's deputies arrived on scene and located the operator, who was conscious, breathing but unable to speak clearly, lying on his back. Richfield Rescue responded to the scene for patient care. Flight For Life assisted on scene and transported the patient to Froedtert Wauwatosa via helicopter. The patient sustained serious but non-life-threatening injuries.

The operator of the motorcycle was a 58-year-old Brookfield resident. The initial scene investigation showed that the motorcycle was eastbound on Pleasant Hill Rd and failed to negotiate the curve, went off the road right into the soft gravel, lost control and struck a tree. The operator was thrown from the motorcycle and landed in the tall grass near a field.

Speed or alcohol does not appear to have been a factor in this crash. Pleasant Hill Road just east of Slinger Rd was shut down for approximately 40 minutes for patient care and accident investigation.

### Shed Fire

On Saturday, May 29, at 5:35 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a shed fire at 3291 Pioneer Road in the Village of Richfield. Washington County sheriff's deputies and the Richfield Fire Department responded to the scene. The caller stated a small shed on the property was fully engulfed in flames and that her husband had sustained burns to his upper body and face. The caller advised that her husband (a 69-year-old Germantown resident) was able to exit the shed and nobody else was inside the structure.

The shed is approximately 15 feet by 15 feet wood framed and is a wood-sided garden shed with a metal roof. Inside the shed was a lawn tractor and miscellaneous lumber. The caller stated her husband had just mowed the grass with the Simplicity Zero Turn Z-Series lawn tractor and had backed the tractor inside the shed. The caller

stated moments later she saw flames inside the shed and her husband running from the shed with his clothing on fire. The caller was able to remove her husband's shirt and extinguish the flames on his clothing. The victim was conscious and alert when deputies arrived on scene. The victim was transport via Flight For Life to Ascension Columbia St. Mary's Milwaukee. The victim suffered second and third degree burns to approximately 40 percent of his body and remains in serious condition.

Fire personnel arrived on scene and extinguished the fire. The fire was contained to the small shed. The shed and contents were a total loss. Estimated structure damage and contents is approximately \$10,000. The origin and cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Richfield Fire Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Personnel from the following fire departments responded: Richfield, Germantown, Jackson, Slinger, Allenton and St. Lawrence. Flight For Life assisted on scene and with patient transport. Additionally, an off-duty Brookfield paramedic assisted with patient care until relieved by rescue personnel.

No fire or police personnel were injured.

### Former Corrections Officer Phillip J. Marker

On May 19, the Washington County Sheriff's Office was contacted by the Menomonee Falls Police Department about a death investigation it was conducting after responding to an apartment in the village to check the welfare of a subject. The police department was contacted on Wednesday, May 19, at 11:20 a.m. by a concerned family member. The police department made entry and located an adult female and adult male deceased of apparent gunshot wounds. Initial information provided by the Menomonee Falls Police Department indicated it was actively investigating the case, but not seeking any additional suspect(s) and there was no pending danger to the public.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office has now officially been notified that the physical evidence revealed the male, who was the sole renter of the apartment, died of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound after taking the life of the female who was known to him.

The sheriff's office is confirming that the male suspect, Phillip J. Marker, 33, was a corrections officer with the Washington County Sheriff's Office at the time of this incident. He was appointed to that position on April 24, 2017, and was assigned to the night shift. Corrections officers do not use

firearms as part of their employment. Before coming to the sheriff's office, he served in the Marine Corps from 2007 to 2012 and was honorably discharged.

At the conclusion of the criminal investigation by the Menomonee Falls Police Department, this agency will also conduct its own internal investigation to determine if there were opportunities to intercede in this tragedy.

"All of the staff at the Washington County Sheriff's Office are given a copy of my 'Leadership Direction' that stresses the importance of building trust within the community we serve. Phillip J. Marker betrayed this direction and this community in the most horrific way possible," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said in a news release. "On behalf of everyone at the Washington County Sheriff's Office, I would like to extend our sympathy to the victim's family and friends. We ask that you join us in giving your thoughts and prayers to all of those affected by this tragedy. This senseless and brutal act of violence ended two lives far too early and brings sorrow to us all."

The Menomonee Falls Police Department is the lead criminal investigative agency for the case.

Hudson Curtin and Jayson Maas. Club advisors are Jayne Steiner and Jeremy Geidel.

In the middle school rocket competition held that same day, the Kewaskum Middle School Rocket Club earned a first-place finish in the Class 1 rocket competition.

KMS Rocket Club members include: Fritz Gerhartz, Peyton Theusch, Alexis Butzlaff, Josh Weinreich and Morgan Schultz. Nikki Airaudi is the KMS club's advisor.

**Starting The KHS Rocket Club**

Mackenzie was determined to create a KHS Rocket Club last year, and the first thing she had to do was get members. She rallied together the former members of the Kewaskum Middle School rocket club.

When a new club is formed at the high school, it must go through a year of being a probationary club before it becomes an official club. That means it does not get any funding from the school, so the next thing Mackenzie and her group needed was funding.

"A big part of rocket club is you have to get \$800 for the rocket, and we couldn't come up with \$800 for ourselves," Mackenzie said.

So last year, Mackenzie and Amanda Martin, who also was a KHS freshman at the time, went to the Kewaskum Booster Club and explained what rocket club is and why they needed money. The Booster Club was convinced it was a good project and donated \$800 to the cause, and the students purchased materials to build a rocket.

But then the COVID-19 pandemic happened, and everything stopped.

This year, Mackenzie still wanted to get the rocket club going at the high school. Once again, she went out to recruit other students to join the KHS rocket club. She went to all the freshmen and sophomores who had been members of the Kewaskum Middle School Rocket Club two years ago. They all wanted to join the high school club. In addition, Mackenzie found a couple more students who were interested.

Competition organizers informed Mackenzie that the club could use the rocket from last year. In addition to the Kewaskum Booster Club, the KHS Rocket Club received donations from area businesses and individuals for this year's launch.

The only problem was that the club needed an advisor. Mr. Eugene Peterson, a KHS teacher who was going to be the rocket club advisor last year, was not able to commit to the role this year because he and his wife were expecting a baby.

"It was totally fine because I understand that is a very stressful time having a newborn and running a club," Mackenzie said. "But we were advisorless."

So, Mackenzie's mom, Jayne Steiner, and another parent, Jeremy Geidel, agreed to be advisors for the club. In addition, Nikki Airaudi, a

science teacher who is the advisor for the KMS Rocket Club, also assisted with the high school club.

"Mackenzie is a go-getter. We talked about doing a high school rocket club for years. Mackenzie made it happen and that is really cool," Airaudi said.

**Building The Rocket**

The KHS Rocket Club began meeting in January. The group got together for about four hours every Saturday for four months to work on the rocket.

For the competition, each rocket club needs to build the rocket. In addition, the students must create an experiment, called a payload, that goes inside the rocket. The KHS payload contained bone fragments from frogs so the students could conduct an experiment on how to prevent bone density loss in astronauts when they are in space. The frog bones were placed in hydrochloric acid to mimic how bones deteriorate when astronauts go into space, due to the lack of gravity. The students then added a calcium solution to see it would help the bones regain any of that lost mass.

Club members then decorated the exterior of the rocket with drawings of frogs and bones. They also drew company logos on each of the rocket fins as a tribute to the club's sponsors.

In addition to building the rocket and creating an experiment, the students were required to create a skit and presentation board to explain the entire project. The students were then judged on their rocket construction, their payload and their presentation.

The idea of doing an experiment with frogs was a long time coming. Ever since they were in middle school, the Kewaskum students had wanted to somehow use frogs with their rocket experiment.

"We have this really long-running joke that we wanted to put frogs in the rocket. You are not allowed to put living things in the rocket, so we decided to just go with frog bones so we could make our little dream come true and put a frog in the rocket," Mackenzie said.

When the KHS rocket was launched some 3,000 feet in the air last month, the students successfully achieved their goal.

**Kewaskum Middle School Rocket Club**

Under the guidance of advisor Nikki Airaudi, the KMS Rocket Club created a payload of its own. The middle school students wanted to determine if an exoskeleton would protect invertebrates from acceleration G-forces, much like the G-suits that astronauts wear during take-off. This information would be important for knowing how to choose which invertebrates would be best suited for scientific research in space, according to Airaudi.

The invertebrates were represented with gelatin molds in two sizes. In each size, one sample was covered in chocolate to act as the exoskeleton. The samples were placed in a centrifuge constructed by the team to help counteract the effect of acceleration G-forces. A camera was attached so students could record the operation of the centrifuge inside the rocket model while it was being launched.

"It was a pretty impressive little payload that they created," Airaudi said. "The experiment actually turned out really cool because the chocolate protected the mold very well, which was not what even I expected. The two molds that were not covered in chocolate were completely obliterated, and the ones that were covered were totally intact."

Therefore, the students concluded that using insects with an exoskeleton would be a better choice for use in space research. That wasn't all that the students learned

by participating in the rocket club, according to Airaudi.

"It touches so many different areas. It is engineering, it's problem solving, it's collaboration, it's science. It touches so many different pieces of important learning. Even for some of my kids that I think this is going to be a challenge for, I see the growth in self-confidence. It is such a good program," Airaudi said.

**The Future**

Because of the pandemic, things were scaled down for the contest this year. In the past, about 20 clubs come from other states have participated in the contest, which is usually held over two days at Blue Harbor in Sheboygan.

This year, all the clubs were from Wisconsin, with just three middle school teams and nine high school teams participating. Rather than meeting for two days, the teams gathered just one day for the launch, while the presentations were done virtually over the internet.

Still, the students enjoyed it. "I have been trying for so long to get this started, and now it finally worked!" Mackenzie exclaimed. "I had such a blast. It was so fun."

Mackenzie and the other Kewaskum students hope that next year the contest will once again be held all in-person. And they hope the new KHS Rocket Club will be around for a long time.

"I am very much hoping it will become a permanent club next year and that we get funding from the school," Mackenzie said.

**KEWASKUM'S DAYS GONE BY****5 Years Ago****June 9, 2016**

The Village of Kewaskum notified 230 residents that their water will be disconnected if they do not pay their water bills by July 1. The notices went out May 19. Approximately 20 percent of utility customers owe money on their accounts. As of May 11, 26 accounts had balances in excess of \$1,000 and there was one account owing more than \$9,000. At the June 6 meeting, the village's administrative committee discussed various ways to change the village's policy for charging water bills to ensure better payments. Once the board agrees on a new policy, it plans to pass a new ordinance on how delinquent water bills will be handled.

Kewaskum School District students have increased their average writing score by 73 percent in elementary grades and 52 percent in middle school over the 2015-16 school year, based on an in-district writing assessment.

Homeowners on Meadow Lane in Kewaskum are going to be spending some money to keep rainwater from going into the village sewage. By village ordinance, residents are not allowed to put rainwater into the village sewer. The majority of homes on Meadow Lane have been doing just that since they were built in the 1940s or 1950s because drain tiles were built on the houses that connect directly to the sanitary lateral, which sends the water into the village's sewer system. That needs to be fixed. The cost will be approximately \$4,300 to \$5,300 per household, depending on how much work needs to be done at the house.



# The Piitt Stop

## What Is Happening To Baseball?

I have always been a big fan of the sport of baseball. I have very fond memories of my years in the game, from tee-ball all the way through high school and then playing some slow-pitch and modified/semi-fast pitch softball as an adult. I have great memories attending my first Major League Baseball games with my family and my maternal grandparents, both of whom were big baseball fans.

I have always been a fan of the nostalgia of the game. As the great writer, Red Smith, once said, "Ninety feet between home plate and first base may be the closest man has come to perfection."

The game has no clock. Food and tailgating are also synonymous with baseball. There are so many great things about the game, although I am worried about where the game is going. Sadly, it does not seem to be the "National Pastime" anymore.

Game length has been an issue for a number of years, but the solutions they seem to come up with do not solve the problem. For a sport with a pace of play and action, like baseball, you need to keep the game length in check — which they have not, with professional games regularly going three hours.

As a "traditionalist," I'm afraid for other developments in the game and how they may end up trickling down to the younger levels. Major League Baseball has had six no-hitters so far this season. The record for a season is seven!

Are pitchers that much better? Are hitters worse than ever? I believe that the skill of the pitchers and hitters are still in balance, but the way in which the game is played, is not.

Starting pitchers seldom go through a line-up more than twice. Relief pitchers are only pitching one inning at a time — being

able to throw 90-plus miles per hour each time. Hitters are swinging from their heels — trying to hit homeruns most of the time. Strikeouts are at an all-time high — because of this combination of pitching and hitting factors.

Defenses have employed shifts, in which they put more players to one side of the field than the other — because they are playing the odds that the batters will hit into the shift. Again, because the batters are not looking to "go the other way" or bunt to try to get on base. Stolen bases and hit-and-run plays are seldom seen anymore. Offenses do not seem to try to manufacture runs as they used to.

How can we fix the game, for the betterment of the competition, watchability, and make it more enjoyable? Here are my lists of "fixes."

**Pitching** — Maintain the limit of mound trips and the clock between pitches, as they currently have. They should also reduce the number of pitchers on a roster, so they are required to pitch more innings, which will also speed the game as there would be fewer pitching changes.

**Batting** — Go back to the fundamentals of hitting. At this rate, a batting average of .300 will be like .400 has been for so long. If we do not make changes, the days of players like Ichiro Suzuki, George Brett, Tony Gwynn, Paul Molitor, and Rod Carew may be gone.

**Defense** — No shifts. The short-stop and second baseman must align on their traditional sides of the infield.

**Offense** — Use the tools available to you - bunting, stealing, and the hit-and-run. Put pressure on the defenses to make plays.

I do think that baseball could make itself the "National Pastime" again, if they are serious about making the game more enjoyable for all.





Milwaukee's Turk Letizia took advantage of a final-lap incident involving the first and second-place cars of three-time and defending PDTR Late

Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland and Charlie Schmidt of Cedar Grove to collect the victory in the 25-lap Sheboygan's Country B93.7 Late Model main event.

2019 PDTR Grand National champion Tyler Kulow of Plymouth drove the low groove to earn the win the 25-lap Oostburg Automotive A-main and Justin Bauer of Sheboygan Falls benefitted from a spin by early race leader Trevor Frank of Sheboygan to claim the victory in the 25-lap Cellcom B Mod A-main.

In the 25-lap 360 Sprint Car headliner, Arenz finished second, McMullen was third, Davis wound up fourth and 2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett rounded out the top five after starting seventh.

Polesitter Turk Letizia grabbed the lead of the 25-lap Late Model A main on the drop of the green flag with third starter Jim Schmidt of Cleveland in second.

On lap 21, Justin Schmidt ducked low to take over the top spot. However, Charlie Schmidt battled back as the two drivers dueled side by side for the lead on lap 22. The fifth caution flag of the race came out on lap 19 when Rick Kretschmann of Sheboygan Falls hit the wall in turn four. Bauer continued to fend off the challenges of Hitsman on the restart and held strong over the final six laps to secure his second career PDTR B Mod A-main victory.

Hitsman placed second, Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls, who started fourth, finished third, seventh starter Shane Long of Sheboygan Falls took fourth and Blanke rounded out the top five.

Tim Haddy of Waupun won the first 12-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main and Scott Conger of Eagle was the victor in the second 12-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car B main.

Tyler Kulow set a new 10-lap PDTR Grand National heat race record in winning the second Grand National heat race in a time of two minutes and 33 seconds, which was one second better than the previous track record.

PDTR action is scheduled to resume on Saturday, June 5, with the FloRacing All Star Circuit of Champions and Bumper to Bumper Interstate Racing Association 410 Sprint Car series set to pay a visit to The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth, with the PDTR 360 Sprint Cars also on the card.





# Washington County Announces Emergency Broadband Benefit Program

Washington County announced it is working to help build consumer awareness about the Emergency Broadband Benefit, a new Federal Communications Commission (FCC) program. The temporary benefit will help to lower the cost of broadband service for eligible households during the on-going COVID-19 pandemic.

The \$3.2 billion Emergency Broadband Benefit program provides a discount of up to a \$50 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for qualifying households on qualifying Tribal lands. The benefit also provides up to a \$100 per household discount toward a one-time purchase of a computer, laptop, or tablet if the household contributes more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase through a participating broadband provider.

A household is eligible if one member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Has an income that is at or below 135 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines or participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid or the FCC's Lifeline program;
- Approved to receive benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision, in the 2019-2020 or 2020-2021 school year;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income through job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020 and the household had a total income in 2020 at or below \$99,000 for single filers and \$198,000 for joint filers; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

Emergency Broadband Benefit enrollment opened on May 12, 2021. Eligible households can enroll through a participating broadband provider or directly with the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) using an on-line or mail-in application. #### Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
