Party On The Pavement To Be Held This Tuesday

Party on the Pavement, known as the largest street festival held on a Tuesday in Wisconsin, will be held in downtown Kewaskum on Tuesday, June 22.

“We are so excited to be able to have this event,” said Wendi Dreher, who helps coordinate the event for the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce. “Where else can you go and spend all day with your family and pay no entrance fee, where you have everything all in one area...food, shopping and entertainment.”

The festival, which is sponsored by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, will run from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m., with 100 percent of the proceeds benefiting the community.

The day features an array of vendors, crafts, children’s activities and live entertainment. Plenty of food and refreshments will be available throughout the day.

“Local businesses have really stepped up and helped sponsor acts so we can offer this huge event for the whole community,” Dreher said.

Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial & Education Center Now Open

The Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center in Kewaskum is now officially open after a dedication ceremony was held on Sunday, June 13.

A couple hundred people gathered for the event, which paid tribute to those who were

killed in the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, including Andrea Haberman, a 1994 graduate of Kewaskum High School. Sunday’s event also honored those who have donated their time and financial resources to build the memorial.

“This memorial was a labor of love and duty to remember Andrea and the thousands of

other innocent lives that were lost that fateful day. It will serve as a respectful place for reflection and remembrance for the people of Wisconsin and all who visit around the world,” said Gov. Tony Evers, who spoke at the event.

“Because of the dedicated

Drone Helps Find Suspect After Crash Near Campbellsport

On Monday, June 14th, at 5:25 p.m., the Fond du Lac County Communications Center received a 911 call reporting a two vehicle crash with injuries at County Highway W and Woodland Drive in the Town of Ashford.

A sheriff’s office deputy arrived on scene and determined that there were four people injured between the two vehicles. The parties in both vehicles were traveling together south on County Highway W prior to the crash. A preliminary investigation determined one of the vehicles missed a turn and

began to make a U-turn when the vehicle following it struck it. The deputy also determined the at-fault driver had fled from the scene on foot and coordinated with responding officers to form a perimeter in the surrounding area.

After forming a perimeter, a Sheriff’s Office drone equipped with thermal imaging was deployed. The drone was able to locate the suspect in a wooded marsh area and assist law enforcement to his location. At 6:18 p.m., the suspect, a 20-year-old Sheboygan man, was taken into custody without incident.

He is being held at the Fond du Lac County jail for OWI causing injury, resisting an officer, and a probation hold.

The four other occupants from the crash were transported to St. Agnes hospital by Campbellsport Fire/EMS and City of Fond du Lac EMS for various minor injuries. Members from Campbellsport Fire/EMS, Kewaskum EMS, Fond du Lac Fire EMS, Wisconsin DNR, and Wisconsin State Patrol assisted on scene.

The incident remains under investigation at this time.

In October of 2020, Alexis began to experience severe headaches. It was originally thought to be signs of dehydration, but an MRI later revealed a malignant tumor the size of a golf ball on the right frontal lobe of the brain.

Diagnosed with stage 4 glioblastoma, Alexis underwent brain surgery in October, 32 radiation treatments from November to December, and beginning in January until now, up to six chemotherapy treatment sessions. She has received support from her family, classmates, and community through this challenge, and her incredible attitude and strength has been a shining example to others.

A cancer diagnosis, however, has not stopped Alexis from excelling her senior year! On the field, she is a varsity volleyball and softball player, and her team just won the Conference Championship and are now pushing towards state! Off the field, Alexis is the Class of 2021 Salutatorian, and she plans to attend Marion University this fall on the track to become a pediatrician.

The tentative date for the Ice Cream Social and Bucket Fundraiser is August 21st, and the location is still being verified. Tune in to later editions of the Campbellsport News as more information is released, and the club hopes you will be able to come on out, enjoy some classic and refreshing food, support Alexis, and maybe even bring home a prize!

Ben was preceded in death by Robert Brunhart, Lloyd Painter, Jeff Oneska, Norma and Carl Michaels and his canine companion Izzy.





work of the Kewaskum community, Wisconsin will be home of one of the finest 9/11 memorials and education centers in the country, well into the future and for generations of Wisconsinites yet to come. So, I am so appreciative of the grassroots team that made this memorial possible, for our state and for the community members that showed unwavering support of the Habermans and this project,” Evers added.

The process of building a memorial in Kewaskum started more than a decade ago, when Gordon Haberman, father of Andrea Haberman, began working with other community members – Jerry Gosa, a close family friend and Kewaskum High School teacher; Larry Ammel, a retired Kewaskum High School teacher and president of the Kewaskum Area Arts Council; and Matt Heiser, Kewaskum village administrator – to procure an artifact for the memorial.

In August 2014, a 2,200-pound steel beam arrived in Kewaskum. That beam now serves as the centerpiece of the memorial.

“The base of the steel sculpture is anchored by a pentagon shaped piece of stone, and is to remind us of the third plane attack. Each of the points of the pentagon is aligned with a learning station within the memorial,” Dustin Melzark, a graduate of Kewaskum High School and an architect who worked on the memorial, stated during Sunday’s ceremony.

Also speaking at the ceremony were Erik Bilstad of Newsradio 620 WTMJ, who emceed the event; Randy Schoemann, who led the opening prayer; Andrew Johnson,

former publisher of the Kewaskum Statesman and Campbellsport News, who serves on the board of directors for the memorial; Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann; Kewaskum Village Administrator Matt Heiser; and Gordon Haberman and his daughter Julie Osmus. Windy Hope sang the Star-Spangled Banner and America the Beautiful during the program, and the American Legion Post 384 Color Guard presented the colors.

The Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center is “a place of education about a dark day in this country’s history, yet it is also a place of hope and indeed a place of celebration of the strength of our community, our country and its’ citizens.,” according to Osmus.

“Those words; Hope and Celebration express sentiments which few could entertain in late 2001. All assembled here today have contributed to making this Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial a place of contemplation, a place of education and a touchstone linking future visitors to that past event,” Osmus said to the crowd gathered on Sunday afternoon as she stood beside her father, Gordon Haberman.

“It is with humility and emotion that we stand in front of you; those who have participated in the building of this powerful and magnificent monument. Yours and this community’s belief in the importance of remembering and memorializing a pivotal event in our country’s history is why we are here. We thank all of you for sharing this vision with us throughout these years,” Gordon Haberman added.

So when representatives from Holy Trinity Parish approached him about doing his Eagle Scout project at the cemetery, Brenden agreed. He built two large planters to flank the cemetery sign, planted flowers in the planters and installed a light to shine on the cemetery's flag.

School districts across the state received High Cost Special Education Aid payments on June 20 to reimburse a portion of the costs associated with teaching students with significant disability-related needs. The Kewaskum School District received \$24,438.

One of the four tennis courts at Kiwanis Park will become a basketball court during the summer months and remain a tennis court the remainder of the year. The Kewaskum Village Board approved bringing portable basketball hoops onto the tennis court during the high school tennis teams' off-seasons.

Nearly \$18 million in Basic Recycling Grants have been awarded to 1,024 local governments to offset some costs associated with local recycling program operations during calendar year 2016. Area municipalities and grant monies include Town of Ashford, \$1,231.08; Town of Auburn, \$7,336.10; Town of Osceola, \$1,602.45; Town of Scott, \$3,057.29; Town of Barton, \$2,831.52; Town of Farmington, \$5,991.34; Town of Kewaskum, \$6,406.18; Town of Wayne, \$4,661.35; and Village of Kewaskum, \$9,468.19.



On June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger issued an order for the state of Texas that all slaves were free. June plus nineteenth was established as Juneteenth Day more than a century later.

This order from Galveston might seem a bit delayed, but the states that were still under Confederate control were not free from slavery. Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation took effect at the beginning of 1863 and the thirteenth amendment abolishing slavery passed Congress in January 1865.

African Americans living in Texas were not aware of their emancipation until Union soldiers arrived in Galveston on that date and announced that slavery was abolished. The former slaves immediately began celebrating with prayer, song and dance on that date and each year thereafter. The Juneteenth holiday was established.

We are happy to have many books at the library that convey various stories about many aspects of slavery. We have them in fiction, non-fiction; for adult, children, and teen readers. In honor of Juneteenth Day, Several will be highlighted below; many more will be available for checkout at the library.

Conjure Women by Afia Atakora is new this year and is historical fiction about three women during and after the Civil War in the South. In an interview with the author, she conveyed that although she saw her novel as an allegorical Gothic Tale, the lesson of which is that our past isn't as far back or as well buried as we want to believe.

Much of it rings true in today's world. Toni Morrison's Beloved is also historical fiction taking place after the Civil War with a family of freed slaves whose home is haunted by an evil spirit. This novel won the Pulitzer Prize for fiction in 1988. Another deep-contemplative novel about slavery this time featuring a teenage runaway slave is Grace by Natasha Deon.

Four hundred souls: a community history of African America, 1619-2019 is a rich anthology of close to 100 essays by writers throughout 400 years. Ibram X Kendi was a co-curator of the book which showcases how African Americans contributed widely to our country's history.

Clint Smith in his book, How the word is passed: a reckoning with the history of slavery across America seeks out how to understand the oppression of Black Americans throughout history. The author traveled to eight places of historic significance to show how the past is present. He has stated that "without learning the actual history to understand why society is the way it is today, nothing will ever be made right."

In addition to the above books, we have many others in our collection about slavery, the Emancipation Proclamation and Juneteenth Day. They will be on display throughout the library for you to check out. Or you can always ask one of our friendly staff for their recommendations in commemoration of Juneteenth Day.



Kewaskum Girls Win Regional Soccer Championship

On Saturday, June 12, the #2 seeded Kewaskum High School girls soccer team defeated the #3 seeded and defending Division 3 state champion Catholic Memorial Crusaders 3-2. The victory secured the first regional championship for Kewaskum since 2009 and the second regional championship in school history. The win advances Kewaskum to the Sectional Semi-Final game against Shorewood on Thursday, June 17. Kewaskum will host the Sectional Final game on Saturday, June 19, at 7 p.m. regardless of who advances.

The game began at a blistering pace to match the heat beating down on the players. The first half was a battle with each team mounting attacks while the other snuffed them out. At the 40:33 time on the clock, Kewaskum broke through for the first goal of the game. Lydia Steinbauer got a clean shot at goal thanks to a nice pass by Natalie Newman to put the Indians up 1-0. Then, less than four minutes later, at 44:09, Newman put a goal in on her own off a direct kick to put the Indians up 2-0 at the half.

The Crusaders were not going to go away quietly as they scored less than two minutes into the second half off a long floating shot to make it a 2-1 game. Catholic Memorial continued to apply pressure on Kewaskum and eventually broke through at 70:02 to even the game at 2-2. Kewaskum was able to bounce right back, getting a third goal off a cross from Natalie Newman that had Kennedy Adams flying through the air and finishing with her head to put the Indians up for

good 3-2 at the 76-minute mark. The final 15 minutes were intense, but the defense held and goalkeeper Nicole Butz made the save of the season in the final minute of the game to seal the victory.

“This really was a great team effort. Everyone left it all on the field. The girls really wanted this game and it was something that they have prepared for years for. Everyone did their part. I am very proud of this team. They never quit and fight to the end,” stated coach Luke Piwoni. “All levels played great, but I cannot say enough about how the defense came together to keep Catholic Memorial out of the goal at the end of the game. They faced a lot of pressure all game and they just kept battling. They were awesome today.”

Kewaskum finished the regular season in second place in the East Central Conference with a 6-1 record and is currently 15-2 overall. This is the highest finish in conference ever for Kewaskum girls soccer and the highest win percentage in school history. This really has been a season of firsts for the Lady Indians and they look to continue making school history on Thursday in their Sectional Semi-Final game against Shorewood.

Kewaskum Closes Out the Regular Season Strong

The Kewaskum girls soccer team wrapped up the final two weeks of the regular season with all victories. It was a busy two weeks and the Indians secured second place in the East Central Conference.


Alec Cappozzo, Mason Droese and Brzozowski each collected one hit to lead Kewaskum.

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM ORDINANCE NO. 21-02

ORDINANCE TO AMEND

Ordinances 7740

58-78(b) OF CHAPTER 58 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE MAINTENANCE OF PROPERTY

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Sections 58-78(b) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Maintenance of Property, should be amended as follows:

(b) *Notice; time for compliance.* Whenever it shall appear to the designee of the village administrator that any lot, tract or parcel of land within the village is in such condition due to overgrowth of grass, saplings, underbrush and weeds in excess of the criteria listed in this section, he shall give notice to such person who appears to be the owner of such property, according to the records of

the village, at the address specified on such records. Such notice shall be given by certified mail with return receipt requested, to the effect that the lot, tract or parcel of land belonging to such person presents a condition the continuation of which is contrary to the public health, safety or welfare of the inhabitants of the village, and that unless the condition is remedied within five days from the date of the notice, the village will undertake to correct the conditions by whatever means may be necessary and will charge the expense thereof against such owner. If any subsequent violation occurs within an 18-month period of first violation, no further notice is required.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable,

such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.



As the laps wound down, Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh was able to close the gap slightly, but it was all Arenz at the front of the field as he cruised to his sixth career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory and second straight main event win at the Plymouth track in the caution-free event.

McMullen had to settle for second, Gerrits wound up third, Erickson placed fourth and 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Howards Grove charged up to finish fifth after starting 16th.

Polesitter Charlie Schmidt of Cedar Grove grabbed the lead at the drop of the green flag of the 25-lap Late Model A-main with 2016 PDTR Late Model champ Tim Buhler of Greenbush in tow.

After switching to the low line, Justin Schmidt went on to built up a comfortable cushion in the closing laps en route to his 14th career PDTR Late Model A-main victory by a half-lap margin.

Charlie Schmidt finished second, Buhler placed third, fifth starter Turk Letizia of Milwaukee placed fourth and sixth starter Justin Ritchie of New London rounded out the top five.

The 25-lap Grand National A-main got off to a rousing start as octogenarian polesitter Dick Hed of Plymouth dueled side by side with outside front row starter Matt Loehr for the first six laps of the race.

On lap 7, the cushion-pounding Loehr finally surged ahead of the low-riding Hed in turn four. The lone caution of the race appeared one lap later for a spin involving rookie Jacob Falk.

Loehr used a strong restart to pull away to a commanding full-straight-away lead over third starting Donny Kulow of Elkhart Lake over the final 18 laps of the race on the way to his seventh career PDTR Grand National A-main victory.

Donny Kulow came home second, two-time PDTR Grand National champion Don Sorce, Jr. of West Allis finished third after starting sixth, 2019 PDTR Grand national champ Tyler Kulow of Plymouth placed fourth after starting seventh and Hed rounded out the top five.

Polesitter Justin Bauer of Sheboygan Falls seized the lead on the opening lap of the 25-lap B Mod as third starter Jonathon Baumann of Sheboygan moved into second on lap three.

Steve Lorier went on to claim his third career PDTR B Mod A-main victory by a five-car margin over Baumann, who placed second. Bauer finished third, Rory Welch of Grafton, who started second, finished fourth and 12th starter Spencer Long of Sheboygan Falls came home fifth.

Jack Vanderboom of Dousman won the first 12-lap 360 Sprint Car B-main and Adam Miller of Plymouth claimed the victory in the second 12-lap 360 Sprint Car B-main.

The seventh PDTR program of the 2021 season, which was sponsored by Josfo Electric, drew 79 total cars, including 35 360 Sprint Cars, 18 B Mods, 15 Late Models and 11 Grand Nationals.

PDTR action is scheduled to resume on Saturday, June 19, with action in the 360 Sprint Car, Late Model, Grand National and B Mod divisions.


