Kewaskum To Hold Fireworks On July 3

The Village of Kewaskum will hold its annual fireworks display at River Hill Park on Saturday, July 3, at dusk, approximately 9:30 p.m. The rain date is Sunday, July 4.

To reserve spots to view the fireworks, spectators are allowed to lay tarps on the hill starting at 6 a.m. on Thursday, July 1.

On July 3, the band “Shut the Front Door” will perform in the large shelter on top of the hill from 6:30 p.m. until midnight.

Food and beverages will be served at the park, beginning at about 5 p.m. Hamburgers, brats,

fries and cheese fries are among the offerings. Beer and soda will be sold as well. Proceeds benefit the Kewaskum Firefighters Association.

In addition, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club will sell popcorn, ice cream, soda and water.

No carry-ins are allowed, and sparklers are prohibited.

Following the fireworks, cars parked on the west side of the Milwaukee River will be directed west on Main Street, and cars on the east side of the river will be directed to go east.

Once the River Hill Park parking lot is cleared out, cars parked in the grass lot on Prospect Street will be directed to go east on Highway 28.

Symphonic Band To Perform At Campbellsport On July 8

The Fond du Lac Symphonic Band will perform at Firemen’s Park in Campbellsport on Thursday, July 8. The evening will open with music by the Fond du Lac Senior Center SCAMP Band at 6:15 p.m. and the Symphonic Band concert will start at 7:30 p.m.

The concert will be conducted by associate conductor Jill Wagner and assistant conductor Nickole Kawleski. A native of Campbellsport and graduate of Campbellsport High School, the former Jill Knickel completed music degrees at UW-Oshkosh followed by a Masters in music education at UW-Madison.

She was the band director at Reedsville High

School for 16 years, and in June 2014 she retired after several years as band director at Theisen Middle School in Fond du Lac. A member of the Wisconsin Bandmasters Association, Jill performs on tuba with several area ensembles including Dorf Kapelle and Wisconsin Symphonic Winds.

Assistant conductor Nickole Kawleski will also be the featured instrumental soloist, performing a traditional solo for alto saxophone, Nola by Felix Arndt. A long-time band member, Kawleski serves as the Symphonic Band’s personnel man-

Heroes Of The Holyland — Ervin John Pauly

Writing a story about someone who has been dead for over 40 years can prove to be a difficult task. Doing so for someone who rarely talked about his experiences because he was a POW during WWII compounds those difficulties even more.

Much of Erv Pauly's story was put together from fragmented snippets from nieces and nephews which didn't always make a lot of sense by themselves. Old newspaper articles and historical documents filled in some details. Stories told by daughters Linda Underwood and Ellen Gross helped fill in more blanks, and chats with former employee, Elmer Thome and nephews Arlyn Julka and Ernie Sippel helped tie things together. In spite of these resources, pieces of the puzzle are still missing and much of Erv's story remains a mystery.

To meet Erv Pauly on the street, one would never have suspected that he had been a POW in Germany during World War II. He had a beautiful wife. He had a loving family. He was active in the church. He loved to play cards, golfed and bowled regularly.

He owned and operated his own construction company and over the years he employed many of his neighbors, family and friends. On the surface, he was as normal as anyone. Beneath that precious exterior was also the fragile soul of a man who sheltered his innermost feelings and rarely exposed the traumatic affects of having survived 300 plus days of incarceration in a German Stalag.

Ervin John Pauly was born in St. Cloud, Wisconsin, on October 16, 1918, to John Anton (Tony) and Mary (Lefebvre) Pauly, the fifth of eight children. Siblings Polly Sippel, Delia Lauby, Antonia Sippel and Mike Pauly were older and Tina Burg, Sonny Pauly and Marina Voelker were younger. He was raised on the family farm, just west of the village, attended the local Catholic School and learned from a young age the importance of hard work. Farm chores were a daily routine. While farming was the main source

of income, carpentry was also a family profession. His father and uncles were noted for their woodworking skills.


In spite of all the hard work, there was still time for hunting and fishing. It was pointed out that Erv was quite the marksman with a rifle. When Sonny bragged about his older brother's skills, saying, "Erv could shoot a penny out from between your fingers at 25 yards," they didn't believe him and had to have proof. One of Sonny's friends held the penny, and though he may have lost a bit of skin from his fingers, the penny was shot out from between them.

On June 9th, 1941, Erv joined the U.S. Army. He spent the first several years of that time in California, where he served in both Carlsbad, California, and Lindbergh Air Port (San Diego International Air Port). The beginning of World War II meant increased security and guard details were expanded to secure our railways and airports. A letter from him tells a story of him being on guard duty while President Franklin Delano Roosevelt paraded with Mexican President Manuel Avila Camacho from San Juan Capistrano to San Diego. Pfc Ervin J Pauly was proud to say, "I can say now the President of the United States saluted me."

In April of 1944, Sgt Ervin Pauly was shipped overseas. One report says he served as a mortar gunner with the 1st Division of the 1st Army in the Battle of Cherbourg, one of many battles during the Battle of Normandy, which took place between June 6, 1944, and June 30, 1944. A let-

ter sent home to his parents June 29th tells of Erv's home having been a foxhole for the last couple of weeks.

Around this same time, Erv's sister Antonia had a dream that he had been captured by the Germans. She told her brother Sonny about it on Saturday and on Monday, July 4th, an officer showed up at the Pauly farm to inform Tony and Mary that Erv was reported missing from the 315th Infantry of the 79th Division near Cherbourg, France. Though the Battle was considered an Allied victory, there were many casualties and Erv was one of them.

Erv had been captured, escaped almost immediately, and was recaptured. He and fellow POWs were put in the basement of a building which the Germans then set on fire. They escaped again by scraping away mortar and opening a crack in the wall. They stole dresses off of a clothes line to disguise themselves. Unfortunately,

the dresses didn't fit well and they were captured once more.

From there they were placed on a train and spent days, perhaps weeks or more, in packed boxcars bouncing across Germany. They were treated worse than animals. A couple loaves of bread for an entire boxcar served as their meal for the day. The injured were not treated and men died along the way. It was not until November 10th that Tony and Mary Pauly received a letter from their son, informing them that he was a POW. In January 1945, they received two additional letters dated October 3rd and November 17th of 1944. Though they didn't know where he was, at least they knew he was alive.

Eventually Erv ended up in Stalag IVB, a Concentration Camp located about 100 miles south of Berlin, 30 miles north of Dresden, and about five miles northeast of the town of Muhlberg. Stalag IVB was the largest

POW Camp in Germany with as many as 30,000 detainees being held there at any one time, Russian, Greek, British, American, to name a few. In all, soldiers from 33 nations passed through Stalag IVB. Conditions there were abhorrent. Perhaps as many as half of the POWs starved to death. Often there was nothing to drink but one's own urine. Some stories recount prisoners eating potato peels or potato soup with maggots in it. Food was sparse and the way they were treated was despicable.

Erv was of German descent and grew up speaking German. That proved to be a double edged sword for him. While it quite possibly afforded him some advantage with the guards, he became a person of suspicion amongst the prisoners. They avoided him because they thought he was a German spy. At some point, Erv overheard a conversation amongst fellow POWs. One of them mentioned that he was from St. Peter, Wisconsin. Erv confided that he was from St. Cloud and was dating a girl from Johnsburg. Finally he had someone he could confide in.

In April of 1945, the Russian front was nearing Berlin. Germans evacuated and were headed west to get ahead of the Russian shelling. By April 23rd, the Russians took over control of Stalag IVB. While the Russians released some POWs, they detained any American and British POWs that were still at the Camp until September 1945.

On May 2, 1945, the Army newspaper, The Stars and

Stripes reported from Stendal on the Elbe of the liberation of Sgt. Pauly and 10 other prisoners in the small town of "Koster Lennin" (Kloster Lehnin), west of Berlin. A later story by the Stars and Stripes corrects the notion that they were released. It states that Erv and three other men, Corp Tony Hinkka of Minnesota, Sgt Matthew Allan from Ohio and T/4 John T. Thompson had escaped.

Erv's mother Mary, being a devout Catholic, prayed the rosary daily for Erv's safe return. One night she was tired and only prayed three of the five decades of the rosary. She awoke to what appeared to her to be an Angel's wing over her. She got up and prayed the remaining two decades of the rosary. It was the same night that Erv escaped. At some point during his incarceration, Erv received a rosary, a gift from a French Priest, perhaps another gift of his Catholic faith that helped him through his ordeal.

Erv related that in April of 1945 he convinced a new guard that he was a German and that the POWs had stolen his clothes. When he let his guard down, Erv knocked him out and Erv and three others made their escape. They got into a bakery and had their first taste of good food in almost a year. One escapee ate as many as 20 donuts and got very sick as a result of his overindulgence.

When they reached the Elbe River, they spotted the American flag on a church steeple, which Erv described as the most wonderful thing they had ever seen. However as they neared the Elbe, they encountered friendly fire and had to raise a white flag before they were finally safe.

At some point, they must have joined up with six other POWs. Erv's first letter to his parents says, "Got back to our lines April 25, the boys couldn't do enough for us. There were 10 of us who made the break and got back safely. I am still in Germany at an American Red Cross field club waiting transportation to France by plane. From there we should be on our way back to the States."

Before allowing Erv to return to the States, he was sent to a rehabilitation hospital in France. Neither the details of his injuries, nor the length of his stay at the rehabilitation hospital are known. However it should be noted that he weighed 97 pounds.

Upon arriving home, Erv was met

by Tony and Mary Pauly. Along with them was Millie Julka. Erv was described by Tony as a very happy young man when he saw Millie there to greet him and it didn't take long for Erv to rekindle his relationship with her. On July 12, 1945, Ervin John Pauly and Mildred Mary Julka were married.

Erv had begun a carpentry apprenticeship working for Hutter Construction. Their first home was a trailer which they lived in while Erv worked on a job in St. Nazianz. They later moved the trailer and parked it on the Bill and Delia Lauby farm west of Johnsburg. For a time, Erv and Mildred lived in Marshfield while he worked on the Marshfield Clinic.

In just a matter of a few years, they added daughter Judy Flasch to the family, built a house in Peebles, and Erv started his own business, specializing in home construction. Mildred was caring for their growing family and tending to the bookkeeping. They lived in Peebles from then on, adding children Linda, Doug and Ellen to the family. Quite ironically, also in Peebles, lived Norbert Schneider, the POW who had befriended Erv in Stalag IVB.

Daughters Linda and Ellen fondly remember Erv as a hard working father, who rarely took time off, though he did take in an occasional Braves game, rarely missed a Sunday afternoon ballgame in St. Peter and was an avid bowler. After supper at the Pauly house, the kitchen became his office. The table was cleared, plans were drawn up, Erv worked on estimates and met with clients.

Ellen remembers little things like trips to Silica Hardware with Erv or him making a house out of Popsicle sticks to help show a customer what the house would look like. That large A-Frame home with huge win-

dows was built high on the ledge above Peebles and overlooks Lake Winnebago. Linda remembers him as being respected in the community and that he treated everyone with respect. He never had a bad thing to say about anyone. Nor did he talk about his experiences in Stalag IVB at home, and he would leave the living room when graphic images from Vietnam would air on TV. And he never kept a gun of any sort in the house.

Through the years, many young men got their starts in the construction trade working for Erv, including many who went on to become contractors on their own: Roland Steffes, Elmer Thome, Ken Sabel, Bill Nett, Mike Wirtz and probably more. His brother Sonny and many nephews worked for him.

Erv had a reputation for excellence, and demanded it from his workers. It was okay to do good work. It was not okay to say something was "good enough." His employees remember Erv as a fair man who was willing to teach them along the way. And he enjoyed having a good time.

On one particular occasion, at the end of the week, when the work was done, Erv sent someone for a case of beer while the rest of the crew was cleaning the jobsite. During this particular discussion, the topic of the Vietnam War came up. Someone suggested we shouldn't be there. Erv said, "Just be glad we're not fighting here."

While attending a wedding celebration in June of 1977, Erv told a group, which included his sister Tina and brother Sonny, about his experiences in prison camp. "A typical meal consisted of a cup of lentil

soup once a day. The soup was thin and usually had bugs and spiders in it. At first we took them out before eating. But it didn't take long to realize that there was protein in them, so we ate them too."

A piece of bread and a thin slice of sausage was a once a week treat when it was available. Erv spoke of his disdain for the Germans. "The way they treated us, no man deserves to be treated." He was ashamed of his German heritage. He would rather tell people he was Polish than admit that he was German. His sister Tina said that until that night she never heard Erv talk about his experiences as a POW.

Just a few weeks later, July the 3rd, the Tony and Mary Pauly family held a family reunion at Riverside Sportsman Club in St. Cloud. When the party was ending, pictures were being taken and some resisted getting in them. Erv reminded everyone that we might not all be here the next time.

The next day, July 4, 1977, a hot day by any standards, Ervin J. Pauly died on the golf course. His 14-year-old son Doug was at his side, along with Tony May and his son. Erv is buried in St. Peter Catholic cemetery. Millie is buried at his side.

At the time of his death, Erv was a member of Abler/Engel American Legion Post 454 Mt. Calvary. Additionally he was a charter member of Harvey Blonigen Post 478 St. Cloud.

Though Erv was awarded the Purple Heart, he never disclosed the true extent of his injuries. Attempts to find any of his service records and awards have been unsuccessful. Most Wisconsin military service records from that time period were destroyed in a fire in St. Louis in 1973. Since the onset of COVID-19, private research groups are not allowed access to what remains of those records.

She had been contacted in the fall about creating something and got to work right away on the concept. Sarah jotted down anything that felt patriotic to her and then put it all together.

"I started on my iPad," Sarah said. "I tried to do it as American as I could. I tried to touch every subject."

The focal points of the wall are a large eagle with its wings spread, the Statue of Liberty and an American flag. She then added the POW logo, an outline of the state of Wisconsin with the Iwo Jima statue silhouette inside it, fireworks and stars.

"Getting the proportions right was the hardest part," Sarah said.

This is a long retaining wall that runs along the driveway on the Highway W side of the station. It is very long and was a little daunting at first, but Sarah tackled it with gusto.

She started with her focal points. One part of her vision did change once she started the work. Originally, she was going to include the Declaration of Independence along the wall.

Once she started writing the opening words of the declaration, she realized just how hard this was going to be to complete. Writing large enough for people from afar to read can be a difficult task.

So instead she chose to stick with those first few words from the Declaration that everyone remembers — "We The People..." They are written right above one of the wings of the bald eagle.

She then added some fireworks to the wall. Originally, this was mainly going to be around the Statue of Liberty and maybe a little further.

But, with the size of the wall, she decided to keep adding the fireworks past the main parts of the wall. It gives it a colorful and fun touch. The final portion are white stars stenciled along the sides of the black wall. Sarah decided this would be a perfect finishing piece to the wall, but it was something new to her.

She is an artist, so she usually freehands everything she creates. She decided to use a stencil for all of the stars that were added with white spray paint.

"I don't do stencils, so that was very tricky for me," Sarah said.

Plus, she had the added headache of painting a mural outside in the elements. Some of the days she was painting the stars were a bit windy, so the stencils were blowing around a bit as she was trying to use them. But, she kept working and didn't let anything get in her way.

"When I'm doing it, I'm focused on it," she said about her art.

She had good weather for the bulk of the job. With such a nice spring, she had warm weather and not a lot of rain on the days she was painting.

"I was waiting for the nice weather to get started on it," she said. Though she had been planning it since the fall.

It took her about a month to create the mural. During that time, she received a lot of compliments from people driving up to the gas station. They would stop to talk with her about the mural as they were going by.

"At least 15-16 times a day people would talk to me," she said. "They've been saying I did a great job."

Sarah was hoping the owners of the B & B

Express would appreciate her design and the mural. This was something she worried about throughout the process, but the owners loved what she did.

"I was so worried and she (Angie) was great," Sarah said. "She was so patient through the whole thing."

Now that the mural is done, Sarah is very proud of it and ready to tackle her next creation. Now Sarah is trying to dedicate more of her time to her art work and make it her full-time job.

Tackling another large wall like this is also something she would look forward to and she has thought about reaching out to some people to offer her services. She is also very happy with the theme and the way it turned out.

"I would do another American theme again!" Sarah said.

Kewaskum's Pool Committee will meet July 12 to discuss options for replacing the swim pond at Kiwanis Park. The committee was formed after the Kewaskum Village Board became concerned with dropping attendance at the pool last summer. Over the last three months, the committee has waded through various options presented by Burbach Aquatics, an architect and engineering firm specializing in aquatic design. There are plans with costs of \$291,000, \$608,000, and \$2 million.

Loduha is training to be a wheeled vehicle mechanic at the 377th Support Maintenance Company in Manitowoc. Martin will serve as a human resources specialist.

Elevate is excited to announce the first Washington County Heroin Task Force Benefit Concert. The event is scheduled for July 9. The task force was launched in February 2014 in response to the growing problem of prescription pain medication and heroin abuse in Washington County.

The Sky Ranch Flyers held its 24th Annual Radio Control Air Show for the Kewaskum/West Bend area on June 25. Throughout the day, more than 600 visitors stopped by Sky Ranch Flyers on Highway D. From World War I biplanes to the latest foam airplanes, all types of planes were present at the show.

The paramedics who arrived in the chopper explained to summer school students in the Junior Police Academy class what the Flight For Life does. The class included lessons about radio communications, traffic stop procedures, OWI enforcement, defense and arrest tactics, handcuffing techniques and crime scene investigations.

The 11-3 victory by the Kewaskum Indians baseball team over SWCHSA was a milestone for coach Doug Gonring. The victory was the 400th in his coaching career. His 300th career victory came in 2011.

July 6, 2006

Michael Krumm has begun his position as superintendent of Kewaskum schools. He started July 5. Already Krumm is brainstorming ideas on improving the school system and working with other governmental bodies in the district to work together as a team. Krumm was previously in the Ballard Community Schools in Huxley, Iowa, where he oversaw the school district serve over 7,000 residents. He will receive an annual salary of \$107,000 and has signed a two-year contract with an automatic two-year rollover.

Scoring a season-high 22 runs, 12 in the first inning, Kewaskum clinched the Eastern Wisconsin Conference baseball title with a 22-1 decision over Two Rivers. The Indians have won 17 games in a

row, including 15 of them in the EWC. Overall, Kewaskum's record is 19-1.

Two other members had been excused and there was already an open seat due to the resignation of a member awhile back when she moved out of the village's limits. A special meeting of the commission has been scheduled for July 11, according to Village President Mathew Heiser.

The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce's area information kiosk along the Eisenbahn Recreational Trail is well on its way to completion. Randy Dreher, Logan Dreher, and Kyle Bowe of RD Builders cleared the area and set the posts a few weeks ago. Dave Martin and crew of Kewaskum Concrete poured the concrete pad and approaches. Tim Heberer and crew will be constructing the building sometime this month. To finish, the Chamber will be placing benches and a display board.

Nearly 500 students are enrolled in the 2006 Kewaskum School District's summer school program, an increase of 25 percent over last year. This is the fourth year of the program. Thousands of people lined the Milwaukee River to see Kewaskum Fireworks on July 3. The event was put on by the Kewaskum Fire Department. Funding of the fireworks is mostly through donations.

The Kewaskum Warhawks Midget Major baseball team participated in the tournament June 10 and 11 in Random Lake. The team placed first with scores of 15-2 over Belgium Blue, 8-3 over Port Washington, and a 5-3 extra-inning victory over Belgium Orange in the championship game.

A 9-8 loss to New Holstein ended the winning streak of the Kewaskum Indians at 15.





About The Fair

The Fond du Lac County Fair will celebrate its 170th fair in 2021.

The first county fair, held in Rosendale, began with an address at half past one on the first day, September 29, 1852. The event was held for two days.

Dairy cattle, fine wool, tools and manufactured items were exhibited at the first fair. Household arts and garden vegetables were on display to be judged.

The best stallion received a \$4 premium. Working oxen and steers were awarded \$3 for being the best in the class. The best sample of butter, not less than 50 pounds, was awarded \$5. The best sample of sugar, also not less than 50 pounds, was given a \$4 premium.


Country star Chris Janson will take the stage at 8 p.m. on Saturday, July 17.





The youth exhibitors will work with the youth before the show to show them how to handle the pig and will be with them during the show.

All participants will meet at the Livestock Barn at 3:30 p.m. They will meet their mentors and spend time learning how to show a pig. At 5 p.m. they will break for dinner and then have a group photo taken at 6 p.m.

The show will start at 6:30 p.m. in the Cow Palace. The ring inside the building is surrounded by a fence to contain the pigs and keep them near the judge. There are bleachers surrounding the show ring for spectators to view.

The judge will assess how the mentors, participants and pig work together as a cohesive unit.

There is no cost to participate, however they wanted participants pre-registered by July 1. It is limited to the first 20 registered participants.

The mission for this show is to provide an inclusive opportunity for all youth to work together and share the experience of working and showing livestock in a competitive and friendly environment.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776

The Unanimous Declaration Of The Thirteen United States Of America

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

He has obstructed the Administration of Justice by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.

He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock Trial from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us in many cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury:

For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies

For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:

For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these united Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States, that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. — And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

The coaches expressed appreciation they received throughout the season to all the parents, especially to Jody Dricken-Kappler for all the photos, and to the community members who helped to make this season a success and supported the program all year. Thanks also go to the assistant coaches, Derrek Brock (hurdles), Katie Jungers (throws), Tristan Marx (pole vault) and Romela Olla (distance), who made Coach Jason Last's and Coach Eugene Peterson's lives easier.

"Most of all thank you to the students for giving us the opportunity to help cultivate your talents and helping to deliver us a first and fourth in Conference, dual wins in Regionals, and a second and fourth in Sectionals. We are amazed at your hard work and dedication. To the seniors, thank you for showing the ropes to your younger teammates, your dedication and hard work over the last four years will have a lasting impression on the growth of this program moving

forward," Last and Peterson said.

The coaches also offered kudos to the 26 athletes who represented Kewaskum High School both athletically and professionally at the state meet in La Crosse on Friday, June 25.

The girls 4x800 relay of Alyssa Butz, Miranda Bastian, Avalon Olla, Abigail Gerhartz, Hannah Frase and Brielle Scoles (16th place) ran the fourth fastest time in school history and will return three members in 2022 (Butz is the lone senior of the group).

The boys 4x800 relay of Isaac Schmidt, Gannon Kreuser, Clayton Kappler, Isaiah Lubner, Bruce Penfield and Justin Toth (not able to attend) placed third and set the school record for a third time this season with a nearly eight-second PR (8:12.03), with two members graduating (Kappler and Kreuser), but others vying for a spot to return hungry and make some noise.

Natalie Newman was 15th in the 100-meter dash in a stacked field (13.26). Madilyn Dogs made finals and placed ninth in a PR of 16.36 in the 100-meter hurdles. Ben "GFT" Poschmann took 13th in

the 200, with 23.35 in a very fast field. Abigail Gerhartz took 14th in the 1600-meter run with a time of 5:28.33, to finish out a year in which she was also all-state in cross country.

The girls 4x200 relay of Julia Steger, Brenna Meidl, Madilyn Dogs, Natalie Newman, Bella Hooker and Josey Curtes placed fifth in a new PR 1:46.23 out of lane one (ninth seed) and will return all four runners plus the two alternates in 2021. The boys 4x200 relay of Kyle Reichert, Braden Gruen, Benjamin Butler, Max Melzer and Andrew Bolek will return five of six athletes from their pool (Poschmann will return to home in Germany) and placed 16th 1:35.31. The boys 4x100 relay of Max Melzer, Carson Rolf, Benjamin Butler, Ben Poschmann, Andrew Bolek and Kyle Reichert placed 11th with a time of 45.05 and will return five of six athletes from their pool (Poschmann will return home to Germany).

Damareyon Taylor ran another phenomenal PR of 42.31 in the 300-meter hurdles with a 12th-place finish and will return as a se-

nior in 2022 to pursue his podium spot. Isaiah Lubner, in addition to his two relays, placed fifth in the 800-meter run out of the first heat with a time of 1:58.39, a five-second PR after anchoring the 4x800 with a 1:55.79 split. Alyssa Butz (4x800) rounded out an outstanding running career with her fourth state meet (three cross country and one track and field) by placing 12th (16th seed) in the 3200 with a time 12:44.32.

Brenna Meidl (4x200, 4x400) took 10th in the triple jump with a 35'1.5" in her second State Track Meet. The 4x400 girls team of Josey Curtes, Julia Steger, Madilyn Dogs, Brenna Meidl, Hannah Frase and Miranda Bastian wrapped up the meet with a sixth place (Girls 4:09.11 PR), and the boys team of Isaac Schmidt, Gannon Kreuser, Max Melzer, Isaiah Lubner, Damareyon Taylor and Carson Rolf took 10th place (3:32.19) with 11 of 12 athletes from the relay pool returning for 2022 (Kreuser is a senior).

"Great job to all athletes at the State Meet! And great job this year to all athletes!" Last exclaimed.

#13 — The Campbellsport boys baseball team upset number one seed Waupun on the road. The Cougars would lose a heartbreaker to Kewaskum in the Regional championship game.

#12 — The CHS boys soccer team won the

first regional championship in school history. The Cougars won in exciting fashion as they defeated Columbus/Poynette 5-4 in a penalty kick shootout.

#11 — CHS junior Joey Nerat signs a Division 1 scholarship for baseball with Dallas Baptist University, a team that almost qualified for the College World Series this year. Nerat was a first team all-conference selection in football, basketball, and baseball this year.

#10 — The CHS girls volleyball team won the WIAA Regional championship. The Cougars would fall to Springs in the Sectional semi-finals.

#9 — The CHS girls dance team had a limited season with the COVID-19 restrictions but were still able to bring home a second place finish from state in the Hip-Hop division and a seventh place in Poms.

#8 — The CHS boys bowling team had a very successful season on the lanes, qualifying for the state tournament. Kyle Murphy was also an individual state qualifier for the Cougars.

#7 — Four Campbellsport Cougar track members qualified for the WIAA State Meet. Kendra Hewitt (pole vault 11'6"), Aubree Koenigs (discus 108'2"), and Joe Gardner (long jump 20'1") were sectional champions. Santana Ryan qualified in the 400 meter dash with her third place

finish. At the state meet, Hewitt brought home a sixth place medal and Gardner made the podium with an eighth place finish.

#6 — The CHS girls softball team brought home another Regional title as they whipped Mayville 11-1 at Columbus Parc.

#5 — Amber Thompson finished in eighth place at the State Bowling tournament. This is the highest finish for a CHS girls bowler in 14 years.

#4 — Kendra Hewitt wins the conference and regional pole vault titles and then soars to a school record of 11'6" to win the sectional crown.

#3 — Two wrestlers place at the State Wrestling Tournament. Junior Drake Muellenbach made his third appearance at state and brought home a fifth place medal. Sophomore Ostin Blanchard also found the podium placing sixth.

#2 — The CHS girls softball team beat Waupun 3-2 in the last game of the regular season to capture the ECC championship. This is the first conference title for softball since 2007.

#1 — The boys cross country team ran an incredible race on their home turf to capture the ECC championship. This is the first conference title for them in 20 years.
