Doug Gonring Resigns From Kewaskum School Board

There is an opening on the Kewaskum School Board after Doug Gonring stepped down from the position.

Gonring turned in a letter of resigned on Wednesday, June 30. He cited personal reasons for leaving the position.

"Doug has been a great board member and I'm sad to see him go. I always appreciated his contributions to the board and really enjoyed working with him," said Dr. Mark Bazata, administrator for the Kewaskum School District.

Gonring was elected to a three-year term on the board in April 2019. His term ends in April 2022.

The Kewaskum School Board is holding a special meeting on Thursday, July 8, when the board is expected to discuss the opening, as well as the budget.

The board could decide to leave the seat vacant until the 2022 election or to appoint someone to fill the position in the interim.

"Typically, in the past, we've had a period of

Sarge Marking Left A Legacy At Campbellsport High School



Gerald "Sarge" Marking left quite a legacy at Campbellsport High School. The beloved wrestling coach died on June 24th, but no one will ever forget the mark he has left on this community.

Sarge began his career at Campbellsport High School in 1963 when he became the industrial technology teacher. His legacy began in 1966 when Sarge founded the wrestling program in Campbellsport.

Marking was the head coach for CHS wrestling for 29 years — 1966-1995. During these years, the program was one of the best in the state. The Cougars record under Sarge was 305-30-1.

The team won numerous conference, regional

Like Christmas In July

In the late 1980s and early 1990s, there was a Christmas in July. It fell on the third Sunday of that month. There are no words to describe the St. Kilian Picnics of old, other than the summer equivalent to a child's anticipation for Christmas. Here is a look back on some of the personal experiences of this defining summer event.

Anticipation in Preparation

After July 4th, the church picnic in southern Ashford Township took focus. Thirty years ago, the parish still used tents for the annual fundraiser. Someone with a big truck was needed to pick up the poles and canvas, and that was my father (Jim McCarty).

At least once, I had the excitement of riding the old big farm truck (used often in fall for corn and grain) to travel over to Port Washington. The vehicle was aged, and a little jittery, so we took the back roads of Farmington or Saukville to get to the J.J. Schowalter Company, a carnival supply outfit that provided all the prizes for the games, and the games themselves.

Something tells me I was more of an annoyance to dad while riding along, and I didn't get to go many times. When a father has to pick up the prizes for a church picnic, rest assured his children will annoy him to see the potential winning toys.

The excitement just started with the J.J. Schowalter visit. During the same run up before the picnic, a child must establish a stockpile of money which can be spent for the main event.

There are two things certain in July, one is the St. Kilian Picnic, and the other is that burdocks begin to seed as their burs turn a purple hue. It's time to kill those unwanted

plants. This was a way to earn money before the picnic.

I was offered 10 cents for every burdock trimmed out of the fields. It is amazing how many burdocks one can find on a farm when the incentive is a dime per weed snipped. This didn't happen too many summers, either because there was so many burdocks or my addition on the amount of killed burdocks seemed inflated to dad.

The highlight of suspense was that Saturday before the picnic. This included men setting up the tents, women preparing the food in the kitchen, and others getting the games positioned for Sunday. Almost out of nowhere, at least three or four dozen people came from Wayne and Ashford townships and the surrounding area.

It was like clockwork. There were no written rules, but sometime between 8:30 and 9 o'clock, my dad and brothers would be done with chores and head to St. Kilian. And so too would other farmers and parishioners, as they coalesced around the annual event.

The old St. Kilian Parochial School doors, closed for teaching since the early 1970s, were now open just as they were during the prime of the parish. Dozens of helpers went into the school to bring out equipment like saw bucks, chairs and parking signs. Some brought their trailers; others brought their trucks. By the time 11 a.m. rolled around on Saturday, the picnic was coming into shape for the next day. However, it seemed it was the longest morning ever the Sunday of the picnic. But around noon, the games opened up. Finally!

Candy Board

One of my favorite memories of the picnic revolved around the "candy board," or what my brothers and

Then hang around for a burger or brat and some fries. In addition, there will be plenty of games for children to play. Of course, there will be good music in the background, and raffle tickets will be available.

I called the "sucker game." Dozens of Dum Dums lined a hard backing of what might have been cardboard. It was run by Sandi Amerling and Eunice Beitsch (1931-2003).

Somewhere by age six, I had recognized that the best way to win was the four corners. I think one of the two women was generous to tell me so after a string of bad luck on Dum

Dums with no marked ends. When you did pick the right sucker, Eunice or Sandi would take the end of the sucker and snip off the marked end.

What a game: you won a sucker, and a prize on the table that was way bigger than the candy. No game is better to play for a young child than one that just requires money and enough chances (a quarter a sucker in those days). And the prizes always seemed a little bigger and better at the "sucker game."

Another lesson of the picnic, and what is special for children of the St. Kilian Picnic, is the generosity of parish adults when begged for money. Somewhere I figured out there is

At the St. Kilian Picnic, parishioners would become synonymous with a work station, as many worked the same spot for decades. An example would be Leander Weiland (1918-2005), pictured here around the early 1990s.

All the games at the picnic had a chairperson. By the time one pushed 10, they graduated from playing games to working games. Leander Weiland was the chair of ball bingo until I was put in charge. It's a fun game of mini hard baseballs that, thrown from a few feet back, must be five-aligned for one bingo. You can double bingo, but there are only 10 balls that can be used and to get two bingo correlates with a miracle.

What I recall is the ten or so years



I worked with Leander. Even as he pushed 80, and possibly older, he was helping me with the games.

There was some caution on whether

he should be working, as it wasn't easy for him. This was because Leander's left arm was a story in itself. His elbow was shattered in the Battle of the Bulge around New Year's 1945. That same arm also held the wrist which broke during an incident climbing the silo on his farm northeast of St. Kilian. Most importantly when it comes to ball bingo, his grip left something to be desired. This is because one time in the barn while feeding the cows with the silage cart, he either tripped or the cart tipped, and it ended in disaster while riding out his footing. Leander, being tall like many of the other Weiland men in his family, had the height to brace himself by using the ceiling. Unfortunately for his left

hand, some of those fingers went into a barn fan braced near the barn beams. This left his ability to grasp items weaker when compared to other's normal functioning of the arm.

Leander never told me about the ailments in the barn; and he only talked about his war injuries when I asked, which was seldom. Looking back it was a privilege to have such great neighbors and parishioners like Leander modeling to younger people of the parish. When it came to the St. Kilian Picnic, I recall how much he wanted to work. His job was a combination of service, faith and community.

no better time to ask your parents for money than a church fundraiser. In addition, giving your child money also gets them out of your hair for a while, as they safely trounce the grounds with about a dozen games.

Unfortunately, when I must have been five to seven, I ran out of cash. So, after meandering the beer pavilion, I saw my dad working or talking at the bar with the Melzers. "Can I have some money?" Dad gave me a five. For currency value, understand that five was worth 50 burducks, but way easier to get on the day of the picnic.

So I took that loot to the candy board and Eunice. "Are you sure you want to use all five dollars?" she asked. "Yes," I said to her legitimate question which basically went over my head. Twenty chances — and suckers — came my way. I don't remember what I won. I just remember how Eunice was kindly attempting to hint that my father wouldn't want me to spend all five bucks at once. I then went by dad to ask for more money. Dad was not impressed.

BINGO!

Going back to a 1990s St. Kilian Picnic, it's hard not to remember the dynamic duo working BINGO. Neal Straub (1924-2015) would be calling bingo after 1 pm, as his loyal wife Lyra (1929-2014) sat next to him. For some reason, I recall hecklers (losers at previous games) yelling "Shake 'em up! Neal." Some in the crowd were laughing; Neal probably had a wry grin as he called the numbers over what was likely a 1970s microphone.

In that vicinity are other odd details that still stick in the mind for some reason. There were hard 1970s chairs that were stored up in the school that Neal and Lyra always sat on. They were nicely padded, yet firmly braced with metal. I always felt they had the best seats for the picnic, but a good bingo caller deserves a good seat.

If Neal needed a break, Lyra would call. There was always plenty of hardshell corn to use for your bingo chips, and many parish women (Lizzy Weiland, Sally Schrauth, Julie Darmody and Bonnie Hare (1949-2012) among many others) working to ensure you could get a new card to

mix things up.

Time Capsule On A Community

The best memories of the St. Kilian Picnic are the overarching memories of years bleeding into each other, and how so many different members of the community, and parish, had the same roles annually at each picnic.

More than one person told me how they remember Kevin and Steve Hein carrying the chicken (cooked outside) after it had been cut in half down to the kitchen. How could you forget that chicken? It was 300 cut in half.

Six hundred people came to a country hillside for awesome poultry! And they were likely getting their tickets for that dinner from Eileen Flasch. The records of the old work-designation sheets, show Grace Boegel (1929-2017) and Bernice Fleischman (1921-2013) would also be in the kitchen with tickets on other years. These were examples of distinguished women who were shaped by the parish, still helping in their later years.

I recall families using the picnic almost as a reunion, like that of Audrey Ruplinger's. Then there were all the game stations, some of which became synonymous with

those running it like Ray Gutjahr at Chuck-A-Luck (dice), Ray Ruplinger at Over-And-Under and Leander Weiland at Ball Bingo.

There were dozens of others making the food possible outside. And it wasn't just food. It was awesome hamburgers. Joe and Evie Flasch and Gary Weiland would be at the hamburger stand, and I can still remember Tim Bong (1957-2019) telling me the fries were almost done. The wait was always worth it — those fries are way better than McDonald's. Meanwhile, Richard Amerling was in charge of chairing the entire picnic for decades.

These were just some of the many people who helped with the picnic. There were some who talked to me for this story, and they mentioned many of the names mentioned here. They also pointed out the amazing organization and annual repetitive roles for the workers was what made the feat of putting on the St. Kilian Picnic so successful.

They also felt guilty picking out any one person for that success when it came to the team effort of a parish coming together. For my omission of names, or biased child perspective, I apologize. I do hope for those of the parish, that they reflect on who they admired or enjoyed best

at the picnic.

In looking back, the picnic was like Christmas in July because, like Christmas, presents, gifts and toys are nice. But when you get older, you realize it was the comradery, love and kindness that others shared with you that made the holiday season meaningful.

Perhaps it was the older people who enjoyed the picnic way more than the children at the fish pond. Really, the St. Kilian Picnic was about the parish coming together. It's hard not to smile when older people come from West Bend or Kewaskum to talk about the old days at St. Kilian on their lawn chairs.

I remember in my early years I did not understand why a couple of people would walk the cemetery and visit graves before they left the picnic. When young, a child doesn't understand how appropriate that is. But decades have passed, and so too many influential people in that parish. It is now so much easier to appreciate the role of honor that's in that cemetery.

Hopefully you will come to the picnic to remember the friends, neighbors and family that shaped the area.

If you would like a return receipt mailed to you, please enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope with your payment. Make sure that your mail receives a U.S. postmark on or before July 31st.

- Pay in person by check, cash or money or

der at the County Treasurer's Office, 432 E. Washington St., West Bend. Treasurer's office is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Extended hours until 6 p.m. on July 12, 19 and 26.

- Pay by credit card using Point & Pay online at <https://client.pointandpay.net/web/WashingtonCountyTreasurerWI>. Taxpayers should be aware that an additional charge will be added by Point & Pay for those who use a credit card. The fee is less for those who pay by e-check through Point & Pay.

It is important that property owners meet the July 31st deadline. If you miss the deadline, the balance on your account will be considered delinquent and subject to interest and penalty of

1.5 percent per month retroactive to February 1st (10.5 percent).



time for interested people to submit a letter of interest. The board took a look at those letters and then had an interview process," Bazata said.

That was the process the board followed last year when it appointed Ric Leitheiser to the board after Mark Sette moved out of the district. Likewise, the board appointed Mary Miller to fill a position on the board

after Jay Fisher moved out of the district in 1919.

If the board decides to appoint someone to the current open position, the district will release information on how to apply.

"Anybody who is interested should be on the lookout for information to be coming out on how to submit your interest for the position," Bazata said.

and sectional championships. In total under Sarge, they won 28 conference championships and 17 regional championships.

His team won the state title in 1980. Before teams were divided into divisions, the team was a runner-up at state while competing against some of the largest schools in the state.

The Cougars were 200-0 in Flyway Conference Duals. From 1971-1979, his team won 101 consecutive duals.

Along with this, his team members have countless individuals awards and accomplishments. This includes numerous trips to the state tournament. In total, eight of his wrestlers won state individual titles.

Sarge was inducted into the Wisconsin Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame in 1992. In 2013, he was part of the inaugural class of the CHS Athletic Hall of Fame.

Even more than the championships and titles, Sarge was a respected coach and friend to all of his wrestlers and their families. He left a mark on all of their lives.

Sarge also left his mark those he taught in his industrial arts classes and drivers education students. He could reach any student and instill in them a can-do attitude. Many felt he made learning fun and could motivate them to want to reach for the stars in everything they do in life.

Others just considered Sarge a friend and someone they wanted to

be a part of their life. He was nice to everyone he met.

One person who was close to Sarge and counts him as his mentor is Mark Peterson. Coach P was an assistant coach under Sarge and took over the wrestling program from him in 1996.

"Jerry built one of the greatest wrestling dynasties from scratch, and I literally mean that," Peterson said. "He was the founder of the program and had no clue about wrestling. But what he did in the next 30 years was remarkable."

"His coaching method was simple, recruit strong farm kids and kids who weren't afraid to work. Teach them to master a few wrestling moves and motivate them to be mentally tough on the mat. His recruiting was phenomenal! He got almost everyone to come out for the sport at CHS. They would get 100 kids out for wrestling every year."

"He just had that great knack of convincing kids they could be great at a one-on-one sport like wrestling. He was persistent if he thought you had ability and if you didn't believe him, he'd go convince the parents to have their children give wrestling a try."

"His teams were feared on the mat throughout his career and it was all a reflection of the man everyone called "Sarge." He was like a rock star, everywhere he went people knew him not just from wrestling but from teaching industrial arts

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORTS

Fatal Accident

Washington County suffered its third fatal accident on June 29. At approximately 8:04 a.m. that day, the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a rollover crash at the intersection of Highway 144 and Wallace Lake Road in the Town of Barton. A caller advised a box truck had struck a car, and the driver of the car was breathing, but not conscious. The caller further advised there was a child in a safety seat in the back seat of the car. Squads were dispatched to the scene along with West Bend Fire and Rescue. An off-duty sheriff's deputy came upon the accident scene and determined the driver of the car was agonal breathing and it did not appear that she had been wearing a seatbelt.

When the first on-duty deputy arrived, he assisted rescue workers with removing the driver of the car from the vehicle, and she was transported to Froedtert in Wauwatosa.

The child had been in a safety seat behind the driver, and the child was transported to Froedtert West Bend. The driver of the box truck was uninjured and was cooperative during the investigation. The Sheriff's Office Accident Reconstruction Team was called in to assist with the investigation.

The initial investigation showed the car was stopped at the stop sign on Wallace Lake Road and pulled out in front of the box truck, which was traveling north on Highway 144. The box truck struck the car on the driver's side of the vehicle. The Sheriff's Office was later notified the driver of the car died due to the injuries sustained in the crash.

Highway 144 was closed to traffic for approximately 2.5 hours to facilitate the investigation and removal of the involved vehicles. The driver of the car was a 35-year-old West Bend woman and her name is not being released.

classes, teaching people to drive through drivers education, being the athletic director, or serving on the Campbellsport School Board. There was no hurdle or obstacle that Jerry feared. He always had the best interest of the students in mind and wanted them to succeed.

"I had the chance to be his assistant wrestling coach for seven years before he told me that he wanted me to take over the program for him. Actually, he "told" Joe Bertone (superintendent at the time) that he wanted me to be his successor and that's the way it was going to be."

"It is never an easy task to take over after a legend, especially one like Sarge. He just said to me, 'Mark, keep this thing going,' and I took those words to heart. I was complete-

ly honored to take over for this man who was not only my mentor but my friend.

"When I got married, he was out on the dance floor all night! When my son was old enough, he'd take me and Parker out on his boat at Long Lake and catch bluegills."

"He was just way more than a great teacher and coach, he was one of the greatest humans you ever had the chance to meet. I will miss that great big smile. I will miss that sound in his voice when he was trying to fire up his wrestlers. And I will miss the laughter we shared, Jerry was such a funny guy."

"I could literally talk hours about this man. He touched thousands of lives in Campbellsport."

With one month of our summer learning program under our belt, we are seeing amazing results. This is not just from the reading program and minutes read, but also includes programming, circulation at the library and comments from our patrons. Being halfway through the year, I like to report on our circulation and other statistics year to date.

I compile monthly statistics which are dispersed at our board meetings. I include a comparison with previous year's numbers. With last year's pandemic, the results may not seem as relevant, but they paint a different picture of how people are using the library which is always pertinent.

Last year the library reopened to the public in June, although we had curbside service beginning in April, we have seen a huge spike in circulation this year. In the check-out of physical items, we are up over 40 percent from last year and over 30 percent in eBooks and other electronic materials.

With the pandemic and limited access to the library and our collection, electronic checkouts did increase. So, seeing a further rise when we have been open for all services with no restrictions is important to note.

When at home last year, people needed to read and adjusted themselves to downloading online content, usually through our Libby/Overdrive app. For many that were apprehensive about the technology, this has been overcome and I believe they are now enjoying the portability of their devices and

wide options of titles to read.

Even with the increase of the circulation of eBooks, it is wonderful to see that our print and other physical collections are being widely checked out, so much more than the previous year and reaching what we have circulated in prior years. Typically, the trend has been going down for many years. Perhaps with the pandemic and people missing their libraries and all we offer; this may see an upward turn.

Now, back to our summer learning program. We are about halfway through, and we have close to 200 participants with almost 70,000 minutes read. That averages out to 350 minutes a reader. With all going on this summer, it is great to see people reading an hour or more a week.

We have also started in-person programming for children including Storytime and weekly programs with the continuation of the grab & go kits for all ages. Witnessing families at these events, whether they are tie dying socks, participating in parachute play or listening to Miss Kim read a story, I can see how the library makes an impact in their lives.

Best of all are the conversations with community members and children. Once again, we have children running into the library to the back section to play with toys and find their favorite story characters to read about. Parents have thanked us for being here and providing what we have to promote literacy and lifelong learning.

Ride Responsibly

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is asking ATV and UTV operators to ride safely this summer.

When out with family and friends for off-road rides and adventures, wearing a helmet and seat belt, monitoring speed and brushing up on safety best practices could save your life.

So far this year, 17 people have died in ATV/UTV crashes. Of the five fatal UTV crash victims, none were wearing helmets and four of five did not wear seat belts. Of the 12 fatal ATV crash victims, 10 were not wearing helmets.

"This year, 12 of the 17 fatal crashes so far occurred on public roads or routes," said Lt. Martin R. Stone, DNR Off-Highway Vehicle Administrator. "We want everyone to stay safe out there; familiarizing yourself with ATV-UTV laws and safe operation practices is a must before you head out."

Safety Tips & Safety Course

When used safely, ATVs and UTVs provide fun, family recreation and are a valuable tool for working or exploring the outdoors. However, these vehicles are powerful and can be dangerous and even fatal. It is the responsibility of all ATV and UTV operators to make the sport a safe one.

Follow these tips for a safe ride:

- Never consume alcohol or drugs before or during your ride.

- Wear a seat belt and a Department of Transportation (DOT)-approved helmet.

- In addition to a seat belt and helmet, wear protective clothing such as eye protection, gloves, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt.

- Keep your speed in check for the terrain, visibility conditions and your experience.

- Remember that some terrain in Wisconsin is too steep for ATV/UTVs. Please be careful while traversing hills or uneven terrain.

- Know before you go. Review all ATV/UTV laws here.

- One of the best things ATV and UTV operators can do to operate safely is to take an online safety course. A list of approved safety education classes is available on the DNR Safety Education webpage.

ATV and UTV operators born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, who are at least 12 years old for an ATV (and at least 16 years old for UTV) must complete an ATV safety certification course to operate in Wisconsin (exception: on private property owned by operator's immediate family).

Wisconsin law requires every operator involved in a crash incident to report the incident without delay to law enforcement officials. In addition, within 10 days of the incident, the operator must submit a written report to the DNR.

Balog Continues Plymouth Dominance With IRA Triumph

Nearly one month after claiming his first career FloRacing All Star Circuit of Champions Presented by Mobil 1 A-main victory at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth, 10-time Bumper to Bumper Interstate Racing Association champion Bill Balog of Hartland continued his winning ways at the third-mile clay oval by bagging the special 30-lap Road America NASCAR Weekend Kickoff IRA main event before a huge crowd of spectators on Thursday, July 1.

In the 25-lap Plymouth Dirt Track Racing Kristine Hartmann Pleasantview Realty 360 Sprint Car A-main, point leader Travis Arenz of Sheboygan Falls rolled to his fourth PDTR A-main victory of the 2021 season.

After the initial start of the 30-lap IRA A-main was erased when Mike Reinke of Howards Grove spun in turn three, visiting NASCAR Cup Series driver Chase Briscoe of Mitchell, IN, bolted into the lead from the pole position with Bill Balog, who started fifth, sliding into second.

Briscoe, who was making his first Winged Sprint Car start since 2018, caught the rear of the field on lap five, which allowed Balog to close the gap significantly. On lap six, Balog swept past Briscoe in heavy lapped traffic to take over the lead in turn three.

The second of eight yellow/red flag periods appeared on lap eight when Briscoe spun Paul May's 71M car in turn three before being collected by Scotty Thiel of Sheboygan, who had been running third.

Following the restart, two-time IRA champion Scotty Neitzel of Beaver Dam, who started fourth, charged in to briefly pressure Balog for the lead as the leaders weaved their way through slower traffic.

On lap 14, 2018 IRA champion Jake Blackhurst of Hanna City, IL, who started seventh, worked past Neitzel to seize second. A red flag was displayed on lap 15 when Russel Borland of Kewaskum flipped along the back stretch.

Shortly after, Briscoe brought out another caution flag when he spun in turn two on lap 16. On the restart, Danny Schlafer of Sussex slowed to a stop in turn four to bring out the fifth stoppage of the race.

After the restart, Blackhurst turned up the

heat to close in on Balog in lapped traffic on lap 20. However, Blackhurst's progress was slowed by three more caution flags over the next five laps for the stalled car of Scotty Neitzel on lap 22, an infield tire on the track on lap 24 and a flip involving Dave Uttech of Kenosha in turn two on lap 24.

Uttech's flip prompted an open red period to allow pit crews to add fuel to help each team get their cars to the end of the lengthy race.

When the race resumed, Balog flexed his muscle once again to pull away from Blackhurst over the final five laps en route to his 132nd career IRA A-main victory, fifth overall A-main win of the 2021 campaign, third IRA main event victory of the season and fourth straight main event victory at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

Blackhurst had to settle for second, 2016 IRA champ Jeremy Schultz of Beaver Dam finished third after starting ninth, Jordan Goldesberry of Springfield, IL, placed fourth after starting eighth and 14th starter Josh Schneiderman of West Burlington, Iowa rounded out the top five.

Outside front row starter Adam Miller of Plymouth grabbed the lead on the drop of the green field of the 25-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main with fourth starter Jack Vanderboom of Dousman following in second.

As Miller paced the field, the first of three caution flags appeared on lap five when Justin Erickson of Plymouth and Tony Wondra of Campbellsport collided in turn two.

Following the restart, 2018 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Justin Miller of Plymouth moved in from his sixth starting spot to pressure his brother, Adam, for the lead on lap seven. Adam fended off Justin in the battle of the Miller brothers to maintain the top spot before Travis Arenz, who started ninth, began to make his presence felt at the front of the field.

After moving into third on lap 14 on the lightning fast track surface, Arenz worked around Justin Miller to take second on lap 15.

One lap later, Arenz powered past Adam Miller and into the lead exiting turn four and quickly built up a sizeable cushion. The second caution flag appeared on lap 18 when Will Gerrits of Waupun stopped in turn four.

Arenz bolted away from the pack on the restart and held a half-lap lead when Austin Hartmann

of Sheboygan Falls flipped on the back stretch on lap 24 to bring out a red flag and set up a green-white-checkered flag finish.

On the restart, Arenz again wired the field as he pulled away from Adam Miller to notch his eighth career PDTR 360 Sprint Car main event win, 18th career Midwest Sprint Car Association A-main victory and fourth feature victory of the 2021 season at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

Adam Miller placed second, two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee, who started third, finished third, Justin Miller was fourth and two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh finished fifth after starting eighth.

Tony Wondra captured the 15-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main.

In time trials, Scotty Thiel set a new track record with a lap of 11.300 to earn the IRA fast qualifier award.

Chase Briscoe and Scotty Thiel earned IRA dash victories.

The all-Sprint Car event, which was sponsored by Jensen Sales and Service, drew a total of 54 Sprint Cars, including 24 IRA 410 Sprint Cars and 30 PDTR 360 Sprint Cars.

PDTR action is scheduled to resume on Saturday, July 10, with action in the PDTR 360 Sprint Car, Late Model, Grand National and B Mod divisions.

Grandstand gates open at 4:30 p.m. with hot laps at 5:30 p.m. and racing at 6 p.m.

As an addition to last week's race report, four new race track records were set in PDTR action on Friday, June 25.

Lance Fassbender of Burnett set a new 15-lap 360 Sprint Car B-main track record with a time of three minutes and 12 seconds. Justin Schmidt of Cleveland established a new 12-lap Late Model B-main track record in two minutes and 40 seconds.

Brad Mueller of Random Lake tied Waukesha's Taylor Scheffler for the 10-lap Late Model heat race track record in two minutes and 12 seconds, while Tim Sheppard of Beaver Dam and Craig Gessner of Beechwood tied Nick Schultz of Beaver Dam by completing 10-lap B-Mod heat races in a track record time of two minutes and 32 seconds.

Letter from the Editor: On common ground



Dear readers,

Time and time again, people refer to the publications in the Multi Media Channels markets as “our competition.” They are always surprised when I respond with “they are not our competition.” Let me explain.

Newspapers are the backbone of journalism. Those that remain fight a common battle in the industry – the challenge of remaining viable while producing fact-based journalism on a myriad of community topics.

Many communities have watched as their town newspaper that has been a trusted voice for a century closes down, and others wither away to just a few pages.

The reasons: facts are getting less and less important as social media explodes with thousands of voices reporting in real time. Those more organized voices are putting it out there without a solid grasp on journalism ethics. Fast and factless may get the clicks desired, but it is also

damaging to the small communities we serve.

Editor & Publisher recently ran a column by Lee Wolverton, executive editor of HD Media, who presented the following facts:

“Print circulation long has been in freefall but not digital audience. Total weekday circulation for all U.S. newspapers slipped to 28.6 million in 2018 from a peak of 63.3 million in 1984. Recent figures are unavailable, but in 2015, newspapers’ online audience reached a record 173 million, according to data cited by the Newspaper Association of America, the industry’s largest trade group, now known as the News Media Alliance.

“These statistics indicate newspapers are drawing more, not fewer, people to their work, even with newsroom employment cut by half since 2009.

“Online readership for newspapers has not translated into profitability. Advertising revenues industrywide tumbled from nearly \$50 billion in 2005 to \$14.3 billion in

2018, according to the Pew Research Center. Print advertising was decimated, plunging from \$47.4 billion to roughly \$12.5 billion over the same period.

“While digital audiences grew, digital advertising did not keep pace, inching past \$4 billion by 2018 from \$2 billion in 2005. That same year, Google nearly doubled its total revenues to \$6.1 billion. Another player in the digital ad market, Facebook, was in its infancy. Today, those two combined bring in more than \$200 billion annually. They gobble up 77 percent of the local digital ad market compared to 58 percent nationally, according to Borrell Associates and eMarketer. The effect of this is suffocating for local news organizations. Thousands of them are

scrambling for scraps. There is not enough for all to survive.”

Publishers in over a dozen states, including my employer, have filed an antitrust claim against Google and Facebook.

It’s clear to see that this is an important fight for not only our company, but also for the communities we serve.


So, in our communities, publications will stand together to fight for the common good and our role in the places we call home.


