## Forever Friends Learning Center Open In Kewaskum

Forever Friends Learning Center, formerly known as Tuttle Creek Learning Center, is now open in the Village of Kewaskum.

Crystal Hafemann is the new owner/administrator of the center. She has worked there for a long time, though.

"I've been here for almost 23 years, so I've been here for most of my life," said Hafemann, who started working at Tuttle Creek as a 17-year-old school-to-work student in high school. "I just kind of fell upon it. It was probably the best thing I ever did in my life. I love it."

While the name is new, many of the things about the center will remain the same. Located in the same building where Tuttle Creek had been at 1623 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum, Forever Friends Learning Center offers daycare services for children ages 6 weeks old until their 12th birthday.

Forever Friends Learning Center will continue to offer before-school care at Farmington Elementary School. The center also offers before- and after-school care at the center itself.

Many of the staff members are the same as well.

"We are very excited about our staff and how they are all working on continuing their education and are pursuing degrees and credentials in

## Road Construction Continues In And Around Campbellsport

The road construction projects in and around Campbellsport are continuing to affect travel and movement around the village. Each project is progressing though.

The main project has been Highway 67 (parts of Sheboygan Street, Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street). This one is being overseen by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. The project started in April and was scheduled to conclude in November.

Phase one of the project is the roadway from Triple S outside of the village to Elm Street. This portion of the project has run into some issues, which has caused that part to become behind schedule.

One of those issues will be a more extensive reconstruction of the bridge over the Milwaukee River. Other issues were problems found when the ground was dug up for the replacement of sewer and water laterals.

These have been resolved and the under-

ground work is almost completed in this phase. The crews will start grading the road and removing the old sidewalk the week of August 9th.

Phase two is Sheboygan Street from the west side of the village to the intersection with County Highway V. Work on this portion of the project has been going well and continues to move along.

Curb and gutter was poured last week and this week the new sidewalks should be installed. The road in this area will be paved around the third week of August just in time for school to start.

The second part of phase two is Main Street from Elm to Poplar streets. Asphalt removal has been started on this phase and the underground work is also beginning in this area.

The third phase is Fond du Lac Avenue from the intersection with Main Street to the intersection with Sheboygan Street. The asphalt removal on this phase is also starting. Underground work on this portion is scheduled to start next week.

County Highway Y in the village limits is also

Dear Editor,

In last week’s 7/29/2021 Statesman, volume 126, Issue #36, Anne Sesing expressed concern about the auditing of the 2020 Presidential election, calling it “foolishness” and that I should “find a cheaper way to convince the public they are necessary.” The first thing I would ask of Anne, and anyone else with a question or similar confusion as Anne, is to call me directly so explanation can be given.

In short, yes the Wisconsin Elections Commission did the post-election superficial review of selected samplings from random counties, but that action is only general, not surgical or focused. Yes, the Legislative Audit Bureau is working on a 72-county review of activities between the Wisconsin Election Commission and the county clerks, post January 6th certification, which Wisconsin set two sets of electors to due to concerns.

In similar fashion, the actions by the Speaker regarding Justice Gableman, lack scope details and budget, suggesting only that costs may now be in excess of several hundred thousand dollars!

My focus is to utilize third-party support paid for by private sources (little/no cost to taxpayers) with a 25-50 element scope statement that ensures a comprehensive, transparent, and forensic approach that removes all outcome question and doubt. The effect of current conspiracies and concerns directly impacts one of our most sacred rights, our vote. The damage from this will be a paradigm shift in our Democratic Republic, perhaps its demise.

This issue is constitutional in nature and it re-

quires closure. Nothing is more important right now. In taking my oath to serve, it is my obligation to ensure that all 69 percent of Wisconsin voters currently with election concerns, know that either nothing nefarious and/or illegal happened, or it did happen and actions will be taken to correct.

under construction. This was started in June and will be done this fall.

The project includes replacement of sanitary sewer and water mains, reconstruction of the roadway, new curb and gutter, sidewalk replacement and an additional sidewalk to Columbus Parc, construction of a retaining wall, and installation of storm sewer.

Fond du Lac County is also working on County Highway V from the Village of Campbellsport to the Village of Eden. Work on this project began last fall and this spring with the replacement of culverts.

The main reconstruction of the roadway began right after the Fourth of July. This project was expected to take about two months to complete.

Early Childhood. We are excited for what they all have to offer Forever Friends," Hafemann said.

Grace Dich, director of the center, has basically grown up at Tuttle Creek Learning Center. Her mother is the past owner.

Dich, who has a bachelor's degree in nursing, has worked at the center on and off since she was 18. She worked as a nurse for a while, but after her son, Sebastian, was born almost two years ago, she wanted to spend time with him, but also work.

"So, it kind of worked out perfectly to come back," Dich said.

Dich's mother, Audra Beyer, continues to be connected to the center. She is working as a cook for the center, but is starting a new journey in life after working in child care for 32 years.

"She was really excited when Crystal showed interest in buying it because that made the transition easier for her. She knew it was going to someone so wonderful and the center would be in good hands," Dich said.

Hafemann plans to run the center basically the same way as it had previously. The main change is the name of the company.

"It is something different...a new, fresh start," said Hafemann, who followed Beyer's suggestion to change the name.

The name was inspired by the former owners, Beyer and Shelly Marx, who opened Tuttle Creek Learning Center together nearly 24 years ago. The two were best friends.

Marx passed away unexpectedly two years ago. Shortly before Marx passed away, she and Beyer got matching tattoos that say "Forever Friends."

"They were my mentors. I wouldn't be where I am without either one of them," Hafemann said.

Hafemann loves working at the center.

"I love working with the kids and seeing their achievements and what they learn and how they develop. And I love the relationships I have with the families. I am still close with families we had in the past. It's very rewarding," Hafemann said.

Hafemann's favorite thing about her job is the children.

"I love working with them. I love seeing their excitement as they learn new things. They bring a lot of joy to me," Hafemann said.

Hafemann admits there are days when the job gets stressful.

"It is a very mentally challenging

field. It also is physically challenging with the little ones," she said. "But when you are having a rough day, and a child says, 'Crystal, I love, you,' or gives you a hug, it just makes you melt. They think the world of us."

The feeling is mutual.

Sometimes they are teaching us, and we are teaching them," Dich said. "Every kid, in their own time, comes across their accomplishments and their milestones. "It is lovely to learn about local businesses and support each other in your community," Dich said.

**Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports**

**One Dead After Plane Crash**

One person is dead after a plane carrying two people crashed on Saturday in the Town of Hartford.

On July 31 at 11:22 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a plane crash in a cornfield west of County Trunk U, south of Arthur Road in the Town of Hartford. This area is directly west of the Hartford Municipal Airport, which is located at 4200 County Trunk U. Sheriff's deputies were dispatched to the scene along with officers from the Hartford Police Department and personnel from Hartford Fire and Rescue.

A caller reported the plane was occupied by two people: a male and a female. According to the caller, the male was conscious and appeared to be in shock, and the female was not conscious. Upon the first officers' arrival, it was determined the female would need to be extricated from the plane. It was determined that the male is a pilot and was receiving instruction/supervision by the female, who is an instructor.

The male was transported from the scene via ambulance to AMC Hartford and then transported via Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital in Wauwatosa. The female was extricated from the plane and taken to the Life Net hanger at the airport and then to AMC Summit by the Life Net helicopter. Overnight, the Sheriff's Office was notified that the female pilot succumbed to her injuries that she sustained in the plane crash.


The Washington County Sheriff's Office is working with investigators of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to investigate the crash.

The 7:18 morning train brought parcel post matter to this village and with the new train schedule causes the parcel post to be delayed over two hours as it will not arrive until the 9:38 train. Patrons living on the rural routes will not receive their parcel post mail until the following day as the carriers leave before the arrival of the parcel post mail in the morning.

The Waucousta baseball team added another win to its long list of victories when the team defeated the Batavia team on their own grounds. The score was 19-7. The Kewaskum Middle School: Adapted Physical Education grant will purchase a tricycle specifically equipped for students with special needs, providing them an opportunity to be independent and physically active, as well as to improve their self-esteem.

The grant is one of six that the Cousins Subs Make It Better Foundation is awarding to area organizations. Altogether, the foundation is giving \$11,080 in grants to help offset the cost of resources and programming that address the vital community needs of health and wellness, hunger and youth education.

Meals are distributed by men within the program who were previously incarcerated or on the streets – providing them an opportunity to rebuild their relationship with their communities.

- Kenosha County Fire Rescue Association – A \$1,080 grant will purchase rope rescue equipment that will replace outdated equipment and help the organization expand its capabilities and allow for different ways to perform a rescue.

- St. Anthony School – A \$2,100 grant will purchase art supplies and equipment for art-rich courses. These courses help further students' fine motor skills and strong work ethic, while also allowing for cultural and self-expression.

- Vision Forward Association – A \$1,800 grant will help fund the organization's Vision Rehabilitation Program that provides early intervention and prescribed services to young children who are blind or visually impaired.

Since the inception of the Make It Better Foundation in 2013, Cousins Subs has supported its local communities through monetary donations to nonprofits, education scholarships and food aid. To date, the foundation has donated nearly \$650,000 to more than 120 benefiting nonprofit organizations.



I try to keep up with trends that impact the library world. It is expected as a Library Director. The American Library Association in their Future of the library website focuses on trends. I am going to use the recommended by acquaintance approach to begin. I have been asking people to name their three favorite podcasts and I will investigate them. I know for certain that I will not like nor be able to experience them all, but I will have a good pool to choose from. I welcome you to stop in and tell me about your favorite podcast.



## Growing Case Activity And Circulation Of Delta Variant Prompt Updated CDC And DHS Guidance

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) supports the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)'s recommendations that were issued on July 27, 2021. The new recommendations, which are based on the most up-to-date information about the Delta variant of COVID-19, will be reflected in all DHS guidance. The Delta variant is highly infectious and is spreading more quickly than any other strain of the SARS-CoV-2 virus, the virus that causes COVID-19.

"Wisconsin's seven-day average for new confirmed and probable cases has been trending upward," said DHS deputy secretary Julie Willems Van Dijk. "We are concerned with this trajectory along with the increasing proportion of sequenced SARS-CoV-2 specimens that are the Delta variant."

First and foremost, the best way to protect yourself, your family, and your community from COVID-19 and the Delta variant is to get vaccinated. From January 1, 2021, through July 22, 2021, over 98 percent of COVID-19 cases in Wisconsin occurred among people who were not fully vaccinated.

Getting vaccinated against COVID-19 prevents severe illness, hospitalization, and death; it also helps reduce the spread of the virus in communities. Unvaccinated people should get vaccinated and continue wearing a mask until they are fully vaccinated. With the Delta variant, this is more urgent than ever.

Data demonstrate that COVID-19 vaccines are



effective against the Delta variant. Past infection with COVID-19 does not assure protection from the Delta variant, so people who have had past COVID-19 infection are strongly encouraged to get vaccinated.

High vaccination coverage will not only reduce the spread of the virus, but also help prevent new, and possibly more concerning, variants from emerging. Vaccination is the best way to protect you, your family, and your community. To find a vaccination location near you visit [vaccines.gov](https://vaccines.gov) (<https://vacunas.gov/>) or call 211.

While vaccination remains the top defense against the Delta variant, the CDC guidance also focuses on additional strategies that will provide additional protection against the spread of the virus. Because science has shown that

wearing a mask over your nose and mouth can help prevent transmission of the respiratory droplets and aerosols that spread COVID-19, wearing a mask is now recommended in the following indoor settings:

- All teachers, staff, students, and visitors of K-12 schools should wear masks indoors regardless of vaccination status.

- Everyone, regardless of vaccination status, who lives in areas with substantial and high transmission as noted on this CDC map (orange counties represent substantial transmission and red counties represent high transmission) should wear masks in public indoor settings.

DHS encourages local leaders to look at CDC's classifications of community transmission in their counties to make decisions on mask guidance for their communities. DHS data, including the COVID-19 Disease Activity dashboard and COVID-19 cases and deaths maps, provide additional context on COVID-19 activity in Wisconsin's local regions.

"As COVID-19 cases climb, and the Delta variant continues to spread, we urge Wisconsinites to get vaccinated," said Deputy Secretary Willems Van Dijk. "We must protect our children as they head back to school this fall, along with all other Wisconsinites who are at an increased risk for being hospitalized from COVID-19. Vaccines and the additional protection from wearing masks are the best combination of tools to achieve this goal."



## Goldesberry, Schmidt, McDermand Claim A-Main Hardware In PDTR Open Wheel Showcase

Three of the region's premiere open wheel series were front and center on the same track on the same night for the only time during the 2021 season as Plymouth Dirt Track Racing hosted the Bumper to Bumper Interstate Racing Association 410 Sprint Cars, Plymouth Dirt Track Racing-Midwest Sprint Car Association 360 Sprint Cars and Badger Midget Auto Racing Association at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Saturday, July 31.

In the 25th annual 30-lap IRA Sprint Car Frank Filskov Memorial A-main, Jordan Goldesberry of Springfield, IL, claimed his first IRA main event victory of the 2021 season following a thrilling duel with two-time IRA champion Scotty Neitzel of Beaver Dam in the 410 Sprint Car headliner.

2011 PDTR and MSA 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Plymouth worked the outside groove and lapped traffic to perfection in the closing laps to secure his third 25-lap PDTR A-main victory of the 2021 campaign.

Two-time defending champion and current Badger Midgets point leader Chase McDermand of Springfield, IL, racked up his fifth A-main victory of the 2021 season in the 25-lap main event.

Polesitter Josh Walter of Plymouth grabbed the lead on the drop of the green flag of the IRA Frank Filskov Memorial A main with third starter Scotty Nitze in tow. As Walter rode the cushion of the wide, smooth and slick racing surface, Neitzel worked the low line to challenge for the lead beginning on lap six.

Two laps later, Neitzel powered into the lead after Walter jumped the cushion in turn two.

On lap 11, Neitzel caught the rear of the 20-car field and set forth on the task of weaving his way through lapped traffic.

On lap 14 the lone caution flag of the race appeared when IRA rookie Bailey Goldesberry of Springfield, IL, spun in turn two.

On the restart, Blake Nimee of Oswego, IL, who started fifth, pulled off a slide job to steal second from Walter. One lap later, Jordan Goldesberry, who started second, followed Nimee into third.

Nimee and Goldesberry then proceeded to engage in heated duel for second starting on lap 19 with Goldesberry eventually securing the position on lap 24. One lap later, Goldesberry utilized the inside lane to challenge the high-riding Neitzel for the lead.

On lap 16, Goldesberry pulled off a slide job entering turn three to secure the top spot from Neitzel. As Goldesberry opened up a lead while negotiating heavy lapped traffic, eighth starter Scotty Thiel of Sheboygan working the high line to vault his way into second.

Goldesberry held off Thiel's late-race charge to wrap up his fifth career IRA A-main victory. Thiel finished second, Neitzel wound up third, Nimee placed fourth and 2016 IRA champion Jeremy Schultz of Beaver Dam, who started fourth, placed fifth.

"These races are tough to win and it feels good to get one tonight," Goldesberry said. "We didn't start off that good tonight, but we kept working on it throughout the night. I don't think we were necessarily the best car out there in the beginning of the race, but we just got better and better

**WARNING!** Do not read this column on an empty stomach. This week I'd like to share some of my favorite foods from local restaurants and bars.

I'm a favorite kind of guy and when I get hooked on a certain food, it's hard for me to go with something different. Here are some of my favorite things that I crave, no disrespect if your business didn't make the list, just means I probably enjoy all of your menu.

I'll start with a couple locals — 2fers Sports Bar in Eden has me hooked on the Holyland Steakette sandwich on Texas toast smothered in some beer cheese. When I go to Crave in Campbellsport it's an automatic reflex to order the cheese curds, these little bricks of cheese are amazingly delicious.

I usually order one thing from the Eden Café and it's a Texas Club sandwich. A crispy chicken breast with ham, bacon, lettuce, onions, pepper jack on Texas toast with chicken dressing spread thick. I warned you this article will get you salivating! Lately at King Pin Lanes, it's been all pizza burgers and won-ton mozzarella sticks for this guy.

At Green Acres Red Cabin, I'm usually a steak guy but their sides are phenomenal! I always go with the cheesy hash browns and candy baby carrots. Speaking of steak, I love ribeye steak sandwiches and I have three places that I usually hit up to get my fix. Dimo's in Eden and Schmitt's Oar House in Fond du Lac both have a delicious steak sandwich. The Roadhouse in Dundee has a killer steak sandwich on sour

dough bread that will have you coming back for more.

A couple of my favorite stops in Fond du Lac are Ala Roma, Backyard Bar & Grill and Friar Tucks. At Ala Roma, I always order the Pizza Focaccia, it's a slab of Italian sausage with pepperoni, tomato sauce, fresh mushrooms and mozzarella on a Focaccia bun.

Only one thing I ever get at Backyard and that's the Chicken Asparagus sandwich. It's a grilled chicken breast, Swiss cheese, asparagus spears with a side of basil mayo on a grilled eight-grain wheat bread.

Friars has always had some of the best sandwiches around and I've tried most of them. The roast beef with a side of mozzarella sticks is my longtime favorite.

When I go to Blanks Supper Club in Johnsburg, it's always the four-piece steak with cheesy potatoes. The Idlewile in St. Cloud has a pecan crusted walleye that is incredible and something I always order.

At the Casa Del Tequila in West Bend or Fond du Lac, don't even bring me a menu because it's going to be a steak quesadilla and a mango margarita. One of my new hot spots is Mancino's in Fond du Lac, they have the best grinders, pizza is my favorite but I want to try them all!

My last "go to" spot is A & W in Fondy. Love pulling up and having the car hops bring you your food. This has been my order for many years and I don't see it changing. A double bacon cheeseburger with cheese curds and wash it down with a Black Cow.

# Outdoors For All: Explore The Outdoors With Adaptive Equipment And All-Terrain Wheelchairs

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is committed to providing exceptional outdoor recreation opportunities for people of all abilities. DNR adaptive equipment rentals and all-terrain wheelchair reservations through Access Ability Wisconsin (AAW) help ensure that everyone can make memories and learn new skills in Wisconsin's outdoors.

Wisconsinites have access to seasonal adaptive equipment at select state parks, including:

- Adaptive kayaks
- Beach wheelchairs
- Accessible beach mats
- Cross country sit-skis

Additionally, Access Ability Wisconsin provides reservable all-terrain wheelchairs (OWC) throughout the state that can be used for hunting, birding, fishing or exploring. Reserving a chair through AAW is easy and free by filling out a simple online form on AAW's website.

Picking up the OWC and trailer does require access to a vehicle that can tow

more than 1,150 pounds. Reservations are recommended a week or two in advance for the best chance of securing one when needed. The OWC can be kept for up to two weeks, as long as no others are waiting to use the same chair. No special permits are required to use these devices on DNR lands.

### Accessible Cabins And Permits

In addition to adaptive equipment, the DNR provides 10 accessible cabins at select state parks and forests, including eight large cabins and two smaller, rustic cabins. For those who would prefer to camp in a tent or RV, the DNR also offers accessible campsites at every state park and forest.

Also, hunters with certain physical disabilities are allowed special permits, such as shooting from a motor vehicle. Some Wisconsin residents with disabilities are also eligible for a discount on their annual fishing licenses. And, since the enactment of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), every fishing pier the DNR builds is accessible to people with disabilities.

# Wearing A Life Jacket Saves Lives

It's peak boating season, and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds boaters that wearing a life jacket could save your life.

To date, 16 people have died in boating incidents so far this year in Wisconsin. Operator inexperience, inattention, recklessness and speeding are the four leading causes of tragic watercraft crashes, and the leading cause of death is drowning.

The majority of people who drown in boating accidents know how to swim but become incapacitated in the water such as being injured or unconscious, exhausted or weighed down by clothing.

"Wearing a life jacket is the easiest thing you can do to make sure that your next boating trip won't be your last," said Lt. Darren Kuhn, DNR boating law administrator. "Make sure you and all other passengers are wearing it with the buckles fastened before you cast off."

The department does not track all drownings — only those fatalities linked to the use of a recreational activity item, such as a boat, kayak or canoe. Boating incident reports to date for 2021 and previous years are available online here.

Statistics show boaters who wear life jackets and take boater safety courses are most likely to stay safe on Wisconsin waters. Always follow the basic safety tips below and enjoy Wisconsin's great lakes and rivers with family and friends.

### Water Safety Tips

- Sign up now to take an online boater education course.
- Always wear a properly fitted life jacket that has a snug fit and is fastened when you're on or near the water.
- Enjoy the waters sober and know your limits. Alcohol blurs a person's judgment, reaction time and abilities.
- River shorelines and sandbars pose unseen dangers. Higher, fast-moving water can tax an individual's boating, paddling and swimming skills.

Be ready for the unexpected and always wear your life jacket. More boating safety tips are available on the DNR website.
