

## Cleaning The Kewaskum Water Tower

Russ Feine and Sam Paque reclined on their Adirondack chairs, looking up at the Kewaskum water tower that is located near the intersection of Fond du Lac Avenue and Highway H.

Although it appeared that the two were relaxing and enjoying the sunny weather on Thursday, Sept. 2, they were actually busy working. They were cleaning the water tower.

To do the job, they used a contraption that Feine invented some 21 years ago. The water tower cleaning machine includes a telescopic boom lift, power washer, robotic sprayer, some long ropes and a handheld remote control.

The remote-controlled equipment was used to spray the exterior of the water tower with a cleaning solution: Dawn dish soap. Then the soap was rinsed with water.

After the equipment finished cleaning an area of the water tower, Feine and Paque would stand up and pull ropes to move the equipment to clean the next 10-foot section of the water tower.

When finished, the water tower was spotless,

all the way around, with the word “Kewaskum” and a picture of a feather proudly gleaming against the white backdrop.

It was the fourth time in 20 years the Kewaskum water tower was cleaned by Feine’s company, Water Tower Clean & Coat. The company cleans about 250 water towers across the Midwest each year, according to Feine.

In addition to cleaning the water tower exteriors, Water Tower Clean & Coat paints water towers. The company also installs tank mixing systems to blend the contents in water towers.

Feine’s company, which is based out of Lodi, also cleans and inspects the interiors of tanks.

To do that, workers even dive underwater while tanks are in service.

About 150 tanks are cleaned and maintained each year by Water Tower Clean & Coat. The company has a long history of employing college interns. However, there are not many interns available this year, so like many businesses across the country, the company is currently

## School Gets Started In Campbellsport



**Facebook Zucks**

Dear Reader,

As a result, it shows little profit in the United States, and therefore pays little in US taxes. Essentially, it is getting a free ride, while the rest of us bear the costs of governing and defending our country.

4. Facebook is unaccountable for the content it distributes. Under Section 230 of US Code governing communications, it cannot be sued for libel, even though lives are damaged and destroyed through the false information it allows on its platform.

Please call or write to Congress today asking them to break Facebook up for the long-term welfare of our communities. Thank you for your time.

Thinking about work but not what I currently do to earn a living. Rather curiously, jobs held by family members come to mind.

When my brother Lee was still in high school, he worked at Ironsides Battery factory in rural Ashford. He came home from there reeking of Hydrochloric acid, with holes burned in his clothes. He even developed a rash from the stuff.

Then he started at a place on the southern edge of Campbellsport where they built Maytag washing machines. The owners filed for bankruptcy and he got burned again (financially) as he never received his final paycheck.

My sister Diane had a babysitting job at a house on one of the high hills surrounding Ashford. Once during the winter, her car got stuck and Dad had to pull her out. The family hired a different babysitter instead.

After graduation in '71, Diane put in applications at the Wisconsin Job Service, then on Marr Street in Fond du Lac. Wouldn't you know it? After

she enlisted in the Air Force, employers from Regal Ware to Jack Walters Buildings called for interviews.

Probably one of the factories that impressed me most was when Lee worked at Prestige Pak in Fond du Lac, then much smaller, a single building at Morris Street. Once, during a summer weekend, Lee asked Mom and Dad, headed up to visit relatives near Wausau, to drop off some clean clothes to change into after his third shift ended.

While he showered, I looked at the rolls of cellophane the company printed with the Hostess logo for Twinkies and Cupcakes. Don't know how Lee had the gumption to make the three hour drive up north after

toiling all night. But he did.

Fuzzy as the details of the past often are, these stuck with me. Though only a kid, as my brother and sister came of age, I got a good gander at what lay ahead. A lifetime of labor.

# Early Farm Days To Be Held This Sunday

People can step back in time on Sunday, Sept. 12, at Early Farm Days in Kewaskum. The event, which is free of charge, will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at River Hill Park, located between the Milwaukee River and the Eisenbahn Trail.

Sponsored by the Kewaskum Historical Society, Early Farm Days dates back to 1975. As usual, the event will feature steam and gas engines, as well as threshing and antique farm machinery.

The theme of this year's celebration is "All Things Kewaskum."

"We are hoping people will bring photos and memorabilia from Kewaskum. We might be lucky and see some advertising collections from Kewaskum and some Remmel machinery that were products of Kewaskum," Eva Harvey, Kewaskum Historical Society treasurer, said.

Anyone with old farm equipment is encouraged to display their items at the show. Exhibitors are expected to come from all around the area for Kewaskum's Early Farm Days event.

"It is always a surprise to see what shows up," Harvey said. "If you look around your house, you probably have old treasures you didn't even know you had."

Early Farm Days offers a chance for the entire community to share and enjoy the area's past through exhibits and demonstrations. The event,

which is not a flea market where items are sold, is a venue where people can exhibit their cherished possessions for others to see.

"As always, there will be tractors, engines, bicycles and those things," Harvey said. "Since we had to postpone the grand celebration of the village's 125th anniversary, this year our extra focus is on Kewaskum."

Next June, the Kewaskum Historical Society will host a three-day event to celebrate the village's 125th anniversary. At that celebration, the society plans to open the doors to its museum, which is currently being remodeled by volunteers.

In the meantime, community members will celebrate Kewaskum at Early Farm Days on Sunday, rain or shine, hot weather or cold.

Early Farm Days promises to offer fun for the entire family, with horse-drawn wagon rides and a petting zoo. Food and beverages will be available for purchase, including brats, burgers and homemade pies.

"Due to the kind of setup that we have, it is a little different from engine shows because it is not just all about tractors. There is the playground and petting zoo for the kids. It is nice to sit and look at the river and is a great time to reminisce with everyone," Harvey said. "It is a community event that offers fun for all."

Attendees also will have the opportunity to register to become members of the Kewaskum Historical Society.

# Fond du Lac Women's Chorus Rehearsals Starting Again

# Free COVID-19 Mobile Testing Unit

Fond du Lac County Health Department is partnering with Accelerated Clinical Laboratories to offer free COVID-19 testing for all Fond du Lac County residents ages two and older.

Starting Tuesday, Sept. 14, Accelerated Labs will be providing mobile COVID-19 testing onsite at the Village of Rosendale Community Center on Tuesdays from 12 p.m.-5 p.m. and the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds on Thursdays from 12 p.m.-5 p.m. Residents do not need to be experiencing symptoms to be tested.

Accelerated Clinical Laboratories will be offering both PCR and Rapid Antigen tests to residents at no cost. No appointment, insurance, or identification required. Accelerated Clinical Laboratories

will provide test results in 15 minutes for Rapid Antigen tests and within one-two days for PCR confirmatory tests.

# Man Arrested After Standoff In Town Of Addison

A 63-year-old Town of Addison man is in custody after a several-hour standoff with the armed man came to a peaceful resolution a little after 11 a.m. on September 1.

The incident began just after 8 a.m. when the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call reporting that the suspect had shot at his 60-year-old roommate with a rifle inside the residence, on County Highway WW north of State Highway 33 in the Town of Addison. The roommate was able to escape the residence and go to a nearby farm and call 911. The victim escaped with minor injuries.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office SWAT Team, as well as crisis negotiators, were immediately called to the scene. The West Bend Police Department's Special Response Team also was requested, along with a second armored rescue vehicle from the Ozaukee County Sheriff. These

resources were requested due to the nature of the call and the unknown whereabouts of the suspect. The Wisconsin State Patrol responded to assist with traffic control. The Allenton and West Bend Fire Departments assisted on scene as well.

Negotiators with the Washington County Sheriff's Office Multi-Jurisdictional Crisis Negotiation Team made phone contact with the suspect, who said that he would "die today" and wanted the police to kill him, according to a Washington County Sheriff's Office press release. Negotiators talked with the suspect for around 90 minutes before they were able to convince him to come out of the residence unarmed. He surrendered peacefully to tactical officers.

The suspect shot at the victim at least two times and indicated that he was upset with his roommate and that he did not want to hurt him; however, he figured that shooting in his direction would

result in a law enforcement response, according to the press release. The suspect then planned to make law enforcement officers shoot him, according to the press release. The suspect was taken into protective custody for a mental evaluation and will face felony criminal charges. The firearm was recovered during the execution of a search warrant at the residence.

According to the press release, Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis wishes to pass along his appreciation to his staff, as well as all the assisting agencies that did their part, which allowed this to come to a peaceful resolution.

"We appreciate the support and assistance we received from all of our public safety partners. Everyone came together and did their part which took a very dangerous and volatile situation and made it safe," Schulteis said.



# Village May Charge Residents Extra \$1,000 For 2014 Project

The Kewaskum Village Board wants to charge property owners along Main Street an additional \$1,000 assessment fee for roadwork that was done over seven years ago, in 2014.

The board voted on August 16 to hold a public hearing on whether to charge residents who own property on Main Street the extra \$1,000 assessment fee for a road project that was done in 2014. The date of the public hearing has not yet been set.

Following the public hearing, the board is expected to make a decision on the issue.

The village originally charged property owners an assessment fee of \$2,175.80, based on estimates from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. Multiple property owners have paid that fee, according to Village Administrator Adam Gitter.

However, the village is now saying that the estimate was inaccurate, and property owners should have been charged an additional \$1,000.

“Our earlier thought of what should have been

assessed to all residents, that number was actually incorrect. It was actually almost \$1,000 more per household,” Gitter said at the August 16 meeting.

Although the assessment is from work that was done in 2014, the village did not receive the bill from the State of Wisconsin until four or five years after the work was completed, according to Gitter.

“So that is where some of the confusion comes in where it looks like it was pushed out so far, yet everybody was under the impression that it was going to be \$2,187,” Gitter said.

“Part of it is yes, the DOT didn’t get us a bill, but then we purposely dragged three years of zero percent interest,” Village President Kevin Scheunemann said.

The village’s administrative committee has recommended that the village send invoices to property owners for the correct assessments, with the opportunity to finance the amount over a five-year period, according to Village Trustee Dave Spenner.

“They [would] have five years to pay, \$200 a year. It’s a lot for some, but better than \$1,000 up front,” Village Trustee Dick Knoebel said.

Kewaskum. He then posts clues on Facebook about the hiding spot.

those situations would have to be rare."

He also stated that masks would be used in the school in certain very specific situations. The example he gave the board would be when the school nurse is working with sick children.

Amundson also told the board that the protocol for quarantining would be a little different too. They would like people to continue to follow the county health department's guidelines, but if you are vaccinated quarantining may not be necessary unless a close family member is sick.

"If someone in the family tests positive, we would ask that the kids stay home," Amundson said. "The exception to close contact would be if someone is vaccinated."

They do still advise that if your child is not feeling well, he/she should stay home instead of going to school.

Amundson felt things went well in the district last year as far as transmission of the disease.

He felt those who did get sick contracted the disease mostly outside of school.

"We didn't see too much, if any, transmission in school," he said. "It was more outside of school. We saw it with one athletic team last year but it was more those who were together outside of school on the weekend for parties or sleepovers."

The district will also not be taking any action on masks on school buses. Amundson stated that this policy is up to the bus companies and not the school districts.

"There are some bus- sining companies saying that masks are mandated," Amundson said. "My contention is that it is something that is unenforceable for us."

In other business at the school board meeting, the board approved hiring more staff. They will be hiring one or two staff members that will fill some long-term sub needs that will be coming up in the district. Amundson explained that there will be several maternity

leaves happening this school year and it is hard to find substitute teachers. By hiring the full-time teachers, they can fill in where needed.

He also recommended the addition of another four-year-old kindergarten teacher. The pilot program for an optional all-day program has been so successful that there is a need to add another class.

"We would like to be proactive on this," Amundson said about all the hires. "We have a huge number of parents on a waiting list (for all-day 4K), so do we go ahead and add a teacher for that?"

The board also approved the agenda for the annual budget hearing and school district meeting. This is the meeting where the district presents the budget and proposed tax levy for the school district to the electorate. Those in attendance will then vote on the tax levy for for the 2021-2022 school year.

They did have a little discussion on where to hold the meeting. Originally, they

were hoping to have the meeting at Eden Elementary School, but with the continued worry on COVID-19, they decided a larger space would be the better choice.

The meeting is planned for the Campbellsport Middle/High School auditorium. If there is a large number of community members who show up for the meeting, then it may be moved to the gymnasium, which is across the hall from the auditorium.

"With everything that has gone on in the last year, I do think we might have more in the crowd," said Danielle Neitzel.

Amundson agreed, "We might possibly have a crowd this year because of COVID."

The annual meeting and budget hearing will be held on Monday, Aug. 20, at 7 p.m. in the Lang Auditorium.



## Village Of Kewaskum Looks At Garbage Collection Options

The Village of Kewaskum is seeking proposals for curbside refuse and recycling collection.

The village currently is under contract with Advance Disposal for curbside garbage and recycling collection through December 31, 2022.

During the August 16 regular board meeting, the Kewaskum Village Board discussed the possibility of providing inhouse service.

"I would definitely like to do that. It would likely be just one truck, one day a week for garbage, and then every other week it would be a two-day endeavor to get the recycling," Village Administrator Adam Gitter said.

"The challenge of that plan is: What do you do with the garbage? And who do you bring it to when you have to dump it?" Village President Kevin Scheunemann pointed out during the board meeting.

Another issue with providing the inhouse service is finding a place to store a garbage truck. Gitter told the board that one solution that has been suggested is that space could be created if a new building is constructed

for the village's wastewater utility department.

### Other Village Matters

Other action at the Kewaskum Village Board meeting on August 16 includes:

- The board approved a five-year hauling contract with Badger State Waste, contingent on attorney review and alterations. Village Trustee Nathan Wendelborn recused himself.
- The board approved a one-year agreement for sewer charges with Kewaskum Foods, LLC, contingent on attorney review and alterations.
- The board approved intake of sludge from the City of Cedarburg, contingent on attorney review and alterations.
- The board approved lab testing for other municipalities, contingent on attorney review and alterations.
- The board approved a developer's agreement for Nature Haven Estates II for the developers, David and Marilyn Spenner, which enables the developer to relocate a fire hydrant and install water service laterals. Village Trustee David Spenner abstained.



# Check It Out!

In August I set a goal for myself to become more familiar with a library trend each month. Last month it was podcasts. I first needed to find a program to stream these through. After a bit of research, I used Google Podcasts for the platform after researching other options. The search function is easy, there are no ads and I have an Android, so it is very compatible with my phone.

I asked friends and family for suggestions about podcasts they enjoy and received a few recommendations. Many of these were current events or pop culture podcasts which did not interest me. I searched for librarian suggested ones and found the jackpot. Podcasts about books, pure heaven! I narrowed it down to three to try, which was not easy with so many to choose from. The three I examined were: Get Booked, Circulating Ideas and Book Club for Masochists.

Get Booked is a weekly show of personalized book recommendations sponsored by Book Riot. There are over 200 episodes to date and there are two presenters called "bookworms" who promote different reads, usually very diverse. What makes this podcast unique is that it is a response to reader requests for personalized recommendations.

I liked that many of the books suggested were unknown to me which prompted me to explore them and I ended up ordering some for our library. I also found it easy to follow and the podcasters very likeable. I did not like that there were ads every so often promoting Book Riot services. But I do recommend it for people who

are looking for new, diverse reads.

Circulating Ideas is a podcast of conversations about library trends and ideas. Each episode is an interview with someone involved in libraries, not always a librarian. They discuss topics such as innovation in libraries, outreach, and intellectual freedom.

There are also author interviews. I listened to several of these, most between 30 minutes and an hour. I found the topics thought-provoking, which is always a good thing for me. I felt very undereducated on some topics, and felt the need to delve more into these, if I had the time. Which I do not. I would recommend Circulating Ideas to anyone interested in the inner workings of libraries.

Book Club for Masochists has such an intriguing title I was hooked. It is a reader's advisory podcast exploring every genre on the reading spectrum, even those the presenters do not like. Four very engaging hosts discuss a randomly picked genre about twice a month. The fact that not everyone loves the genre and must find books to read and discuss, makes this podcast very enjoyable with some laugh out loud moments.

The worst thing about it is that my "To Read" list has grown beyond anything I could possibly finish in my lifetime. If you are looking for reading recommendations, check out the Book Club for Masochists.

My next exploration in library trends will be coming in October. Stay tuned.
