Wisconsin Remembers 9/11 In Kewaskum

Saturday marked the 20th anniversary of the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

It was a day that many people came together to remember the horror of what had happened and to come together with resolve and hope for the future. It was a day that many came to the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial, located in Kewaskum.

The first visitors arrived at the memorial at about 5:45 a.m. They were a group of 13 volunteers from the Kewaskum Fire Department, stopping at the memorial before heading to Green Bay to take part in the 9/11 Stair Climb at Lambeau Field to raise funds for the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation.

Then, at 10 a.m., about 300 people gathered for a service held at the memorial.

"Today's events in Kewaskum, like others around the state, are meant to remember the victims of the worst terrorist attack on U.S. soil but

also to remember all the positive things that came from it. America came together like never before and we need to do that again. Now is the time to reflect," Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann said as he addressed the crowd.

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop, who was a featured speaker at the event, talked about how the country was 20 years ago, compared to now.

"This memorial took 20 years from those attacks to its grand

"It's hard to believe we've been at this for six years, and we can't wait to welcome everyone back to The Ledge Games in 2021," Tyler Oestreich, The Ledge Games co-founder, said. "The Ledge Games offer a great outdoor retreat for a day, and we're grateful for our primary sponsors, including ATI, Graymont, Red Cabin at Green Acres and Wisconsin Lighting Lab, Inc., who continue to support our mission."

Each year, proceeds from the event fund scholarships for students at Moraine Park Technical College in Fond du Lac. 
Dealing with Uncertainty

Kewaskum Firefighters Climb Stairs For 9/11

A team of 13 members of the Kewaskum Fire Department gathered at 5:45 a.m. at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial on Saturday, Sept. 11, before heading to Lambeau Field for the 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb.

Some of the Kewaskum firefighters have participated in the stair climb for the past five years, but this was the largest group the Kewaskum Fire Department has ever had participate.

This year also marked the largest amount of money raised by the Kewaskum Fire Department. This year, the Kewaskum group raised a record amount of \$5,541.28 to benefit the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, which works to honor America's fallen fire heroes, to assist their families in rebuilding their lives, and to reduce firefighter deaths and injuries.

9/11 Memorial Stair Climb events are a tribute to the 343 firefighters who gave their lives during the tragic events at the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

Over 3,000 people participated in this year's Stair Climb at Lambeau Field in Green Bay. During the event, they climbed the equivalent of 110 stories - the height of the fallen World Trade Center towers - on the steps of Lambeau Field. Each climber carried a badge with the name

and photograph of one of the fallen firefighters to symbolically complete the climb with one of the fallen.

At the equivalent of the 78th floor of the World Trade Center towers, which is the highest floor firefighters reached on 9/11, each climber rang a fire bell in honor of the fallen

firefighter on their badge.

Columbus Parc Projects Approved By Campbellsport Board

During the Campbellsport Village Board's Monday, Sept. 13, meeting, they approved a couple projects at Columbus Parc.

The first will be upgrades to the Whispering Trails nature path at the park. Storms that hit the area three years ago damaged the nature trail area. Trees knocked down made the trail hazardous and the trail itself suffered damage.

Since the storms, the village worked to remove the downed trees from around the trail. Now, the pathways themselves need to be upgraded.

Fond du Lac County has offered to step up to help the village upgrade the trail. According to Charlie Kudy, village administrator, the county will provide labor and funding for renovations.

"Around \$25,000 the county is willing to put toward getting those trails back," Kudy said.

Board members approved working with the county to have the nature trail renovated. The work will be done in 2022.

Another item that was talked about for Columbus Parc was additional lighting around the park. Police Chief Tom Dornbrook had mentioned a while ago that he wanted to look into increasing the lighting in the park for safety and security reasons.

"A lot of it has to do with the liability for the village," Dornbrook said. "If you drive by that south parking lot at night, it is as dark as dark can be. Walking from the pavilion to that parking lot,

that's an uneven ground there, I think that's a liability. The playground area and the basketball court is pretty dark too. I just think that should be lit better. We have insurance, yes, but do we want someone to fall and break a hip."

Dornbrook also mentioned that some lighting around the entire park at night would also help with security. People would be less likely to vandalize and hang out there if it is lit throughout the night.

The police chief has talked with the Campbellsport Athletic Association about the possibility of adding lighting to the park. He said they were receptive and would possibly help pay the electric bill during months when the CAA is using the park.

"It's something that we have been talking about there for a long time," said Rick Heisler, a member of the CAA. "I think it is something that would be very positive for that location. I think when all is said and done and it is talked over, I think they (CAA) would be receptive. With the lights being LED, the cost for usage is dramatically less and they should last longer."

Heisler got prices for the board from the person who has installed the other lighting at the park. The quote was \$4,690 for the lights that Dornbrook was asking to install. Lights would be added to the parking lot by the nature trail and throughout the park to light up the ball diamonds, playground area and basketball courts.

Board members approved installing the lighting for the price quoted. The money will be taken out

of the general fund balance to pay for the project.

Property Concerns

In other business, the board continued to discuss two properties in the village. Both had complaints filed against them and the board has been working for the past few months with the owners to clean up and fix up the properties.

One property on Sheboygan Street had already been forwarded to the court system. This property had the same action taken against it about 10 years ago. At that time, the court allowed the village to go in and clean up the property.

"The court has a judgement against him for \$14,000," Dornbrook said about the current action. "Now it is up to us to decide if we are going to go in and clean that up. The decision for the board tonight is whether to go ahead and go in there. I have called Guelig's (for pricing). Last time it cost the village \$8,000 to clean that up."

While discussing this, the board was shown photos of the property that Dornbrook had taken last week.

"The front yard and driveway is cleaned up a little bit," Dornbrook said. "There is way more stuff in there than when we started this process a few months ago. He showed up when I was there and he was not happy I was there. He is not intentionally breaking the law. I think he is in the mindset that he is recycling."

Dornbrook explained to the board that he felt

We are sure he is on the first chair on the ski slopes of heaven.



the village needed to move forward and clean up that property. In his opinion, if the village is going to enforce rules on other properties, then it needs to move forward on this one too.

That is exactly what the board decided to do. They voted unanimously to move forward with the village attorney to keep going on the process to clean up the property.

Another property on Main Street has also been talked about in the past couple months. That family had been working to clean it up and trying to find financing and a contractor to renovate the house to get it up to code.

A representative of the family addressed the board about their future plans. They will not be moving forward with the repairs to the house and are now planning on relocating.

Road Construction

The board was given an update on the road construction projects in the village. The Highway 67 project is moving along. Underground utility work is being completed on Fond du Lac Avenue and on Main Street from Fond du Lac Avenue to Poplar Street.

Curb, gutter and sidewalks are being installed on the south end of town and should start on Fond du Lac Avenue in the next week or two. A first coat of asphalt could start on the south side of Main Street and possibly Fond du Lac Avenue in about three weeks.

The completion date of November 11th has not been changed as of yet.

Garbage Pick Up

The board continued to talk about garbage pick up in the village. Since Waste Management has taken over Advanced Disposal, who had the contract with the village, garbage pick up has not been the best in the village.

Waste Management had been working with the village to try to rectify the problems. They are facing employee shortages and trying to work out scheduling to keep up with pick up. Village officials stated that communication with Waste Management has gotten worse in the last month.

A problem recently faced by the village is the

opening a few months ago. Twenty years later we are here together – right next to a section of beam recovered from the World Trade Center - all of our differences are set aside at the moment. Right now, we are unified as one," Bishop said.

Greenfield Fire Chief John Cohn, also a featured speaker at the event, spoke about the heroes of 9/11, those who are "ordinary people doing extraordinary things."

Members of the Kewaskum Fire Department served lunch to the B-CAUSE We Care group before the bikers headed up Fond du Lac Avenue to the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and then to the fire station in Waupun.

Board member Mark Reseburg stated, "I'm all in favor of dropping them tomorrow if we could."

Barton Street Lift Station

Board members approved designating the ARPA funds (COVID relief money) toward the upcoming Barton Street lift station project. This is a project that needs to be done in the village and it falls under the parameters of the ARPA fund guidelines.

The village will be receiving just under \$200,000 in ARPA money. This will not cover the entire cost of the lift station project, but it will help cover a portion of it.

Patty Hayes

Board members approved a proclamation recognizing and thanking Patty Hayes for her years of medical service to the village. She has been a physician assistant at the Campbellsport Clinic for more than 20 years.

According to the board, she is planning to retire at the beginning of October.



I have been asked by library patrons to suggest good books recently. This is a special skill that can take a while to hone. Contrary to popular belief, librarians have not read every book on the planet. We would love to, but much of our workday is involved in other priorities and opening a book for pleasure is not one of them.

This special skill, to match the perfect book with the patron is called Readers’ Advisory. Some librarians enjoy performing this task and others detest it. For me, I do like helping others find their next read. But what I truly love is when they tell me how much they liked reading what I picked out.

There are different ways to perform Readers’ Advisory and an assortment of tools to help us. Many times, when asked for a reading suggestion, I am told they want to know what I read because they like my choices found either in one of my columns or the staff pick displays we have in the library.

That is nice to know. But I prefer to choose next reads that would best suit the requester. To do that, I may ask some questions such as, “What kinds of books do you like to read?” “Who is your favorite author?” “Tell me about the last book you read.” Then I can base my recommendations off their answers.

One of the best tools I use if I am not familiar with the genre or author they might desire is Novelist. It is a database provided by Badgerlink and free for all Wisconsin residents. You can access it through our website by clicking on online resources and databases, Badgerlink and then Novelist in the description on the page.

It is a super fun and easy resource to use. Some of the other resources that I have used for Readers’ Advisory when I can’t come up with suggestions in my head include podcasts (see last week’s column), Goodreads and Whichbook.

I have read a lot of different authors and genres and have a nice stash of suggestions that I can provide without using additional resources if pressed for time. I do have favorite genres, such as modern suspense without too much gore but a lot of mind games is fun to read. Check out suspense authors Riley Sager, Shari Lapena, and Megan Miranda. I also like lighter chick lit, Sophie Kinsella, Jane Green or Jennifer Weiner comes to mind.

My favorite is historical fiction, especially tales about real historical figures. Some of the authors I prefer for this genre include Tracy Chevalier, Phillipa Gregory, Paula McLain and Christina Baker Kline. Some standout novels in this category include A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles, The Dovekeepers by Alice Hoffman, The Red Ten by Anita Diamant and my personal favorite, People of the Book by Geraldine Brooks.

Whether you are looking for a new author, a different type of read, or just want to chit chat Readers’ Advisory, stop on in the library.



The celebration at Homeplate was epic and the raw joy and enthusiasm was beautiful to see. I listened to the Bob Uecker call on the radio about a dozen times, "Get up, get outta here, GONE!"

In a year where legendary radio announcer Bob Uecker is celebrating his 50th year of calling Brewer games, this season just has something special written all over it. The pitching is outstanding and the Crew has four stud starters (Woodruff, Burnes, Houser, and Peralta) not to mention two of the best relievers in the game with Hader and Brandon Williams.

It seems like every game a new star emerges and a new guy steps up and delivers a clutch performance. The World Series drought will end this year and the Brewers are going to bring Milwaukee a second world championship to the city this year — I'm calling my shot. I told Rick Simpson and Pat Flood at the football game Friday night that I wasn't going to write about the Brewers because I didn't want to jinx them, sorry fella's, I lied.

They are thankful he is here and alive after what he thought was just helping another citizen that day. His optimism and always wanting to push forward has gotten him where he is today, and he will continue pushing forward through the pain. 
