## Kewaskum Man Receives Pardon From Gov. Evers

A Kewaskum man is one of 15 people who received a pardon from Gov. Tony Evers on Oct. 8.

Thomas Pocian was 17 when he accepted and cashed stolen checks and 43 when he illegally possessed a gun. Now 54, Pocian has earned the support of the victim of his crime and is now a small business owner living in Kewaskum, according to a press release from the governor's office.

Pocian was one of the applicants whom the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board heard from virtually on September 10. Applications that were selected for expedited review or recommended by the Board were forwarded to Evers for final consideration. To date, the governor has granted 278 pardons.

"I am glad to grant another 15 pardons following the board's September hearing and to recognize the hard but critically important work these folks have done to move forward, better themselves, and

Vandermar, Stoffel and Seefeld were all inducted during half-time of the Friday, Sept. 10 football game. Martiny was inducted at the end of the 50th annual Cougar Cross Country Invite on Thursday, Oct. 7.

The Campbellsport Athletic Hall of Fame honors athletes who have played for Campbellsport High School, former coaches and those supporters who have been extremely important to CHS athletics. The Campbellsport Booster Club finances the plaques for both the Hall of Fame and the inductees.

The plaques are displayed in the commons area outside of the high school gym.

### Don Seefeld

Don Seefeld was a long-time coach and educator at Campbellsport High School. Seefeld spent 34 years as a teacher in the science department.

Seefeld was named the Teacher of the Year at CHS in 1990. In 1995 he started the CAPP chemistry program, a college level class, that is still at the school today.

In addition to his teaching accomplishments, Seefeld was a coach for most of his teaching career. He was the golf coach from 1969-1973 and 1988-2000.

As golf coach, Seefeld's team were conference champs in 1989, 1991 and 1998 and they won the regional championship in 1996. The team went to

## Campbellsport Road Construction Update

The underground work is almost complete on the Campbellsport road project. All the storm sewer and watermain work is completed. There were a few more sanitary sewer laterals to complete this week.

The concrete crews are working on completing concrete steps from Elm Street to the bridge along with the sidewalks on Fond du Lac Avenue. Weather pending, both sections should be completed with concrete work the early part of next week.

Once the concrete work and restoration is completed, the crews will start preparing for paving. They plan to pave Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street from Elm Street to New Castle the week of Oct. 25.

# The Purpose Of Time

Dear Reader,

Lucius Annaeus Seneca the Younger – that’s quite a name, isn’t it. He was a great statesman and philosopher in ancient Rome, and he usually went by a shortened version of his name: Seneca. Around AD 49 he wrote a book called “On The Shortness Of Life”. In it he writes “The part of life we really live is small. For all the rest of existence is not life, but merely time.”



What he seems to be saying is that in general, we have a decent amount of time to spend living but we sometimes don’t invest it wisely. We’re too busy trying to impress others by accumulating money and power. The trade-off is that there is little left in the day for ourselves.

The struggle for survival tends to focus one’s attention on the basics: Food and water, shelter, medical care, etc. But for many of us, these needs are amply met, giving us precious time to “really live,” as Seneca puts it. Ironically, while we guard our wallets and purses closely, we liberally dollop out large chunks of time on false ambitions and nothingness. When all is said and done, one must let go of the titles and trophies, let go of everything and surrender to the great darkness.

The question then is, If these trinkets are not worthwhile, what is? That is a question each of us needs to decide for ourselves – but if we consider those we love, and the time we spend with them, it shouldn’t be hard to find the answer.

Local farmer Dale Theel, of Greendale Farms, in partnership with Between the Lakes Demonstration Farm Network, is holding a soil health field day at his farm on Wednesday, Oct. 20, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and the public is invited to attend.

Come out to the farm to see soil health practices in action, and to learn from farmers, agronomists, and soil health educators about how you can put soil health practices to work on your land! This field day will provide attendees the opportunity to see a variety of different cover crops, view soil and roots through a soil pit, and to watch a native prairie installation with a prairie strips planting demo.

## Pfizer COVID-19 Booster Drive-Thru Clinic

The Fond du Lac County Health Department is partnering with the National Guard to provide Pfizer booster vaccines to eligible individuals.

On Friday, Oct. 15, they will host a drive-thru Pfizer vaccine clinic at the Cow Palace on the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds (520 Fond du Lac Ave, Fond du Lac) from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. or until capacity has been met. To ensure short wait lines, individuals should register ahead of time at [vaccinate.wi.gov](https://vaccinate.wi.gov). No insurance, appointment, or ID required.

Individuals are eligible if they have completed their initial Pfizer series (two doses) at least six months ago AND meet at least one of the below criteria:

- Ages 65+
- Ages 18-64 with certain medical conditions or live in long term care settings
- Employees and residents at increased risk
  - \* First responders (healthcare workers, firefighters, police, congregate care staff)
  - \* Education staff (teachers, support staff, daycare workers)
  - \* Food and agricultural workers
  - \* Manufacturing workers
  - \* Corrections workers
  - \* U.S Postal Service workers
  - \* Public transit workers
  - \* Grocery store workers

sectionals four times.

Seefeld's golf team made one state golf appearance in 1992 and he had an individual state qualifier in 1997.

Seefeld had many different coaching positions with the Cougar basketball program. He was the freshman coach in 1968 and the varsity coach from 1969-1971. He spent most of his years as the JV basketball coach and varsity assistant coach — 1987-2000.

Seefeld continued to coach former students in adult softball and basketball leagues for more than 20 years. He was very excited this year when, at 80 years old, he made a hole-in-one on the golf course.

"John to this day is still a tremendous golfer," said Tom Griesemer, during the induction ceremony. "I was going to have him hold two props — a golf club and a meter stick. Then everyone would know you.

"Don Seefeld is a great guy. I had him as a teacher and I had him as a coach."

Being selected for the CHS Athletic Hall of Fame was another exciting event this year.

"I'm pretty happy," Seefeld said. "Especially because golf is not a major sport so I was surprised."

In introducing Seefeld, Griesemer talked about the success of the Campbellsport boys basketball program. He credited Seefeld's years as assistant coach as a big part of that success.

"Roger Turchany (former head basketball coach) was the one who nominated him and he couldn't say enough kind words," Griesemer said. "Roger said he was successful because of Don. The assistant coach or JV coach never gets enough credit. Don deserves this, and he really does."

"I really appreciate this," Seefeld said. "Thank you very, very much."

"I had all these kids as students," he said while looking at his fellow inductees. "They deserve it more than I do."

**John Stoffel**

John Stoffel played football, basketball and baseball. Over his four years at CHS, Stoffel earned nine varsity letters — two in football, two in basketball and four in baseball.

The baseball diamond is where this Hall of Famer shined. During his senior year in 1968, the pitcher had a 13-0 record, a .5 ERA, 15 strikeouts per game, three no-hitters and eight shut outs.

"That is tremendous," Griesemer said.

Stoffel was the team captain for all three sports his senior year. He was also an all-conference player in all three sports in 1968.

After high school, Stoffel moved on to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh where he pitched during all four years of his college years. His team was the NAIA World Series champions.

In 1972, Stoffel was drafted by the California Angels. He played in the minors for the Idaho Falls Angels, Quad City Angels, Salinas Packers (CA) and the Union League (Mex.) from 1972-1975.

"Unfortunately, he had an arm injury that ended his career," Griesemer said. "That could have meant that Campbellsport had two professional baseball players during

the era of Jimmy Gantner.

"John said that he didn't have a breaking ball, he just threw fast balls. He was a big left hander with a big arm."

Upon accepting his award, Stoffel told a story about a time he ran into Hubie Diekvoss, a long-time CHS baseball coach.

"When I graduated from eighth grade at St. Matthew's Catholic School, I was walking up the street and I saw Hubie D so I walked up to him and said how you doing Hubie," Stoffel said. "He spun me around and said 'what's the name?' because he knew I was starting high school. I smiled and I said sorry Mr. Diekvoss. I guarantee you I'm going to win a championship for Campbellsport High School. It took me until my senior year and what they did was moved baseball into the summer and we won conference that year and I am very proud of that."

Stoffel credits his father for his success. He said every Sunday night his father would go outside to catch for him.

"I always had someone to catch with," he said. "He (his dad) would say John just throw the ball as hard as you can. That's where I learned my fast ball and that is what got me to where I got."

Stoffel also commented on his high school years and this award.

"It was the most fun four years of my life," he said. "I'm kind of in awe because it is more than I thought it was going to be."

**Cathy Vandermar**

Vandermar was a stand-out runner for the Cougars during her high school years. She won 10 varsity letters — four in track, four in cross country and two in cheerleading.

She was a four-time state qualifier in cross country from 1982-1985. She had her best individual finish at the state meet in 1985, 11 place.

"Imagine that, many peopler are fortunate to get there once and she made it four times," Griesemer said. "That is tremendous."

Vandermar was named all-conference in both cross country and track all four years of her high school career.

After high school, she attended the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh

and ran cross country and track from 1986-1990. During that time in cross country, the Titans were national cross country champions in 1987 and 1988. She had her best national finish in 1989, sixth place. Vandermar was the individual WIAC and regional cross country champion in 1989 and an All-American in Division III that same year.

In 1990, her track team were national team champions. She was the WIAC individual champion in the 3000m and 5000m in 1990. That same year, she had her best finish at nationals in the 3000m in second place with a time of 9:48:98.

"On behalf of Cathy Vandermar, I want to thank Campbellsport awarding her this plaque and induction into the hall of fame," said Mike Kulibert, current cross country coach and Vandermar's coach. He accepted the award for Vandermar who lives in South Carolina now.

**Rick "Rocky" Martiny**

Rick "Rocky" Martiny was another stand-out runner for Campbellsport. Martiny earned nine varsity letters — four in track, three in cross country and two in basketball.

As a member of the track team, he was a state qualifier in 1973. He placed second in the 880 yard, fifth in the mile relay and sixth in the long jump. That same year, the CHS track team were conference champions. This was the only year CHS has won the conference championship in track.

Martiny set school records in the 440 yard, 880 yard, high jump, long jump and as part of the mile relay

team. Jim Vollmer, former cross country coach and track coach, commented that he may have set records in more events, but they only let him compete in five events so he wouldn't wear himself out.

In cross country, Martiny was a member of the 1972 state championship team. He was a three-time state qualifier from 1970-1972 and was also an all-conference runner those same years. The CHS cross country teams during his years were the conference champions all three years.

Vollmer pointed out that Martiny may have been a four-time state qualifier in cross country, but he didn't run his freshman year.

Martiny was an all-conference honorable mention and the team captain in basketball in 1973. He was also the winner of the UW-Madison "W" Award for Top Student Athlete in 1973.

"Rocky joins his brother (Larry) in the Hall of Fame," Vollmer said. "They are two very deserving individuals. Rocky certainly deserves to be in the Hall of Fame."

"You don't just get nominated for the Hall of Fame for one particular performance. Over the last several years, the committee has looked at athletes who not only excel in one sport but multiple sports in different seasons. That certainly is the case for Rick, or Rocky, Martiny."

Vollmer talked about the 880-yard run that Martiny ran in track. He said it was amazing how fast he could run that race.

"He ran that in 1:58," Vollmer said. "I think that is still the school record. So many things to talk about for track with Martiny."

Vollmer had the following phrase added to the Martiny's plaque, "Dominated and scored at track meets like no other."

"It's been an honor," Martiny said. "It's great to be nominated. It was a great run. Running's been in our family. Athletics has been good for us. It is good for everybody. It gives you something to do. It gets you set for what you are going to be in life. What you are doing, you younger people, you're making a path for the rest of your life right now. Hard work, dedication, that's what it's all about."

"This is quite an honor. To have my picture up there along with my brother, I couldn't ask for anything better."

If you would like to nominate someone for the CHS Athletic Hall of Fame Class of 2022, check out the school district's website. Those who were already nominated will stay in the pool of candidates for five years.



uplift their communities," Evers said. "I look forward to continuing to work with the Pardon Advisory Board to offer these official grants of forgiveness and encourage anyone who is eligible to apply."

The Wisconsin Constitution grants the governor the power to pardon individuals convicted of a crime. A pardon is an official act of forgiveness that restores some of the rights that are lost when someone is convicted of a felony, including the right to serve on a jury, hold public office and hold certain professional licenses. A pardon does not expunge court records.

Under Executive Order #30, individuals convicted of a Wisconsin felony may apply for a pardon if they completed their sentence at least five years ago and have no pending criminal charges. Individuals currently required to register on the sex offender registry are ineligible for a pardon. Executive Order #130 established an expedited review process for applications that meet stricter criteria, including a greater length of time elapsed since sentence completion and nonviolent nature of the offenses.

Deputies from the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's office responded to the crash along with Campbellsport Ambulance, Campbellsport Fire Department, Eden Fire Department, Eden First Responders and Theda Star Medical Helicopter.

A 27-year-old year male from Belleville was driving the SUV. He had to be extricated from the vehicle and flown by Theda Star Medical Helicopter to Theda Care Regional Medical Center- Neenah with serious injuries.

A 27-year-old from Eden was driving the pick-up truck. She and her five-month-old passenger were transported by ambulance to St. Agnes Hospital where they were treated and released.

The intersection was closed for 35 minutes while the Theda Star Medical Helicopter was on the scene. The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office is investigating the incident.

### Pedestrian Killed In Train Crash


On Oct. 6 at 2:41 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a call from the Canadian National Railroad, reporting that a train had struck a person. The person had been walking on the tracks east of Scenic Drive between Lakeview Road and Willow Creek Road in the Village of Richfield. Sheriff's deputies, along with the Richfield Fire Department and Rescue, were dispatched.

Upon deputies' arrival, an adult male was located, deceased on the tracks. The initial investigation revealed that the train was operating southbound on the tracks when the engineer observed a male walking southbound in between the tracks on railroad property. The engineer immediately began sounding the horn; however, the person continued to walk southbound on the tracks in the path of the train. This caused the engineer to apply emergency braking procedures while continuing to sound the horn. The person walking on the tracks never reacted and was struck by the train, according to the sheriff's office report. The train came to a stop approximately three quarters of a mile down the track. As a result of the incident, the train was stopped for almost seven hours.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was not immediately able to identify the victim, so it sent out a report seeking the public's help on Oct. 7. Washington County sheriff investigators received numerous tips in response to the call for assistance. One nearby resident had captured video of the person believed to be the victim walking in the area a short time before the incident. A Washington County sheriff's deputy assigned to the Village of Richfield recognized the individual in the picture. Authorities were able to make contact and make preliminary identification. No additional information is being released. The investigation into the incident continues.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office extended appreciation to its community partners who responded to our call for assistance, which allowed the office to identify the victim and notify his loved ones.

Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis asked that community members join him in giving their thoughts and prayers to all those affected by this tragedy and respect the family's privacy.

be held Monday, Oct. 18, 5:30 - 7 p.m. in the Kewaskum Elementary School cafeteria.


A session for parents and caregivers of children in grades 6-12 will be held on Monday, Oct. 25, 5:30 - 7 p.m. in the Kewaskum High School


## Eighth Grade Trenton Schladweiler

Grading crews will be starting to grade from Elm Street, working west toward Fond du Lac Avenue. This section will take roughly two weeks to grade. Following grading, the curb and gutter will be installed.

The DOT plan is to pave the road as soon as the curb and gutter is installed, which should happen around the first week of November. Once the road is paved, the concrete crews will be working on installing the sidewalks.

According to the DOT, the goal is to complete the project this construction season with minor landscaping to be done next year.

# 'We Must Work Together With The Earth'

## Analysis Shows Sheboygan River Progressive Farmers Making A Difference

Trying new things on the farm and then comparing notes with fellow farmers is what Joe Loehr and his brother, Mark, love most about their membership in Sheboygan River Progressive Farmers (SRPF).

They jointly own Loehr Dairy in eastern Fond du Lac County (near Dotyville) where they milk 550 cows and run about 1,000 acres. Joe Loehr assisted in the formation and launch of SRPF, a farmer-led conservation group, and is happy his family-owned farm is participating in the practices promoted by the group to help bolster their already strong commitment to caring for the environment.

"I think the nature of being here nearly 150 years on the same land is evidence of good conservation work," Loehr said. "But now, having other farmers around who want to share ideas and information about conservation is the biggest benefit of being a part of this group. There's nothing we have to experiment with completely alone anymore."

SRPF's 35 members represent 23,000 acres and nearly 13,000 dairy cows, beef cattle and pigs. The group collaborates with university researchers, environmental groups and community leaders to promote and implement innovative farming practices.

In 2020, members planted 6,762 acres in cover crops, 10,746 acres using strip-tillage and no-tillage, and 7,040 acres with low-disturbance manure applications. In all, conservation practices were used on 89,000 acres, up more than four times from just two years earlier. Some farmers incorporate multiple practices on the same fields.

All of that work is making a difference by significantly reducing the chance of harmful runoff into streams and lakes.

The farmers last year potentially prevented an estimated 51,000 pounds of phosphorus from leaving the fields and 3,700 tons of sediment erosion, according to research shared by the state Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and The Nature Conservancy (TNC). For comparison, a mid-size dump truck can carry 10 tons of sediment. One pound of

phosphorus in a lake or stream has the potential to cause the growth of up to 500 pounds of algae, which can degrade water quality.

The analysis calculated an estimate of the potential impact of cover crops, strip-tillage and no-tillage compared to more conventional methods typical to the SRPF's area.

Loehr said he loves to experiment on the farm and continues to try various interseeding and forage blends planted either with corn crops or instead of corn. This is the first year the dairy is using only no-till planting and has cover crops planted on every tillable acre throughout the winter.

"As farmers, we believe plants are more valuable than cultivation," he said. "Plant roots benefit us a lot if they're in the ground 365 days a year instead of us allowing the soil to sit empty. This helps us produce a much more bountiful crop each year and is better for the environment than turning the ground over and killing off the life existing in the soil."

SRPF President Joe Wagner is excited to watch as soil health in the area continues to improve. He said trying new practices can be challenging, but he hopes members will be open-minded.

"People have to give these things a shot," Wagner said. "It's good to start small, try one field and see where it gets you. Be open-minded and know that we can't keep doing the same thing over and over."

Wagner is setting an example.

"I've been trying to plant green for two years and have been no-tilling for about six years," he said. "We expanded our cover crop acreage this year and are doing some yield trials. My hope is that over time the good, productive years help even out the tougher years for all of our farmers."

Loehr is impressed with the increase in adoption of conservation practices.

"I think (what) we're learning, especially in the last couple decades, with some of our farming practices is that we absolutely must work together with the earth. When we're improving it, it's improving our chance of success," he said. "We must work to sustain life in the soil every day that we possibly can."

## Red Cross Enters Third Week Of Emergency Blood And Platelet Shortage

The American Red Cross continues to experience an emergency blood and platelet shortage that has caused the blood supply to drop to the lowest post-summer level in at least six years.

With less than a day's supply of certain blood types in recent weeks, the Red Cross asks donors of all blood types — especially type O — to make an appointment to give blood or platelets as soon as possible to ensure patients can receive the lifesaving transfusions they rely on. Appointments can be made by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Fall is typically a time when the blood supply rebounds from summer blood shortages, but a surge in COVID-19 cases across the U.S. due to the delta variant has contributed to the lowest donor turnout of the year. To shore up inventory, the Red Cross must collect 10,000 additional blood products each week this month to meet hospital and patient needs.

### Blood Donations Help Those With Breast Cancer

During Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October, the Red Cross is reminding donors of the importance of blood to those undergoing treatment. According to the National Cancer Institute, roughly 1.9 million people are expected to be diagnosed with cancer in the U.S. this year, and more than 281,000 of those individuals will have breast cancer.

Patients with breast cancer and other cancers may need blood products on a regular basis during chemotherapy, surgery or treatment for complications. In fact, nearly 25 percent of the blood supply is used by cancer patients.

People across the country depend on the kindness of blood donors. Donors are urged to make an appointment to give blood or platelets as soon as possible by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-73-2767).

### Blood Drive Safety

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and

infection control, and additional precautions — including face masks for donors and staff, regardless of vaccination status — have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive.

Donors can also save up to 15 minutes at the blood drive by completing a RapidPass®. With RapidPass®, donors complete the pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of donation, from a mobile device or computer. To complete a RapidPass®, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Red Cross Blood Donor App.

To donate blood, individuals need to bring a blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification that are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

## UW-Madison Division of Extension: Checking Your Free Credit Report

Federal law allows individuals to get a free copy of their credit report every 12 months from the three major credit reporting bureaus — TransUnion, Equifax, and Experian. The annual free reports were put in place so that individuals can make sure the information on all their credit reports is correct and up to date.

The free annual credit reports can be requested on the official website [www.AnnualCreditReport.com](http://www.AnnualCreditReport.com), through the mail using the request form, or by phone toll free at 1-877-322-8228. You can choose to order one, two, or all three reports at the same time.

Visitors to the official website never need to share any credit card or payment information to get the annual free credit report. Note that Federal law does not include access to a free credit score with your report. A credit reporting bureau may choose to provide a free credit score, or they may offer to sell you an optional credit score online.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the three major credit reporting bureaus also offer free weekly online credit reports through April 2022. The weekly free reports can be ordered online only through the official website: [www.AnnualCreditReport.com](http://www.AnnualCreditReport.com).

"People are sometimes surprised to find out that no one is monitoring your credit report for mistakes, old information that should be removed, or even signs of identity theft," says Peggy Olive, UW-Madison financial capability. "Checking a credit report for accuracy is completely up to each

individual."

When ordering a free credit report, you will be asked for private information, including your Social Security Number, birthdate, and address. Ordering a credit report online also includes security questions, such as previous addresses or loans. If you do not answer the security questions correctly, you will be denied online access to your report. You can then order a report over the phone or by mail in a written request form. Sometimes the credit reporting bureaus will ask you to mail in copies of specific documents to make sure you are who you say you are.

People who use an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) instead of a Social Security Number must use the official credit report request form to order their report through the mail.

The "Check Your Free Credit Report: 2/2, 6/6, 10/10" campaign from the University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension wants to make it easier to remember to order those free credit reports. Anyone can sign up to receive an email reminder from Extension three times a year — on 2/2, 6/6, and 10/10 — on the campaign's website: <https://finances.extension.wisc.edu/programs/check-your-free-credit-report-campaign/>. More than 1,300 Wisconsinites from 71 counties have already signed up for email reminders.

"For some people, the free weekly credit reports provide added reassurance since it's better to discover an error yourself than to have a creditor find

it first," adds Olive. "If keeping up with weekly credit reports sounds overwhelming, I'd encourage you to sign up for our reminder emails to at least check your free reports every four months."

### Reviewing Your Credit Report

Once you have your credit report, be sure the information is accurate. Several of the credit reporting bureaus have taken steps in the past few years to help the free credit reports, also called consumer disclosure statements, to be more user-friendly and easier to understand.

Some information will be easy to review, such as your name, address, or possibly a current employer. Other information can be more confusing. Sometimes a loan may switch hands between creditors, such as a mortgage changing servicers, and the original loan will appear as closed with the new creditor listing the same loan as open. Student loans from the same lender will be posted individually on your credit report each time you take out a loan, even though you only make one payment to the same lender.

In addition to email reminders and links to credit resources, the Extension "2/2, 6/6, 10/10" campaign website provides information for ordering, reading, and understanding your free credit reports. You can also find out how to place a free credit freeze or fraud alert on your credit reports and whether that's the right decision for you.


## Kewaskum Football Beats Waupun

The Kewaskum Indians celebrated Senior Night with a return to the WIAA Playoffs with a 54-0 win over Waupun on Friday, Oct. 8. The win raised Kewaskum's record to 6-2 overall (4-2 in ECC play), ensuring the Indians will be included next week when the playoff pairings are released.

Seniors led the way during the final regular season home game at Doc Mitchell. Quarterback Matt Buechel got the scoring started with a 10-yard touchdown run, and Andrew Bolek made it 7-0 Indians with 10:23 left in the first quarter.

Senior defensive back Damareyon Taylor stopped a methodical and time-consuming drive by the visitors as he picked the Waupun quarterback deep in the corner of the end zone. Two plays later, Max Melzer took off down the visiting sideline for a 91-yard touchdown run. Bolek again added the extra point, and it was 14-0 home team.

After another time-consuming drive by the visiting team, the Indians went on to explode for 34 points in the final seven minutes of the second quarter. I was probably most inspired to teach by my high school physical education teacher — Mr. Randy Erion. He was also a football and track coach of mine.




While we did put together a good record in terms of wins and losses, I am more proud of the other successes we have seen from the program I helped lead.




