Kewaskum Teen Wins Olympic Speed Skating Trial, will Compete in Beijing Winter Games

Jordan Stolz, 17, broke the 1000m track record at Milwaukee's Pettit National Ice Center

A Kewaskum-area teenager, Jordan Stolz, 17, was thrust into the national spotlight the evening of Jan. 6 and into the morning of Jan. 7 after the long track speed skater won the 1000m race at the U.S. Olympic Speed Skating Trials in Milwaukee at the Pettit National Ice Center the night of the sixth.

Stolz, whose 1:07.62 on Pettit ice was better than Shani Davis' former record, qualified for the U.S. Olympic speed skating team and, as a result, he will travel to Beijing, China to compete in the 2022 Winter Olympic Games.

Stolz will become the third-youngest American male to compete in long track speed skating in U.S. Olympics history.

The Town of Wayne resident was already on Beijing time, and could not be reached for comment before this publication. Check back in next week's paper for more on Jordan Stolz.

Cougars and Lions To Meet on Mats and Reignite Historic, Dormant Rivalry

Campbellsport wrestling returns to the Flyway Conference, and a Jan. 20 dual at Lomira will be the marquee event of the Flyway season

For the first time since 2009, the Campbellsport Cougars and Lomira Lions will wrestle one another in Lomira's "Den" on Thursday, Jan. 20, with the first match scheduled for 7 p.m.

The last time these two teams met, Campbellsport was running roughshod through the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC); Campbellsport left the Flyway Conference after the 1999 season, and the Cougars won five conference titles in the EWC before moving, again, to the East Central Conference (ECC) where they won three more titles.

"From 1971 to 1999, Campbellsport won 29 straight Flyway Conference titles and never lost a dual in the conference," shared retired Lomira head coach David Meyer. "Lomira did not beat Campbellsport in a dual or in a tournament until after they left the conference."

Once the Cougars left, however, Lomira became the powerhouse of the Flyway, and without their neighbors in blue and gold taking up the

top spot, Lomira has won or shared 20 of the last 22 conference titles.

With Campbellsport's return to the Flyway this season, the power structure of the conference is now, on paper, a two-team race between two programs that have regularly sent individuals to the WIAA State Tournament.


Lomira, having never been able to topple their Goliath in the form of CHS wrestling, has the chance to beat the Cougars in a conference dual for the first time ever at next week's dual.

Campbellsport, having never lost to Lomira since both programs' founding, will hope to keep things that way.

Even though more than one decade has passed since the two teams faced off, to those close to each team, it will feel like nothing once the first match finally begins on Jan. 20. After all, this rivalry spans decades, with seminal figures to the sport having represented both sides and it all starts in the 1960s with a then-inexperienced coach in Campbellsport.

That coach was Gerald "Sarge" Marking, who passed away last summer, and who was honored by the program after print time at a home dual

State of the Parks

Volunteer work at the Campbellsport parks in 2021 was limited due to the road construction in our community.

Early this spring, we continued the cleanup of the debris left from the removal of ash trees from our parks. Cleanup was done in Fireman's Park and Columbus Parc and a new brush pile was created at Columbus Parc. We also trimmed damaged areas of trees along the hiking trail at Columbus Parc and removed dead trees in this park.

All of the trees transplanted from the Village Nursery survived the first winter in their new locations. We did lose about six trees that we purchased from local nurseries. A deer took care of one of these, and the others showed some life, but didn't survive our summer months even with watering by the village employees. At least two of these trees should

be replaced because of their location in the park.

The volunteers who did the cleanup were Dan Boldt, Tom Dickman, Mike Hayes, Tom Kapfenstein, Curt Kissinger, Jerry Raether, Chris Schannen, Bill Schill, Rick Straub and Pat Twohig; a special thanks to Dan, Curt and Chris who supplied chainsaws to make the debris small enough for us to handle.

Three trees were moved in Columbus Parc to replace dead trees and improve sight lines in the park and some new trees were added. Rick Heisler, Tim Gellings, Jim Peterson and Tucker Wolf did the work on this part of the project. Equipment for this work was supplied by Jeff Lindsley and Bart Welch.

As a part of the work on County Highway Y, the county added a culvert east of the bridge and installed an asphalt path from the parking lot to the underpass at the bridge. This will eliminate the wash outs

that occur to the trail in this area.

In addition, the county will be supplying funding, and possibly labor, to improve the balance of the hiking trail. We need to improve the drainage along the trail and lower some of the existing culverts. Currently, there are a few areas where the trail is washed out and very uneven and improving the drainage will make the trail usable for more months of the year.

In 2022, we hope to continue to remove debris and dead trees from Columbus Parc. We still have six trees in the Village Nursery and the Campbellsport School District has a supply of trees we can move by supplying some trees to school properties.

The amount of tree activity is dependent on the funding available and our first priority will be to improve the trail.

There are still many places we would like to plant trees, so memorial trees can be arranged.



Library to Celebrate 100 Year Anniversary

The Campbellsport Public Library would like to invite you to join us in celebrating a special milestone. This year we are celebrating 100 wonderful years of being a part of this community! Join us on Friday, Jan. 21, for coffee, water and cookies to celebrate this momentous occasion.

Due to this special occasion, we would like to share a little history about the library with you. In the early years the public library was located in the home of Mr. Johnstone Weld, 203 E. Main St., and started as a project of the Mother's Club. On January 19, 1922, the Campbellsport Community Center Public Library was established above the First State Bank, 101 W. Main St. by Albert Schwandt, high school director, and George R. McKenny, high school principal. After four years at that location, in 1926 it was moved to the Campbellsport Mutual Fire Insurance Co., 146 E. Main St. In 1931 the library was moved to the Campbellsport Village Hall, which was located at 177 E. Main St., on the second floor of the building. This building was torn down and replaced by a new village hall in 1953.

A library room was included in the new building on the Northeast corner. In 1972 the library was moved to a room on the Southwest corner, formerly used by the village board as its meeting room. In September of 1996 a referendum for a new library was passed. Ground was broken in April of 1997 at the new site on North Helena St., and most of the construction was finished by September of that year. When it came to moving all the books, the majority of them were moved by the library users, as they participated in "Take Ten," a program where the users checked out 10 or more items at the old location and delivered them to the new Library after the move. This enabled the "moving" volunteers to complete the remainder of the move in one Saturday. The new library opened for business in November of 1997. The lower level meeting rooms were built and ready for public use in the fall of 2003. At this time, the Campbellsport Public Library owns more than 40,000 items for patrons to borrow. As a member of the Winne Fox Library System our users have access to well over a million items through inter-library loan program. We love being a part of this community and hope to continue being here for our patrons and friends for another 100 years!



Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol Launches New Website

The Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol, whose mission is to empower older adults to prevent health care fraud in Wisconsin, has launched a new website at www.smpwi.org to make the organization more accessible to the older adult population.

"Medicare fraud, abuse, and errors are a huge problem, and Medicare recipients are constantly being targeted," said Ingrid Kunding, project manager for Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol. "It's our job to help Wisconsin Medicare beneficiaries and their advocates prevent, detect, and report health care fraud, abuse, and errors."

Kunding said that the new website – made possible by a grant from the U.S. Administration for Community Living, Department of Health and Human Services – has been in development

for many months and is now available as a resource for anyone in Wisconsin.

"Sometimes people are afraid to admit that they've fallen victim to a fraud, but believe me, they are not alone," Kunding said. "That's why we're here. If you're worried that you may have given your Medicare number to the wrong person, or you see something suspicious on your Medicare statement, we're here to help." Kunding said that in addition to the website, Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol has a confidential, toll-free helpline at 888-818-2611, as well as a presence on Facebook and LinkedIn.

The Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol program is housed at the Greater Wisconsin Agency on Aging Resources.

We learned about the resources offered to job seekers, how to maneuver through the website and assist anyone needing help with finding a job in Wisconsin. This training was funded through a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program. Partners include the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI), public libraries and their supporting systems, the Wisconsin Library Association (WLA), the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development (DWD), and Wisconsin’s Workforce Development Boards. The Campbellsport Village Board will continue to discuss the possibility of a village administrator during a special meeting January 16. In the November election, the voters supported a referendum allowing the village to create the position of a village administrator. This referendum only allows the village to create the position, it does not mandate that the village create the position or hire an administrator. It was in a public meeting of the CARE group that people first brought up the idea of a village administrator. The village board then agreed to put a referendum question on the November ballot to see what the residents of the village felt about the idea.

Demolition has begun on the main portion of the former St. Joseph Convent Building in Campbellsport. All the windows were taken out, along with much of the interior materials, leaving the shell of the building. The crew started working on this part of the demolition on January 9. The convent closed two years ago with all of the residents who were living there transferred to Milwaukee locations owned by the School Sisters of St. Francis. The School Sisters of St. Francis had its beginnings in Campbellsport and kept a presence in the community until the closing of this building in spring of 2015.

Nine-year-old Ian Janz was up at 4:30 a.m., ready to compete in a chess tournament last Saturday. The young chess player has been practicing his chess moves after school when he meets with other members of the chess club at St. Lucas Lutheran School in Kewaskum. He even took lessons from a high school chess master last summer. All of Ian's hard work paid off. The St. Lucas fifth grader placed first out of the players in fourth through sixth grade at the tournament. The chess club was formed last year, but Saturday was the first time St. Lucas hosted a chess tournament.

January 18, 2007**

Over 140 Scott Township residents gathered to vote on the future of the township's community center, formerly known as The Hilltop in Batavia. Looking to justify spending money on upkeep and updates, town supervisors put the fate of the building to a vote of the electorate. Public comment was almost completely in favor of keeping the facility. Many different ideas were introduced, including developing a community committee to oversee and promote the facility. After the discussion ceased, there were 134 ballots given to electors - 107 yes votes meant keeping the community center and the 22 votes against meant the voters were in favor of selling the community center. A clear plan was not discussed but it is believed the town board will go forward with budgeting money to keep the building in good standing.



The Kewaskum girls basketball team brought in some talented teams for their holiday tournament on December 29 and 30, with Milwaukee Rufus King, West Bend West, Beaver Dam and the host Lady Indians all vying for the top spot.

The Indians opened up with a 6-1 Milwaukee Rufus King squad.

Junior Morgan Adams jump-started the team early with two long distance three pointers, and junior Julia Steger added nine first-half points to gain an early double-digit advantage.

The defensive pressure forced numerous turnovers and helped Kewaskum jump out to a 31-13 half-time lead.

Kewaskum put it into cruise control during the second half, as junior Madi Dogs started getting going, and the Indians did a fantastic job getting to the free throw line – Kewaskum made it to the charity strip a season-high 45 times in this game.

Dogs finished with 16, Adams

scored 15 and Steger chipped in 11 for a 62-43 team victory.

The championship game featured a highly-ranked Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Division 2 Beaver Dam squad that has been a powerhouse in the state for the past several years. This was by far the biggest challenge the Indians have faced this season.

Beaver Dam center Gabby Wilke – the tournament Most Valuable Player – got off to a hot start with two triples to help the Beavers jump out to a quick 8-0 lead.

The Campbellsport wrestling team traveled to Cedar Grove January 8 and participated in the Rocket Scramble, taking sixth place out of 16 teams. All 10 of the Cougar wrestlers placed in the top eight, and Drake Muellenbach and Ostin Blanchard each brought home titles.

At 120 pounds, Muellenbach (27-2) started the day with a bye and then notched his 100th career varsity win by pinning Spencer Siezewski of Southern Door in 1:49. In the gold bracket, Muellenbach would dominate, pinning all three of his opponents including ninth-ranked Trent Nicklaus of Brillion. Muellenbach finish the day a perfect 5-0.

At 126 pounds, Blanchard (26-0) also started the day with a bye and then a pinned his next opponent to get in the gold bracket. Blanchard would knock off sixth-ranked Jake Shaver of Sheboygan Falls his first match (10-5) and then would pin his next two opponents to, also, finish 5-0 on the day. on Jan. 13.

Marking began the tradition of excellence at CHS in 1966, after earning a first-season record of 4-5. Despite the losing record in his inaugural year as coach, Marking, who had never wrestled and knew nothing about the sport when he accepted the position as head coach, never looked back.

Marking's teams were conference champs for 23 consecutive years; the first three won in the Scenic Moraine Conference and 20 more in the Flyway Conference. In 1979, the Cougars placed second in their first WIAA Class B State Championships and won in 1980.

Meanwhile, further west on 67, Lomira's wrestling program was developed in 1968; two years after Campbellsport's was founded. While the Cougars were gaining momentum, the Lions struggled in their first decade.

Meyer replaced Dick Field as head coach after one year as an unpaid assistant in 1979.

"Wrestling didn't come easy at first," Meyer said. "The first year we had a losing record and no individuals in the conference finals. That first year, I was learning a lot about structuring practices and wrestling technique."

In addition to participating in coaching clinics and wrestling camps, Meyer learned a lot from his brother Bob who was a 1976 state champion and wrestler for UW-Madison. He also had the advantage of observing two other successful area coaches, Larry Marcionda of Fond Du Lac and, of course, Marking.

These two future Wisconsin Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame members were the catalysts in creating the ongoing rivalry between these schools.

"The biggest hump we had to overcome was developing wrestlers good enough to qualify for the state meet," Meyer said. "It hadn't happened in the first 10 years under coach Field, and it hadn't happened in my

first eight years."

In the '87-'88 season, Lomira finally saw three wrestlers qualify for state and, three years later, Ryan Mielkie became their first state champion.

Lomira's luck was beginning to change.

The Lions were nipping at the heels of the Cougars for years; from 1982-1999, Lomira placed second behind Campbellsport 10 times in the conference.

In 1995, Mark Peterson took Marking's place as head coach for the Cougars, and in 1997, Dan Heisdorf, current co-head coach, joined the program as an assistant coach.

The rivalry between these two schools was going strong until Campbellsport moved to the EWC in 2000, and for more than the last 20 years, Campbellsport has been out of the Flyway; the Cougars spent around 14 years in the EWC and another seven in the ECC.

In the time away,

like Marking had done before him, Peterson earned his 300th win, and the Cougars earned their 500th program win. They also earned 18 conference titles before Peterson's retirement in 2019, making the current total 41 for Campbellsport.

With the Cougars out of the way, the Lions were able to shine.

On top of the 20 conference title wins, the Lions won the team sectional in 2005 and 2017 and were the team state runner-up in 2005 and team state qualifier in 2017.

Despite the success in the other conferences, Heisdorf said, "I think we feel back home in the Flyway."

He and co-head coach Alex Costello have heard from other coaches this season that they felt Campbellsport always belonged in the Flyway.

Even Heisdorf and Costello's chief rival, Lomira head coach Jon Marx, was happy to see the blue-and-gold back

in-conference.

"It is great to have Campbellsport back in the Flyway," said Marx. "Traditionally, Lomira and Campbellsport have had a great rivalry. Having that rivalry and competition back in our conference can only make us and our conference better."

Dave Meyer mirrored that sentiment.

"I see it as a very good thing," he said. "Working harder to be competitive with Campbellsport was what first helped build the success of our program. Now, we travel all over the state, seeking good competition for our wrestlers to challenge them and hone their skills. With the renewal of this rivalry, I see both teams benefiting."

So far this season, both teams have performed as expected, with the possibility of a team state appearance never too far out of reach, and the high likelihood of at least one state qualifier from

both schools making the trip to Madison.

"Our current season is going well," Marx said. "We are fairly young on the varsity level, but we are improving every day and learning every tournament."

Costello said the same of his Cougars.

"Guys are stepping up to the plate for duals and putting the team on their back in certain occasions," he said.

The stakes will be high for both teams when they face each other once again, and it is likely that whichever team emerges victorious will be the frontrunner to win the whole conference come February.

For Campbellsport, the undefeated bragging rights will be something to watch, as the Cougars are determined to keep their perfect 209-0 dual record running in the Flyway.

"The boys... They are ready for it," Costello said. "They have been

thinking about it since they knew we were coming to the Flyway."

Meanwhile, Lomira has won 12 consecutive conference titles, and they are working toward number 13.

"The upcoming dual with Campbellsport will be a great one," Marx said. "Campbellsport has a very strong team, and we will have to wrestle very well to beat them."

For Costello, he knows that the buck doesn't stop at the dual, either.

"We are going to have a dog fight at the dual, we are going to have a dog fight at the conference tournament and then we are going to have a dog fight for the regional title," Costello said. "Granted everybody stays healthy, it should be very close."

"No pressure," joked Heisdorf.

The Campbellsport/Lomira wrestling dual will be held in The Den at Lomira on Thursday, Jan. 20, with the first match scheduled for 7 p.m.


