## Local Bowler has Run at 900, Bowls Consecutive 300 Games

On March 7, at King Pin Bowl and Ale House in West Bend, Jeff Scannell was bowling with his regular league.

But this would not be a regular round.

Right from the start of the game, Scannell was on fire.

“I didn’t really feel any pressure,” he recalled. “I just kept my focus.”

As the strikes kept on coming, Scannell did what most bowlers only dream to in their life: Roll a 300.

The celebration of that feat, however, quickly turned into anticipation of another 300 game, as Scannell continued his torrid pace. As the second game’s 10 frames came to a close, Scannell was, again, looking down the lanes and hoping to complete his 24th consecutive strike for a 600 (back-to-back 300 games).

And, down those pins went.

“I had 27 strikes in a row but wasn’t expecting anything when the streak started,” he said, looking back at the accomplishment. Strikes 25-27 came in game three’s first three frames. Scannell’s “turkey” meant he was just nine more strikes away from a 900 three-game set.

Hoping for a “perfect score,” Scannell ended up

falling just short of his goal, finishing with 825.

Even though he didn’t bowl a 900, he said this was by far his best performance.

At the end of three games, Scannell totaled 33 strikes out of a possible 36 and had two final scores of 300 (back-to-back).

As Scannell was bowling, word got out that he was on a roll. Scannell said folks came over to watch, as it is not often that you see someone bowl that many strikes in a row.

Scannell was just points away from breaking the King Pin house record of 855.

The Kewaskum High School alum said he currently averages 233 points-per-game and hopes to continue to improve.

“Within the last six years, I have gotten a lot better,” he said. “I have had 17 game scores of 300 and seven overall scores of 800.”

About 15 years ago, the now-avid bowler found his passion within the sport. Scannell stated that he tries to bowl at least twice per week.

“You can be really good at something if you put the time into it. I came from zero and wasn’t good at all when I first started,” said Scannell. “It is a fun game. There is individual and team competition which creates a drive to improve. I feel that I am still on the incline of my bowling career.”

Aside from the competition, Scannell expressed that he likes the atmosphere at the bowling alley.

At the Kewaskum village board meeting on Monday, March 21, board members made the difficult decision to close the Kiwanis Pond for the summer of 2022.

Several members of the board expressed that this was not an easy decision to make, but the village did not receive any notice of interest in the supervisor or lifeguard positions.

Effort was put into advertising the open positions for this summer, including reaching out to surrounding facilities for help, but ultimately not enough potential employees were found to staff the pond.

The village will be saving the money that was designated to the pond for the summer of 2022. It was stated that around \$60,000, on average, goes



**Charles Henry Van de Zande**



Charles Henry Van de Zande passed away on March 20, 2022, two days before his 93rd birthday.

He was born in Columbia Hospital, Milwaukee, on March 22, 1929, and raised in Campbellsport. He graduated from Campbellsport High School in 1947 where he lettered in three sports.

He graduated from Lawrence College (now University) in 1951 with the combined major physics/math. During the summers, while in high school and college, he worked at Mauthe Lake State Forest. After college, he enlisted in the US Air Force.

While in the Air Force, he met and married Paulette Douglas Chambers from Hampton, VA. He received an honorable discharge from the Air Force as a 2nd Lt. In 1953.

He worked for RCA as a semiconductor design engineer, in Somerville, NJ, for 10 years. While at RCA, he earned a Master of Science degree in Applied Statistics from Rutgers.

He worked for IBM as a Quality and Reliability Engineer in East Fishkill, NY, from 1963 to 1978, and at the Research Triangle Park in Durham, NC, from 1978 to 1996. After retiring from IBM, he taught for 15 years in the Industrial Engineering Department at NC A&T State University. During this period, he was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to teach statistics at the University of Mauritius for one year.

He was a leader in the Boy Scouts, both as a youth and as an adult. His public service was 11 years in the Bay Leaf Volunteer Fire Department and 13 years in the NC Search and Rescue Dog Association. He co-founded several long-distance foot races and the summer track series in the Poughkeepsie, NY, area. He was a competitive long-distance runner and completed 26 marathons.

He had a life-long love of playing music and played the trumpet in several big bands and concert bands, including the Greensboro Big Band and Concert Band. In later years, he taught himself to play several stringed instruments, the concertina and keyboards.

He was a member of "Math Nerds," an early online community that helped students solve mathematical problems.

In his waning years, he lived at Abbotswood at Irving Park, Greensboro, NC, for about six years where he participated in theater and chorus, and served on several committees. In 2019, he moved to Brookdale Chambrel Williamsburg, Virginia, where he was involved with bridge, chess and music programs, and he loved showing off his knowledge in trivia games and challenges.

He is survived by his wife, Paulette Van de Zande; son, Derrik (Sandy) Van de Zande; daughter, Jeanette (Keith) Navia; daughter, Elaine (Stanley) Van de Zande Schwartz; daughter, Mary (John) Kramer; granddaughter, Georgia Dawn Van de Zande; and grandson, Charles Ty Van de Zande; brother, Steve Van de Zande of Tucson AZ; and nephew, Timothy Van de Zande.

Charles' son, Charles "Douglas" (Linda) Van de Zande predeceased him.

At his request, there will be no service. The Cremation Society of Virginia assisted with arrangements.



# Lizard Mound County Park is Now Lizard Mound State Park

Washington County's Natural Resources Department announced that this spring, Lizard Mound County Park, will be a State Park – Lizard Mound State Park. In October, the state Natural Resources Board officially approved the re-deeding of Lizard Mound. For the past 35 years, the county has successfully operated and maintained the park for public enjoyment, helping to improve the public experience of Native American effigy mounds. This park also has its own entry in the National Register of Historic Places.

In 2020, the County Board of Supervisors authorized the transition of Lizard Mound County Park back to the State of Wisconsin after reviewing the long-term management plans for the park and recognizing our limitations on caring appropriately for the effigy mounds.

"It is our hope that the State Department of Natural Resources will consider our work with the Milwaukee Audubon Society in developing a viable public-private partnership with the appropriate archeological expertise and ecological restoration capabilities to care for the mounds,"

said Chief Community Development Officer Jamie Ludovic. "We look forward to assisting the state during this transition as they concentrate on getting Lizard Mound State Park open and maintained this season for the enjoyment of Our Great Community."

### 4K Enrollment for Campbellsport School District Open

Campbellsport School District enrollment is open for the 2022-2023 school year. The registration process is completed online. If you do not have access to a computer, please stop at the school office for assistance. Please register your child for school if he or

she is 4 years old on or before September 1, 2022, to attend 4K in the 2022-2023 school year; 5 years old on or before September 1, 2022, to attend kindergarten in the 2022-2023 school year. Questions may be directed to the Campbellsport Elementary School office at 920-533-8032 or Eden Elementary School office at 920-477-3291. Register at the school where your child will be attending according to attendance boundaries. If you have special circumstances that do not allow you to follow these guidelines, please call the school office. The boundaries are as follows:

- Eden Elementary – The Eden Elementary attendance area shall include the Village of Eden and Towns of Byron, Eden, Osceola, Mitchell, Empire, Forest and Greenbush.

- Campbellsport Elementary – The Campbellsport Elementary attendance area shall include the Village of Campbellsport and Towns of Ashford and Auburn. Students living on Sunset Drive, which runs along the borders of the towns of Eden and Ashford, shall attend Campbellsport Elementary.

## Washington County to Receive Federal Funding for Body and Squad Cameras

After nearly a year of collaboration and support from U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), Washington County Sheriff's Office will receive a \$377,000 grant for obtaining the necessary hardware and data storage for body-worn cameras for sheriff's deputies, as well as dash cameras for squad cars.

"Funding this much-needed equipment is an example of bi-partisanship action," said County Executive Josh Schoemann. "Rather than tagging Washington County taxpayers with this expensive but necessary cost, the procurement of this earmark shares the cost with taxpayers nationwide, many of whom travel through and visit our county. I'm very proud of our team and its working relationship with Senator Baldwin, who got the Senate to pass the funding, which was ultimately signed by President Biden."

County Sheriff Martin Schulteis stated, "Body cameras allow the community to see exactly what the officers are doing and promote transparency with the public we serve. Cameras improve both officer performance and civilian conduct; individuals act differently when they know they are being recorded."

According to Schulteis, there are many advantages to this technology. Body worn cameras bolster accountability. By having interactions between officers and the public recorded, both are held accountable for their actions during the encounter. Allegations of excessive force, officer misconduct and citizen complaints can be proven,

or disproven, after reviewing camera footage.

Body worn cameras also record events and dialogue exactly as they happen and provide an impartial account to law enforcement and the public alike. Additionally, an area that is often overlooked is the training and development of deputies. While reviewing footage, deputies can identify areas of needed improvement including tactics, interview techniques, de-escalation, interpersonal skills, etc.

Now that the President has signed the bill, the Senate and House Appropriations Committees will provide relevant agencies with a list of projects funded as Congressionally Directed Spending requests. Agencies are then required to produce an application that recipients must complete. After the application is completed and approved by the agency, processing of the funding can begin. All equipment will be installed in 2022.

after the covid-19 punch in the face that the world took and hopefully is getting past.



# Cleaning Up Your 'Nesses'

Our generation is, arguably, the most prosperous, blessed, well-fed, cared-for, medically and technologically advanced to ever live. And, yet, depression and anxiety have been at all-time highs (even before covid!)

The world has been through difficult times in centuries past – pandemics, social upheavals, severe economic downturns, and international conflicts, yet now we seem to be more stressed than ever before.

Why?

To quote Captain Jack Sparrow, “The problem is not the problem. The problem is your attitude about the problem.”

Mindset.

We talked last week about how feelings of uneasiness, tension and anxiety can come from the “stress hormones” released during unexpected events or changes in routine. They’re also released in response to a perceived disaster or threat – and that perception is controlled by your mind.

If you can change your mind, you can actually change the way your body responds to potentially stressful events.

This is literally mind over matter!

This week, I want to share with you several “ness-es” your mind gets into, and how you can clean up those “ness-es.”

The first “-ness” is a feeling of **uncontrollable-ness**. Uncontrollable situations like an economic downturn, political unrest or a chronic medical condition can make us feel hopeless.

Start cleaning up this “-ness” by establishing daily routines – most importantly, a morning routine.

Whether it’s exercise, journaling, or reading a book with a warm mug of tea, doing a thing consistently first thing every day can help you feel more grounded and in control, which greatly reduces feelings of anxiety and tension.

Pro tip: don’t start by catching up on the daily headlines on your phone. That kind of “doom scrolling” only increases those hopeless feelings!

The next “-ness” is **disconnected-ness**. Surveys and research show that people in our culture feel more isolated and lonely than ever. We have more social media “friends,” but fewer meaningful relationships.

Without in-person social interaction, people easily give in to feelings of loneliness or anxiety, so start cleaning up this “-ness” with a little “friend therapy.” Get together with someone for coffee, a game of cards, or a walk around the neighborhood. Don’t wait for someone to come to you – take the initiative and reach out! Chances are, the other person is in need of social contact, too. “Iron sharpens iron!”

A third “-ness” is **overwhelmed-ness** about the number of things you have to do or a lack of personal “down” time. Missing deadlines, running late, or always having “too much on your plate” can make you feel unproductive, unimportant or undeserving.

To beat these feelings and help clean up this “-ness,” try using a to-do list app that helps you organize and prioritize important or urgent tasks. In addition, know when your “best” times of the day are – when you feel most energetic or “in the groove” – and schedule tasks then. You might be surprised at how much you can accomplish during your “peak times!”

Many well-intentioned folks with “too much on their plate” keep piling things on, which can increase those unproductive, overwhelmed feelings. Don’t be afraid to say “no.” Admitting that you can’t do everything can actually help you feel more empowered and lower your levels of stress.

The last “-ness” we’re cleaning up is **unfocused-ness**. Highly stressed people commonly feel a lack of focus, which can make even basic tasks seem beyond you.

Clean up this “-ness” by cleaning up a mess! Decluttering your environment goes a long way toward helping you feel focused and in-control. Make your bed, every morning, and get dressed all the way to your shoes – even if you have nowhere to go.

Clean out the sink! Wash that pile of dishes, and scrub the sink sparkling clean. Then do one thing “all the way.” Clean out your car, purse, wallet, or coat closet. Organize your desk. Read a full chapter of a book. Finishing just one thing can completely change your mind about how productive and focused you’re actually able to be.

Staying aware of your negative tendencies gives you the opportunity to “take every thought captive,” becoming more objective and positive in any situation. Remember that we don’t decide our future: we decide our habits, and our habits determine our future.

The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

**Information to Voters**

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification\*
- sign the poll book\*\*

\*If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

\*\*If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt".

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

**Assistance for Voting**

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

**Where Optical Scan Voting is Used**

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

**After Voting the Ballot**

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter may insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

**Spoiling Ballots**

If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.


