## Kewaskum Village Sewer Rates to Increase, GFL to Begin Garbage Collection

*Using a two-phase approach, the village plans to raise sewer rates by 22.2 percent by July 2023*

The Village of Kewaskum Board of Trustees met on Monday, May 16.

During the committee reports, the board discussed the bump-outs on Main Street and if it was necessary to remove them or to leave as is. Bump-outs are extensions of the curb on both sides of pedestrian crossings, making the cross walk shorter.

In discussion, it was deemed necessary to keep the bump-outs in place. It was also stated that it would be a liability for the village if they were to be removed.

Members of the board agreed to move forward with the Main Street Redevelopment Project without removing the bump outs.

Next, the future Shared Facilities Building was a topic of conversation at the meeting, and the board stated that it will have a closed-session meeting wherein trustees would listen to proposals and presentations by four different development firms. The board will then determine which of the four bids they want to move forward with for the project.

A sewer rate study was discussed and the

board approved the motion to increase sewer rates starting July 1, 2022. A phased approach will be put in place to increase the rates over a span of two years. Phase one was approved and there will be an 11.1 percent increase beginning this July. The second part of the phase is set to take place in 2023 and will add an additional 11.1 percent to the sewer rate, creating a total of a 22.2 percent increase.

The second phase has not yet been formally approved by the board and was not included in the May 16 resolution that was approved.

Discussion and action was taken on the garbage collection contract with GFL Environmental Inc.

As was previously reported, the village is switching from the services of Waste Management to GFL. The village approved a contract with GFL which will run until 2027.

GFL will begin their garbage collection services on July 1, 2022.

All village residents will be receiving new carts before July. Residents will be provided with one cart and can receive another at an additional cost.

It should be noted that garbage pickup will change to Tuesdays starting in July. Recyclables will continue to be picked up on a bi-weekly ba-

What's the first car you ever drove? Everybody remembers the first vehicle they owned. Mine was a 1965 Dodge Coronet 500. But the first one I drove isn't forgotten because I was 10 years old at the time. And the car? My grandfather Martin Gloede's 1954 Chevrolet BelAire.

Perhaps it is only the perspective of that age. But the thing, a blue behemoth with a white roof seemed as huge as a tank. The kind of jalopy it took a strong man to handle.

My grandfather bought it for \$800 from Schill Motors in Campbellsport. When the salesman asked how he intended to pay, his jaw must've nearly hit the ground when grandpa whipped out a roll of bills and counted out the price in cash.

When he visited, he swerved over into the left or passing lane to turn into our driveway. This was because the car didn't have power steering.

My grandfather passed away in the summer of 1969. My older brother Lee inherited the car but to make the deal legal, paid the princely sum of \$1.

Bored one late autumn day, he decided to teach me how to drive. He jammed the seat forward and I was tall enough to see over the steering wheel so we didn't need a telephone book boost.

That day he did the shifting. The lever was up on the steering column but I clutched and accelerated/braked. Back and forth we went, from one end of the long driveway to the other. Lee patiently restarted the engine every time I popped the clutch pedal out too fast. I think we drove our neighbor, Mrs. Gasner crazy with wonder at why we kept going back and forth. Till she came alongside and spotted the runt behind the wheel. Something she probably never forgot. I never will.

## Exercise and the Aging Athlete

You are an athlete.

No, really!

Now, before you shake your head, have a chuckle and tell your friends that this Roy guy maybe isn't as smart as you first imagined, bear with me for a minute.

Cars have wheels, seats and an engine and are designed to move quickly from place to place.

But, a car that only drives slowly is still a car. If it breaks down and needs parts, it's still a car. Even if it sits in a garage and doesn't drive at all, it's still a car. No matter how old it gets, it's still a car.

An athlete has a body, a heart and a brain, and is designed to move: You are made to be an athlete.

If you don't get around as much or as quickly as you used to, you're still an athlete.

Maybe you were injured and have some after-market parts. Heck, maybe you're held together with chicken wire and Bondo.

You're still an athlete.

Because, they're designed for movement, cars that sit around too much actually break down faster: belts, hoses, gaskets and seals can get stiff and crack, causing wear or damage. Fluids intended to circulate can break down, losing their effectiveness. Batteries can slowly lose energy, making it harder to even start the car.

As an athlete designed for movement, sitting around can wreak havoc on your system, too: joint-cushioning cartilage can get stiff and brittle as under-worked fluids break down, increasing risk of injury. Bones

can weaken, making falls more severe. Energy levels gradually diminish, making it harder to get up and moving again.

Keeping your inner athlete on the bench affects mood and muscles, bones and blood sugar, hypertension and heart attacks, joint pain and weight gain. Retire that athlete permanently, and your risk of dying early goes up as much as 60%.

Speaking of retiring, I want to address the more mature population out there – the "aging athletes" (and, at 51, I'm including myself, here). An old car is still a car, even as an aging athlete is still an athlete. However, you can't treat a classic car the same as the latest model: there are physical changes our bodies experience as they age that make it necessary to adjust how you approach exercise.

Starting as early as our late 40s, testosterone and estrogen levels go down while levels of stress hormones go up (an effect that can be three times higher for women!). We lose bone and muscle mass – as much as one to two percent every year after age 50, and our agility, balance and coordination decline.

Our bodies don't recover as well as they used to, so high intensity workouts open us up to greater risk of injury and can further increase stress hormones, resulting in inflammation and other problems (see my March 24 and March 31 articles on stress at [dodgecountypioneer.com](http://dodgecountypioneer.com) for more info).

So, how should the aging athlete approach exercise?

**First, be a muscle car, not a hot rod.**

Low to moderate intensity strength training helps preserve muscle you have and can even

help build muscle tone and density. This pays huge dividends for the aging athlete by improving hormones, blood sugar, metabolism, and self-confidence.

**Second, watch the extended road trips.**

Tons of cardio might work great for younger people, but can backfire in older athletes by spiking stress hormone levels and increasing risk of overuse injuries. Unless you're training for an endurance event like a half marathon, 20 to 30 minutes of cardio exercise several days per week is ideal.

**Third, keep your chassis tuned up, balanced and aligned.**

Incorporating balance and agility exercises into your weekly routine can help you avoid falls. Stretching every day and after each workout helps to improve mobility and reduce joint pain and stiffness.

**Lastly, keep your insurance and registration current.**

Many health insurance plans offer fitness incentives, and some even offer free gym memberships and exercise classes through programs like "SilverSneakers", "Silver & Fit" or "RenewActive" (check with the TAG Center in Mayville to see whether you qualify).

Above all, make "regular maintenance" a habit.

Remember, we don't decide our future: We decide our habits, and our habits determine our future.

## Click It or Ticket Enforcement Continues

As the summer travel season approaches, Wisconsin State Patrol joins law enforcement agencies across the nation to encourage seat belt use on every trip in a vehicle.

The annual Click It or Ticket campaign began Monday, May 23, and runs through June 5. Law enforcement agencies will step up enforcement for drivers and passengers who are not wearing their seat belts.

Buckling up is one of the quickest and easiest steps you can take to survive a crash. Unbelted drivers and passengers make up half of those who are involved in deadly crashes in Wisconsin.

"Not wearing a seat belt can have tragic consequences. We are seeing a rise in deadly crashes across the country.

Click It or Ticket is a critical awareness campaign to remind every Wisconsinite why it's so important to always buckle up," Anthony Burrell, State Patrol superintendent said.

Wisconsin's seat belt use is dropping. A seat belt survey found about 88% of Wisconsin drivers and passengers buckled up in 2021. That number was down two percentage points from 2019 and lags behind the national rate of about 90%.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation's seat belt awareness campaign goes beyond enforcement. Former Packers star Donald Driver teamed up with WisDOT's annual Click It or Ticket campaign this month, appearing in person at a news conference in Milwaukee and on the screen in a new animated video.

The campaign comes as Wisconsin gets ready for the first summer travel holiday

of the year. The simple act of clicking the seat belt should be the first step in road trip plans as Wisconsinites prepare for Memorial Day weekend.

"Our goal with Click It or Ticket is to save lives, not just hand out tickets. Ultimately, we would rather write a warning or citation than make a death notification," Superintendent Burrell said. "Every time we talk about the importance of using a seat belt, we have a chance to save a life. Help us achieve zero deaths in Wisconsin this summer and beyond. Always buckle your seat belt. Every trip, every time."

Wisconsin's primary seat belt law allows law enforcement to stop and cite drivers for not wearing a seat belt. Drivers can also be cited for unbuckled passengers in their vehicle. The goal is to encourage a long-term change in driver and passenger behavior.

sis. GFL will also do bulk pick up once a year, but residents of Kewaskum can bring their items to the West Bend landfill for free at any time.  
 Next, the board discussed the Memorial Day parade and it was stated that there will be some street closures due to the parade route throughout town. The parade will take place on Monday, May 30, 2022.  
 Finally, Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Kewaskum Police Department's (KPD) staffing, recruitment and retention issues.  
 Bishop asked the board to consider ways to help improve employee experience at the KPD, as the department is currently facing a shortage of staff. Many officers are getting moved from their de-

sired shift due to demand and lack of employees to fill the schedule.  
 Bishop stated that it is necessary to think outside of the box in order to become competitive with surrounding communities; some improvements, he noted, do not necessarily have to do with salary.  
 Within his presentation, Bishop informed the board that there is a police-hiring grant that would pay 75% of a new officer's salary for three years, and suggested the village consider applying.  
 Bishop said having an extra officer would help fill the open shifts and allow for current KPD officers to get days off when needed.  
 The board stated that they will consider the grant and make a decision at the next meeting.



## Fond du Lac County Encourages Use of Smart911 to Aid Emergency Response

Residents of Fond du Lac County are encouraged to sign up for Smart911, a free service that allows individuals and families to sign up online and fill out a profile in order to provide critical information to 911 dispatchers during an emergency.

When a person who has a profile within Smart911 makes a 911 call, their Safety Profile is automatically displayed to the dispatcher, allowing them to confirm information, or in the event the caller is not able to provide any information, obtain important information about the person needing assistance. Profiles include pertinent information which can help first responders provide a more personalized response, such as:

- Addresses of home, businesses and other associated with the person
- Emergency contact information
- Medical history, including medications, medical equipment and medical conditions
- Property layouts, access points and utility information
- Number of people and pets on the property


Smart911 is currently available in all 50 states and more than 3,500 municipalities across the country,

including in Fond du Lac County.

All information included in a Smart911 Safety Profile — from addresses and vehicle details to medical conditions and emergency contacts — are optional, and the resident has the ability to choose what details they would like to include in their profile.

“When a 911 call comes in, the dispatchers need to work to get assistance where it is needed as quickly as possible. The more information we have to do that, the better and quicker an emergency response will be,” said Bobbi Hicken, Director of Communications and Emergency Management. “It is encouraged that every resident in Fond du Lac County make a profile in Smart911.”

The Smart911 App is available on the Apple Store or Google Play. A link to the website can also be found on the Fond du Lac County Communications website at [www.fdlco.wi.gov/departments/departments-a-e/communications](http://www.fdlco.wi.gov/departments/departments-a-e/communications). Smart911 is private and secure, is only used for emergency responses and only made available to the 911 system in the event of a 911 call.

## Celebrating Beef Month with Burnett Angus Farmer Tim Moul

“I love animals,” said Burnett township resident and beef farmer Tim Moul almost immediately when asked how he got into farming.

It is the type of statement that, perhaps, the unacquainted might not immediately understand: a beef farmer, who sends his animals to market (for human consumption), loves his animals.

As May is Beef Month in Wisconsin, Moul spoke with this newspaper editor about his lifestyle and all the rewards and challenges that come with raising a herd of cattle.

For Moul, who operates the roughly 50-head beef farm on the west side of the Horicon Marsh with his brother Mike, the stereotype of the “calloused farmer” could not be further from the truth.

“People don’t want to see the butchering process, and I can understand why,” said Moul in front of his herd of regular cows, yearlings and new calves. “Some guys think we’re mean, but, if everyone stops eating [beef] then we will stop raising them.”

“Mean” is hardly a word that should be used to describe Moul, who confessed that he does not consume much beef, himself. The

Burnett farmer was thrilled to show off all the animals on his farm including his favorite calf (“I had to hand feed him, his mother didn’t want him. He shouldn’t even be alive,” said Moul patting the young bovine’s head through a fence), a large pig (“We might keep him. I don’t know. That’s going to be a tough decision,” added Moul), chickens and his two canine companions (which also got along swimmingly with the resident cows and pig).

Above all else, Moul’s affinity for his animals is clear, and it is evident in the dozens of hours he spends everyday caring and providing for them. There is also no “offseason” in raising beef, as the cattle sold one year will be replaced by a new generation of calves, a process that continues in perpetuity.

Moul got into beef raising after converting from a dairy operation. It was a decision he said he was happy to make in hindsight, as he spends more time caring for and preparing his animals. He has dozens of acres for his herd to graze, but he said the group seems most happy the closer they are to the barn.

“They seem really content,” said

# Bishop Announces KPD Accreditation Success

Kewaskum's Chief of Police Tom Bishop recently announced that the Kewaskum Police Department (KPD) has been officially recognized and awarded by the Board of Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group (WILEAG) for obtaining the WILEAG's Core Standards Verification Accreditation Program.

This means that the KPD underwent a long process to prove that they meet the 49 core standards that cover all aspects of law enforcement.

The WILEAG website states that, "accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. The key to any successful accreditation system lies in the consensus of published standards obtaining a clear statement of professional objectives."

The goal of the WILEAG program is to help law enforcement agencies better improve their communities.

A post on the KPD's Facebook page states that this accreditation is a voluntary process and that only 64 law enforcement agencies in the State of Wisconsin have achieved accreditation by the WILEAG, while just 19 of the 64 have achieved the "Core Accreditation" status.

The Core Accreditation is designed for smaller agencies while "Full Accreditation" status is reserved for larger departments.

"Lt. Steiner is our accreditation manager and has spent nearly a full year working on this project to get our agency accredited," stated Bishop.

The KPD will need to undergo the re-accreditation process in three years to continuously prove that they are in compliance with the standards. This is not an easy task, noted Bishop, but he added that Kewaskum law enforcement members are working hard to promote excellence within the department.

"I am very proud of the work done by everyone in our department. This accreditation speaks to the level of professionalism and pride we strive for as we serve this great village," Bishop said.

Summer reading starts in June and with it, all new books coming to the library.

One of my favorite authors, Geraldine Brooks will be releasing her novel, *Horse*. Based on the true events featuring thoroughbred Lexington, this story connects a scientist from Australia and a Nigerian-American art historian, one studying the horse's remains, the other uncovering the history of the Black horsemen who were critical to its success. Powerful novelist John Grisham comes out with *Sparring Partners*, a legal thriller including three novellas. *Woman of Light* by Kali Fajardo-Anstine is one of this year's most anticipated releases. In 1930s Denver, Luz "Little Light" Lopez, a tea leaf reader and laundress, begins having visions that transport her to her Indigenous homeland in the nearby Lost Territory where she must save her family stories from disappearing into oblivion. Look for Riley Sager's latest mystery, *The House Across the Lake*. In this novel, a recently widowed actress retreats to her family's lake home where she passes her days watching a couple across the lake until the wife disappears. Debut author Wesley Straton comes out with *The Bartender's Cure*, a story about a law student taking time off and working at a neighborhood bar. Also look for new books by Danielle Steel, Elin Hilderbrand, Fiona Barton, and James Patterson.

In non-fiction, look for *The Rise and Reign of the Mammals: A New History, from the Shadow of the Dinosaurs to Us*. Paleontologist Steve Brusatte brings us his study of mammals, from the earliest days of their lineage over 300 million years ago to how they evolved into those walking the earth today. A dual biography featuring Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull is provided in Mark Gardner's *The Earth Is All That Lasts: Crazy Horse, Sitting Bull, and the Last Stand of the Great Sioux Nation*. This book is a fascinating portrayal of these two leaders who fought to maintain the freedom of their people. Our true crime selection for the month is *Rogues: True Stories of Grifters, Killers, Rebels and Crooks*. In this book, noted author Patrick Keefe presents 12 of his most celebrated articles from The New Yorker that provide an in-depth look at these criminals.

In children's literature, check out picture book, *A Seed Grows* by Antoinette Portis and read to your young ones about how a seed becomes a sunflower. Margaret Stohl and Melissa de la Cruz team up to pen *A Secret Princess*, a mash-up retelling of *The Secret Garden* and *A Little Princess*. In *The Fort* by Gordon Korman, read about five friends who need to stick together after they set up a hideout in an abandoned bomb shelter. Also look for new kids' books featuring Thea and Geronimo Stilton, Pinkalicious and the Magic Tree House cast among many others.

Stop in during June to view our library transformed into an underwater adventure and pick up a few new reads.

### 5 Years Ago

May 25, 2017

The Malone Area Heritage Museum was packed on May 20 for the World War II Veterans Commemorative Event. Surviving World War II veterans were invited as honored guests to the event. An Honor Guard ceremony was held during the event and included a firing squad salute, the playing of Taps, singing of patriotic songs, and recognition of those area men killed in action during WWII. The stars of the day were the eight World War II veterans who were able to attend the event. Moul, proud of the home he has provided for both the permanent and temporary residents of the operation. The cows themselves look very healthy and exhibited playful behavior with one another while also expressing curiosity in Moul and this journalist.

The breeding cows number roughly one dozen, and the size of the calf herd can vary depending on the year. One thing that never changes though: Cows need to eat.

“To be successful, you can’t be feeding your cows high-end food,” said Moul, who clarified that a farmer is much better off harvesting his or her own locally grown grass, corn or oats. Moul spends a good portion of his year harvesting said materials from the pastoral fields surrounding his property.

Bad margins are sure to sink any farm, and with the high cost to operate, it is no wonder that there are very few beef farmers in the area other than Moul. There are roughly 14,000 beef farms in the state, according to the Wisconsin Beef Council, but here in Dodge, the dairies outweigh the cattle farms.

Moul wouldn’t change a thing, though, and he said as long as his cow’s are happy, he is happy.

“That’s what I love about raising animals: When they are content, it makes you feel like you’re doing something right,” he said. “It’s not the money part. When they are content, they are just easy going, and it’s a lot of fun.”

While readers might not yet be willing to fully immerse themselves in the “farm to table” experience, Moul does suggest learning more about the cattle raising process, especially those who consistently eat burgers, steaks and other beef products.

“Some people want to stay removed from that, and that’s okay,” said Moul. “But, you’re burgers come from somewhere.”

While it can be a dirty job, someone needs to do it, and, luckily for Moul’s cows, they have Tim caring for them all the way to the finish line.

# AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL

## Green is the New Red

I have a bit of a predicament, and this is what it is: My golden retriever, Ruby, has a litter of pups, and I am trying to figure out which one to keep.

The way I live my life includes a dog at my side for much of it and that includes both my home life as well as when I travel into the outdoors.

My goal is a physically strong, ambitious, loving and self motivated female that loves water.

This week, I took Ruby and her four, six-week-old pups camping on the backwaters of the Wisconsin River near Portage where the main test was how either Red or Green "collar colors" reacted to both swimming and long periods of time in a canoe while I fished for bluegill and crappie.

**SATURDAY, MAY 14**

**HIGH: 82, LOW: 57**

So, to be perfectly honest – almost since birth – Red was the chosen

pup to be my future sidekick. My reasoning is because she was the biggest female and, as these pups are loose much of the time, very adventuresome.

Yesterday, I got the pups their shots and took them to a lake where Green was the only one that voluntarily swam.

Let me tell you, four pups in the back seat of the truck had me concerned, but nothing went wrong yesterday or on the drive to Portage today.

My campsite would be on the water, and I could drive my truck right up to it.

The first thing that I did was wade in shallow water and none of the pups went any deeper than their knees.

Next, I built camp and rigged my canoe for fishing. I brought an old swimming pool liner along and set it up to keep the pups in; that would not be a part of the test.

Another goal that I had for this

adventure was to hit the crappie spawn. I fished here last year and put a hurting on crappie in the 10-14 inch range and was very excited for that to repeat itself.

So, Red and Green are on their first canoe ride and they wrestle, observe and sleep. I either anchored or tied up to a deadfall and did not catch any crappie but had some luck on bluegill.

Here is what I came up with after four hours in the canoe: Green slept very little and seemed to be exploring the inside of the canoe or looking at the world outside of it. Red did the same but less of it but slept a lot and did some whining.

When we went back to camp with eight 'gills in the basket, the mosquitoes were plentiful and I started a campfire right away. It was very interesting to watch all four pups, as each one had to take a real close look at the fire.

At midnight, I went to the tent and decided to let all four pups and their mother sleep with me. On film, this would have been comical, as I was sleeping on the ground in a very small tent and, every time I would fall a sleep, someone would bite me in the ear or neck.

At sunrise, I got up and, just like

in the truck, not a pup had had an accident.

I put Green and Red in the canoe and went exploring; no crappie and very few 'gills at first. Like yesterday, I had a very cool experience with a large northern pike that had grabbed onto a bluegill I was landing.

I also had a very unique experience that lasted for, at least, 10 minutes with the largest snapping turtle that I have ever seen swimming inches from my hand. One of the gators or the snapper could easily have eaten a pup had it gone over board.

I had two interesting observations on this five-hour excursion: The same type of behavior from both pups, and I literally witnessed the bluegill spawn begin.

The size average went from six-inches to eight, and the action was fast and furious.

So, here is probably my decision with what is now just days before all pups but one are out the door!

Green will have her name changed to Red and, like her master, will live a non-stop, push-yourself-to-the-limit way-of-life!

Is there anything cooler than having a new pup?

# Arenz, Bongiorno, Loehr, Hitsman tally PDTR A-main Triumphs

On an unseasonably warm spring evening, a pair of drivers stayed perfect in A-main competition, while two competitors made their first main event trips to victory lane of the 2022 season, during the second Plymouth Dirt Track Racing program of the 2022 campaign on Saturday, May 14, at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth.

Defending PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Travis Arenz of Sheboygan Falls made it two-for-two on the 2022 season as he rolled to victory in the 25-lap Kristine Hartmann Pleasant View Realty 360 Sprint Car main event victory.

In the 25-lap Sheboygan's Country B93.7 25-lap Late model A-main, Joe Bongiorno of Milwaukee earned his first career Late Model main event triumph.

2018 PDTR Grand National champion Matt Loehr of Dotyville out-dued Luke Scholten of Oostburg to claim his first 25-lap Oostburg Automotive PDTR Grand National main event victory of the 2022 campaign.

Jonathan Hitsman of Sheboygan racked up his second 25-lap PDTR Next Step Insurance B Mod A-main victory in two attempts in 2022.

Outside front row starter Tim Haddy of Waupun got the jump on polesitter Bill Taylor of Boltonville

to lead the opening lap of the 25-lap 360 Sprint Car headliner.

On lap 2, 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Plymouth, who started third, moved into second along the high groove, with Travis Arenz, who started sixth, trailing into third on lap 3.

Three laps later, Schmidt and Arenz closed the gap on Haddy as the top three drivers raced nose to tail along the preferred outside line of the third-mile clay oval. On lap 8, Arenz pulled off a slide job to seize second from Schmidt in turn four.

The leaders caught the rear of the field on lap 10, which allowed Arenz to close the gap significantly on Haddy. Arenz hounded Haddy over

the next three laps as the leaders skillfully weaved their way through lapped traffic.

On lap 13, Arenz bolted past Haddy in turn three with Schmidt in tow as Haddy was shuffled back to third in the running order at the halfway mark of the race.

Six laps later Arenz found himself bottled up in heavy lapped traffic with a group of drivers racing side by side in front of him. However, Arenz dove low in turn one to put three lapped cars between himself and the second-place car of Schmidt on lap 20 and effectively seal the outcome of the race.

Arenz cruised over the final five laps en route to his 12th career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory and 24th overall Midwest Sprint Car Association main event triumph in the caution-free race. Schmidt had to settle for second, two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Kurt Davis of West Allis placed third, after starting eighth, Haddy finished fourth and fourth starter Anthony Knierim of Caledonia rounded out the top five.

Four-time defending PDTR Late Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland grabbed the lead on the drop of the green flag of the 25-lap Late Model A main from the

pole position as rookie Bill Edler of Glenbeulah, who started third, moved into second.

Schmidt maintained the lead over Edler before the first of two caution flags appeared on lap 7 for an incident in turn four involving Sawyer Specht of Sheboygan Falls and Turk Letizia of Milwaukee.

On the restart, fifth starter Joe Bongiorno worked the outside groove to pass Edler and slip into second. Seconds later, leader Justin Schmidt slowed to a stop in turn two to bring out the second caution flag on lap 8.

With Schmidt out of the race, Bongiorno assumed the lead on the restart as Kevin Baldry of Omro, who started sixth, used the high line to move into second on lap 9. Seven laps later Baldry closed in on Bongiorno and appeared that he was going mount a challenge for the lead.

However, Bongiorno used the next four laps to open up a full-straight-away cushion over Baldry and he maintained the top spot in the closing laps on the way to his first career PDTR Late Model A-main victory.

Baldry placed second, Jim Schmidt of Cleveland, who started seventh, finished third, Letizia recovered from his early-race incident to finish fourth and Edler took fifth.

Opening night A-main winner Luke Scholten took the lead on the first lap of the 25-lap Grand National main event from the pole. On lap two, 2008 PDTR Grand National champion Matt Yancey of Sheboygan moved into second after starting third.

On lap 3, second starter Matt Loehr engaged in a side-by-side duel with Yancey for second along the high line. Two laps later, Loehr charged into second and set his sights on Scholten.

By lap 13, Loehr had cut the gap considerably on Scholten and he moved in to challenge for the top spot on lap 20. The high-riding Loehr and low-running Scholten dueled

Polesitter Spencer Long of Sheboygan Falls took the lead on the opening lap of the B Mod A main as sixth starter Jonathan Hitsman bolted into second along the outside groove on the first circuit.

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) agreed to five-year contracts with the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse and Explore La Crosse to host the State Track & Field Championships in La Crosse through 2026.

“On behalf of the 516 schools in the membership, the WIAA extends gratitude for the generous support of Explore La Crosse and the supporting community, in welcoming this event to Roger Harring Stadium at Veterans Memorial Field Sports Complex at UW-La Crosse for the next five years,” Executive Director Stephanie Hauser said. “The outstanding track and field facility as well as the support of the community and the university make this the greatest of experiences for all who take part – student-athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers and spectators.”

The agreement with UW-La Crosse provides the WIAA usage of the entire Roger Harring Stadium at Veterans Memorial Field Sports Complex as well as Mitchell Hall; and, starting in 2023, the Fieldhouse during the State Meet. Roger Harring Stadium at Veterans Memorial Field Sports Complex was opened in 2008 and seats 9,556 with additional seating and standing room for the State Track & Field Championships.

The cooperative efforts of UW-La Crosse, Explore La Crosse and corporate sponsor partnerships with local businesses have contributed to recognizing La Crosse as the premier destination and location for the State Track & Field Championships.





Springs came out swinging in their half of the first and scored two.


Springs added a run in the third when Luke Flitter led off with a hit and made his way around to score, putting Springs up 3-1.
