## Congress Just Delivered Major Postal Reform Legislation, So Why is the U.S. Postal Service Ignoring It?

After the massive mail slowdowns and postage hikes of 2021, Congress took action to financially stabilize the U.S. Postal Service by passing a historic, bipartisan postal reform bill. The bill freed the Postal Service from an unreasonable 2006 law demanding that it pre-fund retiree health benefits 75 years in advance — a requirement that put billions of dollars on the Postal Service's balance sheet each year and motivated it to keep hiking postage rates while reducing services.

Congress passed the 2022 postal reform legislation with the intent to strengthen this critical service and help the Postal Service avoid additional large rate increases and service cutbacks. However, Postal Service leadership has seemingly decided to stamp Congress's message "return to sender."

The very same day President Biden signed the monumental postal reform legislation, Postmaster General Louis DeJoy announced his plans to increase postage prices at an "uncomfortable rate" for some time to come. Specifically, DeJoy and the Postal Board of Governors intend to increase stamp prices again in July, again next January, and as often as twice each year after that. And they can, thanks to a recent Postal Regulatory Commission ruling giving DeJoy the power to initiate postage rates that outpace inflation.

In just a decade, Americans could be paying well over \$1 to mail a single letter. Unless Congress takes action again to hold the Postal Service accountable, let's just say we should all be buying "Forever Stamps" while they are still somewhat affordable.

As a businessman and a fellow Republican, DeJoy should know that raising prices generates fewer customers and can lead to less revenue. The same holds true for unnecessary postage increases. They will not only deter individuals from using the mail, but will also drive away businesses, newspapers, nonprofits, and charities — all of which generate more than half of all postal

revenues.

The Postal Service already anticipates losing 42% of mail volume over the next decade, driven partly by massive rate increases. Additional unnecessary postage hikes could lead to a huge loss in revenue that will jeopardize the survival of the Postal Service itself and its workforce of 650,000 Americans, many of whom are veterans.

Whether it brings something as special as a handwritten card or something as necessary as medication, the U.S. Postal Service is the only institution capable of going the last mile to reach, serve, and tangibly link every American. Some claim that private couriers like FedEx and UPS could replace the U.S. Postal Service, but that's simply not true.

The Postal Service is unique in that it's obligated to serve every American. It processes more than 425 million pieces of mail (not including packages) each day, delivering them to and from a staggering 163 million delivery points in all of the country's more than 41,000 zip codes. The Postal Service goes the last mile, no matter how rural or remote the address—and that's something no private courier could, or would, do.

What can be done to right the ship? First and foremost, the recently passed postal reform legislation can't be ignored by Postal Service leaders. There are new members of the Board of Governors who should push to challenge DeJoy's plans. At the same time, the Postal Regulatory Commission needs to review the freedom it gave to the Postal Service to raise rates.

But if none of these things happen, Congress needs to step in and take action.

Neither snow, nor rain, nor heat will stop the Postal Service, but excessive rates and reduced service just might.

## Vacation

The Go-Go's were right: It is all anyone ever wanted.

In fact, even The Go-Go's needed a vacation from filming the music video for "Vacation," according to the members' own memories from that film shoot roughly 40 years ago.

"We still saw videos as an annoying waste of time," recalls guitarist Jane Wiedlin, a Wisconsin native, in a book about MTV authored by Craig Marks and Rob Tannenbaum. "After seven or eight hours we sent out someone to sneak in [champagne]."

And, who could blame Wiedlin and her fellow musicians? Their debut album, *Beauty and the Beat* (1981), which featured singles like "Our Lips Are Sealed" and "We Got the Beat", was a number-one hit. This group of young women was roughly 25 years old on average and, with seemingly-infinite-youth, fame and fortune on their side, sneaking a few glasses of bubbly hardly seems out of line (given the circumstances).

Eight hours pretending to water ski in front of a green screen would probably drive me to the nearest bottle of brut, as well.

But — even though I would love it to be — this column is not about The Go-Go's.

This last month, the employees of this newspaper have been taking much-needed breaks: in the professional world, we also call them vacations.

It might seem like a frivolous thing to be discussing, but I do believe it is important to occa-

sionally pull back the curtain on how our newspaper operates.

The truth is, especially for our journalists and editors, "vacation" has, historically, not really been a thing.

Certainly, we have vacation days available to us, and I would guess that few employees at the paper let those go to waste.

But, when you're tied to a static deadline that expects 52 products (plus special sections) every year, the idea of a weeklong road trip, sojourn or jaunt can be daunting and, frankly, unrealistic.

I do not expect any pity, nor do I anticipate my workmates would either. This is simply part of the industry we all chose (and love) to work in. To be upset by that reality is akin to crumbling emotionally at the sight of spilled milk (or champagne, if you're a member of The Go-Go's).

With that said, when we do get away from our lives as newspaper-people, it can be pretty jarring, but equally rewarding.

All of our full-time journalists, myself included, managed to get away this month, and while it meant a few missed meetings, rescheduled interviews and feeling like we're missing something (a perpetual feeling even when we have a full staff), it was wholly necessary for us to continue providing this product.

There is something about the work we do that can be lonely and isolating. Yes, we are often surrounded by smiling people, we cover unique and



# IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776

## The Unanimous Declaration Of The Thirteen United States Of America

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.  
He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.  
He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.  
He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.  
He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.  
He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.  
He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

He has obstructed the Administration of Justice by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.  
He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.  
He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.  
He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.  
He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.  
He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:  
For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:  
For protecting them, by a mock Trial from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:  
For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:  
For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:  
For depriving us in many cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury:  
For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies  
For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:  
For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.  
He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us  
He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.  
He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.  
He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.  
He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these united Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States, that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. — And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

### 5 Years Ago July 6, 2017

Painters from Just Rite Painting Service in Kohlsville were pictured adding the finishing touches to Kewaskum's new welcome sign. The new sign is a replica of the original sign, which was built by Kewaskum resident Clayton Stautz and his father about 60 years ago. The wood on the old sign had started rotting and wasn't as sturdy as it once had been. The sign should last 50 years, according to Josiah Wolfe, one of the carpenters from Lehn Construction, which built the new cedar sign. Stautz, who is now 91, made similar wooden signs located throughout southeastern Wisconsin during his 39 years of working for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Music In The Park is returning on July 11 with The Kewaskum Big Band performing. The rest of the summer schedule includes Big Cedar Bluegrass on July 18, the Sun Rays on July 25, and Goodtime Dutchmen on August 8.

Sally and Chris Cochran, owners of Hidden Serenity Bed and Breakfast, welcomed a unique guest to their venue recently. The Red Chair, a simple wooden chair that is painted red, recently made its way to the Farmington bed and breakfast during its tour across the United States. The tour began in 2012 in Massachusetts, and Red has been photographed since then visiting other bed and breakfast locations across the United States and Canada.

Playing for the Division 2-3 Blue Team at the Wisconsin Fast Pitch Softball Coaches Association's annual senior all-star game was Breana Trepes. She was the only first baseman for the team so Trepes played both games on June 13. She believes she went 2x4 in each game.

The Kewaskum Indians played five games in a week. On June 26, Kewaskum won 5-0 over Nicolet. Due to pitch count, Cole Surprenant had to leave in the bottom of the sixth. During his time on the mound, he gave up only three hits. Grafton was defeated 10-2 on June 27 by the Indians. Kewaskum had 15 hits in the game, including a 3x4 game from Tony Steger. Seniors Jacob Loehr and Kyle Pamperin were noted by Coach Doug Gonring as doing an excellent job on the pitching mound in the 6-5 victory over the Suns on June 29. The winning streak ended on June 30 as the Indians fell 7-1 to West Bend West. Kewaskum lost 15-1 to Marquette University High School on July 1.

### 15 Years Ago July 5, 2007

The Village has officially begun its search for a clerk. Trustees approved a job description for the position at the June 25 meeting. The Village began thinking about hiring a clerk after a strategic planning meeting in March. Village Administrator Jay Shambeau, who is also the clerk right now, informed the board of deficiencies taking place at the village hall. Shambeau also wanted to create a zoning administrator/building inspector position. That was created first, with Chad Cook hired at the June 25 meeting. Shambeau hopes to have the clerk position filled by early September. He said he'll be able to focus more of his time and energy on the Village's engineering and planning needs once the clerk duties are no longer his.

A Town of Barton family is without a home after a fire completely destroyed the second level of a log structure on July 2; the family was in the process of moving in when the fire occurred. Members of seven fire departments - Kohlsville, Kewaskum, West Bend, Allenton, Boltonville, St. Lawrence, and Fillmore - attacked the blaze. Five children ranging from three to 15 years old were at the residence when the fire broke out. They were safely evacuated from the premises by the time

Washington County Sheriff's deputies arrived. The cause of the fire was unknown at press time.

The Washington County Highway Committee has decided to leave a highway safety precaution alone so the rumble strips on Highway H will remain. The vote was unanimous.

Bob Manthei punched the time clock in the Department of Public Works Garage for the last time on June 28. Jim Noren took over as lead operator of the wastewater treatment plant on July 2. Manthei was with the Village of Kewaskum for 36 years, and had been the plant's lead operator since 1994.

After hearing the testimony of three individuals at the hearing for Kewaskum Police Officer Troy Ellis, a five-minute break was requested by the court reporter. That break became an hour as the attorneys for both sides had a discussion. They announced a possible settlement. Ellis received a total 15-day unpaid suspension. However, 10 days will be held for 18 months and will be permanently removed if he meets the criteria within 18 months. He is required to undergo an alcohol assessment and attend any counseling recommendation as a result of the assessment.

Tyler Stamm of Kewaskum has attained the Eagle Scout rank in Boy Scouts of America. To earn the rank, Scouts must select and successfully accomplish an act of leadership, recruiting volunteers to accomplish a goal. With the mentoring of area businessman Derek Peterson and the help of troop members, area businesses, and the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, Stamm introduced Kewaskum to a new form of family entertainment, Movie In The Park.

honor and to make her friend stand out.

From here, the stage has to be set with the characters. Jane was a Flood in those days, the daughter of Francis (1893-1965) and Dora Flood (1900-1947). Jane (1926-2011) later married Darwin Tonn (1924-2013).

Jane had four others coming towards her that day. Harriet continued, "I was a great friend of Jane's in school. And she was going to meet her brother to get some money so she could maybe buy herself a coke or something at the picnic. And so we stood by the tree, where we were supposed to stand."

Then all of sudden, Jane told Harriet, "Here comes my brothers with a couple others."

"And so, here comes her brothers Vernon [1924-2004] and Jerry [1924-1984] and then there was my husband, Ray Ryan [1923-1966]," said Harriet. George Baumhardt (1923-2006), called "Georgie" by many, was also in attendance.

With the exception of Harriet, the whole gang was from South Eden. George's parents were John (1896-

1972) and Viola (1903-1989), who lived between present day Highway V and Timberlane Drive. Meanwhile Ray Ryan's parents, Maurice (1897-1974) and Violet (1899-1995), lived across

from Francis and Dora Flood. Both families were north of Highway F but on what became Timberlane Drive. This was 1941, so who knows how they got to Campbellsport, although some or all likely came together. Ray's dad had a DeSoto; but maybe the Flood's chauffeured Ray and Georgie around that day. Either way, it was a great day for Harriet waiting with Jane Flood, who was killing time waiting for currency to buy a soda.

### Instant Admiration

Well, obviously Ray wasn't Harriet's husband yet, but clearly this is where it all started. "Well, once we took a look at each other, I think that was it. Right there – the Campbellsport Picnic."

Would you say it was love at first sight? "Yes," Harriet said emphatically. Her memory goes to the picnic, more than 80 years ago.

"There was another funny thing [that] happened, we were walking around and he was gonna put his arm around me, and he says, 'Woops, I dropped your clothespin from your hair!' And I said, 'Oh, you mean my hairpin!'" Harriet laughed with cracks in her voice on a memory from 80 years ago. "I never forgot that." Yes indeed, Mr. Ray Ryan said Harriet had clothes pins in her hair. "Yeah," Harriet restated, noting the goof didn't stop her from wanting Ray: "'WOOOPS! I dropped your clothespin outta your hair.' It was a hairpin. Never forget."

She did clarify that her Ray was a gentleman. "I think it was genuinely loosening." She added, "In those days, you didn't have an automatic washer, you know. You used clothespins. So that's what he said."

What were the qualities that made Harriet like Ray right away? "The first thing when we looked at each other's eyes. I could see that yet as though it was yesterday."

### From a Picnic to Farming

Ray and Harriet would marry in 1944, and punctuated this meeting at Campbellsport. Ray was born in 1923, and did not go to high school. "And I was in the first year of high [school] and I probably met him three years before [marriage]. Forty-one." That was her answer to the year she connected with Ray at the picnic. She had to wait quite a long time to marry him, she said. Ray would have been the age of a junior or senior that summer at the picnic; meanwhile Harriet had just finished

her freshman year.

Instead of high school, Ray worked very hard on his parents' farm in South Eden. Once Ray and Harriet married, they rented Maurice Flood's farm near the southwest corner of Timberlane and F. They then bought the Cosgrove farm on Eagle Road, where they farmed together successfully until Ray's death in 1966.

Although Ray's formal education was limited to one room schoolhouses, that didn't mean he wasn't smart. Harriet gave an example of his intelligence, despite not going on to high school.

"I tell yah: The boys' at one time – There were a bunch of boys together, and they were trying to figure out an answer to some problem – I don't know what they were measuring or doing. And they were all having such a time, and my husband spoke up out of the clear blue and told them the answer. And these guys said, 'For god's sake, what are we going to school for? He knows the answer. We go to school and can't even figure it out,'" Harriet recalled.

She said that story might have been at the picnic too, but regardless she said, Ray Ryan knew what he was doing. So did Harriet around July 4, 1941.

These good times all started with the Campbellsport Picnic. It was the Flood Brothers, Georgie Baumhardt and Ray Ryan. "They came to see Jane... because they were gonna have a little money for her to get a soda that day." Jane Flood got her cash; Harriet Hall got her husband.

planet were quickly identified, disseminated and broadcast.

Wheat, the planet collectively learned, is a commodity now in question, as Ukraine – a top-10 global producer and exporter of the crop – cultivated an estimated 25 million tons as recently as 2020. Combined with other grains (like corn and barely, which Ukraine is also a top producer of) it was estimated that 70 million tons would leave the country for places like China, Egypt and Western European countries.

Early in the conflict, worldwide concern about Ukraine’s ability to produce grains (farmers have largely been able to plant and harvest despite the threat of explosions and incursions) gave way to worries about how those products would be shipped.

At present, the Russian navy is maintaining a blockade on Ukraine’s Black Sea ports – namely Odesa and Ochakiv – and reports of mines in the water have further exasperated a fragile situation (Russian officials have denied laying mines around Ukraine’s ports

and have, instead, suggested Ukraine is responsible. U.S. officials have confirmed that Russia is, in fact, deploying explosives in an effort to choke Ukrainian access to the Black Sea).

The reality has caused global food experts to sound the alarm on the potential for widespread famine with Ukraine’s grain importers needing to find alternate means to feed its residents.

The early data has supported the concern. According to numbers provided by John Reidy of world-grain.com, Ukraine managed to ship more than six million tons of grain the month prior to the Russian assault. Since then, however, the volume has dropped to roughly one million tons exported monthly. The country has been using less-efficient ways to move the resources, particularly via train and automobile or by river ports.

Here in Wisconsin – and specifically this readership area – there will be an outsized impact on all these veracities, particularly as Russia’s desire to force a famine seems to have been confirmed (whether intentionally or not) by Margarita Simonyan; she is the editor-in-chief of Russia’s state-controlled media entities RT and Rossiya Segodnya.

“The famine will start now,” she said at a broadcasted economic forum held in St. Petersburg. “[The U.S. and its allies] will lift the sanctions and be friends with us, because they will realize that it’s impossible not to be friends with us.”

The stark recognition (which Segodnya delivered with a smile) has caused tumult in every corner of the planet, but the agriculture and manufacturing-rich regions of southeastern, south central and east central Wisconsin have caused commodity traders, farmers and company leaders to position themselves for the long haul.

Joanne Theisen of Campbellsport, a licensed commodity broker working with Total Farm Marketing, has been advising famers on how to adjust to market conditions for more than two decades.

“This whole thing with Ukraine has really set things on edge,” said Theisen, who explained that a large portion of what she does is analyze

the futures market for commodities so that farmers can position their present-day contracts for a higher bottom line down the road. “There’s a basket of corn in the world, and the basket is just so full. The demand is so much, so, if all of a sudden the demand is more than the supply, there’s problems.”

To limit demand, Theisen said, the price of commodities would have to go up.

That has already happened, as the cost for wheat (measured by U.S. commodity tons) closed at 438.25 on May 18. The 52-week low for wheat, by comparison, was 177.25. On February 17, the cost of wheat closed at 265. By Mach 7, it had already ballooned to 422.50.

The story is the same for nearly every commodity during this time frame but, in particular, agriculture commodities. Corn has doubled in price on the markets since Russian’s invasion while food oils (particular rapeseed oil, which produces the edible canola oil) saw one of the most dramatic price runs in the agricultural sector – rapeseed logged a 52-week low price of 350 compared to a 52-week high of 1,094 (registered in April 2022).

Most commodity prices have fallen from the most dramatic of highs – rapeseed, for example, is now trading closer to 600, while wheat (350) has dropped slightly, as well. Corn, however, which has broader uses in multiple industries, has remained high in recent weeks and months.

Why all of this matters goes beyond farmers’ bottom lines and speculator’s pocketbooks.

Theisen summed it up succinctly. “You need wheat to make bread,” she said. “The world’s not going to survive without bread.”

Theisen posited that tough decisions would need to be made on the application of wheat, as less of it is likely to be used on animal feed in an effort to provide food for more humans.

That is where the philosophy of Kondex Corporation, located in Lomira, comes into play.

“We’re on a mission: Helping to feed and fuel the world,” says the agricultural component manufacturing company’s website, as well as a massive banner hanging from the Kondex headquarters off Highway 41.

Kondex President Keith Johnson said the tumult overseas will have direct and immediate impacts on his business, but he acknowledged that, in many ways, Kondex is likely to benefit.

“What is going on over there is horrific and it pains me to say that, in some ways, it will benefit our organization,” he said, emphasizing he felt in no way gratified by the positive-to-the-bottom-line consequence. “We see it as a rallying cry to help get our products to these farmers and into the

fields.”

Kondex, which has become an industry-leader in manufacturing component parts for heavy machinery (particular tractors, tillers and other agriculture necessities), had seen substantial growth in operations prior to Russia’s February offensive. Now, he senses an even greater need for their products.

“The production of food doesn’t start until our parts do the job. Our machines cut the crops from the ground, turn them into food – sometimes animal food – and fuel,” he explained.

The causality between Lomira and Odesa, Ukraine (which are more than 5,000 miles apart) is more obvious than some might realize.

“If you look where [Ukraine] is on the map, it lines up with the same latitudes as the plains of the Midwest in the U.S., and it is well-known for its crop production capabilities,” explained Johnson. “Ukraine has long been known as the ‘bread basket’ of Eastern Europe.”

While Wisconsin ranks near the middle on wheat production in this country (North Dakota, Kansas and Montana regularly take the top spot for that commodity), the Badger State’s corn production is entrenched in the top-10 (behind states like Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Indiana). When it comes to corn used for silage (which is often used as animal feed), Wisconsin is a top producer – if not the top producer in the U.S. – in any given year.

“The world is going to look to North American agriculture to help fill those voids,” said Johnson, who added that American companies as well as the state and federal governments will need to continue progressive actions to help fill the global grain basket. “The depth of the impact of this is really starting to become understood.”

But both Johnson and Theisen, separately, used a colloquial term to help illustrate that there are other factors at play, which could cause further

harm to commodity production and commodity costs.

“There was a drought last year in South America,” noted Johnson. “That started raising commodity prices, so the global food supply was already at risk. Now the Ukraine conflict comes on and it makes that much worse. We’re kind of in a perfect storm.”

Theisen used this same phrase to illustrate the quagmire.

“It’s just been a perfect storm,” she said, noting that the pandemic had already caused supply-and-demand issues. “It’s dry in Europe. It’s dry in Brazil. It’s dry in [the U.S.] Southwest. Pakistan is dry. North Africa is dry. Are we going to get a decent crop this year? That’s got everybody on edge.”

For Theisen, the concerns are endless. As a market expert, she is uniquely equipped to see the fallout of high prices at every conceivable corner – the pump, the grocery store and

with manpower. The domino effect of the high cost of any individual item, according to Theisen, will escalate until more is known about the global food supply by year’s end.

Manpower was a chief concern of Johnson, who said, while he expects it could be a record few years for Kondex, the cost of labor – plus a general lack of quality labor available – could prove to be significant roadblocks.

“It’s been a huge challenge to balance the people side with customer demand,” he said, adding that he and his Kondex peers are asking themselves, on the daily: “What can we produce with the supplies and components and people we have?”

For a company that has, through the years, prided itself on not laying off employees during hardships is now struggling to hire at the height of its financial success.

“You can’t drive down 41 without seeing an ad to work somewhere else,” said Johnson,

who acknowledged that neighboring companies have increased payroll to entice new employees. “We can run up wages to an unsustainable point, but we don’t want to do that. It’s a real balance, and it’s really tough.”

Instead, Johnson is hoping that longtime employees can help him inspire new arrivals.

“We talk a lot about our mission of feeding and fueling the world, and we have a lot of good people that understand the value and the work that they do, but with a lot of new people coming in, it takes a while for them to really understand... that there’s a farmer waiting for the component that they’re building, which he needs to harvest his crop,” said Johnson. “Those families rely on us to get these components to them.”

Theisen said companies like Kondex will be vital in helping the planet produce a large crop.

“The guys are out there trying to plant, and if they break down, the supply chain is ter-

rible, right now,” she said, adding that farmers have been saying since 2020 that they cannot get the right parts and components fast enough. “If guys break down in the field... the labor shortage has caused delays in everything. If you break down and it takes hours or days to get your part and the rain’s coming, it means you either harvest or you don’t harvest.”

Even with the components in-hand, though, Theisen’s concerns about a late crop, particularly in the U.S., are that the machines

might not have many plants to harvest. Wisconsin had been relatively dry and hot, which has been a trend across the country.

While the conjecture and guesswork can be infinite, there is little doubt that the long term effects will be dramatic, and we have likely not yet seen the worst of the fallout from what appears to be a never-ending war in Europe.

“The real implications are going to come next year,” said Johnson, adding that he remains hopeful the Wisconsin spirit can be

a boon – not just locally at Kondex – for a better future. “We’re a relatively small company in little old Lomira doing big things worldwide. I hope that we can instill a passion in the folks here, and the people in the Lomira community, that what we do here matters.”

**Don't Pass on Passing Out**

I'm hoping this article puts you to sleep.

Rather than bore you, however, my hope is to "wake you up" about the importance of sleep to your brain health.

Each of us has experienced the groggy, foggy feeling of "waking up on the wrong side of the bed." That's more than just a feeling – sleep deprivation negatively affects your mood, focus and energy. It reduces critical thinking, problem solving and situational awareness.

In fact, sleep deprivation affects your spatial perception and reaction times just as much as being intoxicated: 100,000 vehicle crashes every year are a result of "drowsy driving," and fatigued employees are 70 percent more likely to be involved in a workplace accident.

A 2010 plane crash that killed 158 people in southern India was blamed on a sleep-deprived pilot, and sleep loss was listed as a contributing factor in both the 1986 Space Shuttle Challenger explosion and the 1989 Exxon Valdez spill.

If a bad night's sleep leaves you feeling like you fly off the handle more easily, you're not dreaming: without sleep, you're all emotional-gas-pedal and no brake; less able to control your emotions and more likely to respond negatively or lash out unpredictably.

Researchers quantified this by monitoring two groups - one with a full night's shut-eye, and another intentionally kept awake. When exposed to a series of increasingly unpleasant images, the sleep-deprived brains showed wildly exaggerated activity in their emotional centers.

It's no surprise, then, that many emotional and psychiatric disorders are associated with sleep disorders.

In fact, sleep problems affect 80 percent of patients diagnosed with depression, and sleep disturbances are a major risk factor for suicidal thoughts.

Sleepless nights don't just affect your thinking and mood, though, as there are also clear and measurable physiological effects.

Insufficient or poor quality sleep can send your body into a hormonal tailspin that slows down your thyroid and production of human growth hormone. This, in turn, reduces your ability to heal, your capacity for gaining muscle and your metabolism, making you more likely to gain body

fat.

Sleeping six hours or less per night nearly doubles your risk of having a stroke or developing diabetes.

Limiting it to four hours – even for one night – increases risk of heart disease and metabolic disorders.

Just a moderate loss of sleep can reduce immune response by half, while doubling your risk of developing dementia and Alzheimer's.



requirement and that was that I drove a full-size pickup truck and that I be pleased to go out and take a picture of it.

I did, and I was in like Flynn.

The first two years of our time together, Michelle would spend one or two nights a week at my house; we would garden, ice fish, cut wood, she would sit in a stand next to me as I bowhunted and – her favorite of all – run the bear baits.

Just as important was about four trips a year that accompany me on such as winter camping and ice fishing, no matter what the conditions, bluegill fishing and camping, walleye fishing on Green Bay, turkey hunting and – last year – bowhunting.

Michelle had never been introduced to hunting or fishing before we met, but she would do her research, buy the best gear and away we went.

Last year was her introduction to bowhunting. A very good man gave her a crossbow, I built her a permanent ladder stand next to the house and she shot her crossbow with great regularity.

On our food plot, I sat with her 22 times, and she did connect on a large doe, which was her first deer.

After Michelle moved to Necedah (she purchased a house one mile as the crow flies from mine), she insisted that once a week we had a "date night." Long ATV rides, campfires, slow "just idling" truck rides in the nearby refuges and state public lands and an absolute ton of laughter were the norm.

When we first met, Michelle did not know a tomato plant from a potato plant, but she had a desire to learn and an incredible work ethic and, by last summer, was a fantastic helper both growing and putting up food.

When we camped, she insisted on doing all of the cooking and most of the tasks relating to taking down camp; every second of our camping trips was as good as it gets.

Socially, every doctor, nurse, high school friend, neighbor and family member would say she was the most positive and interesting person that you

could meet; she simply could not go negative.

Technologically, I am not well versed. I have some sort of mental issue with it and anything I did not understand, which is lots, Michelle simply took care of.

Michelle loved me like there is no tomorrow. From day-one, she named me "My Hot Dish" on her phone and told me that she was my retirement.

She was 11-years younger than me and, though our relationship was a work in progress, she never faltered.

When tragedy struck on June 14, the ambulance took her to Mile Bluff Hospital in Mauston, and I was told that she was very ill. She was put in a coma and med-flighted to Meriter Hospital in Madison.

The doctor on the helicopter called me and told me it was not good; the incredible staff at Meriter did their best, and her children Colby, Kylie, Sophie, Johnny and myself were with her.

Twelve hours after she arrived, her parents – Vince and Tony Chiaro – arrived from the Little Rock, Ark. area after driving straight through. Vince and Tony are in their mid-80s and not in

good health, but Michelle held on for them.

I sat next to her, held her hand, rubbed her and cried almost constantly. Most importantly, I talked to her.

This experience lasted for 24 hours at Meriter, and the staff really tried to save her, and I marveled as I thought what they were doing is exactly what Michelle did for 26 years.

I drove home, literally, through the Mauston tornado and had no cares if it swept me away.

It has been eight days from when I wrote this column, and I am as lost as I was when her heart quit beating.

My family stays with me. I garden, sit by the fire, run the bear baits, go for ATV rides and am never fully happy.

I think I can swing this as literally billions of people have before me.

Please, just give me a few weeks to figure it out!



ance of the 2022 season.

Polesitter Doug Wondra of Oakfield jumped into the lead on the drop of the green flag of the 25-lap 360 Sprint Car A main with third starter Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum, who was competing for the first time since the end of the 2020 season, moving into second and 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Plymouth, who started fourth, taking third on the opening lap.

Four laps later, Schmidt worked his way around Wenninger to take over second in the running order. On lap 6, the first of three caution flags appeared when Preston Ruh of Elkhart Lake spun in turn two. Following the ensuing restart, Travis Arenz, who started sixth, swept past Wenninger and Schmidt to move into the runner-up spot on lap 7.

One lap later, the second caution flag flew when Alex Pokorski West Bend rolled to a stop in turn three. When the race resumed, Arenz used the outside groove to power his way around Wondra and into the lead in turn one on lap 8.

As Arenz bolted away from the field, Schmidt used a low move to pass Wondra and gain second place on lap 12. Schmidt closed the gap slightly on Arenz as the leaders began to weave their way through lapped traffic on lap 18.

On lap 20, the third and final caution flag appeared when Tyler Davis of Franklin spun to a stop in turn two. Arenz then fended off Schmidt over the final five laps en route to his fourth PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory of the 2022 season, 14th career PDTR 360 Sprint Car main event win and 26th career Midwest Sprint Car Association feature triumph.

Schmidt had to settle for second, Wondra placed third, 2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett placed fourth after starting fifth and Brandon Berth of Cascade charged up from his 14th starting spot to round out the top five.

PDTR Late Model rookie Bill Edler of Howards Grove raced to the lead on the opening lap from his outside front row starting spot with polesitter Eric Michaels of Cleveland moving into second.

The first of four caution flags appeared on lap 2

when Jim Schmidt of Cleveland stopped in turn four while Wayne Freimund of West Allis spun in turn two. On the restart, four-time defending PDTR Late Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland, who started fourth, powered his way into second place along the high groove.

The second caution flag was then displayed on lap 3 when Wayne Freimund spun in turn four. When the race resumed, Brad Mueller, who started eighth, moved in to challenge Schmidt for the runner-up spot. On the following lap, Schmidt looped his machine into the infield, but continued on after dropping several spots, while Mueller assumed second.

On lap 8, Mueller began to apply pressure to Edler along the outside groove before securing the lead in turn four on lap 10. Once ahead, Mueller set sail to build up a sizable cushion over Edler.

A pair of cautions slowed the pace and bunched the field on lap 19 when Sawyer Specht of Sheboygan Falls spun in turn two and on lap 23 when Charlie Schmidt of Oostburg stopped in turn two.

However, Mueller was not to be denied as he pulled away after the final restart to notch his 23rd career PDTR Late Model A main victory.

Edler placed second, Justin Schmidt recovered to finish third, Joe Bongiorno of Milwaukee, who started 11th, finished fourth and Turk Letizia of Milwaukee finished fifth after starting fifth.

Chad Espen of West Bend assumed the initial lead from the pole in the 25-lap Grand National A main. The first of six caution flags appeared on lap four when Marc Caswell of West Allis spun in turn four.

On the restart, 2010 PDTR Grand National champion Brian Gilles of Plymouth, who owns a total of six career track championships at The Plymouth Dirt Track, moved in from his sixth starting spot to take second in the Bender Racing No. 89 car along the high groove on lap 8.

The third caution flag was displayed when Kyle Caswell of Caledonia spun along the front stretch on lap 8. On the restart, T.J. Smith made his presence felt as he powered into second from his fifth starting spot on lap 9 and worked past Espen into the lead on lap 10 before the fourth caution flag flew on lap 10 when Rich Garb spin in turn four.

Gilles, who has returned from a retirement from racing as one of three team drivers in the Bender Racing No. 89 entry this season, battled back to take second from Espen along the outside line on lap 10 before two more caution flags slowed the pace in succession on lap 11 for single-car spins.

When the race resumed, Luke Scholten of Oostburg, who started 19th, charged in to duel with Gilles for second before Gilles gained the runner-up spot for good on lap 20. Gilles then mounted one final charge as he again worked the outside lane to pull even with Smith on lap 24.

However, Smith was too strong as he fended off Gilles persistent challenges to earn his first career PDTR Grand National A-main victory. Gilles placed second, Scholten wound up third, Espen placed fourth and 13thstarter Jonathan Otte of Cedar Grove completed the top five.

Outside front row starter Andy Welter of Hartford outpowered polesitter Jonathan Hitsman of Newton to lead the first lap of the 25-lap B Mod A main.

The first of six caution flags was displayed on lap 4 when Steve Lorier of Sheboygan spun and collected Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls in turn two.

On the restart, 2019 and 2020 PDTR B Mod champion Tim Warner worked his way into second from his seventh starting position. Warner was closing on Welter when the second caution flag came out for Gary Glander, who stopped near turn three while attempting to exit the track on lap 14.

After a series of three caution flags with one on lap 15 and two on lap 18, Warner tracked down Welter and powered in the lead with a high move in turn two on lap 19. The sixth and final caution flag was displayed when Jonathan Hitsman spun in turn four on lap 23.

Following a single-file restart, Warner pulled away to notch his seventh career PDTR B Mod A-main victory, which moved him into second place on the all-time PDTR B Mod A-main win list.

Welter placed second, Travis Schmidt of Waldo wound up third, after starting sixth, fifth starter Shane Long of Sheboygan Falls took fourth and third starter Brendon Ostrowski of Milwaukee placed fifth.

Will Gerrits of Waupun was victorious in the PDTR 360 Sprint Car B main.

Tim Haddy of Waupun was the overall fastest qualifier in the PDTR 360 Sprint Car group qualifying session with a lap of 12.427 seconds.

Thirteen drivers made their first appearance of the 2022 season at The Plymouth Dirt Track with a total of 74 drivers on hand. The program, which as sponsored by Mayer Automotive, included 26 360 Sprint Cars, 11 Late Models, 21 Grand Nationals and 16 B Mods.

# Utensils Win 5th in Row Without Defeat

**JUNE 27, 1947**

*The following is an article on the Kewaskum Utensils baseball team from the June 27, 1947 edition of the Kewaskum Statesman. The piece is largely unedited and displays the style and convention used “back in the day.”*

The high-riding Kewaskum Utensils, undefeated pace setters in the Kettle Moraine loop, made it five wins in succession here Sunday when they handed the heavy-clubbing Adell nine a 9 to 3 beating.

It was a tight affair until the 7th inning with Kewaskum leading 4-3. Two runs in the 7th and 3 more in the 8th gave the Utensils victory by a sizable margin.

Kewaskum knocked Helminger out of the box in the 8th. Adell, in second place with 3, won and lost 1 before Sunday, scored all its runs in the 3rd inning on a home run, 2 singles, and a triple.

The Utensils scored one of their first 4 runs in the 2nd and the other 3 in the 3rd.

Kewaskum connected for 14 hits, 13 of them off Helminger.

Marx held Adell to 7 safeties in winning his fifth straight. He was also top batter on his team with 3 singles in 5 trips.

Bath, Held, Tessar, and J. Stautz each poled 2 hits, while the veteran Frank Koepke, a former Kewaskum High School star, was the only Adell batter to get 2.

Tessar, Kewaskum's leading hitter, kept his average up with 2 for 5, one of them a triple. He now has a total of 13 hits in 33 tries for a .565 average.
