An Island Oasis in Kewaskum, Caribbean Joe's Aims to bring Good Vibes to Dining

"Chef Joe" – a Milwaukee-native – opened his island-themed restaurant last year, and he's earned a local following

Darvell Ecford, better known locally as "Chef Joe", is the proud owner of Caribbean Joe's, an island-inspired restaurant at 215 Main Street in Kewaskum. The Milwaukee native brings with him 30 years of cooking experience, and he hopes to "make people happy with food" by creating a community restaurant where people can "let their hair down" and relax.

Ecford dreamed of opening his own diner since high school, but his passion for food developed when he was a child helping his grandma in the kitchen and garden. His grandmother, Liza, was raised in Meridian, Miss. before relocating to Milwaukee. She was influenced by mixtures of island, southern, creole and Native American cui

Building on Rich Past, Foundry 45 Positioned for the Future

The site of the former Amerahn has been transformed into a modern restaurant and reception hall using natural resources and history

Live long enough in and around the Village of Kewaskum and you are assured to hear a similar detail shared amid hundreds of "remember when" stories of the residents: "The night started at Amerahn."

Amerahn Bar & Hall, also known as the Amerahn Dance Hall or, informally, just "Amerahn", was the location of countless wedding receptions, polka dances, fish fries and reunions. The stories regaling the nights that commenced there typically culminated in Kewaskum backyards or taverns, and those memories are oft offered up to illustrate the burgeoning roots of a family or friendship.

The building – nestled in the woods just across the village's northern border in the Town of Kewaskum off Highway 45 – is something of a time capsule; fundamental to the identity of those who grew up here.

Now, a new identity occupies the space, and the ownership team of Foundry 45 is using the

property's distinctive history to build an exciting future of their own.

"Everyone in our group is pretty local," said Erin Tucker, a Campbellsport High School grad who is one of the ownership partners of Foundry 45. "There's such a huge history with this building. This building is really important to the area and to making memories. Everyone in the community has memories of this place."

"This place" is at 9480 US-45 in Kewaskum township; take a few short steps to the south from the Foundry 45 property, and you are in the village.

The good times didn't start with Amerahn, however, as the building's prior owners – Steve and Mary Rahn – ran a popular tavern called Steve and Mary's Minor Bar in the 60s. The structure, then, did not include the dance hall. That was built in 1974 with their daughter and son-in-law, Jeanne and Allen Amerling. The name was derived from the combination of Amerling and Rahn.

The Kleinke family – Early and Marie – purchased the property in 1980, but after 41 years, they decided to retire in 2021.

Despite the storied history, the property was


On Soulmates

Who doesn't love a mural? Not least being this country dweller. They are art taken to an extreme. Done in bold swatches of color and design. And there is something so appropriate to where they often appear.



Whenever I drive around Fond du Lac and glimpse one of those gigantic paintings splayed across a wall, it gives the surroundings a smooth urbane feel. Time was, you had to venture into truly large cities; Milwaukee, Chicago or New York to see them with any kind of frequency.

Or sojourn down into the Heartland, Nebraska or Kansas. I'm not talking about barn art.

Usually an advertisement for a nearby restaurant, other business or product. For example, the plug for Chief Oskosh beer on a farm silo along Highway 151 heading north.

Rather you might find pastoral scenes depicted on the side of a Rexall drugstore. Back in 1993, during the centennial celebration of the summer the Czech composer Antonin Dvorak spent at Spillville, Iowa, his bearded visage debuted on buildings in Cedar Rapids and elsewhere across the state.

Probably the best known of the murals in Fond du Lac is that at Mike's Music, where such notables as Sinatra and the Beatles share space with Janis Joplin and Bob Dylan.

Drive Sober every Trip behind the Wheel

Impaired driving is illegal, dangerous, and can be deadly. Still, thousands of drivers get behind the wheel while drunk or high every year.

Someone is killed in an impaired driving crash every two hours in Wisconsin. Wisconsin State Patrol's August Law of the Month is a reminder of the harmful consequences of driving while under the influence.

"Impaired driving doesn't just impact the person who chooses to get behind the wheel after consuming. One slip up while driving can take the life of an innocent motorist on the road," Tim Carnahan, superintendent said.

This preventable crime is a serious traffic safety risk in Wisconsin. Last year, alcohol-related crashes killed 166 people and 74 others died in crashes involving drugs.

If You Feel Different, You Drive Different

Alcohol steadily decreases a person's ability to drive safely, so it's important to recognize when it's OK to drive. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, driving with even a small amount of impairment can cause a decline in vision, multitasking, coordination, and response.

It is illegal in every state to drive with a Blood Alcohol Content of 0.08 or higher. Drivers with a BAC of 0.08 are about four times more likely to crash than drivers with a BAC of zero and 12 times more likely to crash when the BAC is at 0.15.

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

Impaired driving is dangerous and prevalent

year-round but can be particularly deadly as people celebrate the final weeks of summer and the Labor Day holiday.

To raise awareness of the risks, Wisconsin State Patrol will join law enforcement agencies across the nation for the annual Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign. The stepped-up enforcement runs from August 17 through Labor Day.

"Our officers will work together across the state with zero tolerance for alcohol or drug-impaired driving on Wisconsin roads," Superintendent Carnahan said. "We need each driver to take responsibility for their actions. Protect yourself, your passengers, and other travelers by getting a safe ride home."

Plan Ahead for Safe Travel

- If you plan to celebrate, identify a sober designated driver, or find a safe alternative way home. Never allow someone who is impaired to get behind the wheel.

- Protect yourself and your passengers every time you travel. Buckle up, phone down. Watch your speed and eliminate distractions.

- If you suspect a driver is impaired, call 911. Provide as much detail as possible on the driver, vehicle, and location.

- Download the free Drive Sober mobile app from the WisDOT website. The app includes a "find a ride" feature to help locate mass transit and taxi services.

- Some bars and restaurants have programs to provide patrons a safe ride home.

Cramming It All In

I read something recently that shocked me.

For a long time, the American College of Sports Medicine and the Centers for Disease Control have established physical activity guidelines, recommending that healthy adults get at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity aerobic exercise, or 75 minutes of vigorous aerobic exercise, per week.

Further, they have always maintained that, for the best health benefits, this should be spread out over at least 30 minutes per day five days per week.

So, because the experts have promoted this, I've also encouraged my clients to get at least 30 minutes of exercise on most days of the week.

The shocker for me came last week when I read the results of a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, which followed more than 350,000 adults for more than 10 years – a mixture of non-exercisers, daily exercisers and "weekend warriors" who only exercised two days per week.

The study found that as long as people got at least 150 minutes of moderate activity or 75 minutes of vigorous activity per week, it didn't matter when they did it. Whether they crammed their weekly exercise into two days versus spreading it out over five or more, the health benefits were nearly identical.

Risk of premature death from any cause was 30% lower for "weekend warriors" than for those who didn't exercise at all. The risk of dying early from cardiovascular disease was 40% lower, and cancer death rates were nearly 20% lower.

So what's "moderate" versus "vigorous"?

Simply put, "moderate" exercise gets your heart beating faster. This can include walking



very briskly, playing tennis or pickleball, pushing a lawnmower or mopping the floors.

"Vigorous" exercise gets you going even harder, and can include jogging or running, many fitness classes, carrying groceries up stairs or shoveling snow.

So, what does this mean for you?

First, you have time. Even with a hectic schedule, it's likely that you can still fit in a couple 35-40 minute vigorous exercise sessions each week. So, if weekends provide your only chance to get to the gym, go for a run or ride that bike, you can still feel good knowing you're doing something good for yourself.

I have my home exercise bike set up in front of an old TV. When I want to catch up on episodes of the latest streaming-on-demand series, I do it from the back of that bike. Americans spend an average of three hours each day watching TV – using just a portion of that time smarter pays serious health dividends.

Second, some is great; more is better. If you like that two weekly workouts are far healthier than being a couch potato, there's more where that came from! Checking off the box by doing what's recommended each week can reduce your risk of an early demise, but getting more than the minimums carries even more benefit.

More frequent exercise sessions with fewer days in between promotes adaptations in your body that increase your overall fitness, letting you work longer with harder efforts. This also helps improve your metabolism and maintain a healthy body weight.

Adding two days per week of muscle strengthening activity (weightlifting or "resistance training") helps you feel strong and toned as it fights the loss of muscle and bone that naturally occurs as we age.

sine, which she passed down to her grandson.

“Being raised by Grandma, I was started in this industry out in the garden – shucking corn, picking peas, you name it. I was already being groomed for it and didn’t know it,” Ecford said with a smile. “Grandma is really the one behind all of this. She started it all.”

Before pursuing a culinary career, Ecford committed to play football for Northern Illinois University on a full-ride scholarship as a line-backer in 1990 (he was all-state at Milwaukee Washington High School). He also played basketball and ran track for the Huskies.

At the university, Ecford pursued another passion: art. He graduated with a degree in illustration.

Art is still prevalent in his life, and in his restaurant. It is a positive influence which he credits as being instrumental to his success.

“I wouldn’t be able to do any of this if I wasn’t able to do my art,” he confessed.

His passion for art translates directly into his restaurant through more than just his paintings on the wall.

“In this business, I’ve learned that my experience, my training, and my background in art enables me to be able to put something together on a plate as if it was a canvas,” he said. “To me, it is a clean slate. It’s my art board.”

Ecford made his food/art as head chef at several popular Milwaukee restaurants through the years, even winning awards for his flavorful chicken wings. Plaques commemorating the honors hang among his original artwork.

Music is an art form that Ecford loves, as well, and is one that he feels impacts people’s mood. To create a relaxing environment in his restaurant, and to go with its theme, reggae music plays at Caribbean Joe’s. The music is all part of Chef Joe’s goal to ensure no one is wearing a “screw face,” as he calls it: a face of anger, tiredness or any unhappiness.

He elaborated: “I already have my plan to have the music going on, so when you come in...you’ll sway your shoulders, you bat your eyes, you’ll snap your fingers; you’ll do something on your

way into your seat and, immediately, I’ve already changed your disposition, and I may or may not have already spoken to you.”

Besides art, another influence in the atmosphere of Caribbean Joe’s is Grandma Liza’s values. Not only did her culinary influences inspire his spice mixtures, but her roots passed down the value of southern hospitality. Ecford believes in “touching every table,” or in creating a personal connection with each guest from “the grandma to the grandbabies.”

He said the customers’ enjoyment and happiness comes first inside his restaurant, and he’s willing to be the catalyst in turning a bad day into a good day.

“I want to make sure that you’re full, that you’re satisfied, that it tastes good,” said Ecford, adding that no visitor will hear a grumble from him about patrons making a mess in tables or booths. “If you actually get some sauce in your hair, that’s indicative of going to grandma’s house. I promote that kind of environment here.”

The road to this point hasn’t been easy. As with

many businesses, Caribbean Joe’s faces the challenge of being understaffed. However, undeterred by the obstacles of opening a restaurant in the current economic climate, Ecford continues to push to achieve his dream of owning a welcoming, Cheers-like restaurant “where everybody knows your name.”

“The community has welcomed me. The ones that come in religiously, my regulars, I know them by name, they come in and have a blast. When I touch each table I always tell people, if you enjoyed the food and the experience, not only go and tell somebody or post it online, but bring somebody with you next time because today I’ll play host but when you come back with somebody, we’ll play host. Before you know it, this place will be like Cheers where everybody knows everybody and everyone is welcome.”

listed for sale for an extended period, as a tumultuous realty market fluctuated due to global stressors.

Watching it sit slowly made Tucker wonder: What if?

“Driving by and looking at it, [and I’d think]: That’s a really nice property. There’s a lot of potential,” she recalled. “We were kind of joking like, ‘Hey! Let’s buy that!’ and then it got serious, and we took a tour, and we thought was great.”

The group – under the professional title 7 Bridges Road LLC – consists of six couples: Tucker and Josh Cadman, Dean and Sarah Heltemes, Gary and Linda Gavin, Ali and Tom Krueger, Brian and Lisa Lunde and Carrie and Roy Streaan.

“We’re all friends, so we hang out,” said Tucker, who noted that the dream became a reality quickly. “One night it comes up sitting around the campfire.”

Almost in the next moment, Tucker recalled, they were putting it in offer.

“We closed the end of March (2021),” she added.

They got right to work on a floor plan and immediately started demolition of certain parts of the interior: walls were taken down, the drop-ceiling removed and the tavern’s U-bar replaced.

“Day of closing, we were in here that night and ripping ceiling tiles down,” said Tucker. “We hit it the first day.”

The majority of the structure is made of steel and concrete block, said Tucker, and – in-line with their aesthetic direction – the group exposed the steel ceiling brackets to add inside – height to the dance hall.

“The whole footprint stayed. We just exposed,” said Tucker.

Originally installed for children, Tucker said adults – including members of the ownership group – have been caught plunging quarters into the arcade games.

Along with a rebuffed floor throughout, new bar areas and refurbished wood décor, the space is a “you have to see it to believe it” type of experience.

“We wanted to stay true to that look of it being a foundry,” said Tucker, whose professional experience in exterior design helped draw out the authentic history inherent of the building’s raw materials.

An added touch: the wood from the trees that were removed to expand the parking lot and create a back patio was repurposed into tables and chairs for the banquet hall.

Other antique windows and cabinets – not original to the building, but matching the style – were used to round out interior design.

While an emphasis on the “old” was paramount for inspiration, a lot of aspects needed to be fully updated. Among those were the restrooms and the audio-visual components for the stage and appliances.

In addition to the restaurant and hall, the former three-bedroom residence (located above the tavern) has been renovated into a bride-and-groom waiting room for wedding parties. The space can also be booked out for private events, meetings and conferences.

The sprawling patio, which runs right up against a small forest, provides a serene escape for al fresco dining, a dance floor for outdoor music or an ideal locale for a cocktail hour.

“We’ve had great compliments. People saying, ‘I can’t believe this is in Kewaskum,’” said Tucker, who said the group was anxious to hear what people thought of the redesign and remodel. “We wanted to do [this space] justice. We wanted to keep the history intact and keep the integrity of the building.”

A grand opening for Foundry 45 is scheduled for later this month, but the bar and restaurant – called Bar 45 – are already open. The menu is

Juneau Fire Department to Hold 21st Anniversary Silent Parade

Silent Parade participants will line-up and begin the procession on South Western Avenue in Juneau, along Dodgeland School. The parade will head north and turn right on West Oak Grove Street (Hwy 26) and proceed east past the Village Garden restaurant up to South Main Street and then turn right at the four-way stop on South Main street passing Kwik Trip and head South passing the old Dodgeland School, St. John's Church and School and the City of Juneau Cemetery. The parade route then turns left on Cross Street to the Juneau Public Safety Building to the Juneau Fire Department.

City streetlights along the Silent Parade route will be turned off at 8 p.m. Citizens are encouraged to line the parade route with lighted candles and hold American Flags in honor of all the individuals who lost their lives on September 11, 2001.

The public is invited to a gathering for food and refreshments following the parade held at the Juneau Fire Department in the Public Safety Building.

Third, effort matters. What you put into exercise determines what you get out of it. While I'm a firm believer that anything is better than nothing and all movement has value, the evidence is clear: harder efforts yield better results in less time. The more you can include vigorous efforts in your weekly regimen, the more health benefit you'll enjoy.

Finally, remember the bottom line. The risks of doing nothing are well-known, and include weight gain, heart disease and diabetes, poor sleep quality and premature death. With stakes that high, the time it takes to exercise at least a couple days each week seems a small investment to make.

As always, keep in mind that we don't decide our future; we decide our habits, and our habits determine our future.

**5 Years Ago
August 17, 2017**

The Village of Kewaskum has the opportunity to receive a new park. The James D. Reigle family has offered to give the village 31 acres of undeveloped land to serve as a village park. The wooded property, which is located on Edgewood Road in Kewaskum, has an assessed value of \$649,700. If it accepts the offer, the village would agree that the land would serve as a public park for the next 25 years. The cost of developing and maintaining the park would be covered by the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA) and Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO). The village would lease the land to KAA and KYSO. A conceptual drawing illustrated how the athletic fields could be created, as well as a playground and walking paths.

Kewaskum School District is hosting a groundbreaking ceremony for its new middle school and high school renovations.

Neighboring counties have expressed interest in partnering with Washington County to potentially develop shared service arrangements. Washington County leaders would like to develop cooperative partnerships or shared service arrangements with other counties. They are even interested in the possibility of consolidating counties, procedures or referendums. Letters about this possibility were sent to the counties of Ozaukee, Waukesha, Dodge and Fond du Lac. The deadline for those counties to respond to the letter is August 11.

Salem United Church of Christ in Wayne will be doing a pulpit exchange with Ravenswood United Church of Christ in Chicago, IL. On August 27, Pastor Ruth Hansen from Salem will preach at Ravenswood, and Pastor Jason W. Coulter will be coming home to preach at Salem U.C.C., which is the Coulter Family Ancestral Church dating back to the late 1800s.

The Board of Commissioners of Public Lands approved a State Trust Fund Loan totaling \$999,479 to the Village of Kewaskum to finance road projects.

Four homes and one business were selected to receive beautification awards, which were presented during the August 7 Kewaskum Village Board meeting. Village President Kevin Scheunemann and Kewaskum Women's Club representatives Gwen Dreher and Rita Etta presented the awards. Winners included: Jim and Barb Connor, 590 Braatz Drive, for creative use of landscape materials and shrubs; Shirlee Nelson, 1160 Stark St., for floral, shrubbery and tree arrangement; Virginia Backhaus, 319 First St., for colorful floral and selection of design; Tracey Schaub, 1175 Parkview Dr., for lawn ornaments and decor; and the business was Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club.

Information on the new traffic pattern and parking for Kewaskum Middle and High School was included in this issue. These are changing due to the building project.

Although undetermined at this time, the cause of the fire was likely due to an electrical short.

Regal Ware has eliminated 21 salaried positions in Kewaskum and West Bend, some after years with the company. The eliminations took effect July 31. A statement from Regal Ware gave reasons of the slowdown in the housing market, escalating energy and raw material costs, and other economic factors.

Nurse B asked what my husband did and made some comments about that and then asked what I did. He said, "Wow! What an awesome job!" We talked about his favorite genre, science fiction and those authors and how he is introducing his children to these books. His delight in discussing something we both deeply enjoy eased my apprehension. This discussion was relaxing to my husband, because when I talk books with him, he falls asleep.

My husband is recovering and doing fine. There was some unpleasantness during his hospital stay but we are both thankful that Nurse B was part of the procedure at the beginning. Our book conversation didn't last long, but the memory of how it calmed both of us will remain with me for a long time. I look forward to my next unpredicted meeting with another book lover.

United Way Announces Emergency Food and Shelter Program Funding

On behalf of the Fond du Lac County Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) Local Board, the Fond du Lac Area United Way is pleased to announce the Emergency Food and Shelter Program, Phase 39 and Phase ARPA-R, funding.

The Fond du Lac County EFSP Board is tasked with determining how funds are to be distributed, per Phase, amongst local emergency food and shelter program applicants. Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies who have applied are eligible to receive funds if they comply with all of the requirements.

To be considered for funding, programs must be a private voluntary non-profit or unit of government. They must be eligible to receive Federal funds and have an accounting system in place. Additionally, the programs must practice non-discrimination, have demonstrated capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs. Finally, applicants need to be considered a private voluntary organization and they must have a voluntary board to be eligible.

The Fond du Lac County EFSP Local Board has approved the following allocations for funding: FDLUW for \$252(Ph. 39) and \$978(Ph. ARPA-R), the Fondy Food Pantry for \$2,370(Ph. 39) and \$10,000 (Ph. ARPA-R), Solutions Center for \$15,000 (Ph. ARPA-R), Catholic Charities for \$8,000(Ph. 39) and \$7,956 (Ph. ARPA-R), St Vincent de Paul for \$15,000 (Ph. ARPA-R) and the Salvation Army for \$2,000 (Ph. 39).

The source of funding is a federal appropriation from Congress to the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program. The National Board selects jurisdictions (cities or counties) for funding, not specific agencies. The federal department responsible for this program is the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). These are not state/county government or United Way funds.

Seeing the Future, Residents Partake in Visioning Meeting for Kewaskum

Roughly two-dozen residents and village officials joined together on Wednesday, Aug. 3, at Kewaskum's Annex building for an hour-and-a-half long visioning session led by UW-Madison Division of Extension, Washington County Educator Paul Roback, as the assemblage largely agreed on the municipality's pros and cons while brainstorming Kewaskum's future.

The session was meant to be an open discussion on where residents would like to see their village go.

Robach shared statistics and data regarding Kewaskum's demographics and population prior to launching into group-based idea development.

small by design, for now, but Tucker said they would slowly expand over time.

Since even before their soft opening earlier this summer, the ownership group realized it might not be

easy keeping people at bay for too long: without even an open sign on the door, curious locals had been stopping by and peering through windows for weeks.

“We realized real quickly that people came here to see the building, so we said, ‘Let’s let them in!’”



Utensils Tip Kohler, Increase League Lead

KEWASKUM STATESMAN
AUG. 8, 1947

The following is an article from the Aug. 8, 1947 edition of the Kewaskum Statesman. The piece is largely unedited and display the style and convention used "back in the day."

With the second place Campbellsport Belles taking a surprise 8-1 licking from Adell Sunday, the pace-setting Kewaskum Utensils increased their lead in the K-M circuit with a neat 5-2 victory over Kohler of the northern division.

Kewaskum now has a game and a half advantage over the Belles and a 2 game lead over Adell but still must meet both teams once.

Sunday's win was the Utensils eighth in nine games.

This was an intersectional contest between the two odd teams for the day in the two divisions.

While Marx was pitching another 5-hitter, he and his teammates pounded out 14 safeties off the veteran Bernie Messner of Kohler.

Leading Kewaskum's barrage was Norm Held, who connected for 3 singles and a double in 5 trips.

First baseman Ehren was the only Kohlerite to get 2 singles.

Marx fanned 9 visiting hitters while 5 Utensils succumbed to Messner's slants.

The score was close enough to make the game interesting all the way.

After Kohler broke the ice with a marker in the third, Kewaskum retaliated in the bottom of the same inning with 2 runs on the successive doubles by J. Stautz, Held, and H. Marx.

One more run in the fourth and another in the fifth gave the 'Kums a 4-1 lead.

Each team added a run in the eighth to end the scoring.

lap 11 for debris in turn two, fourth starter Travis Schmidt, who started fourth, worked his way in third on lap 12. Three laps later, Shane Long of Sheboygan Falls spun on turn two to bring out the third caution of the race.

When the race resumed Schmidt and Warner waged a side-by-side duel before Schmidt surged into second and quickly closed in on Konitzer. On lap 19, Schmidt swept past Konitzer and into the top spot.

The fourth and final caution period came on lap 20, but Schmidt was not to be denied as he cruised over the final five laps on the way to his seventh career PDTR B Mod A-main victory.

Warner placed second, Konitzer finished third, Jonathon Baumann, who started 13th, placed fourth and current PDTR B Mod points leader Andy Welter, who started 11th, finished fifth.

2018 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Justin Miller of Plymouth won the 12-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main.

Ben Schmidt earned PDTR 360 Sprint Car overall fast qualifier honors with a lap of 12.883 seconds.

This season, the Campbellsport Cougars football team is focused on growth.

After losing nine of 11 boys on defense, several sophomores have had to step up to fill spots on the line, as the team looks to replicate last season's immense success, which included a Flyway Conference Co-championship and a run to the third level of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Playoffs.

Although the team is "young up front," Head Coach Todd Wondra believes, "Our strength is probably going to be our skills guys on offense. It is mostly upperclassmen."

Mitch McCarty, who received a Flyway Second Team All-Conference nod last season is returning as quarterback and one of the Cougars' team captains.

McMullen, Ritchie, Scholten, Schmidt add to PDTR A-Main Triumph Tallies

Inaugural Plymouth Racing Wall of Fame Class of 2022 honored

A fast, yet intricate racing surface drew the cream of the crop to the top as four distinguished Plymouth Dirt Track Racing veterans paid visits to victory lane in A-main competition, during the inaugural Plymouth Racing Wall of Fame Induction Night and Autograph Night program at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Saturday, August 6.

In the 25-lap Kristine Hartmann Pleasant View Realty 360 Sprint Car A-main, two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh went flag to flag to notch his first main event triumph of the 2022 campaign.

Justin Ritchie of New London claimed his second 25-lap PDTR Sheboygan's Country B93.7 Late Model A-main victory of the 2022 season.

Current PDTR Grand National point leader Luke Scholten of Oostburg notched his second 2022 25-lap Oostburg Automotive A-main triumph.

Travis Schmidt of Waldo used a late-race pass to collect his second 25-lap PDTR Next Step Insurance B Mod A-main victory of 2022.

After starting on the outside of the front row, Brandon McMullen outpowered polesitter Tony Wondra of Campbellsport to lead the opening lap of the 25-lap 360 Sprint A-main as third starter Tyler Brabant of Waupun ducked underneath Wondra to take second, followed by 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Plymouth, who started fifth, in third.

On lap eight, McMullen caught the rear of the field on the lightning fast and tricky third-mile clay oval track surface. Two laps later, Schmidt worked his way past Brabant to assume second in the running order.

The first of three caution periods appeared on lap 12 when Tyler Davis of Franklin spun in turn four. On the restart, Brabant got caught along the treacherous cushion and flipped his machine in turn two to bring out a red flag.

Following the restart, McMullen bolted away from the field with Schmidt chasing in second and fourth starter Brandon Berth of Cascade following in third. On lap 14, the third and final caution flag

appeared when Doug Wondra of Oakfield bicycled on the cushion and came to a stop in turn two.

McMullen again controlled the final restart as defending PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion and current points leader Travis Arenz of Sheboygan, who started 13th, moved into fifth on lap 19.

On lap 20, the leaders began to work their way through slower traffic, which allowed Schmidt to cut the gap on McMullen. However, McMullen held strong over the final five laps to fend off Schmidt's advances in thick lapped traffic en route to his 25th career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory, which moved him into a tie for first place on the all-time main event win list with two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee. The race also marked McMullen's 35th career Midwest Sprint Car Association main event victory, which ranks him third on the all-time MSA A-main victory list.

Schmidt had to settle for second, Berth placed third, 2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett placed fourth after starting seventh and Arenz wound up fifth.

Four-time PDTR Late Model champion Brad Mueller of Random Lake outdueled polesitter Turk Letizia of Milwaukee to lead the opening lap of the 25-lap Late Model main event.

On lap two, fourth starter Taylor Scheffler of Waukesha used a low move to take over second before the first of six caution flags appeared on lap three after Letizia turned sideways in turn two to trigger a four-car pile-up.

On lap nine, Scheffler used the high groove to close the gap on the low-riding Mueller before the second caution was displayed when Jim Schmidt of Cleveland slowed in turn two on lap 11.

On the restart, Scheffler hounded Mueller for the lead, while Justin Ritchie, who started 12th, worked his way into third. After Mueller drifted high in turn two on lap 13, Scheffler pulled off a slide job to briefly sweep past Mueller and into the lead before spinning in turn four to bring out the third caution of the race.

When the race resumed, Mueller felt pressure from Ritchie, who worked the low groove, while Mueller moved up to the cushion, while four-time defending PDTR Late Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland, who started seventh, moved into third.

On lap 15, the fourth caution flag appeared when Charlie Schmidt of Oostburg spun in turn four before first-time Plymouth Dirt Track visitor Bobby Gash of Tinley Park, Ill. brought out the fifth caution period after spinning in turn four.

Ritchie flexed his muscle on the restart to duck underneath Mueller and into the lead in turn four on lap 17 just before Mueller exited the race with a rear-end failure, which gave second place to Justin Schmidt, who was racing with a broken left ankle suffered in an accident at The Plymouth Dirt Track on July 16.

After Turk Letizia brought out the sixth and final caution following a spin in turn two on lap 21, Ritchie held on over the final four laps to collect his sixth career PDTR Late Model A-main win.

Justin Schmidt placed second, PDTR Late Model rookie Bill Edler of Howards Grove, who started second, placed third, eighth starter Joe Bongiorno of Milwaukee finished fourth and Sawyer Specht of Sheboygan Falls, who started ninth, placed fifth.

In the 25-lap Grand National main event, 2019 PDTR Grand National champ Tyler Kulow of Plymouth, who started third, outpowered polesitter Steven Weber of Plymouth to lead the opening lap.

After the first of four caution flags was displayed on lap seven when Vince Bartolotta of West Allis spun in turn three, Weber spun in turn two while running second to bring out the second caution flag of the race,

Following the restart, Scholten used the high line to power his way around Weber to take over the top spot in turn two. After Vince Bartolotta and Scott Kafka of Kiel spun in turn three to bring out the third caution, Scholten pulled away from Kulow to build up a full straightaway lead on lap 20.

The fourth and final caution appeared on lap 22 when 2010 PDTR Grand National champion Brian Gilles of Plymouth made contact with the turn two wall.

Following a single-file restart, Scholten bolted away to notch his 17th career PDTR Grand National A-main triumph. Weber worked his way past Kulow with a low move on the final lap to secure second. Kulow placed third, second starter Donny Kulow of Elkhart Lake finished fourth and Kafka rounded out the top five.

After an incident on the initial start involving Spencer Long of Sheboygan Falls, Andy Welter of Hartford and Jonathon Baumann of Sheboygan in turn one, polesitter Brian Konitzer of Sheboygan grabbed the lead on the opening lap with outside front row starter Shane Long of Sheboygan Falls trailing in second.

On lap five, Tim Warner of Malone, who started sixth, steered Jonathan Hitsman's 7H car to third just before Brandon Knepprath of Boltonville spun in turn four. On the restart, Warner used the high groove to power around Long into second before moving in to challenge Konitzer for the lead on lap eight.

After the caution flag appeared on

The Lure of the Bear

This week's column is dedicated to Michelle Chiaro.

Michelle was my bear hunting, winter camping, bow hunting, all forms of fishing, gardening and "Date Night" partner.

Michelle was 50 and on June 15, she passed away unexpectedly from sepsis.

APRIL THROUGH AUG. 3

This was going to be the biggest outdoor adventures year of my life.

I received Montana tags to hunt deer and elk and have plans to do that hunt alone in late October. I also received a tag to hunt black bear in Zone C, which I have ran baits in since 2010 and this would be my first year where, instead of taking a "new bear hunter", I would be the only tag holder and therefore would be the most active bait that I have when the season opens on Sept. 7.

Michelle and I were a complete team when it came to running baits, either together or separate, depending on our schedules, and – let me tell you – Michelle loved running

bear baits.


I started the task in mid-April and, in reality, Michelle and I started last February when we could walk on the frozen marshes of the Meadow Valley Forest in northern Juneau County, which is public land in Juneau, Wood, Jackson and Juneau counties.

Last fall, I was on a duck hunt and camping trip when I had a unique experience. I had hiked from camp about a mile, shot a limit of woodies and kept hearing mallards and geese behind me. I went exploring and found duck/goose paradise and became very lost in knee to chest deep water. More importantly, I found lots of bear scat and trails, which is why we went exploring in February.

The standard procedure for our operation generally was to be at least a half-mile hike from the gravel roads by foot, and we used a hollow stump with a cover for the top and bottom, which is just a three-inch thick piece of a large log. To keep everything out of that stump but black bear, I put logs that are anywhere from five-to-eight feet in length – tepee-style – over the top.

At first, I ran three baits with total truck miles being 52 and foot miles about three.

On Memorial Day weekend, Michelle and I camped and on the last morning, I ran the baits and she broke camp and cooked lunch. At that point, we had been running the baits about 40 days and one of the baits had never been hit. The new one was sporadic, but I had some very cool wolf and bobcat photos and bear were hitting it about once a week.

Bait, and what is it?

So far this year, I am getting all of my bait from BBD out of Abbotsford "Big Bear Down", and I am using cookies and granola that I purchase in 55-gallon drums.

June and early July is a crazy time for black bear and baiters. The bear are in estrus and the sows hang around a good bait and the boars hang around a hot sow. I have one bait that is exceptional, and my gang has harvested several from it.

This year, I probably had four different boars working it and at least two very hot sows. The pairs would

literally make a bedroom in trail camera range, and my pics included lovers sleeping, eating, and loving.

On June 15, just like that, my woman was taken from me with zero warning and, I have to tell you, I have about 20 bad episodes each and every day.

On the bright side, when Michelle first passed, every moment of every day was a horror story for me.

What am I getting at?

Running the baits and staying ultra-busy, never placing blame or having anger, are what is keeping me from requiring a straitjacket.

Every day that I have been home, except one since June 15, I stay outside way past dark and I work, putz and think.

Today was about day 105 on the baits. I have three out; all were hit.

Zone C on the southern end has a problem and that is that the bear are almost always nocturnal once the season starts.

We shall see, and I am betting that, when the time comes, Michelle will be in that tree with me!
