Auf Wiedersehen, Father Tom

Rev. Thomas E. Biersack, a Kewaskum native, to retire after serving Lomira, Mayville and Theresa communities for nearly two decades

After a total of 17 years serving as pastor for the St. Andrew (Lomira), St. Mary (Mayville) and St. Theresa (Theresa) parishes, Reverend Thomas Biersack is retiring Sept. 1. Biersack became the pastor at the St. Mary and St. Andrew churches back in June 2005, and St. Theresa nine years ago.

Prior to his arrival in Mayville, Biersack served at three other churches around the state

over the course of 24 years. His first assignment was at Mother of Perpetual Help on the north side of Milwaukee for six years, his second was at St. Mary's Port Washington for another six years and last was at St. Alphonsus in New Munster.

He was born and raised in rural Kewaskum and his family attended Immaculate Conception parish in West Bend.

Biersack had thought about continuing his time at his parishes despite his eligibility to retire, but he said, "There was just something inside me that said this is the right time."

As difficult as it was to decide to retire, just as much thought was given to making the decision to become a priest.

"I remember in fifth grade, I had to write an essay about what I wanted to be when I grew up," Biersack explained. "I remember saying I want-


No Hard Labor On Labor Day

U.S.F.W.S. Seeks Comments on Bat Conservation Plan

We at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) are seeking public input on a draft plan to conserve imperiled bats on some forested lands in three Midwestern states. The Lakes States Draft Habitat Conservation Plan is part of applications by the natural resources departments of Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin for three separate incidental take permits under the Endangered Species Act for forest management activities that may affect four bat species.

"We welcome the initiative of the states of Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin as they seek to conserve bats while carrying out responsible forest management," said Lori Nordstrom, assistant regional director for the Midwest Region of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "Forest landowners play a pivotal role in the conservation of wildlife, including for many bat species."

Participation in this plan is voluntary. If the plan is approved and permits issued, eligible forest landowners and managers who choose to sign on will have certainty that their activities will not violate the Endangered Species Act.

Species covered in the draft plan include the federally endangered Indiana bat, the threatened northern long-eared bat, and two species of concern, the tri-colored bat and the little brown bat. All four species use forested lands for roosting, foraging and raising pups in spring and summer. These bats hibernate in caves or abandoned mines during the winter.

Habitat conservation plans are agreements between the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and a landowner, private company or non-federal agency allowing them to undertake otherwise lawful activities on their property that may result in the incidental, or unintentional, "take" (harming, harassing, killing) of a federally endangered or threatened species. Permit applicants must minimize and mitigate the impact of the incidental take caused by their actions.

The draft habitat conservation plan developed by the three states is designed to avoid or reduce unintentional take of the covered bat species. The plan also provides measures to alleviate impacts of forest management on the bats when unintentional take occurs.

The draft Lake States plan outlines conservation measures to be carried out during forest management actions. If we approve the habitat conservation plan and issue the incidental take permits, eligible non-federal landowners, including states, tribes, local governments and private landowners, may sign on to the permit for their state if they adopt the plan's bat conservation measures.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources is applying for an incidental take permit for the endangered Indiana bat, the threatened northern long-eared bat, and two species of concern, the tri-colored bat and little brown bat. Minnesota DNR and Wisconsin DNR are applying for incidental take coverage for the northern long-eared bat,

tricolored bat and little brown bat. The states will implement measures of the habitat conservation plan specific to their state.

If issued, the permits would cover incidental take resulting from forest management activities like timber harvest; forest-related road and trail construction, maintenance, and use; and prescribed fire. Covered lands for the Lake States habitat conservation plan include all forestlands not owned or managed by the federal government within the three states of Michigan, Minnesota, and Wisconsin.

The permits, if issued, would cover unintentional take of these bats resulting from activities that support forest management on large tracts (generally more than 10,000 acres) of non-federal forested lands, or smaller tracts of non-federal forested lands that contain known hibernation sites or maternity roosts within the three states. Participation in the conservation plan is completely voluntary. Only a fraction of the eligible lands are expected to be enrolled if permits are issued.

To offset any incidental take of the bats, the states propose to avoid certain activities during the pup-rearing season and to conduct species habitat protection, enhancement and restoration. The conservation strategy is expected to benefit bats through forest management which protects potential habitat for bats; site-level maintenance and promotion of roost trees and foraging habitat; the protection and management of covered species' habitat; the protection and enhancement of hibernation sites; and other specific measures that minimize or avoid effects to the covered species.

We are seeking public comment on the Lake States Draft Habitat Conservation Plan and will accept comments received or postmarked on or before September 28.

A virtual information meeting will be held on Thursday, September 8, at 6 p.m. ET, to provide information about the HCP and answer questions. Information on how to join the meeting is available at <http://www.lakestatesnepa.com/index.html>.

ed to be a priest, but after college I wasn't so sure."

Biersack took a year off after college and moved to Houston where he worked for a University of Texas police department.

Following that year away, Biersack returned to Saint Francis de Sales Seminary for graduate school.

"My third year of graduate school, I went to Portland, Ore. for three months to work in a hospital," Biersack continued. "It was part of my schooling, but it was also a time to give it some thought because, obviously, it is a lifetime commitment. So, it was back and forth."

Part of Biersack wanted a life with a wife and kids; he had grown up in a big family, himself, as the oldest of six children.

But, "after a lot of thought and prayer, I just felt that's what God really wanted me to do," Biersack said.

Biersack still found family in his congregations and communities he served.

Looking back at his time as a spiritual leader, he has loved the people and appreciated how welcoming they have been.

He wrote in a letter to the congregation:

"I thank you all for taking me into your lives."

He added that he has enjoyed praying and sharing in the highs and lows of life with everyone.

"I'm very thankful and grateful for my 17 years at these parishes," Biersack said. "I'm sure I made some lifelong friendships."

Biersack's last masses were this week: Wednesday, Aug 31, was his final weekday mass. On Sunday, Aug. 28, he had his final weekend mass, which would not have been complete without his famous jokes during his homily.

On Sunday, his joke went something like this:

"Ole and Sven grabbed their poles and headed out to do some ice fishing. As they were augering a hole in the ice, they heard a loud voice from above say, 'There are no fish under the ice.' Ole and Sven moved about 25 feet over and started to make another hole. The voice said a little stronger, 'There are no fish under the ice.' They both looked around and then looked up. Ole said in a humble voice, 'Are you God?' The voice spoke

back, 'No, you idiots! I'm the ice-rink attendant.'"

Biersack won't be far if you are looking for some more good laughs: He is moving into the home his father built in the town of Barton. He is looking forward to making some renovations in his coming free time.

"I'm a little handier than I thought I was," he joked.

Once his home is prepared, he welcomes anyone to come visit.

At the end of Sunday mass, and his letter, Biersack repeated one of his favorite farewells.

"I like the German way of saying it when you depart, 'Auf Wiedersehen,' which means until we see each other again," he shared. "It's not goodbye, it is: 'Until we see each other again.'"





Witnesses Knocking on Doors Again

Jehovah's Witnesses will resume its trademark door-to-door ministry beginning Sept. 1, when a two-and-half-year suspension of the work is officially lifted, just in time to begin a global campaign featuring a new interactive Bible study program.

The decision to resume their door-to-door ministry marks the complete restoration of all pre-pandemic in-person activities for the 1.3 million Jehovah's Witnesses in the 13,000 congregations in the United States. Houses of worship (called Kingdom Halls) were reopened April 1, witnessing in public places resumed May 31 and in-person conventions are once again being planned for 2023.

The suspension of the public ministry was a proactive response by the organization to keep communities and congregants safe. The move was also unprecedented. Jehovah's Witnesses had been preaching from house to house without interruption for more than 100 years through an economic depression, two world wars and global unrest. But COVID-19 demanded a different response.

"We believe that the early decision to shut down all in-person activities for more than two years has saved many lives," said Robert Hendriks, U.S. spokesperson for Jehovah's Witnesses. "We're now ready and eager to reconnect with our neighbors once again – person to person, face to face. It's not the only way that

we preach, but it has historically been the most effective way to deliver our message of comfort and hope."

The move coincides with a global campaign to distribute a new interactive Bible study program available in hundreds of languages at no cost. The program comes in the form of a book, online publication or as an embedded feature within the organization's free mobile application, JW Library. Released in late 2020, the interactive study platform combines text, video, illustrations and digital worksheets to help learners of all ages.

"This new study program is designed to match the learning needs of the 21st-century student," Hendriks said. "We're excited to begin sharing it with our neighbors as we return to making personal visits."

The pandemic forced Jehovah's Witnesses to quickly pivot to virtual meetings and conventions, while conducting their ministry exclusively through letters, phone calls and virtual Bible studies. This has led to growth in meeting attendance and the number of congregants, with more than 400,000 newly baptized witnesses joining the ranks of 120,000 congregations globally in just the first two years of the pandemic.

National Preparedness Month – Red Cross Urges Everyone to Get Ready for Emergencies

"More powerful climate driven occurrences are happening across the U.S. than ever before," said Mark Thomas, Regional CEO and Southeast Wisconsin Chapter Executive Director, American Red Cross. "In fact, there have been more climate-related disasters in the nation over the past two decades than in any other country. It's vital that everyone take steps to be prepared."

Three Easy Steps

Three simple steps can help to keep your family safe during disasters:

1) Build your emergency kit with a gallon of water per person, per day, non-perishable food, a flashlight and a battery-powered radio. Also include a first aid kit, medications, supplies for infants or pets, a multi-purpose tool and personal hygiene items. And don't forget to add copies of important papers, cell phone chargers, blankets, maps of the area and emergency contact information.

2) Plan what to do in case you are separated from your family during an emergency and what to do if you have to evacuate. Make sure to coordinate your plan with your child's school, your work and your community's emergency plans.

3) Stay informed by finding out what emergency situations may occur where you live, work and go to school, how local officials will contact you during a disaster and how you will get im-

portant information, such as evacuation orders.

Include your pets in your emergency plans. Remember, if you and your family need to evacuate, so does your pet. It's important to plan in advance to know which pet-friendly hotels are in your area, and where your pets can stay in an emergency situation.

Take any special considerations into account as part of your emergency planning. Older adults or people with mobility, hearing, learning or seeing disabilities may need to create a support network of people that can help during an emergency. Create a plan that takes into account your capabilities, any help you may need and who can provide it, especially if you need to evacuate or if the power goes out for several days.

Help Your Community

Red Cross volunteers play critical roles in their local communities by making sure families don't have to face tough times alone. "Be ready to not only help your loved ones, but your neighbors too," said Thomas. "Join us as a Disaster Action Team volunteer, learn lifesaving skills by signing up for first aid or CPR classes, or make an appointment to give blood or platelets."

A strong blood supply is key to preparedness for disasters and medical emergencies, and donors can ensure blood is on the shelves the moment it's needed. Donors can schedule an appointment to donate using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, by visiting RedCrossBlood.org or by calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

The Kewaskum community, along with the rest of the nation, will observe Patriot Day on September 11. A ceremony will be held at 9:15 a.m. at the Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex. The public is invited. The 30-minute ceremony will include a presentation by the American Legion Honor Guard. State Rep. Jesse Kremer and Village Administrator Matt Heiser will both speak at the event. Music will be performed by Kewaskum High School students. This is the 16th anniversary of the September 11 terrorist attacks in New York City, Washington D.C., and Pennsylvania.

The social support group is facilitated by trained adults under the Washington County United Way and sponsored by National Association of Mental Illness. The group is led by Peggy LaFleur and Suzanne Milkus. The group offers a safe place for the teens to share their feelings with one another.



2022 Hook and Line Lake Sturgeon Season Opens Sept. 3

WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced that the inland hook and line season for lake sturgeon will take place Sept. 3 - Sept. 30 on certain waters. Lake sturgeon in these waterbodies remain strong thanks to continued science-based management practices and habitat work.

To harvest a sturgeon, anglers must have a valid fishing license and purchase either an inland or boundary water sturgeon harvest tag. Licenses and tags can be purchased through Go Wild, the DNR's online license portal or at one of our licensed sales locations.

All licenses and regulations apply.

A hook and line sturgeon tag is not required if an angler plans to release the sturgeon they catch.

The minimum length for harvesting sturgeon is set at 60 inches, with a one-fish limit per season. If an angler catches a lake sturgeon that they wish to harvest, they must immediately validate their tag. Any harvested sturgeon must be registered at a designated registration station no later than 6 p.m. the day after they caught the fish.

If anglers catch a tagged sturgeon, they should submit the date of catch, location and tag number, color and material composition (i.e. metal or plas-

tic) and the length of the fish to the county biologist where the fish was caught. Tags are located near the dorsal fin of sturgeon and the information these tags contain is used to monitor the movement and growth of lake sturgeon, aiding in future species management.

Eden Girl Injured by Toppling Hay Bale

It has been reported by KFIZ News-Talk AM that on August 24, an Eden girl, age 9, was rushed to Childrens Hospital Of Wisconsin in Milwaukee after a large hay bale her and two other children fell on her while playing.

The Fond du Lac County Communications Center received a 911 call at just before 3 p.m. stating the hay bale had fallen on the girl at W3551 Sunny Rd, in the Township of Eden.

Deputies from the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office along with Campbellsport Ambulance, City of Fond du Lac Fire/Rescue, and Eden Fire Department and first responders were dispatched. ThedaStar medical helicopter was also requested to the scene and flew the girl to the Milwaukee hospital with serious injuries.

An investigation of the incident revealed that three children were chasing after kittens in a barn when two of the children climbed on two large hay bales that were stacked on top of one another while the 9-year-old remained on the ground level. The hay bales tipped over, trapping the 9-year-old under one of the bales.

Two adults on the scene were able to remove her from underneath the bale of hay before first responders arrived.

The incident is not considered suspicious and the other children were not injured.




Our summer reading program was a tremendous success this year, as well, with children reading a combined total of over 800 hours this summer.



Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or free milk, households must fill out the application and return it to the school (unless notified at the start of the school year that children are eligible through direct certification). Additional copies are available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by agency or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals or free milk for children in a household where one or more household members receive FoodShare, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, list the FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 case number, program name, list the names of all school children, sign the application, and return it to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk of households not receiving FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 cash benefits, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, total number of household members, and the adult signing the application form must also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or mark the box to the right of "Check if no SSN". Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy the Food Service Administrative Assistant will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals or free milk if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

Children formally placed in foster care are also eligible for free meal benefits. Foster children may be certified as eligible without a household application. Households with foster children and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household member, as well as any personal income available to the foster child, on the same application that includes their non-foster children.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. Public Law 103-448 limits the release of student free and reduced price school meal eligibility status to persons directly connected with the administration and enforcement of federal or state educational programs. Consent of the parent/guardian is needed for other purposes such as waiver of text book fees.







Once again, McMullen set a blistering pace as he skillfully maneuvered his way through thick lapped traffic throughout the remainder of the race, even going three-wide to pass a group of slower cars on one occasion.

As the laps wound down, McMullen built up a full-straightaway lead over Fassbender en route to his second straight PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main to vault into sole possession of first place on the all-time PDTR 360 Sprint A-main victory list with his 26th career A-main triumph at The Plymouth Dirt Track. The win was also McMullen's 36th career A-main victory in Midwest Sprint Car Association competition.

Fassbender placed second, fourth starter Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum came home third, third starter Tim Haddy of Waupun placed fourth and defending PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion and current point leader Travis Arenz of Sheboygan charged from the 14th starting spot to place fifth in the caution-free race.

Outside front row starter Nick Schultz of Beaver Dam led the opening lap of 25-lap B Mod A-main as fourth starter Elijah Koenig bolted into second from his fourth starting spot.

On lap 4, 2022 PDTR B Mod champion Andy Welter of Hartford, who started sixth, used a low move to pass third starter Geoff Jeche of Juneau. On lap 10, Koenig moved in to challenge Schultz for the top spot along the cushion as Welter slipped past Schultz to take second.

The lone caution flag appeared on lap 22 when Jason Schilling of Milwaukee stopped along the backstretch.

When the race resumed, Welter was pushing hard to pressure Koenig for the big-money victory when he spun in turn two on the second to last lap. Koenig held on over the final circuit to collect his third career PDTR B Mod victory, which was worth a healthy payout of \$1,700.

Schultz placed second, Jeche took third, two-time PDTR B Mod champion Tim Warner of Malone took fourth after starting ninth and eighth starter Travis Schmidt of Waldo wound up

fifth.

In the 20-lap Wisconsin Legends Racing Dirt Series A-main, polesitter Hunter Cardinal of Richfield led the opening two laps before spinning in turn two and collecting eighth starter Parker Jones to bring out the lone caution flag of the race on lap 3.

Eric Blumer, who started sixth, inherited the lead on the restart while Mike Mueller of Waupun, who started third, and Hayden Schmuhl of Beaver Dam, who started fifth, dueled side by side for second with Schmuhl taking the spot on lap 7.

On lap 9, Schmuhl got sideways in turn two, which allowed 12th starter Austin Winkel of Sheboygan Falls and Hartland's Jordan Miklas, who started 13th, to sneak by before engaging in a heated duel for the runner-up spot.

Miklas finally surged past Winkel into second on lap 12, while Jones charged into third on lap 17, after restarting at the rear of the field on lap 3.

Blumer cruised over the final three laps to score the victory in the first Wisconsin Legends Dirt Racing Series A-main ever contested at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

Miklas finished second, Jones placed third, Michael Weber of Marion, Iowa, who started ninth, finished fourth and seventh starter Ryan Sullivan of Waupun placed fifth.

Outside front row starter Tyler Kulow grabbed the lead on the opening lap of the 25-lap Grand National A-main with polestier Steven Weber of Plymouth following in second before fourth starter Chad Espen of West Bend swept past Weber to assume the second spot on lap 6.

The first of four caution flags flew on lap 7 when Scott Kafka of Kiel spun in turn two. Following the restart, Espen moved in to challenge Kulow for the lead with 2022 PDTR Grand National champion Luke Scholten of Oostburg, who started third, trailing in third on lap 10.

Three laps later, Scholten spun in turn four to bring out the second caution flag. One lap later, Kafka spun again along the backstretch to prompt the third caution flag of the race.

When the race resumed, sixth starter Nick

Schumacher of Eagle made his presence felt as he rode the high groove to challenge the low-riding Espen for second place starting on lap 15.

The fourth and final caution flag was then displayed on lap 18 when Scholten spun in turn two. Schumacher again worked the high groove on the restart and briefly pulled even with Kulow over the final two laps.

However, Kulow proved to be too strong as he rolled to his 12th career PDTR Grand National A-main victory. Schumacher had to settle for second, Espen placed third, 2018 PDTR Grand National champ Matt Loehr of Dotyville finished fourth after starting eighth and Weber rounded out the top five.

Colton See of Chilton won the 12-lap B Mod B-main.

Lance Fassbender earned PDTR 360 Sprint Car overall fast qualifier honors with a lap of 12.542 seconds.

The 11th full PDTR racing program of the 2022 season, which was sponsored by Hidden Dreams Livestock, drew a season-high 103 cars, including 21 Dirt Kings Tour Late Models, 24 PDTR 360 Sprint Cars, 26 B Mods, 18 Legends and 14 Grand Nationals.

PDTR action resumes Saturday, Sept. 3 during the 2022 Sheboygan County Fair with an all-Sprint Car program featuring the Bumper to Bumper Interstate Racing Association 410 Sprint Cars and PDTR 360 Sprint Cars with on-track action slated to start at 5 p.m.



It was a night filled with firsts at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Friday, Aug. 26 as veteran Milwaukee racer Turk Letizia notched his first career WABAM Dirt Kings Late Model Tour A-main victory on his home track, two-time track champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh moved into sole possession of first place on the all-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory list and Eric Blumer of Sun Prairie captured the first-ever Wisconsin Legends Racing Dirt Series A-main contested at The Plymouth Dirt Track to highlight a full five-division racing program.

In other main event action, Elijah Koenig of Beaver Dam pocketed \$1,700 for taking the victory 25-lap Next Step Insurance A-main featuring an increased payout courtesy of Thomas Ott and Travis Schmidt Racing, while 2019 PDTR Grand National champion Tyler Kulow of Plymouth claimed the victory in the 25-lap Oostburg Automotive Grand National A-main.

After lining up on the outside of the front row, A-main, Turk Letizia outpowered polesitter Justin Ritchie of New London to lead the opening lap of the 30-lap WABAM Dirt Kings Late Model Tour A -ain.

Campbellsport (CHS) opened the 2022 cross country season at the 11-school Kettle Moraine Lutheran (KML) Charger Invitational Thursday, Aug. 25.

The meet was almost cancelled due to heavy rains Wednesday night, but KML coaches were able to make some changes to the course to avoid flooded areas.

Despite the graduation of three seniors from last season's varsity, the Cougar boys got the season off to a strong start with a second place finish.

Cedar Grove-Belgium placed four runners in the top ten to win the meet with 42 points.

CHS placed five runners in the top 20 to take second with 59. Host KML (71) was third, DASH Homeschool (91) fourth, Winnebago Lutheran (131) fifth, Living Word Lutheran (142) sixth, Washington County Homeschool (152) seventh and Kewaskum (192) eighth. Greenfield, Martin Luther and Milwaukee Lutheran were incomplete.

Returning varsity runners led the way for Campbellsport.

Logan and Brody Nolan took fifth and seventh

place, respectively, with times of 19:32 and 19:37. Aydan Meilahn came in 13th at 20:06, and Sawyer Dirmeier was 17th at 20:27.

Trent Dieckman, Jon Thelen and Owen Blevins, who ran on the JV squad last season, moved up to varsity for this first race of the season. Trent finished 19th in 21:08, Jon was 27th in 21:54 and Owen took 39th in 23:36.

There were only four complete JV teams for boys, but it was an exciting battle for first place. DASH Homeschool and Cedar Grove-Belgium tied with 46 points. DASH was award first based on the better finish of their 6th place runner. Campbellsport was only three points behind in third with 49 points. KML finished 4th with 78.

Wyatt Blevins and Noah Bobb were the top Cougar runners in 5th and 6th. Wyatt took 5th with a time of 21:44, and Noah came in 6th at 22:26. Aydryan Meilahn cracked the top ten finishing 8th in 22:34.

Max Engle (23:48) took 15th, Nathan Reigle (24:53) was 22nd, Henry Allickson (25:04) was 23rd and Abe Poquette (27:17) was 33rd, Aidan Polzin (31:13) was 39th, Caleb White (33:46) was 41st and Sam Ellenbecker (33:46) was 42nd.

Kewaskum won the girls varsity race with 29

points.

Cedar Grove Belgium was a close second with 32. Living Word Lutheran took third with 89 points followed by Winnebago Lutheran (WLA) in fourth with a total of 106 and DASH Homeschool fifth with 109 points.

The Cougars ran only three girls on varsity for the first meet.

Sienna Hewitt took 24th in a time of 26:20. Lydia Toshner was 39th in 30:11 and Megan Dickman was 41st in 31:00.

In the girls JV race, WLA won easily with a score of 29. Greenfield was runner-up with 66, Campbellsport third with 68 and Kewaskum came in fourth with 75 points.

Emily Ohme was the top runner for the Cougars finishing 6th in 28:54. Kaylei Urban took 15th in 30:40. Katrina Ohme and Emily Reigle placed 23rd and 24th in 34:03 and 34:05. Hannah Thelen finished 27th in 36:01.

Campbellsport will next compete in the Valley Christian Warrior Invite on Thursday, Sept. 1. The meet will be held across the street from the school at Hickory Oaks Campground. The Middle School race will be first at 4 p.m. followed high school girls at 4:35 and the high school boys at 5:30.

Independent Living 101

The column that I am about to write was supposed to be written on June 15, and it is my annual hobby farming "getting-by-with-nature" as much as possible story.

Instead, the good lord decided to have my beautiful woman pass away that night, and so I had my 21-year-old daughter Selina write my column, so I could meet my deadline.

Here is another unique situation.


I am writing this week's column in one of my three gardens, and it is the one that is directly across a fence from my sweet corn and on the other side of the corn I just let my steers into - a small area where they can graze on knee deep clover.

Earlier in the summer, I was working in one of my other gardens, and it was five days after Michelle passed.

It seemed like my steers were on the wrong side of the fence. I was correct, and in a matter of five minutes all 36 of my pepper plants were consumed to nearly the ground, and it was a challenge to get the steers onto the right side of the fence and minimize the damage.

At this moment all I can hear is grazing cattle.

After I finish this column, I am going to freeze about 25 more bags of corn. I have already frozen

42 and, after the corn freezing, I am going to harvest enough veggies to make another Nescro of chili. So far, I have made and froze or given away seven gallons and have to make at least 20 to take me through the next 12 months. I put lots of venison burger in it and freeze most of it in 1-quart bags and it makes for a perfect meal on my trips. I will try to write this corn freezing recipe as simple as possible to save space:

- 15 cups of corn that has been cut off the cob, has been in ice water;
- 4 cups of ice water;
- 1.25 cups of sugar;
- 2 teaspoons of salt.

No blanching, super-fast, best frozen corn ever.

This year Michelle and I planted enough garden to give us food for 12-months for six people, which would have been three of her children, Selina,

Michelle and myself. I lost all of my consumers but Selina as well as my labor force. If you would come to my house, you may actually be in disbelief as to the amount of garden.

In the fall, I fence off my main garden and let the cattle live in it, which makes incredible soil in what is one of the worst counties in the state for growing food (unless you use large amounts of fertilizer).

I have all of my firewood cut, split and stacked under shelter for this winter and soon I may harvest a black bear, will probably harvest a white-tail or two and, in October, I will be heading to Montana to hunt elk and mule deer with a rifle on a lone-wolf hunt that will be a huge challenge and should be very good for my mental health.

Everything I do, or at least I try, is to be as independent as possible including how I earn a living.

I miss Michelle, but I need to keep putting one foot in front of the other!

“We regrouped at half try to address some of our own issues and came back out with a different edge,” Wondra said.

Benjamin Timm was hot again for the Cougars. He ran three yards for a touchdown in the third quarter, scored from 52-yards out for another to kick off the fourth quarter and scored the final touchdown for Campbellsport on a 10-yard run.

Each time the Indians got the ball back in the fourth, they scored. With just 0:08 in the game, Hunter Loser scored a five-yard touchdown putting Kewaskum back on top and leaving the Cougars no time to regain the lead.

“I think this game was good for us in a couple ways,” Wondra noted. “Being a physical, hard hit-

ting game it showed our young players what varsity football is going to be. It also showed what we are as a team. They could have quit at half, but didn’t. They came back out and never backed down to the challenge. I’m proud of the fight they showed and we can continue to build on this.”
