9/11 Program to Commemorate the 21st Anniversary of September 11

To commemorate the 21st anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, a program will be held on Sunday, Sept. 11, at 1 p.m. at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial & Education Center, located at 1308 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum. The event will remember the sorrow of that day, but also the dedication, strength and resolve of those who responded to the tragic events.



Burgess said.

Also speaking at the program will be Emerson Lehmann, a reporter for CBS 58 Milwaukee and a graduate of Kewaskum High School. Seeing the attacks of September 11, 2001, on television is one of his earliest memories. He recalls learning a lot about 9/11 from former KHS

teacher Jerry Gosa, and he will speak to the importance of education.

“It will be an honor to speak at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial. As a Kewaskum native, it’s been very special to see the memorial take shape in our community, especially considering the impacts the attacks had on our village with the loss of Andrea Haberman. Considering I was just 4 years old when the attacks took place, myself and others my age and younger had to rely on education to really comprehend all that took place on 9/11. I’m grateful for the opportunity to speak about the importance of education and never forgetting those lost that day,” Lehmann said.

Others participating in the program include the Rev. Jacob Strand, the American Legion Post 384 Honor Guard, Kewaskum High School band, Kewaskum Fire Department, Kewaskum Police Department and singer Windy Hope.

The event is free of charge and open to the public. Please note that Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum will be closed between Main Street and Second Street during the event.

Speaking at the event will be Lisa Burgess, a survivor of the 9/11 attack on the Pentagon. She will speak about her firsthand experiences the day of the attack.

“Commemorating Sept. 11 isn’t some morbid wallow in old news. It keeps a sacred promise to the victims. We remember you. You live on in our hearts,” Burgess said.

A former reporter for Stars and Stripes newspaper, Burgess was the first to report the Pentagon attack.

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Confirmed in Washington County

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) has identified a case of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in a backyard flock in Washington County.

This is Wisconsin’s first confirmed case of HPAI in a domestic flock since May. In April, Fond du Lac County recorded 17 birds with HPAI.

This year, 23 flocks in 15 counties have been confirmed with HPAI. All infected flocks are depopulated to prevent spread of the disease. This week, Indiana and Minnesota have also announced new cases of HPAI in domestic flocks, and there have been recent detections among wild birds in Wisconsin. The fall and winter could be a critical time for virus transmission, so DATCP urges all poultry owners to implement strong biosecurity measures to protect their birds from the disease.

HPAI viruses are highly contagious and often fatal to domestic poultry. The disease can be spread by contact with infected birds, equipment or clothing worn by anyone working with the animals.

Signs of HPAI include:

- Sudden death without clinical signs;
- Lack of energy or appetite;
- Decrease in egg production; soft, misshapen eggs;
- Purple discoloration of wattles, comb, and legs;
- Difficulty breathing;
- Runny nose, coughing, sneezing;
- Stumbling or falling down;
- Diarrhea.

DATCP reminds Wisconsin poultry owners to register their premises. State law requires that all livestock owners register where their animals are kept. Registration helps animal health officials communicate with flock owners during disease outbreaks.

Two Animals Test Positive for West Nile Virus

State Health Department urges everyone to protect themselves against mosquito bites

WIS. DEPT. OF HEALTH SERVICES

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) is reminding people to protect themselves from mosquito bites now that two animals in the state have tested positive for West Nile virus (WNV). A bird from Milwaukee County and a horse from Trempealeau County are the first reported WNV infections in the state this year. No human cases of WNV have been reported yet in 2022. The presence of animals with WNV confirms that there are mosquitoes infected with WNV in the state that can transmit the virus to people and other animals.

"These cases are a reminder of the importance of taking precautions to protect ourselves from mosquitoes and the viruses they carry, which poses a risk to all Wisconsinites, especially to those who have weakened immune systems," said State Health Officer Paula Tran. "By wearing insect repellent and eliminating standing water around our homes where mosquitoes breed, we can help protect ourselves and our neighbors."

WNV is spread to humans, horses, birds, and other animals through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes acquire WNV by feeding on infected birds. The virus is not spread directly from person to person, animal to animal, or animal to person.

As another Labor Day comes and goes, memories of my first jobs drift back. My working life began at age twelve, alongside my cousin, Karl Marquardt. I was hired by the village veterinarian, Doc Huspen during haying. Just strong enough to lift the cumbersome bales. When we filled one side of the barn it was time to descend ... on a rickety elevator – a skeleton frame of tubing and chain drive.

Instead I headed for a wooden ladder that ran from the loft but stopped a good 10 feet shy of the floor. Somebody sensed my panic and older, stronger hands reached up, brought me to safety. I knew then it was my first and last day.

A couple years later, Bill Stoffel at the First State Bank needed someone to mow around the

building, which Krebs Chiropractic now occupies. My mother cleaned the bank offices and buffed the marble floors to a slick sheen. On her recommendation, I took over lawn maintenance including trimming a pair of bushes that seemed to grow as fast as they were shorn. It was tedious to lug a heavy manual push mower up and down two flights of stairs. Shins constantly smacked and bruised. Despite my biggest paycheck of \$17.25, apathy and shoddy mowing spelled the end.

Fresh out of high school in August of 1976, I toiled during the corn pack at California Cannery in Lomira. I drove home from 12-hour shifts straight into the morning sun. Exhausted, pants cuffs full of kernels. It was the longest five weeks of my life. I leaned over the second floor balcony one night, stared at the concrete floor below. Would've almost welcomed its solid release.

Yet this too passed. What didn't and still remains is a work ethic earned through the pores. By sheer dint of sweat, and sometimes, blood.

D.H.S. Expands Access to COVID-19 Self-tests

Wisconsin households now eligible to order a free package of COVID-19 self-tests

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) is launching an online program for Wisconsinites to get free at-home rapid COVID-19 tests delivered directly to them. Starting September 1, Wisconsin residents can go to the Say Yes! COVID Test website at <https://www.sayyescovidhometest.org> and place an order for a package of five rapid antigen COVID-19 tests at no cost. Initial supplies will allow each household to order one package that will arrive in one-two weeks.

"It is critical for Wisconsinites to have access to a COVID-19 test when they need one, and this program delivers tests right to their door," said Karen Timberlake, DHS secretary-designee. "We encourage all Wisconsin households to have COVID-19 self-tests on hand to protect themselves and those around them."

Taking a COVID-19 self-test provides results within minutes. This allows people to make decisions that will keep those around them safe. In addition to the Say Yes! COVID Test program, Wisconsinites can access a COVID-19 test by:

- Purchasing self-tests through pharmacies, retail outlets, or online. Self-tests are widely available at pharmacies and other retail stores across the state.
- Using health insurance, Medicaid, or Medicare plans to cover the cost of self-tests. Private insurers and some Medicare plans continue to cover the cost of eight rapid COVID-19 tests per member each month. Members of BadgerCare Plus and most Wisconsin Medicaid programs can also receive COVID-19 tests from Medicaid-enrolled pharmacies using their ForwardHealth ID card. People are encouraged to contact their health insurance program for more information.
- Visiting a free local community testing site.

There are currently more than 500 community testing sites across the state.

- Contacting a health care provider. Your local or tribal health department, primary health care provider, or community health center can help find a test near you.

In addition, DHS has recently launched programs to provide local and tribal health departments, K-12 schools, and shelters with access to self-tests for distribution to the populations they serve. Through these programs, nearly 464,000 self-tests have been made available to community organizations and the public since May. Test kits continue to be ordered and distributed to these entities for distribution.

To obtain reliable results and help stop the spread of COVID-19, it is important to know when to take a test. Anyone experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, should take a test immediately. Everyone, regardless of vaccination status, should take a COVID-19 test five days after being exposed to someone with COVID-19.

If you test positive with a COVID-19 self-test, stay home, separate yourself from others, and notify your close contacts who were exposed. Contact a doctor, community health center, or pharmacy to see if COVID-19 treatments may be recommended for you.

The Say Yes! COVID Test program is funded in part through the American Rescue Plan and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention funds.



Summer Days on the Wisconsin River

This past week, I headed to Green Bay with my 18.6 War Eagle, both of my golden retrievers – Ruby and her five-month-old pup “Red” – for two days on the water and a night of camping.

My plan was to troll for walleye and see what I could catch.

MONDAY, AUG. 22
HIGH: 82. LOW: 57.

The old Chevy would turn 350,000 miles this week, and it still has its original motor, tranny and exhaust. To be honest, I was very satisfied to see it do an excellent job pulling the War Eagle to Little Suamico, where I would launch at Geano Beach.

Anytime that you put a boat in the water with a plan of camping and fishing, it's kind of a big deal to have all of the right gear. I had the gear and secured some solid advice at the landing and that was to head out to 27-feet of water and troll with night crawler harnesses.

The last time that I launched at Geano Beach was with a canoe, and I limited out on walleye and caught a 47-inch musky on a crawler harness. I had no idea the musky was a musky, and it pulled me around for a half-an-hour before I saw it.

The time before that, I was three miles from shore, fishing in the War Eagle, and I got a call from Jeff Moll that a bad storm was going to hit. I got whacked hard on the ride back to the launch, and it was one of the top-10 “I-should-have-died” experiences of my life.

Today would be different; almost no wind, sunny skies and it seemed like there was at least a hundred boats on the water.

I pulled two crawler harnesses or a crankbait that I would switch about every two hours as I experimented.

I had been trolling for four hours and had not had a hit when one of my rods with a crawler harness started bending and it was fish on. The fight was great. and soon I netted a 27-inch

As far as I was concerned, my trip was success.

It seemed that my action was slow but steady, as three hours later, I had my next strike and, this time, I caught a 24-inch walleye, and I was a very happy camper.

It seemed 27-feet of water with my harness back, 100-feet behind my planer board was the right number and my third and last hit of the day came just before dark, and it was another 24-inch walleye.

I pulled lines, headed to some pri-

vate land, which was remote and beautiful, built camp and slept on the sand with my two pups.

TUESDAY, AUG. 23
HIGH: 84. LOW: 53.

I had camp broke and was on the water before sunrise with high hopes.

I joined the growing pack of fishermen in deep water and, let me tell you, it is quite world out there.

Trolling with planer boards is a game of skill and common sense, especially when you are alone. You have to be wise, or you are going to have an almost constant issue with other trollers and, when you get a fish on – especially a good one – getting it in the net and not messing up your other lines is a very cool challenge.

I did not get a hit until I had been fishing for three hours, and my first whack was an 18-inch walleye, and

that made me feel like I was doing something right.

In some ways, I am extremely patient and, when it comes to trolling and tip-up fishing, I am very patient. You have to be checking your lines at least every 15 minutes, or you will be weeded up, which means that you are wasting your time.

It would be another three hours before I had another chance and this fish was another 24-incher, which made me very happy.

The pups were awesome in the boat and to keep them cool I just put wet towels over their bodies and they were fine. Red and Ruby always wrestle, and Red is probably the sweetest golden retriever that I have ever had.

I needed a trip like this and was thankful that it worked out with relative ease.

| KEWASKUM'S DAYS GONE BY |**5 Years Ago
September 14, 2017**

It was standing room only as about 160 people packed the inside of Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex last Wednesday to voice their opinions on whether the Kewaskum Village Board should accept a donation of 31 acres of undeveloped land from the James D. Reigle family to be used as a village park. The consensus of the crowd was in favor of the proposed park, although final details of the plan still need to be determined. The land, which is located off Edgewood Road in Kewaskum, has an assessed value of \$649,000. The board had asked community members to provide input by either submitting letters prior to the meeting or voicing their opinions at the meeting. The board is expected to vote on the issue at its September 18 meeting.

Kevin Scheunemann, who is the owner of the Kewaskum Dairy Queen and president of the Village of Kewaskum, received national attention this week for a "politically incorrect" sign he has posted at the Dairy Queen. He said it was transparency that there are expressions of God and country in the restaurant. Scheunemann says things such as Merry Christmas, Happy Easter and In God We Trust. He also gives free sundaes to veterans on Veterans Day. Someone had taken a photo of a sign in his Dairy Queen that says he is politically incorrect. The person posted the photo on the national Dairy Queen Facebook page saying it was extremely offensive and asked that someone "speak with the franchise owner." There were thousands of comments. Channel 58 from Milwaukee picked up the story and broadcasted it. Other media outlets picked it up. Scheunemann said that overwhelmingly, the reaction has been in support of him.

On Monday, about 250 people gathered in front of the Kewaskum Municipal Annex building near a steel beam recovered from the World Trade Center. The group remembered the 2,996 people who lost their lives on September 11, 2001.

Beginning next week, drivers will see a new traffic flow sign as they exit the parking lot located between Kewaskum's middle school and high school. Due to the school district's construction project, there has been some traffic congestion at that corner, at the beginning and end of the school day.

The Crooked Lake Sports Club decided to donate the profits of \$400 from its Labor Day Weekend Horseshoe Tournament to the victims of Hurricane Harvey.

Justin Reck finished ninth and Andrew Carlton 12th for the Kewaskum Boys Cross Country Team at the Mike Huilbert Invitational at Mayville. For the Kewaskum girls, the two top finishers were Maela Olla, eighth, and Alyssa Butz, 11th. The boys were ninth in a field of 29 teams; the girls 10th in a field of 22 teams.

The Kewaskum-Campbellsport Girls Golf Team placed fifth at both the September 7 meet and the September 5 meet.

Kewaskum's tennis team beat Brown Deer 6-1, but lost by 3-4 scores to St. Mary's of Menasha, Mayville, and Grafton during the two-day Brown Deer Invitational.

The football Indians defeated Winneconne 55-20, giving Kewaskum a 2-0 record in conference and 4-0 overall record.

**15 Years Ago
September 13, 2007**

It was a great few days for Clark Eichstedt. The Kewaskum native won the men's club champion-

ship at Hon-E-Kor. A few days later, Eichstedt took the lead on the opening nine holes in the Wisconsin Senior Open, which was played at Merrill Hills Country Club. Eichstedt won. He was the runner-up in last year's event. His victory this year had a prize of \$1,000. Because he played professional golf when he lived in England, Eichstedt is able to accept the money. The victory automatically qualifies Eichstedt for the State Open and State Senior Open next year. He is happy about that, saying it gets tougher each year to qualify for those events.

The Kewaskum Board of Education approved a bid from Robert W. Baird & Company for a \$2 million Tax and Revenue Anticipation Promissory Note. The loan is part of the district's annual cash flow borrow. Last year, the district borrowed \$975,000 to provide operational funds for the 2006-07 fiscal year. This short-term loan was repaid on September 5.

A 2008 International Workstar 7400 was recently added to the fleet of plow trucks for the Town of Kewaskum. Bill Butzlaff Sr. reported the township made the purchase due to the aging fleet and availability of parts in an emergency if one of the other two plow trucks break down. After being outfitted with equipment, the cost of the vehicle was \$124,200. The township borrowed \$60,000 for five years from West Bend Savings Bank.



W.C.H.S. Receives 47 Dogs Illegally Transported to Wisconsin

The dogs were seized from an individual in Richfield, who illegally transported nearly 50 canines from the south

Around 9 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 2, local law enforcement was tipped off about an illegal transport of 47 puppies from southern states to Richfield.

After the Washington County Sheriff's Department intercepted the animals at the individual's residence, a sheriff immediately contacted the Washington County Humane Society (WCHS). Shelter operations manager, Jessie Wermager, worked seamlessly with the Sheriff's Department



to quickly and efficiently mobilize staff and intake the overwhelmed and frightened pups.

Care staff worked diligently into the early hours of the morning intaking each dog. This entailed assessing their medical conditions; providing vaccines, dewormer, flea, tick and heartworm preventatives; and briefly quarantining the dogs from other shelter animals to prevent the potential spread of disease. Early Saturday morning, only a few hours after the dogs arrived, WCHS vet, Steven Cybela, DVM, was onsite to examine them, noting there were no major health concerns.

As of Sunday, Sept. 4, 41 of the 47 pups were spayed/neutered. The shelter reopened Tuesday, Sept. 6, at which time the dogs could be viewed and adopted. If the dogs are still available, readers can meet the available pups between 1-5 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

"WCHS sincerely thanks its dedicated team of caregivers, volunteers, and the Washington County Sheriff's Department for their collaboration in this situation," said a release from the humane society. "The shelter humbly asks the community share this story and help get the pups and all shelter animals

adopted. WCHS is looking for donations of Purina Puppy Chow and durable dog toys."

Monetary donations will be used to purchase dewormer, flea/tick and heartworm preventatives, vaccines and food.

Avoid Ash Trees when Placing Deer Stands

WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) cautions hunters to avoid placing deer stands in or near ash trees this deer season as they start scouting properties.

Most ash trees in the southern half of Wisconsin, Door County and the Mississippi River counties are dead or dying from emerald ash borer infestation. Although emerald ash borer is not as widespread in other parts of the state, the invasive insect continues to be found at additional locations throughout the state and unreported infestations are also likely present.

Tree stand accidents are the leading cause of serious injury to deer hunters. Research shows one in four bowhunters have experienced a fall or near-fall from an elevated stand.

It is important to place and maintain tree stands carefully, as trees infested with emerald ash borer may unexpectedly snap or drop large branches. Hunters should also be cautious around ash trees when on the ground, especially in windy conditions, as infested trees are susceptible to branch and stem breakage. "Dead and dying ash trees are structurally weaker than healthy trees, so they are not safe places to put deer stands," said Bill McNee, DNR Forest Health Specialist. "In many cases, it can be hard to tell if a tree has been infested by emerald ash borer, so hunters should place deer stands in other types of trees instead."

Basic Rules of Treestand Safety

No matter the type of treestand, follow these basic safety rules:

- Always wear a full-body harness also known as a fall-arrest system. Connect to your tether line and keep your tether line short. The tether is designed to keep you in the seat, not to catch you after you fall.
- Always have three points of contact while climbing into and out of the treestand, including two hands and one foot or two feet and one hand at all times.
- Always use a haul line to raise

and lower your unloaded firearm or bow into and out of the stand. You can also use the haul for other things like a heavy backpack.

- Use a lifeline when climbing up and down, this keeps you connected from the time you leave the ground to the time you get back down.

How To Identify Ash Trees

Ash trees can be identified through two key features: opposite branching patterns where two branches come off the main stem directly across from each other and compound leaves with 5-11 leaflets.

Avoid Spreading Forest Pests and Diseases

When traveling for hunting season, obtain firewood close to where it will be burned in order to reduce the chance of spreading tree-killing insects and diseases such as emerald ash borer, spongy moth and oak wilt.


Dry firewood with loose bark has the lowest risk of spreading harmful insects or diseases. Purchasing certified firewood is another option, as it is widely available and is seasoned or treated to eliminate pests and diseases. Bundles of certified

firewood have a printed label showing certification.



team's 2022 media guide, I noticed the page which documents Green Bay's six retired uniform numbers. Six? "That can't be right," I thought to myself. After all, this is the team that has now put 25 players, two head coaches and one general manager in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, including four charter members in 1963.

Of those four, Don Hutson was the only Packer to have his jersey number retired, when the team officially took his No. 14 out of circulation in 1951, making him the eighth and final player to wear the number. Although the exact date is not known, it is believed Tony Canadeo's No. 3 was retired at some point in late 1952, at the end of his final season with the Packers, even though the team's media guide lists Kicker Ben Agajanian as having worn the number in 1961, the seventh and last player to do so. Two years after he hung up his cleats for good, and four years before joining the Pro Football Hall of Fame, quarterback Bart Starr became the 21st and final player to wear No. 15, after it was retired by the team in

November 1973. A decade later, No. 66 was retired in honor of longtime linebacker Ray Nitschke during the halftime ceremony of a December 1983 game against, fittingly, the Chicago Bears – even though two other players are listed as having worn the number in 1978 and 1980. Twenty-two years would go by before another jersey number would join the others on the green facade of Lambeau Field's north end zone. Nine months after his death, Reggie White's No. 92 was formally removed from circulation during the 2005 home opener against Cleveland – plans which had been set by then-Packers CEO Bob Harlan a year earlier, three months prior to White's sudden death in December 2004. The Hall-of-Fame defensive end was the sixth and final Packer to wear the number. The last time the Packers retired a uniform number was in July 2015, in conjunction with quarterback Brett Favre's induction into the team's Hall of Fame. Favre's is perhaps the most iconic No. 4 in all of sports history, although baseball historians might argue that distinction belongs to Lou Gehrig, who wore the number for 14 seasons as a member of the New York

Yankees. After his 16-year stint under center was over in Green Bay, Favre was the fifth and final player to put on No. 4 for the green-and-gold.

Many of us could make the argument for retiring some other uniform numbers Green Bay players have made famous over the years. Now I understand you can't retire a jersey number for every single Pro Bowl or standout player, or fan favorite. The team simply wouldn't have enough to go around if that were the case. But there are a few numbers currently in use or not yet retired that could be, and probably should be. We'll tackle that argument in a future installment of Titledown 101, our new semi-regular feature digging in to some of the history behind our favorite football team from the not-yet "Frozen Tundra" of Green Bay.

Pack has Retired just Six Uniform Numbers

“What’s in a name?” William Shakespeare asks the question in his play Romeo and Juliet to convey that the naming of things is irrelevant. One could argue the same holds true when it comes to athletes.

Oh sure, the players’ last names appear on the backs of their jerseys, sometimes accompanied by a first initial. But what so often catches the fan’s attention first appears below the name, seemingly ten times larger, is the players’ jersey number, which in the NFL also shows up in three other places. Some players have gone so far as to use their jersey numbers as marketing tools. TB12 features an entire line of products inspired by quarterback Tom Brady. In most sports, a few numbers have taken on lives of their own. In NASCAR, the No. 3 has become synonymous with Dale Earnhardt and his race family. In baseball, no one wears No. 42 anymore, after MLB in 1997 universally

retired it for all teams in honor of Jackie Robinson. The same honor was recently bestowed upon Bill Russell’s No. 6 in the NBA. The No. 99 on a hockey sweater will always

mean Wayne Gretzky to most fans. Then there is Michael Jordan’s No. 23, arguably the most iconic sports number of all time, after he won six NBA championships with the

Chicago Bulls in the 1990’s, and created a sports-marketing empire, based largely off the silhouette image of him dunking a basketball, and the number on the back of his jersey.

I got thinking about jersey numbers while gearing up for another season of Green Bay Packers football. While perusing through the

The second half opened with Mayville in possession of the football, but there would be no scoring on the first play.

Mayville, instead, moved methodically down the field – burning more than four minutes of game clock – before Schraufnagel scored his fourth touchdown on an 18-yard run to conclude the drive.

The score was now 21-26, but this is a Campbellsport team that scored 33 and 36 points (respectively) to open the season, and there was no time for the Cards to count chickens.

The Cougars embarked on a long drive that would eat the nearly-eight-minutes remaining in the third.

A third-and-eight pass from McCarty to Mason Willacker up the seam extended the drive and pushed Campbellsport deep into Mayville territory.

Moments later, on fourth down and goal, McCarty connected with Caleb Smith over the middle to steal the lead back, 29-26, and Mayville took possession and a three-point deficit into the final period.

Fourth Quarter

In the final period, the Cards scored again from roughly seven-yards out. It was Schraufnagel’s fifth scoring run of the night, and it gave the home team a 29-33 lead with just eight minutes remaining in the game.

But Campbellsport was up for the challenge all night, and the Cougars capitalized on two enormous Mayville mistakes when possession turned over.

First, a Mayville defender was flagged for a facemask penalty, which gave the Cougars a first-and-10 from roughly the 50-yard-line. On that first-and-10, the Cards were again flagged for a penalty: This one a roughing the passer call, which moved Campbellsport to Mayville’s 41.

Campbellsport moved closer and closer to the goal line, with Timm and Kaehne leading the rushing attack. But, Mayville’s defense managed to force a fourth-and-five with just less than five minutes remaining in the contest.

Sensing a turning point, each team’s fans cheered loudly as the fate of the night seemed to rest on this one pivotal play.

On said play, McCarty dropped back to pass and immediately saw a wide-open receiver up the mid-

Fun in the Flyway, Cougars Fall just Short in Conference Opener

The fantastic football feature between Flyway foes finished with the Mayville Cardinals winning by four

“We knew there were going to be learning and growing pains this season,” said Campbellsport Cougars Head Coach Todd Wondra after a tough but hard-fought loss to rival Flyway Conference member the Mayville Cardinals, 29-33. “[But], we gave ourselves a chance to win and that’s what you hope for.”

It was the second of two straight nail-bitters for the Cougars, as last week’s game – played at Ray Dunn Field in Mayville – came down to the last possession. Just one week prior, the Cougars lost to non-conference Kewaskum in the final seconds of the game.

The first Flyway game for both teams, it was an early-season litmus test for each squad.

For Campbellsport, Wondra’s Cougars were eager to prove that last year was not a fluke – despite graduating a host of talented defensive players – and that his Big Cats were ready to make even bigger moves on the big stage come this postseason. A second Flyway title in as many years is also among the team’s stated goals for the season.

For Mayville, the Cards’ head coach, Scott Hilber, hoped to correct his offense’s energy levels from the previous week, and he wanted a chance to showcase his team’s (which was state runner-up last year in division five) talents against a quality conference opponent.

While only one team could win the Sept. 2 tilt, both teams traded looking like the cream-of-the-crop in Flyway football, as the nip-and-tuck battle came down to the final possession with Mayville just edging out Campbellsport.

Of course, with two high-powered offenses in what has become a quality rivalry game the last two seasons, anything should be expected, although few in the stands or sidelines likely predicted how this game would start.

First Quarter

It was Campbellsport with the ball first and, within seconds, the Cougars took the lead.

On the first offensive play of the game, Ben Timm received the ball via

handoff on a sweep play. Mayville’s defense initially looked to have it snuffed out, but some nifty moves and broken tackles by Timm led the Cougar runner into space at midfield and, from there, it was a track meet. Timm outran the Cards’ secondary 62-yards for a touchdown with relative ease and, with the scoreboard showing just 17 seconds ticked-off the game clock, his Campbellsport Cougars were suddenly up 0-7 (following a successful point-after-touchdown [PAT]).

It was only the beginning of a big night for the junior Timm; he would finish the game with 120 yards on 17 carries.

For Campbellsport, it was an early shot of momentum that away teams covet out of the gate.

“Mayville is one of the top teams in conference, so we knew it was going to be a fight,” said Wondra.

Almost unbelievably, only a few real-life minutes after Timm’s huge run, the Cards’ also scored on their first play from scrimmage – a home-side handoff to Blake Schraufnagel – who went 75-yards to the house.

A missed PAT from Mayville kept Campbellsport in the lead, 7-6, but momentum, perhaps, moved toward Mayville (with, now, just 34 seconds of game-time spent).

Seizing the energy, the Mayville defense came out ready to rumble, and the unit forced Campbellsport into a punting situation.

On that punt, the kick was low and fast, and it careened directly toward a referee, who could not fight his best instinct to catch it. Once the ball made contact with the ref, the play was blown dead, and Mayville, likely, gained at least 10 yards of field position, as a result.

On that drive, Schraufnagel scored his second touchdown on the night from three yards out with 4:18 remaining in the quarter.

Mayville took a 13-7 lead following a successful PAT.

The consecutive scoring drives in the first were the only for either team throughout the contest. The rest of the way, Campbellsport and Mayville would alternate scoring, which set up the feeling of a “last team to score will win” type-of-contest.

Second Quarter

To keep with the theme of big scores on first plays, Campbellsport found pay dirt again to open the second quarter, as a 37-yard scamper by Cole Kaehne (and a successful PAT) gave the lead back to the Cougars, 14-13.

On the other side, the Mayville offense worked its way back to the Cougars’ goal line, and it looked as if the Cards were set to score their third touchdown of the night. On a running play up the middle, however, the Mayville back, while extending to the goal line, lost the possession of the football and Brett Theisen recovered for Campbellsport.

Without much room to work, Campbellsport was unable to move the ball from off its own goal line. The Cougars were forced to punt from deep within their own end zone. This was the second and last punt of the game for either team.

With good field position, Mayville used a balanced approach of runs and passes to get within the 10, again. With less than two minutes remaining in the quarter, a pitch to Schraufnagel toward the away side was set up well, and the running back scored his third touchdown with ease.

Mayville, assuredly, would have loved to go into halftime with a 20-13 lead, but Campbellsport had different plans.

Opening up the passing playbook on their final drive of the first half, McCarty and the Cougars marched right down the field and into scoring position with less than one minute remaining in the quarter. Finally, from eight-yards out and with 40 seconds remaining in the half, McCarty connected with Caleb Smith for his first of two touchdowns on the night.

Suddenly, Mayville’s one-score, halftime lead was a 21-20 advantage for the Cougars.

“I got to give Campbellsport all the credit in the world,” said Hilber, who has immense respect for the Cougars’ coaching staff and senior leader, Mitch McCarty. “They run a good system. They believe in what they do, and they don’t deviate from it. They just do such a wonderful job hiding the football. [McCarty] is the master of hiding the football and, on top of it, he can stand over the top of everybody and chuck it. He’s a match-up problem.”

Campbellsport’s misdirection plays – wherein McCarty turns his back almost entirely to the line, conceals the football from sight and then makes a decision on where to go with it – were equally maddening to the fans as it was to this photographer.

“Who has the ball?” was a frequent question heard in the stands throughout the Cougars’ offensive drives.

Mayville was unable to score with limited time remaining in the first half, and Campbellsport took its one-point lead into the third.
