First Human Case of West Nile Virus in Wisconsin

Confirmed case reported in Sheboygan County

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) is reminding people to protect themselves from mosquito bites following the first confirmed human case this year of West Nile virus (WNV) in a Sheboygan County resident.

Despite cooler temperatures, mosquito activity and the risk of WNV will continue until the first hard frost (temperatures below 28 degrees for at least four consecutive hours). Cases of WNV have also been reported in three animals in Wisconsin, two horses and a bird. These animal cases were located in Trempealeau, Monroe, and Milwaukee counties.

"This report of the first case of West Nile Virus in a person is a reminder of the continued importance of taking precautions to prevent mosquito bites and the viruses they carry as we move into the fall," said State Health Officer Paula Tran. "While West Nile virus and other viruses spread by mosquitoes pose a risk to all Wisconsinites, people who have weakened immune systems are at the greatest risk for serious illness."

WNV is spread to humans, horses, birds, and other animals through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes acquire WNV by feeding on infected birds. The virus is not spread directly from person to person, animal to animal, or animal to person.

The best way to avoid illnesses spread by mosquitoes is to reduce exposure to mosquitoes and eliminate mosquito breeding sites. DHS and

Sheboygan County Health and Human Services offer these tips to protect yourself and your family against mosquito bites.

How to Avoid Mosquito Bites

- Apply an insect repellent with DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR3535 to exposed skin and clothing.
- Prior to heading outdoors, treat clothing with permethrin; do not apply permethrin directly to skin.
- Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during evening or early morning hours, when mosquitoes that spread WNV are most active.
- Wear long sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitoes away from your skin.

Mosquito-Proof Your Home

- Make sure window and door screens are intact and tightly-fitted to prevent mosquitoes from getting into your home.
- Prevent mosquitoes from breeding around your home by removing stagnant water from items around your property, such as tin cans, plastic containers, flower pots, discarded tires, roof gutters, and downspouts.
- Turn over wheelbarrows, kiddie pools, buckets, and small boats such as canoes and kayaks when not in use.
- Change the water in bird baths and pet dishes at least every three days.

When St. Kilian Turned 100

When St. Kilian Catholic Church turned 100 in 1948, it was a special day on the Fond du Lac/Washington County border. Perhaps nothing encapsulates this more than the dozen or so 8- by 10-inch pictures Don Felix acquired when researching St. Kilian. He has uncovered many pictures and stories of the area in the time he dedicated to researching after his retirement. Don doesn't recall who gave him these pictures which are the focus of this article. However, he is certain they are great images to share, whether that be for those who grew up in the church or those who have relatives descending from the parish.

The celebration was significant for many reasons. First, it culminated in a Sunday mass in which the Archbishop of Milwaukee added much pomp and circumstance to the century old parish. This was seconded by the two or three dozen priests who attended. Accordingly, the service in St. Kilian started at 11 o'clock, likely so the reverends could administer their own parish before coming to the ceremony.

On 'Magical Rings'


Dear Reader,

At one time, they comprised a series in a straight line along Highway V from the last big curve before the long stretch into Fond du Lac, right up to either side of the railroad tracks.

A familiar sight was simple white signs on roadside poles announcing these were Luxerin Farms, which ended with the sale of the estate of Rosemary Sheridan.

When you pass by now, you might notice how the barn on the property just before the railroad tracks has been converted into living quarters. A solid deck built across the sunny southern side at second story level. Large windows shimmer in the daytime and sometimes glow in the darkness.

It's scarcely a new trend. Folks have repurposed former cow shelters for quite some time. As anyone who remembers the lot on 45 near County Trunk W was once a farm, later a lumber mill. Then the building bought and turned into a popu-

Eden Resident 'Pays It Forward'

Judy Straub facilitated funds – raised to help her recover from Guillain-Barré syndrome – back into the Eden community

"I felt compelled to pay forward the proceeds," said Judy Straub, an Eden resident who is recovering from Guillain-Barré syndrome, a neurological autoimmune disorder, which, if left untreated, can cause paralysis to parts of the body.

Tabor United Methodist Church – located just east of Eden – held three fundraisers, which benefitted Straub this summer: a July 31 car wash, an Aug. 19 ice cream social and an Aug. 21 bike-a-thon.

Straub arranged for proceeds from the car wash to benefit Camp To Belong, a non-profit that helps reunite adopted children with foster siblings. The ice cream social proceeds went to the Eden Fireman's Association. The funds from the

- Clean and chlorinate swimming pools, outdoor saunas, and hot tubs; drain water from pool covers.

- Trim or mow tall grass, weeds, and vines since mosquitoes use these areas to rest during hot daylight hours.

More Information

Most people (80%) who are infected with WNV do not get sick. Those who do become ill usually experience mild symptoms such as fever, headache, muscle ache, rash, and fatigue. However, some people (less than 1%) who become infected with the virus get seriously ill with symptoms that include high fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, disorientation, mental confusion, tremors, confusion, pa-

ralysis and coma. Older adults and those with compromised immune systems are at greater risk of developing severe illness that can be fatal.

It is important that people contact a health care provider if they suspect they have WNV illness. For those without a provider, help is available by dialing 211 or 877-947-2211, or texting your ZIP code to 898-211 for free, confidential support.

Since WNV was first detected in Wisconsin in 2002, infections in humans have been reported from June through October; however, most people with WNV report becoming ill in August and September.

D.N.R. Asks Public to Help Count Chimney Swifts before Southern Migration

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) asks the public to report chimney swift sightings to help monitor populations and locate important roost sites before they begin their migration south. The call to count is part of Swift Night Out, a continent-wide effort held to raise awareness about the decline of chimney swifts.

According to the Wisconsin Chimney Swift Working Group, after swifts have finished raising their young, they gather in groups at communal roosting chimneys before beginning their fall migration to South America. While migrating through Wisconsin from mid-April to early May, you can find large numbers of chimney swifts and hear their chattering sounds in the early evenings, ready to roost overnight in brick chimneys.

“Volunteers all over the state of Wisconsin have counted thousands and thousands of swifts roosting in chimneys over the past decade,” said Nancy Nabak, chair of the Wisconsin Chimney Swift Working Group. “It’s fascinating to watch, count and listen to swifts as they circle and whirl above chimneys before they roost for the night – it’s a visual sky concert.”

Although volunteers have counted large numbers of swifts since the program began, they’ve also documented the loss of many chimney swifts due to the demolition or capping of chimneys, resulting in a loss of habitat for this federally protected bird. The Wisconsin Chimney Swift Working Group hopes to bring attention to finding ways to protect existing chimneys, therefore protecting the chimney swift population.

Last year, the Wisconsin Chimney Swift Working Group partnered with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service to create a cost-share program to preserve swift chimneys in need of repair. Through the program, the Vernon County Historical Society successfully restored a chimney at the Vernon County Historical Museum in Viroqua, which hosts hundreds of swifts. Those who know of a chimney that needs repair and currently hosts swifts are encouraged to contact the working group via email at helpchimneyswifts@gmail.com.

Chimney swifts nest in eastern North America in the summer and migrate to South America in the fall, where they gather by the hundreds. Before European settlement, the birds nested in large hollow trees in old-growth forests. As these forests disappeared, the birds discovered brick chimneys as a replacement. Brick chimneys work well for the birds because they provide enclosed areas with a rough, vertical surface the birds can cling to, much like a hollow tree. Unlike most birds, chimney swifts do not perch on branches but use the sharp nails on their tiny feet to cling to the sides of their roost.

According to the latest North American Breeding Bird Survey, the chimney swift population has declined by 72% in the past 50 years. Specific reasons for this loss are unknown, but pesticides, climate change and habitat loss likely all play a role.

Chimney swifts have slender bodies with long, curved wings and short, stubby tails (they look like a flying cigar or boomerang). They fly rapidly with nearly constant wing beats, often twisting from side to side. They also give a distinctive, high chattering call while in flight. They are the only bird that will drop into chimneys to roost for the night.

Here’s how you can help:

- Look for tall brick chimneys that are uncapped. If you find more than one chimney, do some scouting in the evenings to determine where the swifts will roost. Watch for swifts swooping over the chimney for a while before they enter. Be aware that the roost site choice can change from night to night, especially during migration.

- Pick one or more nights to monitor through September.

- Observe the roost starting roughly 20 minutes before sunset until 10 minutes after the last swift enters the chimney. Stay in one location, even if you do not see swifts right away. They may come to your site later, and you do not want to miss them. To be sure, stay 30 minutes after sunset to know if it was active or not. If you have zero swifts in your chimney, please record this because it is still valuable information.

- Count (or estimate) the number of swifts as they enter the chimney. It’s useful to count in groups of five or 10 when they enter quickly in large numbers. A handheld clicker counter can be helpful.

- Submit your data to eBird.org. Please note that a free eBird.org account is required to log in and submit your data. Map your roost site to an exact address or point when prompted for a location. After you enter the number of chimney swifts, use the hashtag #SwiftWI in the chimney swift details section, making your data submission easier to access.

- You can add additional information in the chimney swift details section, in this exact order, with semicolons separating the data: #SwiftWI; the type of building (residence, school, church, business, hospital, apartment, swift tower/structure, etc.); the condition of the chimney (in good shape, in need of repair); any other notes (example: #swiftwi; residence; chimney in need of repair; any other notes).



To honor the special occasion, a *Centennial Jubilee* booklet was published and available at the time of the celebration. Recognize, however, that the pictures which accompany these articles were not in that booklet. These 8 x 10s appear to be professionally taken that day, although no photographer's mark are on the originals. There was only one picture of this 1948 set that was republished in

the St. Kilian Parish booklet commemorating 150 years in 1998. This booklet, comprised largely by Lyra Straub, contained the picture of the Jubilee Mass taken from the choir loft. Otherwise, it appears that most of the pictures in the 1948 set have not been re-published. They are shown here out of respect to the many families descending out of St. Kilian. They are also a snapshot of the way of life in 1948, 74 years ago.



Celebrating 100 Years

Approximately 50 people who took part in the celebration at St. Kilian pose for a picture outside the church on the day of the 100th Centennial Jubilee.

The two boys of the parish near center are dressed up as pages – Donald Sarauer and Charlie Straub (shorter boy). Behind the page is the Archbishop of Milwaukee, Moses Elias Kiley. To Kiley's left is St. Kilian's priest Fr. John B. Reichel.

The farthest seven to the right (aligned to the south west corner of the church) have many younger men who many from the area still recognize nearly 75 years later. The Jubilee Book from 1948 published the celebrants and young men helping with the mass that day. With that in mind, on the farthest seven to the right, Richard Kern and Ralph Peter were acolytes. Richard Kern is the second in from the right. Kern is holding the same style candle as the seventh one in from the right, but I could not have someone else verify Ralph Peter before publication.

Carrol Straub was the thurifer and is in the middle of the farthest right seven. He is partially covered by Ambrose Simon who is holding the tall crucifix. Simon's title for the service and help that day was not published in the jubilee booklet, and may have been a late addition to the service. According to his obituary, Simon "was invested in the Capuchin habit in 1942, perpetually professed in 1946, and ordained a priest in 1950."

In addition, James Schmitt was the censer bearer for the service, but location in picture could not be verified before publication. **PHOTO COURTESY OF DON FELIX**



Traveling Cathedra

St. Kilian, being a small rural church to administer in the countryside, did not have a permanent place set up for the Archbishop of Milwaukee to sit. Accordingly, the dark canopy to cover the seat for "The Most Reverend" was brought to St. Kilian in 1948 so Archbishop Kiley could sit underneath it during the mass celebrating St. Kilian's 100th Anniversary.

This seat, known as a cathedra, specifically seats a bishop at his church. The term cathedral implies the ornate architecture of a religious place of worship, yet actually is rooted in the Latin word for throne. The seats are permanent in cathedrals, but temporary and transitory for the events that were site-specific, such as a small parish's jubilee anniversary. **PHOTO COURTESY OF DON FELIX**



A Priest and the Archbishop

There are lot of questions and observations which come to mind when looking at this photo, not the least of which: What is Archbishop Kiley and Fr. Reichel talking about? Fr. Reichel was the resident priest of St. Kilian from 1920 until his death in 1964. However, the day St. Kilian celebrated a century as a parish, their priest was on the side stage. Archbishop Kiley was the most prominent guest, and former St. Kilian pastor Rev. Peter Burelbach came back to celebrate the mass. The sermon was given by a parish son, Rev. Peter K. Flasch. In that sense, Reichel could relax and enjoy the festivities of a hundred years of a parish, over a quarter which he had overseen by the time of this photo.

This well taken image also captures Fr. Reichel's taste for cigars, which he holds in his right hand close to the matches. Please note the apparent desert, as it is a wonder how much food the women of the parish were expected to prepare for the guests and parishioners that day. **PHOTO COURTESY OF DON FELIX**

Moses Kiley Speaking


Moses Elias Kiley lived a well-traveled life. Born in Nova Scotia, he was ordained a priest in Rome then served the area of Chicago, and later went back to Rome. He became the Bishop of Trenton (New Jersey) in the 1934, and was



promoted to Archbishop of Milwaukee in 1940 after Archbishop Samuel Stritch transferred to Chicago. Archbishop Kiley is pictured addressing St. Kilian's parishioners at the 100th anniversary of their church in September of 1948. Whose hands are these?

There are very few, if any, people who are alive to today to vouch for whose hands are in this picture. However, multiple peoples' first guess was Fr. John B. Reichel's, given he was the leading man of the parish at the time. Another observation made was that the hands are not that of a laborer, such as the likes of many farmers of the parish. Lastly, Fr. Reichel was known for his penchant for cigars. With that in mind, the right handed thumb nail is unusually pitched darker, which aligns with an accompanying picture of Fr. Reichel holding his cigar in his right hand. His constant smoking could have colored the nail. This book was a treasured artifact of the parish members. **PHOTO COURTESY OF DON FELIX**

October is recognized as the month for a bombardment of new book releases which is just in time for the holiday season and gift giving. It is also a time we will see many winter themed books coming out. Here are some of the offerings Kewaskum Public Library will have next month, including potential new holiday favorites.

In adult fiction, Pulitzer Prize winning author Cormac McCarthy returns after a long hiatus with the first in a two-volume series, *The Passenger*. This is the story of a man haunted by loss, a salvage diver investigating a crash and missing information. Dystopic author Veronica Roth will bring us the story of a woman's search for a missing girl after the collapse of an oppressive regime in *Poster Girl*. Gregory Maguire's Another Day trilogy releases the second novel, *The Oracle of Maracoor*. Read more about Elphaba's green-skinned granddaughter Rain and her attempts to escape a city under siege. I am looking forward to checking out *Hester* by Laura Lico Albanese. This story is a reimaging of Hester Prynne in a historical tale that conquers

racial themes with a strong heroine during the 19th century. The *Boys from Biloxi* is a new legal thriller by John Grisham. It follows the path of two childhood friends in Mississippi who end up on opposite sides of the law. Look for a new Jack Reacher novel, another Alex Cross thriller and Christmas stories by both Debbie Macomber and James Patterson.

D.N.R. Recommends Precautions when Handling Wild Game

Extra effort will be needed this hunting season to prevent exposure to highly-pathogenic avian influenza

With the start of multiple waterfowl seasons and the fall bird migration ramping up, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) asked hunters to follow simple precautions when harvesting and handling wild birds because of the presence of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in the state.

The current HPAI strain was first detected in Wisconsin and other midwestern states in March 2022. Recent findings of the virus in domestic and wild birds this fall illustrates that the virus is still present and circulating in the flyway, including in Wisconsin. Waterfowl are considered more susceptible to HPAI than other gamebirds, so hunters are advised to follow the precautions listed below.

Recommended Precautions

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service makes the following recommendations for hunters when handling wild game to prevent possible exposure to HPAI or other potential pathogens:

- Do not handle or eat sick game.
- Field dress and prepare game outdoors or in a well-ventilated area.
- Wear rubber or disposable latex gloves while handling and cleaning game.
- When finished handling game, wash hands thoroughly with soap or disinfectant.
- Clean knives, equipment and surfaces that came in contact with game.
- Do not eat, drink or smoke while handling animals.
- All game should be thoroughly cooked to an

internal temperature of 165°F before being consumed.

The DNR also asks hunters to be mindful that the virus may be transported via hunting equipment and clothing. For hunters who have backyard poultry, basic biosecurity measures are recommended.

No Immediate Public Health Concern

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, this strain of HPAI does not present an immediate public health concern. Properly handling and cooking harvested birds to an internal temperature of 165°F kills the virus. Anyone with questions about how avian flu affects humans can find information at the Wisconsin Department of Health Services website.

Anyone who observes sick or dead birds should minimize contact with them. Do not touch dead birds or wildlife with your bare hands. If you have to touch a dead bird, wear gloves or use a plastic bag to put it in the garbage. Wash your hands with soap and water after handling and throw away any gloves.

Updates on DNR Website

More information on Avian influenza viruses, the current situation and recommended protocols for suspected cases can be found on the DNR website's wildlife diseases webpage under the avian influenza tab. The DNR will continue to update this page with future HPAI findings in wild Wisconsin birds.

University of North Dakota punter Cade Peterson was one of four players honored by the Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) on Sunday evening, Sept. 18, earning the title of Special Teams Player of the Week.

Peterson was sensational in the 27-24 win at Northern Arizona with four punts for 209 yards, averaging 52.2 yards per boot. While punting, Peterson had two touchbacks and recorded three punts over 50 yards.

With his four punts on Saturday, Peterson is now tied in the UND Division I record book with Brett Cameron (2009-

12) for most punts in a career with 186.

On the season, the Kewaskum native has 11 punts for 442 yards, averaging 40.18 yards

per punt. He has pinned teams within their own 20 on three occasions, has four punts of over 50 yards and has recorded three touchbacks.



When these two saw each other, it was apparent that it was ma-ma and, for the next hour, I listened to them talk each other, watched the baby crawl on top of ma-ma and both of them licked each other a lot.

I have to go on the trips that give me material for each week's column, but I bait when I leave for the trip and hunt on the way home.



Ten Sunsets on a Bear Stand

I started running bear baits with my girlfriend Michelle Chiaro on April 15 in northern Juneau County, as I have for the last 13-years.


It seems like a lifetime of situations has happened since we started, including the unexpected death of Michelle, who was my mate and outdoor-everything partner.

This week's column is a short summary of the first 10 days of my bear hunting situation, during which I did not miss a day sitting in a tree.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 3

HIGH: 74. LOW: 53.

It has been eight days since I have had a daytime picture of a black bear at one of my baits,

so, yesterday, with 5 days to go before the season opens, I created two new baits; both being about a mile from my existing baits.

My hope was to maybe intercept a bear earlier in its day, before it arrived at one of my existing baits. Today, I was checking one of them and walking in a forest with waist high ferns when I had the misfortune of walking

directly into a nest of hornets. This would be the worst insect experience of my life (so far), as I was stung at least 25 times in the head, arm, stomach and legs. At first, I thought I was going to be okay. The following day I became very ill, swollen, disoriented, arthritic, itchy and in pain. This situation would last eight-full-days and really sucked.

FRIDAY, SEPT. 9

HIGH: 83. LOW: 54.

Today was my third day of hunting and, no matter what, I never give up hope.

The trail cameras tell me that within 20 minutes of climbing down from my tree the last two nights, bear have been at the bait.

There is a debate among bear hunters about whether we are being watched while in the stand. I firmly believe it happens.

It has now been more than two weeks since I had a daytime hit, and I know I just have to keep running my baits, be observant when I am
