C.H.S. Students Participate in Young Leaders Breakfast

Wash. Co. Executive Schoemann Bans TikTok on Government Devices

In a press release delivered on Monday, Dec. 19, by Washington County Director of Communications and Community Relations Fran McLaughlin, it was announced that County Executive Josh Schoemann would ban the use of TikTok, a social media app, on all Washington County government devices.

Washington County is just one of dozens of government entities that have made such a move in recent weeks. Use of TikTok has been banned on government devices in Alabama, Georgia and Idaho, among others. A bill in Congress, which would ban the app on all federal devices, was unanimously passed in the Senate, and it is expected to receive bipartisan support in the House (*details were written as of print time on Tuesday, Dec. 20*).

In the press release, it stated that U.S. Rep. Mike Gallagher (R-Green Bay) of Wisconsin's 8th Congressional District helped inform the county on its action.

"In discussions with [Rep. Gallagher], Schoemann learned of the serious issues the TikTok app presents to our national security," stated the release. "Rep. Gallagher has led the effort to inform the public and urge a ban on TikTok use by government agencies. He introduced a bill last week banning TikTok nationally, and the U.S. Senate voted unanimously to ban the app from all U.S. government devices."

For years, TikTok has been accused by government entities and independent watchdogs of tracking users' behavior without consent. One report indicated that TikTok had been tracking users' keystrokes, which could be used to access the users' private files.

The Chinese company ByteDance owns the photo and video-sharing application. Language from Federal Bureau of Investigation Director Chris Wray, back in November, suggested that the Chinese government could leverage the app's

Nothing quite like this time of year, huh? All the gloriously lit displays on homes and during a drive through Lakeside Park. A light show near Stinky Point provides a spectrum of flashing color and shapes in rhythm to music.

Yet there comes a moment when Christmas loses the joy and excitement the occasion once brought. You don't have to be a victim of seasonal affective disorder either.

Perhaps this happens as a child, when you learn the truth about Santa Claus. Or as an adult, disenchanted by the crass commercialism which envelopes and almost blots out the true meaning, indeed, spirit of the holiday. A mindless miasma of materialism.

Far worse is losing a loved one and facing the first Yuletide alone. I hadn't a clue how deeply my mother hurt after Dad died. A wreath of memories included the last year I felt the sheer exuberance of both my birthday; on the 21st, and the following days in December 1976.

After work at Wright Brothers Paper Box, I wandered downtown. Into Kresge's, where mirrored pillars cast off images of the amassed merchandise. Outside Woolworths, a Salvation Army band played, the trumpet's brassy notes hung on the brisk pre-solstice air. My mood was itself a wonder since we had recently moved from the farmhouse a half-mile outside of Campbellsport where we'd lived since I was five.

Fast forward to 2016. My mother, the only person other than myself left in our household, had gone to a nursing home to rehab. She passed away four days shy of my 58th birthday, a week before Christmas Eve. That evening, when Pastor Brian got to the part of the Beatitudes which states those who mourn will be comforted, I burst into tears.

Now I grasped not merely Mom's grief, but also how a neighbor's family felt when their father's funeral was held on the 24th. Christmas is never the same.

Green Bay Packers Give Back, Nicolet National Bank and Multi Media Channels, the publishing company of this newspaper, are partnering on a program to support local educational institutions in training the next generation of journalists and fostering the community news environment. This initiative addresses the alarming need for quality reporters of local news.

According to "Report for America," a national

service program that places emerging journalists into local newsrooms, "The number of reporters in the country has declined 60 percent since 2000, a job loss similar in scale to the coal industry."

"Despite declining employment, about 4,900 openings for news analysts, reporters, and journalists are projected each year, on average, over the decade. All of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to other occupations or exit the labor force, such as to retire," the report stated.

The Packers said that community support has been a key to their success throughout history and it was a natural for Packers Give Back to support the initiative.

"The Packers are committed to our communi-

Included in this week's paper is a press release regarding a new partnership between the Green Bay Packers, Nicolet Bank and this newspaper's publishing company, Multi Media Channels (MMC).

The organizations teamed up to create a program called "Pass It Forward", which will help fund college students in the Green Bay area looking for hands-on journalism experience prior to earning their degrees.

Stated in the release:

"This spring, six student interns from the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay and three St. Norbert College interns will receive real-world experience in the newsroom at the Green Bay Press Times, through copy editing and the creation of editorial content with a focus on the

community."

I was thrilled to read this announcement, first, because of the tremendous reputation of the two supporting organizations: the Packers and Nicolet Bank. Helping secure the future of community-based reporting may require help from sources outside the print industry, and the influence these Wisconsin-based companies provide is a tremendous value to the partnership.

Second, I was motivated by this program's ultimate mission: Help stabilize and grow newsrooms while providing an experience for budding journalists, photographers and writers.

In just less than five years since joining this paper as a part-time correspondent, I have watched entire offices disappear (not literally, as the buildings remain, but four properties that





Washington County Adopts 2050 Parks and Golf Fiscally Thriving Plan

Recognizes 2022 Eagle Scout Projects in the Parks

Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann and County Board Supervisor Carroll Merry have signed the resolution adopting the 2050 Parks & Golf Fiscally Thriving Plan at Glacier Hills County Park Hall on November 20. The plan was proposed by Schoemann to remove the parks operating budget from the tax levy and was unanimously adopted by the Washington County Board of Supervisors in November.

The County Executive recognized Eagle Scouts and scout troops at the signing who have completed projects in Washington County Parks in 2022. Their community-minded efforts to improve the parks included building boardwalks along trails, installing benches at trails and disc golf courses, re-decking picnic tables, building new trail signs with park maps and QR Codes for parking options, and installing a bike repair and wash station near the mountain bike trails.

In 2018, Washington County created an enterprise fund for park and trail activities which is a separate accounting and financial reporting mechanism for revenues and expenditures that allows operations to function more independently as a business.

The Parks Fiscally Thriving Plan funds \$7.4 million dollars of equipment and infrastructure at Washington County Golf Course and plans for \$10.8 million dollars of investment through 2050 throughout Washington County's six major parks and the Eisenbahn Trail.

"In prior years, the parks operating expenditures reached \$1 million annually," said Schoemann. "With this plan now in place, we have reached our goal to fund annual infrastructure without using tax dollars for the next 30 years. It is satisfying to celebrate this today with the scouts who have helped us with their park improvement projects."

were once news offices were sold and turned into different business spaces or residential housing).

This was exacerbated by the pandemic, as was a reduction in staff, but, overall, despite the constant change, this newsroom is amid the lucky ones.

A lot of community newspapers, especially those in rural areas, have shuttered altogether. Some of this can be attributed to advertising dollars moving out of print and onto the internet, but all-too-often newspapers shut down because no one is left to tell the news.

If community papers like this one are to survive, they will need to rely on the next generation of writers sooner rather than later. Our paper has made that leap, already, as our boots-on-the-ground journalists (three total) have an aggregate age of 25-years-old (rounded down). This group has made great strides, but we still have a lot to learn (myself, chiefly, included).

Pathways like Pass It Forward are a win-win for everyone involved, as learning-on-the-job is the most valuable way to grow as a writer, reporter and editor. For MMC's *Press Times*, the paper will have a team of

motivated interns to help with a variety of tasks.

I can speak from experience; everyone at this newspaper (in every department) is doing the job of more than one person, and even the smallest bit of assistance helps.

While Pass It Forward will initially be rolled out "up north", the hope is it could expand into other regions in the future.

I do not believe the following statement to be hyperbole: The value of local news – particularly newsprint – cannot be overvalued in small communities.

In rural areas, when a trusted newspaper folds what replaces it (if anything) is often little more than an online blog or social media page. Gone – in a physical sense – is an accurate record of what transpired in these towns during a given time.

The times are a-changin' a lot faster than ever could have been anticipated. If we shed all traditional, tangible forms of record keeping for data projected on glowing screens, what remains?

I promise I am not being dramatic, nor do I have an answer, but it will be an important question in both the newspaper industry and in rural communities across the country in the immediate future. What I do

know is that more change is coming.

As for this editorial group, we are excited for 2023. We have a host of volunteer and student contributors that have helped us bridge gaps during our recent personnel sea changes. I am immensely grateful for all these writers and photographers, and hope to see more great content next year.

While it has been a challenging year at times, I am extremely proud of this newspaper, its staff and this publishing company for its commitment to telling your stories. As we continue to work on improving these pages, I thank our readers and advertisers for all their support in 2022 and beyond.

25 Years Ago

December 18, 1997

A large contingent of Campbellsport School District teachers made a one-sided presentation to the school board on Tuesday evening. It was not one-sided at the request of the teachers, but rather as the result of a school board ruling on Monday night that came about by a close 4-3 decision. Tension at Monday evening's meeting was generated by the fact that the Campbellsport Education Association has been given a contract offer of 3.8 percent each year for a two-year contract (1997-1999) by the board's negotiating team. The teachers requested one more audience with the board, and board president Norbert Rentmeester granted the request. This hit a nerve with some members of the board. Administrator Joe Bertone contacted the school attorney, whose advice to the board was to listen only.

A WIAA announcement indicates that the Campbellsport School District could be participating in a different conference in the 1999-2000 school year. A ripple effect is being felt throughout state school conferences as the WIAA provides league competition for private schools across the state. If realignment is approved, Campbellsport would compete in a conference with Plymouth, Two Rivers, Kewaskum, New Holstein, Sheboygan Falls, Kiel, and Manitowoc Roncalli. Coaches and the Campbellsport Board of Education have expressed in no uncertain terms their displeasure with the WIAA proposed conference realignment.

The rural Campbellsport area is one of the fastest developing areas of Fond du Lac County. But the land use planning in this rapid growth area has been so slow in coming. The drumlin region is rich with open spaces, farmlands, wetlands, woods and other unique features. There will be a

Campbellsport placed all 12 wrestlers at the 26th Annual Neenah Invitational for a fourth place finish in the 15-school tourney. Two Cougars earned champion of their weight division: Nick Wenger at 152 and Jeremy Olbrys at 160.

The Campbellsport wrestling team defeated Random Lake 50-21 on Tuesday and knocked off Markesan on Thursday by the score of 46-18.

The combination of cold shooting and lack of time to practice led to a dismal week for the Campbellsport Girls Basketball Team. After losing to North Fond du Lac (score not provided), the girls had one day to practice for Slinger, a 38-23 loss, then only one day to practice for Markesan, a 61-38 loss.

Twenty turnovers, easy field goal attempts that were missed, and missed free throws translated to a 49-39 loss to Laconia by the boys basketball team. Although the Cougars had a 30-22 lead over Markesan at halftime, loss of patience on offense and intensity on defense led to a 58-37 defeat.

As the year ends, I would like to revisit a column I wrote in January about being organized and tracking my reading. I signed up for the 2022 reading challenge on the website Goodreads with the best intentions. I figured I could read and track 100 books for the year. I know I read more than 100 but did not remember the last time I logged into Goodreads. It was 10 months ago, and I had logged 13 books for the year, so it was an epic fail for me. OK, maybe that is harsh. Looking at my record in the Monarch catalog, I checked out 237 books this year and I think read at least half of them all the way through. Reading is not the issue but spending the time tracking what I have read is. I wanted to note what I had read so I could easily refer to that information if asked for a recommendation. However, the

standout books that I read in 2022 are so good, I can recall them easily. Here are a few I've read this year that I highly recommend.

Two are from my favorite authors. The first is *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks. I was very much looking forward to this novel as it has been about seven years since her last. I did review *Horse* in July, so will just summarize that this historical novel follows the life of a famous racehorse through its conception to retirement. The life of a boy who cares for this horse is also noted and the novel sweeps between historical times and the present, bringing in racial issues faced today. I was thrilled to read Stephen King's fantasy novel, *Fairy Tale*. For me, it was classic King, the story of a teenage boy and dog who travel to a fantasy world to save

what he loves most. King drew on fairy tales such as “Jack and the Beanstalk” and “Rumpelstiltskin” to enrich his story. I relished the 600-plus pages and finished it in a weekend.

Foreverland: On *the Divine Tedium of Marriage* by Heather Havrilesky was a memoir that read as a testimony to the difficulties of marriage. I didn't think I would be able to relate, being in a marriage much longer than the author, but her perspective was right on. I found myself reading passages to my husband, laughing out loud and thoroughly enjoying this read. It was much needed humor for me.

Those are just three of my top reads this year. Some others you should check out are, *Dinosaurs* by Lydia Millet, *The School for Good Mothers* by Jessamin Chan and *Remarkably Bright Creatures* by Shelby Van Pelt.

I don't think I will make a goal of tracking my checkouts in 2023 but I know I will definitely read. Good reading to you!

ty that has supported us for more than 100 years,” said Mark Murphy, Packers President and CEO. “This program will nurture the next generation of journalists. High-quality journalism is crucial to a well-informed community that contributes to its collective success and enriched quality of life.”

Mike Daniels, Nicolet National Bank President and CEO, said that the goals of the program fit right into their company’s focus.

“Since Nicolet’s founding 22 years ago, we have always focused on local – local people meeting local needs with local resources. Pat Wood’s idea of teaching the next generation about journalism is vital to meeting the needs of our communities. I have repeatedly seen the tremendous value that a great reporter and newspaper can bring to a community,” Daniels said.

“We are honored to further our partnership with the *Press Times* and to start new and exciting partnerships with Packers Give Back by supporting the Pass It Forward program.”

This spring, six student interns from the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay (UWGB) and three St. Norbert College interns will receive real-world experience in the newsroom at the Green Bay *Press Times*, through copy editing and the creation of editorial content with a focus on the community. Interns will also complete the “Earn Your Press Pass” course in association with the Wisconsin Newspaper Association. Networking and real-world experience will provide a funnel for qualified young reporters to enter community journalism.

As a former journalist, Tom Kunkel, St. Norbert College Interim President said that he was “especially delighted” to be involved in the program.

“This program will provide opportunities for many St. Norbert students to learn the rudiments of journalism and hone their writing and communicating at a high level. Some of these students might eventually even go into media for their ca-

reers. But regardless, these lucky students will be learning the kind of fact-finding skills and sharpening the kinds of interpersonal and communication skills that all employers value today,” Kunkel stated.

“We say it all the time – colleges such as St. Norbert literally cannot do our jobs without the help of our friends and outside supporters. They create valuable opportunities for our students, underwrite much of their tuition, provide internships, and do so much to help shape their future lives and careers. We are tremendously grateful to the *Press Times*, Nicolet Bank and Packers Give Back for doing it again.”

Chuck Rybak, UW-Green Bay College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences Dean, expressed the need for graduates with media-based skills, such as expertise in writing, web, video, and audio production, in what he referred to as “the age of content.”

“It is no secret that state support for public universities has decreased significantly over the last few decades, for a variety of reasons. Any additional funding we receive is vital because we are able to direct it to the area that matters most — student success. If we can provide paid internships to students while simultaneously creating high-impact, hands-on work experiences, our students and our region’s employers share equally in the benefit,” Rybak explained.

“Contemporary media and its business model is an area of great change and instability. As a university, our job is to anticipate such changes and prepare students not for what media is today, but what it will be tomorrow. We must also deliver this education in a way that prepares students to adapt to the continual change that they will face

post-graduation.”

Patrick Wood, MMC/*Press Times* Publisher and CEO, explained that the vision for the program arose from working to “enhance hyper-local news in communities that are vibrant and need to stay vibrant.

“Partnering with UWGB and St. Norbert College to enrich the learning of their budding journalism and communications students seemed like an obvious path to enriching the next generation of reporters. Packers Give Back and Nicolet National Bank responded positively, knowing that a program that supports local schools reporting local news is a win for everyone in the community.

“The students are paid for their work while they learn with editors and writers at the *Press Times*. Broadband Update – Wisconsinites Must Submit Corrections to New National Broadband Map by Jan. 13

On November 18, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) unveiled the “pre-production draft” of the new national broadband map at <https://broadbandmap.fcc.gov/home>. This new map is the most detailed and current federal map of where broadband is and is not accessible throughout the country.

“As we often say, access to broadband is vital for economic success,” says MadREP President & CEO Jason M. Fields. “Our team at MadREP has spearheaded efforts to collect accurate data on underserved areas in both urban and rural communities in our Region for the last year and now is another opportunity for Wisconsinites to contribute to a broadband solution.”

“We are asking everyone in the Region to visit

the new FCC map and make sure it correctly reflects the access available at your homes,” adds Gene Dalhoff, VP of Talent & Education. “If it does not, we have a brief window to challenge that finding. If areas are incorrectly finalized as having access they do not, it will jeopardize the Madison Region’s ability to access federal support for broad infrastructure.”

MadREP is asking their partners in municipalities, community organizations, business groups, chambers of commerce, education advocates, health care organizations and trade groups to promote this initiative widely in their networks so the Region can obtain the support necessary to help expand opportunities for residents.

What information is included on the map?

The map displays address-level availability and data (as self-reported by internet service providers) for fixed and mobile broadband as well as data aggregated to larger areas – e.g., state, county, census place, and congressional district. Data can be examined by exploring the map’s digital interface or by searching by state or address. The

map also displays coverage data by provider. **How does this affect you and your community?**

In cases where the draft broadband map indicates broadband speeds that are not actually being observed at specific locations, it is important to challenge the results being presented on the map. Failure to do so could jeopardize a community’s ability to secure a portion of the more than \$42 Billion set aside for broadband expansion under the Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program. Simply put, if the speeds indicated on the map are incorrect for a location and you want to improve local broadband access, it is very important to challenge the results.

How to submit a challenge/ correction:

The FCC is seeking help to improve the data on the map by asking communities and individuals to submit a challenge or request a correction. These are 3 types of challenges: availability challenges, mobile availability challenges, and location challenges. More information on the challenge process can be found at <https://help.bdc.fcc.gov>.

Due Date

To ensure valid challenges are incorporated into the map before federal funding allocations are made, the public are encouraged to submit challenges by January 13, 2023.


or two. Children must be older than 6 and accompanied by an adult.





AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL

Camping/Ice Fishing on Lake Puckaway

As I write this week's column, I have been without electricity due to a winter storm for 30-hours.

About all I can say is that it feels like I am living back in 1800s.

Anyways, this week's column is about my first winter camping and ice fishing trip of the season, and I went to where I usually start. That is on Green Lake County's 5000-acre Lake Puckaway, and my goal was to catch some walleye and not fall through the very thin ice that I was living on top of.

TUESDAY, DEC. 6
HIGH: 34. LOW: 32.

Lots to write about on this expedition, and it was a dandy.

I put in at Miller's Resort near Marquette and hauled my gear in an Otter Sled in what would be three trips with each one being about 500 yards.

Red, my eight-month-old golden retriever was along, as was her mother Ruby. This was Red's first time on the ice, as she was born in April. Red and Ruby wrestle about 50% of their waking hours, and Ruby kicked her butt, as she had no idea how to use her claws to get traction on the ice.

I was tip-up fishing for walleye, northern pike, catfish and striped bass and, as soon as I set my last tip up, it went up, and I iced a 27-inch gator, which I released, as they have to be 32 inches on Puckaway.

As I said, I had to make three trips and had only two hours of daylight, so I was a busy man but, in reality, had no cares.

I have headlamps and propane lanterns, and that is how I built my camp.

I had each of my tip ups rigged with 12-pound test mono, a number 12 treble

hook, a small split shot, chartreuse bead and, for bait, I was using a medium golden shiner. I guess you could say this was the hot ticket as the flags just kept tripping and, after dark, it was like Christmas on the ice. I have lights on my tip ups that flash when I have a tip up trip, and I just love to see the flashing lights.

This would be one of those trips where the air temperature almost stayed the same and with it being just over 32 degrees my holes did not freeze over. I built my camp in the dark, which was

made up of an Eskimo pop-up ice shack, a cot, table, cook stove, propane light and a good mood. Once everything was rigged up, the pups were either playing on the ice or sleeping on my cot.

Tonight, the fishing was excellent. I caught four legal walleye, a large striped bass, a catfish and three northern pike. I missed several fish.

I stayed up the entire night and really enjoyed myself.

WEDNESDAY, DEC. 7
HIGH: 34. LOW: 31.

Today my brother Mike, who just retired after 38-years of working at Research Products in Poynette, and our family's long time, good friend, Roger Frank, who is also retired came out to my camp for a day of

fishing.

Each of us would have a line of three tip ups nearly 150-yards in length, and it was kind of a learning day for these guys, as they simply do not ice fish much and have a strong desire to get into it.

As is always the case, we give each other a lot of BS and, I have to admit, I had the hot line of tip ups and Mike and Roger were living in Skunk City. In other words, they claimed I had put them in a rotten spot, and I claimed they couldn't catch a cold if they fell in the lake.

Also, during the day, as we sat in lawn chairs and shot the breeze, several very damp lows blew through, and it was very interesting to experience how the temperature

really did not change, but the moisture in the air would make it very uncomfortable.

We fished a few hours after dark, the lights were flashing and we were laughing especially because my buddy and my brother were going to starve to death on what they were catching.

Mikey, who has had many nicknames over the years (such as Farkel, Dark Cloud, Catfish and Musky) got extremely lucky and actually caught a fish, which was a beautiful 21-inch walleye that was blind, starving to death and stupid. I declared Mikey's new name Walleye Mike and when Mikey, I mean Walleye Mike, asked Roger - who was still living in Skunk City - if that could become his official name. Roger clearly said "No."

These guys are going to need some fine-tuning on several of their skills and they are practically begging yours truly, Master Guide Extrordinaire, to please help them out.

My first camping trip on the ice was a pleasant one!

tech powers for its own benefit, an allegation that ByteDance representatives denied.

Schoemann did not mince words when detailing the perceived threat TikTok could pose to government operations.

"The continued use of TikTok is clearly a potential threat to our security and will not be allowed on our devices here in Washington County," he said via the release.

Rep. Gallagher, via the same memo, lauded Schoemann's actions.

"It's common sense to prevent this spyware from being downloaded onto government phones, and I commend [Wash.] County Executive Schoemann for taking this step to better protect Wisconsinites," said Gallagher. "I hope more County Executives, as well as [Wis.] Governor [Tony] Evers, follow this example and ensure no government device has TikTok on their phone."

According to county officials, it is believed Washington is the first county in the state to ban TikTok on government devices.

Not too Late to Get Flu Vaccine

Data from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) show influenza (flu) activity is increasing significantly throughout Wisconsin ahead of the December holiday season, mirroring trends being observed around the country.

As of December 1, only 31% of Wisconsin residents have received their single-dose flu vaccine. DHS urges Wisconsinites to get vaccinated against the flu as soon as possible. Early data suggests the flu vaccine is a good match to protect against circulating strains of the virus.

“The best way to protect yourself and those around you from the flu is to get your annual flu vaccination,” said Dr. Jasmine Zapata, Chief Medical Officer in DHS Bureau of Community Health Promotion. “Everyone six months and older can get their flu vaccine today. This is especially important for those at highest risk of experiencing severe symptoms, including older people, people with chronic health conditions, people who are pregnant, and young children. But even if you are not at higher risk, getting the flu vaccine can help you from spreading it to others who may get seriously ill.”

Other respiratory viruses, including COVID-19 and RSV, continue to spread in the state. These viruses spread easily when people are gathered together. While the flu and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory illnesses, they are caused by two different viruses and require two different vaccines. Eligible Wisconsinites can get their flu vaccine and updated COVID-19 booster at the same time.

In addition to getting vaccinated, DHS recommends Wisconsinites take simple actions to increase your protection and help keep you and your loved ones safe this holiday season:

- Wash your hands often with soap and warm water for 20 seconds, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.



The Cougars will resume post-holiday play on Monday, Jan. 9.




