One Decade on the Hill, Sunburst Stewards look back on Progress

As of December 2022, it's been 10 years since Rob Friedl acquired the ski hill known as Sunburst and with this year's skiing, boarding and tubing season finally finished (despite a late push last week from Old Man Winter), the anniversary marks one decade of positive change for the skill hill that's been a Kewaskum staple since 1961.

Like most readers who grew up around the Kettle Moraine, it wasn't (initially) the mountains of the American West that instilled a love of skiing in Friedl.

"I grew up on the north side of Chicago," he explained. Friedl started skiing as a kid on Midwest hills in Illinois. "I went out to school in Wyoming, skied out there a bunch, came back home and wound up in the Milwaukee area in 1999."

In 2012, Jim and Kim Engel announced they were selling Sunburst Ski Hill. The couple operated the facility for 28 years.

For Friedl, who had spent his entire life on the slopes, it was an enticing investment. He previously owned Fall River Capital, a commodity trading-firm based in Mequon, and he saw with Sunburst the chance to combine his professional expertise with his lifelong passion.

"The opportunity presented itself in 2012... and I was able to take advantage of that opportunity," said Friedl. "I've been managing it and running it ever since."

In that time, regulars to the hill have probably noticed some alterations.

"The first thing we did in 2013 is we turned the tubing facility from 12 lanes to more than 45 lanes," said Friedl. "We added a magic carpet. We added new lighting; all the electric. That same year, we also completely remodeled the rental building and started that; self-serve boots and a more streamlined process."

Friedl's ultimate goal was to make the facility more accommodating while also providing

the best skiing experience and value you can get in the Midwest. A big part of that was revamping the snow-making artillery and grooming machinery.

"We've been working on snow-making since day one," said Friedl, who added, in order to increase quality and volume, dollars needed to be spent. "I want to say when I showed up, we had one tower-mounted gun on the property and today we have 50."

"52," corrected Sunburst general manager, and Friedl's right-hand man, Jason Wood.

Wood grew up in the Waukesha area, joined the Sunburst team as a member of the ski patrol, was promoted to operations and, just last spring, he was moved up to general manager.

Friedl credited Wood with helping achieve his vision, one that the latter seems to share.

"We're just moving the entire program forward," said Wood. "We're trying to take massive leaps in both customer service and operation of the whole hill. We want to make it more family friendly and get this boosted up to an entirely new level."

The pair also repaired chair lifts and re-situated the beginner's run in addition to making improvements to the advanced runs. They've contributed countless hours of sweat equity into the remodeling and repairing projects.

The Sunburst chalet also received a full face-lift. The old bar was replaced by a live-edge wood counter and the vaulted ceiling (which was previously covered) was opened up to honor the space's original aesthetic. The bottom floor cafeteria received a similar renovation with wood and steel replacing the eatery's outdated interiors.

"It wasn't as planned out as it necessarily should have been," admitted Friedl to chuckles from Wood.

"I came in here one day, and he had just been ripping the whole bar apart. Water is still on,

Vista Christian Retreat, Inc., commonly known as Camp Vista, is hosting a free movie showing of the *Jesus* film on Good Friday, April 7, in the newly built chapel building. The event is free to attend by the public, and they would like to extend the invitation to the Campbellsport community, family and friends to commemorate the life of Jesus through the viewing of this film.

The *Jesus* movie was filmed in 1979 in Israel at authentic Biblical sites. It recalls the story of the life of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke; from his birth, to the calling of his disciples, his teaching and ultimately his death on the cross at the hands of the Roman empire, ending with his Resurrection. The film has been translated to over 1,000 languages to date, and 253 translations are still in progress, which makes it the most translated film in history.

"I remember how this film changed my life, and I want to share it so that it can do the same for people in my community," says Andrew Fidziukiewicz, president of Camp Vista.

Camp Vista is a local retreat center just outside Campbellsport. The location of the movie showing will be at the new Our Lady of Hope Chapel, which was rebuilt after the original chapel burned down in 2018.

Camp Vista is a Christian retreat center located at the heart of the beautiful Kettle Moraine Forest at N3398 Chapel Heights Rd. It was founded in 1961 by a Catholic priest, Fr. Joseph Fischer, and today serves as a unique retreat place for Christian groups.

The Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) Foundation 2022 Better Newspapers Contest awards banquet was held last Friday, March 24, and this editor and journalist Clarice Case were honored to bring home two prizes: Clarice was named second-place Rookie of the Year in Division DE, and I received a first-place plaque for Best Sports Action Photo in Division D.

It must be stated that most journalists don’t get into the profession to win trophies, and that is true for everyone on this newspaper’s editorial staff. We do our jobs because we enjoy working with the communities covered. On the simplest level, most of us like to write, take photos and share that content with others who value it.

Awards in this industry are really about education.

I won’t go as far as to say that working in the media is a “thankless job,” but it can be a balancing act to accurately report on all our cities, towns and villages. Editorial teams often know where improvement is needed, both from reader feedback and the journalists’ own instincts, but where a reporter is successful can sometimes feel mysterious.

Clarice joined the newspaper at a fraught time in late 2021; we had a few part-time helpers, but I was, by-and-large, the “last man standing” for a brief period that autumn (we previously had five full-time journalists).

electric is on. I just said, 'Rob, hold on one second,'" recalled Wood.

The cafeteria was done first, roughly four years ago by Friedl's estimation. The bar room was finished two years ago.

"The old bar that was in here had soft spots. It was starting to rot a bit," said Friedl. "Within three hours I had basically tore the bar apart. It turned into more money and a bigger project than we planned, but the goal is to improve all the buildings."

It's been a labor of love for Friedl, who notes that this line of work is not for casual investors or ski enthusiasts.

"It's been a challenge because the industry is going through a lot of growth and a lot of rollover. A lot of guys who were here building the industry are no longer in the industry, and they didn't take the time to train the next generation," said Friedl, noting that, as a result, planning has been paramount. "But we've got a one-year, five-year and 10-year plan. There's still a lot of investment into infrastructure that we have planned."

Wood agreed that a key to their success is reinvestment. While they need to pay the bills and employees, what is leftover goes to the hill, he added.

"Close to every dollar that is gained here goes right back into the facility," said Wood. "That's the way we're able to do these improvements. There's a lot of back-end improvements that people never get to see, and now we're doing more of the face-

lift things that people get to see."

Recognizing that he runs a seasonal business, Friedl highlighted one challenge that seems to be lingering: securing seasonal employees.

Friedl said to combat low interest locally in working at "the hill", he's used the J-1 employment program, which sets up international college students with paid work.

"We were basically forced to use the J-1 program," said Friedl, who said the results have been fantastic. He's had recurring employees from South America, who study in the U.S. and have returned to work at Sunburst for multiple seasons. "They do a great job."

Looking at the rewards of their hard work,

Wood said hearing directly from visitors, particularly regulars over the years, has been both helpful and encouraging.

"The response to the new bar area has been really good," he said. "People are astounded. If they haven't been here in a while they walk in and are impressed. It's not as dark, we've been able to add a few tables. We've reinsulated the entire area, which has made a big difference in keeping it warmer in here."

Both Wood and Friedl have been regaled by locals' stories of "back in the day at the Sunburst tavern." They noted that they don't have too many customers who come in just to enjoy the tavern, but they said they'd be interested in curating an off-season bar crowd.

"We're toying with the idea of trying to keep it open year-round like it once was," said Friedl, who noted first steps would be to see if there was an appetite to rent out the space for events or parties. "Graduation, birthday parties, we feel like we have pretty competitive rates and a really nice facility."

Anyone with an iota of business-sense would probably realize that operating a ski hill is not cheap. In fact, it has been the opposite for Friedl.

But, for the lifelong skier, it's not all about the margins, it's about creating a quality product that can last the test of time.

"It's a huge reinvestment. Massive. It's capital intensive. From a management standpoint, it's totally my passion, and it's just what we want to do. I want to make this place the best it can be," he said.

The skiing and tubing hills are likely closed for the season, but Sunburst will host the annual Motorcycle Hillclimb this Father's Day.

Friedl expressed excitement for the event, and he looked forward to seeing regulars at the hill and members of the community out for the unique race.

"We consider ourselves a real gem in the Southeastern Wisconsin area," said Friedl, who hopes to keep the good times rolling. "We want to continue to be a fantastic value. After a decade being here, I think the whole community has embraced Sunburst, which is really nice to see."

Work to Begin on County Trunk Hwy Q

At the intersection of Hillside Road

Reconstruction of Washington County Trunk Hwy (CTH) Q, at the intersection of Hillside Road in the Villages of Richfield and Lisbon, began on Monday, March 27 and will be substantially completed by mid-July. The intersection will be reconfigured to a roundabout.

The prime contractor for the project is Vinton Construction Company from Manitowoc. The construction project will be closed to through traffic to mid-July. 



April is a full month of spring and brings with it a shower of new books for you to check out. Here are just a few recommendations from our collection. Stop in to see them all.

For children, best-selling author Brian Selznick's *Big Tree* is a special treat. This book is suited for second and third grade readers and is a survival story about sycamore seed siblings, Merwin and Louise. They are forced to leave their mama tree prematurely and must navigate and mysterious and sometimes dangerous world to find a place to set down roots. *Not an Easy Win* by Chrystal Giles is a novel for middle-grade readers. After moving in with his grandmother and getting into too many fights at his last school, Lawrence is expelled. He spends his days at the rec center helping his neighbor who runs a chess program. Chess is new for Lawrence, and he finds himself not only caught up in the game, but maybe finding more about who he can be. For youngest readers, look for Maisy books, *Pug* and *Baby Shark*.

Here are a couple new books in adult non-fiction. In drawing on deep research and her own experience as a woman without children, historian Peggy O'Donnell Heffington shows that many of the reasons women are not having children today in her book, *Without Children: The Long History of Not Being a Mother* are ones they share with women in the past - a lack of support, their jobs or finances, environmental concerns, infertility, and the desire to live different kinds of lives. Understanding this history is key to rebuilding kinship between mothers and non-mothers, and to building a better world for us all. *After the Miracle: The Political Crusades of Helen Keller* is a biography by Max Wallace about Helen Keller after the water pump miracle. So much is focused on her times as a disabled child, but her greatest accomplishments were not that she learned to communicate, but how Keller used her voice to make changes in the world. Read about her lifelong fight for social justice across gender, race, class, and ability.

Monetary conditions of release may be imposed at or after the initial appearance only upon a finding that there is a reasonable basis to believe that the conditions are necessary to assure appearance in court, or if the person is accused of a violent crime as defined by the legislature by law, only upon a finding that there is a reasonable basis to believe that the conditions are necessary based on the totality of the circumstances, taking into account whether the accused has a previous conviction for a violent crime as defined by the legislature by law, the probability that the accused will fail to appear in court, the need to protect members of the community from serious harm as defined by the legislature by law, the need to prevent the intimidation of witnesses, and the potential affirmative defenses of the accused. The legislature may authorize, by law, courts to revoke a person's release for a violation of a condition of release.

EXPLANATION

1. Explanatory statement regarding Question 1:

Under the current Wisconsin Constitution, courts may impose reasonable conditions on the release of a criminal defendant before trial for three purposes: (1) to secure the defendant's appearance in court; (2) to protect the community from "serious bodily harm," and (3) to prevent intimidation of witnesses. Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2).

Question 1 would change the language of the second factor from "serious bodily harm" to "serious harm as defined by the legislature by law." The question would thus change the type of harm to the community that a court could seek to protect against. Because the term

"serious harm" would be defined by the legislature by law, what it means could evolve over time depending on legislative enactments.

A "yes" vote on Question 1 would vote to amend Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2) to allow a circuit court to impose release conditions based on the purpose of avoiding "serious harm as defined by the legislature" rather than "serious bodily harm."

A "no" vote on Question 1 would vote not to amend Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2) to change the term "serious bodily harm" as a factor for determining the conditions of a defendant's pretrial release.

2. Explanatory statement regarding Question 2:

Question 2 would also

change the language of Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2), but in a different way from Question 1. Question 2 addresses the circuit court's ability to impose the specific condition of monetary bail.

Currently, the Wisconsin Constitution allows a court to impose a monetary bail requirement only if the court finds a reasonable basis to believe that bail is necessary in order to secure the defendant's appearance in court. Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2).

Question 2 would expand the factors a circuit court may consider in imposing monetary bail. In cases where a defendant is accused of a "violent crime as defined by the legislature by law," Question 2 would allow a court to impose monetary

bail based on circumstances in addition to securing the defendant's appearance in court, including accounting for a previous conviction for a violent crime, the need to protect the community from serious harm, preventing witness intimidation, and potential affirmative defenses the defendant might assert.

A "yes" vote on Question 2 would vote to amend Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2) in cases where the defendant is accused of a violent crime to allow a court to utilize monetary bail for additional reasons in addition to securing the defendant's appearance in court, including accounting for a previous conviction for a violent crime, the need to protect the community from serious

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Washington County, Wisconsin on April 4, 2023, at which the officers named below shall be nominated. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

*If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

**If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot* marking device to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "no" if opposed to the

question.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter may insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils an optical scan ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

Most of those programs are limited to children, families with children, pregnant women, disabled persons, or those 65 or older, who Wisconsin law does not consider "able-bodied" for public assistance purposes. See, e.g., Wis. Stat. § 49.79(1) (am) (defining age limits for "able-bodied" under food stamp program).

Two programs currently available to "able-bodied, childless adults" are Wisconsin's BadgerCare Plus medical assistance program and the FoodShare program, also known as SNAP or food stamps. However, those programs are subject to certain federal requirements and restrictions that either would be inconsistent with the requirement about which the referendum asks or, in some cases, already include such a requirement.

BadgerCare Plus's medical assistance program is subject to federal Medicaid restrictions, and federal law does not allow for work-based requirements

for such programs absent a federal waiver. See 42 U.S.C. § 1396a(a)(10)(A). Currently, there is no federal waiver in force that would allow Wisconsin to impose work requirements on this program. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, April 4, 2023, the following questions will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

2023 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 2

To amend section 8 (2) of article I of the constitution; relating to: conditions for release prior to conviction, including the imposition of bail (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2021 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2021 Assembly Joint Resolution 107, which became 2021 Enrolled Joint Resolution 6, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 8 (2) of article I of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article I] Section 8 (2) All persons, before conviction, shall be eligible for release under reasonable conditions designed to assure their appearance in court, protect members of the community from serious bodily harm as defined by the legislature by law, or prevent the intimidation of witnesses. Monetary conditions of release may be imposed at or after the initial appearance only upon a finding that there is a reasonable basis to believe that the conditions are necessary to assure appearance in court, or if the person is accused of a violent crime as defined by the legislature by law, only upon a finding that there is a reasonable basis to believe that the conditions are necessary based on the totality of the circumstances, taking into account whether the accused has a previous conviction for a violent crime as defined by the legislature by law, the probability that the accused will fail to appear in court, the need to protect members of the community from serious harm as defined by the legislature by law, the need to prevent the intimidation of witnesses, and the potential affirmative defenses of the accused. The legislature may authorize, by law, courts to revoke a person's release for a violation of a condition of release.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2023 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held

on the first Tuesday of April, 2023; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: "Conditions of release before conviction. Shall section 8 (2) of article I of the constitution be amended to allow a court to impose on an accused person being released before conviction conditions that are designed to protect the community from serious harm?"

QUESTION 2: "Cash bail before conviction. Shall section 8 (2) of article I of the constitution be amended to allow a court to impose cash bail on a person accused of a violent crime based on the totality of the circumstances, including the accused's previous convictions for a violent crime, the probability that the accused will fail to appear, the need to protect the community from serious harm and prevent witness intimidation, and potential affirmative defenses?"

EXPLANATION

1. Explanatory statement regarding Question 1:

Under the current Wisconsin Constitution, courts may impose reasonable conditions on the release of a criminal defendant before trial for three purposes: (1) to secure the defendant's appearance in court; (2) to protect the community from "serious bodily harm;" and (3) to prevent intimidation of witnesses. Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2).

Question 1 would change the language of the second factor from "serious bodily harm" to "serious harm as defined by the legislature by law." The question would thus change the type of harm to the community that a court could seek to protect against. Because the term "serious harm" would be defined by the legislature by law, what it means could evolve over time depending on legislative enactments.

A "yes" vote on Question 1 would vote to amend Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2) to allow a circuit court to impose release conditions based on the purpose of avoiding "serious harm as defined by the legislature" rather than "serious bodily harm."

A "no" vote on Question 1 would vote not to amend Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2) to change the term "serious bodily harm" as a factor for determining the conditions of a defendant's pre-trial release.

2. Explanatory statement regarding Question 2:

Question 2 would also change the language of Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2), but in a different way from Question 1. Question 2 addresses the circuit court's ability to impose the specific condition of monetary bail.

Currently, the Wisconsin Constitution allows a court to impose a monetary bail requirement only if the court finds a reasonable basis to believe that bail is necessary in order to secure the defendant's appearance in court. Wis. Const. art. I, § 8(2).

In cases where a defendant is accused of a "violent crime as defined by the legislature by law," Question 2 would allow a court to impose monetary bail based on circumstances in addition to securing the defendant's appearance in court, including accounting for a previous conviction for a violent crime, the need to protect the community from serious harm, preventing witness intimidation, and potential affirmative defenses the defendant might assert.

Most of those programs are limited to children, families with children, pregnant women, disabled persons, or those 65 or older, who Wisconsin law does not consider "able-bodied" for public assistance purposes. See, e.g., Wis. Stat. § 49.79(1)(am) (defining age limits for "able-bodied" under food stamp program).

Two programs currently available to "able-bodied, childless adults" are Wisconsin's BadgerCare Plus medical assistance program and the FoodShare program, also known as SNAP or food stamps. However, those programs are subject to certain federal requirements and restrictions that either would be inconsistent with the requirement about which the referendum asks or, in some cases, already include such a requirement.

BadgerCare Plus's medical assistance program is subject to federal Medicaid restrictions, and federal law does not allow for work-based requirements for such programs absent a federal waiver. See 42 U.S.C. § 1396a(a)(10)(A). Currently, there is no federal waiver in force that would allow Wisconsin to impose work requirements on this program. Wisconsin's FoodShare statute contains requirements that able-bodied, childless adults be employed or participate in an employment and training program, see Wis. Stat. § 49.79(9), but that requirement has been suspended by the federal government in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

A "yes" vote on Question 3, the advisory referendum, would make no change to Wisconsin law.

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Fond du Lac County, on April 4, 2023, at which the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification
- sign the poll book

If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth and then proceed to the machine to cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked. A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an electronic ballot marking device to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall use the tactile pad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan ballot**, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the voting machine. **The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.**



AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL

The Storm

This week, I am writing to you about a weather event that I experienced with two longtime friends, Jeff Moll and Doug Cibulka, while camping and ice fishing 2.8 miles from shore on Lake Superior near Ashland.

Every week before I go on my weekly trip, I watch the weather for the area that I am heading to and adjust to what I see; the weather event that we experienced was not forecasted.

SATURDAY, MARCH 11
HIGH 32, LOW 22

Yesterday, we arrived and my golden retrievers, Ruby and Red, are along.

As usual, we are staying in pop-up Eskimo shacks, we sleep in cots and one of the life savers of this trip was that we were all wearing rubber knee boots. We have one shack for sleeping and cooking, another for fishing and socializing and we traveled by using two snowmobiles.

Early this morning, I turned on our radio and the weather report was – starting at 3 p.m. – a storm would begin that would drop anywhere from six to 10 inches of snow, and the winds would be from 25-35 mph.

Something that I noticed was that by noon all other fishermen left the ice. Something that I thought about was that the wind would be out of the northeast, which meant blowing from open water, meaning lake affect snow.

At 3 p.m., the storm began, and it was forecast to last for 36 hours, and it started with a vengeance that immediately caused massive snow drifts on the top end of our camp, which sunk the ice due to the holes we had drilled for fishing and the snow weight.

A constant job was shoveling out our tip-ups, as they would be covered

with three-feet of snow in a matter of 30 minutes.

By dark, we made an agreement, and we did not want to do it. No one leaves the shack, visibility was near zero and the chance of finding a lost person was about the same odds.

SUNDAY, MARCH 12
HIGH 27, LOW 22

The wind is almost unreal. It has been bumped up to a constant 30-40 mph.

During the day, each of us tried maintaining our tip-ups, and it was physically exhausting due to the shoveling and trying to walk in knee-to-butt-deep snow. Our camp/shacks have eight-inches of water on top of the ice; the dogs have to stay on top of the cots, if they get off, they get our beds wet when they get back on them.

We are jigging for perch and smelt and catching them, but when we go outside the shack, we are soaked to the bone within a minute due to the driving snow reaching every part of

your body.

The half-acre around our camp is just shy of knee deep with slush, so walking is now hitting a physical experience that is testing each one of us.

The storm was forecast to hit its peak at 3 p.m., which was 24 hours after it started. The wind was blowing so hard that within 30 minutes of shoveling out our shack door the snow was three feet deep.

MONDAY, MARCH 13
HIGH 36, LOW 24

The storm quit late in the night.

Today, we would attempt to break camp and go home. Both of our snow machines are non-functional, as

they are 100-percent full of snow in literally every place.

Jeff Moll was the mechanic, Doug Cibulka was the camp breaker and I hauled all gear to a staging area 40-yards from camp. This had to be done because the snow machines would literally sink in the slush.

All three of us were literally done in, not a one of us complained and we knew we were going through a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Each of us performed our task and – three round trips later – we were loading trucks and heading home.

We caught three splake on tip ups while breaking camp.



D.N.R. Asks Public to Avoid Feeding Deer as Cold Weather Continues

Leaving food out for deer poses risks to their health.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is asking the public to avoid feeding deer as cold winter weather continues around parts of the state.



While the public may be concerned about the impact of winter conditions on the deer population, supplemental feeding of deer, such as leaving corn and other feed out for them in your backyard, causes more harm than good.

Deer are well-adapted to survive in winter conditions, with a slower metabolism in cold months and adjustments in their gut microbiomes to adapt to winter food sources. Corn, alfalfa and other feed are not part of their natural winter diet and can cause severe digestive issues and even death. Even a single feeding can cause rumen acidosis, which can cause death in otherwise healthy deer.

In addition to becoming sick after eating inappropriate food, winter feeding can negatively impact deer in several other ways. Feeding can draw them out of their winter range where naturally available food and shelter are nearby, causing them to expend more energy than necessary. It also causes deer to congregate, which increases the risk of disease transmission, including chronic wasting disease (CWD).

The risks to the deer population associated with supplemental feeding outweigh any temporary perceived benefits to individual deer. Creating and improving habitat is a more sustainable long-term solution to give deer and other wildlife the resources they need during the summer months and support them during the cold and snowy winter season.

Various resources are available to help landowners improve their land for wildlife, including the Deer Management Assistance Program, the Wisconsin Young Forest Partnership (youngforest.org) and the Landowner Incentive Program.

Deer feeding is currently illegal in more than three-quarters of Wisconsin counties. Where it is legal, regulations restrict the location and amount of food that may be placed.
