When deputies arrived, they located the suspect still outside the residence, and he refused to comply with their commands. The suspect refused to show deputies his hands and was yelling at them to shoot him. Deputies could also see a holstered handgun attached to the front of his clothing.

## Kewaskum Drexel Site Planning Nearing Final Stages

*Village Board rezones TID 4 to industrial to clear way for Drexel construction project*

The Village of Kewaskum's newly annexed land off HWY 28 was rezoned for industrial purposes earlier this week after the Village Plan Commission recommended and the Village Board approved a 2050 Comprehensive Plan that paves the way for manufacturing growth in the new tax incremental finance district (TID 4).

The recommendations, which took place at last week Tuesday's Plan Commission meeting, were the last of several procedural steps dating back at least six months. Late in 2022, the Village of Kewaskum was working on a development plan for the area (including the creation of TID 4, which was approved last week). In early 2023, it was announced that Drexel Building Supply was working with village officials on a new location to be dubbed "The Blue Door District." Recently, the village annexed the land (south of 28 and west of HWY 45) from the Town of Kewaskum, and the adoption of the village's updated 2050 Comprehensive Plan and the recommended

rezoning from agricultural to industrial will clear the way for Drexel to continue working on site plans and construction. The Kewaskum Village Board approved the recommendation during its regular monthly meeting on Monday, May 1.

It's anticipated that a 200,000 square-foot building will be constructed at the site, which comprises roughly 80 acres (though only 20-30 will be utilized by Drexel at the onset with another 30 acres available for future development, according to a previous release). The land

area encompasses two parcels.

At the April 25 Plan Commission meeting, during the public hearing portion of the evening, two residents expressed concerns and offered questions to the commission regarding the project.

Diane Zalewski, who lives across the highway from the industrial parcels, said she was concerned about traffic, safety and the environment.

"The speed limit is 55 miles-an-hour," noted Zalewski of

## Public Comments Welcome on Proposed Elimination of County Commuter Express Service

Comments from the public regarding the proposed elimination of the Washington County Commuter Express service provided by Washington County are welcome at a public meeting to be held on May 18, starting at 6 p.m., at the Washington County Government Center, Room 1019.

### Washington County Commuter Express Reductions

The service reduction is to eliminate all bus routes servicing the West Bend, Richfield, and Germantown Park and Ride lots. The Commuter Express would no longer service locations in Milwaukee County such as Marquette University, Marquette University High School, Milwaukee Regional Medical Center, Clement Zablocki Veterans Administration Medical Center, and Downtown Milwaukee.

The proposed elimination is being consid-

ered due in part to the decreased use of the service, associated loss of revenue, and the increase in the cost of the service. The service would cease on September 29, 2023.

The Public Works Committee will make a recommendation to the Washington County Board. The Washington County Board could take the matter up at its June 14, meeting.

# Campbellsport School Board Elects Officers

The Campbellsport School Board held a meeting on Monday, April 24, at Eden Elementary School, which included the election of officers in

addition to the regular meeting.

First, board members were to nominate this year's school board president with Mike Weiss again nominated to serve in the role.

Deb Senn nominated Danielle

Neitzel for president but did not receive a second motion from any of the other members.

By a vote of six to one, Mike Weiss was voted president of the board.

Next, Danielle Neitzel was nominated for vice president and was elected by a unanimous vote across the table.

Sharon Gazzola was named clerk and Deb Senn was voted to be the treasurer.

Following the election of officers, board members Sharon Gazzola and

Jessica Strand gave the oath of office. Sharon Gazzola was reelected in the April 4 election and Jessica Strand was elected as a new member.

Following the oaths, student representative Brady Bania gave a report on current high school events and shared some of his peers' feelings and thoughts.

Bania stated that the high school prom took place over the past weekend, and the majority of feedback from the student body was positive.

Additionally, he mentioned that the juniors received their ACT scores and many felt good about their results.

"I have also heard some students discuss plans to retake the test if they felt they could have done better," Bania added.

### Board Matters

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

rest of the school year.

• The board also received information on three newly hired teachers for the 2023-24 school year. Campbellsport will be gaining a new middle/high school Agriculture teacher, Speech Pathologist and high school Math teacher. Members of the board expressed their happiness in approving the three applicants for the upcoming school year.

• Finally, the meeting convened into closed session for the purpose of discussion regarding the employment, compensation, or performance of an employee over which the Board has jurisdiction or exercises responsibility.

HWY 28. "There's only two lanes. There's a lot of semis on that road. Are they intending to put a turn lane for people working in that area, or will traffic back up?"

Village Trustee Jim Hovland, who also serves on the Plan Commission, noted these were valuable concerns.

"Don't we think we should have addressed it before we even annexed [the land] to the village?" asked Hovland of village officials and commissioners present for last week's meeting.

Commission Chair Nate Wendelborn noted that some concerns could be addressed later in the meeting.

Ann Bodden, also a nearby resident on HWY 28, agreed with Zalewski's concerns and added a few of her own.

"I hope that there is some kind of study done," said Bodden regarding the speed limit on this stretch of highway. She added sending a request to the Wis. Department of Transportation to lower the limit would be prudent.

Bodden also questioned the nature in which the development project originated and was executed.

"There seemed to be a lot of discussion and a lot of planning and things went on behind closed doors and there weren't a lot of people that were made aware of it," stated Bodden. "We have a lot of concerns about the manner in which it was presented."

After the public hearing was closed, the commission took up discussion on the rezoning request.

"All the concerns we heard during the public hearing, things like the traffic and the speed limit and the noise, all those things will be addressed during site plans and, because it's a state highway... you have to get state-approval plans," noted Chairman Wendelborn. "All those things will be addressed by the state to make it a safe intersection."

Wendelborn said once Drexel provides a site plan for the parcels, the village can address other issues like buffer zones for noise and wetland delineation.

The village will need to install sewer and water utilities to accommodate future infrastructure. Village Administrator Adam Gitter estimated it would cost roughly \$3,000,000, based on recent estimates, with the early project plan calling for roughly \$6 million in total expenditures. The project, like most TIDs, will be initially funded by loans. The Economic Development Washington County organization and Washington County officials signaled early their involvement with the financing of the project with an anticipated \$2,977,810. The pre-project plan noted the village would begin paying back this debt starting in 2025

after increment collects in TID4.

"Do you think that's fair to the taxpayers of this village?" asked Hovland to Gitter, regarding the high initial costs, during the April 25 Plan Commission meeting.

"I do," responded Gitter, noting that, a pre-development plan, worked out with Drexel, would ensure the developers, not the village, pay for any shortcomings on the project's estimated gained-increment.

"One of the mechanisms that you use, you use the increment that you're gaining to pay off those loans," explained Gitter, adding that should the TID not gain enough increment to fund the project, the developer, and landowner in this case, would pay the difference of the debt-owed. "That covers the village from the catastrophic events that would end up having this place on the tax roll."

There was some concern on the commission that if TID 4 underperformed, which had been an issue with previous TID projects in the village, the costs to manage and develop it could become the burden of taxpayers.

Gitter was optimistic for TID 4, although he said curveballs can be thrown; especially from state regulation.

"I don't know what our legislators will do and what kind of rules they could possibly pass, so I'm never going to say that something is 100-percent guaranteed," he said. "But I'm doing everything I can with [the developer negotiations] to cover the village."

Gitter added that while a pre-development agreement is in place, he is still negotiating a final developer's agreement, although he did not anticipate major changes.

Should the project reach full development, according to pre-project numbers, the village anticipates an incremental value increase of \$25.1 million by the end of 2024 with TID 4 expected to generate more than \$6.5 million in incremental tax revenue over the 20-year lifespan.

Chairman Wendelborn added that TID 4 is unique, in that, a developer is already planning a project for it. He noted that underperforming TIDs are often created without immediate development, which leads to losses in the form of debt interest and administrative fees to operate the TID. The TIDs collect increment based on the property's value, which increases with infrastructure projects like the proposed Drexel campus.

The motion to recommend the rezoning passed with all non-abstaining commission members voting in the affirmative. Hovland abstained.

At the May 1 meeting, the Kewaskum Village Board approved the recommendation and officially changed the zoning of the TID to industrial.


He was taken into custody by deputies and turned over to EMS personnel on scene for treatment of bite wounds and ultimately transported to St. Agnes Hospital for further treatment.





I went to a conference last week and came home with many things. Some were ideas and information about literacy, strategic planning, self-care and building planning. Others included posters, handouts, and business cards. I networked with current colleagues and met new ones. This was the first conference I attended in person since late 2019. Not much has changed because I also returned home with the same thing I received from the previous conference, the flu.

I was supposed to meet my husband at the campground when the

conference wrapped up. We are hosting a party at our site next weekend. We need to get our place prepared for our company. All I wanted to do was go home, put on comfy pajamas and sleep all weekend, which I did. He was very understanding, almost certainly because he didn't want to be around my germs.

When sick, I think about what has comforted me in the past. I didn't get ill often as a child, nor did my sisters that I remember. My mother probably told us it was not allowed. Although when I did succumb to an

illness and had to stay home from school, she was very nurturing. I could stay in bed and she would roll in the portable television from her bedroom. We played games, war with cards or scrabble when I was older. If I could eat, she would make me Campbell's chicken noodle soup and white toast with cinnamon sugar. If I could not keep anything down, it was flat ginger ale or 7-Up. Besides watching daytime soap operas and playing games, I had books to keep me company when I was awake. It was very comforting.

As a parent, whenever my children were ill, which was also a rare incident, I hope I was as nurturing as my own mother. I worked often so their father may have stayed home with them more than I did. But when I was able to tend to my sick kids, I channeled my mother. There was some variance. It was

whole wheat toast with cinnamon sugar, the chicken soup had stars and I didn't allow soda so to hydrate, I poured apple juice. I introduced them to the game of war and our board games were Life and Guess Who. We didn't have a portable TV, however there was a lot of cuddling and a bed full of books.

The adult me when ill has adapted the routine to self-nurture. I slurp down chicken bone broth with gluten-free toast sprinkled with cinnamon sugar and drink lots of hot tea. The games are played on my phone, I have a multitude of shows to binge watch and of course, loads and loads of books.

I am lucky to be able to attend in-person conferences and amass all the wonderful information provided. I wish I didn't have to take home everything provided, but the day or two of illness was worth it.

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

Kewaskum will be back home on Thursday against Ripon at 4:45 p.m., followed by a doubleheader on Friday against Oostburg at 3:30 p.m.



## Water, Essential for Life

This past week, I really did not know what I was going to do for an adventure worth writing about.

As it always does, an idea came to me and, I think you will agree, it was a good one.

Well, in to this week's column, you will see some words of wisdom written by a friend and one of my daughter, Selina Walters', professors: Justin A VanDeHey. He is an associate professor of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences at UW-Stevens Point and also the owner of Cooperstown Kennels.

**SATURDAY, APRIL 24**  
**HIGH 42, LOW 25**

My plan was to go up by Crandon, hike into some public land with Red and Ruby, my golden retrievers, build a camp and do nothing for three days.

That plan changed to hiking on the Ice Age Trail (IAT) in southern Taylor County in the Chequamegon

National Forest, building a camp and doing very little. High water everywhere kind of had me boxed in for this week's options.

I was actually driving when I came

up with the new plan and it was a wise choice; I could see it on my map in the Wisconsin Gazetteer. So, I drive into Owen/Withee, hit County T and continue north to paradise. Actually, I love this entire area, the well-kept farms, large forests and good people all get my respect.

I am driving on gravel roads, there is snow in the forests and water everywhere. I came to a crossing for The Ice Age Trail parked my truck, loaded my pack and let the trip begin.

My first observation, besides the water and snow, was the lay of the land. I would call it knobs of maybe two-to-six acres of land that go up about 80-feet and most lower edges have small wetlands. This was a constant, and I was almost always hear sandhill cranes and Canada geese.

My plan was simple, build camp on top of a knob, look at the world and hike the IAT with a base camp to come back to.

**TUESDAY, APRIL 25**  
**HIGH 46, LOW 26**

The moisture in this neck of the woods is everywhere to be seen and felt.

Today, the pups and I went on an all-day hike, and I have found a new place to call home. What is amazing is the constant small wetlands around each knob and what I am seeing and not seeing. Due to snow on the ground, there is very little sign of wildlife tracks. I have to wonder do the animals leave for winter or did a very long winter harvest many of them, probably a bit of both.

Here are Justin VanDeHey's words of wisdom, I think you will enjoy them:

"While it may seem obvious to us, there are many natural benefits of streams flowing over their banks and spilling onto the land. For example, when water moves out onto the

land it slows the downstream flows and allows more water to leach into the soil replenishing groundwater. These slower flows allow silt and nutrients from the stream to be deposited onto the flooded land creating excellent growing areas for plants. The slower flow rates also reduce erosion downstream. The flooded areas are high in nutrients and low in predators, making them excellent breeding grounds for fish, frogs and aquatic bugs and are critical nursery areas for fish like northern pike. So all in all, allowing a river or stream to spill out onto the land has a lot of hidden benefits."

Think about what Justin wrote. That my friends is a huge way that nature works.

By the second night of this excellent adventure, I was 100-percent acclimatized and felt great during my treks. The pups had some excellent training and loved swimming in still somewhat frozen lakes. If you are a hiker, consider this section of trail a must check out on your priority list.

Get lost, hang out, observe; you will come out of it with your batteries charged!

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

Sam Schodrow singled, Megan McCarty walked, and Kaitlyn Goebel tripled to drive in two in the first inning.


In the third, Kovi Hermann walked, Schodrow doubled, and Kinsley Homuth singled to drive in two more.
