## Local Community Theater Advances to National Festival

Just three weeks after winning a major national award, the chairman of the Kettle Moraine Players (KMP) will be heading to the AACTfest National Festival in Louisville, Ky. in June to receive the award, accompanied by five more individuals from KMP. During the week of June 17-22, 12 theatre companies will present shows to determine who is the national champion.

After winning the Wisconsin AACTfest and two additional awards at Beaver Dam in January, KMP returned to Beaver Dam on April 29, to take on five other theater groups in AACTfest Region III (Great Lakes Region). At that festival KMP took first place with their production of "Three Viewings," Kokomo Civic Theatre took second place with "Silent Sky," and Beaver Dam took third place with "For the Love of Camping." Mandi Theater of Buffalo Grove, Ill., The Sauk of Jonesville, Mich., and Troy Civic Theatre of Troy, Ohio also participated.

Mandi is an Indian-focused company and their presentation was in the Hindi language and its costumes were native Indian attire. It was quite interesting and they won four awards. All the companies won awards. Beaver Dam's third

Each year there is a national ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington, Virginia where a wreath is placed upon it to commemorate the day.

In 2000 Congress passed The National Moment of Remembrance Act so all American citizens would pause for a moment of silence to remember our fallen brothers and sisters. This Memorial Day at 3 PM most in our Country will stop grilling and other leisure pastime activities to remember those who gave the ultimate gift of their lives in service to America and its freedom.

## Gov. Evers Signs Bills to Address Carjacking and Reckless Driving in Wisconsin

*Governor again urges Legislature to approve budget initiatives designed to curb reckless driving, make roads safer*

Gov. Tony Evers today signed two bills earlier this month that would help address reckless driving and carjacking in the state by increasing penalties for both and creating a new “carjacking” section of the criminal code.

“Reckless driving and other dangerous behaviors are putting our kids, families, and communities at risk all across our state, and we must do more at the state level to address dangerous behavior on our roads,” said Gov. Evers. “I’m proud the first enacted bill of my second term was aimed at curbing reckless driving, and I am glad to be continuing that work today by signing these bills to address carjacking and ensure reckless driving is treated with the seriousness it requires.”

In April, Gov. Evers also signed Senate Bill 92, now 2023 Wisconsin Act 1, to curb reckless driving in Wisconsin by allowing counties and municipalities to enact ordinances authorizing law enforcement to impound a vehicle if its owner is cited for reckless driving, has a prior conviction for reckless driving, and has not paid the imposed forfeiture for that offense.

Assembly Bill 55, now 2023 Wisconsin Act 9:

- Increases the penalties for reckless driving; and

## On Memorial Day

This coming Monday, May 29, is Memorial Day, and in this paper (pages 13-28) is our annual special section honoring all those who lost their lives in service and those who served and are no longer with us.

America’s Memorial Day had an almost compulsory beginning – localized versions of ceremonies and parades were documented in the 1860s – but even the best of historians had a hard time pinpointing its origins.

Many communities across the country have made cases for being the genesis of the day of recognition, but records suggest flower-laying and ceremony coincided organically alongside the recess of the Civil War. Countless communities hold histories of making an annual practice of recognizing deceased local service members.

Noticing the function of the habit, the holiday became official on May 30, 1868, proclaimed as “Decoration Day” by John A. Logan (Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic), and the event turned annual before eventually getting renamed “Memorial Day” in 1968. Congress recognized it as a federal holiday three years later.

Locally, it should come as no surprise (with abundant and excellent examples still thriving across the state today) that a Wisconsin municipality has a legitimate claim to holding one of the first-ever Memorial Day parades. The Village of Rochester (near Burlington in Racine County) was documented as holding something like a Memorial Day parade as early as 1867 (one year prior to the creation of “Decoration Day”).

Today, that deep history is still witnessed – not just in the parades – but in the ceremonial flower-laying ceremonies and programs put on by local veteran groups. The tradition has remained an annual rite for those who served and remain with

us to lead the public in remembering the fallen.

This year will be my fifth consecutive year in-attendance for a Memorial Day ceremony. I attended several in my youth, but there was a long gap between the first one I covered for the paper in 2019 and the last time I had been.

For any readers who have not attended recently or have never been to a Memorial Day ceremony: I highly recommend it.

I understand the status of being a federal holiday means, for many, an additional day off work. While you should certainly enjoy that added freedom, I would note that most local Memorial Day services and programs are relatively brief and involve little to no active participation from those in attendance. The programs usually feature a gun salute, the playing of “Taps”, a reading of names and a procession and recession of an area color guard. Longer programs might incorporate music or guest speakers.

The community interaction that precedes and follows these events is also not to be understated. Unfortunately, most Americans either know someone directly or know someone secondhand who has lost a family member at war. To honor and remember those members of the community with supportive neighbors is part of the fabric of this country’s culture.

Support for the tradition of Memorial Day, from its spontaneous creation roughly 150 years ago to the present, is important, not just for the country, but for our hometowns, our rural municipalities and our neighboring cities. If all the public is asked to do, in exchange for the sacrifice U.S. Armed Service members make, is be supportive and show up, I think we can find 30 minutes this coming Monday between camping, fishing, baseball and softball to remember those we lost and thank them for the life they helped provide.

## Grow Easy-Care Mandevillas for Season-Long Color

Bold color, tropical beauty, and easy-care mandevillas make excellent additions to patios, decks, and gardens. Train them onto a trellis, allow them to cascade from a hanging basket, or combine them with other plants. Enjoy summer-long blossoms and the butterflies, hummingbirds, and other pollinators that stop by for a visit.

Once divided into two different groups, dipladenias and mandevillas, the botanists now con-

sider them all mandevillas. You will find both names still in use, with dipladenias referring to those with a more mounded, shrub-like habit and mandevillas being more of a trailing vine. Whatever you call them you are sure to find one or more that complement your garden and container designs.

Mandevillas are grown as annuals in all but zones 10a to 11b where some varieties are hardy.

They flower best in full sun but will tolerate some shade. These South American native plants thrive in the hot humid weather of summer. Wait for spring temperatures to remain in the 60s before planting them outdoors.

Select a potting mix or location with organically rich, well-drained soil. Use a slow-release fertilizer at the start of the season and make a second application, if needed mid-season. Read and follow the label directions when using fast-release liquid fertilizers.


Mandevillas are usually flowering when you purchase them at the garden center. They will continue to bloom on new growth throughout the summer and fall until frost kills the plant.

The well-behaved vining mandevilla will not strangle nearby plants. Just give it a trellis or obelisk for the vines to wrap around and climb. Their slightly woody stems provide greater stability than other vines that regularly need to be secured to the support. Just tuck any new tendrils through the trellis, pointing them in the desired direction as needed.

Use vining varieties in a container of their own or as a vertical accent on a trellis in mixed containers or flowerbeds. Set pots by an entrance to your home or garden for a colorful welcome or use them to dress up a bare wall or fence.

The more compact shrubby types can be planted with other annual flowers in the garden, grown in hanging baskets, or used as a filler in mixed container gardens. Just prune off or tuck any wayward branches behind neighboring plants.

## Producers to Receive Crop Insurance Premium Rebates for Planting Cover Crops

WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP), in partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Risk Management Agency (RMA), received 450 applications for rebates on approximately 145,000 acres of land for a new program offering crop insurance rebates for planting cover crops. DATCP anticipates approximately \$725,000 will be awarded in rebates. The application period closed on January 31, 2023.

USDA-RMA is currently reviewing the applications and will work with insurance providers to issue the rebates on producers' upcoming crop insurance bills. For the producers who applied, all eligible applicants who have an active policy with an approved insurance provider and submitted correct field and acreage information should anticipate receiving the rebate.

In 2022, Gov. Tony Evers signed bipartisan legislation to create a state-run crop insurance premium rebate for planting cover crops. For this program, up to \$800,000, or 160,000 acres of coverage, could be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Recipients will receive a \$5 per acre rebate on their summer 2023 crop insurance

## Check It Out!

Families, what do you have planned for the summer break? Are you going to take some small weekend vacations or a long one? Have plans to explore the world around you, even just in your backyard? Allow your kids to make their own recreation choices that will enrich their imagination? All those are great options that will help prevent loss of learning from the previous nine months of school. But don't forget to stop in the library and participate in the summer learning program.

For the past 20 years, researchers have compiled information about the loss of significant knowledge in math and reading over summer break. About 2½ months of math and 2-months of reading skills disappear over a single summer. Summer slide is also cumulative so these lost skills will add up over time. By the time they are middle school students, children can lose up to two years of learning. Terrified yet? I certainly was when I discovered summer slide.

Previously I was a teacher and can attest to the fact that it may take the entire month of September to get your students caught up from what they lost over summer. While many kids don't attend summer school, learning does not need to stop. Reading just two-three hours a week or any other educational opportunity over the summer will prevent summer slide.

You may wonder how you can get your child reading, if they are not already into that. Allowing children to select their own reading material provides a greater gain in reading achievement. If they find reading fun, they will read more and as children are little mimics of the adults in their lives, viewing their role models with a book will encourage them to find reading enjoyable. If you are going on vacation, don't forget the books to read on the plane, at the beach, or listen to audiobooks on car trips. Other ways to help your children find the fun in reading is to join a family book club, introduce them to a series that they cannot put down or take them on regularly visits to the library.

Of course, I highly recommend visits to the library over the summer as we will be hosting our summer learning program, "All Together Now – Bee a Summer Reader." Note that this program is for readers of all ages with no restrictions. We will have programs and prizes and incentives for children, teens and adults. You can start registering for our program on June 10. We are grateful to have the product Beanstack again which is being offered through the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) with funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant through April 2025.

Check my column next week for more about our summer learning program. For now, I hope you and your family make a commitment to continuous learning and help prevent summer slide.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Elmer and Ester; husband, Gerald; and son, Roy Dunisch.



• Requires that the driver improvement surcharge and safe ride surcharge are imposed on anyone convicted of reckless driving.

Senate Bill 76, now 2023 Wisconsin Act 10:

- Reorganizes the crimes of intentionally taking a vehicle without the owner's consent;
- Creates a new "carjacking" section of the criminal code; and
- Increases certain penalties related to carjacking crimes.

"These bills are a good place to start, but our work cannot stop here," continued Gov. Evers. "I am once again urging the Legislature to support my budget initiatives that build upon the legislation I'm signing today to combat reckless driving across our state. I look forward to further discussions to make our roads and communities safer by taking a statewide, multi-pronged approach on this critically important issue."

These actions build on previous and ongoing efforts of the Evers Administration to address reckless driving, reduce crime, and increase safety on Wisconsin's roads, including the governor's 2023-25 biennial budget proposal, which would:

- Improve the safety of travel on Wisconsin's highways by providing 35.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for additional state troopers and 10.0 FTE positions for motor carrier inspectors;
- Provide \$16,000 to develop and implement electric vehicle license plate stickers to assist first responders in emergency response for electric vehicles;
- Restore roadway design considerations in state law that support non-motorist infrastructure known as "Complete Streets," empowering local communities to safely integrate all modes of transportation; and
- Invest \$6.5 million to cover the cost of comprehensive driver education for economically disadvantaged students.

Unfortunately, last week, the Joint Committee on Finance met in its first executive session of the budget process and in a single motion removed more than 540 provisions from the governor's budget, including several additional provisions to make roads safer, such as:

- Providing \$60 million to establish a new traffic calming grant program;
- Implementing Driver Licenses for All, regardless of documented status, to improve the safety of Wisconsin roads for everyone in Wisconsin;
- Requiring that courts order the use of an ignition interlock device (IID) for all offenses involving the use of alcohol and operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, joining 30 other states and D.C. in requiring all offenders, including first-time offenders, to install an IID; and
- Increasing Wisconsin's seatbelt violation penalty from \$10 to \$25 to match neighboring states.

In addition to his 2023-25 biennial budget proposals, Gov. Evers has previously announced more than \$100 million in investments to support violence prevention and community safety efforts statewide, including to support the work of local and Tribal law enforcement across the state and, notably, to prevent reckless driving through environmental design and upgrades to local roads in Milwaukee.

## Goal Completed!

#### ANDREW JOHNSON VVMF VOLUNTEER

It was awesome news to learn the last photo for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) Faces project was found, and the goal of finding at least one photo for every name on Vietnam Veterans Memorial (The Wall) in Washington, D.C. was completed on September 1, 2022. Many people behind the National Newspaper Association (NNA), state newspaper associations, community newspapers and journalism schools from around the country joined the effort in 2014 to find more than 24,000 missing photos from the 58,281 names engraved on The Wall. Not only did these people find pictures, but they also told stories about these American heroes. All the people who worked on the project served their country in a unique and memorable way that will leave a legacy for future generations.

Many people who worked on this project had some personal military connection or were dedicated patriots. My connection is my son, 1LT David Johnson. He was killed in action (KIA) by an IED in small arms battle he led in Kandahar Province, Afghanistan, on January 25, 2012. David loved serving as a platoon leader in the Army. He felt it was his life's purpose to lead soldiers into battle. He achieved his purpose. His work saved many others in the military. It was not how long David lived that counts, but how well he lived his

24 years. His faith and life have inspired many, including me. Like many of the recent KIAs from the War on Terror, David is buried in Arlington with a simple white gravestone marking his location in section 60. He joined the over one million military members who gave their all in our country's history.

The names etched onto a military gravestone or on memorials like the VVMF Wall are representative of a real person's life. A photo of the fallen person tells more about the story of the person's life. A photo translates just a name into a portrait of a real person who lived and died. A photo adds meaning. Finding the photos was an important mission to me.

I have learned that monuments and memorials are primarily for the living. It reminds us of the tremendous personal sacrifices made for our great country so we can be free. It is a place we can reflect, mourn, and most importantly, never forget. It is also a place that should inspire us to live better lives because of the sacrifices made.

My wife and I received counseling from the Army after our son was killed. At the last session, the counselor asked us, "What do you think David would want you to do with your lives?" There is no question that David would want us to live full lives and help as many others as possible. I suspect that many of our fallen military, including those listed on The Wall, would say the same thing. I would go a step farther and argue that the living have a responsibility to honor our heroes by living fully.


Vietnam veterans from across the country have

been extra kind toward recent Gold Star families. Many would come to military funerals, including my own son's. It was not uncommon for a Vietnam vet to welcome me with a big hug and cry with me. They would tell me they would never forget my son, even though they were mistreated when they came home. It was a strange connection I cannot explain in words. All I know is that they loved my son and me. Many of them offered to help in any way they could. I could often sense their losses represented by the etching on The Wall. Every name represented someone special. Completing the task of finding at least one picture for every name was a way to honor not only those who gave their all but also the living Vietnam veterans and Gold Star families. They have also paid an enormous price for being Americans.

When I learned about the Faces Project, I immediately thought it would be a way that newspapers could uniquely serve our country. My son David would be so proud of the newspapers helping find photos for fellow veterans.

May we all live in such a way to honor all American heroes!

ed to have the group learn about the Confederate breakthrough that occurred on September 20, 1863. Miscommunication, supreme exhaustion and pettiness contributed to the tidal wave that crushed the Union center on that day.

We also wanted to hear about the Union stand on Snodgrass Hill following the collapse of the Federal right and center. It was here that George Henry Thomas earned his nickname "The Rock of Chickamauga." Who better to tell these stories than an author who has written battlefield guides to lead visitors around each of the key locations? Seriously, the services of Robert Carter are strongly recommended should your travels ever take you to the Chickamauga battlefield.

A. Wilson (Will) Greene lead the charge at Chattanooga. Our group hiked to Brown's Ferry, scaled Lookout Mountain (in our vehicles) to visit Point Park, came to understand what Grant saw from Orchard Knob, wondered why the Sherman Reservation isn't called Cleburne Reservation (since

Old Pat handed Uncle Billy his lunch there) and, finally, we ended the day at the Bragg Reservation on Missionary Ridge. Will Greene is a master at making the mess that was Chattanooga make sense.

While in Chattanooga our kids and chaperones did more than pound history. "See Rock City" say the barns and billboards all the way down the interstate. So, we did. Visiting this tourist-trap gem was a real adventure. It cleared some cobwebs from overloaded minds, and refreshed us. The same thing happened at the Tennessee Aquarium. That venue is a must-see for both adolescents and adults. The aquarium is super well done.

Our itinerary took us to Franklin, Tennessee next. On the way there, we stopped at St. John's Episcopal Church near Columbia. This beautiful church, built by the family of the Bishop-General Leonidas Polk, was a temporary resting place for General Patrick Cleburne's body after the disaster at Franklin. It also contains the bodies of an earlier skirmish near Spring Hill, and is the final resting place for several



# King Pin Jr. Bowlers Raise \$14,409 in Scholarship Dollars

## KING PIN LANES CAMPBELLSPORT

This has been another busy year in the fundraising department for the King Pin Junior Scholarship bowlers. The year started off with our annual pizza and fish fry fundraiser. This year, 73 participants sold pizzas and fish dinners to deposit \$6,688 into their scholarship accounts. As usual, the bowlers and parents met in the CHS cafeteria to make the pizzas they sold. This is the 18th year of doing the fundraiser so the pizza making is down to a science. It took only five hours for them to make 1,300 pizzas.

The King Pin Junior Bowlers would like to thank all of the volunteers, friends, relatives and community members who assembled or purchased pizzas and fish dinners to help to make this year a great success.

Following the cash raffle fundraiser in March and April, King Pin Lanes had their 30th Annual King Pin Junior Bowler Scholarship Tournament. The tournament was held on April 8 with 70 Junior Scholarship bowlers competing for \$2,330 in scholarship dollars that will be used for their future education. In addition to the prize purse, the participants raised \$5,391 for their individual accounts by selling cash raffle

tickets.

Thirty-four bowlers competed in the Bumper and Pee Wee Divisions, all receiving part of a \$1,130 prize purse. It was a tight match again this year with only 20 pins separating the top four bowlers. Ayla Konen captured the top spot and was awarded a \$120 scholarship. Tryston Kober finished second and received a \$100 scholarship. Last year's champion, Dexter Haendel, took home third place and an \$80 scholarship trailing Tryston by only one pin. Korbin Gesbeck finished fourth and received a \$60 scholarship. Harper Crass rounded out the top five and received a \$45 scholarship.

In the Junior and Senior Divisions, 36 bowlers rolled three games of qualifying before the field was cut to the top eight bowlers. To make the first cut, the bowlers had to be almost 20 pins over their average each game. Those eight went on to compete in two games of match play. The five survivors coming out of the match play and advancing to the modified stepladder finals included: Adam Retzlaff seeded fifth, Adam Rahmer seeded fourth, Carson Schrauth seeded third, Porter Faust seeded second and Stephen Miller seeded first.

The first match of the modified stepladder finals had the third, fourth and fifth seeds rolling off against each other. Carson bowled over the two other competitors rolling a 243 to defeat Retzlaff's 202 and Rahmer's 198 (all games listed include handicap). The second match Carson ran out of gas and his 184 didn't stand up to Porter's 250. The Championship match was set between second-seed Porter Faust and first-seed Stephen Miller. Stephen had been untouchable all day finishing 220 pins over his average after qualifying and matchplay. Stephen didn't disappoint rolling a 245 to comfortably beat Porter's respectable 217. Champion Stephen Miller received a \$120 scholarship, Porter Faust finished second receiving a \$100 scholarship, Carson Schrauth finished third receiving a \$80 scholarship, Adam Retzlaff finished fourth receiving a \$70 scholarship and Adam Rahmer rounded out the top five receiving a \$60 scholarship.

Each junior bowler that participated in the tournament received at least \$20 in future scholarship dollars. Presently, the King Pin Junior Scholarship Program has had over 325 members and has raised over \$134,426 in scholarship dollars. In ad-

dition, \$138,805 in scholarships have already been redeemed by participants for post high school education to further their career goals.







former slaves. This led to some great discussion with the kids!

At Spring Hill, we discussed the lost opportunity General John Bell Hood had to trap the Union army under John Schofield. The "best move" of Hood's career came to naught, and he was "wrathful as a rattlesnake" because of it. Was the fiasco here a specific individual's fault, or was the blunder there more solid evidence of the Confederate Army of Tennessee's dysfunctional nature?

The Carter House and Carnton Plantation moved hearts to tears. The Carter family endured horrible things during the battle. Soldiers fought in the dying daylight and into the night in five tragic hours that destroyed any hope of success for the Confederates. Over 1400 Confederates buried by civilians, many of the bodies unknown, is a

sad tale that needs to be heard. Educational interpreter Jenny Peach had us all in the palm of her hand with exceptional information and great insights about both the Carter House and Carnton.

Our final day brought us to Springfield, Illinois. There we visited the Abraham Lincoln Museum and the Lincoln House National Historic Park. The museum in particular interested the students. With state-of-the-art displays and films, the Lincoln story was told in a unique and fascinating way. Tickets to the Lincoln are free, but distributed on a first-come basis. We didn't get inside.

Trinity put on about 2,000 miles, ate some fantastic meals, and saw God's handiwork in His incredible scenery.

All venues the group visited were kid-friendly and fulfilled their goals of education beyond our expectations.

programs.



He had a one-word answer: “Memories.”



### A Unique Trout Fishing Trip

This week’s column is a pretty cool and an off-the-wall story; here’ goes!

Every spring I go somewhere in Wisconsin for three days, camp and fish trout. I make a wildlife adventure out of it and, this year, I chose the Clam River, which is in northwest Wisconsin and flows through Burnett and Barron counties.

The beauty of this location is that much of the land is in the Clam River Wildlife Area, public land, which would be very cool to explore for hunting, as well.

**SUNDAY, MAY 14**  
**HIGH 73, LOW 34**

I am currently on a run where I am over-scheduled and much of it is physical, all of this is my own doing but what I am doing is very positive!

I fished the Clam River last May and did very well on brook trout, not so good on browns.

This year, I was hiding out in a new section, one that I had never seen, and today, when I arrived in the late afternoon, I decided that, when I die, my ashes can be spread here; Burnett and Barron are beautiful.

So here is a side note: On the way home from this expedition, I am going to stop at Premier Livestock and Auction in Owen/Withee and hopefully buy three calves in the 200-pound range. I planned on sleep-

ing in the trailer I hauled calves in and, the day after I got home, I planned to move my daughter, Selina, with that same trailer.

I find a place to hide my trailer and catch massive trout where no one has ever fished; I am super excited. I gear up, including chest waders, and go exploring. While crossing the Clam River, I once again realize that walking on slippery rocks in a hard current, that my 165-pounds could easily be swept away.

I see lots of deer sign, I fish hard for four hours, I have only one bite after working five pools and that is a brook trout that I released.

I found a bear stump that had been washed down stream and is very waterlogged and full of mud. It is the perfect stump. I try lifting it and blow out my knees, back, hips and get a hernia.

I must get the stump!  
**MONDAY, MAY 15**  
**HIGH 72, LOW**

I am on the Clam at 5 a.m. and very excited.

I am using a small gold hook with a number-five split shot and a night crawler.

I fished hard for three hours and only had one hit, which was an 11-inch brown.

I have no worries; my pickup has gas and I am going to explore.

First, I must get the stump across the river and haul it about 500-yards to my truck. This was a four-grunts kind of journey, and that stump is going to kill me a bear some day.

I explore and fish hard on the Clam and catch nothing, my mind says “travel” and it is telling me to go to the Rush River in Pierce County.

The stump is in the back of my

truck, I slept in my makeshift cattle trailer, my window switch does not work, my heater is stuck on high and life is excellent (“*Mothers, don’t teach your boys to be outdoor writers!*”).

I know the hole I want to fish on the Rush; I think the ridges are limestone, the pools are deep and I love it here.

I am set up with five hours of daylight and about a half mile from my truck.

The trout are hungry.

This pool is about 40-yards long with rapids above it and can be very challenging to negotiate.

My first fish is a 15-inch brown trout, and I now feel super smart; I fished until dark, forgot my headlamp, caught 11 browns (of which I kept a 15”, 14.5” and a 14”).

The following morning, I limited out, drove to Premier by 10 a.m. where it was determined that I smelled worse than the cattle I was hoping to buy.

After a full day, I could not find any calves that I could afford, and homeward-bound the Chevy Hotel took me!





## Kewaskum Claims Conference Title

The math was simple for Kewaskum coming into Tuesday's doubleheader with Ripon. Win one game to become the outright conference champions. After the Indians defeated the Winneconne Wolves in extra innings last week, the same Wolves defeated Waupun on Friday evening to give the Indians a two-game lead in the standings.

Kewaskum not only won the first game, they claimed the school's first conference championship in softball since 2019.

The Indians jumped on the Tigers in game one of the double-dip and did not give them much hope.

Four runs in the second inning would be all the team would need to take down the sixth place team in the East Central Conference (ECC). Aubrey Magray, Julia Prochnow, Maya Beistle and Sadie Clausing would cross the plate to tally scores for Kewaskum on four singles - by Magray, Macy Sabish, Clausing and Kyli Baka.

The Indians added an insurance run in the fifth frame with a double by Baka, who was driven in when Magray also whacked a double.

Sabish kept the Tiger hitters off balance throughout the game, scattering three hits while walking one and striking out ten.

In game two, the Indians put freshman Olivia Beck on the mound and she continued the solid pitching for the team. The rookie gave up one run on seven hits, walking two and striking out eight.

The offense was lively for Kewaskum as four players recorded multi-hit games - Baka, Grace Leitheiser, Sadie Clausing and Jaidan Miller.

Extra-base hits were popular as seven of Kewaskum's 12 hits in the game were for extra bases. Clausing with two doubles, Baka and Miller
