The varsity softball team beat Wautoma 9-8 in a regional semi-final game last Tuesday, May 23.

The Hornets' defense struggled in the first inning giving up five unearned runs.

Sam Schodrow led off with a walk. Kylie Krueger laid down a sac bunt, however, the pitcher tried to get Schodrow at second and the throw pulled the shortstop off the bag. Kinsley Homuth then hit a hard single that the third baseman couldn't quite glove to load the bases. Megan McCarty hit a sac fly to drive in the first run. With one out, Maia Morgan struck out but reached first when the ball got past the catcher to, again, load the bases. Alyssa Koebel then reached on an error when the first baseman dropped a throw from the second baseman, which allowed two more runs to score. After a passed ball scored another run, Ava Sippel hit a hard shot to short,

and a throw off-target to first allowed the fifth run to score.


A Simple Feeding

Some Songs for (Almost) Summer

The sausages will be sizzlin', the porches packed and the campsites crammed from here on out: Welcome to (almost) summer in Wisconsin.

I will assume for a second, dear readers, that you are at least a little bit like me. After months of snow, cold and rain, I like to start summer as soon as possible (no need to wait for that far-off solstice later this month). Cyclically, with high school spring sports seasons nearly complete and graduation and Memorial Day observed, this is the time of the year in the newspaper industry where things "lighten up." It's often exactly the right time for staff to finally scamper off to much-needed vacations.

A feature of many backyard hangs, late-night bonfires and long days on the lake is music. A carefully chosen record, an expertly crafted playlist or a crystal-clear radio station suddenly seem so much more vital when the temperatures bust through the high-60s; friends and family nearby and food and beverages aplenty.

Since this is still "almost summer", I thought to share a random spattering of five songs that I think fit the bill of the changing seasons. These are not, what some musical admirers would call, "bangers" (or high-energy songs you can dance to); let's save the "Hey Ya", "Brown Eyed Girl" and "Friends in Low Places" for the dog days.

These are, instead, really lovely songs to hear in the garden, a pre-dinner kitchen or in your car, as the sun shines through just hot enough that the air conditioning finally comes in handy.

If winter was the time for reflection and summer the season of expression, then the final weeks of spring are clearly a good time for both; a transition from battling the doldrums to trying to find all the energy to savor every single second of summer in this state.

"Jesus Was a Cross Maker" (1971) by Judee Sill

The first artist signed to David Geffen's Asylum Records was singer-songwriter Judee Sill who was just 26 when her eponymous debut album was released. Track six, which was the last song on the first side of the record, is "Jesus Was a Cross Maker".

Credit to a friend of mine who described this song as "floss for my brain." Sill's multi-part harmonies and quiet verses that crescendo into the chorus certainly do something to human ears that few other songs of the time (or since, for that matter) have seemed to figure out. Produced by Graham Nash, the song was never a hit but gained traction through contemporary covers (Nash's The Hollies, Linda Ronstadt and Cass Elliot found some success with the song).

The instrumentation consists of Sill's guitar playing, which blends with a full backing band, organ and the multiple vocal tracks. Upon listening, you would think it was meant to be heard in churches or cathedrals.

Sill, who died in 1979, was fond of the single, and she called it the "best thing I'd ever written."

I do agree.

"It's a Big Old Goofy World" (1991) by John Prine

I've mentioned John Prine on more than one occasion in this column, and that is in large part because of his spot-on Midwestern poetry and perspective. A native of Illinois, Wisconsin landscapes show up frequently in Prine's work, which is oft accompanied by slang and style that seems to mirror and honor this regional way-of-life (he was not allergic to offering a few criticisms, as well).

Perhaps one of the best examples of Prine's prowess with prose was the 1991 song "It's a Big Old Goofy World". Written almost entirely with idioms and phrases of speech, the sprawling five-minute tune (though it could go on forever without complaints from me) feels like eavesdropping on neighbors at the local saloon or a summer

picnic.

Prine somehow takes banal cliches like "working like a dog" and "eating like a horse" and crafts a sincere story about watching a couple dance.

"It's a big old goofy world," the narrator states in the chorus.

Maybe a song meant best as a solo listen, I would recommend safely queuing it up in the car the next time you have a long drive through the farms and fields.

"Come On Over" (1997) by Shania Twain

I was just seven years old when Shania Twain's album *Come On Over* was released, so forgive me if this one doesn't seem to fit the mold of the other four tunes, but it had an outsized influence on my very young ears.

To say that this record was a hit would be a massive understatement. For the better part of the late '90s, you could not go anywhere without hearing (and loving) a Shania Twain song.

The 1997 album spawned a mind-boggling 12 singles (it had 16 tracks) with mega-hits like "Man! I Feel Like a Woman!", "From This Moment On" and "You're Still the One".

I am not at all ashamed to say I think this album is an incredible feat of popular music, and there's a reason it was so beloved upon its release and continues to influence modern country and pop music.

My favorite song has always been the title track, which was the 10th single released from the album.

Toeing the line somewhere between an island-waltz and a polka, a lead accordion is the song's most unique characteristic. Cheerful with a positive message encouraging self-care and improvement, it would be hard to be offended by this tune. It's formulaic, but that's also what makes it shine.

The only living member of this five-song list (simply by coincidence), perhaps readers could see Ms. Twain perform this one soon.

Free Memory Screens at Washington County Senior Dining Meal Sites in June

June is Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month. The Aging and Disability Resource Center of Washington County is providing an opportunity for county residents to receive FREE memory screens at the seven Senior Dining Meal Sites in Washington County throughout the month of June. The purpose of offering memory screens is to help raise brain health awareness and to provide an opportunity to begin a discussion about planning for the future.

What is a memory screen? A memory screen is a wellness tool that helps identify possible changes in memory and cognition. Just as blood pressure, cancer, diabetes, or stroke screening contribute to prevention and better treatments, so do memory screens. Memory screens are structured but laid back and take only 10 minutes to complete.

Why should you get a memory screen? It creates a baseline of where a person is at so any future changes can be monitored. Some types of dementia are reversible with proper treatment. Dementias that are not reversible can be treated with medications that may slow the process and preserve quality of life for a longer period of time. It is also important for an early diagnosis to allow for making plans for the future.

Dementia Caregiver Support Specialist Tammy Dickman will provide memory screens as scheduled:

- Friday, June 2, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., at Scenic View Apartments in Slinger.
- Tuesday, June 6, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., at Germantown Senior Center in Germantown.

- Thursday, June 15, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Jackson Community Center in Jackson.

Black Bear Spotted Between Horicon and Mayville

The talk of two towns over the last two weekends was a visitor to the Horicon Marsh area: a young black bear.

A video circulated online which appeared to show the bear on the Gold Star Memorial Trail off Highway 28 between the cities of Horicon and Mayville; just a few hundred yards away from the Horicon Marsh Education and Visitor Center.

While previous reports of large predators have been reported and debunked in the past (there was a "cougar hoax" in Horicon in 2021), the sightings of the bear the past two weeks have been confirmed by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR).

"I received the first report of potential bear scat [on] Friday [May] 19," acknowledged Eric Kilburg, a wildlife biologist for the department. "That was found near the... Visitor Center. Sunday, I received an indirect report of a sighting near the intersection of County Road TW and Raasch Hill Road. On Monday morning, I saw the video taken along 28. This combination of evidence was enough for us to conclude we had a bear in the area. There were no reports of damage or conflict and I have not received another report since Sunday."

Kilburg said it's not uncommon for black bears to make appearances this far south and noted there was nothing unusual about this particular sighting.

"Every year, we have a few bears wander

through southern Wisconsin, seldom staying long in one area. We have had bears in the Madison and Waukesha areas within the past month," he added.

The WDNR is looking for more information on the bear as it traverses the area.

Residents are encouraged not to approach or follow the bear if encountered. Black bear attacks are highly rare, but they can result in fatalities. If you encounter a black bear, back away slowly (ideally from the direction you came), keep your eyes on the bear and do not run. In most encounters with humans, black bears are evasive, but, if one were to approach you, yelling, shouting and banging metal should frighten the animal into running away.

"If someone encounters a bear, they should give it plenty of space," confirmed Kilburg. "If a bear causes any damage to property, that can be reported to me directly."

Kilburg also said sightings and track or scat information can also be reported to the WDNR.

"If someone sees a bear or believes they found evidence of a bear, they can submit that report on our website: DNR.wi.gov. Click the search window in the upper right corner and enter 'large mammal observation'. That will bring up a link to a form they can fill out and submit," detailed Kilburg. "The information will go to our large carnivore specialist for review and distribution to other staff."

K.H.S. Athletes Receive Legislative Citations

On May 15, the Kewaskum High School girls basketball team and Braeden Scoles of the KHS wrestling team received legislative citations delivered by Rep. Ty Bodden (R-59th District). The motion to congratulate the athletes on behalf of the Wisconsin State Senate was made by Sen. Duey Stroebel (R-20th District) and Bodden.

According to the girls basketball team citation, the team, under the leadership of Head Coach Mark Maley, claimed the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Division 3 girls basketball state title at the Resch Center in Green Bay on March 11 – the first state title in the history of the KHS girls basketball program. The

team finished the season with an overall record of 24-5 and were co-champions of the East Central Conference.

Braeden Scoles of the wrestling team, under the leadership of coach Scott Rhoads, claimed the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Division 2 individual wrestling tournament state championship at the Kohl Center in Madison on February 25. He finished the season with an overall record of 52-0 and overall career record of 163-3; and became one of just 26 wrestlers in state history to win four individual titles, per the citation.

Harry Belafonte passed away at age 96 just more than one month ago, but his musical legacy will live forever (beyond any shadow of a doubt).



Wisconsin D.M.V. Rolls Out New License Plate for Fleet Operators

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) debuts a new license



plate for qualified fleet operators that is stylish, embossed with "FLEET" and does not need annual registration stickers.

To qualify for the new plate, customers with 10 or more standard or light-truck vehicles must be enrolled in DMV's eMV Fleet Registration System (wisconsin.dmv.gov/e-MVFleet). Qualifying operators will be able to renew vehicle registration for the fleet at the same time online. Along with the initial \$8.50 issuance fee, standard registration and other fees (such as wheel tax) apply. Fleet plates cannot be personalized.

This is the first time Wisconsin has offered a separate fleet-type plate. DMV has more information on this FLEET license plate on its website.

Businesses and organizations with multiple vehicles can also manage their fleet through the online eMV Fleet Registration System. This streamlines the paperwork process for license plate renewals and saves companies staff time and money. Participants of this free service can view their entire fleet on a customizable dashboard, sort and select vehicles scheduled for renewal, renew and pay online.

June 7, 2018**

The Kewaskum School District is currently looking at installing a large electronic scoreboard near the high school's football field that would display advertisements for local businesses. The problem is that the village currently has an ordinance that prohibits off-premises advertising. Businesses are not allowed to display any off-premises advertising. Although the village does not have an ordinance specifically addressing scoreboards, SEWRPC advised that it does qualify. With the village currently allowing signs of advertising to be mounted to the outfield fence at the baseball and Kiwanis Park, Trustee Dick Knoebel noted the village is violating its own ordinance. The Village Board agreed the issue should go to the plan commission in June.


The Kewaskum Legion Drum and Bugle Corps will appear in the parade at the annual picnic of the Newburg Fire Department.

Secure Boats, Trailers and Cargo to Get to Destination Safely

As the weather warms up and seasonal travel begins, more vehicles will be hauling boats, campers and trailers throughout Wisconsin.

The Wisconsin State Patrol's May Law of the Month is towing safety, reminding drivers to make sure cargo and trailers are properly stowed and attached to keep everyone safe on the roads.

"Wisconsin is the ideal setting for summer recreation but getting to your destination safely is our primary goal," Tom Carnahan, superintendent, said. "As boats and trailers come out of storage, inspect them carefully to ensure they're in good condition and ready for the season. An improperly attached trailer or unsecured cargo can quickly become a dangerous hazard on the roads."

Debris on highways and unsecured cargo cause approximately 800 crashes every year in Wisconsin. These crashes, and the injuries that result from the incidents, are preventable.

Failure to properly secure a trailer or a load of cargo can result in a \$200 citation in Wisconsin. That penalty can increase if someone is hurt.

Trailer Safety

If you're hauling a boat, camper or trailer, you're responsible to ensure it's in good mechanical condition and is safely attached to the vehicle.

Before you leave home make sure:

- Trailer tires, axles and lights are in proper working condition
- The ball and hitch coupling assembly are the same size and latch securely
- Two safety chains of proper

length and strength are attached between the vehicle and the trailer (with enough slack to allow proper turning)

• To crisscross the safety chains; it creates a cradle that can catch the tongue of the trailer should an unexpected disconnection occur

vehicle or trailer

- Cover the entire load with a sturdy tarp or netting
- Don't overload the vehicle or trailer
- Always doublecheck your load to make sure it's secure

Secure Your Cargo

Make sure that any items loaded into a trailer or truck bed are properly secured. Items such as coolers, chairs, lumber, or fishing equipment that bounce out of trailers or truck beds can damage other vehicles or result in serious crashes when drivers swerve to avoid debris.

To secure the load in your vehicle or trailer:

- Tie it down with rope, netting, or straps
- Tie large objects directly to your

ready for the boating season.

State law requires travelers to clean boats before transporting them between bodies of water to stop the spread of invasive species that can damage the ecosystems of Wisconsin waterways.

"By removing those plants and draining the water from a boat, you're ensuring that you're not spreading harmful plants and animals across the state. These species are often microscopic, so it doesn't take much to spread them to a lake that isn't infected," Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Warden Molly Detjens said.

Before traveling, the DNR requires boaters to:

- Inspect your boat, trailer and equipment
- Remove any attached aquatic plants or animals
- Drain all water from boats, motors and equipment
- Never move live fish away from a body of water
- Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash

Interested persons can read more information about boating laws and safety on the Wisconsin DNR's website.

AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL

Long Day on Green Bay

I can honestly say I would rather fish out of a canoe than a boat. I enjoy the challenge, in which physical danger and skill adds to the game and there is no worries of a trailer or boat break down.

Green Bay is probably my favorite place to paddle-troll, and I have had incredible success and some trips where I did not come close to catching a fish.

This week I headed just north of Oconto to fish walleye and sleep wherever my canoe took me.

SUNDAY, MAY 21
HIGH 74, LOW 43

I am at Oconto County Park and Campground, which is north of Oconto about seven miles.

My plan is to rig my canoe for fishing and pack it for traveling.

I take my time at the landing and talk to about a dozen fishermen who do not have good reports as they trailer their boats.

My rig is ready, and I begin paddling north towards Peshtigo and

after my Helix 7 tells me I am over seven-feet of water. I begin setting lines, which in this case, is a couple of planer boards with crawler harnesses behind them and a crankbait straight back on a spinning rod.

I am very excited for a rod to start bending and the crazy experience of catching big walleye while fighting it on my knees on the floor of my

canoe.

Long story short, after four hours, I did not have a hit nor did any fishermen that I spoke with, and I headed to a hideout campsite near Peshtigo where I was immediately hit by a wave of mosquitoes that were very hungry.

I put up my tent as fast I possibly could, sprayed the door area with bug dope, opened the door and got in as fast I could. The tent I am using is about the size of a coffin and, from inside, I could watch and listen to thousands of mosquitoes, and they all had one common goal.

MONDAY, MAY 22
HIGH 75, LOW 46

I was awake at first light and knew I had to get out of bed ("sleeping

bag on the ground") get out of my tent and break camp as fast as I possibly could. I did this and it was not a pleasant way to start the day; bug dope and lots of clothes worked.

So, I am paddling out to sea, there is a northeast wind and every report I have says it will switch to the south in mid to late morning. I say perfect, head south towards Oconto, which is maybe 10 miles away, and use the southern tailwind to push me back to my truck.

I know that I am going to catch a lot of walleyes, and I am very excited.

Two hours into my journey: not a hit and the wind is still out of the northeast. At 12:30 I had been in the canoe for six hours; I am kneeling on a cooler and I have cooler-butt and squashed knees.


I am at the Oconto landing and the wind is still out of the northeast. I paddle west along the shoreline but about a mile out as anything less than seven-feet of water is guaranteed weeds, which is guaranteed no fish and a lot of work to reset lines.

At 1:42, my spinning rod starts bending, I have been fishing for more than 11 hours counting the night before. I am in disbelief when I pull it out of the rod holder and I actually have a fish on. Believe it or not, I caught a 23-inch walleye.

I'm not a zero, I'm a hero. I rerig,







Olivia McCarty ran for Homuth and advanced to third on a ground-out and scored a few moments later on a wild pitch to give the Cougars a 9-8 lead.

McCarty, who came in to relief pitch in the fifth inning for starter Peyton Hall, worked around a leadoff error to get the final three outs and secure the win.

Hall pitched 4.2 innings allowing eight hits, five earned runs, no walks and struck out four.

McCarty pitched 2.1 innings, allowing one hit, three runs (zero earned), no walks and struck out three.

Campbellsport Wins Regional Title

Last Thursday, May 25, the Cougar softball team played the Flyway Co-Champions, number one seed and fourth state-ranked Winnebago Lutheran Academy (WLA) Vikings in a Regional Championship game.

In conference play, WLA beat Campbellsport, 7-1, and, 3-2.

On this night, the Cougars rallied in the top of the seventh to score two runs and held on to beat WLA, 4-3, to win their first Regional title since 2021.

WLA scored first in the second inning when Abby Cole singled and Anna Trewin walked with

The seventh inning was a long, crazy inning. Alyssa Koelbl led off and smoked a ball to third baseman Averie Suprenand. Suprenand made a great play on the ball and fired to first, however, the first baseman dropped the ball. This brought up Sippel who proceeded to lay down a sac bunt. Some miscommunication by the WLA defense allowed Sippel to reach. However, the bunt appeared to hit Sippel in the batter's box. Hall, a freshman, pitched all seven innings, allowing seven hits and the three earned runs to get the win.
