## Finding Inspiration from Home, Boehlke Sisters Host Travel Show

*After years apart chasing different careers, Andrea and Sabrina Boehlke chart path together in Wisconsin*

Sisters Andrea and Sabrina Boehlke – who hosted a pilot episode of a travel show on The Design Network (which was released earlier this year) – don't want their globetrotting adventure at a lavish destination to confuse anyone.

They are still Wisconsin farm girls at heart.

"There were no boys, it was just us sisters," said the younger Sabrina of the Boehlke household, noting that gender did not matter on the farm when chores needed to be done.

Sabrina is a 2012 graduate of Kewaskum High School (KHS), and the last 10 years she's served

as a substitute teacher at the Kewaskum School District, started her own video/photography company all the while coaching athletics at the high school and collegiate levels.

"It was dirty work," added Sabrina's older sister, Andrea, about growing up on a farm, as the two discussed their careers at the village coffee house in Kewaskum. "Getting up early, no play time with friends, driving tractors..."

"Stacking haymows," added Sabrina.

"Shoveling manure!" chimed in Andrea.

The eldest Boehlke, Andrea is recognized nationally for competing three times on the reality television competition *Survivor*. She is one among just 10 others in the show's 23-year history to "survive" for 100 or more days (accumulated across multiple seasons). All-time, Andrea is 11th in the contest's history for "total days" on the island (spoiler alert: she finished as high as fifth, which she accomplished on her first go at it in 2011 on *Survivor: Redemption Island*).

Raised outside Random Lake (Andrea graduated from Random Lake High School in 2007 and attended UW-Stevens Point for acting), the sisters' upbringing in rural Wisconsin was a big reason for their toughness and success in competition: Sabrina, in addition to coaching lacrosse, played at the collegiate level for Con-


## Finding Gratitude in the Present and History of Thanksgiving

## Top 5: Songs About Thanks

The Thanksgiving holiday is among us, and tradition calls for our expressions of gratitude.

Rather than bore you with what I'm thankful for this year (my family, my friends, this newspaper and the communities it covers), I thought I'd bring back a "Top 5" list with this one recognizing some songs (generally speaking) about gratefulness and appreciation.

Reminder: Since it's been a bit since my last Top 5, I hope readers will recall that these lists are in no way meant to signify the "objectively greatest tunes" in any particular category. These placements are all just my opinion, and one I share for the explicit purpose of having fun.

In no particular order:  
**"You Didn't Have to Be So Nice" by The Lovin' Spoonful**

Coincidentally, this song was released less than two weeks before Thanksgiving in 1965.

Originally a non-album single, it was included on the "The Spoonful's" 1966 album *Daydream*. It was a hit for the uber-successful American pop/folk quartet, peaking at 10 on the *U.S. Billboard* Hot 100.

Starting with one of my favorite lines in popular music, the prose is a first-person reflection by the narrator on a, seemingly, chance meeting with the song's subject.

"You didn't have to be so nice. I would have liked you, anyway," opens this jangly little ditty that sounds like it's from the '60s.

Bordering on romance, reverence, and appreciation, according to one of the band members it was written for an Israeli-born photographer and actress, Nurit Wilde. Included in her portfolio of work are photographs of the Monkees; another darling group of the '60s pop/folk revival.

On surface level, in spirit and through its sonic elements, the song is an homage to young love and love-at-first site. Its simple rhymes, vocal rounds and lyrics celebrating the innocence of love have allowed it to stand the test of time (along with most of The Lovin' Spoonful's other hits).

Ultimately, it's a song about thanking someone for doing the bare minimum: being nice.

**"1952 Vincent Black Lightning" by Richard Thompson**

Better known for his work in the 1970s, particularly as part of a duo with his then-wife Linda Thompson, Richard Thompson's "1952 Vincent Black Lightning" was released in 1991 on his solo album *Rumor and Sigh*.

The song tells the story of Red Molly and James, two twentysomethings in England who bond over a mutual appreciation of a motorcycle: a 1952 Vincent Black Lightning. Their first date is a ride on the bike to "Box Hill."

But before you think this one ends happily ever after, it's quite the opposite.

James does warn the listener and Molly, though, in the second verse.

*"I'll tell you in earnest,  
I'm a dangerous man."*

James is a robber at the age of 21, and if anything were to happen to him, he tells

Molly, "I'll give you my Vincent to ride." Enter this story's third character, Sargeant McQuade, who calls to Molly's apartment from the street.

A robbery-gone-wrong resulted in James getting shot.

"Come down, Red Molly, to his dying bedside," pleads McQuade (which, I always thought was a pretty generous thing to do, all things considered).

Molly arrives at the hospital and there "isn't much left." He smiles when she bursts through the hospital-room door.

James, with a few of his last words, utters another one of my favorite lines in all popular music:

*"In my opinion, there's nothing in this world [that] beats a '52 Vincent and red-headed girl."*

There are other motorbikes, continues James, "but they don't have a soul like a Vincent '52."

As "angels and ariels in leather and chrome" come during James' final moments, he completes his promise to Molly with his last action.

"He reached for her hand, and he slipped her the keys," sings Thompson, later concluding the story: "And he gave her one last kiss and died. And he gave her his Vincent to ride."

**"End of the Line" by Traveling Wilburys**

The Traveling Wilburys were a "super-group" formed in the late 1980s consisting of the Beatles' George Harrison, Electric Light Orchestra's (ELO) Jeff Lynne, Roy Orbison, Bob Dylan and Tom Petty.

They released just two records (titled "Vol. 1" and "Vol. 3" because Harrison thought it would be funny to skip "Vol. 2" and perplex fans and critics).

"Let's confuse the buggers," Lynne recalled Harrison saying, according to a *USA Today* feature.

Closing out *Traveling Wilburys Vol. 1* (1988) is "End of the Line".

The song is a joyous celebration of life, even its troubles and ultimate conclusion. The phrase "it's all right" is said 20 times (and 23 times if you included background vocal responses).

The superstars of rock music all trade roles in the song. The tune is unique, in that the chorus does not have entirely fixed language and is placed in the song where the verses conventionally go. Each chorus opens with, "Well, it's all right," and each verse ends with "at the end of the line."

Harrison sings the first chorus (which is the opening stanza of the song), Lynne sings the second and Orbison the third. Petty sings all the verses. Dylan is the principal backup vocalist.

The song celebrates "doing the best you can" and having "someone to love."

The most overt expressions of gratitude come in the final verse.

*"I'm just glad to be here, happy to be alive. It don't matter if you're by my side (at the end of the line); I'm satisfied."*

**"What a Wonderful World" by Louie Armstrong (written by Bob Thiele and Geroge David Weiss)**

To exclude this song on a list about gratitude in popular music would have been a mistake.

Released as a single in 1967, it wasn't initially a hit in the U.S., in part, because a single record executive at ABC Records refused to promote it.

# D.N.R. Seeking Public Comment for Environmental Review of Village of Kewaskum Safe Drinking Water Loan Program Project

**WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES**

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced the village of Kewaskum is an applicant for funding through the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program (SDWLP) to improve its public drinking water system.

The project includes the replacement of water mains along U.S. Highway 45 in the village of Kewaskum.

Activities related to this project are minor actions under Chapter NR 150, Wis. Admin. Code, for which no environmental analysis is required; however, following the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program federal requirement 40 C.F.R. §35.3580, an environmental review must be conducted before funding this project.

The Safe Drinking Water Loan Program has determined that the project will not result in significant adverse environmental effects, and no further environmental review or analysis

is needed before proceeding with funding the project.

The public is encouraged to submit comments regarding this decision and the potential environmental impacts of this project. Submit comments by Nov. 27, 2023 to:

## Snowmobile Safety Course Offered

The Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs will sponsor a Wisconsin Snowmobile Safety Course. The course be held Saturdays, Dec. 2 and 9.

The courses will be held from 8 a.m. until noon at the Kewaskum Municipal Annex Building on Fond du Lac Avenue.

Classes will cover snowmobile safety features, pre-ride inspections, snowmobile rider responsibilities and outdoor emergencies.

Snowmobile operators can be certified at age 12 or older. All people interested in snowmobile riding are encouraged to attend. There is no maximum age, and parents are encouraged to enroll and participate.

A parent or guardian must be present to sign the application, or the student cannot participate. The cost of the course is \$10 and covers all necessary materials.

If your birthday is after Jan. 1, 1985, you must have certification from a safety course in order to ride on public trails. Failure to do so will result in a citation by the DNR.

All students must also obtain a Wisconsin DNR Customer ID number as part of the criteria to graduate from any recreational safety class. That number may be obtained by calling the DNR from 7 a.m. until 10 p.m. at 1-888-936-7463, or they can visit a DNR service center. Locations for DNR service centers can be found. 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# Saved by a Sub

It was in the middle of 1943 and Bob Kohler, an established missionary, didn't want to leave the mountains of Bukidnon Province. That's how his daughter Lou Anne Daniels of South Eden remembers it. She would know, she was there when she had to flee the Japanese Military by directive of General Douglas MacArthur. This is how she got home.

## To the Rendezvous

After spending approximately a year or a year and a half hidden in the mountains, and living in two different houses – one of which burnt, dad started to consider leaving, especially when Gen. MacArthur demanded it. Dad, Lou Anne said, "wasn't happy about it." But they packed up whatever they had.

Once they committed (or were forced) to leave it took them a couple of weeks to hike down from the mountains to get to the Pacific coast safely. "I remember walking it, and my dad had to carry my sister a lot of the times. She was two, and a heavy little girl." Then the guide would get lost, and they were walking at night with a torch – a concern given there was a price on their heads.

The Kohler family and Louise, a nurse helping Lou Anne's parents, were not going to be picked up immediately by the U.S. Military. First, they were going to meet locals who were going to take a boat out to the ocean where the Navy would pick up the escapees with a U.S. submarine. But before they could be transferred to the sub, they needed to meet up with a rendezvous who would know where to take them to meet at a house before boarding the sub. This meet-up, from which they were fleeing the mountains to get to, is what Lou Anne calls the "rendezvous." At least this was the plan if the Japanese wouldn't intercept it and kill them.

Feeling safe didn't seem to be part of the equation. "Well, there wasn't a whole lot else you were gonna do, was there?" She said the local Filipinos wouldn't have done much, and the guides helping her were probably ones associated with the guerrilla movement to keep the Japanese out of the Philippines. But the process to getting to the ocean coast required that they not use the main trails in an expedition that took two or three weeks to connect with the rendezvous. Then they missed the rendezvous. "The first one we missed, and then we were up and down the coast," on the northern end of the island of Mindanao.

Where exactly she was picked up for the transfer is hard to say, but it was along the coast. From the mountains in Bukidnon Province, they headed north and west towards the coast. However, because of the trails and heading down the mountains, it was hard to recall the directions it felt like at age five. "But I remember hiking down to the coast." As they got closer to the intended rendezvous, they reached a coconut grove. "And the guide gets lost. And my dad is tired. It's nighttime. And he's carrying Joyce, and you're listening to these coconuts falling off the trees. He was not happy." Those on the mission were on edge. There were no coconuts where they were living in the mountains. Now they would hear a plane and a coconut would drop.

She concluded the second rendezvous attempt was "probably a little further west from Cagayan that we were picked up." A boat picked them up on the coast and took them to a pit stop before they attempted to load on the U.S.S. Narwhal (S.S. 167) submarine.

## Loading the Sub

The transfer to the submarine required a secret meeting at a house, to which they would load a fishing vessel. So, after the second rendezvous worked, "We got to where we were going. It was like two or three o'clock in the morning." It was pitch black on the coast off the Island of Mindanao. There was a house high off the ground. "I remember getting to this house in the middle of the night, or early in the morning on the coast. And the people had us come in. And they served

us eggs. I hadn't had eggs in eons. Cooked eggs. It was sooooo good. I don't know what we'd been eating? Not much. We hadn't had eggs in a long, long time. Eggs were scarce. I don't know how they cooked 'em. But it was good." So that was their breakfast, and they laid down to sleep. It was in the early morning hours, and everybody was quiet.

There were others who came down from the mountain, including the obnoxious man known as Dutch DeVreis. "They didn't travel with us. I don't think my dad wanted that at all, and so we didn't travel together. But they were also being evacuated. And I don't remember where some of the others came from. But there were others being evacuated as well."

"Then we got the word. 'The submarine is here!' So, nobody – NOBODY – was talking above a whisper." She was impressed by the locals' silence as they got ready for the boat ride out to the sub. "So, there were a couple of boats. Probably more like the canoe outriggers at the beach."

"They were loading woman and children first." She remembers Dutch DeVreis wanted to go first, as Lou Anne guessed he was worried about being held back last. "My dad's like, 'Whatever, go ahead and go.' So, they musta gone out before us." So Dutch DeVreis went before some of the children. "But the funny thing on that was most of his luggage that they brought to go with him was left behind because he was in such a rush. And most of ours just went with us."

So, the Kohlers and Louise were out there on the little boat with Filipinos oaring it. By the end of the ride, it was the first time Lou Anne had ever saw a white person other than her family. She had been raised around Filipinos in her first years of memories. "I had not seen white people. Let alone guys that are in the Navy that have got beards and are heavy and are in a big fat hurry to get us on that submarine and outta there." So, they took the Kohlers and Louise off the little canoes and shoved them into the submarine.

Later when they got on the sub, dad told the captain, "It was so good to hear your engines." The captain responded: "You didn't. You did not hear our engines. We were running on battery." The engine heard was that of the Japanese. "Between you and us," the captain said. As the Kohlers were traveling off the shore, the Japanese were located between the Kohlers and the U.S.S. Narwhal.

This all happened at least half a mile to maybe a mile off the coast. So somewhere on the boat ride from the coast house to the sub, a Japanese patrol boat was going through. "And that's the motor my dad heard." The sub had the guns on the Japanese, but they couldn't shoot because the Kohlers were on the other side. "They were scared to death – is what they were – on the sub. They [Japanese] missed us. They didn't see anything. So, the Lord put a protection there too."

## Life on the Sub

Lou Anne wasn't scared on the boat ride to the sub. This changed when she got on it. The boat ride out was "just like another trip." What did

she know? She was five going on six. "But I did cry getting on the submarine. Because these guys were just grabbing us and dumping us down the chute pretty much. 'Down the ladder you go.'" Shoving is an appropriate word. "They could not be fooling around. 'You'll have to deal with this later,'" she said as if the shipmen were thinking it.

There were quite a few who were escaping the Philippines besides the Kohlers. Because she remembers being cot-to-cot when they stayed in the "aft-torpedo room." They divided the men from the women on the sub.

She provided context for her point of view on the submarine, "Now where had we been? We were out in the open, running around. No shoes. Hardly much of anything." Bukidnon Province was a place one could "come and go the way we wanted to, eating whatever came along that was edible." They had some vegetables up in the mountains, including some squash. Then there was whatever you could barter from the Filipinos who had a place to grow a garden. She had memories of mom planting sweat peas out in the open. Contrast those natural foods to the unique eating experience on the sub. "Then they had sandwiches. White bread and sandwiches and ice cream. And my sister and I were like, 'That's awful.' My dad says, 'Gimme! Gimme! Gimme!' I didn't know what ice cream was. I didn't know what white bread was. And sandwich? Whoever had a sandwich? We never had any!" Dad, on the other hand, was up for the menu change? "Oh yea he was. He used to dream about strawberry ice cream."

Lou Anne compared the open air of Bukidnon Province to the U.S.S. Narwhal, "we got on that submarine, and now you're in this clamped up/cooped up space. All this metal. And lights. The lights were on continuously. You never had dark." She remembered blinking red lights too, and added bluntly, "Hated that sub." The lighting was hard to get used to. "It's bright light all the time because they had to leave the lights on. You know, their working in there. This is the aft torpedo room. There was a guy sitting back there all the time with torpedoes. And they were lined up along the wall. Now, this is where we were

all sleeping.” Or at least supposed to be sleeping, Lou Anne said. The problem is there was not much to do.

When mom went to the bathroom, she called it “the head,” which is the bathroom in the navy. Lou Anne’s childhood viewpoint couldn’t understand a vessel under water, “You go in the head, I was always scared if we flushed that thing, we were gonna sink the submarine. Or flood the submarine.”

The spacing was cramped. When they went to eat, “You’re walking down this ally way. Very tight. And tight even for me as a six-year-old. You know. It’s big enough for men to go through there because they did it all the time.” Thirty years later she saw a submarine at the museum of science and industry in Chicago. “My husband could not. COULD NOT! Get me to go on that sub. And, I mean, we’re married. Its 30 years later. I could not go on that sub.”

**To Australia**

From the sub, they worked their way to Australia. “They dove as soon as we were loaded and outta there.” You could feel the dive, but she remembered it as manageable. They weren’t safe of course because this was 1943 and the Pacific is a war zone. “The submarine shot a Japanese destroyer before we got to Australia. The crew even showed a picture to my dad, of that destroyer that they shot down.”

She remembers the altercation. “We heard that explosion. We could hear them. There was an awful lot of scurries on the submarine. Everybody’s getting into position.” And here the torpedoes were going out after the destroyer. The beds of the evacuees had to be next to the torpedoes. When it came to mom and dad, “They probably were praying like crazy that we didn’t get shot up. But we didn’t, and as soon as that was over, they were down and gone.”

So, after the Japanese destroyer, the sub dove and they stayed down until they got to Australia. They landed in Darwin, which is on the top of Australia. She didn’t think she was even there a day. They got on a military transport plane. It had no seats, and all that she remembers is a stop in the desert of Australia for lunch because the plane had to refuel. “And there was a little shack there. In the middle of nowhere. And this is desert. We hadn’t seen desert.” She laughed. “We were from the mountains. And it was weird. It was hot.” They were out of the transport plane long enough to eat.

When the trip was over, they were in Brisbane where the Red Cross was situated. Mrs. MacArthur was stationed there, but Lou Anne never saw the general’s wife. They received little bags of toothbrushes and other items they hadn’t had for years.

The Kohlers then lived in a house. It probably was just an ordinary house, but because Lou Anne had lived in a gully in Bukidnon Province, the house in Brisbane was a palace. It was way bigger than her farmhouse in South Eden today. And they had ceramic tiled floors. “That house was probably no fancier than a house in the area. Who knows? But my recollection that it was tiled floors. Beautiful. Shiny. Tile floors. This is a six-year-old seeing this.” This was all put up by the Red Cross, and they lived there three months.

There was also the problem that the family didn’t really know what was going on. “The thing is there’s so much secrecy. Nobody told you a lot what was going on. You just did what you were told. You know, ‘Don’t ask so many questions.’”

She recalls going to school in Brisbane, and later on her grandma threw out her Australian first grade primer. “I wished I had that. I had saved it, along with some of my other school stuff.” Because there was schooling, it makes her wonder if they arrived in Brisbane around September. “I have no idea when it started or what the school was.” So, it was late summer or the fall of 1943 (by American standards). They went to the beautiful beach but couldn’t swim there because there was a lot of sharks. There were also dunes there. Dad wasn’t doing anything there because they were waiting to get back to the U.S.”

The relatives knew very little about the family’s status back home. Lou Anne explained, “You’re talking about not much communication back then either. There’s no communication. My grandparents didn’t know whether we were dead or alive for two or three years.” Correspondence out of the Philippines was dangerous. “You couldn’t do that. Your letter could get intercepted. Then what? And telegrams were fantastically expensive. And how were you going to get a telegram out anyway? And they didn’t want knowledge of that [they were there]. When we did come home in ’43, my dad and mom would be out speaking at different churches, they were NOT allowed to say one single thing about where we were, how we got out, or when. NOTHING. Until after the war.... And they abode by that.” **PHOTO COURTESY: LOU ANNE DANIELS**

**To San Francisco**

Eventually, “We went home to the states to San Francisco on a troop ship.”

The troop ship back was its own experience, as the soldiers she saw were noticeably off balanced. Lou Anne remembers going on the deck of the ship from her quarters. She didn’t leave often, but “You’d see these guys in straitjackets, being exercised on the deck.” The trauma was evident in their demeanor and obvious even for a child.

She is open to the possibility that she, being a child, was somewhat managed because of the men on the ship. “They didn’t want us running around loose. You had to have your life jacket on at all times if you were out of your room. And I don’t have any recollection as to what our rooms were like. I remember being out on deck. I don’t remember what we ate. I don’t remember the journey. I remember seeing these men [in straitjackets] feeling very sorry for them. It was just really sad to see.” She had never seen that before. “But I knew what it was. I assume I was told what it was. But...I remember seeing them. It was just sad.” She described that ride as one dominated by “an air of sadness...I don’t know if it was just the whole war. The whole weariness of it all, or what the deal was.”

She can’t fully explain why the ship ride was so different. Because, ironically, they were all heading back to the United States. “There was just a general quiet weariness on the ship. It wasn’t a cruise, let me say that. NO cruise ship. And we lost one guy three days out of San Francisco. He jumped overboard, and they circled around and tried to find him. They couldn’t find him.” Then the boat circled for the potential suicide, and “Nobody was saying a lot about it, but we circled to try and find him. But we never did.”

She thinks the ride from Brisbane to San Francisco felt like a couple of weeks because the trip was long and the boats felt slow. “My dad said, ‘That was the most beautiful site I have ever seen when we came in and went under the Golden Gate Bridge coming into San Francisco.’” The landmark was just completed in 1937. “But it didn’t register to me because it wasn’t something I had seen before.”

The Kohlers made it to America. She thinks they probably got back to Rochester, N.Y. by train. She was certain it was not a car, and they lived with her grandparents.

**So, what is the meaning of the story?**

“For me as a believer, I see God’s hand of protection in a half a dozen very obvious times.” And she gave an example of when she was in the mountains of Bukidnon, “For one thing. And don’t tell me they’re coincidences. Why didn’t that guy say? ‘They are right over there in that house!’? Why did he say, ‘They went over the mountains.’? He knew we were right there!” That Filipino’s lie which saved the Kohler’s was a blessing.

Second, the Japanese should have killed the Kohlers as they transferred to the submarine. “Okay. How did they NOT see us or the sub? Cause the sub was above water.” She still can’t believe the Japanese didn’t see the submarine nor the boat the Kohlers were on.

Third, dad’s shot foot was a blessing. “My dad gets shot in the foot. It’s the only time when he ever got shot. And he did it himself.” And he wasn’t a clutz in general, she said. “He was either unloading the gun or something, and he had it down like that [towards his foot].” And if he wouldn’t have done that, he probably would have been in Talakag and would have been shot up that Christmas. “So, there was a lot of ways the Lord protected us in the whole thing. And it’s a part of life. Why do you end up where you are? Why do we live here? Because that’s where my husband got a job.” Life is all a rhythm of connections and blessings if we choose to see them. Her story between the Philippines and South Eden makes one reflect on their own happenstances.

However, most important is a reverence for her parents’ faith, the protection provided by the U.S. Military, and the freedom in democracy that the Philippines believed in. Years later, she toured Corregidor. She was there only once, around 2005. It was a fascinating island with rock outcroppings that had changed hands with many world powers. This was all at the mouth of Manila Bay, and one could see the Japanese hand of World War II. At the end of the tour, they played the national anthem of the Philippines and she cried. Maybe it was because the Philippines, courtesy of the United States, got their land back. Perhaps the tears came because the World War II experience was a lot to process. Then again, it could have been the fact that her mom and dad returned to the Philippines after World War II and continued their work in the missions. Therefore, Lou Anne Daniels story isn’t just one of freedom, but also one of enduring faith. Maybe the tears were those of thanksgiving.

### 5 Years Ago

**November 22, 2018**

It will be a bit of a blast from the past this winter when an outdoor ice-skating rink opens for all to enjoy. It will be located at Campbellsport's Firemen's Park on the baseball diamond. The new ice-skating rink is being funded partially by a Local Spark Award. WEA Trust awarded the Village of Campbellsport a \$3,000 grant for the outdoor ice skating rink to provide the community with a safe and entertaining recreational winter activity for all ages. The Village wants to host planned social events with no entrance fees. The project's mission is to enhance health, connections, encourage unity by providing the community this outdoor space.

How do you cook a Thanksgiving turkey? The first graders at St. Matthew Catholic School in Campbellsport told us how their families cook their turkeys. This class does the writing assignment each year and shares the results with readers of the Campbellsport News. They are always interesting to read.

Campbellsport Middle School received an overall score of 71.0 with three stars, meets expectations. Campbellsport High School received an overall score of 65.9 with three stars, meets expectations.



cordia University Wisconsin.

"It was a great way to grow up," said Andrea about ag-life. "With any challenge I can say, 'I've done harder things.' Even on *Survivor*. I was raised to be so tough."

She discussed her youth working in a hay-loft and used it as a metaphor for facing life's challenges.

"When you've been working for hours, and you're sweaty and tired, but you can't give up because you have all your cousins and family relying on you to get the bales off the elevator... the bales are always going to come up, and you can't let them hit you in the face."

After *Survivor*, Andrea started a career as an on-screen television and online personality. She lived in New York City and worked for *People* as a host and interviewer. Over the years, she talked to countless A-list celebrities from the likes of Brad Pitt, Robert DeNiro and Jennifer Lopez. It was a fast-paced career and an exciting one, but it kept her from seeing her family on a regular basis, she said.

Sabrina joked that she hadn't seen Andrea in 10 years, though both admitted – outside of holidays and brief trips – they spent most of their adult lives away from one another.

In 2020, Andrea moved back to Wisconsin to be closer to family while working remotely through the pandemic.

Sabrina – who co-founded the Edgewood College women's lacrosse program and coached the team to a playoff appearance in its second-ever season – was also back at home with athletics at Edgewood on pause.

"We kind of realized we were the same person," said Sabrina of the time spent together, who noted they are roughly five years apart in age.

With plenty of free time, the sisters got to work on combining their passions and created Boehlke Media. They shoot video and photography for weddings, events and create family portraits, but have also created content for companies in the brewing and real estate industries (among others).

While Andrea has expertise in front of the camera, Sabrina provided the behind-the-lens know-how.

"I was really inspired by a videography class I took my freshman year of high school," added Sabrina about one of her first educational experiences at KHS. "It was really cool to be creative through videography."

When Andrea was cast on *Survivor*, Sabrina was tasked with putting together a video of old photos and videos of Andrea. As a teenager, she recalled this experience being formative in stoking a passion for media and videography.

"I'm following Andrea with a hand-cam, zoom-

ing in on her riding a horse, and I'm editing it to music that's not licensed, and it was so fun," she added. "That was super-exciting for a 15-year-old. Back then, I knew I wanted to keep making video content, and I'm still filming."

While they have a different approach to the medium, Sabrina said she and Andrea work well together because their core mission is the same.

"We're both storytellers, we've learned, and love finding fun ways to do it," said Sabrina.

Both the Boehlkes said a fascination with cameras and performance is likely a credit to their father.

"Dad was filming us all the time with a giant, old VHS recorder, and he would take it everywhere," said Sabrina.

"Basketball games, 4H Club, horse shows..." said Andrea, rattling off the locales she remembers seeing her father in-toe with his recorder.

Andrea added that their dad, Royal, also has done stand-up comedy performances for years.

"His main job is a farmer and a stand-up comedian," she said with earnestness, noting that her comfort in live interviews with celebrities may stem from this familial upbringing. "He is so funny... just how gregarious he is. He's always trying to make a conversation more interesting, and I think I get that from my dad."

Their mother, Linda, was a longtime art teacher at Campbellsport High School, and both Andrea and Sabrina said her creativity has been vital to their professions, as well. Both were eager to mention that Linda played in a band in her youth called Sweet Inspiration.

"Shout out!" the pair said in unison (which was not the first nor last time the sisters used this specific two-word phrase in tandem through the interview).

Ever since 2020, Andrea and Sabrina have been hard at work on their media company, while Andrea continues on-camera work for Discover Wisconsin and on WTMJ Channel 4's *The Morning Blend*.

Her role with the Milwaukee-based morning show ranges from reporter to correspondent to spot host. With Discover Wisconsin, she travels the state looking for feature stories from as far away as the Northwoods to as close as Washington County.


"We actually just did a show in West Bend!" exclaimed Andrea, who lamented that they couldn't come to Kewaskum, as well.

With their energy, ambition and connections, the sisters recently pitched and were awarded a pilot episode for a Design Network show called *Epic Destinations*. Currently, there is just one episode completed, which features Andrea and Sabrina on a Cabo adventure.

In addition to following the pair on their sight-seeing exploits in Mexico, the show offers for viewers an inside look at some of the world's most extravagant hotels and accommodations.

Andrea and Sabrina said the trip was incredible, but they did worry folks might think this was a regular occurrence for them.

"We want to be relatable," said Sabrina, who said she was comfortable playing the "fish-out-of-water" on camera alongside her more seasoned T.V.-host sister. "The Design Network is about being high-end and polished, and I am not. It was a good balance because Andrea has all this experience, and she says all the right words, and I'm in the background saying things like, 'Oh, wow!

That's cool!"

As for the hotel they stayed in, they wanted to assure readers this was an opportunity graciously set-up by the network. Neither was exactly sure what the cost-per-night was for the villa they stayed at, but it was somewhere between \$5,000 and \$15,000.

"It was so big that we would lose each other," said Sabrina. "I was shouting, 'Where are you!'"

They are waiting word on if the show will be picked up, but there's plenty to keep the Boehlkes busy in the meantime.

Andrea has gotten more familiar with the Milwaukee media market and has been loving her roles with Discover Wisconsin and TMJ4. The opportunities have allowed her to experience more in her home state and current city (she lives in Milwaukee's East Side neighborhood), which has inspired her to commit to the Badger State fulltime.

"I've been hustling in New York for a decade," said Andrea. "I've been so career-focused my entire life, and now it's cool to be able to show my family what I do, working locally. I feel like I'm bringing awareness to fun things going on in the community, and I have more personal connection with the people I'm interviewing or highlighting, and that's been really wonderful."

She added that something about being home just makes everything a little sweeter.

"Nothing against New York. It's great and exciting, but it just wasn't as fulfilling," said Andrea.

Sabrina agreed about a renewing love for her hometown(s).

"We're just so connected to all these communities; Random Lake, Campbellsport and Kewaskum," she said.

A lot of Sabrina's current work with Boehlke Media has her traversing familiar territory.

"I feel like I'm running this town for a second time!" she joked. "I love the area. People are so friendly, and I have so many great memories and feel connected and bonded to being from a small town."

The sisters have been compiling their choice spots throughout the Kettle Moraine in recent years, and both seem immensely happy to be here.

"We like our certain spots, and I find new spots all the time," said Sabrina, listing establishments from Dundee to the Town of Wayne.

Now entrenched in the "Miami of the Midwest" (which is what Sabrina called Milwaukee), the three-time *Survivor* Andrea is soaking it all in and cherishing being so close to her friends and family.

"I appreciate Milwaukee so much, because it scratches the itch of the city, but it's not so big, and I can visit my parents easily," said Andrea, saying it reminds her of the best of where she grew up. "Friendly faces everywhere."

Ultimately, Andrea found an answer to that age-old question: Who says you can't go home?


No one.

The DPI generates a "School Report Card" and "District Report Card" for every publicly funded school and district in the state. The report cards are intended to help schools and districts utilize performance data to target their improvement efforts so that students are ready for their next educational step.

"We are excited to see the continuing success of our students in the Kewaskum School District. We are grateful for all the hard work and effort from our students, teachers, parents, and community to be able to provide the best education possible for the children in our district," said the Director of Student Learning and Services Jody Heipp.

The report cards have four priority areas including student achievement and student growth in English, language arts and mathemat-

ics. These reports also score districts and schools in how well they are closing achievement gaps in specific student groups and the postsecondary readiness predictors of how many students are on-track to graduate.

As a district, the Kewaskum School District performed above the state average in the areas of "Student Achievement" and "On-Track" as well as "Postsecondary Readiness."

The priority area scores are aggregated into an overall accountability score, from 0 to 100. This score is displayed in the top left corner of the School or District Report Cards. Based on its score, a school or district receives one of five rating categories, from "Significantly Exceeds Expectations" to "Fails to Meet Expectations" (as well as corresponding one to five stars).

The song appeared in the film *Good Morning, Vietnam* (1988), which resulted in a boost in popularity (reaching 32 on the *U.S. Billboard* Hot 100 that year).

Now arguably one of the most recognizable songs in the history of English-language music, the lyrics are just a simple poem written from the perspective of the narrator, who is enamored with everything around him.

"The colors of the rainbow, so pretty in the sky," sings Armstrong in his baritone.

He also wonders at other subjects in nature like trees and roses and the clouds above him.

Of course, there's an affectionate reflection on people, as well.

*"I see friends shaking hands, saying, 'How do you do?' They're really saying, 'I love you.'"*

If I'm brief in explaining this song, it's because, should I really have to?

There are few songs I am more grateful for than this one, which is a nice coincidence considering what it's about.

**"When the River Meets the Sea" by John Denver & The Muppets (written by Paul Williams)**

Yes, I am finishing this list with a song sung, in part, by puppets.

Well, Muppets, to be precise. The tune was written by composer Paul Williams ("Rainbow Connection", "An Old Fashioned Love Song" and "We've Only Just Begun" among his most recognizable) specifically for Jim Henson's 1977 television special *Emmet*

*Otter's Jug-Band Christmas.*

It was rerecorded in 1979 by John Denver and the Muppets for the group's album *A Christmas Together* (on that version, Denver sings with Robin the Frog – voiced by Jerry Nelson, who also voiced Emmett Otter).

Although curated as a holiday and Christmas tune, its lyrics and composition allow it to stand out in all seasons.

Relying on imagery that illustrates the cycles of nature, the prose is a reminder that, sometimes, life's biggest mysteries are what we should be most thankful for.

*"Though our minds be filled with questions, in our hearts we'll understand, when the river meets the sea."*

A bridge before the final verse encourages patience from the listener. What we don't know now, the song states, may be revealed to us with time.

"In that sweet and final hour, truth and justice will be done," sings Denver and the Muppets.

The final verse, after that soaring vocal interlude, hammers home the theme of beauty in life's secrets, and an optimism that, if we simply allow the natural course of things, peace and comfort await everyone in the end.

"Like a baby when it is sleeping in its loving mother's arm; what a newborn baby dreams is a mystery," sings Robin the Frog before Denver takes over for the final stanza. "But his life will find a purpose, and in time he'll understand, when the river meets the sea."



# AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL

## Running Hard

When I returned home from my elk hunt, I realized – with my busy season, which begins around April 1, and my recent nine-day adventure of hunting hard in the mountains of Montana – I was beat, tired and worn out.

The other situation was that every aspect of my life was behind; what I am getting at, is that I needed to sleep at home a few nights and this week's column gives you an idea of what that was like.

As usual, there is a ton to write, so I will be brief.

**THURSDAY, NOV. 2**

I hosted a campfire event at my home for NOAC (Necedah Outdoor Adventure Club), which is an outdoor club dedicated to getting people of all ages outside. I am the president.

We started this club in January, and it is impressive.

Next on our docket is an ice-skating rink at Old Mill Park in Necedah.

**SATURDAY, NOV. 4**

There were 19 of us ("The Red Brush Gang") participating in a work weekend at our hunting camp

in northern Juneau County. This weekend is a lot of work and even more fun. The old timers in the group had a rule with our kids and that was that you can come to camp work weekend when you are not in diapers anymore.

These days the "kids" range from 19 to 36 and they are becoming the pillars of The Red Brush Gang.

When the sun comes up on opening day of Wisconsin's deer gun season, it will be the 52nd year in a row that I hunted here. No single event is more important to me than deer camp and that is why I do my best to ensure that it has a strong heartbeat.

**WEDNESDAY, NOV. 8**

I took the pups duck hunting on the Meadow Valley Flowage, which is located in the Meadow Valley Wildlife Area.

Much of my history has taken place here, from deer, duck and bear hunting, trapping wolf, cross country skiing and survival trips. Simply put, I am at peace when I am on the Meadow Valley Flowage.

That evening, I attended a meeting for the Meadow Valley Chapter of KAMO (Kids and Mentors Outdoors). This chapter, like the oth-

er five, has come to life since covid kind of ended, and they have a lot to be proud of.

The following morning, I was in my truck and headed to Durand for a 36-hour trip of bowhunting, and (once again) working out of my canoe.

I did not see a deer while hanging out in a tree but did have a very cool experience when I rounded a bend and was immersed with a doe and her two very large fawns that were swimming from one shore to another.

When I arrived home from that adventure, I had just enough daylight to hunt in the food plot behind my house. I built this plot for my daughter Selina and my late girlfriend, Michelle Chiaro. Michelle passed away on June 15, 2022, and I have not been capable of going back to the plot as it

just chokes me up.

I forced myself today and had a memorable experience with a doe that was being chased by an eight-pointer that was being followed by a spiker. All three were exhausted, drooling and wheezing. I was just getting into Michelle's stand and could only watch as each of them went within 10 yards of the oak tree I was in.

I also spent two days pheasant hunting and four more in Michelle's stand and, maybe even more importantly, achieved some progress on getting my world ready for winter.

The time period that I just wrote about was 14 days.

I am run down as the 8 pointer that ran underneath my tree.

It is a good kind of fatigue!

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

## Make a Difference with your Deer this Hunting Season

### WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages hunters to donate Wisconsin-harvested deer through the DNR's Deer Donation Program. The program helps stock food pantries to support residents in need.

Wisconsin has a network of venison donation partners, including county land and water conservation departments, food pantries, charitable organizations, USDA - Wildlife Services and participating meat processors, who help implement and administer the program.

Since the program began in 2000, hunters have donated 98,000 deer, totaling over 3.9 million pounds of venison.

### How To Donate

Hunters interested in donating a Wisconsin-harvested deer to the DNR's Deer Donation Program should follow these steps:

- Field dress the deer.
- Register the deer through GameReg ([gowild.wi.gov/wildlife/harvest](http://gowild.wi.gov/wildlife/harvest)). Please note the registration confirmation number and keep it on hand when dropping off the deer.
- Test the deer for CWD before taking the deer to a processor if harvested from a CWD-affected



county. A list of CWD sampling locations is available on the DNR's Sampling For Chronic Wasting Disease webpage at [dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/WildlifeHabitat/registersample](http://dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/WildlifeHabitat/registersample).

- Call ahead. Contact a participating processor before dropping off the deer to make sure they have space to accept it. More processors may be added later in the season, so check back if you don't see one currently in your area.

- Bring the deer to the processor. If donating a deer being tested for CWD, inform the processor and provide the CWD barcode number. The processor will not distribute the deer until the results are known.

### Don't Hunt Or Want To Donate Your Deer?

Hunters and non-hunters may also support the Deer Donation Program through a monetary donation at any Wisconsin Hunting License sales location or online through their Go Wild account.
