Jelaine Schmitz was in the shower when the power went out in Oak Center on December 7, 2000. She called her sister living in Mayville to finish getting ready before she waitressed at the Audubon Inn. "Chrissy, I got work tonight. I'm coming by you to get ready and paint up my face." That's when she got the call from her stepdaughter and neighbor Jamie, "You gotta come home, your house is on fire!"

### The Fire Damage

By the time Jelaine got to her house, the fire was probably

burning for one hour. She pulled into the driveway and a half-dozen fire trucks were there – Oakfield and Lamartine's, among others. She watched near her detached garage. When your house is on fire, really, what are you going to do but watch? Her husband Jim came home immediately and as he neared home he knew. "That was more than a chimney fire."

Firemen were chopping into the roof with axes. The house was all black like a bomb went off. Most of the possessions in the house were charred. One of the few things saved was some of

## Campbellsport Gets Win over Kewaskum in a Non-conference Battle

On December 21, the Campbellsport Cougars boys' basketball team got a key 64-56 win over Kewaskum.

Campbellsport (3-7, 1-4) followed its season trend of getting early leads. The Cougars held a 12-4 advantage at the 13-minute mark of the first half.

"Our team was locked in early and played with confidence, which was key with a few players out with illness," noted Head Coach Ethan Elliott.

Kewaskum (5-4, 2-1) fought back to take a 29-27 lead at the halftime buzzer.

The Cougars clawed back with an 11-2 run to take a 40-34 lead at 13:20 mark in the second half.

The back and forth game saw the Indians with a 47-46 lead at 6:20 remaining before Campbellsport's Trent Schladweiler hit a big three-pointer to give Campbellsport a 49-47 edge.

Schladweiler wasn't done, as he hit another three-pointer at the three-minute mark to give the Cougars a five-point advantage. He made two big free

throws to extend the lead to 58-53 at the 2:03 mark.

"Trent was huge for us with 13 points on the night and taking advantage of his playing time," said Elliott. "It was awesome to see him shine and his teammates were so proud of him."

Campbellsport finished the game on a 13-6 run to a

## Chambers of Commerce and Businesses Support Wisconsin

### Passenger Rail Expansion

Chambers of Commerce in cities around Wisconsin say that the recently-announced federal grants to study passenger rail expansion in the state are an important first step to determining the feasibility and potential economic benefits that trains could provide.

The grants from the US DOT's Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) provide for federally-funded planning to be undertaken to look at expanding service on current routes and adding train service to new cities around the state. Potential new cities include Appleton, Oshkosh, Fond du Lac, Eau Claire, Menomonie, Hudson, Pewaukee, Watertown, and Madison, with potential expanded service for Sturtevant/Racine, Milwaukee, Portage, Tomah, and La Crosse. FRA's Corridor Identification and Development Program was created as a result of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law that provides significant federal support for expansion of increasingly popular passenger rail service.

"This is an important announcement in the process towards a high-speed passenger rail line stop in Fond du Lac," Sadie Vander Velde, president/CEO, Envision Greater Fond du Lac, said. "This corridor expansion from Milwaukee to Green Bay would open up avenues for more talent attraction,

transportation accessibility, and increased tourism."

A number of local Chambers of Commerce, prominent state and local businesses, education leaders, and local tourism agencies have signed on to a statement enumerating the potential value to more trains in the state:

"We (local Chamber of Commerce organizations) support the expansion of passenger rail service in high-potential Wisconsin corridors as a needed and worthwhile investment for the economic future of our state. Frequent service to more cities will help attract and retain business and the talent critical to its success; provide a convenient, economical, and environmentally friendly alternative to driving; accelerate economic growth opportunities; improve quality of life; increase tourism; and add resiliency to our transportation system."

The list includes Chambers in Chippewa Falls, Eau Claire, Fond du Lac, Fox Cities, Green Bay, Menomonie, Milwaukee, and Oshkosh, as well as regional economic development organizations, several local tourism bureaus, and a number of prominent businesses. 

# Make a Plan now to Dispose of your Holiday Tree

## Keep Trees out of Landfills

### WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is encouraging Wisconsinites to make a plan now to properly dispose of their holiday trees after their celebrations wrap up.

Wisconsin law generally prohibits landfill disposal of yard waste, including leaves, grass clippings, brush and pieces of wood (branches, sticks, etc.) under 6 inches in diameter. The yard waste disposal law has been in place since 1993.

The DNR does not act as “trash police,” but rather works with communities to divert yard waste from landfills through composting and other waste reduction activities.

The DNR recommends chipping or composting yard waste because that organic waste takes up a lot of landfill space, has value for gardening and landscaping and creates harmful greenhouse gases when it breaks down in landfills.

If your municipality or a private service provider offers drop-off or curbside tree collection for residents, remove lights, decorations and wires before placing the tree on the curb or taking it to the drop-off center. If tree management is not offered in your area, check out the Wisconsin Recycling Markets Directory for a list of licensed composting facilities by selecting “Licensed Composter Facilities” in the drop-down menu.

The DNR will continue to work with municipalities and the Waste and Materials Management Study Group over time to gather information about how holiday trees are being managed and identify options for keeping useful materials out of landfills.

Jelaine's antique spongeware.

Then when a fire occurs, one is left thinking about what they could have done. What caused the fire? "Well that was just a freak thing," Jim explained. "When the power came back on there was a surge." Jim had replaced all of the wires in his old farmhouse, besides one line that was in the basement, which he never used anyway. Well, a plug in box was on that remaining line. The power came back on, there was surge, and something between that line and plug-in box started on fire down in a dried out and dusty basement from a wood furnace. It all burnt up pretty quickly.

There were many lessons from the fire that can be applied to life. That's how the fire came up in conversation on the porch by Jim and Jelaine. It was just one of many topics that span a good get together by friends. And so it was asked what advice did they have for others in life who are younger? "It taught me not to be materialistic," Jelaine answered. "It taught me your husband, or your partner or your family is the most important. Anything you see here, you can buy. Jewelry. A house. Clothes. Cars. It's all a bunch of \*\*\*\*. What matters is who you love, and your health. And take care of yourself."

What was the worst about the fire? "Our dog died. That was the worst part," Jelaine said. Bailey was a springer spaniel. "We went out to the Holyland and bought him." He tried to escape. "But the dog was laying at the back door dead. He was asphyxiated." The neighbor tried to get him breathing again after the firemen carried him out. Jim bookended the commentary on all what was lost in the fire, including their home: "But our dog was the most sacred thing we lost in that house."

**The Flip Side of the Fire**

"And Bea Smith was our insurance lady, and she cut us the check the next day," said Jelaine as if Bea was right there saying it in front of the porch. "Yea. Cut us a check. 'Here!' She never even looked at the damage. Nothing. She just cut a check." All their clothes burnt, and they had no place to live. So this check floated them the cash to get an apartment by her dad in Fond du Lac.

"And listen to what she did for us," Jelaine said to her husband on the porch, who finished explaining. Jim said he was woefully underinsured on the house, which had the same coverage unchanged since he moved into it in the mid-1960s. Bea doubled the house coverage and also significantly increased the personal property coverage. This was all done "the year before, and she didn't even tell me," recalled Jim. "So God bless Bea," Jelaine concluded.

Jim never checked his insurance until after the fire. First, Bea had the foresight to up it without asking. And second, she didn't even charge the Schmitz's more - that's why they weren't even aware of it until their house burnt down.

Jim admitted he didn't examine his insurance policy. He had put additions on the old farmhouse, "And just never looked at the policy. Never paid too much attention to it." So when the house burnt, they got money he never counted on.

**Fish Fry Covered**

Years after the fire, they went to a fish fry at the Fin & Feather in the Kettle Moraine. "So we were there," Jelaine said, "and Bea Smith is with her

husband [Jack] and another couple. And Jim went up to the waitress. "Those people over there, I want to buy their dinner." So he covered all of Bea's table. "Well, you would have thought he bought gold bullion for Bea Smith. Because then she sent us tickets to the Eden dinner, always." The Schmitz's got tickets to the dinner at the Sheppard of the Hills for years. "Because Jim bought their fish fry."

So Jim and Jelaine finally went to an event Bea invited them to. "And Bea Smith saw us walk in. And she ran up us and said, 'We're gonna mix a drink for yah.' I don't know if there was a bar or [if] she had her own stash?" Jelaine laughed in the context that Bea was the type person who would have shared her own alcohol. (Not a judgement, a compliment). Of course, Jim pointed out that the occasion had a bar that you could get liquor. The point from Jelaine is how welcoming Bea was, "And she greeted us as if we were royalty."

**Lessons in Life**

Bea Smith would never have come up in conversation if Jelaine hadn't talked about her life looking back. Besides making sure you are not underinsured, and that materialism doesn't get you far, Jim and Jelaine now see the importance of taking the time to visit with those nearing the end.

Jelaine ran into Bea at someone else's anniversary party at Northwinds in Eden. Bea's husband Jack (1939-2016) was in a nursing home by then and she was alone. Bea had cancer and was getting treatments. Jelaine recalled what was going through her head at the time: "I see Bea sitting there at the table, all by herself, and that's when everybody knew she had cancer. And when you get cancer, you're," and Jelaine caught her words. Unless you have had cancer, one does not understand those with cancer often feel an awkward treatment. Friends and relatives often don't know what to say. "And I said, 'Bea, it's good to see you.'"

Its one thing Jelaine is proud of looking back, because it was the last time she ever saw Bea Smith. "I talked to her, and I'm so glad." Because Bea was there, but Jelaine got the vibe that "Nobody knew what to say. You know? Now that I know - I've had cancer - I know what to say. Treat her like always - same thing, not like a leper."

It was an ironic conclusion on Bea Smith. The reason we started talking about her was because Jelaine was asked a question on lessons in life. What advice would Jelaine give to those younger? Meanwhile, just the fact how Beatrice entered Jim and Jelaine's life shows how this Eden icon carried her own message.

When writing about Bea, numerous sources—family and non-family—talked about how generous Bea was. She was there for St. Mary's—and then Shepard of the Hills: anything the church needed. She bought pies, and the tickets mentioned above. There were so many private debts in various forms she canceled or aided. The Schmitz's stories second the generosity that defined Bea Smith beyond Eden and family.

Bea Smith was there the day after your house fire and your dog was killed. She was there to help further the educations of future generations. She was there to buy pies for the chicken dinner for church. And she never expected something in return.

But if she was rewarded, she'd come back and treat you like a king. "She paid for people's college educations and a simple thing like a fish fry meant so much to her. That Bea though, she was quite the woman. She was extraordinary," Jelaine concluded on their porch of the house rebuilt after the fire. Jim seconded: "Hell of a woman."

“The Amtrak Hiawatha trains on the Chicago-Milwaukee corridor are widely recognized as providing valuable economic and mobility benefits to southeast Wisconsin, and service is expected to start soon for an additional Chicago-Milwaukee-Twin Cities train via Wisconsin Dells and La Crosse,” notes Scott Rogers, vice president Governmental Affairs at the Eau Claire Area Chamber of Commerce. “These grants make it possible to look at how trains could benefit other parts of Wisconsin, well.” Rogers also serves as the private-sector representative for Wisconsin on the Midwest Interstate Passenger Rail Commission, a compact of eight upper Midwest states who provide strategy, planning, and coordination of passenger train services.

Fond du Lac area visitor's bureau, Destination Lake Winnebago Region, also supports this project. “As the official tourism entity for our region, we are thrilled at the prospect of a high-speed passenger rail line stop in Fond du Lac, Craig Molitor, President/CEO, said. “This corridor expansion from Milwaukee to Green Bay would provide a wonderful new point of access for potential visitors. Additionally, the rail line would offer residents and future residents increased flexibility as they travel throughout the broader region.”

The FRA grants were awarded for five corridor applications submitted earlier this year by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT), and the Chippewa-St. Croix Rail Commission in west central Wisconsin. The grants do not require any local or state matching funds. They will provide for the opportunity to assess potential ridership, track and station requirements, costs, and economic return-on-investment for each of the corridors. This work will help ready the corridors for the next steps in development, including Service Development Plans, environmental clearances, and potential implementation.

**First Winter Camping Trip**

This week, I had a few firsts and a very good time, as well.

Please read on, and I hope you enjoy!

**MONDAY, DEC. 20**  
**HIGH 38, LOW 23**

What do you do when southern Wisconsin does not have enough ice, if any, to walk on (much less winter camp)?

You go north and find ice, or in my case, call a friend!

My friend is Paul Bucher, who is the publisher and owner of the *Cumberland Advocate*. As always, Paul had good news on both ice and a lake

where he and some of his friends had been catching a few walleye.

Walleye have a tendency to put on the feed bag in November and early December, and then their metabolism slows down dramatically, and they can be very difficult to catch.

So, I headed towards Grantsburg with my directions, found my lake and began the very large process of hauling loads out to where I would fish and live for the next 48 hours.

My excitement level was literally exploding, as I worked and watched my golden retrievers – Red and Ruby – live the good life.

Today's plan had me using two Beaver Dam tip-ups and a spinning rod set up on a Finicky Fooler. I might add that I had just enough daylight to haul my gear and build a camp.

It was well after dark by the time I had everything completed and, other than one very small northern pike, the action was not happening.

So, I am sitting in my "Eskimo" shack that is lit by a propane lantern, heated with a Mr. Buddy heater and, this, is a place I love to be.

Just like that, the spinning rod/Finicky Fooler that is baited with a large shiner in over 18-feet of water is hit, and I had a huge

fish on. For 10 minutes, I could just barely keep the sumo (that I was thinking may have been a musky or mega-walleye) from spooling me. There were times when I had it below me, and it just hung there and did not move, then it would just peel line, stop and say: you cannot move me.

Fifteen minutes into the epic fight, it became snagged on something and all I could do was re-bait and hope for another chance.

At 8:30 p.m., one of my tip-ups that had a light on it go off, and I was tickled pink when I iced a 19.5 inch walleye.

I still had 40 hours left on this trip and was very excited.

**HIGH 39, LOW 27**

The pups and I are living on five inches of ice and, this morning, I was walking the ice long before first light and very excited to catch some walleye.

Every trip that I go on, I forget something and, though it may seem foolish, it is easy to do. On this trip, I had two screw ups: I left both of my




