**January 29, 2009**

A decrease of \$25,000 in the Town of Wayne tax levy was approved by the town board during the monthly meeting in December. Capital improvement expenditures had the biggest decrease, going from \$160,000 in 2008 to \$100,000 for 2009. Anticipated end of year balance decreases from approximately \$272,000 to nearly \$252,000.

However, the Village of Kewaskum's plan commission still has a say based on the extra-territorial zoning, and the commission has tabled any action until February.

Last year, in 2023, I checked out approximately 300 items from the library. These were not just books, but also included movies, library of things, magazines, and eBooks from Libby. In reality I took home approximately 150 books, but I did not read all the books for myself. There were children's books that I had checked out for the weekends my grandchildren would be visiting. A few were my husband's requests. Many were required reads with my involvement on the Wisconsin Literary Committee. Even those I read for myself; I did not always complete. I am of the thought that life is too short to spend it reading something you do not enjoy, so I don't.

Rom-coms were very popular items last year and even though that is not my preferred genre, I gave it a shot. Some were hit or miss; several I just could not get through and then there were a few I really enjoyed. Here are some of the romance-like novels that came out last year that I recommend for those like me that want to give rom-coms a try.

*The Year of Second Chances* by Lara Avery was a winner for me. It is a feel-good story that takes place in rural Minnesota. Robin is a young widow and after a year of intense grieving, she tries to fulfill her deceased husband's wishes and move on with her life. This is following an email sent

from her husband's account a year after his death giving her access to a dating app that he signed her up for. Besides dating a variety of men and healing herself from within, Robin also heals other relationships in her life. This was YA writer Avery's first attempt at adult writing, and I hope she publishes more.

Another romance I enjoyed had a different storyline. Katherine Center's *Hello, Stranger* was deeper than a simple love story and it was also humorous. Sadie Montgomery is an artist whose gift is portrait painting. She is on her way to becoming well-known after placing as a finalist in an artistic competition. An accident leaves her with a debilitating condition called acquired apperceptive prosopagnosia, also known as face blindness. While Sadie struggles with hanging on to her artistic dream while she cannot discern faces, she also has challenges with her unsupportive family, needy pet and a couple of romances thrown in.

The last rom-com I read of note is by best-selling author Emily Henry. *Happy Place* follows Harriet and Wyn, who have been the perfect couple for years. They recently broke up but didn't tell their friends and have to spend a week-long vacation pretending they are still together. Will this force them to get back together?

Reading rom-coms is new for me and with their popularity within our patronage, I gave it a try. I am glad I did, because now I have found a few more authors to recommend and continue to promote literacy in our community.



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

Four herds with 12-month pregnancy rates of 38 percent and greater were recently recognized with the CentralStar Cooperative ReproStar Award. Schmitz East Branch Dairy, Fond du Lac; Model Dairy Farms, Dodgeville; Blue Star Dairy Farms, DeForest; and Burr Oak Heifers, Coloma, are the recent recipients.

During the past decade, significant genetic advancements have been made in the dairy industry, particularly with the Holstein breed, to improve cow health and fertility. CentralStar Director of Consulting and Profit Strategies Cole Mark shared, "By focusing on health and fertility traits in their sire selections for several years, our winners are now reaping the rewards. Not only are they benefiting from increased milk production, but these animals are healthy, and breeding efficiency is very high."

## Task Force Conducts Review of Denied and Modified Conference Realignment Plans

*Kewaskum could move to the Wisconsin Flyway Conference in 2025 for non-football athletics*

### WISCONSIN INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Conference Realignment Task Force convened Thursday, Jan. 11, to conduct appeals for requests that were denied in December in addition to providing a hearing and configuring plans that were modified from their original proposals.

The current non-football conference realignment process addresses sports other than football for implementation in 2025-26. Football-only conference realignment consideration occurs on an alternate-year rotation.

Based on the information gathered from the hearings for the modified plans, the Task Force amended a number of the proposals that will receive a hearing for all schools impacted by the modifications at the Feb. 8 meeting. Schools that are affected by modified realignment solutions have the opportunity to provide feedback, which enhances engagement, communication and transparency in the conference realignment process.

In an effort to place Plymouth and Kewaskum into a conference, the Task Force modified plans impacting three leagues.

Plymouth and Sheboygan South would transition from the East Central Conference and Fox River Classic Conference, respectively, into the North Shore Conference. In addition, Kewaskum would move from the East Central Conference to the Wisconsin Flyway Conference.

The conference configurations for all the modified realignment plans, as well as all the original realignment proposals submitted, are available on the Conference Realignment Requests and Proposals page of the WIAA Website at [www.wiaawi.org/Schools/Conferences/Conference-Realignment/Requests-and-Proposals](http://www.wiaawi.org/Schools/Conferences/Conference-Realignment/Requests-and-Proposals).

The Board of Control will vote on the recommendations of the Task Force at its meeting Tuesday, March 5. The Board has the options to approve, reject or remand realignment recommendations back to the Task Force. If approved, the modifications will be implemented for the 2025-26 sports seasons. If remanded, the Task Force will reconvene to make appropriate changes to the plan before presenting it to the Board of Control again in April. If rejected, the conferences will remain in their current configuration.

# A Very Good Time in the Canoe at Port Washington

This column gives you a bit of reality about my way of earning a living and is also a pretty cool adventure.

**THURSDAY, JAN. 11**  
**HIGH 34, LOW 27**

The lead up to this experience is important. First, I heard good stories about fishermen catching brown trout in the harbor at Port Washington as well on Lake Michigan.

Second, my 17-foot Aluma Craft aluminum canoe has a six-inch tear in its belly that I have been attempting to fix the last few days with my canoe actually in my living room.

Third, I am addicted to canoe fishing and do not remember ever paddling a canoe on Lake Michigan in January.

Fourth, I had planned on staying two days but a monster snowstorm with major wind would knock this plan down to one day.

Fifth, I looked on the internet and saw that there were two sport shops in Port Washington and that is where I planned on getting the right spoons and crankbaits to paddle troll with.

On my actual drive, I came to reality with the approaching storm and, after arriving in Port Washington, realized that both shops were apparently closed for the winter. I went to one of those big box stores hoping to find something that looked like a shad, as I had been reading that the brown trout were feeding on shad. The closest I could come was a spoon made by DREAMWEAVER, and it was called the Silver Alewife.

I bought two as well as a half dozen crankbaits. I have to admit I did not have a ton of daylight after rigging my canoe with three rod holders mounted on a 2x6, no electronics, and a whole bunch of I-can-do-this attitude. I rigged one of the DREAMWEAVERS on a spinning rod that was straight back and put a crankbait on my left and right rods which had planer boards. I left the landing at 1:30 and was really excited.

I had paddled maybe two minutes and the DREAMWEAVER setup started going bonkers telling me it was fish on. Folks, I have to tell you, catching heavy torpedoes in a canoe is close to insane. My trophy started jumping, and I could see it was big. A half dozen times I got it close to the net and then it would just take off and be out of sight. I was on my knees, riding out the fight and this fish was stronger than my left wrist.

In the end, I caught what I would say was a 14-pound brown trout, and I felt like a super hero.

Next plan was, stay in the harbor and follow the hundreds of mergansers, which are a fish-eating duck and hopefully brown trout would be by the ducks.

Well, I have to tell you, I got snagged a lot and this was a time consuming problem.

After about an hour I had a hit on the DREAMWEAVER, but it was gone as soon as it happened. I lost several cranks and then just like that it was fish on with my DREAMWEAVER and once again I felt like I was a superhero as the big brown was jumping and clearing four feet with each jump.

Unfortunately, bad luck came my way, my line went limp and the brown kept jumping. I think the rocks had done some damage, and I was now without a DREAMWEAVER.
