**A Sippel Haircut**

We were talking at Woodlands Senior Park in Fond du Lac over breakfast, about the old days and the value of a good haircut. Whether you were in Fond du lac, St. Cloud or Eden, you could get a good one from a Sippel.

**Bernard Sippel (1908-2003)**

Esther Hodina was talking to Karl Ryan. Both had stories of Sippel haircuts, but from different vantage points.

Esther recalled fondly her Uncle Bernard, who cut hair in St. Cloud. Esther's father was Erwin Benedict "Bud" Schrage (1912-1997), whose sister Dorothy Schrage Sippel (1909-1995) was Bernard's wife.

As a child, Esther remembered going over by all the Sippels in the St. Cloud area, and "Ma Sippel" sang and played the piano. This would have been Mathilda Sippel (1882-1954). The whole family sang. However, Bernard admitted he could not sing well, "I couldn't carry a tune in a pail." (Uncle Bernard had a sense of humor.)

Dorothy Sippel's obituary states she married Bernard in 1935. "Following their marriage, the couple lived in Fond

du Lac until 1941 when they moved to St. Cloud where Mr. Sippel was a barber until retiring in 1991 after 50 years." Bernard's obituary states he "spent 50 of his 53 years as a barber, owning and operating a shop in St. Cloud. He was a first assistant chief with the St. Cloud Volunteer Fire Department for 25 years. He also was a master woodworker and furniture builder."

Bernard's woodwork wasn't just a hobby, it was a gift. This

included making wooden crosses for his niece, new cabinets for his son, and a baby cradle for his great grandchild.

Bernard also had an appreciation for the outdoors, as he golfed and fished. He also liked a good soup. Once he left St. Cloud and moved to Fond du Lac, he often would ask Esther and her husband Ed to come over for a bowl of soup. "The same way when I made something, then I'd have him come

# Washington County Executive Statement on UW-Milwaukee Tech College Transfer Announcement

## Regarding allowance for transfer of technical college credits

The announcement by UW-Milwaukee last week to allow for technical college students to seamlessly transfer their associate's degree credits to UWM is a welcome change coming at the heels of the closure of additional two-year UW satellite campuses. I thank UWM Chancellor Mark Mone, Moraine Park Technical College President Bonnie Baerwald and their respective teams for displaying the courage to pursue this type of innovative solution.

Unfortunately, it was abundantly clear that the old model of a two-year campus was financially and demographically unsustainable and required creative solutions to address the changing needs of our students looking for options in higher education. I formed the Washington County Task Force on Higher Education several years ago to address this issue.

In our Washington County Task Force on Higher Education report last year, we noted that it made

the most sense for a community college-type concept under the governance of Moraine Park Technical College (MPTC) to provide the pathway to a four-year degree for our county's students.

The task force noted that an emphasis has been placed in recent years on seamless transfer of credits earned in high school, at two-year level colleges, or other four-year universities. It highlighted that students still run into barriers when trying to transfer previously earned credits to their new college of choice.

The task force findings precipitated positive discussion, change and action in handling the inevitable closures of the two-year UW campuses and bringing leaders of the educational institutions to the table to start finding solutions.

Once again, I commend the UWM and MPTC team for this momentous collaboration and strongly encourage continuing this positive momentum toward further enhancement and improvements to best serve the students, businesses and community.

## Cross-Country Ski the Northern Unit

With a great base of snow on the ground, it's time to break out those cross-country skis and then head to the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit. The Northern Unit offers some of the best cross-country ski trails in Southeast Wisconsin.

The Northern Kettle Moraine Nordic Ski Club grooms the trails at the Greenbush Recreation Area and lights up one mile of trail for night skiing. For more than 20 years, the club has worked in partnership with the State Forest staff in maintaining and improving these trails for skate and classical skiers. The Greenbush trails are located off Kettle Moraine Drive between County Road T and Hwy 67 near Greenbush. You can access the six loop trails either from the trailhead or from the Greenbush Group Camp (N5854 Kettle Moraine Drive, Glenbeulah) parking lot, which provides much more parking than the trailhead.

The Zillmer Trails (W833 County Road SS, Campbellsport) located between County Road G and Hwy 67 near New Prospect, offer a second set of four groomed loop trails. The State Forest staff keeps the Zillmer trails in good condition for both classic and skating styles of cross-skiing.

For trail conditions at both Zillmer and Greenbush, check out [skinnyski.com](http://skinnyski.com). The heated shelters at Greenbush and Zillmer are open seven days a week and provide a private space to change clothes and a place to warm up cold toes and noses. Inside the shelters, a toasty woodstove along with tables and chairs offers a welcoming spot to enjoy a snack or simple meal. There are vault toilets and drinking water available at each location along with outside grills, picnic tables, and campfire rings.

For a great skiing adventure and whole-body workout, come dressed for the weather, and bring drinking water, high energy snacks, and dry clothes for the ride home.

If you don't have any gear, don't fret. You can rent cross-country ski equipment from Attitude Sports in Fond du Lac and Mountain Outfitters in West Bend. If you decide to purchase cross-country skis, you can with a modest investment. Talk with the experts to figure out the best set of skis, poles, and boots to meet your needs. Be warned as

the season progresses stock becomes increasingly limited.

Unlike downhill skiing where you need to pay each time you ski, cross-country skiing at a State Park System property only requires a valid Wisconsin State Park System vehicle admission sticker and an individual trail pass for those 16 years old and older. The vehicle admission sticker allows you access to any property in the State Park System. The trail pass is not only good for cross-country skiing, but can be used for mountain biking, in-line skating, trail biking, and horseback riding at properties that require it. These may be bought online, over the phone, at a self-registration kiosk, or in person at a State Park System Property. For information, call the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit headquarters at 262-626-2116.

Winter's snow won't last long, so hit the trails soon to enjoy a great cross-country ski outing in the beautiful winter woods.



# Sheep Dip Booklet Found near Oak Center

One of the unique aspects of putting the South Eden and Eden area history together is the information that came by happenstance. One of such came from Oakfield High School senior Mekena Gerlikovski.


In the midst of researching the Sheep Dip on the old Braun farm in Eden, Mekena brought to school a water-stained paper publication her family preserved from their razed granary.

Titled *Sheep Dipping in a Nutshell*, we are confident that the booklet was more than a century old, and possibly from the 1890s. There is a reference to awards at the World's Fair, but it cannot be said for certain which World's Fair, such as the one held in Chicago in 1893. There was a line in the advertising that said, "Undoubtedly a first-class manufactured Dip can alone be relied upon, and of these Cooper Dip has stood alone for half a century as the lead-

ing Dip of the world..." Given William Cooper's (1813-1885) sheep dip solution can date to the early 1850s in Britain, the source found in Oakfield is probably before 1910.

The family deserves a lot of credit for saving it, because others would have tossed this stained document into the garbage. It was so wrinkled that it was hard to keep it flat while photographing. She encouraged me to read it, because the testimonials were indicative of the time period. The following points are some of the arguments selling this "Cooper Sheep Dip" around 1900. (Please note some of the different capitalization and spelling might relate to Europe, and more specifically Britain, indicating how globally this product was used.)

- First, it's important to periodically dip the sheep. "In the older countries, on every well-conducted farm the flock is dipped regularly once or twice every year, on the principle it pays well to do so." After all, "A sheep

tortured by the biting of insects cannot thrive properly and incurs direct loss to the owner."

- Second, it's helpful to dip after shearing. One testimonial said this should occur a month to six weeks after shearing. This also


relates to the young. "Lambs should be dipped when the ewes are shorn to prevent the Ticks passing on to them for the better covering afforded."

- Third, dipping should be considered as winter approaches. A dipping in the fall should be done "to insure perfect comfort in the winter." In addition, "Often do we hear of men who find their flocks full of Ticks or breaking out with Scab in the winter when it is extremely difficult to get rid of them."

ly bought sheep should always be dipped before turning them out on the ranche or farm."

- Fifth, there were a lot of ways to mess up your wool via dipping or treatment in the 1800s. Many other options had spread in the sheep world besides Cooper Dip, who argued the alternatives came at a cost. "Lime and Sulphur as a Dip is



generally denounced, as it ruins the fleece; Tobacco stains it, and requires heating to be effective. Carbolic, and other liquids are only temporarily effective, and usually very unpleasant in use. Kerosine Emulsion is very risky, and often peels the wool. None of these can truthfully be called perfect preparations. All hot Dips are objectionable and liable to chill the sheep." In contrast, Cooper Dip powder could be soluble in cold water and ready in 5 minutes.

In addition, the publication was very informative on issues revolving around the dipping process. For example it warned, "the Sheep should not be heated or thirsty" during the procedure. This was likely to prevent their urge to drink the poison bath. In addition, Cooper Dip recommended to "Shade Draining Pens in very hot weather." Overall, the booklet was a reminder on the old days of how to take care of sheep and what farmers had to consider in the early 1900s. It was very helpful in painting a picture of why a Sheep Dip in Eden would be necessary.

over by us and have it.” Was his soup good? “Oh yes. He’d make turtle soup. I guess in St. Cloud there was a little river... They had a lot of turtles in there.” In those years you could catch them, and make soup with them. “It tasted so good.”

Esther recalls, Bernard’s St. Cloud barbershop was attached to his house. She fondly remembers a pool table. It was a neat way for customers, including farmers, to visit. The barbershop was quite the conversational atmosphere. Billiards could occupy younger kids and other customers waiting. Did the pool table charge a quarter? Esther said that wasn’t the point in them days. Uncle Bernard took care of his customers, enjoyed their time, and created a place where people could socialize. Charging to play pool wasn’t part of the story, and indicative of a different era when such charges were not a priority. Esther’s point is St. Cloud had a down-to-earth barber.

**Julius “Jule” Sippel (1903-1996)**

Bernard’s brother Jule cut hair in the Village of Eden. He was the oldest Sippel child of his big family. According to his obituary, Jule Sippel was born in 1903 in Stetsonville. “At the age of 2, he moved with his family to the rural St. Cloud area. In 1992, he moved to the Fond du Lac area. He was a barber in Eden until his retirement in 1976. He belonged to St. Mary’s Church, its Holy Name Society, and the Fireman’s Association of Eden. He served as village treasurer in years past.”

It was hard to verify how long Jule was cutting hair in Eden. One source associated with Eden history, and born in 1935, said he could not recall a time without Jule cutting hair in Eden.

Now back to the Woodlands, were Karl Ryan was discussing the history of haircuts. In regard to his hair, Karl was a child, and doesn’t remember his mother cutting his hair. His memories might put his haircuts with Jule as far back as the 1930s. “He was the first hair cut I got.”

Jule’s location was “right across from Flood Oil.” He was by the office side of the road, and his barbershop “was hooked on to the Hotel,” meaning Jule rented it from Scudella’s. “Jule Sippel had his house right in Eden. He walked to work everyday. It was only a little ways. [He] never had to drive a car.”

Karl remembered Jule as a funny guy. He was quiet, “until you get a few beers, then he was really peppy in a good way.” Karl thought Jule preferred a drink across the street at Ray Fox’s Tavern. “Instead of the Hotel, he came across there.” And he gave good haircuts.

In the early days of the Eden Fireman’s Picnic, you would see Jule taking in money when people paid for their pitchers of beer. “He sat on a chair at the table. I remember that so plain.” Besides money collection at the picnic, Jule’s role on the fire department was important, and dates back to the days when fireman knew to come to a fire because of the siren in the village. Being a businessman in the heart of Eden, he was able to answer the call immediately.

Karl’s memory places a typical Eden customer’s options for haircuts, as he had Jule until he retired, “then I had to find somebody else and I went

down to Campbellsport,” for which he meant Don Huberty. Then Karl had Sharon Baumhardt cut his hair. “They were all good.”

**Harlins to Roger Sippel (1935-2022)**

One unique memory with Jule involved Tommy and Francis Harlin, brothers who liked a Friday night haircut. While Karl might go to the tavern after Saturday’s 8 p.m. mass, the Harlin brothers also treated themselves when they got a haircut.

“Usually on a Friday night – Harlins – they’d all get their hair cut.” Jule, Karl said, “was busy as hell Friday night.” This was an opportunity for the Harlins to trim their hair and talk to the neighbors. “On a night after a haircut you’d go to Fox’s, on a night after church you’d go to Wood’s [Don’s Bar].” Karl did the latter at Wood’s; the Harlins could pull off both. In defense of Harlins, Karl said the reason they frequented the taverns was to enjoy the local company. The Harlins went to the Eden bars “to find out the news,” and talk to their neighbors. Church was part of that equation on Saturday nights. This is reminiscent of the words of Dr. Fuller McBride (1935-2022), who said one has to respect the Irish heritage in that going to the pub equated with finding out the latest local news. Jule’s haircuts, Fox’s Tavern, St. Mary’s Church, and Wood’s Bar were a way to be aware of the latest happenings.

Meanwhile, Roger Sippel was Jule’s son, and cut hair in Fond du Lac. He was born in Eden in 1935, which suggests that Jule might have been cutting hair by then. His obituary notes, “Roger was a barber in Fond du Lac for 50-plus years. He

## Tips to Build a Nest Egg in a Time Marked by a High Cost of Living

A rise in the cost of living has presented challenges to millions of households across the globe. As the cost of everything from food to natural gas to fuel for vehicles has risen, many people have struggled to find ways to save money, especially for their long-term goals like retirement.

The term “nest egg” has long been associated with long-term financial goals like retirement savings or college tuition. But what are individuals to do if short-term costs get in the way of their long-term goals? There’s no magic formula for building a nest egg, but these tips can help anyone grow their savings despite the high cost of living.

- **Identify a specific, achievable goal.** Simply resolving to save more without attaching a figure that defines what more is can make it hard to build a substantial nest egg. Examine your finances, including what’s coming in each month (i.e., take-home wages) and what has to go out each month (i.e., housing and automotive costs, etc.).

Document these expenses and

then identify an achievable goal to build your nest egg. If necessary, trim some fat related to monthly expenses that are not necessities so you can redirect funds to your nest egg. Cancel streaming services or cut back on dining out so those funds can be redirected to building a nest egg.

- **Take advantage of pre-tax opportunities to save.** Pre-tax opportunities to build a nest include retirement vehicles like a 401(k). With these plans, money is deducted from a paycheck before taxes, thus lowering workers’ immediate tax burdens (taxes are paid when funds are withdrawn) and enabling them to save more. Some employers even match contributions up to a predetermined percentage, so enrolling in plans that offer employer match contributions can be an especially effective way to build a nest egg.

- **Begin living on a budget, and stick to it.** The idea of living on a budget may seem simple, but it’s less common than some may recognize. A 2023 survey from the online financial resource *NerdWallet* found that 83 per-



cent of the more than 2,000 adults 18 and older who participated acknowledged they overspend.

Perhaps more telling is that 84 percent of respondents indicate they have a monthly budget but exceed it anyway. Individuals who want to build a sizable nest egg are urged to work with a financial advisor to devise a monthly budget and then stick to it.

- **Save for emergencies.** A lack of emergency funds can quickly jeopardize a nest egg. Without a somewhat sizable savings account, individuals could be forced to borrow from their

retirement accounts in emergency situations. That strategy hurts in more ways than one, as it both reduces the amount in the nest egg and also affects how much the nest egg can grow, as gains are greater when balances are higher.

The *NerdWallet* survey found that 48 percent of respondents want to prioritize emergency savings, and that strategy can be vital to building a nest egg. A sizable nest egg can help anyone live comfortably in retirement, and various strategies can help people grow their nest egg even as the cost of living remains high.

## Estimating Your Retirement Income Needs

You know how important it is to plan for your retirement, but where do you begin? One of your first steps should be to estimate how much income you'll need to fund your retirement. That's not as easy as it sounds, because retirement planning is not an exact science. Your specific needs depend on your goals and many other factors.

### Use your current income as a starting point

It's common to discuss desired annual retirement income as a percentage of your current income. Depending on whom you're talking to, that percentage could be anywhere from 60% to 90%, or even more. The appeal of this approach lies in its simplicity, and the fact that there's a fairly common-sense analysis underlying it: Your current income sustains your present lifestyle, so taking that income and reducing it by a specific percentage to reflect the fact that there will be certain expenses you'll no longer be liable for (e.g., payroll taxes) will, theoretically, allow you to sustain your current lifestyle.

The problem with this approach is that it doesn't account for your specific situation. If you intend to travel extensively in retirement, for example, you might easily need 100% (or more) of your current income to get by. It's fine to use a percentage of your current income as a benchmark, but it's worth going through all of your current expenses in detail, and really thinking about how those expenses will change over time as you transition into retirement.

### Project your retirement expenses

Your annual income during retirement should be enough (or more than enough) to meet your retirement expenses. That's why estimating those expenses is a big piece of the retirement planning puzzle. But you may have a hard time identifying all of your expenses and projecting how much you'll be spending in each area, especially if retirement is still far off. To help you get started, here are some common retirement expenses:

- Food and clothing
- Housing: Rent or mortgage payments, property taxes, homeowners' insurance, property upkeep and repairs
- Utilities: Gas, electric, water, telephone, cable TV
- Transportation: Car payments, auto insurance, gas, maintenance and repairs, public transportation
- Insurance: Medical, dental, life, disability, long-term care
- Health-care costs not covered by insurance: Deductibles, co-payments, prescription drugs
- Taxes: Federal and state income tax, capital gains tax
- Debts: Personal loans, business loans, credit card payments
- Education: Children's or grandchildren's college expenses
- Gifts: Charitable and personal
- Savings and investments: Contributions to IRAs, annuities, and other investment accounts
- Recreation: Travel, dining out, hobbies, leisure activities
- Care for yourself, your parents, or others: Costs for a nursing home, home health aide, or other type of assisted living
- Miscellaneous: Personal grooming, pets, club memberships

Don't forget that the cost of living will go up over time. The average annual rate of inflation over the past 20 years has been approximately 2.5%.<sup>1</sup> And keep in mind that your retirement expenses may change from year to year. For example, you may pay off your home mortgage or your children's education early in retirement. Other expenses, such as health care and insurance, may increase as you age. To protect against these variables, build a comfortable cushion into your estimates (it's always best to be conservative). Finally, have a financial professional help you with your estimates to make sure they're as accurate and realistic as possible.

### Decide when you'll retire

To determine your total retirement needs, you can't just estimate how much annual income you need. You also have to estimate how long you'll be retired. Why? The longer your retirement, the more years of income you'll need to fund it. The length of your retirement will depend partly on when you plan to retire. This important decision typically revolves around your personal goals and financial situation. For example, you may see yourself retiring at 50 to get the most out of your retirement. Maybe a booming stock market or a generous early retirement package will make that possible. Although it's great to have the flexibility to choose when you'll retire, it's important to remember that retiring at 50 will end up costing you a lot more than retiring at 65.

### Estimate your life expectancy

The age at which you retire isn't the only factor that determines how long you'll be retired. The other important factor is your lifespan. We all hope to live to an old age, but a longer life means that you'll have even more years of retirement to fund. You may even run the risk of outliving your savings and other income sources. To guard against that risk, you'll need to estimate your life expectancy. You can use government statistics, life insurance tables, or a life expectancy calculator to get a reasonable estimate of how long you'll live. Experts base these estimates on your age, gender, race, health, lifestyle, occupation, and family history. But remember, these are just estimates. There's no way to predict how long you'll actually live, but with life expectancies on the rise, it's probably best to assume you'll live longer than you expect.

### Identify your sources of retirement income

Once you have an idea of your retirement income needs, your next step is to assess how prepared you are to meet those needs. In other words, what sources of retirement income will be available to you? Your employer may offer a traditional pension that will pay you monthly benefits. In addition, you can likely count on Social Security to provide a portion of your retirement income. To get an estimate of your Social Security benefits, visit the Social Security Administration website ([www.ssa.gov](http://www.ssa.gov)). Additional sources of retirement income may include a 401(k) or other retirement plan, IRAs, annuities, and other investments. The amount of income you receive from those sources will depend on the amount you invest, the rate of investment return, and other factors. Finally, if you plan to work during retirement, your job earnings will be another source of income.

### Make up any income shortfall

If you're lucky, your expected income sources will be more than enough to fund even a lengthy retirement. But what if it looks like you'll come up short? Don't panic — there are probably steps that you can take to bridge the gap. A financial professional can help you figure out the best ways to do that, but here are a few suggestions:

- Try to cut current expenses so you'll have more money to save for retirement
- Shift your assets to investments that have the potential to substantially outpace inflation (but keep in mind that investments that offer higher potential returns may involve greater risk of loss)
- Lower your expectations for retirement so you won't need as much money (no beach house on the Riviera, for example)
- Work part-time during retirement for extra income
- Consider delaying your retirement for a few years (or longer)

## Tips to Educate Young Adults to be Smart about Credit

Credit is a necessary component of doing business in the modern world. The credit reporting agency Experian defines credit as the ability to borrow money or access goods or services with the understanding that a person will pay later. Various creditors grant credit based on their confidence that a borrower will repay what is owed.

Many adults learn about credit through trial and error. Financial literacy is not taught in many schools, although lots of people feel it merits space alongside literature, math, science, and other subjects. A recent NextGen study found only one in six high school students are required to take a personal finance class in the United States. In addition, a survey conducted in 2018 by Chase Bank found only one-third of Americans were taught what a credit score is by their parents. It is essential that guardians share information about credit with young adults to help them be financially solvent and successful later in life.

Here are some ways to help young adults learn about credit.



### Start with Credit Basics

Speak generally about credit and how it is used. Then explain credit scores, credit bureaus and credit reports. A credit history and credit score is important information for

young adults to have early on and check frequently, as having good credit improves the chances they will qualify for loans and earn acceptable terms in the future.

### Help them Build Credit


Having one or more credit accounts can help a person establish and build credit by making payments on time. Credit card companies often advertise student and secured credit card accounts that come with small or managed credit limits. Making purchases on the cards and paying them in full every month is the best way to improve a credit score or maintain a good one, says the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau.

Another way teens can build credit is through their student loans. Making small payments on the principal while in school can help establish a strong credit history.

### Check their Credit Reports

The Federal Trade Commission recommends checking a child's credit score around the age of 16 or 17. This will help families figure out if there are any anomalies that may indicate identity theft or inaccurate credit issues.

## Financial Mistakes Anyone can Avoid

Earnings go a long way toward determining an individual's financial security. However, high wages do not guarantee long-term financial security any more than lower wages ensure a future marked by a lack of financial flexibility.

Individuals are a unique variable in any financial equation, and those who can exercise and maintain some fiscal discipline are more likely to secure long-term security than those who cannot. One way anyone can improve their chances at a secure and flexible financial future is to identify and avoid some common mistakes. Avoiding the following mistakes can increase the chances individuals at various income levels enjoy a secure financial future.

- Delay saving for retirement – Conventional wisdom says it's never too early to begin saving for retirement. Despite that, surveys indicate many adults are behind on saving. A 2022 survey from Bankrate found that 55 percent of respondents indicated they were behind on their retirement savings, while 35 percent reported being "significantly behind."

Though laws governing retirement contributions have made it easier for people to catch up, it's still better to begin saving once you enter the professional arena, which for most people is some time in their early to mid-20s. The longer you delay saving for retirement, the more precarious your financial future becomes.

- Spending beyond your means – The post-pandemic increase in cost-of-living has garnered considerable attention in recent years, when inflation has driven up the cost of just about everything. There's little consumers can do about the rising cost of living, but making a concerted effort to curtail spending is one way to combat the spike.

However, surveys indicate many people earning significant salaries are living paycheck-to-paycheck. For example, a 2021 report from LendingClub Corporation found that nearly 40 percent of individuals with annual incomes greater than \$100,000 live paycheck to paycheck, with 12 percent reporting they are struggling to pay their bills.

An assortment of variables undoubtedly contribute to that stark reality, and one might be a tendency for consumers to spend beyond their means. Individuals who are struggling to curtail their spending are urged to seek the help of a certified financial planner who can help them devise a budget and alleviate some of the stress and pressure associated with overspending or living paycheck to paycheck.

- Poor use of credit – Credit cards can be a financial safety blanket, but that blanket can soon smother con-

sumers who don't know how and when to utilize credit.

Reserve credit cards for emergency situations and resist the temptation to use them for daily expenses, such as groceries and gas. Credit card interest rates tend to be in the double digits, so unless card holders can pay their balances in full each month, they're only exacerbating the already high cost of living by using credit for daily expenses.

- Buying too much house – Overspending on housing is another financial mistake, and arguably the one that's the most difficult to avoid. It can be hard to walk away from a dream home, but such a decision could secure your financial future.

Unfortunately, data indicates far too many individuals are spending more on housing than conventional financial wisdom recommends. The most recent Consumer Expenditure Survey from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics found that spending on housing accounted for 33 percent of the average household's monthly expenses and that the average household spent 88 percent of its after-tax income each month. That latter figure is especially troubling, as conventional financial wisdom recommends a saving rate of 20 percent. Overspending on housing greatly affects a person's ability to save and invest, so resisting the temptation to buy that expensive dream home could be the difference between a secure or scary financial future.

Avoiding some common mistakes can help individuals be more financially flexible and secure over the long haul.

### Know the Formula for Good Credit

Forbes says there are five categories that add up to good credit:

1. Payment history (35 percent) – Always pay bills on time.
2. Amounts owed (30 percent) – Borrow a low amount compared to the total lines of credit. This also is known as credit utilization.
3. Length of credit history (15 percent) – Keeping accounts open for a long time is a win.
4. New credit (10 percent) – Do not apply for too much new credit too often.
5. Credit mix (10 percent) – Having a balance of different types of credit, such as car loans, credit cards and other types of debt, is advantageous.

### Share your Own Experiences

Sometimes the best way to teach about credit is to be honest about what a parent or another adult did wrong with his or her finances, and use that as a “what not to do” scenario.



I will be writing this week's column to fill you in on some pretty big life changes I have undergone recently.

On December 16, I graduated from UW-Stevens Point with a double major in fisheries and aquatic sciences and water resources, minors in soil science and biology, and a wetland science certificate. (I know that is a mouthful, but I never tell people all the things because it is, and now is my chance!)

Example: the U.S. Forest Service wants to log a section of National Forest, but they need to build a logging road that will cross a stream that contains bull trout. It will be my job to add insight to where would be the best location, and what would be the best way to build the road with having the least amount of impact to bull trout.

I quickly want to note: I actually didn't even apply for this position. After I completed my job in Arizona this summer, my resume was sent around and the supervisor out of the USFWS office in Missoula called me, now the rest is history!

I do want to acknowledge that there were many people who aided in this transition, and I would not have been able to do it without them.

As excited as I am to move out to Montana, I would be lying if I said it is all happy emotions that I'm feeling right now. I have been extremely

fortunate to live with or very close to my best friends for the last four and a half years. My closest girl friends have been like the sisters I never had, and I know I will never lose that relationship with them, but it is bittersweet to watch it change. Moving away from my family is going to be the most difficult. In all honesty I don't even really know how to put it into words.

It would be inappropriate for me to not include a section on my dad. I think my dad has been the most impactful person to me, and is a large part of the person that I am today. You may know, I went on my first camping trip when I was only a few months old, and that was not just a one-time deal. In a lot of ways, I was raised surrounded by the outdoors. While our mission was always to harvest something on our countless hunting and fishing trips, I think the real goal of his was simply for us to appreciate time together outdoors. 


