## Campbellsport Qualifies Four Cougars for State

Senior Joseph Volz and freshman Emma Batzler won sectional titles, and sophomore Jacob Allickson and senior JJ Ksiosk each took second to qualify for the 2024 State Wrestling Tournament. This will be Volz's third time getting to state, while it will be the first trip for Allickson, Ksiosk, and Batzler.

Volz, wrestling at 215 pounds, had no issues with his first two matches, pinning both opponents in the second period. This set up a rematch against

ninth-ranked Nate Grooms of Lake Country Lutheran. Volz beat Grooms 6-4 in the regional championship the week before. Volz left no doubt this time around, dominating the match, winning 10-2 for his third sectional championship.

At 157 pounds, Ksiosk pinned his first two opponents in the first period and this set up a rematch against eighth ranked Sawyer Dailey of Plymouth, who beat Ksiosk 8-2 the week before in the regional championship. Ksiosk found himself down 6-2 in the third and got an escape and takedown to make it 6-5. Ksiosk cut

Dailey and went for the tie and ended up getting the takedown he needed with 18 seconds left to tie the match. However, Dailey ended up getting a reversal and put Ksiosk to his back to get a 12-7 win.

At 113 pounds, Allickson won his first match 16-3 and then earned a first period pin to earn his birth to state. In the finals, he met Brent Krejcarek of Kewaskum. Allickson wrestled a solid match but ended up losing 6-2.

Freshman Logan Knoeck (106) and senior Karsten

## Magdeline Braun

The best, and first task, any historian should do is interview the oldest persons they know about the oldest people they remember as a child. This is why Elaine Koenig (1932-2006) should be thanked. In the early 1990s, she published *Family Stories*, in which she documented the history of the Braun family in Eden by talking to her elders. Direct quotes below are used with permission of the family, and they are out of respect to retain the integrity of Elaine's research.

### On Faith and Language

One key element in Elaine's book was her focus on the matriarch of the Braun Family, Magdeline Wilkomm Braun, who was born in what was Prussia in 1827. (She is called Magdalena here because that's what the family called her.) Her family settled near the Nabob area in Washington County. Her husband, Nicholas Braun, was also born in Prussia (1818) and came to the United States in 1846. He settled on a rented farm in Washington County and built a log cabin. Although he got his land grant for Eden Township in 1849, the 1850 census still had Nicholas and Magdalena as Washington County residents.

Given religion was so important to settlers, what was it like to move from Prussia to Washing-

# Weeding Out Marijuana Myths

The Wisconsin Assembly introduced and passed legislation to legalize medical marijuana. The bill as described by Assembly leader Vos, would approve the use of medical marijuana for patients diagnosed with cancer, epilepsy, AIDS, glaucoma, Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome, severe cases of chronic pain, muscle spasms or nausea, multiple sclerosis, inflammatory bowel disease and terminal illness. The marijuana would be available in oral form, patches, oils or via a nebulizer treatment, but not by smoking. Vos further described this bill as being the strictest in the country and said the state would run five dispensaries across the state for patients to access the drug.

The Senate disagreed with some key components of the Assembly bill and did not formulate their own bill. With the entire Wisconsin legislature ending its work sessions in March, it is unlikely this bill will be passed this year, and it, and those who would benefit from medical marijuana, will have to wait until next year when the legislator returns to work.

While Wisconsin Democrats wish to legalize both medicinal and recreational marijuana in accordance with the wishes of a majority of citizens, Republican legislators refuse to consider full legalization due to concerns of addiction and other societal problems. A Marquette University poll found that 64% of Wisconsin residents support full legalization of marijuana and 83% support medical marijuana.

There are many myths related to marijuana. Let's see if we can weed out the false beliefs and focus on the facts.

**Myth No. 1:** Marijuana is a gateway drug that leads the user to try other, harsher drugs. Research by the National Institute of Health (NIH) indicates that there is no evidence that using marijuana leads to using other illegal drugs. People who believe this myth point out that many people who use other illegal drugs like heroin initially started using marijuana. This demonstrates a correlation between the two drugs, not that one causes the other. Using this type of faulty reasoning, you could also argue that drinking milk leads to drug use, because all people who use drugs at one time drank milk.

**Myth No. 2:** Everyone that uses marijuana becomes addicted. Further research by the NIH demonstrates that the addiction risk for marijuana users is less than 10%. In contrast, researchers say that alcohol and nicotine, both legal substances for adults, are as addictive as opioids and cocaine. Furthermore, there has been no documentation of any deaths caused by marijuana overdose in an adult.

**Myth No. 3:** Marijuana legalization will lead to an increase in crime and accidents. Research by the University of Colorado showed no increase in DUIs or crime. They also noted a decrease in opioid use and related overdose deaths.

**Myth No. 4:** Marijuana users will become unhealthy. Again, research by the University of Colorado, where marijuana has been legal for over 10 years, found this to be untrue. Recreational marijuana users in the state were found to be healthier than non-users and 80% reported using marijuana right before or after working out to decrease muscle inflammation. John Hopkins also found that older Americans who used marijuana reported a 4.8% decrease in

pain and a 6.6% improvement in their health status.

While the facts indicate marijuana is not the dangerous drug some believe, it is still a drug and should be used responsibly. John Hopkins University found that for those people with a family history of mental health issues, marijuana, alcohol and other drugs could increase the risk of developing a psychosis. The NIH found that although smoking marijuana does not increase a person's risk for developing emphysema as in smoking cigarettes, it can increase the risk of respiratory infections. Children are at increased risk for health problems when taking any drugs, including alcohol, nicotine and marijuana, and should not be exposed to any of these substances.

Across the nation, Wisconsin is rather late in entering the group of states that have already legalized marijuana. Thirty-eight states have legalized medical marijuana and 24 states have legalized recreational marijuana use, including Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Minnesota.

According to the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, legalizing recreational marijuana would generate 166 million dollars in tax revenue each year. The current bill for legalizing medical marijuana in the state would be a tax neutral plan, with five state run dispensaries across the state providing the drug at cost.

It remains to be seen how this new medical marijuana bill will change as it works its way through the Assembly and Senate. Although it is not the total legalization supported by a majority of Wisconsinites, it does represent a small ray of hope for the thousands of citizens suffering from some chronic conditions.

ton County then to Eden all the while maintaining faith-based traditions? In addition, Elaine's research aligns with the belief that the couple had 13 children, four of which did not make it to childhood. One child may have died in Washington County, and "A daughter and son died in 1857 on the Eden farm of scarlet fever. Another son died in 1858 of diphtheria," (p.3). The Braun's became a staple name in Eden Township throughout the 1900s, but it is important to acknowledge the disease that threatened rural life and their family in the mid-1800s. Clearly the constant risk of losing your children pervaded settler life. How did that impact Magdalena's faith?

Magdalena spent nearly 60 years on the farmstead on the west side of what is currently Eagle Road in the town of Eden. Where does a German Catholic go to church in 1880? Although they were from Eden, Nicholas and Magdalena did not go to St. James. In addition, the church in Eden village was not built until she was in her 60s. According to Elaine, Nicholas Braun was one of the founding members of St. Matthew in Campbellsport. The appeal was that the church near New Cassel had masses said in German, as there were many German-speaking members. Descendants of the couple did attend St. James. However, "Even after St. Mary's Catholic Church in Eden was founded in 1888, Magdeline Braun attended the German-speaking church in Campbellsport," (p.5).

Language not only impacted church selection, but also which grandchildren received treats. One way to reward German speakers in the family was candy. Magdalena "kept a bag of candy (peppermint drops) on a shelf in her bedroom that she gave to the grandchildren who visited her. The John Braun children didn't get as much candy as the Henry Braun children because they couldn't 'talk' German and the Henry Braun children could. (Magdalena Braun spoke only German, but she could understand some English.) Ag Braun said the Peter Braun children who lived in the house [with Magdalena] never got any candy," (p.25).

**Ways of Life**

Elaine Koenig's book salvaged many memories of the old ways in Magdalena's life. She points out that Magdalena's German frame was stout, and her years on the farm were ones filled with sheep. "Nicholas Braun was a small man, but his wife Magdeline, was big and strong. Oscar Braun remembers his father, John Braun, telling him that when Magdeline worked out in the fields when her children were babies, she would set them in the shade of a grain shock. Jerome Braun remembers being told that Magdeline covered every inch of the farm on her hands and knees (clearing the land). Ag Braun Meade said 'Magdelina', as she was called, was so strong she was able to lift a sheep and put it in the sheep wash by herself. (The sheep had to be washed before they were sheared.) The sheep wash was a round pond back in a field where the Braun girls also went swimming," (p.4). It is still hard to verify if Magdalena used a sheep dip to treat the sheep for lice, ticks or scabbies. But

there is no doubt she was strong enough if she had to. At least there is validation that the Milwaukee River west of Eagle Road was known for the sheep which ran through it.

Grapes were another important element on the old Braun farm. Magdalena and daughters, "picked bushels and bushels of grapes that grew along the stone fences. They used a cider press to squeeze out the juice to make wine which was kept in wooden kegs in the basement. Ag Braun Meade recalls when she was living on the homestead the cellar doors were left open in the fall as the sunshine would make the wine work. Magdelina also made currant wine, apple cider, and beer." (p.4)

One question on the grapes. What type were they? Are they the same species hanging naturally in Ashford and St. Kilian vicinity, where the Ruppinger family makes wild grape wine out of the fruit that is a remnant of the past? How did the Braun's adjust for the taste of the grapes compared to what they used in Prussia?

A unique experience Elaine charted was one which involved marriage in the Braun family. There were double weddings. But what about triple weddings? Magdelina witnessed this of her daughters too. "...Catherine (Katie) Braun married James Maney (she was his second wife). Louisa Braun married Christian (Chris) Kierig, and Helen Braun married August Stenz in a triple marriage ceremony at St. Matthew's Church in Campbellsport on April 21, 1885. After the wedding, the three couples walked across the fields at the back of the farm to the railroad crossing. There they flagged the train which took them to Milwaukee for their honeymoons," (p.5-6).

**Memories in Death**

Magdalena died at the farm she created. Elaine's research intertwined it with apple peelings, hacks and Agnes Braun Meade. Elaine explained her death, "In February of 1910, Magdalena was taking apple peelings out to the back entrance of the house. She slipped and fell and broke her hip. She was in bed the rest of her life. Her daughters took turns coming to help Julia Braun (Peter's wife) take care of her," (p.27). She died in late September that year.

In chapter four, "The First Automobile," she explains how John Braun [Magdalena's son] bought an Overland from Doc Jerry McCarty, a dentist. There were three lessons. One was the Overland wasn't a good car. The second was in 1910, horses were still the preferred method over automobiles. And third, watch out for hills too big to go over. "The car was a mistake. Its weakness was that the axels would break down, and they'd have to put a stone boat under the side that was down and drag it home. John didn't use the auto for Magdeline Braun's funeral in 1910, because the other families were using horses and hacks, and the auto would have scared the horses," (p.22).

A 'hack' is basically a horse drawn carriage, in this case likely reserved transportation for this funeral. Elaine's mother May (Braun), Magdalena's granddaughter, was five years old at the time and remembered the funeral. "John, her pa, May and Annie, her Ma, sat in one seat of a hack and Uncle Henry, her cousin Emmie, and Aunt Emma sat in the other seat facing them," (p.27). How they got to the funeral becomes part of the memory of the era in which grandma lived and died. It is just one of the many interesting details Elaine found through her work.

In her introduction of her book, Elaine clear-

ly states, "I am indebted to my mother's cousin, Agnes Braun Meade, who was 96 when I first interviewed her, for vivid memories of Magdeline Braun, the stern matriarch of the Braun family. Ag lived on the Braun homestead with her family, the Peter Brauns, and her grandmother...until Magdalena's death in 1910."

The story of Magdalena started with her birth in 1827, and the story on Agnes Meade, who lived 102 years, closed with her passing in 1996. In between was nearly 170 years of history to discuss the changes that occurred. Elaine deserves a lot of credit for honoring her ancestry, and she did it well because she talked to the oldest people living about the elders whom they remembered long ago.

## New Baiting and Feeding Ban for Ozaukee County Effective Now

### WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was recently notified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) that a farm-raised deer on a deer farm in Sheboygan County tested positive for chronic wasting disease (CWD). This positive result is within 10 miles of the Fond du Lac, Ozaukee and Washington county borders, resulting in a new baiting and feeding ban that went into effect in Ozaukee County on February 15.

State law requires that the DNR enact a three-year baiting and feeding ban in counties where CWD has been detected and a two-year ban in adjoining counties within 10 miles of a CWD detection. If additional CWD cases are found during the lifetime of a baiting and feeding ban, the ban will renew for an additional two or three years.

This detection will cause the following:

Ozaukee began a two-year baiting and feeding ban on February 15. Sheboygan, Fond du Lac and Washington counties renewed the bans already in place. The DNR also reminds the public that it is illegal to hunt over an area previously used for legal baiting and feeding until that area is completely free of bait or feed for 10 consecutive days.

Baiting or feeding deer encourages them to congregate unnaturally around a shared food source where infected deer can spread CWD through direct contact with healthy deer or by leaving behind infectious prions in their saliva, blood, feces and urine.

Americans move an average of 12 times in their lifetime. I lived in three different places as a child, four as a young adult and lastly, moved one time into the home we have been in for the past 20-plus years. I plan on probably moving at least one more time and although that is below the average, it seems like a lot. For many, including myself, moving is a daunting task albeit exciting.

It can be a fresh start beginning with unadorned walls that are ready for your personal touches. Or a chance to return to the place you originated and reconnect with your

past. Moving can be thrilling, an adventure, something to look forward to. Moving can also be stressful and overwhelming. In one month, Kewaskum Public Library will be moving into our new location. Is this an exciting prospect? Of course it is. Will the move be a lot of work? You betcha. Is moving a library comparable to moving your home? Not at all.

When the library moved into its current location many years ago, Girl Scouts helped with the transfer of books. I do not know how many books were in the collection at that time, but I am thinking not more than a couple hundred at most. Presently, our collection consists of more than 25,000 items, mainly books but also media, kits and special collections. We have hired moving special-

ists with library expertise and even with that, it will take approximately a week to relocate and reorganize. That is a hopeful timeline.

I have had many suggestions to help offset the financial costs of our move, and although I truly appreciate the caring that goes into these thoughts, the reality is that anything less than professional library movers would result in weeks or months of to get settled. Our primary goal to have the library functional with the services we offer as soon as possible would be defeated with the plans we have to move.

As soon as we knew about the relocation, which was recent, I went into move mode and began measuring shelves, creating charts and calculating with math skills I thought I would never have use of after high

school. With the structural support of the new location, we will not be able to have our entire collection available for browsing. Plans are in place to increase the floor load, but that will take time as funding is an issue. I have recreated the placement charts many times over and am now in a holding pattern waiting for more information from our planner.

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# Task Force Conducts Hearings and Finalizes Conference Realignment Plans

## WISCONSIN INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Conference Realignment Task Force reconvened at the executive staff office Thursday, Feb. 8, to conduct hearings for modified requests and finalize solution proposals to advance to the Board of Control.

The current realignment process addresses sports other than football for implementation in 2025-26. Football-only conference realignment consideration occurs on an alternate-year rotation.

A new conference was created to provide Kewaskum and Plymouth with conference affiliation after the East Central Conference was dissolved by the Task Force. The new, seven-school conference to be named later, includes Grafton, Port Washington, West Bend East and West Bend West, which move from the North Shore Conference; Sheboygan South, which moves from the Fox River Classic; and the two

former East Central Conference schools.

The conference configurations for all the modified realignment plans, as well as all the original realignment proposals submitted, are available on the Conference Realignment Requests and Proposals page of the WIAA Website.

The Board of Control will hear any appeals of plans modified or rejected at the Task Force meeting and will vote on the recommendations of the Task Force at its meeting Tuesday, March 5. The Board has the options to approve, reject or remand realignment recommendations back to the Task Force.

If approved, the modifications will be implemented for the 2025-26 sports seasons. If remanded, the Task Force will reconvene to make appropriate changes to the plan before presenting it to the Board of Control again in April. If rejected, the conferences will remain in their current configuration.

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

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

Campbellsport received the No. 11 seed in the Division 3 WIAA Tournament and will travel to play the No. 6 seed Wrightstown on February 27.





win on Tuesday, Feb. 13.

Looking back at how the team got here, Head Coach Scott Rhoads said, "It was such an interesting season," as major injuries affecting the team had him worried that team state wouldn't be possible.

"We knew we were predicted to be a stronger team in our sectional this season, but then returning state podium wrestler Dylan Soyk broke his ankle in the last football game of his season, and our returning team captain, Casey Schmidt, tore his meniscus," explained Rhoads.

The wrestlers who stepped up to fill the open spots in the line-up did a "phenomenal job," according to Rhoads. Kewaskum won the Gunslinger tournament back in December and placed fifth out of 71 teams at the Oshkosh On The Water tournament proving they were a strong team as predicted.

Soyk returned in time for the Winneconne dual near the end of January where Kewaskum won, 47-21. Since then, the team has been fortunate to avoid anymore injuries or illness.

"Our team really grew together this year," Rhoads said. "We've taken the team perspective to new levels this year, and they work so hard for each other and with each other. We've had individuals grow exponentially this year and qualified eight kids for the state tournament. Two of those are freshman!"

In addition to being able to fill all weight classes and avoiding injuries, Rhoads further explained what it took to achieve their team and individual state goals.

"We focused on a lot of mind-

set, keeping our eyes short... It's important not to talk about whats at the end of the season too much. The end of the season will pan itself out based on how we treat each day and each event each week...But our culture is probably the main aspect. We have a lot of kids that like to show up for extra work: six a.m. workouts daily with at least six to eight of our kids every morning. They are guided by great captains and leaders on the team that hold the bar high for everyone."

The team captains this season are seniors Schmidt, Kaiden Naumann and Nic Deheck.

"These three men demonstrate amazing leadership and passion for our team," acknowledged Rhoads. "They are selfless and oversee a lot of parts to our team. Casey and Kaiden have not had long term wrestling careers but were chosen captains because they love to show up and care a lot about our whole program. Casey had a torn meniscus and didn't compete this season but was still present every day he could be, typically working out on his own or supporting. Nic would probably be considered our Head Captain, as he was also a junior captain but also had the longest wrestling career of them all. He refuses to miss anything, and in the mornings, he makes sure people are getting to those extra workouts."

Another senior leader Rhoads had more to say about is Soyk.

"I'm proud of Dylan Soyk for working hard to get back into wrestling," praised Rhoads. "His ankle injury was very serious and he needed surgery, but he followed through on his rehab and was able to come back to help the team. Sadly, he just didn't have the time to catch up

to our opponents' cardio and shape, so he fell short of state this year"

Rhoads last wanted to recognize Oliver Voight.

"Oliver Voight is a senior that so many of our younger athletes look up to," shared Rhoads. "He's been extraordinarily sound and positive about the cruddy situation he faced this season, where he had to fight over and over with one of his good friends, Braden Gissal, for our 175 spot in the line-up. He came extremely close in every wrestle-off match they had but couldn't pull it off. You'd expect most teenagers to storm away and give up on the team, but Oliver has been right in there every day no matter what, ready for his next chance to help our team where we need him."

Rhoads concluded, "I could go on about so many of our athletes. They've all made sacrifices for our team and each other, and they all see our big picture; we work hard together, so we can have a lot of fun competing hard in this rough sport."

Kewaskum will be wrestling in the Team State tournament on March 2 at the UW-Madison Fieldhouse, with semifinals beginning at 10 a.m.

However, individual state is this week from February 22-24 at the Kohl Center.

This past weekend at the Division 2 Sectional in Campbellsport, a record eight individuals from Kewaskum qualified for state: Carter Heimerman (106), Brent Krejcarek (113), James Racer (126), Ethan Immel (132), Bryston Scoles (138), Kage Weseman (150), Nic Deheck (165), and Braden Gissal (175). As a team, Kewaskum placed first with 189.5 points.


