## Four Indians Medal at the Individual State Wrestling Tournament

A record eight Kewaskum Indian wrestlers qualified for the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Individual State Tournament that occurred last week from February 22-24, and in the end, four placed receiving medals.

Senior Nic Deheck (165) and junior Brent Krejcarek (113) placed sixth, while sophomore Ethan Immel (132) and freshman Bryston Scoles (138) placed third.

Deheck was returning to the state tournament for a second time since qualifying his sophomore

year. After facing difficulties his junior year, Head Coach Scott Rhoads said, "He came back very strong and focused this season, so we are super proud of his finish as sixth place on the podium this season."

In the first match, Deheck won by a 6-2 decision over Drake Petersen from Saint Croix Falls, but lost the next match by a 7-4 decision to Jeremiah Avery from Prairie du Chien. He moved to the third place bracket where he defeated Bryson Schmid from Wittenberg-Birnamwood by a 10-3 decision. He faced Conner Melton from Spooner/

Freshman Emma Batzler was the first to take the mats on Thursday where she wrestled Addison Olson of Peshtigo. Batzler wrestled tough, however she ended up losing 8-0 and did not get a wrestleback. Olson ended up taking third in the tournament. Batzler, the first girl to ever make it to the girls' state tournament, finished her season with a 23-10 record.

Next up was sophomore Jacob Allickson who faced Drew Ryder of Bloomer/Colfax. Allickson found himself down 5-0 going into the third period, but got an escape and a takedown to cut the lead to 5-3. Allickson almost had Ryder turned in a spladle a couple times, but time ran out. Allickson finished his season with a 30-15 record.

Senior JJ Ksioszk wrestled next and took on

## Greenbush Bikers Rejoice!

The mountain biking trails at Greenbush Recreation Area of the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit have been adopted by a new organization, Sheboygan County Cycling (SCC) which became a 501c (3) non-profit in February of 2022. The group’s mission is to promote all forms of cycling, for all people who live, work, and play in Sheboygan County.  
The winter of 2023-2024 marked the first year that SCC groomed the Greenbush trails for winter off-road/fat-tire biking. This came about thanks to a land use agreement with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the financial support of sponsors and members. This winter the SCC utilized two groomers at Greenbush. The first was a 1980s snowmobile with a drag behind it to pack down the snow. One of the group’s volunteers, Dan Meyer, manufac-

tured the drag in his garage. The second groomer was what is known as a Snowdog. It is a small one-person stand-up snow craft that maneuvers excellently around the tight corners of the Greenbush trails. A special thanks goes out to this year’s groomers, Dan Meyer, Dave Hasse, and Tom Reis.  
Grooming proved to be a challenge this winter with the two large back-to-back January snowstorms that dumped nearly three feet of snow. It took a crew of more than 15 volunteers on snowshoes to help pack the trail and clear fallen branches from the trail before the groomers could go out. Then came the bitter cold followed by the great melt-down. The group was able to groom the trails after last week’s snowstorm.  
Equipment for this first year was made possible thanks to a borrowing agreement with At-



Manitowoc Public School District. He then became a World History, U.S. in a Global Perspective teacher at Waukesha South High School. After that, Wittig served as a school counselor for Slinger Middle School. He is currently the associate principal at North High School of the Sheboygan Area School District.

Each position brought enjoyment to Wittig. In his first educational job, Wittig had the opportunity to team-teach with an English teacher a group of struggling learners.

“It was a great experience,” he said. “We taught History and English through various novels. I loved connecting with the students in the unique atmosphere.”

Student discussions were lively during his time teaching U.S. in a Global Perspective. Students learned how the United States was impacted by current events around the world. Wittig said the class challenged how everyone thought.

titude Sports located in Fond du Lac. Currently, SCC is fund raising to purchase a Snowdog single track groomer which will be stored at Greenbush for easy and consistent use. This will help the SCC groomers produce a higher-quality winter cycling experience for everyone. For more information about Sheboygan County Cycling and the group's fundraiser check out their website at [sheboygan-countycycling.org](http://sheboygan-countycycling.org).

With the current freeze-thaw cycles, the group recommends heading out to bike the trails early in the day before the ground thaws. It is best to bike on frozen dirt and not mud. This practice will protect the trail tread and reduce the amount of trail maintenance.

Bikers need to be mindful of other trail users from hikers and snowshoers to horseback riders and cross-country skiers. At Greenbush, the bike

trails cross other trails at multiple locations, so bikers should make sure they remain on the bike trails.

Bikers over 16-years-old using the Greenbush Trails need a Wisconsin State Park System annual or daily trail pass. Folks can purchase trail passes at a self-registration station or from a staffed State Park System office. This trail pass also works for State Bike Trails, horseback riding trails, cross-country trails, and in-line skating paths that require them. A Wisconsin State Park System vehicle admission sticker is required to park in the parking lots at Greenbush. People can buy a vehicle sticker at the same locations as the passes.

With Sheboygan County Cycling adopting the Greenbush Recreation Area mountain biking trails, mountain and fat-tire bikers should rejoice! This new partnership between the SCC and the Department of Natural Resources can only lead to awesome biking on excellent trails.



“The festival gives students a chance to come and sing in a college environment, and for a lot of the smaller schools in the area this gives their students the experience of singing in a large choir. The event is entirely funded through donation which has allowed us to minimize financial access barriers and bring people to a mass choir setting that they might not otherwise have had access to.”

The festival is offered free of charge to

the high school singers through financial support by Bob Booty of Oshkosh. Booty is a longtime supporter of the Department of Music and has played as a community member with the Ripon College Wind Ensemble since 1980 and the Ripon College Orchestra since 1995.

He supports Ripon College music because “it’s something I like,” he says. “It’s fun, and I think it should be fun for other people and students, too.”

**Howes the Fishing**

Before I go any further with this week’s column, I would like to thank all of the good people that sent me emails and texts after the column that my daughter Selina wrote, as well as the one I wrote about Selina. I would have to say that Selina’s column was one of the top two or three with readers in the last 34 years. We speak every day, and she truly has become a woman of the Rocky Mountains.

The week before this trip, I kind of went through the ice a bit and so, I decided that maybe I should take a week off from winter camping on the ice. My good pal, Gary Howe, who is a former four generation newspaper man, and his cousin, John Howe, are dyed in the wool-going to go out no matter what the weather, river rats. Though Gary ice fishes, many of their winter stories are of fishing out of boats and often by pushing their boats through ice below the dams at Lynxville and Guttenberg on the Mississippi River.

**Wednesday, February 7**

**High 41, Low 30**

I have to make a confession. I, Mark Walters, do not vertical jig for walleye enough and, therefore, I am not very good at it when I do.

This morning just after night became day and there was a cold wind blowing, Gary, John Howe, and I launched John’s extremely nice 18.6 semi v, Crestliner into the Mississippi near Prairie du Chien. Our plan was to drift, use spot lock on John’s trolling motor and to also just very slowly work our way up against the current and jig with 3/8’s ounce jigs tipped with a minnow.

Anyone that fishes with me knows that sometimes I have to experiment and today I started out with a Buckshot Jigging Spoon and at least today, the local sauger population was not hungry for what I was jigging.

There were four boats and nine fishermen working about a 300-yards stretch of river. Often, we would be within 20-yards of each other and every-

one knew each other and got along great.

John and Gary had the hot sticks and were landing some beautiful sauger, 17 inches, and when I finally went over to a 3/8’s ounce orange and green glitter jig with a Christmas lights tail, tipped with a stinger hook and minnow, I realized that I really do not suck as bad as I thought.

I would have to say that the best memory of the day was watching Dave Ralph, who is a well-known, very good fishermen in the area and one of Gary’s buddies from childhood, fight and land a very large sturgeon on six-pound test. When we took photos, Dave said that he had read Selina’s story the week before and that he wanted me to tell Selina that he was proud of her. Since Selina is my editor, I guess she will see this.

The Howe boys honestly are very tough and addicted to the water and we fished from the very cold hours of early morning until mid-afternoon. We kept a nice batch of sauger and three catfish and then after trailering the boat, headed over to the Eagles Club “Aerie 1502” for a cold beverage and good company. This fraternal organization does really good things for heart and cancer research and both Gary and John are proud to be members of it.

**Thursday, February 8**

**High 45**

John was busy today, so we fished out of one of Gary’s boats which is a 16-foot jon boat pushed by a 30 hsp Yamaha, no electronics, no trolling motor on this day.

I started out with a 3/8’s ounce jig and the sauger were hungry. This is skill/finesse fishing if there is such a thing, when a sauger hits, it generally was either the fish putting its head on the jigs at the bottom of the river or one tug and gone.

I had a blast and as is always the case with Gary, we never ran out of things to talk about.

Once again, we fished until mid-afternoon. At one point, I believe that I had a sturgeon on and it was great to be on the river.

My near future is all about living on the ice, but I have to tell you the boat is a very close second!







Webster in the next match, and he lost by a 4-2 decision. In the fifth place match, Deheck faced Avery, again, and lost by an 11-5 decision to place sixth.

“Nic is our senior team captain and has brought an amazing mood and atmosphere to our team and program,” added Rhoads.

Deheck finished his last season with a 39-12 record.

On Scoles’ experience, Rhoads said, “He had a tough placement in his bracket and faced the future state champion in his first match of the tournament and took a tough 6-5 loss. This is such a challenge as the first match brings a lot of pressure for someone who hasn’t had any Kohl Center matches, yet.”


Czuppa led Kewaskum in scoring on the night with 15 points.
