In Last Meeting at Village Hall, Kewaskum Board Approves \$9.5 Million Bond for New Facility

The Kewaskum Village Board held its last meeting at the Village Hall and Municipal Complex at 204 1st Street on Monday, April 1, with the board approving funding for a new facility at the same site.

Joe Murray with Ehlers, the village's financial firm on the project, informed the board that the mechanism for borrowing had changed after the state government changed a rule on municipal borrowing via general obligation promissory notes. The state now allows borrowing for 20-year periods, which was the village's preferred timeframe.

"Now you can do this all at one time," said Murray, noting the rule-change helped streamline the borrowing aspect in this case.

Murray said he expects the debt to increase taxes in the village by a rate of 82 cents (per \$1,000).

The village can revisit the interest rate in 10 years and refinance in the event rates lower by 2034.

The bond issuance of \$9.5 million was approved with all board members voting "yes" and Trustee Justin Weninger abstaining.

Kewaskum to Join County's Lead Lateral Program

Village Administrator Adam Gitter said Kewaskum was invited to join Washington County's lead-lateral removal grant program.

The program exists in two grant forms; one to cover village costs and one to cover residents' costs.

Gitter said at the meeting that there are 11 properties on Fond du Lac Ave. and Main St. that could be included in the funding.

April 1 Meeting Last in the Old Complex

No fooling: the April 1 meeting was the last for the Kewaskum Village Board in the Municipal Complex.

The Tuesday, April 3, Spring Election was the last village operation out of the building, said village officials.

The complex and former library and police building – the Kewaskum Public Library moved to the former PNC Bank building on Fond du Lac Ave. – will be razed to make way for the new village hall and police station.

The village is running administrative operations from 1308 Fond du Lac Ave. (the Annex building).

At the April 1 meeting, Gitter thanked the board for their service.

"Can't thank you enough for all you've done in this room," he said.

Steven Rosales, a 34-year-old Kewaskum police officer, was arrested on Friday, April 5, for his alleged involvement regarding inappropriate conduct toward an 18-year-old female student at Kewaskum High School while Rosales was assigned as the school resource officer.

Rosales was held on felony charges of sexual misconduct by school staff and misconduct in public office. He appeared in custody in a Washington County courthouse on Monday, April 8, for a bond hearing and was released with restrictions after meeting a \$40,000 bail.

"To say these allegations are a shock would be an understatement. As a parent and your police chief I am saddened and angered. This officer be-


Why It Matters

trayed the trust of the Kewaskum Police Department, the Kewaskum School District, and most importantly, the community our officers take an oath to serve with professionalism, integrity and respect," Kewaskum Police Chief Thomas Bishop said.

Formal charges are expected to come within two weeks. Rosales has been placed on administrative leave pending the completion of a formal employment discipline process.

Although the student was 18 years old and a consenting adult at the time of the misconduct, the problem is that she is a student, and Rosales was a staff member in the school and an authority figure. At this time there is no evidence to suspect there are any other victims, according to Bishop.

The student's parents reported the issue on Friday, April 5. Bishop was on vacation in New York with his family when he received a call from Dr. Mark Bazata, district administrator of Kewaskum School District, about the report.

After being notified, Police Chief Thomas Bishop immediately initiated an internal investigation. To maintain transparency and impartiality, Bishop requested the West Bend Police Department conduct the independent investigation based upon mutual assistance.

While his family remained on vacation, Bishop flew home on Saturday.

Bishop met with police staff members and school administration on Sunday. Then, on Monday, he met with Kewaskum School District staff

members as they were informed of the situation.

Rosales has been with the Kewaskum Police Department for nearly seven years and has been the department's school resource officer for the past two years. He was recently promoted to lieutenant, the department's second in command, to replace Mark Steiner, who retired from the Kewaskum Police Department on April 1.

"It's just a shock. The whole department is shocked. I'm particularly shocked and really hurt on top of it. This is a guy I was promoting, a guy I was going to spend the rest of my career working with. We were going to run this police department together. He had a lot of good ideas for being a lieutenant and what we can change and improve on, and I thought it was going to be great," Bishop said. "We were friends on top of it, and suddenly one day I found out I apparently never knew who that guy was."

Rosales has a wife and a young daughter. Bishop knows the whole family.

"When you are this small of a department, it's cliché, but it's like a family. You know people's personal stuff. So, it just adds that layer of shock to it," Bishop said.

Community members also have been shocked by the news, with many writing comments on the police department's Facebook page. Since becoming chief, Bishop has worked to build community relations. One of the things he has done to do that is create videos, many of which featured Rosales.

"Steven was an integral part of those videos. He was funny and approachable. He just was really good in the videos; he was really good in the com-

munity. He really was what I wanted him to be, until Friday," Bishop said.

Bishop has now started the disciplinary process to remove Rosales from the Kewaskum Police Department. With Rosales off duty, the Kewaskum Police Department is now two members short of a full eight-member staff.

"We hold our officers to the highest moral and ethical standards," Bishop said. "What I learned is this particular officer should never have been in law enforcement. He clearly needs to be out of the profession. He is not somebody that should be trusted. So, we need to find an individual that our community can trust, and that's what we are going to do."

Bishop said he and the department will focus on building up trust from the community once again.

"We have the team that can do it. We have good officers. Everybody we have on staff is fantastic now. They really are. We have a really good group of officers who will come together, will get through it, will rebuild it, and we will be better off," Bishop said.

Call 811 Before You Dig to Keep Family and Neighbors Safe

One click or call can prevent catastrophe

Alliant Energy encourages residents and contractors to call 811 before any digging projects. A quick call to 811 or click on call811.com prior to planting trees or shrubs, fencing a yard or building a playset can prevent a fine or a potentially dangerous accident with gas or electric lines.

The announcement coincides with National Safe Digging Month. Spring is a popular time for digging projects, and April is a month to acknowledge the hazards and raise awareness of safe digging practices.

It's not just about the call, it's the law and it can keep you and your neighbors safe. 811 is a national, free service available year-round.

"Everyone is excited to get outside and start working on outdoor projects this time of year," said Adam Marxen, manager of gas integrity and standards for Alliant Energy. "Not knowing what's below the surface can lead to a major disaster. Please slow down and call to have your underground lines marked before you dig."

After you call 811 to describe where and when you plan to dig, utilities mark the locations of buried lines with high-visibility paint or flags. Yellow paint or markings indicate buried natural gas lines; red paint or markings identify electric lines.

When you dig, Alliant Energy advises you to stay 18 inches away from the marked lines. If you must work within the 18-inch tolerance zone, dig by hand with extreme caution.

If you happen to contact natural gas pipelines or electric lines, call 1-800-ALLIANT (800-255-4268). Even minor damage such as nicks, cuts or dents can result in pipeline failure, electrical shock or a major incident, if not properly addressed. Never attempt to fix damaged lines yourself. 

'Indian Burial Mounds of Wisconsin' Presentation

On Tuesday, April 30, at 6 p.m., the library is hosting Naturalist and Wildlife Educator Bill Volkert as he presents a talk entitled, "Indian Burial Mounds of Wisconsin." This presentation is an overview of Mr. Volkert's recently published book on the subject. The discussion will cover the prehistoric mound building periods in Wisconsin, how and perhaps why burial mounds were constructed and the tremendous concentration of Indian mounds in this region of Wisconsin.

The Horicon Marsh represents one of the greatest concentrations of effigy mounds found anywhere in the world! For the first time in its 113-year existence, the Village of Kewaskum held an election recount. The recount on April 14 proved the election canvassers had it right the first time a week ago. Candidate Kevin Scheunemann requested the recount. A three-hour recount found the same

results. Washington County Clerk Brenda Jaszewski and Kewaskum Clerk Stephanie Justmann oversaw the recount. Through financial information received by the village, the Statesman estimated the cost of the recount to be around \$225.

The Kewaskum Town Board highlighted its financial savings of the past year and set priorities for this year during last week's annual meeting. To save money, the recycling center is no longer open Wednesday nights; however, it is open longer on Saturdays. Of the town's \$15,000 contingency account last year, \$4,000 was used. The new reserve account currently has \$18,582. Treasurer Daniel Stoffel would like it to reach and be maintained at \$30,000.

During Monday's meeting, the Kewaskum School Board approved a balanced 2009-10 working budget of nearly \$26 million, a three-percent increase over this year. The expected mill rate is \$8.35 per \$1,000 of equalized value, up 21 cents from this year's \$8.14.

The Kewaskum Board of Education will recommend a 10 percent decrease in board members' salaries at the annual meeting in August. The recommended decrease is \$350. The suggestion made by president Kenworthy was because "we're asking other groups to tighten their belts, we should do the same."

Work began slowly on the Childs/Hakes Cemetery in the Town of Auburn. Cookie Minz said it took six years for the town to section off the cemetery because it was on private property. The family cemetery was used in the 1850s. A group of approximately a dozen volunteers helped clean the cemetery once per year. Three years of work is slated to culminate in May.

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Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week

Schools, businesses, and homes are encouraged to practice going to their nearest tornado shelter during the drills, as if there were an actual tornado warning in effect.

During the drill times, Wisconsin's NWS offices will conduct NOAA Weather Radio tests that can be heard if you are actively listening to those devices or have one programmed to activate on test alerts. Many communities may also choose to test their outdoor warning sirens

during drill times.

Weather warning sirens in Washington County are owned and operated locally by the various cities, villages and towns. Due to this fact, the sirens in your area may have, or may have not, sounded on April 8, depending on participation by the local jurisdiction in the drill, or the fact that a particular system may choose not to deviate from its normal testing schedule.

If there is a threat of severe weather in Wisconsin on April 11, the statewide drills will be postponed until Friday, April 12. The drills will go on in all other conditions, including non-severe weather (clouds, rain, dark sky, scattered thunderstorms, etc.). If severe weather is also expected on Friday, the drills will be cancelled.

All residents of Washington County are encouraged to become familiar with the designated shelter areas and weather procedures needed to be safe if you are at home, school, work, shopping, or on the road. The best way to stay informed about severe weather conditions at home is to purchase a weather radio.

Additional information can be obtained from your local or state Emergency Management Agency, the National Weather Service or your local chapter of the American Red Cross.

Back to the Bush

Back in the late 80's and for several weeks each summer in the 90's, I was a bushman/camp manager for Chimo Lodge and Outposts. I worked for Pete and Elisabeth Hagedorn at any and all of their 11 fly-in locations and in '89 started the column that you are reading while camp manager. I originally called this column North of the Border and I would hand write it no matter where I was. Pete would fly NPO (November Papa Oscar), his Cessna 180, to wherever I was in the bush; I generally worked alone. He then flew my column to Red Lake and would fax it to my publishers Dick and Molly Emerson, owners of the Poynette Press and Deforest Times Tribune.

When my old buddy turned 80, two things happened, he sold Chimo, until then he had been a full-time pilot and bushman. I also started doing an annual trip for his birthday which is April 2 and that is what this week's column is about.

Sunday, March 31
High 36, Low 30

This four-day trip would include ice fishing every day, and just to let you know, there was 30 inches of excellent ice, and the ice road at Red Lake was still open. Today's adventure would be by truck for 30 miles and then off the highway for 26 miles by "bike" (Canadian for utv). Just a

bit of a brain fart on my part, but I thought this adventure was going to be for Lake Trout and that was how I was geared up. In reality, we would be fishing for walleye and also catching "jackfish" (northern pike) on Trout Lake.

Just the ride was worth the price of admission, which in this case was

in Dale and Aileen Butterfield's Polaris 1000 "Ranger." Dale Butterfield is retired from the goldmine and Aileen is basically addicted to hunting and fishing. Earnie and Kim Mesto would be in another bike, and this day was full of adventure and laughs from the first minute.

As soon as we started fishing or

should I say Pete started jigging, it was immediate action as he was catching walleye in the 17 to 21-inch range fast and furious. I have two stories to tell you. First, the last time this gang was out here, Aileen lost a rod to a big fish as it pulled it in before she could grab it. Later that day, they were having a picnic several miles away when a local fishermen and his seven-year-old son pulled up on their snowmachine.
