With her educational and professional background, she brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise to this vital role.

Stodola is committed to upholding the highest standards in death investigation. Through our continued partnership with the Waukesha County Medical Examiner's Office for forensic pathology services, she will ensure that all cases are handled with thoroughness and compassion.

Stodola said, "I am honored to continue to serve Washington County in this new capacity. I look forward to working closely with our community partners to not only provide accurate death investigations but provide insight that can guide prevention efforts and promote community well-being."

Overdose Aid Kits Installed at Local Fond du Lac County Agencies

ADVOCAP, Holy Family Warming Shelter, Fond du Lac County Health Department, and local parents affected by overdose, are working in collaboration with the non-profit organization Clinton Foundation to install Overdose Aid Kits (OAKs) across the community. These newly installed kits will be available at various business locations within Fond du Lac County, starting on Tuesday, January 7. These kits are in addition to the OAKs that have been installed previously at the Gratitude Club and Lighthouse Christian Church in Fond du Lac.

The purpose of the OAKs is to provide life-saving tools and resources for individuals at risk of overdose. These kits contain naloxone (Narcan), a medication that can reverse opioid overdoses, along with other helpful materials such as educational information on how to prevent and respond to overdoses.

"Opioid overdoses can happen at any time and having Narcan on hand can save a life. The Narcan in the OAKs is available for anyone to take, no questions asked, to use in an emergency," said Jessica Geschke, Senior Project Manager at the Clinton Foundation and creator of the OAKs.

This initiative demonstrates a collaborative effort to combat the opioid crisis and provide immediate assistance to those in need, offering a proactive approach to saving lives within the local community. Every life saved is an opportunity for healing, growth, a fresh start toward a brighter future and a path to recovery.

"We are grateful for the Fond du Lac County Health Department's leadership as we seek to combat the opioid crisis. While we know that overdoses are found across backgrounds and demographics, statistics show that about one-third of those experiencing homelessness also suffer from issues with substance abuse. Having access to Narcan and educational materials with the OAK will help us to better care for and educate our guests at the Holy Family Warming Shelter

if the need should ever arise," Holy Family Catholic Community Director of Human Concerns Erin Cobb said.

"Making OAKs available at ADVOCAP reflects our commitment to creating a safe, non-judgmental space where people can get the help they need," says ADVOCAP Executive Director Tanya Marcoe. "Everyone deserves compassion and support, especially in times of crisis. This is one way we hope we can make a difference in the fight against fentanyl."

Maximize Seed Starting Success with a Seed Starting Chart

Now is the time when many of us are busy ordering seeds. We often end up with many seeds, some new ones we needed or wanted and perhaps a few duplicates of those we have left from past seasons. It is easy to overlook some of these as the indoor and outdoor planting season begins.

Save money by inventorying your current seed collection, reducing the risk of ordering seeds you don't need. Decide what seeds you want to keep and grow this season and those you want to pass along to or swap with gardening friends. You may choose to make seed art with older or improperly stored seeds and invest in fresh seeds that are sure to germinate.

If in doubt, check the seed viability of older stored seeds with a simple germination test.

Wrap 10 seeds in a damp paper towel and place them inside a plastic bag. Check the seeds in a week or so to see how many sprout. If all the seeds sprout, follow the planting guidelines on the seed packets. When only half the seeds sprout, you will need to plant the seeds twice as thick and so on.

Check catalogs and your favorite garden center for any seeds you need to purchase. Place your order early for the best selection.

Once the seeds arrive, look at the back of the packet to determine when to start the seeds indoors or out. Many seed companies now provide this information on their website instead of the seed packet. Check with your local University Extension website for recommended planting dates in your area.

Record the start date on your calendar, garden chart, or spreadsheet to make the process easier. Consider organizing your seeds to make it easier to find and plant them at the proper time. You may want to organize the seeds in alphabetical order or by the month for planting. Design a system that works best for you.

You can create your own seed storage organizer or purchase one. Store the seeds in a cool dark





location in an airtight container to help maintain their viability and keep them safe from mice.

Once your seed starting schedule is created and seeds are organized, prepare the space for starting seeds indoors if needed. Make sure your grow lights are in working order and you have sufficient containers, flats, and seed starting mix for planting.

Save money by repurposing yogurt, applesauce,

and similar food containers into seed starting pots. Just clean and add drainage holes. Look for used cell packs, flats, and small pots that can be used again. Disinfect these by soaking them in a one-part bleach and nine-part water solution for ten minutes then rinse with clear water. Repurposing saves you money and helps reduce plastic waste and the risk of disease that could kill your seedlings.

Taking time to plan and organize now can save you money while helping you maximize the pro-

ductivity and beauty of your gardens.







The JV got some action in at the




Abigail Ksioszk wins the New London Cutler Classic tournament in the 120 pound weight class. **SUBMITTED**



VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen who:

- will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day.
- has resided in the ward or municipality where they wish to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election.

The elector must also be registered to vote to receive an absentee ballot.

Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may make written application to your municipal clerk for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by email or at MyVote.wi.gov.

Your written request must include:

1. your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote.
2. the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different from the address above.
3. your signature.
4. A copy of your photo identification.

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:
 5 p.m. on the fifth day before the election,
Thursday, February 13, 2025.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

OutWiGo for Free Fishing Weekend Jan. 18-19

WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is hosting Free Fishing Weekend Jan. 18-19 to share the fun and excitement of winter fishing. During Free Fishing Weekend, anglers of all ages can wet a line in any Wisconsin waters open to fishing without a fishing license, trout stamp or salmon stamp.

All other 2024-2025 Hook and Line regulations including bag limits, size limits and species restrictions remain in effect. While most trout streams are open during the catch-and-release season on Free Fishing Weekend, there are trout streams, spring ponds and lakes that are closed to fishing. Please review the trout regulations or check with your local biologist if you have questions about specific waters. For trout streams that

are open, only artificial lures are allowed, and anglers must release all trout caught.

If you plan to keep fish, review the DNR's Safe Eating Guidelines to stay informed of potential consumption advisories impacting some waterbodies throughout the state.

Winter Fishing Reminders

Before any winter adventure, ice safety should be a primary consideration, as no ice is ever 100% safe.

Dress appropriately for the weather, and remember safety gear:

- Warm layers that are water-resistant
- Sturdy waterproof boots with spike-style creepers for traction
- Extra hat and gloves
- Rescue throw rope

• Ice claws

Remember, the DNR does not monitor ice conditions. However, local bait shops and fishing clubs are good sources for current conditions and fishing tips.

No Ice Fishing Gear? No Problem.

To help get you started, the DNR offers loaner ice fishing equipment at 19 tackle loaner sites around the state. Locations with ice fishing equipment will have an "IF" next to their name. Essential gear is available, although sites do not offer ice augers. Abandoned holes can be opened with a sledgehammer or spud bar.

Hours and available equipment vary, so contact the site in advance and create a plan to pick up the gear.

AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

Deep South Deer Hunt

Hello friends,

I have a solid appreciation for both the people of the southern United States and the lay of the land, which creates a true adventure for an outdoorsman like me. This week and next, I will be writing to you about my annual journey to Delta National Forest in western Mississippi where I would hunt and camp together with my brother, Tom Walters, who lives near Denham Springs, Louisiana.

Tuesday, December 25
High 58, Low 40



For most of our hunts, we travel by skiff or canoe.

As you will find out over the next two weeks, much of this adventure was about the drive to and from Mississippi while pulling my 14-foot, 7,000 pound enclosed trailer rigged for camping. I left my home in Wisconsin on Christmas Eve afternoon with my trusty companions Ruby and Red "goldens." As always when motoring that far, 950 miles, crap happens, but as seems to be the case for the last 35 years, I made it from Point A to Point B.

Delta National Forest, near Rolling Forks, has become one of my go-to places for a southern getaway and that is because it is beautiful, remote, has some big bucks, and I have made some good friends down here that I literally met in the woods four years ago. The following spring they came up to Juneau County and did some serious turkey whacking.

The drive was a challenge as the road construction in some parts seemed to make the road narrower than my trailer and in one stretch it was for 50 miles.

When I arrived where Tom and I would camp for the next seven days, all I cared about was making a quick camp, getting my skiff in the water and paddling to where I whacked a real nice buck last year. In this hunt, I would be using my Bar 300. Here are the rules for harvesting a deer on this hunt: no does can be taken and two bucks which must have either an inside spread of 15-inches or an antler length of 18-inches may be harvested.

My license was good for seven days and cost

\$300, which for the year of 2024 would put me at just over \$2000 in hunting and fishing license fees. In reality, on this hunt, I want to smoke two bucks and hopefully a wild boar but the real goal was met once I put the truck in park, built camp and paddled to paradise well aware that Tom and I would have a great time whacking or not whacking.

The dates of this hunt coincide with what is generally peak rut here and last year I did harvest a buck with an 18-inch spread with antlers that measured 21-inches in length.

I paddled exactly to where I hunted last year and after I walked about 500 yards through a beautiful forest with some of the trees bigger around than a pickup truck, my mood was about as Christmas-day perfect as it could be.

I would be hunting on the ground and was on my hands and knees cleaning out every noise-making leaf, which had just fallen a week earlier, when I noticed movement about 75-yards away, it was a buck. I picked an opening and could see it was a dandy and I could have sent him to heaven but was not sure if he met the shooting requirements. I picked another opening and figured he had the antler length but was still not confident. The buck had no clue I was there and so I passed. Not two seconds later, I saw another dan-

dy which was skirting the first buck and maybe a 90-yard shot. I was not confident, I was literally on my hands and knees and I passed.

That experience, which five minutes later I was well aware of could have resulted in a trophy down, gave me no regrets and a great feeling at dark as I hiked back to my duck skiff, which unfortunately had a solid leak, and paddled back to camp in an excellent mood. It's not about the killing, it's about the hunting.

Tom would arrive the next day, I would visit my friends from the Dustin Hariel deer camp many times and these guys are about as cool and tough as it gets.

When the pups and I hit the rack that night after one heck of a long 36 hours, the trip was already a success.
