## Kewaskum Wrestling Returning to Team State, Six to Individual State

The Kewaskum wrestling team has broken the heart of Campbellsport again as they defeated their rival and neighbor, as well as Delavan-Darien, to earn a trip back to Team State for the second year in a row, on Tuesday, Feb. 18 at the North Fond du Lac Team Sectional.

Kewaskum easily defeated Delavan-Darien 55-19, but Campbellsport gave the Indians a run for their money, only falling by two points, 38-36.

Kewaskum started the dual with

a win, thanks to Xane Klienke, who won by decision over Conner Sitzberger at 175.

However, Campbellsport proceeded to quickly rack up wins and points from Porter Klotz (190), Zach Zimdahl (215), Brock Bentz (285), Logan Knoeck (106), and Jacob Allickson (113).

Carter Heimerman broke the Cougars' win streak in the 120 match with a technical fall over Garrett Pickering to turn the tide for Kewaskum.

Brent Krejcarek (132), Ethan Im-

## Cougar Wrestlers Qualify Eight to State

Last weekend, the Cougar wrestlers qualified seven boys and one girl for the State Wrestling Tournament in Madison, to be held February 27, 28, and March 1.

On Friday, all five girls qualified for the Menasha Sectional, where the top two individuals would move on to State. Sophomore Irelyn Woolhether did just that by finishing in second place at 107 pounds. In the quarterfinals, she pinned her first opponent, and that put her against 2024 state qualifier Nora LeFever of Southern Door (41-11). Woolhether was down 3-0 in the second period when the two wrestlers got in a scramble and Woolhether caught her opponent on her back and pinned her in 3:11. In the finals, it was a rematch of the regional final against Ashlynn Scheidermeyer of Neenah. In a much closer match than the week before, Woolhether lost 2-0.

Sophomore Emma Batzler just missed qualifying. After pinning her first opponent, she ran into Taya Johnson of Menasha, who is ranked sixth in the state. Batzler was down 5-3 in the third pe-

riod, got reversed and put to her back, and ended up losing 10-3. She earned a pin in her wrestle back however, Johnson blew a four-point lead in the final 10 seconds of the championship match to lose by one, which meant Batzler would not get a chance for a wrestle back. Batzler finishes the season with a 39-8 record, ranked 13th in the state.

Freshman Mya Schraufnagel also beat her first opponent by fall. In the semifinals, she went up against defending state champion Lily Banks of Menasha (41-1). Mya battled tough but ended up losing by fall in the second period. In her wrestle back, Mya was down 11-1 going into the third period and had a furious comeback that would fall just short, losing 13-12. Mya finished her season 40-15.

Sophomore Abigail Ksioszk and junior Emersen Wissink each qualified. Ksioszk lost to Debra Kuss of Mishicot by fall. Kuss is ranked 11th in the state. Wissink lost to Bryn Miller of Brillion by fall, who is ranked sixth in the state. The Menasha sectional had 27 state-ranked girls, including four defending state champions.

## Campbellsport Volunteer Firefighter Arrested on Sexual Assault of a Child Charge

### VILLAGE OF CAMPBELLSPORT

A 34-year-old Campbellsport Volunteer Firefighter/EMS and Campbellsport resident has been arrested for his alleged involvement regarding sexual contact with a child. The initial investigation revealed sexual contact towards a known female. The male suspect was arrested by the Campbellsport Police Department the morning of Saturday, February 22, 2025, and remains in custody at the Fond du Lac County Jail. He is being held on a felony charge of Second Degree Sexual Assault of a Child - 948.02(2).

Campbellsport Village Administrator Charlie Kudy stated, "We hold all employees and volunteers of the Village of Campbellsport to the

highest moral and ethical standards. These allegations are a shock. The individual has betrayed the trust of Campbellsport Volunteer Fire Department and most importantly our community. He was immediately placed on suspended leave pending the investigation."

The community is not at risk. The investigation is at the preliminary stages and remains under investigation by the Campbellsport Police Department. There may be additional criminal charges pending the completion of the investigation. In an effort to maintain integrity of the investigation, no further details or information are being released at this time.



# Presentation on U.S. Cemeteries in Europe by Farmington Historical Society

In 1923, the United States Congress created the American Battles Monuments Commission (ABMC) to honor American armed forces where they had served overseas and to control military cemeteries, monuments, and markers on foreign soil. Currently, there are U.S. cemeteries and memorials scattered throughout the world.



On Thursday, Feb. 20, Kewaskum pulled off a close win against non-conference rivals, Mayville.


It was another double-double for Behn with 23 points and 15 rebounds.



On Saturday, the Cougars sent nine wrestlers to the Waupun Sectional and came away with four champions: Logan Knoeck, Jacob Allickson, Porter Klotz, and Brock Bentz. Erich Cappozzo was a runner-up. There were also two third-place finishers: Gavin Pickering and Conner Sitzberger.





# Big Eyes on Little Bay de Noc

*Hello friends,*

We are all almost going through constant life changes. I grew up with Jeff Moll, he has been a part of this column since I started it back in '89, and back in October, Jeff retired after about 40 years in the vending machine business. Now, instead of participating in all of our playtime on weekends, Jeff can play on weekdays as well.

This week, I am writing about a two-night camping trip that Jeff and I made on the frozen waters of Little Bay de Noc (LBDN) while fishing for walleye.

**Wednesday, Jan. 29**  
**High 32, Low 20**

There would be several unique and memorable parts of this trip, and one would start at the beginning when we were getting minnows at Bayshore Resort Bait & Tackle and were told the bite is good but almost nonexistent after dark. I have been fishing LBDN since about '98, and in the past, it seemed the most reliable bite was from an hour before dark until an hour after daylight.

So, I am driving a rental car because a tree fell on my truck. I reaffirmed my belief that I hate cars, kind of felt like a cowboy in a buggy instead of on a horse. In case you don't know, Red's mom, Ruby, passed away so this would be Red's first hardcore trip without her mom.

Jeff and I each put out three tip-ups and because he retired, I bought him a gift which was a Beaver Dam tip-up, and I rigged it with Power Pro line, a fluorocarbon leader, a red number 10 hook, and a chartreuse piece of Gulp on the hook. I may have told Jeff a fib when I mentioned that I had the tip-up custom painted with US flag-type colors just for him and it cost me \$300.

So anyways, we set up camp using an Eskimo "Outbreak 850XD" for our cabin on the ice, complete with cots, propane lights, Mr. Buddy heater, and a kitchen. While we were working,

Come primetime and all night we patiently waited for a flag to go up and had zero action but we sure had a ton of fun.

**Thursday, Jan. 30**  
**High 38, Low 20**

Today would be a classic in the days of Jeff Moll and his good buddy, Master Guide Extraordinaire, which Jeff and everyone else in our gang love to call me. Zero action until 8:30 a.m., then I get a flag and have a great fight and ice a 27-inch walleye that definitely looked like it was eating too many Twinkies. We are back at camp basking in the glory of the moment when Jeff gets a flag with his new tip-up. The fight lasted a good five minutes and was he ever happy when he iced a dandy that looked bigger than mine and seeing as we had a five-dollar bet on big walleye, I did not want it to be.

The tape measure read 27.75, and I was about ready to kill him. He wins the big buck bet at deer camp because I let him sit on my stand one night, and now this. Well, the good Lord knew

this could not be, and while we were still rigging his tip-up, I get a flag that I had set in shallow water a good 200 yards away. When I got to it, I was kind of spooled but pleasantly surprised that I had a fish on. Mr. Moll is living large back in Mollville and has no idea what is going on as I had a very long tussle with a good fish. I got it to the bottom of the hole before it swam off again and could see it was at least the great, great, great grandma to his rather sickly-looking fish, and I knew I had to ice it.

Lo and behold, I had it flopping on the ice, and it was a true 30.25-inch beauty walleye from the deep. About all I could say is let the festivities begin. We fished all day and night, caught some small gators but had nothing happen at primetime, that night, or the next morning's primetime. The wind switched to the north, and it was nasty, I had one flag at the shallow water tip-up, caught it, and it was a 25.5-inch "eye."

Moll told me I looked like someone/thing that I cannot mention when we loaded my car and I drove home with the sweet revenge feeling of beating the Big Buck Thief!

**VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT**

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election.
