Kewaskum Village Announces New Municipal Open House Date

The Village of Kewaskum prepares to officially open its brand new municipal building, consisting of the Village Hall and Police Department, this spring. The community is invited to celebrate this milestone at an Open House with a tentative date of Wednesday, May 7. This date is symbolic because it also marks the 130th anniversary of the Village of Kewaskum.

The vision for a new municipal building has been in discussion since 2014, with significant planning beginning in 2019 and official construction launching in 2021. From the start, the goal was to create a modern, functional space that meets the needs of the village for the next 80 years and beyond.

“This has been a long time coming,” said Adam Gitter, Village Administrator. “We’ve put a lot of thought into making sure this building serves the needs of our community, not just today, but well into the future.”

The new Village Hall and Police Department will provide much-needed storage space along with improved facilities and technology.

“One of the most exciting parts of this project is that we will be bringing back community spaces,” Gitter explained. “Groups will once

again have a place to gather and meet. Additionally, we’ve invested in technology to livestream village meetings, making it easier for residents to stay informed.”

The village has made cost-effective decisions throughout the project, handling some tasks in-house to save money such as assembling furniture themselves. These efforts have allowed the community to maximize resources and cut costs whenever possible.

“This has truly been a team effort, and we’re proud of the work that’s gone into making this happen,” said the Administrator.

The May 7 Open House will give residents the opportunity to tour the new building, and celebrate Kewaskum’s growth. Citizens should remember this date could be subject to change.

The event will also feature refreshments from local businesses, with Great Outdoors and Piggy Wiggly offering snacks and drinks.

This building represents an investment in the community and village board members are excited to share the facility with the public.

With the final stages of construction wrapping up in April, the village remains on track for the May celebration. While the date is tentative and subject to final construction timelines, residents are encouraged to mark their calendars and stay tuned for more details.

Campbellsport Girls Basketball Season Ends in First Round

On February 25, Campbellsport girls basketball lost 53-32 to the five-seed Lakeside Lutheran on the road in the first round.

Campbellsport (3-21) got on the scoreboard with a Kiera Laverenz post move to make the score 7-2 in favor of Lakeside Lutheran (15-10).

The Cougars’ offense continued to score baskets, with Laverenz and Mackenzie Helsell converting on the floor to put the score at 17-8, with Lakeside in the lead.



Kewaskum’s Ethan Immel Tops Podium at State Wrestling Tournament

After three days competing against the best of the best across the state of Wisconsin, two Kewaskum wrestlers earned a spot on the podium at the 2025 WIAA Individual State Wrestling Tournament.

Junior Ethan Immel, the first seed with a 43-1 record, became a state champion in the Division 2 138 weight class after winning by decision 7-3 over Dylan Weigel from Belmont/Platteville, the three seed. On his way to the finals, he also defeated Nathan Johnson from Dodgeville by technical fall in 5:07 23-8 in the quarterfinals and Antonio Sowell from Amery by a 13-2 major decision.

This was Immel’s third time qualifying for and placing at state. In 2024, he placed third in the 132 weight class, and in 2023, he placed fourth in the 120 weight class.

Undefeated sophomore Bryston Scoles, the second seed with a 54-0 record, had a tough and close championship match but lost by a 4-2 decision to Owen Seffrood from Darlington/Black Hawk, the first seed, to earn a second place finish in the 150 weight class. On his way to the finals, he defeated Trey Zemke from Winneconne by technical fall in 1:51 21-6 in the quarterfinals and Bradyn Penard from Amery by technical fall in 2:46 17-2 in the semifinals.


As a freshman, Scoles placed third in the 138 weight class at last year’s tournament.

The other Kewaskum wrestlers that competed but did not place were Brayden Loehr (144), Kage Weseman (157), and Eli Ogi (190).

Loehr won a tie-breaker match in the first round but lost by technical fall in the quarterfinals and decision in the first round of consolation matches. Weseman lost by decision in his first match and technical fall in his second match. Ogi lost by technical fall in his first match and by fall in his second match.

However, the season is not over for the Indians as they have one more thing to do: Compete at Team State.

The Kewaskum wrestling team returns to the mat one more time and to the Division 2 WIAA Team State Tournament for the second year in a

row this weekend, Saturday, March 8. They will take on Saint Croix Falls at 10 a.m. in the UW-Fieldhouse. If they win, they will advance to the championship at 3 p.m. against the winner of Coleman versus Fennimore.

As I reflect on our time in Cartagena, I realize that no trip leaves you unchanged. We came home with new memories and strengthened friendships. Perhaps, in some small way, we left a piece of ourselves behind in that beautiful city. And maybe, just maybe, Cartagena carries a trace of us now too.

in school. Most older adults recall having a class in civics. Currently, schools have the option of offering a separate civics course, or integrating the material into other social study courses. Regardless of how the content is taught, all students must take and pass a basic civics exam prior to graduation. The Wisconsin Assembly just passed a bill that would require schools to offer a minimum of one semester of a separate civics course, in the hope that this would improve the public's knowledge level. This bill now goes to the Senate for review.

Let's see how well you did with the sample civics questions.

The three branches of government as designed by the United States Constitution are the legislative branch, which includes the Senate and the House of Representatives, the judicial branch, which includes the Supreme Court, and the executive branch, which consists of the President, advisors, the Cabinet and other agencies. The three branches each have equal power and are intended to balance each other so one branch doesn't try to take over.

According to the Constitution, the President has several duties. The President can make treaties with the approval of the Senate, veto or sign bills, and represent the U.S. in talks with foreign countries. The President is also responsible for enforcing laws passed by Congress, acting as Commander in Chief during a war, can call our troops to protect our nation against an attack, can make suggestions for new laws to Congress, may grant pardons, nominate Cabinet members and Supreme Court Justices and should represent the best interest of all Americans. The President does not have the power to make laws, declare war, decide how federal money is spent, interpret laws or choose Cabinet members or Supreme Court Justices without approval of the Senate (trumanlibrary.gov).

Congress, which is made up of the Senate and the House of Representatives, has very specific duties which include declaring war, drafting and passing laws, regulating commerce, establishing rules for immigration, controlling taxing and spending and acting as a mediator between constituents and the federal government. It is often said that they control the purse strings for the government. The President can't end funding for projects Congress has already approved but can impound or hold up funding for no more than 45 days (constitutioncenter.org).

The Supreme Court is the judicial branch of government. Their main duty is to review laws and make sure they are not contrary to the Constitution. They also can declare an executive act is in violation of the Constitution. They are responsible for protecting civil rights and liberties and "ensuring that each branch of government recognizes the limits of its own power" (uscourts.gov).

Each state has two senators, regardless of the state's population. The number of representatives is based on census data. There are currently 435 representatives. Wisconsin has eight congressional districts with eight representatives.

An executive order is written by the President and orders the government to take specific actions to make sure existing laws are followed. They cannot override federal laws or statutes (aclu.org). Executive orders have been used by all past presidents except President Harrison.

If you would like to have a better understanding of how our government should work, you can read the Constitution by going to www.archives.gov. The Constitution is composed of a preamble, seven articles and 27 amendments (the first 10 amendments are also known as the Bill of Rights). Another resource is the National Constitution Center at <https://constitutioncenter.org>.

WHAT WAS LOST

Quickert, Grandma Thelen and Contact Theory

In his book *The Story of Washington County* (1923), Carl Quickert explained a good relationship between European settlers and Native Americans. He writes in his “The Aborigines” chapter, “With the Whites the Indians were on friendly terms. They, as a rule, were honest and appreciative of favors. Animosities, or bloody wars between the two races, which stained advancing civilization in other parts of the country, were unknown here. A noble trait in the character of the redskins was that, although to sustain their life they were to a considerable extent dependent on charity, they always tried to repay their benefactors with something that might be of use to them. It is true, they had a great foible for ‘Goodnatosh’ (fire water, whiskey), and for a jug full would give the result of a day’s hunt, but excesses, on account of it, have never been known, or they would have been recorded. On their little clearings they raised their corn in their peculiar way; it had irregular rows of kernels on the cob, but they were of superior taste.”

There is a point of view in psychology called “contact theory” or the “contact hypothesis.” It is the conclusion that prejudice is reduced when positive contact occurs between two groups.

Quickert explains a working situation circa 1850 where European settlers and Native Americans could coexist. Fast forward to 1900, and the population of European immigrants had increased, both due to new immigrants arriving and the first immigrants (settlers) creating families, which were often big. This population increase clearly decreased the amount of contact between the two races.

As a story to run with Quickert’s position, just north of the Washington County/Fond du Lac County line, Elizabeth “Lizzie” Weiland (1924-2022) told me how her Grandma Elizabeth “Lizzie” Fleischman Thelen (1881-1972) (henceforth called Grandma Thelen) had recipes from the Indians. The conclusion was the recipes and advice were useful and helpful. Some were given to Grandma Thelen’s parents. Grandma was appreciative and retained contact with Indians as well, but likely covertly. As a contrast to Grandma Thelen, the later generations around 1900 concluded they wouldn’t have needed a Native helping hand. Nature’s medicine from the Natives was replaced with something delivered by the train or from the general store. However, Lizzie credited the survival of her premature birth to the recipes Native Americans gave her Grandma Thelen.

Although Quickert’s positive comments were about Washington County, and Lizzie Weiland’s story comes from Ashford, they work together in asking later generations to question where the disagreements started between predominantly white European societies and Indigenous peoples. This is all the more interesting given Quickert documented a time when there was coexistence and acceptance. It is important to accumulate evidence of this positive coexistence, and explanations on why it occurred.

Recall in psychology, researchers try to avoid ethical and moral labels to behavior. For example, one could say that once the white Europeans didn’t need Natives, then the settlers didn’t reach out to Indigenous peoples. But we must also remember that those were not the same generations of Europeans. A German or Irish immigrant was more likely to come in contact with Indigenous peoples in 1850 than 1890. That causes a different response between a property owner of European descent and the Native in 1890. In addition, those rare Natives by 1890 would be outnumbered by those old settlers’ children and new immigrants still coming into the country, who now had the amenities of modernization and industrialization which they concluded replaced the survival skills Natives

could teach. Thus, in regard to contact with Natives, within decades during the 1800s, different historical and psychological eras of human behavior existed – especially in regard to homesteader vs. Indian relations. The logic holds the possibility that Quickert is correct that the first settlers in Washington County were more helpful to Natives, who reciprocated. Grandma Thelen’s contact is all the more fascinating because it was so late in the historical narrative.

I know Lizzie’s story to be true because we went over and over it. She also had respect for the Native influence on her history. She was amazed at the end of her life on the trees that were bent in her township by Indigenous peoples. She had a respect for their past in her township and wished to learn more about Native influence even as she was passing. She clearly concluded it was a gift that Grandma Thelen connected with Natives. Lizzie’s thanks was the legacy of that contact.





• Ali Stroker was the first performer in a wheelchair to take home a Tony award.

• Edith Wharton achieved the Pulitzer Prize in literature in 1921 for "The Age of Innocence." She was the first woman granted this honor.

• Although her real name is lost to history, a Japanese lady-in-waiting known as Murasaki Shikibu was the first person to author the world's first novel circa 1000 A.D., titled *The Tale of Genji*.

I could go on and on about the achievements of women in history, some lesser known than others. As a proud female raised in a feminist household, I would be a disgrace to my mother if I did not share the accomplishments of women in our library. 

Campbellsport's Ava Sabish was able to put four straight points on the ledger for the Cougars to make the halftime score 37-16.

Laverenz and Helsell combined to score 11 points in the second half, plus Ellie Heider knocked down a jumper to help the Cougars continue to battle throughout the game.

Campbellsport's season ended with a 53-32 loss in the first round of their Division 3 playoff matchup.

"It is a journey we started in the summer, which ended after many months of hard work and dedication by this great group of players," said Head Coach Ray LaBatte. "Our returning players know what it means to row the boat as a team, and these lessons will propel us into offseason work to get ready for the 2025-26 season."

Kiera Laverenz led the Cougars with 10 points in the game, and the Flyway's leading conference rebounder (10.1 rebounds per game) Brittany Reilly grabbed 12 rebounds in the playoff matchup.





Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen who:

- will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day.
- has resided in the ward or municipality where they wish to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election.

5 p.m. on the fifth day before the election, **Thursday, March 27, 2025.**

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.
