

Campbellsport and Kewaskum Emergency Responders Assist in Town of Auburn Incident

On Tuesday, March 11, at approximately 4:56 p.m., the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Communication Center received a 911 call from an individual stating he and his landlord were in a fight and the landlord was having trouble breathing. Deputies responded to the Town of Auburn address and found a 39-year-old victim/landlord with significant and life-threatening injuries. The victim was transported to Froedtert West Bend Hospital and subsequently flown to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee.

During the on-scene investigation, detectives discovered evidence and developed probable cause to determine the initial caller, a 39-year-old male who resided at Town of Auburn address, was the aggressor and responsible for causing the substantial injuries. That individual was taken into custody and is currently incar-

cerated at the Fond du Lac County Jail.

The victim has significant head and brain injuries and is currently (as of March 11) medically sedated as the injuries continue to be life-threatening.

The Sheriff's Office is continuing to work with the District Attorney's Office as this investigation continues. As a result of this investigation, a 1st Degree Attempted Homicide charge is being forwarded to the District Attorney's Office. Additional charges may be forthcoming.

The Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Campbellsport Fire Department & EMS, Kewaskum First Responders, and the Wisconsin State Patrol Technical Reconstruction Unit.

Because this investigation remains open and active, no interviews or additional details will be released at this time. If or when charged with a crime, additional details will be released in a criminal complaint filed with the courts.

Kewaskum Prepares Parks for Spring

The Kewaskum Village Board held a regular meeting on March 17, 2025, at 7 p.m. at the Kewaskum Fire Department.

Dennis Aupperle, Department of Public Works working foreman, reported to the board what the Public Works department has been doing to prepare for the spring and summer seasons. Pickleball and tennis court nets have been set up at Kiwanis Parks. The restroom facilities will be ready at Reigle Park and River Hill Park in the coming days, weather permitting. They are also going to start working on removing the old pool fencing at Kiwanis Park.

The ice cream shack at River Hill Park will be getting a new roof. Dennis met with Heberer Bros Home Improvements, LLC to evaluate the current conditions of the structure. There were some rotten pieces of wood and it was advised to replace it. The DPW will be responsible for some of the demolition of the roof. The Kiwanis Club will be making a donation to help with the re-

placement process.

The DPW Yard will be open starting April 1 for village residents. The hours will be Monday-Friday 7 a.m. - 3 p.m. and Saturday 7 a.m. - 12 p.m. Brush pickup for residents will start soon, with pickup offered the first and third Monday of the month, weather permitting.

Board Matters:

- The Plan Commission approved 1675 Reigle Drive for a Planned Unit Development. They will be in charge of their own garbage and snow removal independent from the village.
- The board discussed whether the Library should continue its agreement with Washington County's Heart and Homestead program. They chose to continue this agreement and keep the library as a participating non-profit in the Heart and Homestead program.
- In-person absentee voting hours begin Tuesday, March 18 for the April 1 Spring Election.
- The tentative date for the Village Hall open house remains May 7, 2025. The date remains tentative due to the construction timeline.

Kewaskum Foods Announces Discontinuance of Operations

Kewaskum Foods has informed its staff that it is discontinuing operations, with most manufacturing operations already having been concluded. There will be a run-down period to sell off the remaining inventory to existing wholesale accounts, and products will also remain available in our retail outlet located at 118 Forest Ave in Kewaskum, while supplies last.

There will most likely be a great deal of public speculation around the reasons behind this, the real reasons being numerous and only known by those who have worked alongside us over the past six years.

There were an astonishing number of surprises uncovered with this business since the time of ownership change in November 2018. Being 100% committed to this business since then, we have

endured and overcome so much. All of this was very time-consuming and extremely costly.

We greatly hoped that our scenario would have been very different. We wish that we would have been able to complete our vision, which we were barely able to implement with the thousands and thousands of hours of work, and hundreds and hundreds of thousands of dollars, addressing everything here to the very best of our ability. Four years ago, we were unsure that we would be able to make it through the next 90 days with the challenges in front of us.

In the end, we were on the cusp of completely turning this business around, being perhaps only a couple weeks away from gaining USDA grant of inspection and of garnering distribution arrangements to begin to scale our business and

share Kewaskum with the masses. The problem was that everything up to this point took so long and was so incredibly costly. It did not help that our largest customer failed last year, resulting in a loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars in sales. In the end, we never gave up, but we no longer possess sufficient resources to overcome the historical challenges and to complete what we set out to.

We understand that we held great responsibility for this company and for the greater community. We can unequivocally say that we gave this everything that we had and do not think anyone else would have been able to do better – most would have given up years ago.

Thank you all for an incredible 83 years.

It's not a normal thing to celebrate anymore. Suppose a bit of common sense is involved. As we are who we are sheerly by the accident of birth. Nobody gets to choose where that happens.

Mind you, there is an exception (always is) about this time of year. As the Ides of March approach, we witness the coming of a color. The burgeoning here is specific. It lands on a certain date and from thence rises the tradition.

Begins before Shakespeare's "salad days" when we were "still green in judgement." By now, you must've riddled out I'm talking about St. Patrick's on the 17th. Which honors the major contribution Ireland made on the world but especially, our hemisphere and its culture.

Wasn't always so. Chiefly, we've forgotten the treatment those early arrivals from the Emerald Isle received. Signs in windows – "No Irish need apply." Jammed into crowded New York

But by and large we've lost touch with our own history. Which now makes it easier for us to deny access to further immigrants. The pledge at the base of the Statue of Liberty; "Give me your tired masses yearning to breathe free" is merely empty words. And, as a poet once wrote, "we all know how often they've failed us."

Colorful Houseplants for Lower Light Locations

Take your indoor garden to the next level. Include some colorful houseplants for some added interest throughout the year. Even those with low to moderate light in their homes can boost the color of their indoor gardens.

Philodendron has long been a favorite houseplant for low light situations. Update your collection with the bright chartreuse leaves of the trailing Lemon Lime philodendron or upright Pink Princess with splashes and streaks of pink on its dark green leaves.

Chinese Evergreens (*Aglaonema*) are a good choice for gardeners who prefer low-light plants that tolerate drier soil. You can find Chinese evergreens with a variety of colorful leaf patterns. Siam Red has broad leaves with red edges, Red Valentine offers green leaves with pink and red blotches, and the white markings on its green leaves inspired Split Milk's name.

Nerve plants (*Fittonia*) on the other hand prefer consistently moist well-drained soil to keep their green leaves with pink, purple, red, or white variegated leaves looking their best. Regular trimming will help this plant look its best and starting new plants from these trimmings will keep your plant collection filled with these colorful but often short-lived plants.

Reduce maintenance and increase success with this and other houseplants by amending the potting mix with an organic and sustain-

able soil additive like Wild Valley Farms wool pellets (wildvalleyfarms.com). Research found this amendment holds 20% of its weight in water and slowly releases it into the soil when needed, helping keep the soil consistently moist but not soggy wet.

Prayer plants, including the Marantas and Calatheas, can be a bit more challenging but their unique foliage that folds up like praying hands at night makes them well worth the effort. These plants prefer moderate indirect light and can scorch in direct sunlight or pale when the light is insufficient. Like nerve plants, they prefer consistently moist soil and high humidity. Boost humidity by grouping houseplants together and placing them on gravel trays. The pebbles in the tray elevate the pots above the water kept in the saucer. As the water evaporates, the humidity level increases around the plant. Use rainwater or distilled water to avoid brown tips on prayer plants, dracaenas, and spider plants caused by fluoride and chlorine in tap water.

For those with a bit more light add a few spots of color with polka dot plant (*Hypoestes phyllostachya*). You may have grown this plant as an annual in your garden and containers, but it also performs well as an indoor plant. Regular trimming of the green with white or pink-dotted leaves keeps the plant full and compact.

Peperomias prefer bright indirect light, but some varieties will tolerate a bit less. Ripple



Peperomia (Peperomia caperata) adds texture and a bit of color while watermelon peperomia (Peperomia argyreia) offers a nice contrast with its smooth leaves colored like watermelon rind.

Dracaena plants offer a wide variety of textures with narrow and broad leaves and various types and intensities of variegation. Dorado's leaves have thin yellow leaf edges, Lemon Lime's green leaves are highlighted with white stripes and chartreuse leaf margins, and Limelight with its wide neon bright chartreuse leaves are just a few of the many colorful dracaenas now available.

If the colorful leaves of any of these plants tend to pale or fade to green you may need to increase the amount of light the plants receive. Try moving them closer to an east- or west-facing window or supplement those lowlight situations with artificial lights.

Consider these plants a piece of living art or a way to refresh your indoor décor. Not only do they improve the view, but they also help boost your mood, reduce stress, and improve focus when observing and tending these and your other indoor plants.

Every year Moser runs Jump Rope for Heart (JRFH) for the K-3 graders and a Hoops for Heart (HFH) for the 4-5 graders during gym classes where students play jumping games and jump rope while the older kids play basketball games and even sign up for 3 on 3 matches if they choose to raise money for the American Heart Association which uses the money for heart research. Moser told the kids that if they raised over \$2,500 as a school a winner would be drawn from the list of those who donated and they would get to cut his hair any way they wanted. The school raised \$3,264.50.

The Village Board decided on Monday to send annual letters encouraging but not requiring private fire hydrant owners to flush their hydrants, going against the advice of the village attorney who said the notification could expose the village to liability. Private resident Jerry Stilb volunteered to find the hydrant owners and give their contact infor-

mation to the village so letters are sent to the right people. Taking Stilb up on his offer was part of Trustee Kevin Scheuemann's motion, though no deadline, accountability for getting the job done or backup plan if Stilb can't complete the task for whatever reason were discussed.

The girls' soccer team will play on the old field below the high schools' tennis courts this season thanks to a wet fall that delayed putting down sod on the new field. The school district last year entered into a \$1 annual lease with the West Bend Clinic for a piece of land adjacent to the clinic to use as its new varsity soccer field. 



When Joseph “Sep” Schraufnagel Hosted Bill Koch

The following sheds some light on the influence the Schraufnagel family established west of LeRoy within the Town of LeRoy. The research intertwines perspectives of two former town chairs, one of LeRoy (Earl Kehrmeyer) and the other from Ashford (Joe Koch). Evident throughout is the webbed connections of family, and a clear tie to German heritage.

William Koch at Schraufnagel's

According to Rita (Koch) Babler and Joe Koch (1931-2024), their father Paul Koch (1900-1980) came to America through his brother William. William “Bill” Koch (1903-1994) arrived in LeRoy in the form of a sponsorship with German Americans. This process may have been connected with the church or archdiocese. Bill stayed at the Schraufnagel's and after he stabilized in America, his brother Paul followed.

Joe and Rita said that when Bill arrived, they pronounced the last name “cawk-h,” not “cook.” By the time I was growing up in the 1980s, the last name pronounced around Ashford sounded like “cook.” Earl vouched that in LeRoy, they said the name like “cawk-h” also. For those in Mayville and Horicon, recognize there was a Koch farm west of Schwarze Road on the north side of Hwy 28, but this is not the same Koch family. However, it appears all the older generation Germans are in agreement that the last name should be said “cawk-h,” a likely indication of the appropriate way to say it in German.

Uncle Bill, as Rita and Joe called him, stayed at the Schraufnagel's. Rita is certain that it has to be the original Joseph Schraufnagel, because “Bill and my dad” came over in the late 1920s. In addition, the family Bill stayed at was a very big family. “Cause I remember we had a picture at one time...There was a picture taken when Bill came over, and it was a family gathering.” The photo had numerous Schraufnagels, and Joseph and Sophia Schraufnagel had 15 children. In addition, that photo was taken “at the Joe Schraufnagel place.” Thus, although the picture is of the entire Schraufnagel family, Bill Koch is also in the photo, evidence of his close relationship to the family.

Later in life, William Koch had a tavern in Pewaukee. He is buried with his wife Alma (1900-2000) at St. Peter's Cemetery in Beaver Dam.

Paul Koch in Knowles

Bill followed Paul in birth order, but it was Paul who followed Bill to the United States. Rita explained, “My dad was a blacksmith for a number of years in Knowles.” That was his occupation in Germany, and there is a picture of her dad shoeing a horse, and it's while Paul was in Knowles.

Joe said, “When he came over from Germany, he was blacksmith down in the coal mines. And then when he got here, he had to work off his fare by Schraufnagels in LeRoy. And then he was blacksmith after while in Knowles in the blacksmith shop there.” Paul had to shoe the horses that were used for road work construction. Joe compared this job to working for the “WPA,” but it's hard to say which roads those horses were used for around 1929, much less who was funding the road construction. Joe did concur that Paul Koch's work in Knowles was not a Works Progress Administration job. After all, Paul's work was during the Great Depression but was before the New Deal and the WPA. Joe's consistent story was clearly the horses were working on road construction in the area. Joe also said when you see the picture of Paul Koch shoeing horses, “That's a Knowles picture. That's the blacksmith shop in Knowles, right across from Cunningham's Feedmill. Pa worked... during the Depression. And what he did there,

he shod the horses at night so they could build roads during the day.”

Paul specifically came over here given how bad the situation was in the industrial parts of Germany, particularly with the mining. Joe Koch said his dad left industrial Germany because he would shoe the horses down in the mines, but they left the horses to die there. The work was brutal. Recall too that Germany was unstable in the 1920s, particularly during the Weimar Republic which eventually fell to Hitler and the Third Reich in the early 1930s. For a timeline, recall that hyperinflation hits Germany around 1923. In about five years, Paul was in Knowles.

Paul followed his brother to Ashford Township. Joe said, “When he left Schraufnagel, he [Uncle Bill] worked over there by Jaeger's farm. Pat Jaeger's farm...as a hired man. Then pa came to Ashford too, and he worked.” Joe said what he meant was Clarence “Pat” Jaeger (1918-2001) farmed the land of his father, Peter Jaeger (1881-1959). Joe said back in the 1930s, Peter and his brother William John Jaeger (1878-1936) “worked side by side.” While Bill Koch was with Peter Jaeger, Paul Koch followed to William Jaeger's farm. “So, he worked there. And that's how he met my mother... and in a few months' time, they were married. It's really something.”

In Ashford Township, Paul Koch and Mary Stoffel Koch (1912-1999) had a dairy farm where Paul also had a small blacksmith shop where he kept up the trade for personal use. Both are buried in St. Martin's Cemetery in Ashford.

Old Joe Schraufnagel of LeRoy

To understand who Joe Schraufnagel was, Earl Kehrmeyer clarified there was Joseph “Sep” Schraufnagel Sr. (1855-1932) who married Sophia Weiglein Schraufnagel (1861-1928). They were the parents of Rosalia Schraufnagel Gindt (1880-1938), who was Earl's maternal grandmother who had died of the rabbit's disease in 1938. Earl said, “Sep is always the nickname for Joe.” This is a noteworthy nickname, because “Giuseppe” is the Italian version of Joseph, so “Sep” seems to be a variation of this, even though the Schraufnagels are German. Earl was clear that the Germans often called Joseph “Sep,” and the language roots of that is still a question. Joseph and Sophie, Joe Schraufnagel Jr., and Rosalia Gindt are all buried at St. Andrew's Cemetery.

There were two Joseph Schraufnagels in this piece. There was old Joseph “Sep” who was the father of Earl's Grandma Gindt. In addition, Rosalia's brother was Joseph (1884-1961). “He was a younger brother to my Grandma Schraufnagel [Gindt]. That was the same family. That was a big family. Leonard. Alfred. Francis. All those Schraufnagels [from Joe Jr.]” Earl said not only was Rosalia's siblings a long list, but then Joseph Jr. also had many kids.

Recall for the purposes of the Koch arrivals, Uncle Bill stayed with Joseph Schraufnagel Sr., a historical position validated by Rita. Earl showed the location of the original homestead for Joseph “Sep.” From upper town LeRoy, one takes the road straight west out of LeRoy to Center Line Road/YY. Before that westerly road out of LeRoy turns into Reiser Road, you look south on YY and an old 1800s house stands on the east side of the road. “That's west of LeRoy. It's a four-square house, and it's south of the intersection.” His Grandma Rosalia Schraufnagel Gindt was born in this house.

The Schraufnagel house is very significant to the area. It would be fascinating how many people from LeRoy, Knowles, Lomira, Ashford and beyond have lineage connected to the house. Given “Sep” and Sophia had 15 children, their ties are way beyond Schraufnagels. First is the Kehrmeyers and Gindts, for which Earl can vouch given his Grandma Gindt.

Another is the Feucht family. For Joseph Andrew Schraufnagel, his wife Teresa was a Feucht. Earl noted she was a sister to Jon Feucht, Alois Feucht and Pete Feucht. Therefore, Teresa Feucht Schraufnagel (1885-1951) grew up with her parents August Feucht (1859-1929) and Philamena Wittman Feucht (1863-1930). That original Feucht farm is in the Horicon Marsh National Wildlife Refuge. The Feucht farm was at the west end of the present Headquarters Road.

In addition, Sep and Sophie Schraufnagel's daughter Mary Ann (1886-1967) married Michael Feucht Sr. (1872-1941), who was August Feucht's brother. Both August and Michael lived on that headquarters farm, for that is rooted in their parents (and settlers) Johann (1821-1897) and Magdalena Dierwimmer Feucht (1832-1891).

Other daughters of Sep and Sophie married into many known families of the area – Wondra, Rosbeck, Gitter, and Fell. Coincidentally, it is the Fell family who deserves partial credit for bringing the young Koch men out to the Stoffel Farm in Ashford Township around 1930.

Rita discussed a Fell/Schraufnagel connection to her father's move to Ashford. “Well, one of the Schraufnagel girls—Christina—married John Fell. And John Fell was our neighbor. They had the next farm up from us. And I know that when he married Christina, she moved to the farm, which is right up the road from our old homestead.” In addition, “Bill had a connection with Jake Stoffel, my grandpa, at that time already. I don't know how, but there was a connection there. And then my dad came and visited with the Stoffel family, met my mother, then they got married.” John Fell (1900-1978) farmed in Ashford until 1967. According to his obituary, he married Christina Schraufnagel (1904-1980) in 1927 at St. Andrew's Catholic Church in LeRoy. This corroborates that the newlyweds were connected with the Koch

brothers coming out to Ashford from LeRoy and Knowles in the late 1920s. The Fells are buried in St. Martin's Cemetery, which Joe Koch cared for and tended to for decades. This is just an example of that circled connection between LeRoy and Ashford.

Prisoners of War

Joe Koch appreciated his history and his German heritage. Given the Koch brothers from Germany came through LeRoy, here are two stories illustrating the tie to the old German past and local history.

First, Joe Koch remembers where they kept the German Prisoners of War in Lomira. "They worked in the canning factory, and I think they kept 'em where Sterr Brewery was there." He was in the vicinity of the bridge in Lomira, and said today you would have to go south on the side road to Cole Oil. From the old Knights of Columbus Hall, back then "the next place was the canning factory, and then there was the Sterr Brewery." Joe said around 1943, there were pea viners there and the POWs helped. "They were feeding the peas in there, and they were out in the fields, loading the pea vines up."

Joe said the POWs were working in both the fields as well as the factory. The most significant memory to Joe was how cordial his father and the POWs were. Paul was farming in Ashford and concluded that given so many Germans were at the factory he should take a chance to converse with them. What made his dad go down there? "Well, we thought the prisoners were there. And he said we should be able to find someone from his home country/his hometown you know! And sure enough we did." Joe was laughing about his father, who "talked quite a while" with the POWs.

Joe said while his pa was in Lomira by the canning factory, it was important to clarify that this was not a big deal. "There was no problem. There were guards there. Yeah. But no problems. Ha. Ha. Ha..." (The ha's are included as a reminder of the hearty laugh Joe always gave). Yes, the Germans were our enemies, but dad okayed it with

the guards. Joe thought the guards were military men rather than locals but were still easy to talk to. "The prisoners were here," Joe said, as if where else were they going to go. "People took them home and fed them a meal." Joe said such stories on German POWs were also in Stalag (2002), a book he recommended on the wartime POW camps in Wisconsin.

One also has to keep in mind that Joe (1931-2024) had a German tongue which made this camp experience memorable. "I couldn't talk a word of English until I got to grade school. I talked all German. So, I knew German." It was really neat to hear the conversations between the POWs and dad. "They knew the same people." Dad's hometown was "near Dortmund. 'Lean-in' they called it. It was in the coal mining district." Joe specifically pronounced it "Lean-in," and noted, "that's where he was born." He then spelled the town L U N E N. When Joe went to Germany, he said they looked up people in Lunen and he still had relatives there.

The Soccer Match

The second story on German heritage is Paul Koch's love for soccer. Within his garage in 2023, Joe was smiling about his dad's adventure. "They had a soccer game in Milwaukee, and they had the Dortmund team and another team playing soccer, and Pa and I got to go into the locker room, and one of his buddies was playing soccer there... See, my dad was a soccer player when he was out in Germany. He played semi-pro soccer." How did he find out that the team was coming to Milwaukee? "Well, we heard it through the grapevine. My uncle [Bill] was down in Pewaukee," so he knew that game was coming up. Then Joe added another laugh.

One also has to understand that there were many German publications in the Milwaukee area mid-century about the homeland, and the German culture around Milwaukee. Dietrich Otto (1927-2019) (who, like Joe, lived in Ashford Township and shared an affinity for 'aberguts') also spoke of how his family came to Milwaukee. "I talked to Dieter a lot. I knew him... We were buddies." Dieter himself was born in Pankow outside Berlin and was another avenue for Joe to speak on German culture. Dieter said that in the mid 1900s there were southeastern Wisconsin publications telling German Americans about the homeland. Joe affirmed the logic of how Uncle Bill could have seen or heard about the soccer match in such publications and told Paul.

Rita verified this soccer match was after World War II and played at Milwaukee County Stadium. "I remember him going because that was such a big deal. My dad was so excited... it would have been the early 40s or early 50s... I remember when they went, because Ma and I had to do the milking because they went."

Joe recalled the players he saw in Milwaukee. "Some were older. Like they were pa's age, some of them." It wasn't like all the soccer players were 20. "But they were older. Yeah... They talked and talked and talked. And I sat there and listened. But you know, he played soccer before he came over here, and he broke his shins a couple times." The team's name was out of Lunen, because soccer was a big sport. Although Paul lived through Super Bowl I and II, Joe said his father wasn't a

huge fan of the NFL. "He didn't care about the Packers. Soccer's a different game."

On Sponsorship

Earl was not aware of the Koch sponsorship to come to America, but he could speak for what he witnessed after World War II. In regard to folks like the Schraufnagels - "I would say they took him in as a hired man. And usually, they worked for three years. Worked off a sponsorship. Otherwise, it was pretty hard to immigrate. They had to find a place to go when they came to Ellis Island." He gave an example at the Klomberg Bakery at Horicon around 1947. "In fact, when I worked at the bakery, we sponsored Germans after World War II. Then they worked for us for three years. Then they worked enough to go out on their own somewhere else."

Earl acknowledged that he didn't know about specific sponsorships in LeRoy, but provided an interesting memory tied to the old German heritage. "I just know they said some of the immigrants came and they didn't have no place for 'em, and farmers usually had a brooder house where they would raise their baby chicks in the spring of the year." And with those young chickens in the spring, a farmer "might have a little heater, a kerosene heater or something to keep it warm, until electricity came. Then they used heat lamps to warm it. And they used those chicken coops for those people to sleep in, and they always said when Martin Eilbes came from Europe, that he had to live in a chicken coop not far from the Darge Farm on Dairy Road that goes up towards Grande. That was the story." This is roughly the location where Wiese Trucking keeps their trucks for hauling milk for Grande. Across the road from Wiese Trucking, there was what was always known as the Darge (Dar-gee) house. Earl said over the years "there were several Darges there. And they said they had a brooder house north of there, and that's where Martin Eilbes lived for a while." Martin (1879-1962) was a brother to Henry Eilbes (1883-1963), both who lived in the township of LeRoy. Donnie Weiland noted that both his grandfather Martin (Henry's brother) and great-grandfather Martin Sr. (1848-1926) came within a year's time frame, but the younger Martin Eilbes came first to LeRoy. Regardless of which Martin Eilbes it was, the coop story is just another example of the early struggles and sacrifices of German immigrants in the area.

That's the same value of the Koch-Schraufnagel story. Joe Koch said in our last interview how he was looking at his pa's history, "The other day I looked at the passport for what it cost to come over here -135 dollars to come over here... They had to work for a year to work that off." It is not only how the Koch's worked it off, but also how the Schraufnagel family provided a safe landing for Germans in LeRoy in the 1920s. Whether it is William or Paul, even if that stability was just for a few months or years, the support isn't forgotten nearly a century later. It also reminds descendants how so many people are tied to the same story when looking back at their ancestry.

AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

After Dark Coyote Hunt

Hello friends,

I spent three nights chasing coyote in Fond du Lac, Columbia, Dodge and Winnebago Counties with two very avid outdoorsmen, Brian Ball and Tom Hoinacki, both of Waupun. **Sunday, Feb. 23**
High 40, Low 25

We actually started our adventure fishing walleye on Lake Butte des Morts, but that's another story, and while fishing, I had plenty of time to shoot the bull with Brian and Tom and started to learn a lot about what life-long, hardcore, and very successful outdoorsmen both of them are.

Brian and Tom made sure we had all of their gear loaded in the truck for tonight's hunt as we would be hunting Winnebago and Dodge Counties on night one. I would be an observer all three nights and learned from minute one about the importance of not slamming truck doors, making sure your phone is off, and not talking or moving while on a set up.

After hiking anywhere from 75 to 300 yards, a FoxPro electronic call is setup and in each hunt, wind direction is always a major factor. Brian shoots a Daniel Defense M4 with a Griffin Suppressor and an ATN night vision scope.

Tom uses a Colt AR 223 with a Banish Suppressor and a Pulsar scope. Both Tom and Brian also use thermal scanners that, in short, make it so you can see anything with heat like a deer, cow, raccoon, etc. in the dark.

I might add that tonight, there was deep snow, and it was very windy. One is work, the other is not good for hunting. So here is the scoop, I also learned how to use a scanner and from my first look on night one, to my last look on night three, I saw raccoon and it was literally unbelievable how many there are. Seemed like they were either

roaming fields or hanging out in trees.

Monday, Feb. 24

High 49, Low 29

We have gone from deep snow to plenty of mud in 24 hours, and tonight, we are hunting in Columbia County near Columbus and Randolph. A bit about Brian and Tom, they are both retired, and from 1990 to 2010, they fished the Masters Walleye Circuit and the Midwest Walleye Series as a team, and these guys kicked hiney. It was very cool to listen to their stories. Like last night, not only did we see at least one raccoon on each of our seven setups, we saw deer almost constantly, and it is really neat to watch them through the thermal optics. We only saw one coyote. I was the only one to see it, and it was about a five-second experience. Drive time from Waupun to my house is exactly two hours.

Thursday, March 6

High 49, Low 26

I am starting to get the hang of this and let me tell you, any direction from Waupun for at least 40

miles is loaded with deer and raccoon. Here are some interesting facts. Tom and Brian actually have farmers request that they hunt their land at times as they have problems with coyote stressing out their calves that are sometimes in pasture or in calf hutches as well as chasing cattle that then bust through fences. Brian makes mittens, wall hangings, and does taxidermy, and until the fur market fell apart, a coyote hide brought a healthy dollar.

Tonight, we would hunt within 20 miles from Waupun, and on our first setup as soon as Brian started working the call, Tom spotted two coyotes that gave us a great show but did not get close enough. We kept doing hunt after hunt, and as usual, the coon and deer were everywhere, and we had a very close call on another coyote and then watched a large coon attack the call, which was pretty cool as we could see it stalking the call across the field.

On our last hunt, we had one final experience with a fox or small 'yote, and before I knew it, I was driving home with some excellent memories while watching a couple of top notch outdoorsmen do what they love to do.

Hunt until you can't!
