## The Remarkable Journey of Jordan Stolz

*This story first appeared in the January 2025 issue of Silent Sports Magazine, and has been updated by the Kewaskum Statesman to include results from the World Cup at the Pettit National Ice Center, January 31-February 2.*

At just 20 years old, Jordan Stolz has already etched his name among the world's elite speed skaters. Growing up in the small town of Kewaskum in southeast Wisconsin, Jordan's connection to skating started young. Stolz and his sister, Hannah, began skating at age five, en-

couraged by their parents, Dirk and Jane. "The racing skates were \$600, way too expensive," Jane said, "but a friend found some used ones." This friend was Olympian Becky Many-Sanfello who recommended they join the Badger Speed Skating Club.

In the early days, Dirk cleared snow from their backyard pond and installed outdoor lighting so they could skate at all hours. This early exposure to skating laid the foundation for Jordan's athletic career.

Our full staff of volunteer women did a great job caring for and serving donors the hot ham sandwich meal, with fruit and snacks, along

with homemade cookies and goodies. It was so nice to see and hear our volunteers chat with each other, and with our donors. You just can't replace the personal touch our ladies provide.

The Red Cross Rapidpass system allows donors to read material and answer questions online the day of the drive, which speeds up donation time. This program along with appointments, save donors approximately 15 minutes. We recommend future donors use both systems the next time they donate blood. **Less than 1% of officers worldwide selected**

Village of Kewaskum Police Chief Thomas Bishop recently graduated from the FBI National Academy, joining law enforcement professionals from across the country and around the world in completing this advanced training program.



The 293rd session of the National Academy included 243 law enforcement executives representing 48 states, the District of Columbia, 24 international agencies, 11 military organizations, and four federal civilian agencies. Held at the FBI Training Academy in Quantico, Va., the 10-week program focuses on leadership, communication, and fitness training to support the professional development of law enforcement leaders.

Since its inception in 1935 under FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, the National Academy has graduated more than 55,900 law enforcement professionals. Participation is by invitation only, and less than 1% of officers worldwide are selected, highlighting the prestige of this accomplishment.

Chief Bishop is grateful for the experience and looks forward to applying what he has learned to better serve the community.

# April 1 is Election Day - No Fooling

We had 10 weeks of being free of political campaign ads until campaign fever took hold once again. Huge amounts of money, much of it from billionaires who don't even live in Wisconsin, have again fueled a constant barrage of attack ads.

Have you ever wondered why the very dark and scary attack ads are so prevalent? According to psychologists, our ancestors needed to pay close attention to negative stimuli in order to survive. Early settlers who appreciated the view might not see the rattle snake ready to strike and kill them. This natural disposition to focus more on the scary things than on the positive is used by campaign ads to make us fearful and not view information objectively. Because of this tendency for ads to play on our emotions and fears, they rarely contain much valuable information on which to base your vote. To really learn about a candidate and where he/she stands on issues, it is suggested we visit the candidate's and their opponent's web pages for the information they want you to know, and then also check several other sources, both positive and negative.

The spring election to be held on April 1 has three statewide contests and many communities have additional local races. The most publicized election is that for the Supreme Court. The Wisconsin Supreme Court is made up of seven justices who are elected by the voters to staggered 10-year terms. It is a nonpartisan election, although the two candidates are clearly aligned with the two different parties.

The Supreme Court has three major roles, according to the Wisconsin Court System. They decide cases that have worked their way up through appeals courts, they are administrators for the state court system, and they regulate the legal profession in the state. The court also has the final say in interpreting the Wisconsin state constitution. Despite all the negative ad emphasis on criminal cases and whether a judge is tough on crime, those types of cases rarely are heard by the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court is much more likely to hear cases on the legality of laws passed by the legislature and cases related to industrial pollution. The court is currently considering whether a law written in 1849 that bans abortion is constitutional and whether the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has the power to manage hazardous chemical spills and toxic forever chemicals now found in our food and water.

The other statewide election is for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The Superintendent oversees all public schools and libraries, works at developing plans for improving public schools, evaluates school performance and proposes a state education budget to the governor.

Another statewide issue on the ballot is a referendum for another change to the state constitution. Voters will be asked to vote yes or no to the following statement: Shall section 1m of article III of the constitution be created to require that voters present valid photographic identification verifying their identity in order to vote in any election, subject exceptions which may be established by law?

Supporters of the amendment say it is needed to prevent voter fraud. Nationwide there have been 31 documented cases of voter fraud over 12 years. Opponents say Wisconsin voting laws are too restrictive and point to research by the Brennan Center that found 14.5% of eligible voters nationwide do not have an acceptable photo ID. Nine states require photo ID to vote ([my.lwm.org](http://my.lwm.org)).

According to Marquette University polling, approximately 75% of eligible adults voted in the 2024 presidential election. In April 2023, only 40% of voters bothered to cast a ballot in the last Supreme Court Justice election. The election on April 1 is an important one. Don't be fooled by all the negative political ads and attempts of big money interests to sway our election and be an informed voter.

**LeRoy Frances Baudry**



LeRoy Frances Baudry, 93, of Eden entered into his eternal heavenly home on March 18, 2025 while residing at St Francis Home in Fond du Lac.

He was born in Fond du Lac on December 7, 1931, son of George and Ruth (Allain) Baudry. He grew up on the family dairy farm near Eden.

LeRoy attended grade school in a one-room schoolhouse in Marblehead and St. Joseph's School 9th Grade in Fond du Lac. After graduation from the Fond du Lac High School in 1949, LeRoy was privileged to continue his passion taking over the farm which had been in continuous family ownership since 1848.

LeRoy would fondly reminisce when he met the love of his life, Carol Fenrich, at an Oshkosh Eagles dance and they later married on June 14, 1958 in Oshkosh. They were blessed with five children who quickly realized valuable life qualities of perseverance, strong work ethic and being resourceful. 



### 5 Years Ago

March 26, 2020

Gov. Tony Evers on Tuesday, March 24, directed Department of Health Services (DHS) Secretary-designee Andrea Palm to issue a Safer at Home order that prohibits all nonessential travel, with some exceptions as clarified and defined in the order. The order is effective at 8 a.m. on Wednesday, March 25, and will remain in effect until 8 a.m. Friday, April 24, or until a superseding order is issued.

Signs announcing that businesses were closed were posted this past week on many doors in Kewaskum. The signs were posted in response to the announcement that Gov. Tony Evers made on Friday, March 20, that “non-essential” businesses such as tattoo parlors and hair salons were to close in order to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. Restaurants were told they could offer curbside pick-up, drive-through services or delivery services only. Gatherings were limited to less than 10 people.

A line of cars wrapped around the block as families waited to be served free breakfast and lunch meals from Kewaskum Elementary School on Monday, March 24. The district is offering drive-up, grab-and-go breakfasts and lunches at Kewaskum Elementary School and Farmington Elementary School, Monday through Friday, from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The meals are offered to any child in 12th grade or younger while the Kewaskum schools are closed because of the COVID-19 epidemic.

The Kewaskum School District began offering virtual learning on Monday, March 23, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Students who do not have access to the internet were instructed to pick up their materials from their schools. Chromebooks/iPads were available for pickup at the school.

All Kewaskum School District employees will be paid administrative emergency leave pay March 16 through April 13 because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Kewaskum School Board unanimously decided at a special board meeting on Thursday, March 19.

A turning point in Jordan's life came from watching the 2010 Winter Olympics. He credited Apolo Ohno and Shani Davis's performances in Vancouver as the inspiration to get serious about skating. Had it not been for that moment, Jordan admits he might never have pursued speed skating.

"We are outdoor people and never really watched TV," Jane said. "I told Jordan and Hannah that we would watch the 2012 Olympics over the next couple of weeks." Jordan asked, "What's the Olympics?" Both kids were enthralled with short-track skating and some other events, but didn't get figure skating. They all started skating in earnest; it was a family affair. "We wanted to teach the kids," Jane explained, "so Dirk and I had to learn how to skate. It was intimidating getting those huge, big blades on. It was very awkward, but we loved it from the start; you go so fast."

### In Their DNA

Dirk was a talented downhill skier in his native Germany and had national team aspirations until his family moved to Wisconsin when he was 9, where track and field won out over downhill. "Dirk was a good athlete, but I really never competed," Jane said. "Jordan was 6 or 7 when one of the coaches asked him if he wanted to be a national champion. The coach told us the kids are very talented; they could be the next Eric and Beth Heiden. Not sure we believed him. Jordan's first national championship was at age nine. I remember driving and dragging them all over the place to national meets and skate camps."

The Stolz kids initially trained in short track. Jordan moved to long track and began winning national championships in fifth grade. "You need a specific body for short track," Jordan said. "As I grew, my body became more comfortable for long track which I liked."

As Jordan got better, he started club skating at the Badger Speed Skating Club and the West Allis Speed Skating Club, which morphed into the Wisconsin Speed Skating Club at the Pettit National Ice Center in Milwaukee. "The Badger Club was so helpful in starting Jordan's career with a warm family welcoming atmosphere. I knew this was the sport for us," Dirk said.

Dirk was a Washington County deputy sheriff who transferred to the graveyard shift so he could be around for the 90-minute commute to the Pettit Ice Center where Jordan often trained for 5.5 to 6 hours a day.

"Hannah quit competing at skating at age 16, but is driven in her own right," Jane said. "She has won national and international competitions in bird taxidermy." With a chuckle, Jane added, "Her medal was bigger than Jordan's last World Cup Gold medal."

Jane was surprised how intently Jordan listened to his coaches about weight transfer and other technique language at such a young age. She didn't comprehend the lingo and asked Jordan, "Do you understand this?" Jordan replied, "I have no idea of what they were saying so I just skated harder, and they said, 'You got it.'" Jordan was one of the youngest U.S. skaters to try out for both the short and long track at age 15.

"Jordan was 17 during his first Olympics in 2022 in Beijing China during COVID," Jane said. "It was very tough not being there. He would text me that he couldn't get the right foods and protein he needed." Jordan still fared well, placing 13th in

the 500m and 14th in the 1,000m. As the mom of one of the top speed skaters in the world, Jane explained, "I try to make sure Jordan is eating right and has everything he needs when he is at home competing. It gets busy. People are calling and asking about tickets, and I'm often volunteering for the event. It's pretty crazy. I don't think about it in the moment."

### Achievements and Milestones

Jordan Stolz's rise to prominence in the speedskating world has been nothing short of meteoric. During the first event of the 2022/23 ISU Speed Skating World Cup in November 2022, he became the youngest man to win an individual World Cup race. He clinched the 1,500 meters with a time of 1 minute, 44 seconds, setting a track record at the World Championships in Norway, and won a gold medal in the 1,000 meters with a time of 1:08. By December, Jordan had won medals in multiple events, including gold in the 1,000 meters and silver in the 500 and 1,500 meters, showcasing his versatility. This is a huge accomplishment for any World Cup skater, let alone someone as young as Jordan.

In 2024, Jordan continued to dominate, winning 13 gold medals, including the World All-Around Speed Skating Championship. He set world records in the 1,000 meters with a time of 1:05; and won the all-around with a points total of 144.740 at the World Championships in Inzell, Germany. Jordan was awarded the 2023/24 season's Oscar Mathisen Award of Speed Skating for his extraordinary achievements. Termed the speed skating Oscar, it is awarded annually to the skater with the most outstanding speed skating performance of the season.

"I remember when Jordan won the 2024 All-Around in Inzell," Jane said. "The town was wild; so many people were partying and celebrating. I got out of the car and someone yelled, 'There is Jordan Stolz's mom!' The crowd cheered me like crazy; it was something else. But when everything is done, we look back and think, Wow. There is much more to come."

Jordan notched his second Oscar Mathisen Award following the 2024 season. But wait, there's more! Last November, racing at Hachinohe City at the Four Continents Championship in Japan, Jordan not only won gold medals in the 1500m, 1000m, 500m, and Team Pursuit, but also smashed and set new Track Records in doing so. Even jet lag couldn't stop this champion.

### Training Regime

After taking just three weeks off after his historic speedskating season, Jordan got back into

his offseason training program, which is primarily road cycling in the Kettle Moraine area of Wisconsin. Last year, he focused his training on all distances to complete at the All-Around Championships, balancing endurance and sprints. "This year, the focus is less endurance and more intensity as I'm not racing the 5,000 meters this year," Jordan shared. "I'll mostly do the 500, 1,000, and 1,500-meter distances. I'm hoping to drop times this year."

During the spring and summer, he cycles up to 18 hours a week on the Kettle Moraine roads to build stamina, saying, "I enjoy road-cycling the Kettle Moraine roads, where there isn't much traffic. I need to build endurance during spring and summer. Mountain biking is fun, but I need the consistency of road riding. Most of my cycling is in zones 1 and 2. I start transitioning to ice in September; then, in October, I switch to almost all ice. My sprint-speed endurance intervals on ice are 30 or 60 seconds, with 120 seconds off."

Many of the U.S. Team skaters and their coach are in Salt Lake City. Jordan believes that sea-level training optimizes red blood cell production, occasionally training at higher elevations to boost fitness. His training partners in Milwaukee and his coach, Bob Corby, play crucial roles in his preparation. Corby, a former competitive skater and physical therapist, has been instrumental in Jordan's development. He prefers the consistency of sea-level training with periodic high-altitude camps.

"My weight training program is mainly squats," Jordan said, "with very little upper body, doing mostly explosive moves. I squat more than 400 pounds." He wouldn't divulge exact weight amounts, saying he doesn't want the competition to know. "In October, I do weights twice a week. Later in the season, I'll cut it back."

Jordan is sponsored by Team Albert Heijn Zaanlander in the Netherlands. Zaanlander is a Gouda cheese and Albert Heijn is a large European grocery store chain. He spends part of the year training with teammates in the Italian Alps and the Netherlands. Speed skating is popular in Europe, on the scale of football in the U.S. "I don't get recognized much in the U.S.," Jordan said, "but people know who I am in the Netherlands." Ironically, Jordan is from the land of cheese and a European cheese company is Jordan's sponsor. Maybe Sargento is next?

### Personal Insights and Lifestyle

Maintaining a disciplined lifestyle is crucial for Jordan. His diet is rich in protein and carbohy-



In adult fiction, I am looking forward to Jennifer Weiner's next read, *The Griffin Sisters' Greatest Hits*. In this novel about family life, you meet Cassie and Zoe Griffin who were born a year apart but are very dissimilar. One has a passion for fame, but a lack of talent and the other is a musical prodigy but shies away from the spotlight. Follow them through their pop stardom, family saga and second chances. drates, with a focus on unprocessed foods, including meat, salmon, rice, and pasta. He generally avoids processed foods. “You know what carb-loading is,” he said. “I have to do it all the time. I’m not a big fan of veggies.” Jordan shared that he allows himself occasional indulgences such as a burger or custard from Culvers.

One unique aspect of Jordan’s preparation is his meticulous care of his equipment. He sharpens his skate blades himself, ensuring they meet his exact specifications. This hands-on approach reflects his commitment to excellence in every aspect of his sport.

**What’s Next?**

Jordan had a packed schedule, including competing in World Cup races in China and Japan in November, followed by a few weeks at home in December. Then it was off to the World Cup race in Calgary, Canada, before returning home in February for the World Cup race in Milwaukee, the city’s first in over 20 years. “I’m really excited to be skating at the Pettit,” Jordan said. “They have my favorite ice makers in the world there.” After that, it was off to Poland and the Netherlands. The season culminates in March with the World Championships in Norway. “My dad doesn’t travel with me as much as he used to but will come to some of the World Cup races if it’s a good location,” Jordan laughed.

At the World Cup race in Milwaukee, Jordan placed first in the 1000m a time of 1.06.16, first in the 500m with a time of 33.91, first in the 1500m with a time of 1.41.46, and second in the second 500m race with a time of 34.19. He set track records in the 1000m, 500m, and 1500m races.

From watching Olympic heroes on television to becoming one himself, he has shown that dreams can be achieved with hard work and dedication. His story continues to evolve and the world will be watching as he aims for new heights in his career.

**Bright Future**

Jordan appears to be on track for another amazing year. In early November 2024, he swept the 500m, 1,000m, and 1,500m at the World Cup Qualifier event at the Pettit National Ice Center in Milwaukee. He also claimed the top medal in the 16-lap mass start endurance race. Not a bad opening to the season and just 15 months away from the next Olympics.

Going from a young skater in Kewaskum to a world-renowned speed skating champion, Jordan Stolz’s journey has been an inspiring tale of dedication and the power of family support. His achievements at such a young age are a testament to his talent and determination.

Jordan remains focused on his ultimate goal – the 2026 Winter Olympics in Milan-Cortina. “If I can continue doing what I’m doing,” he said, “it would be great to complete at Cortina.”

With his impressive track record, there’s no doubt that Jordan Stolz will continue to make waves in the world of speed skating.

# Four Days on the Frozen Waters of Lake Superior

*Hello friends,*

Who would have thought that a day that would reach 80 degrees in Necedah would see myself and three good friends, Rick Miotke, Jeff Moll and his son, Nate, heading out onto the ice for a couple of miles and four days of winter camping at Ashland on Lake Superior.

On this same day, a UTV would go through the ice due to current and warm weather.

**Friday, March 14**

**High 56, Low 29**

Two round trips by two ATVs pulling multiple sleds and people ensured that our gang of four was ready to start building our camp, which would consist of three Eskimo ice shacks and a whole lot of gear. For myself, this is my favorite "ice escape" of the year, and that is because whether it is on a jig pole or a tip-up, you never know what you are going to catch until you see it. On this trip, we would catch smelt, coho salmon, brown trout, northern pike, perch, burbot, splake and have a \$5.00-per-big-fish bet on each, so as you can imagine, there is a lot of competition.

Today was all about travel, getting our gear out a couple of miles, setting up camp, fishing and having fun. I cannot remember the exact facts but at night's end, we had a couple of perch and a coho. Someone, late in the evening, may have sabotaged the length of one of the perch.

Very late in the evening, when it was just the Jeff and Mark show, I had a heck of a good fight with what would be a 23.5-inch walleye that, in the end, would have a floy tag attached to it which is used to study fish populations and angler catch.

**Saturday, March 15**

**High 49, Low 26**

Today there would be a major wind storm that wreaked havoc on our camp and made it so that almost constant thought was required to keep our shacks from blowing away. Our gang of four had a blast and caught some beautiful fish, including a couple of perch just under 13-inches in length, several burbot, smelt, one northern pike, a splake, brown trout, and one heck of a lot of laughing.

We eat great meals. Last night

About 10-ish, I caught a 22.5-inch walleye. About 3-ish in the a.m., I caught a 26-inch walleye that propelled the "Elder Moll" and myself to fish until 4:30 a.m.

**High 28, Low 19**


We have witnessed spring and now winter on this trip. The winter part is a good thing because though there is a good 24 inches of ice, it was getting a bit on the weak side.

Today would be a day of coho on the rather small side but very tasty,

with more getting away than we would catch. The "Elder Moll" was on a rather "cold streak," as in not catching much, but today that would turn around as he caught a 21-inch splake and what would beat the winning coho. Rick had big burbot, Nate had big gator, and I would take big perch, walleye, and brown trout.

A trip like this is a constant test as in not falling on the ice or through it, fatigue is huge, and how to adjust to actually catch what you are after, and then, of course, there is the weather.

We had so much fun that we are go-

**Notice of Referendum Election APRIL 1, 2025**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, April 1, 2025, the following question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

**2025 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 2**

**To create** section 1m of article III of the constitution; **relating to:** requiring photographic identification to vote in any election (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2023 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2023 Senate Joint Resolution 73, which became 2023 Enrolled Joint Resolution 9, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

**SECTION 1.** Section 1m of article III of the constitution is created to read:

[Article III] Section 1m (1) No qualified elector may cast a ballot in any election unless the elector presents valid photographic identification that verifies the elector's identity and that is issued by this state, the federal government, a federally recognized American Indian tribe or band in this state, or a college or university in this state. The legislature shall by law establish acceptable forms of photographic identification, and the legislature may by law establish exceptions to the requirement under this subsection.

(2) A qualified elector who is unable to present valid photographic identification on election day shall be permitted to cast a provisional ballot. A provisional ballot may not be counted unless the elector presents valid photographic identification at a later time and place as provided by the legislature by law.

**SECTION 2. Numbering of new provision.** If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

**Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That** the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2025 legislature; and, be it further

**Resolved, That** the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of April 2025; and, be it further

**Resolved, That** the questions concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

**Question 1: "Photographic identification for voting.** Shall section 1m of article III of the constitution be created to require that voters present valid photographic identification verifying their identity in order to vote in any election, subject to exceptions which may be established by law?"

**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT AS TO THE QUESTION**

The Wisconsin Constitution provides that "[o]nly a United States citizen age 18 or older who is a resident of an election district in this state is a qualified elector of that district who may vote in an election for national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum." Wis. Const. art. III, § 2. The referendum question would add a new provision to Wis. Const. art. III to require that voters present valid photographic identification to exercise their rights as electors.

The proposed constitutional text would provide that acceptable photographic identification must be "issued by this state, the federal government, a federally recognized American Indian tribe or band in this state, or a college or university in this state." The proposal therefore would exclude identification such as out-of-state driver's licenses and tribal identification issued by non-Wisconsin tribes.

The proposal would allow, but not require, the legislature to create exceptions to the identification requirement. Courts have held that some exceptions are required by the U.S. Constitution. The proposal would also prevent future legislatures from repealing statutory photographic identification requirements altogether.

A "yes" vote would vote to create a new article III, section 1m of the Wisconsin Constitution to require voters to present "valid photographic identification" in order to vote.

A "no" vote would vote not to create the new constitutional provision.

Office of the Washington County Clerk To the voters of Washington County:

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Washington County, Wisconsin on April 1, 2025, at which the officers named below shall be chosen.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
show an acceptable form of photo identification\*
sign the poll book\*\*

\*If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

\*\*If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an electronic ballot marking device to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which they intend to vote.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it may be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils an optical scan ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter.

### NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ELECTION

APRIL 1, 2025

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, April 1, 2025, the following question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

#### 2025 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 2

**To create** section 1m of article III of the constitution; **relating to:** requiring photographic identification to vote in any election (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2023 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2023 Senate Joint Resolution 73, which became 2023 Enrolled Joint Resolution 9, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

#### SECTION 1. Section 1m of article III of the constitution is created to read:

[Article III] Section 1m (1) No qualified elector may cast a ballot in any election unless the elector presents valid photographic identification that verifies the elector's identity and that is issued by this state, the federal government, a federally recognized American Indian tribe or band in this state, or a college or university in this state. The legislature shall by law establish acceptable forms of photographic identification, and the legislature may by law establish exceptions to the requirement under this subsection.

(2) A qualified elector who is unable to present valid photographic identification on election day shall be permitted to cast a provisional ballot. A provisional ballot may not be counted unless the elector presents valid photographic identification at a later time and place as provided by the legislature by law.

**SECTION 2. Numbering of new provision.** If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

**Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That** the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2025 legislature; and, be it further

**Resolved, That** the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of April 2025; and, be it further

**Resolved, That** the questions concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

**QUESTION 1: "Photographic identification for voting.** Shall section 1m of article III of the constitution be created to require that voters present valid photographic identification verifying their identity in order to vote in any election, subject to exceptions which may be established by law?"

#### EXPLANATORY STATEMENT AS TO THE QUESTION

The Wisconsin Constitution provides that "[o]nly a United States citizen age 18 or older who is a resident of an election district in this state is a qualified elector of that district who may vote in an election for national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum." Wis. Const. art. III, § 2. The referendum question would add a new provision to Wis. Const. art. III to require that voters present valid photographic identification to exercise their rights as electors.

The proposed constitutional text would provide that acceptable photographic identification must be "issued by this state, the federal government, a federally recognized American Indian tribe or band in this state, or a college or university in this state." The proposal therefore would exclude identification such as out-of-state driver's licenses and tribal identification issued by non-Wisconsin tribes.

The proposal would allow, but not require, the legislature to create exceptions to the identification requirement. Courts have held that some exceptions are required by the U.S. Constitution. The proposal would also prevent future legislatures from repealing statutory photographic identification requirements altogether.

A "yes" vote would vote to create a new article III, section 1m of the Wisconsin Constitution to require voters to present "valid photographic identification" in order to vote.

A "no" vote would vote not to create the new constitutional provision.

## Notice of Spring Election and Sample Ballots

**OFFICE OF THE FOND DU LAC COUNTY CLERK:  
TO THE VOTERS OF FOND DU LAC COUNTY:**

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Fond du Lac County, on April 1, 2025, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, in the sample ballot below.

**Information to Voters**

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification\*
- sign the poll book

**\*If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth and then proceed to a machine to cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

**Assistance for Voting**

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter. If a voter is unable to state their name and address, an assistant may also do so for the voter.

**Where Optical Scan Voting is Used**

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an **electronic ballot marking device** to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall use the tactile pad to type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall use the tactile pad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

**Spoiled Ballots**

If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than **three** ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

**After Voting the Ballot**

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, the voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device.

**The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.**


