Kewaskum Native Michelle LL to Perform at The Bend

Musician and Kewaskum native Michelle LL will take the stage at The Bend Theater in West Bend on Thursday, April 17 at 7:30 p.m. Many community members may recognize her by her maiden name, Michelle Thull, as she grew up in Kewaskum and first found her voice singing with her grandfather's band, the Bill Thull Orchestra, before joining her parents and siblings in the Goodtime Dutchmen, a Wisconsin polka band.

Michelle is excited to showcase a new side of her artistry, just minutes away from where her musical journey began.

"This feels special," Michelle says. "I'm not that far from West Bend now, I live in Oshkosh, but growing up in Kewaskum, The Bend was actually the first place I ever saw a movie on the big screen. I was around 16, and it was kind of a date with my future husband, Danny. My mom sent my brother,

er, Russell, with us... so he sat right between us in this very room," she recalled.

Michelle grew up always having a passion for music.

"My family loved music and dancing," she recalls. "We went to so many polka dances growing up, and I just fell in love with it all."

Her musical journey expanded in sixth grade, when her dad encouraged her to learn the saxophone. This was the first of many instruments she would master over time.

Michelle stated that she originally set out to study physical therapy at Concordia University in Mequon, as she believed music was just supposed to be a hobby. Her passion and talents continued to grow, and she eventually embraced music as her full-time career.

At 19, Michelle married Danny Jerabek who is also a musician. Together they built a family and their own band. Settling in Oshkosh, the couple

launched Copper Box, a high-energy Americana roots band that blends rock, blues, folk, and polka influences into original pieces.

Michelle explained that the band has toured across the U.S., from the East to the West Coast, and even performed in Amsterdam and Canada. They've shared the stage with major acts like The Doobie Brothers, Huey Lewis & The News, and Little Big Town, and earned multiple awards from the Wisconsin Area Music Industry (WAMI), including Artist of the Year, Americana Artist of the Year, and more.

Although she is committed to the Copper Box, Michelle has long kept a collection of original songs that don't quite fit the band's vibe and are more personal, often influenced by artists such as Bonnie Raitt, Van Morrison, Carole King, and Eva Cassidy.



2025 Storm Spotter Training Scheduled for Tuesday, April 8

The National Weather Service, in conjunction with Fond du Lac County Emergency Management, will be hosting annual storm spotter training. The session will run from 6:30 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 8, 2025, in the Fond du Lac City-County Government Center Legislative Chambers located at 160 S. Macy Street, Fond du Lac.

Training will be led by a meteorologist from the National Weather Service and is free and open to the public. It is highly recommended for members of law enforcement, fire service, EMS, dispatchers along with other first responders such as public works and amateur radio operators. Anyone who has interest in learning more about severe weather is encouraged to attend. Pre-registration is not required.

The training provides information on severe weather safety, as well as, the differences between watches and warnings. Information will be presented on how to help the National Weather Service as a trained spotter, including what needs to be reported to the NWS and how to submit reports. It is important for everyone to know about the different types of severe weather, as this helps residents stay safe by being properly prepared for when severe weather occurs.



for Tuesday's election when only 464 ballots were cast in the Village of Kewaskum. Two of the three incumbent trustees were re-elected for two-year terms. Roger Strack was successful in his bid for a second term. He led the balloting with 354 votes. Also named to a second term was Daniel Schmidt who received 279 votes. The third incumbent, Alfred Kral, lost to challenger David Nigh, who won by a mere two-vote margin, 229 to 227. Kral had been on the board for the past 12 years.

A building report was made to the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening. The report, made by the board building committee, listed all changes from the original plans and showed a net increase in costs of \$38,870.99, plus the gym flooring which the board had taken over at the previous meeting. The board accepted the report of the building committee and approved the additional payment from interest monies earned on the building funds.

Senator Thomas E. Petri (R-2nd District) has announced that the state department of transportation has mailed checks totaling \$67,264.60 to every city, village and town in Washington County, of which Kewaskum is to receive \$476.35.

Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, reports an improvement on the economic horizon. As of Monday, March 31, that company had called back a total of 58 production employees. They also expect to put on an additional 45 laid-off production workers within the following ten days to two weeks. Inventories have been stabilized and the call-back is being made to meet increases in sales.

Kenneth Schmitt, 22, who has bowled in league competition only four years, saw a bowler's dream come true at Campbellsport Friday night as he slammed 12 straight strikes for a coveted 300 game. Schmitt, who carries a 183 average, opened with games of 168 and 191 before exploding for his 300, the first ever sanctioned at Campbellsport's King Pin Lanes.

75 Years Ago

The new Kewaskum theatre and Hansen's men's wear and shoe store, located in a newly constructed building on Fond du Lac Avenue, both had their grand opening last weekend and were visited by very large crowds. The men's wear store opened Friday and the opening will continue until April 1. People came beyond expectations on opening day Friday and Saturday and the store was sold out on some items the first two days.

Next Tuesday, April 4, is spring election day and the polls in Kewaskum will be open from 9 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. The voting will be in the old village hall, probably for the last time. A light vote is predicted although considerable interest is centered around the race for the three village trustee offices and that for circuit court justice. There are five candidates for the trustee positions. They are Marvin A. Martin and Clifford Stautz, incumbents, and Lester Kohn, Arnold Martin, and Charles E. Sparks.

For the first time in its history, Kewaskum will act as host for the Tri-County student council convention. The convention is tentatively scheduled for April 17. Schools expected to participate in the event are Brandon, Oakfield, Lomira, Campbellsport, Slinger, North Fond du Lac, Rosendale, and Kewaskum.

My EZ Season

Hello friends,

This week, I am writing to you about a series of bad luck that has happened to me, and I feel it makes for a pretty interesting story. Every year from around the 1st of April until the end of Wisconsin's deer gun season, I have what I call my "busy season," and to be perfectly honest, it about kicks my hinder. For several years now, my busy season has not ended until I return from my annual Mississippi deer and hog hunt in early January.

As I have written about, this late December, while hunting and camping in The Delta National Forest in west central Mississippi, a tree fell on my 2017 GMC, smack dab on the cab, and it was not pretty. Long story short, I made it home with the truck, and a month later it was rebuilt, which cost my insurance company \$17,900.

The night I arrived home, after a 952-mile trek pulling my toy hauler trailer with broken windows and a scrunched cab, I was proud that I got the old girl home. I was shutting the lights off in my house to call a long day quits, and I noticed a long and very ugly wound on my 8-year-old golden retriever Ruby's belly. That wound ended up being cancer. My vet and myself did everything we could do to save Ruby, and that was not meant to be as she passed away 16 days later on my living room floor.

The following week, I started to notice a scratch in my throat, headaches and fatigue. I was getting better, then I helped host an ice skating party, which was on a snowy night, and I became very ill for 7 days. To this day, about 50 days later, I have not fully recovered my stamina. The illness that whacked me, the loss of Ruby, and a truck-guy being without his truck for a month was not a positive start to my EZ season.

So we all know that when we fall, we must get back up. My pond biologist had told me that I need more habitat for my fish and minnows. I already had quite a bit but took on the task with about twenty, 20-foot oak and maple tops from a logging job. I would put the butt end on shore and have the top facing out on the "ice," and when spring came, it would sink down for my long term fishing/retirement plan.

I was super ambitious and was confident the ice

was safe. I got a bit too close to the aerator while dragging the biggest tree top across the pond, over 14-feet of water. My right foot, leg and upper body fell through the ice faster than you can blink an eye. I had two problems, one, I was in very cold water that was deep and two, my left leg did not fall through the ice as it did not break, and I was stretched as fast as you can imagine. In other words, tie your right foot to an atv, tie your left foot to another atv, have two drivers go opposite directions real fast, it was not pretty.

If anyone is fairly experienced at falling through the ice and getting out, it is me. I honestly thought I was fine. About an hour later, I noticed I had hurt my left ankle, knee and my back. Two hours later I was 100% worthless, all I could do was crawl. I knew I needed help, so a host of neighbors answered my call. My house was not perfect, and before they arrived, I swept my floors while crawling and, simply put, was a mess.

The next day my doctor told me she was concerned my ankle was broke. X-rays revealed a se-

vere sprain. That fall happened four weeks ago. I am healing but my balance, especially when cutting firewood, is not good.

Just to put a tad more love into this story, I'm fishing and camping on the ice on the Mississippi river, then get a text from one of my Polish neighbors down the road a piece.

Here is what it said: "There are three bulls in my backyard." I knew it was three, shorthorn 600-pound heifers, and I was doinked as my neighbor is surrounded by forest and I was four hours away.

Thank God for my neighbors for the 500 thousandth time! These shorthorns are so tame that even though they were lost in the forest, my good buddy Daren Plantz, who helps feed, had carried a bucket and kept calling until they came out from their adventure, which was a good half mile from my house. The neighborhood worked together on a roundup and all's well that ends well took place!

Can't wait for this dang EZ season to end!

D.N.R. Learn to Hunt Bear Program Seeks Applicants and Instructors

The Learn to Hunt Bear program is intended to promote awareness and understanding of bear hunting in Wisconsin, particularly for those who are interested in hunting bear on their own in the future. The program includes multiple classroom and field sessions, culminating with a bear-hunting experience. Participants will learn about bear biology, population management, habits, habitat, hunting techniques, regulations and safety.

Anyone who has not previously participated in the Learn to Hunt Bear program or received a bear harvest authorization is encouraged to apply. Participants must be at least 10 years old, and there is no maxi-

mum age.

The number of Learn to Hunt Bear programs offered varies annually and will influence the number of participants selected. Applicants will be notified of the status of their application by June 1.

Become a Learn to Hunt Bear Instructor

Potential instructors need at least five years of bear hunting experience and must consent to a background check.

The DNR will work with instructor groups to develop a Learn to Hunt Bear program in their area or help individual volunteers find an existing group to work with. Interested volunteers should notify Emily Iehl, DNR Hunting & Shooting Sports Program specialist, at emily.iehl@wisconsin.gov by April 18.

Chief Bishop Graduates from the FBI National Academy

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop recently joined the ranks of an elite group of law enforcement professionals after successfully completing the ten week FBI National Academy in Virginia.

This academy is considered a world-renowned leadership and training program that is reserved for less than one percent of law enforcement officers worldwide.

Chief Bishop explained that the opportunity was more than just professional development; it was the fulfillment of a long-term goal.

“The FBI National Academy is considered one of the best training programs for executive law enforcement officers,” Officer Bishop said. “It’s been a goal of mine since I became chief.”

Held at the FBI training facility in Quantico, Virginia, the academy brings together law enforcement executives from across the globe, and the coursework is rigorous as it covers topics from critical incident leadership to forensic science. The Chief stated the networking opportunities were the most valuable aspect of this experience.

“The classes I took were excellent and very insightful,” he said. “I was able to meet and get to know law enforcement executives from literally all over the world as there were international students in our class as well. [I was] able to expand my network and [am] able to make a phone call to any of those folks in a crucial situation.”

Getting accepted into the FBI National Academy isn’t easy. In fact, officers must be nominated by a previous graduate before even being considered. For Chief Bishop, the process included an application, an in-depth FBI background investigation, multiple interviews with colleagues, a medical clearance, and even a timed one-mile run under ten minutes.

“It is an incredible honor to be nominated and chosen to attend the FBI National Academy. There are many high quality leaders in our profession who don’t get this opportunity. I’m just lucky to have the support I needed to attend from my family, co-workers, Village Administration, Village Board and our great community,” mentioned the Chief.

Throughout the training, the Kewaskum officer enrolled in advanced courses such as Critical Incident Leadership, Navigating Disasters, Wellness in Law Enforcement, Police and Media Relations, Forensic Science, and Physical Training. Each course, he stated, will directly influence the way he serves the Kewaskum community, not just as a police chief, but as a person.

“All of those classes have a direct impact on how I lead our department and Village every day. They also impacted my personal life and I wholeheartedly believe I left there a better person,

husband, father, and chief than when I left here on January 1,” said Officer Bishop.

As the Emergency Manager for the Village of Kewaskum, Bishop made sure to pay more attention to how other communities handle crises. From hurricanes in the Carolinas to wildfires in California and the ongoing border issues in the south, real-world insights helped shape the Chief of Kewaskum’s own plans for preparing the Village for potential future emergencies.

“The instructors were mostly retired or active FBI Special Agents with a wealth of knowledge and experience to draw from. However, even more so than the instructors, some of the best learning moments came from my classmates with experiences from around different parts of the country and the world.”

Bishop’s experience was made even more special by a surprise visit from his former lieutenant,

Mark Steiner. Steiner flew out to attend the graduation, joining Bishop’s family in celebrating his accomplishment.

“On a personal note, my former Lt., Mark Steiner, who retired last year, surprised me by flying out with my family and attending my graduation. It was a very special surprise and I am very appreciative of his support! He knew how important this training was to me and wanted to show his support, even though he no longer works with me. It was a great surprise,” recalled the officer.

Bishop also received his diploma from newly-appointed FBI Director Kash Patel. He stated this was a memorable moment given the current political landscape and changes happening within the FBI.




