## Campbellsport Baseball Win Streak Reaches Seven Games to Start Season

On April 14, Campbellsport baseball beat Living Word Lutheran (LWL) 6-4 for their seventh straight win to start the season.

Campbellsport (7-0) took a 1-0 lead over LWL (1-4) thanks to Riley Kohlmann driving in Brody Nolan for the Cougars in the first inning.

LWL held a 3-1 lead over Campbellsport after four innings when the Cougars tied the game in the fifth inning highlighted by a Nolan RBI single and a sacrifice fly RBI from Braden Bothe to put the score at 3-3.

The Timberwolves took the lead back at 4-3

on a passed ball after LWL had the bases loaded with no outs when Kyler Bowe came into the game to pitch for the Cougars.

The Cougars were able to tie the game at four runs apiece for both teams when Bowe drove in Hunter Cochran at the top of the sixth inning for Campbellsport.

This Campbellsport baseball team has shown the ability to come up with key plays in big moments during their seven-game win streak to start the season which they showed again in the seventh inning by capitalizing on a LWL error scoring Nolan and executing a squeeze play scor-

## Local Press Burger Bar Competes for the Title of Wisconsin's Best Burger

Local Press Burger Bar in Kewaskum has been announced as an Elite Eight finalist in the Wisconsin Beef Council's "Best Burger Contest." They had the seventh highest amount of nominations for the title. The nomination period was open from February 21 to March 21 for individuals to submit their best burger spot.

The menu features a variety of specialty burgers, sandwiches, a burger of the month special, and a fry of the month special. They are open Tuesday through Saturday from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m.

To qualify for the contest, the hamburgers had to meet the following guidelines:

- The burger must be 100% beef (other ingredients may be added to the patty such as spices, vegetables, etc.)
- All burgers must be composed of a formed

ground beef patty served on a bun or other bread product (such as biscuits, focaccia or tortillas). Burgers may include any combination of condiments (such as ketchup, mayonnaise and mustard), sauces (such as barbeque or hot sauce), cheeses and toppings (such as bacon, onions, tomatoes and lettuce). Every component of the burger must be placed between the bun or bread pieces or served open-faced on a bread product.

The Wisconsin Beef Council's panel of judges will visit each restaurant in the finals to taste and score their burgers. The judges will be scoring the burgers based on taste, appearance and presentation, proper cooking temperature, overall eating enjoyment, and bonus points could be awarded for the environment, atmosphere and experience in the restaurant. A winner will be announced on the Wisconsin Beef Council's website and social media on May 1 in celebration of National Beef Month.

## Kewaskum Senior Named to Wisconsin Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Team

Andrew Reichert, a senior at Kewaskum High School, has been named to the Wisconsin Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Team by the Wisconsin Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

The Wisconsin chapter, founded in 1993, is one of 120 chapters across the country. Each year, chapters award more than \$1 million in scholarships to high school scholar-athletes.

Reichert was selected from 93 nominees statewide to be one of 14 young men named to the team. As part of the honor, he will receive a \$2,000 scholarship, an award and a jacket from the foundation.

Jason Piittmann, who coached Reichert during his high school football career, nominated him for the award.

"As a coach, he was there whenever I needed someone to help with any task — from organizing equipment to talking to underclassmen and everything in between," Piittmann said.

Reichert is actively involved in his school and community beyond football. He serves as historian for the National Honor Society, is a leadership team member and newsletter editor for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and is a member of the Kewaskum Impact Club and KEY Club. He also volunteers as a technology instructor for senior citizens and as a flag football coach, in addition to various roles through Holy Trinity Catholic Church.

"Andrew goes above and beyond in all he does," Piittmann said.

After graduation, Reichert plans to attend Concordia University, where he will major in secondary education and play football. He and his family will be honored at a banquet hosted by the Wisconsin Football Foundation in Madison on April 27, along with the other scholarship recipients.

There's a solid reason Wisconsin is just one of the northern tier of states now referred to as the Rust Belt.

West Bend serves as a prime example of the disappearance of industrial manufacturing. Once home to Enger Kress, Amity Leather, the West Bend Company and a slew of others, about all that remains is Gehls and Serigraph Sales in addition to small machining shops.

Outside the city, Weaslers, Daco and Dairyland Seed complete a much smaller blue-collar profile.

Then there are the outsourced, products still assembled... just not here anymore. Think Parker Pen in Janesville which closed its plant in 2009, 300 jobs lost. They're produced overseas, currently in France. Oshkosh B'Gosh clothing left their namesake town in 1997. Downsized to Mexico and Honduras.

Some items have vanished entirely. Ripon Good Cookies ceased operations completely in that burg in 2016. Quite a tumble from the late 1970s when they baked 6 million cookies a day. Others faded fast after promising runs. With the repeal of Prohibition, Chief Oskosh beer made a big splash. Selling widely, the company followed a 1950s trend of pale lagers. By the 1960s, the brand was purchased by David Uihlein. The new recipe used corn syrup instead of corn grits and hop extracts. A flavor change not welcomed by regular consumers. Peoples Brewing bought the name and from 1971-72 had a brief run until they closed in 1972, and it spelled the end. A long way from our fathers picking up a six pack at Rheimers Bar or Ray Weiss in Campbellsport. The famous red arrowhead logo painted on farm silos.

Four succinct histories which reflect the rise and fall of made right here in America's Dairyland. Back in the day, a person could quit a job and get hired elsewhere inside a week. Those times are gone. Will tariffs bring them back? Anybody's guess.

# Preserving Eden's History

United States history is often remembered by major events like presidents, wars and major movements. However, history was made by our grandfathers and grandmothers who were the farmers and workers living through those events. What memories are buried in our community that we can save to have a better understanding of our past? And which stories can you help in discovering and sharing?

One thing for sure is you can see a lot of Eden history during the Eden Village-wide rummage sale the last weekend of April if you stop at the Old Eden Townhall.

## The Value of Eden's History

There are many ways Eden's past intertwines with national history. First, evidence of sugar camps, marker trees and sacred petroform sites show the ties to indigenous peoples before and after Wisconsin statehood.

Second, the role of early agriculture and family farms defined the young country. Many of those older the age of sixty had parents or relatives who lived in an economy defined by dairy farming or its supporting businesses in the mid-1900s.

Third is the significance of local veterans in regard to the wars they served. Of particular, what Vietnam War, Korean War and World War II stories (and earlier) can be salvaged either directly from the veteran or from those who heard what was passed down from relatives? In addition, what military service of living veterans can be documented?

Fourth is the influence of religion on the township. There were Irish Catholics in South Eden, and many Germans Catholics and German Protestants in other parts of the township and village. Meanwhile, Marblehead's quarry had a unique enclave of Italians. No doubt there are stories from other ethnic groups to join the collections.

Fifth is the history of Ledge, and the general topography of the rivers. It's important to save stories of species of fish, birds and mammals that were common, including how the water used to run. Eden's distinction as "The Garden of Eden" matches the need to preserve stories of our land.

Sixth is the role of industry in the area, including that of the railroad shaping population and developing settlements. As an example, George B. Reilly's son Dave Reilly was told they considered running the railroad tracks through South Eden but instead sided with the construction of what became Eden Station (Eden). How did the railroad shape local behavior?

Seventh, recall the area's influence on Brewer's history with Jim Gantner. Given it is more than 40 years since Milwaukee went to the World Series, it

is good timing to share those memories.

## The Old Eden Townhall

In the 1990s, many elders from the Eden area came together to preserve local history. These individuals are honored at the museum in a frame accompanying this article. They decided to save the "Old Eden Townhall" and use it as a gathering place to share history. Over time, that generation faded away, and the use of the building dwindled. Then in May of 2020, a fire damaged the building. However, many artifacts and documents survived.

Currently, only two members of the 1990s exist – Bob Meier and Carol Murphy. Judy (Wettstein) Walters, Bob Flood, Wayne Hass and Mona Abhold have worked with those mentioned here to restore the Eden Historical Society to what it used to be. It has taken considerable time and resources to get the building back functioning, but the work is a reminder of the importance of Eden's history.

The purpose of the Eden Historical Society is many. First of all, is the preservation of this historic site. Carol recalls being at Neosho, and she saw an old town hall. "Then a bunch of guys like Jack Salter, Jim O'Brien, Dale Grahl – they went

down to talk to the people at Neosho." From there, came plans and ideas on what to do with the Old Eden Townhall in the village, a building that dated back to the 1800s.

Because of the actions of the previous generations in the 1990s, Eden has a location that houses history, functioning as a gathering place to preserve the past and to pass it onto the next generation. Thirty years after its origins, the present

### 5 Years Ago

April 16, 2020

group started to utilize Facebook. Since last year, it's been seeking contributors to the community building, whether that be stories, images or items. The present members stress that the current status of the Old Eden Townhall is a process of reorganizing, and input and information would be appreciated.

**How can you help?**

First of all, please stop by on Friday, April 25, and Saturday, April 26, to view the history of Eden. The hours will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., both days. Please also consider bringing a friend to share the experience and trigger old memories of the past.

Donations can occur in various ways. It took considerable effort to repair the museum after the fire, and upkeep of the building is aided by the generous financial support of the community.

In addition, Judy Walters and Bob Flood (phone – 920-251-3808) are in charge of its Facebook page. Consider sharing some old pictures with the Eden Historical Society to make them available online. Remember, you don't have to give up the picture – just let it be scanned to preserve it for posterity. The more people who have access to the image increases the livelihood and longevity of its story.

Please also remember when going through estates, be careful to save unidentified images. Reflect on where those pictures were taken – some people who passed in the 1800s and early 1900s are not photographically identified. Question if someone from a local historical society (Eden, Byron, Oakfield or Kewaskum) could use it. Please remember

sites like findagrave.com exist, and such locations could use images that identify those long deceased. In addition, sometimes the most mundane articles (pamphlets, advertising, and other ephemera) were not expected to be saved. Therefore, because such items have survived decades, if not a century, they help tell the story of the era. Contact the Eden Historical Society first to make sure the item is saved. Remember, you can't undo throwing out history.

All of the folks mentioned above are great contacts. Reach out to them with ideas, items and questions to preserve Eden's past.

Lastly, the easiest help we can all do is share the stories of our ancestors and neighbors. The best reason to support the Eden Historical Society is to honor those who have passed. For example, Bob Flood said, "I wish I could ask Sylvia that." His point is his respect for Sylvia McNamara (1923-2016). She worked for Flood Oil and took calls for Dave



Rose (1927-2019), who was artificially inseminating cows around the 1960s. If there was a question about Eden, Sylvia could answer it given all the customers she served. Along those lines, Dave Rose always shared stories at historical meetings. Now, Carol Murphy said, she wishes she could listen to him again. We all wish we would have recorded more of what Dave Rose thought.

It was Dave Rose who said it was important to think about legacy. "...

# Indians Fastpitch Starts 4-0 in Conference Play

The Kewaskum Indians varsity fastpitch softball team has come out of the gate with four straight conference wins to start the season. The conference is shaping up to be a real dog fight of a year with Winneconne, Plymouth, Kettle Moraine Lutheran, and Waupun all having very veteran rosters and a boatload of talent. Kewaskum softball came out ready to battle and came out of the first two weeks unscathed.

#### At Plymouth

Gale Grahn Field in Plymouth was a house of horror last year for the Lady Indians, but the Kewaskum bats would not let this year be the same as the last as they pounded out a season-high 15 hits, which led to 12 runs, to secure the victory. Seven Indian sluggers, Lauren Rettler, Julia Prochnow, Ellie Calliari, Brianna Krause, Maddyn Sabish, Izzy Wollner, and Macy Sabish, all had multiple hits.

Plymouth stayed in the game with nine hits of their own, but Kewaskum helped them out by committing four errors on defense. The fourth inning appeared to be the turning point in the game. Nursing a 7-5 lead after a Plymouth home run, Bri Donner, the Pumas' number-three hitter, laced a deep, line drive into left center with a runner on. In the play of the game, senior centerfielder Lauren Rettler got a bead on it and made a diving catch on the warning track and had the wherewithal to find her balance after somersaulting to fire a laser to second base, keeping a base runner at first base, killing all momentum the Pumas had. Plymouth's first base coach told Lauren at the end of the game that it “was the best catch he has ever seen.”

The top of the seventh saw the Indians put four insurance runs on the board, which proved to be the difference.

Campbellsport had two outs on the ledger when Nolan reached base on an error then stole second base to get into scoring position with Braden Bothe at the plate.


Bothe proceeded to hit a seeing-eye single to drive Nolan home for the winning run for the Cougars 4-3 walk-off victory.

“I woke up David (Kassie’s husband) and he immediately called his mom to come watch our older daughter and we started getting ready

to go,” recalled the Campbellsport mom. “Things quickly changed and I realized it was about to happen and we weren’t going to have enough time for someone to get there and get to the hospital.”

David called 911 at 5:18 a.m. The ambulance team arrived within 13 minutes of the call, and just two minutes before baby Charlotte was born.

After the delivery at the Davis home, Kassie and Charlotte were transported to SSM Health in Fond du Lac and the two were reported to be healthy.

“We couldn’t be more grateful that it all turned out the way it did,” remarked Kassie.

A week after the event, the family brought Charlotte back to visit the first responders who helped deliver her.

“The crew was wonderful and we were fortunate enough to take Charlotte to see them again with a treat about a week after,” said the Davis family. “We hope to continue to stay in touch so they can watch her grow.”

Charlotte is now nearly three months old and the Davis family is forever grateful for the assistance of the Campbellsport first responders.

# Local Earth Day and Arbor Day Celebrations

An ancient Native American proverb warns us that: “Only when the last tree has died, the last river is poisoned and the last fish has been caught will we realize that we cannot eat money.” Despite the warning, the battles between profiting from the earth versus protecting it are ongoing. Earth Day, which began 55 years ago, focuses on the importance of protecting the planet.

The first official Earth Day was held on April 22, 1970. It was organized by Wisconsin Senator Gaylord Nelson as a nationwide effort to raise awareness of environmental issues after a major oil spill occurred off the California coastline. In response, Republican President Richard Nixon created the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Clean Air, Clean Water and Endangered Species Acts were passed by Congress. These laws have helped protect our nation’s air, water and wildlife from pollutants. EPA success stories include patching the ozone layer, preventing cities and industries from dumping raw sewage into waterways, banning DDT which enabled the bald eagle to once again thrive and making our air safer to breathe (*billmoyers.com*). The future of the EPA and environmental laws is currently uncertain.

Arbor Day, officially celebrated the last Friday of April, has an even longer history. It was begun in 1872 by Julius Sterling Merten in Nebraska. He created a movement to plant trees to provide shade, help clean the air and water, support wildlife and beautify the area. In Wisconsin, Governor Evers has pledged that 100 million new trees will be planted across the state by 2030. To help in the effort, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) gives a free tree seedling each year to all fourth graders in Wisconsin, which is over 50,000 trees.

Anyone interested in planting large numbers of trees can inexpensively obtain the trees from the state DNR. Many different species of trees native to Wisconsin are available for purchase in lots of 100. A minimum

Many events are planned by the City of Beaver Dam for Saturday, April 26. From 9-10:30 a.m. civic minded folks will gather to do a downtown trash clean up. Helpers should check in at the American Bank Shelter behind the bank on 115 Front Street to get directions and pick up supplies. Volunteers will receive a gift card from Great Harvest Bakery & Café. At 10:30 a.m., a tree planting ceremony will be held at East 213 Front St. Families, friends and coworkers as well as various organizations volunteer to help with the city clean-up. LaToya Bates, of Mayville, reported that members of the Dodge County Democrats will “be helping our communities become healthier and

brighter by planting trees and participating in highway cleanup this Earth Day” during the Beaver Dam city cleanup.

# The Peter Hagedorn Story

*Hello friends,*

I met Peter Hagedorn in 1982 while on vacation with my dad and brothers to one of his fly-in locations, "Shultz" lake, in northwest Ontario, Canada. In 1988, I became his camp manager at Chimo Lodge, and the following year I began writing this column while camp manager at Chimo Lodge.

Last week, I spent five days at Pete and Elisabeth Hagedorn's home in Red Lake for his 87th birthday and made the decision it was time to do a column on this incredible man's history.

Peter Hagedorn was born in Berlin, Germany on April 2, 1938, the same year that WWII started. Peter is quiet about those years but when he speaks of it, he includes memories of nightly bombings in Berlin. His home was blown up while his family was in the basement and his father was taken prisoner and released by the British in 1948.

Like most youth in Germany in that era, Peter became an apprentice at the age of 15, and his trade would be to become a printer.

At the age of 19, adventure won over Peter and he took a ship to Halifax, Nova Scotia and thus his life in Canada would begin. Canada needed laborers and Peter had three options: farm work, logger, with a Swede saw and horses, or a miner, in this case, a gold miner. Pete chose mining and soon found out it was very hard work, good money, and he loved it, while working at the Pickeral Crow Mine in Ontario and ending up at the Madsen mine near Red Lake.

In 1973, Peter applied with the ministry to build a fly-in camp on Roderick Lake which is about 50 air miles northwest of Red Lake. In 1974, Peter and his family, Elisabeth and daughters Berget and Josie, started building their first cabin (Pete

and Elisabeth have been married 63 years) and opened what would become Chimo Lodge in 1975 (Chimo - Inuit for friendship).

Over the next three years, Pete built a total of five cabins at Roderick and began his outpost operation, which in the end would be 10 locations, 11 cabins. During the winter of 1978, Pete also obtained his pilot's license and purchased a PA12.

In 1983, Pete upgraded to a Cessna 180 NPO, November Papa Oscar, a plane that I would fly in hundreds of times.

In 1988, I was offered a job as camp manager of Chimo Lodge. I took it and thus a solid relationship with the Hagedorn family and this business would begin.

The following year, 1989, while sitting in a bear stand and camp manager at Chimo, I hand-wrote my first column for The Poynette Press and never looked back. I would go full time as a writer after that but for the next 15 years, spent at least a year of my life helping the Hagedorns with my main skill being dropping trees, making lumber and building.

In 1995, Pete purchased a Norsemen and thus "Chimo Air" was born. In other words, instead of paying to fly his guests, Pete would fly them himself. Between 1995 and 2013, Peter Hagedorn developed the largest float plane business in the Red Lake area, owning two 180s, two Norsemen a twin Bech and three Otters. On one of the Otters, Pete paid \$800,000 and had a turbine engine put in it.

I have to add that Pete was always ahead of the game, the first with solar lights and appliances and always the least expensive on his prices so parents could afford to bring their children.

When Pete Hagedorn turned 80 he was still a full-time bush pilot and major business owner. It was time to hand over the reins and all of Chimo Lodge and Outposts was sold to my very good friend Chris LeBlanc who has maintained this incredible man's high standards to this day.
