Collaboration Results in Kewaskum Ice Cream Stand Repair

The Village of Kewaskum Department of Public Works approached Kewaskum Kiwanis Club for assistance with inspection of the roof and interior ceiling on the Ice Cream Stand in River Hill Park as the Club had assisted with park buildings repairs in the past.

Due to age and unseen damage until this spring the roof was deemed irreparable and needed to be replaced. The village along with the Kiwanis Club decided to replace it, so it would be maintenance free, and last a long time. The club enthusiastically agreed because – 1) the club motto is, “We serve the children of the world,” 2) we are grateful for the village for allowing the club to use the Ice Cream Stand to serve food during the Third of July Fireworks and, 3) the club has skilled carpenters as members to ensure a quality result.

The club would provide materials and labor for the repairs. (When a long-time Kewaskum resident heard of the project, this civic-minded person asked to anonymously provide for one-half of the materials cost.) The village provided

labor for the removal of the old roof and interior ceiling and the club began the repair process on April 19, as viewed in accompanying pictures.

It is expected that another workday in the near future will complete the steel roof and trim installation. Zac Groeschel of Preferred Electric handled all the electrical disconnect and elec-

C.H.S. Triumphs at State Visual Art Classic

After a very successful day at the State Visual Art Classic (VAC), Campbellsport High School students came home with several individual medals and the first ever VAC state team trophy for Campbellsport.

country facing staffing challenges, Chief Olson hopes that by reaching students early, the department can inspire a new generation of dedicated volunteers.

Moraine Park Technical College brings its educational expertise and state-of-the-art resources to the partnership, ensuring students receive high-quality instruction aligned with industry standards. Classes include both theoretical and practical components, giving students a taste of what it’s like to be a firefighter or EMS provider.

“This is a win for the students, for the community, and for public safety,” Olson added. “We’re excited to see this program grow.”

A Sustainable Lawn Starts with the Right Grass Seed

Growing a healthy lawn in a more sustainable manner is better for the environment and can also help reduce maintenance. As a major component of landscapes, they provide living surfaces for play areas and pathways while protecting the soil from erosion and slowing stormwater runoff.

A healthy lawn starts with selecting the right grass seed.

When starting a new lawn, selecting the best lawn grass is as critical as selecting the right plant for your gardens. Look for a mixture of grasses that thrive in your growing conditions and activity level, provide the aesthetics you prefer and with the care you are willing and able to provide.

Fescues are known for their shade and drought tolerance and ability to thrive in warm and cold climates. Tall fescues are among the toughest with their dense root system, ability to tolerate heavy foot traffic and other wear and compaction. Turf-type tall fescues have finer leaf texture, denser growth, and tend to spread better than the bunching tall fescues.

When selecting a tall fescue grass seed, look for one with several varieties to create an attractive, resilient and low maintenance lawn. Varieties like Annihilator, Marauder, Rhizing Moon, and Bloodhound have excellent heat resistance while Channel is great for high traffic and low maintenance areas. Barbarian can be managed at a moderate height. Roman tolerates diverse soils and Warhawk produces a beautiful dark green lawn.

Using a mixture of grass seed allows the various varieties to fill in where they excel, tolerate the often-challenging growing conditions and work together to create an attractive lawn. Grass seed mixes, like Combat Extreme Transition Zone (Outsidepride.com), contain several tall turf type fescue seeds to create a heat, cold, and drought resistant lawn that looks good and requires less watering and fertilizing and is suitable for zones 3 to 8.

Prepare the soil and begin planting the seeds when the soil temperature is 55 degrees and warmer or up to six weeks before the first fall frost. Use a seed calculator to help you determine how much seed you'll need.

Broadcast the seed over the soil surface and lightly rake to ensure adequate seed to soil contact. Water often enough to keep the soil slightly moist and mulch to conserve moisture. Look for seedlings to sprout in 7- to 14-days and be ready to start mowing in 21 to 30 days.

Mow high, 2 ½- to 3-inches, and often enough to remove no more than one inch at a time. Regular mowing is less stressful on the lawn and the short clippings quickly decompose, adding nutrients and organic matter to the soil.

Save even more time, fuel, and water with sharp mower blades when cutting the grass. You can cut more efficiently when the blades are sharp, your mower will consume 22% less fuel, and the lawn will use up to 30% less water when using sharp blades.

Put away the rake and mow over fall leaves in the lawn. As long as they are the size of a quarter or less, they will not pose a problem to the grass. You may need to make several passes, but the leaf pieces will decompose, adding nutrients organic matter to the soil for your lawn to benefit.

Selecting the best grass seed for your climate and growing conditions and making a few changes in maintenance can help you grow a beautiful lawn.

Severe Weather Spotter Training

Free and Open to the Public

On Thursday, May 8, a meteorologist from the National Weather Service (NWS) will conduct Severe Weather Safety and Spotter Training at the Germantown Community Library located at N112 W16957 Mequon Rd. in Germantown. Two identical sessions will be held - an afternoon session from 1-3 p.m., and an evening session from 5:30-7:30 p.m.

This training is free, open to the public and does not require any pre-registration.

The sessions will address aspects of severe weather safety including high winds/tornados, flooding and lightning. It will also cover recognition training on weather features that are indicators of severe weather potential. The causes and dynamics of differing forms of severe weather

will be discussed and video/photos of past weather events will be presented to illustrate some of the concepts. What needs to be reported, to whom and how best to relay those reports will also be presented.

This training is recommended for members of local police, fire and EMS departments as well as amateur radio operators and anyone else with an interest in weather. There will be ample time for questions. The training is sponsored through the cooperation of Village of Germantown Emergency Management, the Washington County Office of Emergency Management and the National Weather Service.

Kettle Moraine Symphony Reflects on Recent Performance

The Kettle Moraine Symphony (KMS) delighted their audience with a beautiful musical tour of the world at their spring concert, Musical Travels, on Friday, April 11 at the Slinger Performing Arts Center.

Starting in Europe with "The Blue Danube Waltz" and "Die Moldau" and ending in America with "Refulgence" and the "Grand Canyon Suite," even Lake Michigan and Milwaukee were highlighted in the program.

"Refulgence" was composed by University of Wisconsin-Whitewater Professor Christian Ellenwood. During a pre-concert talk, Ellenwood and Dr. Peter Gibeau discussed the origins of "Refulgence." The piece was written to celebrate the Milwaukee Chamber Orchestra, also known as Milwaukee Musiak. The word refulgence means

radiance, brilliance and shining.

Ellenwood stated that, "In 1975, Stephen Colburn planted a seed which grew to become a radiant Milwaukee arts institution, and I begin by planting a few musical seeds at the beginning of the piece, first with a surge of waves in the strings that were inspired by the sparkling waters along the Lake Michigan shore in Milwaukee, and then with an oboe solo—in honor of Steve—which contains the primary motive for most of the thematic material of the piece."

This was only the second time "Refulgence" has been performed.

KMS President Jill Furman added that, "It is a rare opportunity to play a work by a living composer, and even more special for that composer to be present at the concert commenting on the in-

spiration behind the piece. We were absolutely thrilled to be able to present the second public performance of Refulgence."

KMS Music Director/Conductor Richard Hynson noted that, "This concert featured the ability of music to create vivid, descriptive pictures of places and of time. Within a few bars of listening, we were carried along the babbling source of the Moldau River, we watched sunrise in the Grand Canyon, or we could waltz in old Vienna. This music frees and directs our imaginations to the wonders of both the outer and inner worlds."

The Cougars got an RBI triple from Jace Goebel and an RBI single by Brody Nolan for the first two runs of the inning for a 2-1 lead.





"The Cougars offense exploded on Tuesday night, which was more than enough for Riley to pitch a complete



D.N.R. Encourages Residents to Reduce Food Waste

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encouraged residents to celebrate Food Waste Prevention Week, April 7-13, by using simple tips to keep food waste out of Wisconsin landfills while saving money.

The DNR’s 2020-2021 statewide waste characterization study found that wasted food was the largest component of trash in Wisconsin. Wasted food is defined as edible food thrown away before it is eaten or because it is spoiled. When food scraps like banana peels were included, approximately 854,000 tons of food waste and scraps, or 294 pounds per Wisconsinite, were sent to the state’s landfills in 2020.

When food waste breaks down in landfills, it produces methane, a potent greenhouse gas.

Households contribute heavily to this, with food waste making up 30% of residential trash. A 2020 study by Penn State University estimated households lose \$1,866 a year on food that’s thrown out.

“Through food waste prevention, Wisconsinites have a major opportunity to make a positive im-

pact on the environment while saving money on their grocery bills,” said Kate Strom Hiorns, director of the DNR’s Waste and Materials Management Program. “Food Waste Prevention Week is a great time to look at how you can reduce the amount of food you throw away.”

Here are some tips to consider in order to prevent and reduce food waste at home:

- Understand date labels and when food items are actually unsafe. Date labels are not regulated by federal law and do not indicate food safety, with the exception of infant formula. Manufacturers provide dates to help consumers and retailers decide when food is of peak quality. The U.S. Department of Agriculture advises consumers to examine foods to determine if the quality is sufficient for use. Relying on your eyes and an old-fashioned sniff test can be a better indicator of whether food is good to eat and help you avoid disposing of healthy and safe food.
- Shop with a plan and prepare for gatherings. Buying more food than what is needed often leads to more food waste. You can reduce this problem by

taking inventory of what you already have, planning meals and making detailed shopping lists. Save the Food’s free portion planner, The Guestimator, can help you estimate how much you need to prepare for gatherings. You can spread the leftover love by having containers on hand to send guests home with their favorites.

- Store food to extend its life. Proper food storage can reduce waste and save the time and money associated with additional grocery store runs. Save the Food’s Store It Guide gives ideas on how to organize your fridge and offers tips and tricks for storing food.
- Freeze before you toss. Consider popping your leftovers and surplus ingredients in the freezer before it’s too late. Freezing food is like hitting the pause button and preserving it until you are ready to eat it. Extra eggs can be removed from their shells and frozen. Vegetable scraps, extra meat and bones can be frozen and used later for soup stock.





A Campbellsport Farm and a Breakthrough Album

Oshkosh composer and pianist Alicia Rytlewski has recently been acknowledged and praised across the country for her debut album, "When We Were Bears." This contemporary classical record was partially written during her time living on a farm in Campbellsport. Her lyrics are shaped by Wisconsin's landscapes, seasons, and spirit. The album was released on January 24 and has already been highlighted by Wisconsin Public Radio (WPR) and received national and international recognition from publications like Uproxx, Interlude, and Milwaukee Record. It has also earned radio play on Radio Milwaukee. "A marvel... 'When We Were Bears' captures Rytlewski's majestic dynamism, highlighting both her careful ear for fine detail and resplendent totality," wrote Uproxx.

The project was composed over the course of eight years while Rytlewski lived in various parts of the state, including Campbellsport. These surroundings helped her shape an earthy, expansive and intimate sound throughout each song. "A wonderful—and wonderfully accessible—contemporary classical album...earthy, dramatic, hypnotic, and rich," said the Milwaukee Record. Additionally, Rytlewski recently performed selections from the album at a release concert at Milwaukee's iconic Pabst Theater, drawing a crowd of several hundred. "Her ability to draw inspiration from personal connections and translate them into music has made her compositions deeply resonant," noted Interlude (Hong Kong). The album was recorded at Wire and Vice Studios in Milwaukee. The music was mixed by indie musician and producer Ian Olvera, and mastered by Justin Perkins, known for his work with The

Replacements and Rufus Wainwright. It was stated that Rytlewski leaned into a warmer, songwriter-inspired approach throughout the album, which drew comparisons to artists like Susanne Sundfør and Sufjan Stevens. "Nothing short of beautiful," wrote Breaking and Entering. Additionally, Radio Milwaukee called the album "something special...gentle and insistent and soothing and stirring." Many listeners enjoy the delicate piano tracks on the album as they allow for quiet reflection and emotional clarity. "When We Were Bears" was officially released on January 24 alongside a companion book of sheet music and is available to stream on most music platforms. Alicia Rytlewski's unique talents are currently being widely recognized with her sound deeply rooted in Wisconsin's natural beauty and inspiration from a Campbellsport farm.

Saturday, April 12

High 58, Low 30

Yesterday I made the two-hour drive to the Jeff and Melissa Pausma farm near Fox Lake where I would be hunting with 13-year-old Conner Thie-

So here is the deal six mentors would be heading out with six hunters and two parents long before daylight, and we would be scattered all over Dodge County. Conner and I have hunted together several times, and we had a blind to set up long before daylight. Pretty bad luck struck when we arrived at the same spot where Conner whacked a massive tom last year when directly above us was a flock of turkeys in a burr oak tree. Turkey flew off in the dark, and when it started getting light we could see a tom that was

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out of range and sitting in a tree. Meanwhile, Tanner Weber was mentoring his 15-year-old cousin, Joey Reifschneider, on the Horicon Marsh. Tanner is 21, Joey had a baseball game the night before and on Sunday morning was scheduled to shoot 100 rounds for the Beaver Dam High School trap shooting team. It took Tanner and Joey about 40 minutes to call in a tom and Joey put it in the frying pan.

My stepson Joey Dushek was mentoring over in Juneau County and had a golden eagle attack his jake decoy as in crushing it.

Near Waupun, 13-year-old Griffin Visser was hunting with his grandpa, Jeff Visser, and working together, Griffin bagged his first turkey.

The entire day, Conner and I watched sometimes a flock of crows, sometimes a single crow that would find an owl that seemed to live by us and harass the heck out of it.

By 10 a.m., the team of Jameson Klug, his mentor, Jerrod Braun, and father, Jim Klug, had been successful in getting Jameson who is nine and came all the way from Greely, Colorado, his second tom in as many years. In other words, before lunch, we were at 50 percent for our kids.

Another wildlife story is that of a hen mallard that we watched last April and then on September 1 for the Early Teal/Goose opener. She raised a brood of 9 or 10, she always seems to hang out in the same 20 square feet of marsh and she never quit quacking, the old girl was there again today.

During the middle of the day and after dark all of the mentors share meals and a ton of laughs, these guys all grew up together near Burnett and were avid with plinking 22s and harvesting lots of game.

Perhaps the most unique turkey-whacking story of the day was for 14-year-old Carsyn Thiede who I have enjoyed many quality deer, duck and turkey hunts with. Justin "Beaner" Braun was her mentor, and her dad, Tyler Thiede, was also a part of the hunt. Beaner, as he is commonly called, has an obsession for turkey hunting and this trio spent much of the day chasing the same gobbler, which just before dark, made the mistake of getting too close to Carsyn.

The following morning, Conner and I chose no blind and hunted on the ground at the Pausma farm. We hunkered against a deadfall and Conner was asleep, about 20 minutes into daylight. I was working my dad's call (dad passed away in '94) and just like that four jakes flew down from the roost and were within 20 feet of us. Crazy thing is that Conner could only hunt till 8:30. The jakes knew something was wrong and were wandering away pretty steady. Conner Thiede made an excellent shot, and just like that our group went five for six.




