Kewaskum Village Board Prepared for May 7 Open House

The Kewaskum Village Board held a regular meeting on Monday, May 5, at 7 p.m.

Village Administrator Adam Gitter took the board members through the new Village Hall. The board walked through the timeline for the ribbon cutting and open house. The event started at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, May 7, with a ribbon cutting followed by remarks from village officials and ended at 7 p.m.

Gitter then walked the group through the

ground floor and basement where the Kewaskum Police Department will be located. The first floor and basement features office space, training facilities for officers, and increased evidence and weapons storage. There is also a community room on the first floor that can be used by village residents and for voting. The second floor of the building contains the Village Administrators office, Village Clerk's office, Village Treasurer's office, the Village Board Room, and additional meeting space.

There were guided tours of the new building offered throughout the duration of the event.

Pulverizing and Repaving of County Trunk Hwy D Begins Week of April 28

CTH WW to Kettle View Dr South

The Washington County Highway Department in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation will be pulverizing and repaving County Trunk Highway (CTH) D from CTH WW to Kettle View Dr South. This is a five-mile stretch of road in the Towns of Barton and Wayne. The project was anticipated to begin the week of April 28. The road will be closed to through traffic but resi-

dents will be able to get to and from their homes or businesses as needed. Culvert improvements, new asphalt surface, striping, signs and beam guard are all included in the scope.

A detour route will be posted and will utilize CTH WW, STH 33, and USH 45. Please obey all traffic signage in the area. Payne & Dolan, Inc. is the primary contractor and will be performing the pulverizing and paving operations. Substantial completion of the project is anticipated by August

1, and is dependent on weather and other factors.

The Washington County Highway Department appreciates your patience and extra caution as we improve and maintain Washington County's roadways striving for effective mobility and reliable infrastructure. Always Room for Tomatoes

Nothing beats the flavor of fresh-from-the-garden tomatoes. Keep them close at hand by growing one or more in containers on your patio, balcony, or front steps.

Any tomato can be grown in a pot, but determinate varieties are shorter and more compact, making them a bit easier to manage in a container. They produce fruit in a relatively short period of time, making them great choices for preserving as well as using fresh. Look for a D or determinate on the plant tag, seed packet or in the catalog description.

Indeterminate tomatoes, often designated with an I, are usually much taller and continue to grow, flower, and produce fruit until frost kills the plant or you pinch out the growing tip. These are usually staked or grown in wire cages to save space, reduce pest problems and make harvesting easier. Many new containers have built-in trellises or creative gardeners craft their own, making it easier and more attractive to grow these bigger plants in pots.

Semi-determinate varieties are in between these two. They are compact like determinates, often trailing but produce fruit throughout the growing season like indeterminate varieties.

People can now find compact varieties often sold as miniature and dwarf plants that grow well in small 4- to 8-inch pots. They are a great option for those with limited space, gardening on balconies, indoors in a sunny window or just about anywhere. Kitchen Mini tomatoes, Heartbreakers, Red Velvet and Micro Tom Thumb are just a few.

Grow one tomato per container for maximum productivity. Use a five-gallon or bigger container for large varieties and at least a two- to three-gallon or similar size pot for smaller varieties. Some research suggests growing tomatoes in a pot that is at least 14 inches but preferably 20-inches wide will yield greater results. Adding flowers and herbs to the container boosts the beauty and diversity of your container garden but will reduce the number of tomatoes produced.

Growing tomatoes in containers also allows you to start the season earlier. Just move the planter inside when the weather is harsh and back outside when the weather is warm and sunny. As the weather turns cold at the end of the growing season, cover the planter or move it into a frost-free location as needed. Some gardeners even move a pot or two inside to finish off the tomato season.

Plant tomatoes in a container with drainage holes and fill it with a quality potting mix. Reduce the time spent watering with a self-watering pot that has a reservoir to hold water and extend the time between watering. Further reduce the need to water by adding an organic, sustainable soil amendment like certified organic Wild Valley Farms' wool pellets (wildvalleyfarms.com) to the potting mix. Made from wool waste, this product reduces watering by up to 25%.

Water thoroughly when the top few inches begin to dry. Mulch the soil with evergreen needles, shredded leaves, or other organic mulch to keep the soil consistently moist and suppress weeds. Consistent soil moisture encourages more flowering and fruiting, while reducing the risk of blossom end rot, cracking, and misshapen fruit.

Harvest tomatoes when fully colored or leave them on the plant a few more days for an even sweeter flavor. You'll enjoy the convenience of harvesting fresh tomatoes right outside your door for use in salads, sauces, and other favorite recipes.

Planned to coincide with the Memorial Day holiday on Monday, May 26, this annual event pays tribute to the sacrifice that our armed forces have made to preserve freedom and to honor past and current service members.

The poppy also honors Wisconsin disabled veterans at the Zablocki VA Medical Center in Milwaukee, where the red crepe paper poppies are made by the veterans. Wisconsin's red poppies provide financial and therapeutic benefits to these veterans, as well as the thousands of veterans and their families who also benefit from the donations collected from the distribution of the auxiliary poppy.

In the battlefields of Belgium during World War I, poppies grew wild amid the ravages of war. The overturned soils of battle enabled the poppy seed to be covered allowing them to grow and forever serve as a reminder of the war's bloodshed.



This issue of the Kewaskum Statesman is dated May 7, 2020, exactly 125 years after the people of Kewaskum voted to incorporate the village. 125 years. It's a big milestone. Because of that anniversary date, we have included numerous articles and information about the village's history in today's paper.

The Kewaskum's 125th Anniversary Celebration that was planned for June 12 and 13 has been postponed until next year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The dates for the Kewaskum 126th Anniversary Celebration are to be determined.

Last spring, Madelyn Thull, who is currently a senior at Kewaskum High School, began working on a video about the history of the Village of Kewaskum. 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



Campbellsport Softball Gets Two Dominating Wins on the First Saturday in May



Campbellsport (7-8) took a 1-0 lead over Wautoma (10-8) thanks to an RBI triple from Megan McCarty for the visiting Cougars.


The Cougars' offense really got going in the second inning, featuring an Emma Muraski triple to center field allowing two runs to cross the plate to take a 4-0 lead.

I do consider myself fortunate to have both moms around and close to me. There are other women in my life I consider mother figures and when they are gone, I feel a great loss.

One of these women was Connie who recently passed away. I met her approximately seven years ago when I started my position at the library. She

was one of the library board trustees, in fact, one of my bosses. She was a true library advocate, one of our strongest here. She valued everything the library stands for – freedom of information, lifelong learning and more. Her involvement in many community organizations was thorough and strong. Personally, we worked together in the book club, the Kewaskum Public Library Foundation and her support for the library was insurmountable. Connie was a mother figure to me in how she bolstered my confidence as a new director while she listened, provided valuable advice and was a champion of everything I stood for. I miss her greatly.

This Mother's Day, tell the mother figures in your life how valuable they are to you in ways they appreciate. To show my love, I will give my mother a storebought card which she loves receiving and for mom B, a homemade banana cream pie per request.

The Two-Decade Turkey Hunt

Hello friends,

This past week I spent five days hunting turkey, and each day was at a different location. This week's column is more like a path down the last 21 years of some of my history as well as some people very important to me. As always, thanks for reading!

Wednesday, April 23

High 62, Low 40

Today would be day one of my seven-day turkey season, and I would be hunting on private land close to my home in northern Juneau County. For some reason, the turkey numbers have been dramatically reduced here, but I sure had a nice time hunting even though I did not see or hear a bird. The first time I hunted this property was 21 years ago with my stepson, Travis Dushek.

Two toms came into our decoy setup. It was Trav's first turkey hunt; he dusted one. I was going to let the second one go. The foolish bird started tearing into his fallen comrade and was tearing it up. I decided to punish it and so I whacked it.

My daughter, Selina, and I put a food plot on the property and had incredible success with some really big birds as Selina put the lights out on five big toms at it.

Michelle Chiaro was a woman that touches me in ways everyday even though she passed away on 6-15-22. Michelle's only turkey was a 25-pound pigasaurus that she whacked on the food plot as well.

Friday, April 25

Yesterday, I hunted on public land and did not see or hear a turkey while hunting. This morning, I walked from my house long before daylight and hunted on the food plot that Michelle and I built. I probably put a hundred hours into building that plot, and Michelle and I spent many a "date night" by a campfire enjoying life there. I also witnessed Michelle harvest her first and only deer on that

plot. On the hunting end today, I did not see or hear a turkey. I miss that woman!

Monday, April 28

High 76, Low 41

I am hunting down the road from my home on a field rich with our turkey-hunting history. Selina killed her first turkey here when she was 11, and it was a double beard, 25-pounder with 1-5/8 inch spurs. I watched all three of my stepson's harvest toms on it, as well as many youth hunters that I helped. On one experience, I was with Joey and Travis Dushek, and we had two toms coming in. I was going to call when to shoot, Joe and Trav were aiming. Trav decided to shoot ahead of the plan and Joey had to and did make a phenomenal shot at a running tom.

On another hunt, I was with my stepson Kevin Dushek on a snowy morning. I helped Kevin get his first turkey that morning, and when my chance was approaching, the hoodlum made some noise and no shot did I fire. No turkey were spotted or heard this morning.

Tuesday, April 29

High 65, Low 36

Today, I would be in northern Juneau County in The Meadow Valley Wildlife Area hunting turkey where I run bear baits, near a place we call Selina's Stand! I heard her 30:06 go off when she harvested her first bear. Selina was 15, and earlier that day, I watched her run in a cross country meet at Brookwood; a very positive day that was.

I have been part of several peoples' first bear at that location, and today was the first time I hunted turkey at it and not a bird did I see or hear while hunting. Actually, while hunting, I did not see or hear a bird during my seven-day season.

Folks if I had the time, I could write a book about the five places I hunted due to all of the incredible experiences that I have shared with young hunters at them. My guess is that you can understand that I really do not care that I did not see or hear a turkey during my hunt.



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
