Campbellsport Softball Defeats Springs on the Road

On May 8, Campbellsport softball lost to Lomira 3-0 on a nice, spring day for this Flyway Conference matchup.

Lomira (16-3, 9-2) took a 1-0 lead over Campbellsport (8-10, 4-7) in the bottom of the second inning.

The Lions added two runs in the third inning to increase their lead to 3-0. Lomira's three-run lead was enough in the Flyway Conference tilt, with the Cougar offense held to no hits by Nora Buske in the contest.

Peyton Hall had a good performance in the pitching circle for the Cougars, limiting the Lions' strong offense to three runs.

"Peyton pitched well for us, with only allowing one earned run, however Buske was on fire for Lomira. Sometimes you just have to tip your hat and move on to the next game," said Head Coach Dan Heisdorf. "I am happy with the way the girls played this week; playing four games in four days is a grind, and three of those games were against ranked teams."

At Springs

On May 7, Campbellsport softball defeated Springs 5-1 in a rescheduled game from May 1 between the two Flyway Conference teams.

Campbellsport (8-10, 4-7) jumped ahead of Springs (12-7, 7-4) in the third inning with Josie Twohig and Peyton Hall hitting singles before the Ledgers got two outs against the Cougars.

Emma Batzler hit a single to right to drive in two runs to take an early 2-0 lead over Springs.

The Cougars got a triple from Mackenzie Hellsell, but they couldn't get the extra run across the plate in the fourth inning with the score staying at 2-0.

Springs scored their only run of the game in the bottom of the fourth inning to make the score 2-1.

Campbellsport had two outs against them in the fifth inning when Batzler laced a double into left to drive in a run for the Cougars to push their lead to 3-1 over the Ledgers.

The Cougars were able to load the bases, featuring singles from Hellsell and Twohig. Then Emma Muraski was able to hit a two-run RBI single to increase their lead to 5-1 in the sixth inning.

Campbellsport was able to load the bases again in the sixth and seventh innings but it didn't result in any extra runs for the Cougars.

Olivia McCarty pitched a strong seven innings, supported by her defense, to limit the Ledgers' offense to one run in the Cougars' 5-1 conference win.


Kewaskum got on the board first, batting through the lineup, scoring five runs after a two-RBI single by Everett Donath, an RBI single by Levi Whitfield, an RBI fielder's choice by Sam Ciriacks, and an RBI single by Carter Unger.

After Cooper Petermann shut the Tigers down in the top of the second (3IP, 2H, 2BB, 2K), Austin Reichel delivered an RBI triple to right center scoring one run.

The bottom of the third was much like the first inning as the Indians put up another five spot thanks to an error that scored a run, followed by Andrew Reichert, Reichel, and Everett Donath all delivering RBI singles to extend the lead to 11-0.

Kyle Haim shut the door on the Tigers in the final two innings, allowing a pair of hits while walking and striking out one.



Unto Dust...

Dear Reader,

In the final accounting, when the ledger of our days closes and the last breath escapes like a whisper into the void, what remains of us? We who once walked with purpose, loved with abandon, and dreamed beyond the confines of our mortal shells—what becomes of all that we were?



The body, once a vessel of consciousness and desire, returns to its elemental state. Skin that felt the warmth of summer suns and the tender touch of loved ones dissolves. Bones that carried us through decades of striving and stumbling crumble into the same dust from which all life emerges. We are reduced to our most basic components, indistinguishable from the earth that receives us.

Our possessions, those objects we accumulated and cherished, outlive us for a time. Books with dog-eared pages. Photographs fading at the edges. Heirlooms passed down with stories attached. But eventually, these too deteriorate, are discarded, or lose their connection to those who once gave them meaning. The material monuments to our existence erode under time's relentless passage.

The institutions we built, the companies we labored for, the organizations we championed—these may persist beyond our individual spans, but they transform, merge, dissolve, reinvent themselves until our fingerprints upon them become unrecognizable. Even civilizations, those grand collective projects of humanity, rise and fall like tides, leaving only fragments for future archaeologists to piece together.

Is this, then, the final word on human existence? A brief flare of consciousness between two infinite darkneses? A temporary arrange-

ment of atoms that, once scattered, can never be reassembled in quite the same way?

Perhaps not.

For in the spaces between particles of dust and grains of sand, something intangible persists. The ideas we contributed to the great conversation of human thought; the stories we told that shaped how others understood themselves and their world; the kindnesses we extended that altered the trajectory of another's life in ways we may never have witnessed; the children we nurtured—whether our own or those who simply crossed our path—who carry forward not just our genetic material but our values, our perspectives, our ways of seeing; these invisible legacies ripple outward through time, touching lives we will never know, in places we will never visit, in eras we will never witness.

We are, in the end, both less and more than we imagine ourselves to be. Less permanent in our individual identity, more enduring in our collective impact. Less significant as separate beings, more powerful as contributors to humanity's shared story.

When we return to dust and sand, what remains is the echo of our humanity—not preserved in stone but alive and evolving in the hearts and minds of those who come after us. Our brief moment of consciousness, our fleeting dance of atoms, becomes part of the endless transformation of matter and meaning that is the universe knowing itself.

And in that continuation, there is hope. For while we may not persist as we are, something of what we gave to the world—something essential and true—remains.

Even dust catches the light sometimes, and in those glimmering particles, the story continues.

Cruised down a country road recently, passed a sight I hadn't glimpsed in a while. Slowed down considerably. Free range chickens pecked in the shallow grassy bottom of a ditch. Some real mean-spirited folks out there. Just as soon flatten such critters which cross their path. Never did cotton to running any animal over. Of a mind, they've as much right to live as any of us humans.

Point of fact, I feel a mite sorry for their plight. Eating three squares a day myself. They gotta scrounge for whatever their circumstances provide. Crows usually are pretty well fed. Nature's garbage men.

About time somebody else pitched in. Gave them all a bit of sustenance. Every couple of days, I'll break up slices of bread into a container. Only question is, "Are we smart enough to learn it?"

Town of Farmington Repaving to Begin

At the March 11, Farmington Town Board meeting, the town board awarded a repaving contract for the 2025 repaving season. General contractor, Payne and Dolan Inc, will be adding a new surface layer of asphalt to the existing pavement. The contractor has notified the town that this paving work is anticipated to take approximately one to two weeks to complete and is tentatively scheduled to begin the week of May 19, weather dependent.

The road will remain open for the duration of the project, although the Meadow Road paving project may have a full closure for a brief period due to narrow width of the road.

New shoulder material will be installed by the Washington County Highway Department following the new pavement install. This shoulder work may not occur until one to three weeks after paving is completed.

Residential trash and recycling pickup will not change, residents should continue to place collection carts as normal.

The 2025 repaving projects include:

- Overlaying of existing pavement \$160,525.00 – Scenic Drive – from western pavement edge of North Paradise Drive to eastern pavement edge of Maple Tree Road.

- \$75,050.00 – Windy Acres Drive – from northern pavement edge of Scenic Drive to southern dead end of Windy Acres, matching existing pavement edges.

- \$147,840.00 – Forest View Road – from northern pavement edge (ROW) of Hwy 28 to new pavement edge of East Moraine Drive.

- Patch & Wedge and Overlay

- \$64,512.00 – Meadow Road – Patch area of culvert replacement and Wedge Overlay from eastern pavement edge of Trading Post Trail to the east for a distance of 2,250 feet.









AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

A Remote Trout Fishing Trip

Hello friends,

Last May, I headed down to Columbia County, put my canoe into the Wisconsin River, and did a physical and at times dangerous journey for 90 minutes to a stream. Up that stream I fished trout and slept on the shoreline. I only had three bites in 24 hours, but I landed two 17-inch and a 22-inch brown trout. It was pretty much impossible for me to not return this May.

Saturday, May 3

High 73, Low 35

This trip would have me back in my home area, as far as where I grew up, and naturally, I had my three-year-old pup, Red, along. Just to fill you in, this is in a way, a fairly dangerous canoe journey. The reason is because before I get to the creek, I paddle up for almost two miles, and have to paddle through about 600 yards of water just deep enough to float a canoe through muck.

When I was a kid, the ice fishing was pretty good here, and while my brothers and I watched tip-ups, we would often skate and play hockey.

Ten years ago, I could use my 40-hsp Mercury and 16-foot boat to travel these waters. Wild rice

and dying plants each fall, combined with sediment flowing down the stream, have literally blocked everything, and if a person were to fall out of their canoe and could not get back in it, they would die. Simply put, there is no bottom.

Large trout and ZERO fishermen besides myself pull me here.

After getting through the muck field, there is about a 60-minute paddle upstream, and this year it was pretty physical as there was a lot of current. Another "situation" is deadfalls; they block my path and create labor.

When I arrived at my hole, which is probably 100 feet long, elbow-shaped, and three to seven

feet deep, I was in excellent spirits, as I would be here two nights.

There was no dry land for a tent, everything was flooded, so I pulled up literally a half a truck load of last year's dead grass that was on the top of fallen trees and made a tall pile for my tent. This worked flawlessly; another choice would have been sleeping in my canoe, and I have done it here.

So I am in a swamp, there is more waterfowl here than you can even imagine, I am fishing, doing as little as possible and loving it. Towards dark it actually became damn cold between heavy moisture in the air and probably not bringing enough clothes. I caught three suckers and one, 11-inch brown trout. Retiring to my sleeping bag was good and bad. Red likes to snuggle like a tick, but she was soaked and muddy, which would have made me colder, I kept her a foot away and slept well.

Sunday, May 4

High 72, Low 27

I was up at first light, and it was cold out, everything outside of my tent was froze and I had trout to catch. The suckers were hungry, the waterfowl were overhead by the hundreds as were the sandhill cranes. I had one group of cranes fly directly over me, and one of them had a leg just hanging. Imagine living much of your life in shallow water, not being able to swim and only having one leg!

Today, I caught my biggest trout of the trip, it was a 16-inch brown. My goal was to crack 15, so I was happy with that. Last year, I was here a week later, there were leaves on the trees and the current was much lower. Over three days of fishing I only caught three trout and 11 suckers. Last year, I was well aware that I was on a dream trip when I landed the big sumos.

For myself, the 100-percent getaway, the huge trout last year and other years are the reason I come here. Most importantly, it's the nonstop wildlife show and the cold reality that my years of reaching this type of hard-to-get-to spots are definitely numbered.

I still love my job!

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
