## Kewaskum Boys Golf Wins East Central Conference Tournament

Kewaskum shot a sizzling 307 to win the East Central Conference (ECC) golf tournament for the second consecutive year.

Kewaskum was led by sophomore Colton Rabe shooting an even par 71. His day got off to a hot start making an eagle on his first hole. He also carded three birdies on the day to shoot his 71.

Junior Eli Steinbauer has come back to form, shooting a four over 75. His day started with back-to-back birdies and kept it steady all day long to shoot his best round of the year.

Senior Alex Theusch's ball striking was great all day, but his putter let him down most of the round. He finished with an 80, which very easily could have been low 70's.

Sophomore Jaxson Voit ended with a great round of 81. He hit a rough patch in the middle stretch of holes but came around to end strong.

Senior Brent Krejcarek rounded out the team with an 89.

With the great rounds today from Rabe and Steinbauer, they both received second team all-conference for the ECC season.

Kewaskum will be at Washington County on Tuesday, May 27 for regionals, hosted by Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

On May 22, Campbellsport baseball defeated WLA 7-0 to clinch a share of the Flyway Conference Championship for the first time since 2022.

Campbellsport (17-7, 11-3) had two outs against them, facing WLA (12-10, 7-7), in the first inning when Riley Kohlmann hit a single to right field to take a 1-0 lead.


The Cougars got the bases loaded in the inning, which resulted in Ben Sabish and R. Kohlmann scoring runs to give Campbellsport a 3-0 lead after one inning.

Campbellsport's fifth inning started with a Trent Schladweiler double to right, which was followed by a Kyler Bove single, and Jace Goebel executed a sacrifice bunt to take a 4-0 lead.

Brody Nolan got a single before the Vikings got two outs on the Cougars, which put Braden Bothe up to the plate, and Bothe helped his own cause on the mound with an RBI single to increase the Campbellsport lead to 5-0 over WLA.

The Cougars once again had two outs on them when Zach Zimdahl hit a double, and Schladweiler got an RBI single to put the score at 6-0 in the sixth inning.

when attending the 3rd of July Fireworks or one of the Music in the Park events this summer. Kiwanis looks forward to participating in







# Campbellsport Teens Craft Terrifying Haunted House for Delightfully Good Cause

While recent Campbellsport High School graduates Hunter Sabish and Kaleb Eggers are preparing for their next chapters in life, their future plans include continuing to run the Terror Shed Haunted House, now preparing for its fifth season this fall.

Sabish first discovered his love for haunted house design at just 10 years old, creating spooky experiences for his family in his bedroom. As his passion grew, so did the scale—moving to the basement, then to a large shed on his grandparents' property.

Hunter's Haunted House, later Terror Shed Haunted House, began in 2018 when Sabish was just 12 years old, along with his friend since second grade, Eggers.

Since the beginning, the mission has been to support local food pantries and give back to their community. In the first year, with admission being a donation of five nonperishable food items, they collected 612 pounds of food to give to the Kewaskum Food Pantry.

Although the COVID-19 pandemic forced the haunted house to pause in 2020, the downtime allowed Sabish and Eggers to rebrand the haunt as Terror Shed Haunted House.

Eggers said, "That break was very much needed because then we could just sit down and think of all the different ideas and get [it] more solidified."

Despite the break, the community returned for an unexpectedly large turnout, showing support for the boys and their mission.

Terror Shed welcomed over 2,100 guests in 2022, raising over 3,290

pounds of food for those in need.

"Every year, it just keeps getting bigger and bigger," Sabish said.

With the overwhelming amount of donations, Terror Shed now donates to the Campbellsport Food Pantry, in addition to Kewaskum.

Expanding on the success of the Halloween season, Sabish and Eggers began offering Holiday of Terror during the Christmas season in 2023, which continues to draw bigger and bigger crowds as well.

"We never thought we would be where we are at. [It's] Kind of surprising that we're still even able to get the crowd that we initially had," Eggers said.

What has become a successful annual event within the community would not be possible without volunteers. Family, friends, and children ages 12 and up from Campbellsport, Kewaskum, West Bend, Lomira, and

the surrounding areas work together to help execute Sabish and Eggers' vision.

"In 2022, the team began reaching out to local businesses for sponsorships. Businesses could sponsor a night or weekend, with their logos displayed on The Terror Shed website. Some sponsors provided custom apparel for volunteers, raffle baskets, or helped cover costs such as props, batteries, signs, banners, and printed flyers. These donations are deeply appreciated and have been a big part of the Terror Shed's continued growth and success," wrote the team.

The goals for this year and beyond include expanding the haunted house to a bigger location, continuing to attract more quests, and making Terror Shed Haunted House an even greater, beloved Halloween tradition "that brings the community together while supporting a great cause."

Despite its size, length of walk-through, or rural location, Terror Shed has over 200 five-star reviews and "is now considered one of the best home haunts in Wisconsin."

Sabish and Eggers mentioned one of the places they gather inspiration from is the TransWorld Halloween & Attractions Show they have attended in Missouri.

From there and the experience they have gained over the years of operation, Sabish and Eggers have learned quite a bit.

"Every year we learn more of how much time goes into it, and we try to give ourselves more time," Eggers said. "You kind of have a better idea of the level of dedication that is needed to have a good turnout every year and to have a good haunt that is up to par with our past seasons."

"I've always embraced creativity, hard work, and community," Sabish shared. "I discovered my passion for design and leadership through founding this haunted house with Kaleb." Sabish also learned many valuable techniques for building elements of the haunted house from walls to set pieces.

"Towards the end of our building cycle, we always have these little spaces that don't seem to really fit. And then we have to try to turn that around somehow to make it make sense with a little bit of area that we have left to fill," Eggers commented, in regards to making the most of their smaller space. "I think that's always a fun challenge, and we usually get some pretty unique ideas that just are straight up in the moment that we came up with."

"Something else that's pretty exciting is just seeing the way different scares work and how well they work out," Eggers added. "Let's see if we can try it again the next year and im-





Petermann would then get a strike out, but the ball skipped away from Reichel behind the dish, and the batter would make it to first base while the other runner advanced to third. It was at this time Coach Heisdorf made a call to the bullpen, well really centerfield, to bring Grisolono back into pitch since he still had pitches left from game one. On Saturday, May 10, Kewaskum High School freshman Si Qi Gundrum represented Wisconsin at the national gymnastics competition in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Then, at state, you need a 34.0 or better to make it to regionals. To qualify for nationals at regionals, you need to place all-around within the top seven of your region. Then, at nationals, you compete against everyone in the country in your age group who also qualified."

After 12 years of dedication to the sport, countless hours of practice, and years of competition experience, this year was Si Qi's first appearance at nationals, marking a new milestone in her

career.

"I'm so grateful for the opportunity to be able to compete at nationals. It was such a fun experience, and it felt really great to compete with so many good gymnasts," said Si Qi.

Si Qi is now one of the four gymnasts on the Region 4 National Team, after her amazing performances at the nationals competition.





This week's column is basically about life, hobby farming, being the president of two youth organizations, and my favorite chicken ever!

Over the last nine days, I have slept in my truck two nights, had four scheduled events for KAMO and NOAC, welcomed home Kai Chiaro for the summer, ran my bear baits, had the heartbreak of finding out that my daughter, Selina, cannot come home for vacation as she had transmission problems two hours after leaving Missoula, gardened as much as I could, and prepared the beach that NOAC built for a summer of fun. Kai is Michelle's daughter, who will be staying here this summer as she has her old job back at a local restaurant/ice cream shop.

I have a flock of 16 laying hens and one rooster. The hens are 1, 3, and 7 years old; only one is 7. From October to April, they are free-roaming. I cannot let them be free during the garden season as they will tear up my gardens and also destroy my lawn. In the world of chickens, every day, generally in the late afternoon, the rooster breeds each hen.

This winter I noticed the 7-year-old hen was staying in the hen house, keeping her head in the corner all the time and getting pecked apart by the other hens. Over a period of time, I realized the cause.

The Old Red Hen was not letting the rooster have his way anymore. In January, she started sleeping by my front door instead of the safety of the hen house. I made a nest for her, gave her very nice treats, and every late afternoon, she would come wobbling over to her nest. I would hold and pet her and she would rest easy.

By mid-February, I had enough of watching the rooster punish her enough for not allowing him to have his way. I figured 15 hens was enough. Instead of April, I penned them up then.

The Old Red Hen went from a skeleton that could hardly walk to a very heavy chicken that had the run/waddle of the property. She is like clockwork, about sunset, she hits her nest and at sunrise, she is up and at them. I hold her like a kitten, and she loves me.

When the Old Red Hen was 6 months old, Kai's mom, Michelle, and I were about as happy as a couple could be, Kai was in seventh grade and Selina was in her senior year in high school, probably the happiest year of my life. Now, Selina is a biologist in Missoula, Kai is a "Razorback" down in Alabama going to school for nursing, like her mom, and Michelle is in heaven.

Three years ago, the Old Red Hen was four, pretty close to the end of her laying life but the Queen of her flock and her sisters passed away one by one. Michelle and I had just purchased a new Polaris quad ATV so that we would not be breaking the law by riding on my 2013, which is not a quad. Kai was working at the ice cream shop, on Highway 21, and as always, Michelle and I were running bear baits and always had our

On June 15, 2022, Michelle passed away unexpectedly from sepsis. Many lives were at least

temporarily shattered. Michelle loved the chickens, and I am betting The Old Red Hen misses her.

The following March, our swimming pool, which Michelle also loved, disintegrated; I had had a pool for 22 years. Within a day, I came up with the idea of building a pond. The pond has been the most physical and time-consuming project of my life. I named it Lake Matilda and the Old Red Hen enjoys drinking out of it.

That fall, I harvested a large black bear at our favorite bear bait and a 6x6 bull elk on a solo hunt in Montana. No matter how bad the bugs were, how cold it was or how much she got beat up, "Matilda" always demanded to participate and was my partner in every adventure possible.

This was also the time that Necedah's school administrator, who is my very close friend, Tanya Kotlowski, talked me into starting an outdoor club for Necedah that would become NOAC. We have built an ice skating rink with lights, a beach with picnic area, and this week, we finished a first-rate disc golf course; at each of these locations, we hold events that are a lot of fun.

The Old Red Hen is as happy as she could be, Selina is coming home in three weeks, Kai is making money to exist during the school year, bluegill are about to spawn in

Lake Matilda, and I'm thinking the perch already did. I have a bear tag and an elk tag, and my old saying is true as ever and that is, "No matter how rough things get, the sun always comes up in the morning."
