## Kewaskum Friends of Parks Installs Kayak Launch

Kewaskum Friends of Parks completed their kayak launch project at River Hill Park. They hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony on May 30 at 4 p.m.

The kayak launch on the Milwaukee River was completed with the assistance of a 50/50 grant that was awarded from the Wisconsin DNR. The launch is located just south of Main Street on the east side of the river, where the Village of Kewaskum recently upgraded the parking lot.

The kayak launch is ADA compliant, making it accessible for all ages and abilities. The funding for the project was generated through fundraising events put on by Kewaskum Friends of Parks such as Pints and Polka, Perfect Pairings, and a Night at the Races.



Tom Griesemer, a village resident, played a crucial role in writing the grant and presenting the plan to the DNR. Griesemer did the honors of cutting the ribbon during the ceremony. Multiple village residents brought their kayaks to the ceremony to test out the new launch with an inaugural ride.

## Johnny Hooker Headed to Track Championships

With his strong performances at the Division 2 Kiel Regional and Marinette Sectional, junior Johnny Hooker is the sole Kewaskum track and field athlete heading to the State Championships to compete in the 400m race this weekend, June 6-7, in La Crosse.

On Tuesday, he qualified for the sectional with a time of 51.64, placing second, and at the sectional, he placed fourth with a time of 51.37 to

qualify for state.

Hooker also qualified for sectionals in the 100m sprint.

Hello, my name is Fritz Gerhartz, and I am one of the Kiwanis Students of the Month. I have found a passion for flying, which is the career path I intend to pursue.

In high school, I accomplished several notable achievements. During my junior year, I took flight lessons at our local airport, West Bend Municipal. I would fly two or three times a week for two hours every lesson. Throughout my training, I got to experience many new opportunities culminating on July 11, when I received my Private Pilot's License. Following that, I started working on getting a Complex Aircraft Endorsement, which would allow me to fly faster airplanes that have retractable landing gear and more complex propellers and engine systems. In November, I finished that training, and in the time since, I have been preparing for my Instrument Rating, which will allow me to fly with sole reference to the aircraft's internal instruments, allowing me to fly the airplane in more adverse weather conditions.

After I graduate from Kewaskum High School, I will start my Instrument flight training at Hartford Municipal Airport and continue my training until I become a Certified Flight Instructor. Beginning in September, I will be enrolled in Fox Val-

ley Technical College's Aviation Management Associates program, where I will learn how to manage businesses related to the aviation industry. After I have accomplished all of this, I plan to move out to Alaska and fly either float planes or bush planes. This will allow me to enjoy a more raw and demanding type of flying, as well as get to experience the beautiful Alaskan landscape every day. Being a pilot in Alaska will also allow me to connect to communities and people, and I'll be able to see the direct effects of my work.

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

Richard O. Krueger, of West Bend, formerly of Lomira, was called home to be with the Lord on May 29, 2025, after celebrating his 104th Birthday, at Samaritan Health Care Center – The Fields in West Bend.

Richard was born on May 28, 1921, in Lomira to William “Bill” and Wilhemina “Minnie” Krueger (Enderle).

Richard attended grade school in a one-room schoolhouse in Lomira and graduated from Lomira High School in 1939. He attended all his class reunions, until he was the last person who could drive. Richard worked on the family farm in Lomira. Later, he worked at the feed mills in Lomira and Theresa. He was also a part-time electrician's assistant, working alongside his friend, Armand Behm. Richard then went on to work at Gehl Company in West Bend for 17 years until he retired in 1983.

Richard was an active walker and biker and lived on his own until he was 97 years old. He enjoyed camping, fishing, family gatherings, and playing horseshoes, frisbee, and board games like Trivial Pursuit. He was an avid reader of military history, travel books, and Time Of Grace devotionals.

Richard regularly attended Wednesday Morning Bible class at Good Shepherd, where he was also part of the lawn care team for several years.

## Road Signs Stolen from Fond du Lac County Communities

This spring, attention was brought to some recent road sign thefts in towns in Fond du Lac County.

Chris Randall with the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department said they see this type of crime “every year or so.”

Unlike theft of jewelry and tools where additional leads to follow up on are produced as a result of pawning or selling of the items, signs “generally end up in someone's garage and will stay there for years,” making it a more difficult crime to solve.

“Property crimes are just inherently more difficult to solve because of the lack of leads,” said Randall. “Historically, property crime solvability

has hovered around 18% nationwide.” Randall went on to emphasize the danger road sign theft poses to motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians.

“The Sheriff's Office has zero tolerance for this type of conduct, because of the potential hazards this creates and the safety of others being jeopardized,” Randall stated.

Ken Depperman, Town of Auburn Chairperson, added on saying, “Citizens should realize that road sign theft and damage creates public safety issues, directional confusion, and cost issues for Towns and Counties. I would highly encourage citizens to immediately report sightings of individuals who they see in the act of doing theft or damage, or observations of damage to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department.”

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



## Vs Columbus


On May 27, Campbellsport baseball lost 8-0 to Columbus to wrap up their regular season.





## Campbellsport Softball Finishes Season in Regional Final

On May 29, Campbellsport softball lost 3-0 to the second-seed, Kewaskum, on the road in the Regional Final.

Campbellsport (13-12) and Kewaskum (19-8) were in a pitching duel between Kewaskum's Macy Sabish and Campbellsport's Peyton Hall, with the game tied 0-0 going into the bottom of the sixth inning.

"Peyton pitched an amazing game with allowing only two hits before the sixth inning," said Head Coach Dan Heisdorf.

Kewaskum scored three runs in the bottom of the sixth inning, highlighted by doubles from Elli Calliari and Kyli Baka, to put the Indians ahead 3-0 over the Cougars going into the seventh inning.

Campbellsport wasn't able to mount a comeback in the seventh inning against WFSCA all-star pitcher Sabish to give Kewaskum the Regional Championship for the first time since 2019 with the 3-0 win.

The six-seed Cougars finish their season with a record of 13-12, and the two-seed Indians advance to the Sectional semifinals against one-seed Waupun on June 3.

### At KML-Second Round

On May 27, Campbellsport softball beat KML 2-1 in the second round to upset the third-seeded Chargers on the road as the six-seed.

Campbellsport (13-11) took a 1-0 lead over KML (12-10) in the first inning with two outs. Olivia McCarty drove in Emma Muraski with a single to center field.

The Cougars got singles from O. McCarty and Kaylie Jandre to help load the bases for the Cougars' Mackenzie Helsell, who came up to bat and produced with a sac fly to center, extending the Campbellsport lead to 2-0 in the third inning.

"We played solid defense all day, which was combined with Peyton's pitching scattering their offense to ten hits," said Head Coach Dan Heisdorf.

Campbellsport's defense was highlighted by Muraski throwing out a runner at the plate in the third inning to preserve the Cougars' lead at 2-0.

KML scored their only run of the game in the bottom of the fourth inning to place the score at 2-1, and the Cougars took control of the game the rest of the way, resulting in the 2-1 second-round win on the road to advance to play Kewaskum in the Regional Final.

Olivia McCarty and Emma Batzler combined for four hits, plus Peyton Hall's good performance in the pitching circle paced the Cougars to the playoff victory.



# The Health Benefits of Dairy

A healthy diet is comprised of a mix of nutrient-rich foods and beverages. The United States Department of Agriculture includes dairy as part of its MyPlate program, which recommends foods and serving sizes of those foods from different food groups. Evidence indicates that dairy can help improve bone density, reduce the risk of developing osteoporosis, and lower fracture risk in



older adults. Dairy, when consumed with calcium-rich leafy greens and legumes, ensures people get enough calcium to affect bone improvements.

- Dairy improves vitamin D levels. Approximately one billion people across the globe have vitamin D deficiency, while 50 percent of the population has vitamin D insufficiency, reports the Cleveland Clinic. Vitamin D is produced in the body through exposure to the sun and also comes from dietary sources. Vitamin D is a nutrient the body needs, along with calcium, to build strong bones

and keep them healthy. Dairy products are often fortified with vitamin D to work in conjunction with calcium for good health.

- Dairy helps to sustain energy levels. Dairy provides a source of high-quality protein and essential amino acids. Protein can curb hunger and help a person feel satiated longer. Dairy can help a person maintain fitness performance and may also be used for weight management.

- Dairy promotes gut health. Fermented dairy and foods in the dairy group that contain live cultures can

add beneficial bacteria to the digestive tract to foster a healthier microbiota, according to U.S. Dairy. Cheeses, yogurt and kefir are fermented foods. These foods may improve digestion and gut barrier function.

- Boost the immune system. Dairy contains protein, vitamin A, zinc, and selenium, which work together to strengthen the body's immune system. Dairy contains all nine of the essential amino acids that are responsible for supporting the immune system and building and repairing tissue, says Dairy Farmers of America.

Those who want to incorporate more dairy into their diets are urged to choose low- and non-fat versions, which do not contain as much saturated fat as full-fat dairy. Saturated fat can contribute to elevated 'bad' cholesterol (LDL) numbers and increase the risk of heart disease. Harvard Health suggests no more than 20 grams of saturated fat per day for the average 2,000-calorie diet, making low-fat dairy options a smarter choice.

Dairy is an important food group for good health that helps to strengthen bones and the immune system.

## Detroit-Style Pizza Dip

### Ingredients

- 12 frozen dough dinner rolls, thawed (about 1 pound)
- 6 tablespoons butter, cubed and melted
- 2 teaspoons garlic powder, divided
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1 cup whole milk BelGioioso Ricotta con Latte® cheese (8 ounces)
- 6 ounces Widmer's Mild Brick cheese, shredded (1 ½ cups)
- ½ cup sliced pepperoni
- 6 ounces Widmer's Mild Brick cheese, cubed (1 ½ cups)
- ½ cup pizza sauce
- ¼ teaspoon onion powder

### Instructions

1. Cut each dinner roll into three equal pieces; shape into balls. Cover and let rise for 1 1/2 hours.
2. Heat oven to 375°F.
3. Combine the butter, 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder and Italian seasoning in a large bowl. Toss dough in butter mixture. Arrange dough balls around edges of a greased 10-inch ovenproof or cast-iron skillet. Top with remaining dough balls, leaving space between each roll for rising. (Center will be unfilled.) Cover with plastic wrap. Let rise until nearly doubled, about 30 minutes.
4. Bake for 10-15 minutes or until rolls just begin to brown.
5. Meanwhile, combine the ricotta, shredded brick and 1 teaspoon garlic powder in a bowl. Spread cheese mixture into the center of the skillet. (Pan will be hot!) Layer with pepperoni and cubed brick.
6. Combine the pizza sauce, onion powder and remaining garlic powder. Drizzle pizza sauce in three lines.
7. Bake for 10-12 minutes or until rolls are golden brown and filling is bubbly.

## Did You Know?

Drinking milk is a popular way to consume the amount of dairy recommended for a healthy diet. Milk is a rich source of 13 essential nutrients that can boost the immune system and fuel the body.

If the idea of downing three glasses of milk is a turn-off, milk can be incorporated into recipes, such as smoothies, where its taste and texture is less prominent. Cheese and yogurt also count. Eight ounces of yogurt or 1 1/2 ounces of hard cheese is equivalent to one cup of milk in terms of nutrition, says a2 Milk®, a company that produces milk that may be easier on digestion. Individuals who have lactose intolerance can choose milk products that do not contain lactose.

# Big Wind/Walleye on Green Bay

*Hello friends,*

As you may know, I am addicted to the outdoors and enjoy pushing things to the limit from time to time. I have a buddy who recently retired and has been a part of this column since it was started back in '89. His name is Doug Cibulka, and he also loves to hunt and fish.

This past week, Doug and I tent camped at a campground on Green Bay in Oconto County and

and lived to eat'em!

**Monday, May 19**

**High 58, Low 42**

Doug and I knew well in advance that we either had to bail on this trip or live with a solid northeast wind, and the only thing I bail is hay or my boat. So poor Dougie had no choice but to pray, wear his vest and perform an excellent job as captain of his 16.7 Aluma Craft "Classic" powered by a 70 hsp Yamaha.

Plan number one was to just fish the Oconto Riv-

er as that would be safe. Good but ominous news hit us like a sinking ship



endured some very high seas in a boat that was tossed around like a leaf in a tornado. Long story short, we had an epic experience, life jackets required, in that we put a hurting on the walleye

when we pulled into our campground, and there were two groups of fishermen filleting "limits of 20 to 25-inch walleye." I started jabbering with these guys, and Doug started getting that same feeling as he has about a thousand times when he knows Walters thinks we can do this. In other words, despite very high seas and our new friends in 22-foot watercraft, I figured as long as the bilge pump was operational, that we could fish the bay, especially since what today was a sustained 17 mph wind was going to be 22 the next day.

We built camp, rigged lines, Doug did a lot of mumbling about things I did not listen to, and we launched the SS Minnow for some fun on the pond. We were either looking up at the clouds or down at the bottom of the bay as we edged our way out to 8-10 feet of water with Mr. Cibulka at the

helm. I started running lines, which in this case would be two poles straight back of the boat, one close, one far, and a left and right planer board all rigged with crawler harnesses.

Heading into the waves, the first 40 minutes we had zero action. When we turned around and had the wind at our back, our first hit was a small perch. A minute later, we had another hit and caught a 13.5-inch perch. Five minutes later, there was another hit, and this time, there was some solid heft to the fish and insanity in the fight. One person had to hold onto the steering wheel at all times; the other had to fight fish and keep it out of other lines, in most cases, net it and, somewhat importantly, not fall out of the boat.

That first "eye" was 23 inches, and within five minutes, another fight was being fought, and "eye" number two was a 26-incher. Suddenly, Dou-

gie C, who got me in a lot of trouble as a kid cuz I was always innocent, was losing his doubt of our "mutual decision" to fish the bay, and we kept a southerly direction with the wind at our back.

Another side story. Our net was too short, the boat driver could not let go of the wheel, and the fish catcher had to get up front so the boat driver could net and drive. Super long story, short, the first fish we lost was our 10th and that is because our net dropped overboard, and the fish catcher ripped the harness, did a quick cast, caught the net and it was a fair trade.

"Eye" number 10 was landed, not a one was under 20 inches, and I started pulling lines for the victory ride back to camp. While pulling the last three lines, a 23 and 26-inch "eye" was landed and released.

We made it back to camp, changed our underwear, cleaned our catch, and had a big old "we caught an awesome limit and lived to tell about it celebration."
