Breaking Ground for Regal Place

Washington County, in partnership with Economic Development Washington County (EDWC), the Village of Kewaskum, American Companies and Regal Ware hosted a groundbreaking ceremony for Regal Place in Kewaskum on Monday, June 9, as part of the Next Generation Housing Initiative, providing attainable homeownership opportunities to area residents and workers.

“Next Generation Housing exemplifies a suc-

cessful public-private partnership and a win for the people of Washington County. We appreciate the opportunity to work together with Regal Place in helping more families realize the American Dream of homeownership,” Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann said.

Once completed, Regal Place will provide 48 new townhomes in Kewaskum. The development expects to start having occupancy by fall

KMS Student Accepted to Wisconsin Middle Level State Honors Band

Cailyn Beres, an eighth-grade trumpet player at Kewaskum Middle School, has been accepted to the Wisconsin Middle Level State Honors Band.

Cailyn has been a member of the band for the last three years. She is lead trumpet in the jazz band and has performed many solos, duets, and ensembles at the Solo and Ensemble competitions.

Kewaskum Middle School Band Director Rachael Holmes says, “From the beginning, Cailyn stood out with her superior tone quality, enthusiasm for playing, and strong work ethic. Not only is she a great player, but she has always been a great leader and role model in the band.”

The Middle Level State Honors Band is one of the highest achievements a student musician can achieve, with an intense audition process. Beres competed against trumpet players from all over the state for a spot in the group. Out of 59 trumpet players that auditioned, only 19 students were awarded spots.

Holmes says, “It is really amazing when you come from a small school. When you audition for the state honors band, you are competing against students from large schools that may have more teaching staff for extra lessons, students that have been taking private trumpet lessons for years, or students that have been playing for a long time. Cailyn prepared this difficult audition material basically on her own, and I couldn't be more proud of her.”

Plant Sunflowers for a Season of Enjoyment

Sunflowers are one of those happy plants many gardeners can't resist planting. Kids love to watch the plants reach for the sky and everyone enjoys all the visitors. You are likely to see hummingbirds, bees and other pollinators on the flowers, songbirds munching on the seeds, and squirrels practicing acrobatic contortions as they try to gain their fair share of the harvest.

What we call the flower is made of 1,000 to 2,000 individual flowers. The large petals are, in fact, infertile ray flowers that do not develop into seeds. The center consists of fertile disk flowers that develop into seeds after pollination occurs.

These versatile flowers tolerate a wide range of soils around the world and are drought tolerant. It is not surprising they have been used by people for more than four thousand years. Native Americans used the flowers for pigments, seeds for food, the dried stems for construction and fuel. Today millions of acres of sunflowers are grown for the edible seeds, oil, and birdseed.

There is still time to plant sunflowers. Just

check the seed packet for the number of days from planting seed until bloom. You'll find varieties that mature in as few as 55 days while others need as many as 120 days to flower. Start planting sunflower seeds directly in the garden after the danger of frost has passed and soil is about 60°F. Extend the bloom time by making additional plantings, allowing enough time for the plants to flower before the first fall frost.

Protect seeds and seedlings from birds and other critters. Cover the area with a floating row cover, a spun fabric that lets air, light and water through to the plants, or some type of netting or screen. Plant the seeds one to two inches deep and six inches apart in rows two to three feet apart. Remove every other seedling once they are several inches tall.

Protect young plants from deer if needed. These critters can quickly destroy young plants so consider using a repellent or fencing if deer are a problem in your area.

Water often enough to keep the soil moist around the seeds and young seedlings. Gradually extend the time between watering to encourage

the plants to grow a robust root system. Continue to water thoroughly as needed throughout the growing season. Fertilize at planting and make a second application mid-summer if needed. Follow the fertilizer label directions for proper timing and rates.

Staking isn't usually needed to support even the taller varieties unless they are growing sunflowers in a windy location or are overcrowded. Use a metal or wood stake placed close to the stem if you need to stake the plants. Secure the plant to the stake using twine or soft ties made from cloth.

As the flowers appear, watch them track the sun from east to west and return facing east each morning. Scientists recently discovered the young plant's sun-tracking, also called heliotropism, is tied to the plant's circadian rhythms. One side of the stem elongates during the day and the other side at night, directing the flower toward the sun. As the flowers mature, they stay facing east, helping to attract pollinators like bees to the warmer flower surface.

Enjoy watching your sunflowers sprout, grow and flower. Take time to observe the many visitors to the blooms and be sure to harvest a few seeds for snacking.



CTH A Road Closure – Replacement of Bridge over Milwaukee River

(Began June 10, in Farmington until early October)

The Washington County Highway Department in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation will be replacing the CTH A bridge over the Milwaukee River located 1,900 feet east of CTH M in the Town of Farmington. The bridge will be closed to all traffic for the duration of the project. The Riverside Road intersection will be closed to through traffic (allowing emergency vehicles) for the duration of the project. A detour route utilizing CTH M and CTH H will be posted. Please obey all traffic signage in the area.



Access to the river for kayaks and canoes will be permitted during the project. Waterway markers will be placed in the river directing paddlers away from active construction areas. Pfeifer Brothers Construction is the prime contractor performing the bridge replacement work. Project completion and road opening to traffic is anticipated in early October dependent on weather and other factors.

The Washington County Highway Department appreciates the public's patience and extra caution as it improves and maintains Washington County's roadways striving for effective mobility and reliable infrastructure. 

Glenn Otto Mittelstadt



Glenn Otto Mittelstadt, 94, of Landrum, SC., left this earth to be with his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on May 29, while surrounded by his loving family.

Glenn (Mitty) was born October 20, 1930, in Milwaukee, the youngest child of Otto and Marie Thomas Mittelstadt.

While obtaining a business & marketing degree

at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee, Mitty was a test rider for Harley Davidson. After college, Mittelstadt continued working at Harley Davidson and began a successful career in advertising.

At Harley he met the love of his life, Judith Lovejoy and together they had four children.

He later became the Director of Advertising for Regal Ware and the family moved to a farm in the Campbellsport area. Eventually Mitty left the corporate world and became a partner in his wife's growing business, Area Moraine Realty in Campbellsport.

Mitty and Judi fell in love with the Piedmont area of the Carolinas while vacationing. They moved there in 1982 and established a successful real estate business, AM Realty, brokering in North and South Carolina.

Mitty kept busy raising animals on his hobby farm, flying airplanes and hot air balloons, gardening and cooking. His main passions were flying and motorcycles. While at Harley Davidson he rode a motorcycle 365 days a year, using a side car and chained tires to commute during snowy Wisconsin winters. He owned a private plane for much of his adult life and once took apart a WW2-era Piper Cub to the last screw and rebuilt it to where it was better than new.

He was the first person in Wisconsin to get a hot air balloon license and went on to become a flight instructor. Mitty competed in balloon rallies at the national and international level and was a common sight during early morning hours in the southeast Wisconsin countryside.

He was a devout Christian his entire life and very active in his church. He was instrumental in founding Trinity Lutheran Elementary school in Waucousta. At the time of his death, he was a member of Living Savior Lutheran Church (WELS), in Hendersonville NC.

One of Mitty's great strengths was his ability to talk with anyone, showing a mix of grace, humor, humility and honesty that endeared him to those he encountered. Although he may have just met someone for a few minutes, they remember him with affection and a smile...that was his superpower!



of 2025. The owner-occupied townhomes are being constructed on the site of the former Regal Ware headquarters, which in recent years moved operations to Milwaukee.

“I was terrified when I went to talk to my grandfather, to tell him we’re going to knock down the building that he ultimately lived and worked in for over 50 years. He looked at me and he said, ‘Well, everything changes, doesn’t it?’” said Ryan Reigle, chairman and CEO of Regal Ware.

Reigle said his grandfather, James D. Reigle, who died on Saturday at the age of 99, was very pragmatic and realized that nothing can stay the same because the world changes.

“I would like to think that today is he’d be so proud of what we are ultimately doing here because we are families giving back and creating opportunity for families,” Reigle said. “Today’s groundbreaking is more than the start of a new development — it’s the continuation of a legacy. Regal Place honors the roots of our family, our company and this community. It’s a tribute to the generations who came before us and a promise to those who will call this place home.”

Regal Place is the fourth Next Generation Housing Development to break ground in Washington County since the initiative started in 2022 with the goal of

1,000 new owner-occupied housing units by 2032.

“Our partnership with Regal Ware began back in the 1950s when my father, aunt, grandmother and great grandmother immigrated to Kewaskum from Serbia. Employment was a requirement to earn entry into the U.S. at that time. J.O. Reigle and his company not only provided them with jobs but also a community that helped nurture and develop us into who we are today. I am deeply grateful for the support and opportunities Regal Ware extended to my family, and I am honored to contribute to this project that reflects our shared values,” said Kraig Sadownikow, president and CEO of American Companies.

“Regal Place represents more than just homes. It represents an ongoing spirit of Kewaskum, a place to grow, a place to thrive and a place to continue building on the strong community ties that we all value here,” Kewaskum Village President Fuzz Martin said in his remarks during the groundbreaking ceremony.

A grand opening celebration is scheduled for fall 2025. At that time, members of the public will be invited to tour the first completed townhome and get a preview of the quality and design the future neighborhood will offer. Additional event details, including the official date, will be announced in the coming months.


Jaxson Voit Advances to State Golf Tournament

The top of the first inning was highlighted by a pick-off of the Kiel baserunner at first by starting pitcher Kingston Grisolono.








In reality, Paul just finished his graduation issue, also his summer "Laker," and I have been running hard since April 1st, and two good buddies decided the gills could wait till the next morning.

Chris' shack is built for hunting, but in all honesty, could be lived in.


Saturday, May 31

High 78, Low 49


