

# Town of Auburn Approves Solar Energy Project

Town of Auburn residents packed the Town Hall on Monday, June 16, to express their feelings to the Plan Commission regarding a proposed 30-acre, six megawatt, ground-mounted solar energy project via special exception permit by OneEnergy Renewables on the Beck family farm, west of County Trunk Highway V and north of Century Drive.

The Beck family did not speak during the meeting, but wrote, "As a family-owned farm, sustainability is at the heart of everything we do. We have dedicated our lives to this land, working tirelessly to uphold the traditions and values that have kept our farm thriving for generations. By installing solar panels, we're not only securing a cleaner energy future, but also creating a reliable source of income as we grow older. This investment allows us to maintain our independence, continue caring for the farm, and ensure its legacy for the next generation. Solar power is more than just an upgrade—it's a commitment to our family, our farm, and a more sustainable tomorrow."

Associate Julie Gerits, Manager Peter Murphy, and Manager Nolan Stumpf with the OneEnergy Renewables Project Development Team were in attendance, as well. They started the meeting with a presentation and stayed to answer and address questions and concerns from residents.

"OneEnergy is an independent developer of community-scale energy projects," stated Gerits. "Our Madison office develops, engineers, constructs, and operates projects throughout the Midwest."

Gerits continued, "As a Public Benefit Corporation, we pursue public benefit and operate in a responsible and sustainable manner, in addition

to traditional business objectives."

OneEnergy has constructed 55 projects over the last six years, with seven in Wisconsin in 2024.

In a handout, they wrote about the sustainable design and construction details specific to the proposed Campbellsport project.

"The area beneath and around the panels will be planted to a low-growing perennial pollinator mix. This increases water infiltration relative to conventional row-cropping. Water that flows off solar panels is safe for people and wildlife.

"The project area will be fenced within an eight foot tall deer-exclusion style fence, similar to what one might find around an orchard. The area surrounding the project will continue to be farmed.

"When the project is decommissioned, all infrastructure will be removed, and the site restored to pre-development conditions for continued agricultural use with rested and restored soils."

Additional details on the project include that the project will produce enough electricity to power around 1,400 homes on average in Wisconsin, and it will connect to three-phase distribution lines along Hwy V.

Following OneEnergy's presentation, the Commission opened the meeting up for public comment.

Rebecca Bartoli was the first to make a statement saying, "... I know that this process has been frustrating for many of the residents. As I have heard so many times over, many didn't even know this was happening. It affects their communities as a whole, as it will change their landscapes. It may be someone's land to do what they wish with, but it's everyone's interest when

# AI's Hidden Cost: A Critical Look at the Environmental and Geopolitical Implications of Artificial Intelligence

Dear Reader,

Recently, I attended an AI conference that opened my eyes to a crucial yet under-examined aspect of our AI revolution: the rare earth materials that power it all. While we celebrate AI's remarkable capabilities, we must confront an uncomfortable truth about the hidden costs of this technological leap forward.



## The Resource Reality Behind AI

The current explosion in AI demand—from commercial applications to individual users—is creating unprecedented pressure on our planet's finite resources. Every AI model requires massive computational power, which translates directly into hardware demands. The chips, servers, and infrastructure supporting AI systems consume vast quantities of rare earth elements, lithium, copper, and other critical materials.

This demand doesn't exist in isolation. Electric vehicles, renewable energy systems, and countless other modern technologies compete for the same limited resources. We're witnessing a convergence of resource-intensive technologies at a scale our planet may not be able to sustain indefinitely.

## The Geography of Power

These critical materials aren't distributed evenly across the globe. Just as diamonds are naturally absent from U.S. soil, many rare earth elements are concentrated in specific regions, creating new forms of geopolitical dependency. This geographic reality is reshaping international relations and economic strategies.

The competition between nations like China and the United States extends far beyond AI algorithms—it encompasses entire supply chains. From the extraction of raw materials to the manufacturing of semiconductors, from data center construction to the development of AI applications themselves, every level presents opportunities for strategic advantage or vulnerability.

- ~ Corporate level: Companies like Google, Meta, and OpenAI competing for market share

The question isn't whether AI offers benefits—it clearly does. The question is whether unrestricted AI development justifies the potential destruction of ecosystems and the depletion of resources that could serve other crucial purposes.

## The Need for Thoughtful Regulation

We stand at a crossroads that demands reflection rather than reflexive acceleration. Before we exhaust our planet's resources in service of AI development, we need frameworks for making conscious trade-offs based on:

- ~ Resource sustainability: Understanding the true environmental cost of AI systems
- ~ Ecosystem protection: Weighing innovation against ecological preservation
- ~ Human agency: Ensuring AI enhances rather than replaces human capability and purpose
- ~ Equitable access: Preventing resource competition from creating new forms of inequality

## Charting a Sustainable Path Forward

The goal isn't to halt AI development but to pursue it wisely. We can harness AI's benefits while maintaining our humanity and protecting our planet's finite resources. This requires:

- ~ Conscious prioritization—of AI applications that provide the greatest societal benefit relative to their resource cost.
- ~ Regulatory frameworks—that account for environmental impact alongside innovation potential.
- ~ International cooperation—on resource sharing and sustainable development practices.
- ~ Preservation of human agency—in an AI-augmented world, ensuring technology serves human flourishing rather than replacing human purpose.

## Conclusion: Two Futures Await

We don't have to choose between technological progress and environmental stewardship, but we do need to make conscious choices about how we proceed. The current trajectory—unlimited AI development without consideration of resource constraints—is unsustainable.

Our challenge is to embrace AI's potential while

preserving what makes us human: our agency, our environment, and our responsibility to future generations. The conversation about AI's pros and cons must include not just what the technology can do, but what it costs us to build it—and whether we're willing to pay that price.

As we stand at this technological crossroads, we face a fundamental choice between two possible futures. Where artificial intelligence amplifies human creativity, solves our greatest challenges, and frees us to pursue deeper meaning, connection, and purpose? Where technology enhances our humanity rather than replacing it?

The future we create with AI should be one where technology elevates human potential rather than replacing it, where innovation works within planetary boundaries rather than beyond them. That future is still possible, but only if we choose it deliberately and soon. it affects the aesthetic of their community and their property values."

She continued, "OneEnergy Renewables has no intent to provide subsidies per the informational meeting. Out of all of their installations that they showed you for the state of Wisconsin, I do believe only one is surrounded by residential area. There aren't any current studies for the state of Wisconsin to demonstrate that there isn't a decline in property values."

She concluded her comment by presenting the Commission with a petition opposing the project with 394 signatures.

Her reference to the community being concerned with the aesthetic was another major concern for other citizens.

Ken Kuhn expressed his concern over proper-

ty values and the Commission responded by saying studies on large-scale systems, like the one in Brownsville, have been shown to decrease property values, but mid- to small-scale systems increase nearby property values.

OneEnergy responded to another question on the materials used in the solar panels, explaining they are made with monocrystalline, not cadmium telluride. They are bifacial panels within an aluminum frame, and the solar cells are made from silicon encased in glass.

Other comments made were related to the environmental impacts, long-term effects, the process of decommissioning projects and recovery, and on many more topics.

In the end, only five of six members voted, as one member abstained, which resulted in the approval of the project with a 3-2 vote.



# K.H.S. Graduate Emilia Lang Honored with National Nursing Award

Emilia Lang, a 2023 Kewaskum High School alumna, has recently graduated from Moraine Park Technical College and has been recognized with the DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nursing Students. Receiving the DAISY Award is a prestigious national honor celebrating compassion, dedication, and excellence in patient care.

Lang earned the award during her nursing program's pinning ceremony at Moraine Park. The recognition came as a complete surprise, as students aren't informed ahead of time if they've been nominated.

"I feel incredibly honored. I felt a sense of validation for all the hard work and long nights I have put in the last two years," said Lang. "I had no idea that I was nominated by my clinical instructor, so I was in shock when they called my name."

The DAISY Award recognizes nursing students across the country who demonstrate exceptional care, empathy, and commitment to patients and their communities. At Moraine Park, one student from each of the college's three campuses is selected for the award at every graduation ceremony.

Lang's passion for nursing started during high school, where she worked as a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA).

# Hello from Montana!

This week, I (Selina) am writing this week's column while my Dad is away in Canada. I have a year of travel and adventure to fill you all in on. This story will be about the great, good, and some ugly from my last year.

Moving to Montana is one of the best things I think I have done for myself. While it is difficult being so far away from family, the magic of the mountains has captured me. The people here are incredibly active and independent and that has pushed me as well. Getting passed by people of all ages, 5-75, on hiking trails was a good reality check to step up my game (adjusting from flatland is not easy). Now I hike nearly daily and think I am the strongest I have ever been.

One of my favorite activities I have gotten into is downhill skiing! Thanks to Sue and Jeff Moll, I came to Montana with some skis, but no experience actually skiing. Fortunately, I have many friends out here that are avid skiers and were more than willing to take me under their wing and teach me a thing or two. I didn't think that I would be, but now I'm hooked! I got a season pass to a local resort around here and look forward to being a bit of a ski bum this next winter.

Last fall was also a very pivotal time for me as it was the first time I was truly hunting independently and not with the help of my Dad. Although I did not harvest anything I was happy to be able to say I went and did it totally on my own, and look forward to growing more and more independent and skilled as the years progress.

After much thought and consideration in April, I stepped away from my job working with the USFWS as a biologist. I think this is the hardest decision I have had to make thus far in my life, and while it was not easy, I have no regrets in my choice. It is no secret that this year has been difficult on federal employees and I was no exception to that. The stress from being worried if I was going to be fired nearly every day took a big toll on my mental health. Additionally, if I were to get fired financially I would have been in some hot water very quick. (The way that I resigned I remain a federal employee through September and am still receiving full benefits.) While Montana is gorgeous and incredible, it is not a cheap place to live. Additionally, while I was incredibly grateful to land such a good position at a young





On July 12, fourteen local agricultural businesses from Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties will be hosting a free, family-friendly event from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. for the community to visit as many local agricultural businesses as possible at their own pace to make a connection to the area's local agricultural industry.

Here is a rundown of the participating businesses:

- Ledgerrock Distillery, located at N5287 Grandview Rd, Fond du Lac, is a small-batch craft distillery built on the Retzer Family farm with a tasting room and specialty cocktails. They make vodka, gin, bourbon, and corn whiskey with the grains they grow on their farm.

"A member of our family is always there to share our story, and you can see where the entire process takes place," said Heidi Retzer. "The same individuals who plant and harvest the crops make the spirits."

- Valley View Landscaping LLC & Valley View Garden Center, located at 9085 St Kilian Heights Rd, Allenton, is a family-owned business specializing in helping clients create their ideal patio and outdoor living space.

Their greenhouse houses a retail store featuring annual and seasonal hanging baskets, plus porch pots for outdoor space, with local vendors that include jams, jewelry, homemade products, and house plants.

"We also have vegetable plants for your garden, and visitors can meet their goats, ducks, sheep, peacocks, and chickens," said Maria Flasch.

- Widmer's Cheese Cellars, located at 214 W. Henni St, Theresa, is a fourth-generation cheese factory making quality handcrafted Brick, Butterkase, Cheddar, and Colby Cheese since 1922.

"Come to our retail store for a wide selection of cheeses and samples," said Joey Widmer.

- Traveling Roots Farmstead, located at N9299 County Rd AY, Theresa, is a small, family-run farmstead and is open year-round.

Their farm stand is a local source for freshly baked sourdough bread, handcrafted bakery items, micro-greens, farm-fresh eggs, seasonal produce, and cut flowers.



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

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

**DNR Celebrates 85 Years of Bald Eagle Protection and National Eagle Day**

*Support Endangered Species Conservation and Bald Eagle Recovery in Wisconsin*

**WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES**

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) celebrated National Eagle Day on June 20, and the 85th anniversary of the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act. Wisconsinites can support the next species' comeback in Wisconsin with an Endangered Resources license plate.

Bald eagles have made an amazing recovery in our state thanks to a combination of the national ban on the pesticide DDT, added state and federal protections, like the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, river cleanups under the Clean Water Act and Wisconsin DNR nest monitoring and protection with support from the Endangered Resources Fund.

"The bald eagle is an iconic Wisconsin endangered resources success story, and part of that work was supported by the Endangered Resources Fund," said Drew Feldkirchner, DNR Natural Heritage Conservation Director. "Endangered Resources license plates help raise funds and spread awareness for current endangered species recovery efforts in Wisconsin, like little brown bats, rusty patched bumble bees and ornate box turtles."

Endangered Resources license plates include an annual \$25 donation to the Endangered Resources Fund. This revenue has played a critical role in funding DNR conservation work for more than 400 wildlife species and 300 plant spe-

cies listed as endangered, threatened or special concern. The DNR's Natural Heritage Conservation Bureau works across the department and with partners and volunteers to locate, protect and manage native plants, animals and Wisconsin's natural communities from the common to the critically endangered.

The Endangered Resources license plate is \$40 for the first year, with a one-time charge of \$15 to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) and the remaining \$25 to the DNR's Endangered Resources Fund.

Endangered Resources license plates, along with tax form donations and state matching funds, have accounted for as much as 40% of funding for endangered species conservation in some years and have supported the recovery of bald eagles, trumpeter swans and other species while preventing hundreds of other species from vanishing from Wisconsin. In 2024, license plate sales raised over \$470,000 for conservation of endangered resources.

**How To Get An Endangered Resources Plate**

To buy a new plate, fill out the WisDOT Endangered Resources License Plate Application Form. People can switch to this license plate at any time, and there is no need to wait for registration renewal.

## SSM Health Supports Fond du Lac County Health Department Save a Smile Dental Program

No child should grow up without the benefit of good dental hygiene. Poor oral health among children has been related to poor performance in school, poor social relationships, and less success later in life.

SSM Health has given a \$20,000 donation to the Fond du Lac County Health Department Save a Smile Dental Program to help area children and adults with limited finances to receive dental services.

The Save a Smile Children's Dental Program provides preventive and restorative dental services for Fond du Lac County residents, ages 18 and under, with Medical Assistance only.

The Save a Smile Adult Program assists only with urgent dental needs. Adults on Medical Assistance or that meet a specified income level may be eligible for assistance. It does not cover root canals, crowns, partials or dentures.

Fond du Lac County has approximately 7,800 children and 6,000 adults enrolled in medical assistance.

"This program allows families to receive dental care locally instead of having to travel long distances for care," according to Stephanie Hopf, Save a Smile Dental Program coordinator. "Oral health is often an overlooked piece of the health puzzle, and oral health and overall health are directly related. Someone with poor oral health is more likely to suffer from cardiovascular disease, dementia, respiratory infections, diabetes, kidney disease, and rheumatoid arthritis. Preventive dental care can help to reduce the overall burden of disease and health care costs."

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
