

Brenner is New Leader of Cougars' Volleyball Program

Alexandra Brenner has been named the new varsity volleyball coach for the 2025-26 season.

Campbellsport is coming off a 15-14 season, finishing in second place in the Flyway Conference, with all-conference players Ellie Smith, Emma Muraski, and Shea Willacker returning for the Cougars.

"This will be my sixth year coaching. I started by coaching JV1 at New Holstein High School for three seasons, then Campbellsport, where I coached JV2 for one year, followed by JV1 last season," said new volleyball coach Alexandra Brenner. "Volleyball has always been a large part of my identity. The sport is a passion I love passing on to my players."

"I'm currently in my fourth year teaching at Campbellsport, and after serving as the JV1 coach last season, stepping into the varsity role felt like a natural next step," said Brenner. "This position allows me to lead a group of athletes I already care about and to continue growing a program I've been invested in."

"Campbellsport is an incredibly supportive and close-knit community, and being part of the school as a teacher has given me a deep appreciation for the values here: hard work, kindness, and community involvement," said Brenner. "It's a great place to coach because people genuinely care about our students and their growth, both in the classroom and on the court."

"I think we're in a really promising place. There's a lot of talent in our program and a willingness to work hard," said Brenner. "Last year, we started building a strong culture of teamwork, accountability, and positivity. I'm excited to continue that momentum and help our athletes take the next step competitively and personally."

"I see so much potential in the youth and middle school programs, and they're critical to the long-term success of our high school teams," said Brenner. "I'm looking forward to collaborating more with those levels, helping create a clear progression for skill development, and getting young players excited about the game from the start."

"The Flyway Conference has always meant something to me because I played in it as a high school athlete," said Brenner. "It's been fun to

see the conference grow and evolve over the years, and I'm constantly impressed by the level of talent across the teams. It's a competitive environment that pushes us to keep raising the bar."

"I believe two of the most important roles of a coach are to lead with honesty and positivity," said Brenner. "I'm a firm believer that honesty is the best policy because it builds trust and sets clear expectations."

"I also want my players to act with grace, both towards others and themselves," said Brenner. "As a coach, I know I need to model that. I want to show young women how to compete with heart, lift each other up, and live with integrity, no matter the outcome."

"My initial goal is to continue the work we started last year by building a positive environment and cultivating a goal-oriented mindset among our athletes," said Brenner. "Long-term, I'd like to establish a program that competes consistently in the Flyway Conference, supports players at every level of development, and becomes something that younger athletes look forward to being part of."



Love and Quantum Entanglement; Hearts Across the Universe

Dear Reader,

In the mysterious realm of quantum physics, there exists a phenomenon so strange that Einstein himself called it “spooky action at a distance.” When two particles become entangled, they share an invisible connection that defies our everyday understanding of reality. Measure one particle’s spin, and instantly—faster than light could travel between them—its partner responds, no matter how many galaxies separate them.



chanics, the act of measuring one particle instantly affects its entangled partner. In love, this manifests as the uncanny ability to sense when something is wrong, to feel the other’s emotional state shift, or to know instinctively when to reach out. The connection exists in a realm beyond our five senses, operating through what lovers often describe as intuition but might better be understood as emotional entanglement.

Critics might argue that quantum entanglement involves particles that maintain perfect correlation, while human relationships are messy, imperfect, and subject to change. But this objection misses the point. Even entangled particles can become “disentangled” through interaction with their environment. Love, too, requires protection from external forces that might break the connection, such as neglect, betrayal, or simply the quantum decoherence that comes from taking the bond for granted.

The beauty of both phenomena lies not in their permanence but in their possibility. Quantum entanglement shows us that at the most fundamental level, separateness is an illusion. Two particles, once connected, carry something of each other forever. Two people, once truly entangled, share a similar fate—they become part of each other’s story in ways that persist regardless of physical distance or the passage of time.

This quantum view of love offers comfort to those separated by circumstance and insight to those struggling to understand the depth of their connection. It suggests that love operates according to principles more fundamental than those governing our everyday world, where instantaneous communication across vast distances is not just possible but inevitable.

In the end, perhaps Einstein was only half right. The “spooky action at a distance” he found so troubling in physics might be the most natural thing in the world when it comes to the human heart. After all, what is love but the ultimate quantum entanglement—two souls becoming so intertwined that they share a single wave function, collapsing into the reality of “us” every time they choose to observe their connection and find it still there, still strong, still defying the classical rules of a world that insists we are separate beings?

In both quantum physics and matters of the heart, the universe seems to whisper the same secret: connection is more fundamental than separation, and love, like entanglement, is woven into the very fabric of reality itself.

Perhaps this sounds familiar to anyone who has ever been deeply in love.

Consider two people who have found that rare, profound connection. Like quantum particles that have shared a common origin, these individuals become entangled in ways that transcend physical proximity. When one feels joy, the other somehow senses it across continents. When one struggles, the other feels an inexplicable urge to call, text, or simply send love into the universe.

The parallels are striking. In quantum entanglement, particles exist in a state of superposition—simultaneously holding multiple possibilities until observed. Similarly, two people in love exist in a shared emotional state, their feelings interconnected and fluid. They are both individuals and part of something greater, their identities overlapping in ways that create new possibilities for who they can become together.

Distance becomes irrelevant in both realms. Quantum particles maintain their connection regardless of the space between them, and lovers often report feeling closer to their partner during separation than to anyone physically present. The heart, it seems, operates on its own quantum principles, where emotional proximity trumps geographical reality.

Yet the analogy deepens when we consider measurement and observation. In quantum me-



Not a train spotter. Leastwise, since childhood. When I was a toddler, my parents rented Jerome Perron’s farm, two and a half miles north of Campbellsport. Dad raised chickens together with the Bauer family.

Nights when Chicago and Northwestern trains ran across Sunset Drive and County V crossings a quarter mile south of us, either my father or older brother towed me outside where we watched in the darkness as double decker Pullman cars rattled over the tracks, air pungent with oily diesel smoke. Upper and lower berths lighted, others dark, unoccupied or tenants asleep. Occasionally, a shadow in the window. Perhaps those glancing out at dwellings in the sticks wondering how we lived. Entranced as much as I, while they thundered away. What an exciting means to travel.

In grade school, Greg Graves and I saw freights pass through town. Though less frequently. More apt to see jet contrails in sky blue enough to hurt the eyes.

Perhaps a bug was planted from Mom’s stories of hobos who stowed into Hartford. Or Dad’s own tales of “All aboard.” Not to mention magazine articles which extolled a glamorous lifestyle.

My father’s worst memory after his mother was killed by a milk truck backing out of their driveway is taking her from Edgar to Manitowoc for burial. Paying for two fares. He rode up front, her coffin in baggage.

Only time I’ve ever ridden the rails was in a Victorian-era stiff seat carriage towed by a steam locomotive around the perimeter of the National Railroad Museum in Green Bay.

Still miss the rumble of trains through summer nights in Marblehead, echoes ricocheting off limestone cliffs.

Yet a hunger persists. Not to follow in Jack Kerouac or Ralph Ellison’s hitch a free ride style. Thrown off, if not beat up by the bulls. Just settle comfortably into an Amtrak coach, headed anywhere.



Twenty-Four Hours in a Tree



Quite the show was put on by mama bear and her cubs.

Hello friends,

Every few years, I pick a cool part of Wisconsin to climb into a tree and watch what happens over a 24-hour period of time. Last week, I gave my good buddy, Musky Joe Flater, a call. Joe, who owns Flater's Resort, which is a great place to hang your hat and is located on the shores of the Chippewa and Flambeau Rivers, set me up for a big show!

Thursday, July 10
High 83, Low 57

Here is the plan: Joe set me up on one of his food plots, and I would be very comfortable 18 feet up in the air, in a two-man ladder stand. My diet would be a stick of garlic cheddar elk sausage, a zip lock bag of green beans that I had just picked, and a half a pound of cheese; I had a frozen one gallon jug of water for hydration, which also kept my food chilled.

Clothing-wise, mosquitoes, ticks, rain, and heavy dew at night were all important, so I wore layers and rain gear after dark as well as a gillie suit.

At 12:10 p.m., I was dropped off by UTV and was very comfortable and looking forward to my challenge. My view is a T-shaped food plot planted in clover and grass that is 100 percent surrounded by forest. I think that it is worth mentioning that so far, this warm season, I have had 13 separate experiences where ticks have lodged into my carcass, and with each experience, it sucks for about three weeks.

Until 4:58, all I really observed besides a great view was a lot of robins. At 4:58, a large doe entered the food plot, did not like something, and left.

During primetime, I was very excited to see a bear, deer, turkey, etc., but did not. I passed the time eating my snacks, especially the green beans. At dark, I had not climbed down and realized with nine hours in, I still had 17 to go, and this was going to be a challenge.

At 11:58 p.m., there is a full moon, and my eyes have adjusted to the forest and food plot as well as I could hope for. Four large deer are feeding within 30 yards of me. I can see the red of their bodies perfectly but cannot make out horns. There are no fawns, and I am thinking bucks. They had no idea of my presence and were communicating in snickers. It was very cool.

The deer kept me wide awake, but by 2:00 a.m., I was getting tired. Though I was strapped into my tree, if I would start to relax, my legs would

slip out from underneath me, and thus, zero sleep would take place.

It started to become light at 3:15, and light was very obvious by 4:00. I was in an excellent mood at 6:05, when to my left I saw about a 250-pound sow with three cubs enter the plot 70 yards to my right. To watch the cubs was to watch an endless game of them playing with each other and exploring by themselves, and they were making a sort of clucking sound to communicate to each other.

Kind of bad luck came my way when they started heading directly at my tree. Things got a bit touchy when one of them climbed my tree, and the other two tried climbing my ladder. So here is the scenario, I have a cub directly behind my head on the back part of my tree and the other two trying to climb the ladder.

Mama decided to mosey on over and see what is so exciting. She was 10 feet in front of the ladder, looking up and using her nose. The cub in the tree climbed down, the other two headed to mom, and for the next half hour, I was able to watch these four play and rest in the plot.

That my friends could have become a very much different situation. Friends would ask me afterward if I was scared. I can honestly say that I was not. Some of the drivers and ice on the road scare me more. Technology puts fear in me, as I have not kept up. The family of four experience was just one very cool memory.

I stayed in my tree until 12:10 p.m., changed into shorts at my truck, and was consumed by mosquitoes. The drive home, I had been awake for 35 hours. I was fine until I hit Marshfield, and just like that, I simply could not rationalize driving. I pulled over at the zoo, took a 30-minute snooze, and was good to go.

I want to thank "Musky Joe" for almost feeding me to the skeets and bears!



LAND BETWEEN THE MARSHES

Lake Theresa

Around the time Solomon Juneau was plating the Village of Theresa in 1848, he was also expanding his business interests building a grist mill in the settlement. The grist mill was located at the east end of present day Henni Street bordering the Rock River, across from the Old Weber Brewery. One-hundred sixty feet upstream he built a 6-foot-high log and earth dam which provided waterpower via flume to the downstream mill.

The dam backed up more than your average small mill pond. When the water backed a 2,000-acre lake covering marshy wetlands to the east, Juneau named the body of water Lake Theresa. Lake Theresa was twice the size of present-day Cedar Lake and approximately two-thirds the size of Lake Sinissippi. Like Lake Sinissippi, Lake Theresa was a man-made shallow flowage with a water depth of 8 feet or less. The lake soon became a great wildlife haven with excellent fishing, hunting and other recreational uses. Activities included swimming, row boating, along with excellent year-round hunting, fishing and trapping. During winter, horse racing on the ice from Theresa to Theresa Station and back was a popular event.

The *Dodge County Pioneer*, October 22, 1885, reported, "building activity was booming at St. Anthony settlement (Theresa Station) on the shores of beautiful Lake Theresa." In those days North Pole Road had

not been built and the water backed by the Theresa Dam was lapping the shore surrounding the southern and east side of the village of the new village. That along with the coming of the Wisconsin Central Railroad, which ran through the settlement crossing the Lake Theresa on a man-made embankment with a short trestle bridge, made the future look bright for the new town.

According to Theresa historian Les Beck in an article in *The Mayville News*, October 21, 1982; "Stories exist of a large flat bottom boat

powered by foot driven water wheels on each side of the boat which often plied the waters of the lake taking folks and sometimes the (Theresa) Village Band on Sunday excursions up to Theresa Station and back. Stories of excellent fishing, ice fishing and spearing with large fish and large catches on the lake and below the dam also flourished."

In 1889, the old grist mill built by Juneau was destroyed by fire, but then owner Gerhard Schnerder built a new mill on the same site, modernizing it by installing a steam engine

for mill power and reducing water usage. Not long after, an agent representing local business interests contacted farmers whose land bordered Lake Theresa proposing the establishment of a Theresa Drainage District. The aim was to remove the dam and convert the flooded land back to agricultural use.

In the January 4, 1889, issue of the *Dodge County Pioneer*, it was reported that John Wenninger, Gottlieb Erdman, and Otto Greiner proposed to establish the Theresa Drainage District, intending to buy and remove the Theresa Dam to reclaim 3,800 acres for agricultural purposes. There was considerable opposition raised by township residents. The dam removal issue lagged, bogged down in the state court system. Six years later on May 16, 1895, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled against the Theresa Drainage District and the dam stayed.

Less than month later, On June 6, 1895, the *Dodge County Pioneer* reported that Gerhard Schnerter, owner of the dam, had contracted with Fred Rietbach & Associates to tear the dam down, despite the fact there was a court order issued less than a month earlier that prevented the dam from being torn down.

On July 18, the *Dodge County Pioneer* ran a report, "A large hole break developed in the dam at Theresa and as a result the water level had lowered." The fact was the dam was being removed despite the pending court order that had stayed its

demise. Theresa residents complained loudly that the dam had been removed illegally, citing the land would return to be a worthless swamp but the issue faded into the sunset. The court did not revisit the issue and after 47 years of existence, Lake Theresa became a case of water over the dam... gone.

After the dam was torn out, it took more than two years of court wrangling to get the deeds of relinquishment on reclaimed land back to the farmers who bordered the drained lake. Area residents complained for several years about the stink and smell as the land dried out. A similar smelly fate had occurred only 10 miles west with the draining of Lake Horicon in the 1870s.

Mother Nature took over and vegetation started to return to the old lake bottom. Efforts to prepare the drained lake bottom for agriculture included land clearing, stone and


rock removal, dragging, and some excavation to enable drainage of the nearby bog areas. Soon enough, most farmers found that much of the reclaimed land was not good for agricultural use, outside of pastureland. Then came several rainy seasons, causing ground water levels to rise, and soon the cattails started to reclaim the 2,000-acre lake bottom, returning it to a wetland marsh.

Some years later the Wisconsin Supreme Court would rule that all man-made lakes that had existed for 40 or more years were declared to be natural lakes and could not be drained. Of course, that came too late for Lake Horicon and Lake Theresa. They were gone. Historian Les Beck wrote in his column, *The Mayville News*, October 21, 1982. "Had this ruling (Supreme Court order staying the demolition of the Theresa dam) come down earlier Theresa might be a resort area..."


One can only imagine what it would be like if Lake Horicon and

Lake Theresa still existed. We would not be living in the land between the marshes. Rather, the land between the lakes.


Theresa Historical Society erected this commemorative plaque at the Lake Theresa Dam site in 2000. PHOTO CREDIT: ROB BOWE




