Kewaskum School Board July Meeting Notes

Opposition to the past expulsion of a School District of Kewaskum student was expressed during the public comment segment of the Board of Education meeting on Thursday, July 17. Anonymous letters were read, and two community members spoke in regard to the student's potential to return to school.

Board Matters:

- The school board discussed adopting the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Special Education Model Forms and Policies and Procedures Manual. A motion to adopt the manual was made by Bradley Petersen and passed 4 to 0. Vice President Tim Ramthun, Clerk Stephanie Bird, and Sue Miller were absent from the meeting.
- The board also discussed approving the annual declaration and parent notice of the Kewaskum School District's student academic standards for the 2025-2026 school year. The motion to approve the declaration and parent notice was made by Petersen and passed unanimously.
- The board considered purchasing Structured Literacy Academy for specialized literacy training professional development at the cost of \$14,000. Treasurer Ric Leitheiser made the motion to approve the purchase, which passed unanimously.
- Purchase of Itinerant Services: Deaf or Hard of Hearing (DHH) and Audiology through CESA

Campbellsport Baseball Legion 19U Advances to the State Tournament

On July 27, the Campbellsport baseball legion team beat Waupun 13-3 in six innings to advance to the Wisconsin American Legion Baseball Association 51st Annual Class AA State Baseball Tournament in New London, August 1-5.

Waupun (8-5) was ahead 2-1 to start the third inning when Brody Nolan hit an RBI single for Campbellsport (12-5) to tie the game at two runs apiece after three innings.

Campbellsport scored five runs in the fourth inning, highlighted by a bases-loaded, three-run double by Tyler Sachen to clear the bases with

two outs to give Campbellsport a 7-2 lead.

The Cougars got the bases loaded again in the fifth inning, resulting in another five runs for Campbellsport, featuring RBI singles from Jace Goebel and Nolan to push the Cougars' lead to 12-3 after five innings.


Campbellsport got doubles from Goebel and Nolan, resulting in another run to give the Cougars the 13-3 win and clinch the Regional Championship, advancing to the Class AA State Baseball Tournament.

"Jace and Brody each tallied three hits in the


On Memories of Yesteryear

Did the alarm clock fail to ring? Plumb slept through the entire summer. Could've sworn it




was the tail end of July, the EAA air show in full swing. Or mebbe the ears were just ringing again.

A plant must have significantly improved qualities to be considered for an AAS award.

Display gardens feature the newest AAS winners in a well-maintained setting where you can view the winners. There are nearly 200 display gardens in the United States and Canada located in public botanic gardens and arboreta, municipality gardens, garden retailers, university gardens and more. Some locations also offer related educational opportunities, open houses or field days during the growing season.

Take some time to enjoy and evaluate your gardens. Then set aside some time to visit local gardens for ideas and inspiration.



Campbellsport Village Board Approves Purchase of New Ambulance

The Campbellsport Village Board held a regular meeting on July 14 at 6 p.m.

The Campbellsport Fire Department replaces their ambulance every seven years. In 2023, they chose to replace the chassis, which was scheduled to take place in 2026. The chassis dealer said that they would

not be able to start the re-chassis process until late fall in 2027, putting the project completion date in 2028. The Fire Department felt that this was not a realistic option with the ambulance's mileage being around 90,000. The fire chief and the ambulance committee did not feel that this ambulance would be able to reliably withstand another seven years.

The ambulance committee was

able to find a new ambulance that would be delivered to the department in October 2025 for \$297,000, the cost to re-chassis the ambulance would be \$296,000. Due to this, the ambulance committee advised the purchase of the new ambulance for \$297,000. The "new" ambulance was ordered around 2022 by a different department, but the order fell through and it was being held on the

line, which allowed the Campbellsport Fire Department to purchase it for a lower rate. The price of \$297,000 does not include the wrap that is added to the ambulance.

The Campbellsport Fire Department funds this ambulance purchase with the money that they receive from the county every year, and save over the course of the seven year time period to make this purchase.

Trail Riding

Hello friends,

Though I own a 500 Polaris Sportsman and a 570 two-up Polaris Sportsman ATV, I seldom use them for anything other than hunting, ice fishing and farm work. This week, I did some prior homework and headed up to Lincoln County, where I camped and learned/experienced what it is that has created such an immense and popular pastime for thousands of people every weekend.

Saturday, July 19
High 77, Low 55

My first very cool find of this adventure would be Otter Lake Campground, which is a beautiful 30-site, county-owned campground with no electric hookups (that really helps to keep the big units out). Folks, I seldom push a spot, but you could hunt here on this very large tract of public land, fish Otter Lake, which does not allow motors, or simply enjoy yourself with a simple picnic or camping getaway.

So, I have to be really clear that I am very green to trail riding, and the most important part of this experience, next to my 570 Polaris, was the map I would carry and really have to pay attention to reading.

Today I arrived, built camp, and, like I mentioned, I was really impressed with Otter Lake Campground and also felt comfortable with my very down-to-earth neighbors.

The first mistake I made was 100 percent my fault and something that I realized after about 10 miles. I am embarrassed to say this, but until late in the day, I had read my Harrison Hills ATV Club Routes and Trails map wrong, and I did not hit the trails I hoped to ride until the last 15 miles of a 32-mile tour. I was looking for nature, as in a view, wildlife,

interesting landscapes, and a challenge with my driving. That was all there, but I was also on blacktop until I figured out my mistake.


Though I had my early failure in reading the map, I came out of it and was very psyched for the next day's ride.

Sunday, July 20
High 81, Low 57

Last night, my machine took me to Winding Trail Grill and Bar, and that was where I had dinner and also witnessed a lot of riders having a very good time. Today, I had the map all figured out and was determined to explore as much as I could and see if I could keep from getting lost. In re-

ality, where I was driving was almost 100 percent public land, as in forest or marsh, with lots of up and down grade slopes with what seemed like a curve every couple hundred yards.

What this redneck on a machine learned the most is you can never stop being observant, always stay on your side of the trail and always expect the person that you cannot see, that is coming your way, is going to be in your path. I had probably five close calls today and generally it was drivers that were younger and just having a blast. There are going to be times that you do not see each other until you are 50 feet or less away.

I put exactly 50 miles on the 570 today. I probably stopped every three miles just to take in the view and the moment and have come up with a new idea for my next ATV adventure and that is to travel with a small tent and a sleeping bag and go on a trail trip where I do not come back to a camp.

I have looked with interest and envy at the UTVs and ATVs on trailers heading for fun weekends and can now fully understand why people spend the money and time doing this very cool pastime.


Campbellsport is advancing to the state tournament for the third time in the last four years.





Kewaskum Village Board Commits to Moving the Future Creekside Camp All Abilities Playground to Reigle Park

The Kewaskum Village Board held a regular meeting on July 21 at 7 p.m.

The Kewaskum Women's Club gave out their 2025 Beautification Awards. The winner of the Plant Shrubbery and Tree Arrangement Award was Raymond and Geraldine Bodden. The Colorful Floral and Selection of Design Award went to Nicholas and Arlene Schecher. The Lawn Ornaments and Decor Award went to Beverly Zimbars. The Business Beautification Award was awarded to Local Press Burger Bar.

Kohn's Filling Station Donated \$700 to the Kewaskum Public Library. There was also an additional \$100 donation by a resident. The library is still in search of a new director. Priority will be given to applicants who apply by August 1. The application can be found on the village website.

The Village Board voted to move the Creekside Camp All Abilities Playground to Reigle Park. The playground project could receive a potential donation of over six figures if there was a commitment from the Village Board to move the playground to Reigle Park, pave a portion of the parking lot to make it accessible, and add ADA-compliant bathrooms. In previous discussions about the Creekside Camp All Abilities Playground, it was originally planned to be placed in Kiwanis Park. The Board discussed paving the northeast portion of the parking lot, about where the current playground is. In their initial research, the Board is estimating the paving project to cost around \$85,000. The Village is continuing to research the accessible bathrooms; Village Administrator Adam Gitter said they can range from \$50,000 to \$60,000 all the way up to six figures. They are going to continue to look into this before they are able to commit to the accessible bathroom and are able to put an exact number to it. Unlimited Play has been assisting the Creekside Camp All Abilities Playground and the Village with writing their grants.

The DNR Grant offers a matching grant for the Village. The Village is exploring the possibility of a grant from the DNR that would match their contribution. Ben Propson raised the concern that there is a sanitary sewer that runs through the center of the proposed plan; there may be some added cost to work around that, but he would need to look into it further. The only official action taken by the Board was to commit to placing the playground in Reigle Park.

There were three potential offers for the purchase of TID #3. The Board discussed the need for these individuals to come back and present their offers at an open session meeting. They were going to go back to those who had proposed an offer and have them come back with an official offer at an open session meeting.

The board voted to adopt Ordinance 2025-03 Non-Transport Ambulance Service Fees. This means that there will be a \$250 fee for the third non-transport ambulance call within a rolling 12-month period.
