Campbellsport Pony Baseball Team Concludes Successful Season

The Campbellsport Pony baseball team, with boys ages 13 and 14 years old, had a successful season this summer, finishing second in the Dual County League. They came out with a 19-6 season record and a 10-1 tournament record.

This season, they also went 3-0 in the North Fond du Lac tournament, taking first place; 5-0 in the Lomira tournament, taking first place; and 2-1 in the Oakfield tournament, taking third place.

In playoffs, they beat Eden 7-3 and Lomira black 3-0, before losing to Laconia in a close championship game 8-7 in extra innings.

“The pitching was the strength of the team all season,” said Coach Kyle Wondra. “The pitchers combined to throw four games this year where the opposing team didn’t have a hit. The best game was their 3-0 win over Lomira in the playoffs, in which the team played error-free defense

and pitched a no-hitter.”

Wondra commented on the offense, saying, “[I’m] Proud of the way the boys battled all year. They never gave up in games this year. We had a number of games where we came back in the late innings to pull out wins.”

Wolfgang Stoffel and Davin Doyle were chosen to represent Campbellsport and play in this season’s all-star game, while Krozby Kohn participated in the home run derby.

“The development of the players as the year went on was fun to watch,” said Wondra. “They did the little things to win ball games, and it was great to see them play unselfishly for the betterment of the team.”

Wondra concluded, “I would also like to thank Dave Doyle, Shane Stoffel and Dave Mowry for all their help this year. It would be really tough to coach 16 players without all their help.”

Village Board Approves Purchase of Additional Police Body Cameras

The Kewaskum Village Board held a regular meeting on August 4 at 7:00 p.m.

The Kewaskum Village Board approved the purchase of two additional police body cameras. Currently, they have two that are used for patrol and one that is used for the school resource officer. They originally purchased their body cam-

eras with a grant, and there is still \$4,000 left in the grant to utilize. The two new cameras will be purchased with the remaining grant money; the remaining cost will be \$744 a year for five years. Chief Bishop said that this can easily be worked into the budget for the next year. The board approved this purchase.

The next board meeting will be held on August 18 at 7:00 p.m.

Kewaskum School District Approves Levy

State Budget Leaves Local Taxpayers to Shoulder School Funding Burden

While the recently approved Wisconsin state budget includes investments in special education, it leaves general school funding flat for the next two years—shifting the burden of funding school districts to taxpayers to maintain essential programs and services.

Because the state did not increase general aid to schools, Kewaskum School District, like many others across Wisconsin, will need to raise the local tax levy simply to maintain current levels of staffing, classroom instruction, student programs, and operational needs. Nearly all of the new revenue goes directly toward a continuation of services, meaning maintaining existing student programs and offsetting inflationary costs, such as fuel, utilities, and cost-of-living increases. Total KSD expenditures are increasing an overall 2.77% while the tax levy is projected to increase by over 7%.

“We are grateful for the increase in special education support, but the reality is that most of our daily operations, like maintaining safe buildings and offering high-quality learning opportunities, are funded through general aid and the revenue limit,” said Dr. Mark Bazata, Superintendent of the Kewaskum School District. “With no increase in that funding from the state, the responsibility shifts to our local taxpayers to make up the difference. That’s not a burden we take lightly.”

Originally, state aid and the revenue limit were designed to work together. When the state increases one without the other unintended consequences occur. If the state budget process would provide modest inflationary increases to both, local taxpayers would also see lower and manageable adjustments.

Board of Education President Jim Leister emphasized that the district remains committed to fiscal responsibility and student success. “Our board works hard to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars while ensuring that Kewaskum students have access to a well-rounded, high-quality education. In the face of flat state funding, we are choosing to prioritize our kids, our teachers, and our community’s future.”

Despite the funding challenges, district leaders remain optimistic. Kewaskum schools continue to demonstrate strong academic achievement, responsible budgeting, and a community-driven approach to decision-making.

“We are proud of our staff, our students, and the unwavering support of our families and taxpayers,” added Dr. Bazata. “We’ll continue to work



head barely visible above the front seat headrest.





Participants must remain enrolled full-time, maintain a 2.5 GPA or higher and give back to the community by working 20 hours of community service each semester.

Hello friends,

After I hit send on this column, I am getting in my truck, which is hooked to a trailer with my ATV in it and heading to Salmon, Idaho, for the start of a 14-day adventure. First, I am going to meet with my daughter, Selina, and spend four days with Selina and her coworkers as they do research on trout and salmon. Next, it is off to the Montana mountains where we are going to camp and scout for elk.

This week I am writing about a unique change in my life, that may happen each summer as long as I have my pond, and I am also going to add in some of my hobby farming way of life that is really keeping me busy these days.

Sunday, July 13
High 82, Low 55

For the last three weeks, when I am home, I have been sleeping in my 14-foot, 2017 Stealth trailer that is rigged for camping and hauling a UTV. It is next to my pond. After googling bullfrogs, I realized what a threat they are, and today I sighted in my Crossman pump BB gun. This afternoon, I was hanging out at my beach with a friend, and I saw the enemy and seriously did not want to take its life. One shot between the eyes, and it was game on. That evening until 2:00 a.m. I sat by a campfire, and when I heard the tell-tale croaking, I went hunting with my headlamp and the Crossman. By the time that I hit the rack, my total was four, and I was confident that I had eliminated the enemy.

As soon as I laid down, the croaking began, and until last night, 12 days later, it would not stop after dark.

To the garden, I have four crops of sweet corn planted, and the freezing process will begin when I get home from this trip. Each winter, I put my cattle in the garden, and I honestly feel that this

summer is the best-looking crop I have ever had. The night before I left for this trip, I had a friend take a picture of me in my tomato patch and most of the plants are as tall as me.

I am addicted to gardening, putting up food and feasting on my independent way of living until the next garden.

Speaking of cattle, this may be my last group. I buy 200 to 300-pound calves. Not long ago, I was paying \$350 to \$500 a piece, fast forward 20 months and they are \$1000 to \$1500 each. I use the lump sum to invest in my Roth IRA but will not be able to continue doing that as I would lose at least \$500 an animal at the present calf price.

Back to the frogs, seven days after the night that I wrote about. I had harvested 14. It is literally amazing; they are very intelligent once they know that they are being hunted. I whack about one a night, and every time I get one, I am confident I just ended the problem. Often, I miss; sometimes, I forget to put a bb in the chamber, and there has not been a night that I went to bed that another bullfrog hasn't started croaking.

Good news on the pond, which is my favorite escape in the world. Last October, I planted 230, 3-to-5-inch perch. Yesterday I fished it and caught two, 3-inch perch in a minute, and that is the size that this year's young would be at 90 days.

I wrote a while back about an old red hen named Red that was being tortured by my rooster, as she did not find him attractive anymore. Red the hen is as much of a pet now as my dog Red. She always wants a treat, to be pet, and she sleeps next to the front door.

The frogs have become so intelligent to my sneak attacks in the dark that when I hear them croak, they dive under water when I am trying to find them. I changed my arsenal to a .22 with bird-shot, and last night I whacked number 24. Since then when going to bed, I have not heard a single croak.

On that same subject, I do not have a single other type of frog anymore, no peepers to listen to.

When I get home, I will only be 28 days from hunting bear. Today was the 100th day of running baits, the deer flies are as bad as they can get, but all I can think is cooler weather, sitting in a tree with a 300 and just like the bullfrogs, whacking me a black bear. The roasts are as good as any beef roast and my freezer is getting low.

In a year or two, I can start harvesting perch and bluegill, my garden, pond and woodstove are all parts of how I live independently, along with bear, deer, elk, turkey, duck, goose and the eggs my hens provide.

Be active, do something nice for someone, and I will keep doing what I do!

Vs Beaver Dam

"Riley had an outstanding performance on the mound with eight strikeouts in six innings," said Campbellsport Coaches Dave Bothe and Gary Goebel.


Vs Onalaska


The Cougars got the bases loaded twice in the fifth inning, capped off by Sachen's two-run RBI single to finish off the 11-1 victory in five innings.

It was 1952, when Earl and Betty were ready to get married. Earl went to the bank to take a significant amount of cash out to buy furniture, then he went to his dad's farm to help break the ground in the spring with the field cultivator. "All of a sudden, he felt that he didn't have his billfold."

Losing a Wallet and an Appetite

Earl took over telling the story, which brings back the anxiety that comes with a huge loss. "Well, here's the story. We were eating lunch, because on Saturdays I didn't work in the bakery. I worked on Sundays, and on Saturdays I usually worked on the farm." By this time, he already owned the milk trucks for four years and was also helping his broth-

er Vernie on Saturdays. However, on this Saturday in the spring of 1952, Earl was at the old Lookman Farm (dad's farm) on the east side of the Horicon Marsh. "I jumped on the tractor and went out to work the land with the field cultivator."

It was a pleasant day, and Earl was eating lunch. He may have even butchered three or four roosters that day as mom made a feast. "My mother made dinner, and we were all sitting around at the table, and then my dad asked me what I was going to do the rest of the day. I said, 'Betty and I are going up to Fond du Lac, we're going to buy furniture for our apartment in Horicon.' And I reached back to find I had an empty back pocket." The vibration from the tractor seat is likely how Earl lost a wallet full of cash in the field.

"My uncle, Alois Feucht, lived across the road from the field where I lost the billfold. So, I rounded up my uncle, and a few of his future son-

in-laws who happened to be at his farm at the time." In addition, Earl's brother Vernon Kehrmeier (1930-2014) and father Alvin "Casey" Kehrmeier (1891-1987) went looking for the billfold. "We looked and looked. We went back and forth, back and forth."

Blessed in the Fields

Earl said, "It was a struggle and more than just an easy find. What we did was we went back and re-worked the soil with the field cultivator. And here a little brown corner was sticking up out of the dirt, and Ollie Zehren spotted it. I had \$400 in that billfold, which is a lot of money back then." It is. Four hundred dollars in 1952, adjusted for inflation, is \$4,700 in 2025. "And we were going up to Sears Roebuck on Main Street in Fond du Lac, who had a furniture store down in the basement."

"So life has been good to us," Earl concluded with a thanks to St. Anthony. This conversation came up over Earl's St. Christopher medal in his wallet, and the power of prayer. I myself had recently lost my keys and Earl said it was important to pray. Earl said, "Betty has lost several things, so I always say, 'The first thing you do when you lose something is you pray to St. Anthony.' So, we were praying to St. Anthony at the same time we were looking for the billfold, and we found it."

They were looking for the wallet for an hour and a half to two hours. "I went to work and gave Ollie a \$20 bill and I said, 'Go buy some beer and a bottle of whiskey, we're gonna have a party. We're not going shopping today.' So that's what we did." Better to have 380 dollars, have a party and thank St. Anthony rather than lose 400. And yes, they bought case beer from Schmidbauer's in lower town LeRoy. Amen.

Alois Feucht's First Farm (Headquarters Road)

The Feucht family was important to the history of LeRoy and the Horicon Marsh. Here is an explanation in honor of Earl's neighbors and family

who were part of his childhood. Earl explained the history of Alois Feucht's farms. Alois Feucht first farmed by the Horicon Marsh in Section 29 of the Town of LeRoy. "That's the headquarters now. That was their farm. That's where they lived. And the government bought 'em out, and then they got the [federal] head-

quarters down there. And they moved across the road from us on the Collien farm. Right across the road, kind of." That move came after World War II ended.

Alois Feucht's father was August (1859-1929), whose father was Johann (1821-1897). The 1873 plat of LeRoy shows "J. Feucht" in Section 29 by the future National Wildlife Refuge headquarters. That same land was owned by August in the 1910 plat. When Earl and the Kehrmeier family left Waupun Township and came to the Lookman Farm in 1937, the Feucht's still farmed by what is currently Headquarters Road.

In some cases, the consequences of the federal refuge weren't as apparent until after World War II. For example, sometime in the 1940s, the Feuchts made the move to what would

become Point Road. Earl noted that the Feucht land once worked as farmland is now back to the marsh. In addition, once the Dyke Road by Kekoskee was built, the north half was the National Wildlife Refuge, and the south was the state. Please note, however, that according to Robert Gard and Edgar G. Mueller's book (*Wild Goose Marsh Horicon Stopover*), the federal government established the refuge around 1941 (p.132). Some farms that no longer exist in the Horicon Marsh still existed after that time period. The Feucht farm was one of them.

Earl also remembered Alois as very sociable and recalled some stories of the old Feucht farm by the currant Headquarters Road. "He was a little more carefree than his other Feuchts were. I think because he lived on the Marsh. He had open access to the Horicon Marsh. He had hunters coming in there from Chicago, and they were bringing moonshine in there. And then my dad would end up with some of that in a brown paper bag." One has to understand that those men from Chicago would "come out and shoot hundreds of ducks years ago." Earl said there was not so much goose hunting in those days, but those Chicago men would bring back some alcohol that worked its way to the original Feucht farm, then the Kehrmeyers, for both men married Gindt sisters. Recall that at the time of the great wallet loss, Alois Feucht isn't just a neighbor – he's family. Alois Feucht (1898-1993) married Elizabeth Gindt Feucht (1899-1966), the second of Jacob and Rosalia Gindt's children, making Elizabeth the next child after Earl's mom.

The Feucht farm located at the headquarters was good farmland, "Alois's farmland from where he lived to the interior lot on the borderline of the Marsh was all farmland between Hwy Z and the farm. It's a long driveway that goes back there. I would say the driveway is a half a mile long." That Feucht land was "very good subsoil," and there are portions of that between Hwy Z and the original farm that were flat and good to work on. "Good black soil."


It's important to remember this farm, because it's the heart of the Federal Wildlife Refuge.

Alois Feucht's Second Farm (Point Road)

Alois Feucht's family moved north of their original farmstead to the Collien farm south of the Jesse family. It is more accurate to say that the Jesse farm is across the road from the Lookman Farm, and Feuchts were close but to the southwest of the first and only farm Alvin and Rose Kehrmeyer (1898-1993) bought.

Earl explained when it came to the Feuchts, "We worked together all the time." For example, when Earl's youngest brother Donald was born, "They hauled us to Alois Feucht's place, and we would go play with them and our cousins, who were our best friends." Earl also said compared to the Kehrmeyers, Alois Feucht might have had a little more help from home through the Feucht family. One has to understand that the Kehrmeyers were starting from scratch on the Lookman Farm, as Alvin was already in his 40s when he bought his first farm. In contrast, Alois Feucht's father and grandfather had the farm at what became the marsh headquarters for years. "My dad never had farm experience, so Alois was probably a little better of a farmer than my dad was, and a little better off." This situation is shared here as an example of how the Feuchts were a family the Kehrmeyers could depend on.

By the time of the lost wallet memory, the Feuchts were on the Collien Farm for years. Earl said he thought the Feuchts were living there in the Marsh (later headquarters) when World War II started. "There was not much going on in the Marsh, because World War II started in '41." Eventually the state divided the Horicon Marsh between state and federal government, and some-

time after the war or in the late 1940s the Feuchts made the move. In regard to all of Alois and Elizabeth (Gindt) Feucht's children, Earl said, "all but Gertie was born on that farm" at the headquarters.

In addition, Earl recalls a time when Alois worked for the Horicon Marsh and the government. They bought his farm, and he worked for them part time. Earl remembers Alois Feucht would be putting road signs up for the federal government in the Marsh. "And Alois really liked that job, because he was working for the guy that was the head of the north part of the Marsh," Robert "Bob" Personius (1922-2019).

Feucht Family

When Earl goes back to losing his wallet, no other neighbors were in the fields besides the Feucht and Kehrmeyer families.

The Feuchts were important because the Kehrmeyers didn't have a lot of money, so the social exchange provided by St. Andrew's with church and the interactions with his cousins were the major sources of fond memories.

Aunt Elizabeth was Earl's mother's sister. She had a large garden and was always working outside. "All Gindts took pride in their gardens and flowers," Earl said. She was the mother of eight children (two boys, six girls). The fondest memories for Earl were by Grandma Gindt. It was common on a weekend, usually Sundays, that the Gindt girls would be working on needle work, handiwork and embroidering. "Whenever we'd visit my grandma's house, Grandma had a lot of room there. And I remember they would be all sitting around at the quilting frame exchanging stories, and the men would be sitting outside drinking beer." Because she died in the late 1930s, Earl said those memories were at the Gindt House (near Wiese Trucking today). "It was pretty typical. The grandkids would be playing outside; the men would be sitting under the shade tree if it was a summer day and visiting. And they didn't do much card playing." Meanwhile, inside Grandma's house, "if there wasn't a quilt frame up, they were embroidering and doing handiwork." For sure in this memory, Earl remembered his mom, Aunt Elizabeth Feucht and Aunt Sophie Schmidt (1906-1992) working as a family.

Earl also recalled Aunt Elizabeth as frugal. "When we were taken there, she would never arrange to take us home. We'd walk home from there, and that's a couple miles from where Alois Feucht lived originally in the Marsh, and us kids would have to walk home. See." Earl said in his childhood on the Lookman Farm on Point Road, the Kehrmeyer kids would be by the Feucht's (today on Headquarters Road). "Us kids would walk home. If Vernie and I were there, or if the girls were there. I remember several times we'd walk. I would say it's a good two and a half miles." That would be a time when maybe mom and dad dropped Earl and his siblings off. "If we went with mom and dad we went with the Model A car."

Earl also shared some memories of Alois and Elizabeth Feucht's children. Becoming a teenager in the Smutz Point area, Earl had a great time with Eddie and Ambrose Eilbes, and his Feucht cousins. "We'd get in somebody's car. My cousin [Jimmy Feucht] had a 1934 Ford... And we would go down to Kermis dances down in St. Anthony or St. Kilian. Wherever there was a church dance.

And Rudy Feucht was there." The guys always made a big deal out at those dances, many which served beer. "I know in St. Anthony; they always served beer at the Kermis. We had it made out that the last one to get a girl to dance with would have to buy the first drink. Beers were maybe 10 cents. And they served the beer there. And the first one on the dance floor was always Rudy Feucht." It didn't matter who the girl was, "He was the first guy out on the floor dancing. Hah!" In addition, there were Feuchts in the car when they were touring Ashford Township and the famous hill in lower Fond du Lac County. "And then we'd get down on Katzenburg Hill and coast down to Ashford. You know? We just get on top. Wind up. Give it a good start."

There is an irony in saving the wallet story when Earl and family prayed to St. Anthony, because this was also the same family that went to St. Anthony's for a good time. Those memories are preserved from being lost in honor of the patron saint.


