

Campbellsport Legion Baseball Class AA State Champions

On August 5, Campbellsport baseball beat Seymour 12-11 in the Class AA American Legion State Tournament in New London to win the Class AA state championship.

Campbellsport (16-6) took control in the first inning over Seymour (18-4) by scoring nine runs in the opening inning.

“We came out hot during the championship game against Seymour, scoring 9 runs in the first inning, then adding to it in the third,” said Campbellsport coaches Dave Bothe, Gary Goebel, and Jack McCarty. “Seymour did not give up, chipping away at the lead.”

The Cougars scored six runs before Seymour could record an out in the inning, featuring RBI singles by Brody Nolan, Tyler Sachen, Cullen Reis, and Trent Schladweiler for Campbellsport.

Campbellsport was able to load the bases with one out in the first inning, which resulted in three more runs, highlighted by Sachen’s second single of the inning and driving in two runs on

his base hit, ballooning the Cougars’ lead to 9-0 when the first inning ended.

The Cougars tacked on a run in the third inning when Riley Kohlmann got an RBI single to give Campbellsport a 10-0 lead over Seymour.

Seymour showed some life in the fourth inning by scoring three runs to put the score at 10-3 in favor of the Cougars, and continued their momentum in the fifth inning by getting the bases loaded, which allowed Seymour to score three more runs to close the gap a little more with the score at 10-6 going into the bottom of the fifth inning.

Campbellsport got a double from Sachen in the bottom of the fifth inning, bringing Braden Bothe up to the plate.

Bothe blasted a two-run home run over the right field fence, giving some more breathing room to Campbellsport, extending their lead to 12-6 over Seymour.

“Braden collected three hits, including a monumental home run in the fifth inning,” said Bothe, Goebel, and McCarty.

Kewaskum TRiE-athlon Brings Community Together for a Day of Fitness and Fun

The Kewaskum Friends of Parks and TRiE fitness teamed up this past weekend to host the first Kewaskum TRiE-athlon. More than 50 adult participants took on the challenge, which combined a 5K run/walk, a 13-mile bike ride, and a 2-mile kayak paddle.

Participants had the flexibility to tackle the course solo or partner with friends and family for a relay-style race. Without chip timing or podium finishes, the emphasis was on fun, community spirit, and personal accomplishment.

In addition to the adult race, 15 youth athletes participated in a mini version of the event, featuring a 1-mile run/walk and a 3.5-mile bike ride.

Kewaskum Friends of Parks said their goals for the event were, “to bring the community together, utilize our beautiful park space in a new way, encourage outdoor activity, and highlight Kewaskum’s new kayak launch in River Hill Park.”

They plan to host this event in Kewaskum again next year, “and feel it was a big success.”

Changes with the Village!

VILLAGE OF CAMPBELLSPORT

As with most organizations, it is important to reflect and evaluate needs, structures and best practices in times of change, and to be transparent about ongoing changes! This has been true with the Village of Campbellsport the last few months, and we feel it is right to communicate changes that we are currently undertaking for the next few months to evaluate their effectiveness with continuity of services, continued fiscal responsibility of public funds, and professional development of our staff!

Wastewater (Sewer)

In May of this year, Nate Boddien, our Wastewater Operator, left the village for a different opportunity. With his departure, it allowed the Village to evaluate our needs across all of our utility and public works departments. Adam Konen, who began working for the village in 2022 as General Labor Crew I, has been put onto a path to earn his wastewater certifications to operate the plant as well as continue assisting the public works team with general labor crew tasks.

During this period of transition, while Adam has received previous training from the previous wastewater operator, the village has contracted with MSA Professional Services to assist in training and operations with Adam. This contract runs until the end of 2025, and will be evaluated at that time for the level of service the village needs to ensure Adam’s continued success!

Thank you, Nate, for your years of service to the village, and thank you to Adam for taking on a new set of responsibilities!

Public Works: Infrastructure and Utilities

Over the last few years, Campbellsport has experienced a large increase in development and public works projects. Administration has planned and recruited the following projects with the village board, plan commission and professional service partners: approved, permitted or constructed 138 new housing units (a 17% increase in total housing units) since 2020, opened a new subdivision, continued development in the

Campbellsport Business Park – South, redone 15% of all roadways in the village, and have undertaken park improvement projects. Even with all of this progress, there are still significant projects coming up with the Water Treatment Plant and Wastewater Treatment Plant capital improvements, new residential proposals, and business expansions in the next few years.

To carry out administration and the village board’s planning and projects, along with safe delivery of all utility services, the Director of Public Works position has been transitioned into the Infrastructure and Utility Manager role, with Mark Gruber bringing his knowledge and experience with development and public works projects in the village to guide the strategic capital improvement projects and developments to their successful completion. This position also ensures proper compliance with all Wisconsin Department of Natural Resource standards for our water distribution system, and wastewater collection system, and is ultimately responsible for all reporting.

Mike Phillips, who began working for the village in 2016 as General Labor Crew I, has been elevated to General Labor Crew II – Lead (Water) to allow the new Infrastructure and Utility Manager role




Time will carry us all forward, as it always has. But we can choose to be fully awake to both its gifts and its inevitable losses, holding them together in our hearts like the complex chord they make.

County Trunk Hwy D Pulverize and Repave Completed and Road Open

The Washington County Highway Department in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation pulverized and repaved a five-mile stretch of County Trunk Hwy (CTH) D from CTH WW to Kettle View Dr South in the towns of Barton and Wayne. Payne & Dolan, Inc. was the prime contractor and performed the pulverizing and paving operations.

Safety improvements include a 4-foot paved shoulder, 2-foot gravel shoulder, new guard rail and signage. Several crossroad culverts were also installed along with a culvert liner prior to the roadway being paved. The Washington County Highway Department appreciates the public's patience and extra caution as it improves and maintains Washington County's roadways striving for effective mobility and reliable infrastructure.





AN OUTDOORSMAN'S JOURNAL

Young Biologists

Hello friends,

The next two weeks, I am writing to you about Idaho and then Montana. This week's column will be based out of Stanley, Idaho, a very mountainous area. There, I was helping/observing and camping with a team of fish technicians who work for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and do research on trout and salmon on tributaries of the Salmon River.

Julianne Kirby graduated from the University of Virginia in 2024 with a degree in Environmental Science and is the crew leader. Treygan Bragg is a senior at Brigham Young University and a biology major. My daughter, Selina Walters, graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 2023 with degrees in fisheries and water resources. Devin Dockendorf is a senior at Bemidji State, majoring in wildlife biology. This crew works "hitches" that are eight days and then have six off with a percentage of them living out of their cars when not working.

Monday, July 28
High 83, Low 47

This is one of those "how much can you write about as there is a ton" type of stories. First, it was a 1,625-mile drive to get here while pulling a trailer with an ATV in it for my next adventure, and pretty much staying in the GMC Hotel the entire time. Second is arriving at a remote camp nestled in the mountains and meeting the crew I mentioned and about 15 other people doing research. Just as much as anything else would be the learning curve I would be on as I observed, helped, and always waded following this snorkel team.

Here is the scoop in as few words as possible. First, each team, which can vary from two to four people, hikes into a predetermined site on a stream that can be 2 to 15 feet wide and two inches in some places to four feet deep.

This in itself can be a physical task and is found by using OnX. Once the site is reached, depending on the width of the stream, either one or multiple people suit up and one person takes data and each survey covers 100 meters of stream with measurements of stream width taken six times.

Next, the snorkelers get into the water, which, due to the fact that their wet suits are partial-

ly shredded, can feel very cold with an average stream water temp of 51 degrees.

What the snorkelers are looking for and tell to the data recorder is the number and size of steelhead/rainbow trout, cutthroat, brook trout, bull trout, and presence/absence of non-target native fish such as dace, suckers, pike minnows, etc.

The crew was extensively trained in early June in fish identification and estimating size, which, with the larger fish, is completed by knowing the width of their hand. Interestingly, in most cases when spotted, the fish are not scared of the snorkeler.

My main job was to record data, which is a huge responsibility but quite simple once trained, and that enabled us to have two crews. For myself, some of my main challenges were to do the data correctly and, just as importantly, to not fall in the often very slippery, rock or gravel bottomed streams, also keeping up with 21-24 year olds in our mountain hikes.

In the late afternoon, I was with Treygan and Selina. Bull trout are one of the most loved fish in the mountains and a very clear sign of the health of our rivers and streams. Unfortunately, they are not doing well and are labeled as "Threatened."

Bull trout have two main life histories, one is a "resident," and they are much smaller than "migratory" bull trout that come back to where they were born to spawn. A resident bull trout is large at 12-15 inches, and the migratory bull trout, which lives most of the year in lakes or larger rivers, can reach into the high 30-inch mark. We were on our last site/pass of the day, and I have to tell you that due to the cold water temps, pulling themselves on the stream bottom through countless deadfalls and over hundreds of rocks all day, these kids are visibly worn out. They say this snorkeling is a lot like "underwater rock climb-

ing. Treygan and Selina came across an incredible find: four big bull trout ranging from 22 to 33 inches. They were even able to make a really cool video with Selina's phone.

This evening at camp, where each crew does its own cooking and just about everyone sleeps in a tent on the ground, the bull trout experience was the talk of camp.

I think that just as interesting is the chinook salmon that are born in these streams and rivers, live in fresh water for a year or two, migrate roughly 900 miles to the Pacific Ocean to salt water, live there for several years and then migrate in an incredible journey to spawn and then die where they were hatched.

As sometimes happens, I have used more space than I should, but for everyone reading this, I hope you can at least partially understand how important this work is and be thankful that there are enough men and women that get the education and are willing to do the research to protect our natural resources.



Police Department


