Community Honors Fallen Athlete with Benches, Plaque, and Quilt

The Campbellsport High School cross-country family has honored teammate Sawyer Dirmeier, 18, with two memorial benches following his sudden passing in a motorcycle accident this summer.

One bench stands on Sawyer's home property, inscribed: "From the first mile to the last, Sawyer will always be a part of us. His Campbellsport Cross Country Family."

The second, featuring a plaque of his cross-country achievements, sits on a small corner of land generously donated by the Meilahn family.

Positioned on the southwest edge of the home course at the elementary school beneath the

shade of a tree, it overlooks the trail where Sawyer ran from sixth through twelfth grade.

The Dirmeier family expressed deep gratitude for the team's compassion. "We are so thankful for their kindness and for finding such a meaningful way to keep Sawyer's spirit present on his home course," they shared.

Teammates also contributed their own sports t-shirts, which team mothers — Bethany Bobb, Tracy Dieckman, Kelly King, Kristina Meilahn, Sam Nolan, Laurie Pickering, and Shannon Toshner — sewed into a quilt, creating another lasting tribute to Sawyer's strength, determination, and adventurous spirit.

Campbellsport Football Defeats Kewaskum 18-14 in Final Minute

On August 29, the Campbellsport and Kewaskum football teams squared off in their annual rivalry game for the Kettle Moraine trophy at Kewaskum High School.

Campbellsport (1-1) and Kewaskum (0-2) traded punts on the first respective offensive drives of the game, before quarterback Eli Ogi threw a beautiful, deep pass over the Cougars' defense into the hands of Jace Wichtoski for a 58-yard touchdown to give the Indians a 7-0 lead over Campbellsport with 7:11 on the first quarter clock.

Pierce Kaehne responded for the Cougars with a 58-yard kickoff return on an ensuing kickoff to give Campbellsport the ball at the Kewaskum 30-yard line, but the Cougars turned the ball over on fourth down, giving the ball back to the Indians.

"It was nice to get off to a good start. Eli and Jace are very talented players," said Kewaskum Head Coach Jeff Rondorf. "I feel anytime those two hook up, there is a chance we can score."

Kewaskum made one first down on their next drive, which was earned by Kingston Grisolono after receiving the ball from Ogi and reversing his field about 15 yards behind the scrimmage, which allowed him to gain six yards for the first down.

The two teams were at a standstill in an early defensive battle when Kewaskum stopped a Campbellsport drive with a fumble recovery by Easton Derge, giving the ball back to the Indians at their own 36-yard line.

Campbellsport's defense rose up with a fourth-

down stop to get the ball back to their offense at their 37-yard line.

The Cougars converted two fourth downs on the drive, capped off by a Jackson Straub 30-yard passing touchdown to Kaehne, who hauled in the pass after it was tipped in the air and strolled into the end zone, putting the score at 7-6 with less than one minute left in the half.

Kewaskum's opening kickoff of the second half bounced off a Cougar and was recovered by the Indians, which gave the Indians an unexpected offensive possession to start the second half.

The Indians got a big passing play from Ogi to Grisolono for 36 yards, which set up Kewaskum within the Campbellsport 20-yard line.

"Kingston ran the ball well and fought all game for the extra yards," said Rondorf. "He is a talented athlete and I expect him to have a great season."

D.N.R. Honors Connie Ramthun as State Natural Areas Volunteer of the Year

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced Connie Ramthun as the 2025 State Natural Areas Volunteer of the Year for her dedication to invasive species removal in the northern Kettle Moraine.

As a lifelong resident of the Kettle Moraine area, Ramthun has seen native plants being overtaken by invasive plants like garlic mustard, buckthorn and honeysuckle. She has taken an active role helping native plants recover and controlling invasive species through the DNR's State Natural Areas Volunteer Program and as a board member with the Friends of Kettle Moraine State Forest.

She has been a part of the State Natural Areas Volunteer Program since 2018, establishing the Stewards of the Northern Kettle Moraine, which coordinated workdays at Haskell Noyes Woods State Natural Area for garlic mustard removal, worked on removing reed canary grass at Spruce Lake Bog State Natural Area and kept the boardwalk area full of showy native plants. She also spearheaded successful grant applications for this work through the Friends of the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest. According to Ramthun, volunteers have been able to reduce garlic mustard by 90% at Haskell Noyes Woods, which has allowed native plants to return and flourish. The Stewards of the Northern Kettle Moraine has also expanded their work into other parts of the forest.

"Connie has dedicated many years to conserving and restoring native ecosystems," said Samantha Lindquist, superintendent of the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit. "She brings extensive skills and knowledge of native species and invasive eradication to her efforts and strives to inspire others to action. Connie's commitment to the health of native landscapes is commendable and appreciated."

Since 2020, the Stewards of the Northern Kettle Moraine has averaged 150 volunteer hours per year on state natural areas alone, with events held regularly in May and June. They have worked to successfully control garlic mustard across 62 acres of woods each year at Haskell Noyes Woods so that the diverse ground layer of native plants flourishes and helps support the entire ecosystem. Looking ahead, Ramthun hopes to find an apprentice volunteer to train and pass the work on to.

Coming Home

Dear Reader,

I've been thinking about something we all know but rarely talk about openly – what happens to our kids when they leave home and go out into the world.

We raise them the best we can. We love them well. We try to teach them right from wrong, how to work hard, how to treat people with respect. We give them everything we've got – our time, our wisdom, our resources, our hearts. And most of the time, they take it all for granted. Not because they're bad kids, but because that's just human nature. When something's always been there, you don't really see it.


Then they leave. They go off to college, or move to another city, or start their careers, convinced they know better than we do about how the world works. They love us, sure, but they don't really get what we were trying to give them all those years. Our advice sounds old-fashioned. Our concerns seem overblown. Our values feel outdated.

And then the world gets hold of them.

The world doesn't care that they're good people. It doesn't care that they were raised with love and attention. The world doesn't give a damn about their feelings or their potential or their dreams. Bosses who don't value them, friends who disappoint them, relationships that fall apart, plans that don't work out the way they imagined. They get knocked around, sometimes badly. They discover that most people aren't looking out for their best interests. They learn that fairness isn't guaranteed and that being a good person doesn't automatically lead to good things happening.

Some of this teaches them valuable lessons – resilience, independence, how to stand up for themselves. But a lot of it is just hard. Really hard. The kind of hard that makes you realize that the people who loved you unconditionally, who worried about you, who tried to prepare you for exactly this – maybe they knew something after all.

That's when the phone calls start coming



more frequently. That's when they actually listen to your advice instead of just waiting for their turn to talk. That's when they start to understand that all those family dinners they couldn't wait to escape, all those conversations they found boring, all that support they took for granted – it was something precious.

They don't all come back physically, but most of them come back in ways that matter. They call more often. They ask for advice. They start to repeat the things you used to say. They begin to understand that home wasn't just a place they outgrew – it was a sanctuary they didn't even realize they needed.

Some of them do come back to live closer to family. Some realize that the place they were so eager to leave actually has something to offer that they can't find anywhere else. Some discover that the life they thought was too small for them is in reality exactly the right size.

And when they do come back – whether it's for a visit, or emotionally, or for good, – there's something different in their eyes. They see you differently. They see home differently. All those things you tried to give them that they couldn't appreciate before? Now they can. Now they understand what unconditional love looks like, because they've learned how rare it is.

It's not that they needed to suffer to appreciate us. It's that they needed to see what the world looks like without the safety net we provided, without people who were automatically in their corner, without the kind of love that doesn't have to be earned or maintained through performance.

This isn't about them coming home defeated. It's about them coming home wiser. They bring back everything they've learned out there, but they also bring back a real understanding of what they had here all along.



Maybe the greatest gift we can give our children is raising them well enough that they can go out into the world, get knocked around, learn what they need to learn, and still find their way back to what matters most.

As Bob Segar sang, "turn the page." And so, we have. A fresh calendar page. The September Morn Neil Diamond crooned about is here. Can't you almost hear Neil's dulcet tones about how "night became a brand-new day?"

If there's anything the month cries out for, it's retrospection. While the leaves, once a vibrant hue, crunch underfoot into a uniform brown drabness, the soul seeks illumination.

What better way to find such clarity than in the radiance cast by previous Septembers? September 6, 1975 left a lifetime deep impression on a then seventeen year old. On the cusp of his senior year in high school, he stood up, an awkward, clumsy footed groomsman in his older brother's wedding. It had been a fight to get him into the green, nearly black tux. All summer his parents prodded him to apply the gravelly facial medication to clear up his acne-prone complexion. Well beyond the assistance of Stridex pads.

Wright Brothers, a box factory in Fond du Lac called. 53-hour weeks. A vacation. Once again, he'd hung on. Another story to remember.



Kewaskum School District Approves 2025–2026 Levy

KEWASKUM SCHOOL DISTRICT

The 2025 Annual Meeting of the Kewaskum School District Board of Education was held on Monday, August 25, in the Kewaskum High School Theater. The meeting included an overview of the previous school year's accomplishments and a presentation of the previous and current year's budget.

"The Annual Meeting reflects the strong partnership between the community and the district," said Board President Jim Leister. "We are grateful for the continued support of our families, staff, and residents who help us build a strong future for Kewaskum students."

Business Manager Keith Brightman presented the 2024–25 financial results along with the preliminary 2025–26 budget and estimated tax levy. After discussion, the electors approved the 2025–26 tax levy for operating expenses and capital outlay of \$11,445,098, debt retirement for \$1,920,775, and community services fund for \$76,800.

Brightman stated, "The total levy reflects the district's continued commitment to strong financial stewardship while supporting students and staff. Although the district's total expenses only increased 2.77% for this year, the property tax levy increased by 7.3% because state legislators did not increase school aid. In the future, we hope to see

the state legislature contribute to the state aid for schools so that the inflationary burden does not fall entirely on property owners. While Kewaskum is projecting a 7.3% increase, there will likely be much higher increases across the state—again because of a freeze on the state aid that offsets tax levies. The bottom line is that Kewaskum is a low-revenue, low-cost district that produces well above average results."

Kewaskum Superintendent Dr. Mark Bazata reported on the district's commitment to student care, challenge, and commitment, along with staff engagement and financial responsibility, highlighting a nine-year high attendance rate of 96.2%, well above the state average, a 73.4% passing rate for Advance Placement exams, which is the highest it has been in over 10 years, 72% of the Class of 2024 participated in work-based learning programs, and a strong fund balance, avoiding short-term borrowing and saving taxpayers \$30,000–40,000 annually.

Dr. Mark Bazata, Superintendent, added, "The Kewaskum School District is thriving. Our students are excelling, our families and staff are engaged, and our finances remain sound. These accomplishments reflect our unwavering commitment to excellence, responsibility, and community pride."





Ogi hit Wichtoski for their second touchdown passing connection on the day with a 15-yard touchdown to give Kewaskum a 14-6 lead with seven minutes left in the third quarter.

“Eli did have a good game statistically, but what I was especially happy with was how he kept his composure throughout the game,” said Rondorf.

Campbellsport was facing a third down when Straub found a streaking Kaehne down the left sideline, who outraced the defense for a big, 74-yard touchdown for their second touchdown of the day to put the score at 14-12 in favor of the Indians with 5:40 on the third-quarter clock.

“Pierce has stepped into a bigger role this season in multiple places and is making it pay off so far,” said Campbellsport Head Coach Todd Wondra.

The two rivals punted before Kewaskum fumbled the ball at the Campbellsport 41-yard line, recovered by Keegan Sabish for the Cougars.

The Cougars fumbled on their second offensive play, which was recovered by the Indians’ Chase Heinonen at the Campbellsport 43-yard line.

“Our defense played well against a good Campbellsport offense, which usually doesn’t turn the ball over,” said Rondorf. “Getting those two turnovers was a credit to how good our defense is.”

“It was a good win in that rivalry game, with the kids fighting and working hard all night,” said Wondra. “We know when those teams get together, nothing will come easy, and you’re going to know it after all is said and done.”


